Broward dad, son find cache of bogus cash

Independence Day took on a whole new meaning for Steven ██████████ and his son Ian. While walking through West Lake Park in Hollywood, they found a rusty ammo box full of at least \$500,000 worth of crisp \$20 bills.

But the possibility of wealth for the Hollywood family quickly vanished. Federal agents believe the money is counterfeit, ██████████ hue said Sunday.

This is just the latest strange twist in ██████████ life. He says he posed as a drug dealer and worked for the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration in Beirut in the mid-1980s. Kidnapped by drug smugglers, he was held hostage for 19 months. He was released July 4, 1986.

Now, ██████████ often walks with his son on Independence Day to celebrate his freedom. As he and Ian walked near the Intracoastal Waterway by the Sheridan Street bridge Saturday, Ian

saw the rusty box, half-submerged next to a tiny red flag.

Ian persuaded his father to pry open the lid. It was jammed to the rim with stacks of \$20 bills stuffed inside freezer bags.

"He's lucky I didn't have a heart attack right on the spot," ██████████ said.

██████████ said he counted the cash at home, but quit when he reached \$350,000, about halfway to the bottom. His wife, Johanna ██████████ had visions of a new home and their son's college tuition.

██████████, however, said he couldn't shake lingering doubts. Re-examining the money that night, he noticed several serial numbers were all the same. A U.S. Treasury agent Sunday confirmed that the bills were bogus, ██████████ said.

Ian, a member of the Boy Scouts Webelos Troop ██████████ said, "I think I'm going to get a special Scout badge."

This document is one of many pages comprising the federal indictment from my case.

To my dismay, this was the largest print I could reproduce in such a compact area in which to display this document.

\$20 federal reserve notes were uncovered at 11720 Northwest [REDACTED] Street, Sunrise Florida. This was the address of David [REDACTED] brother. Another \$500,400 was buried at the defendant's uncle business, [REDACTED] Laundry, Hollywood, Florida. At the defendant's residence, \$394,500 was located. On July 4, 1992, an ammunition box containing \$243,740 in counterfeit federal reserve notes was found in Hollywood. A total of \$9,802,920 in counterfeit federal reserve notes was recovered in South Florida. A total of \$2,095,630 was not accounted for, however, the defendant claimed that several million dollars was wasted during the printing process.

In regards to Case No. 92-6076-CR-[REDACTED], the defendant was originally named in a three count Indictment. Count One charged Conspiracy to Counterfeit Federal Reserve Notes, Count Two charged Counterfeiting Federal Reserve Notes and Count Three Charged Uttering Counterfeit Federal Reserve Notes. Pursuant to plea negotiations the defendant pled guilty to Counts One and Two, and Count Three was dismissed. In regards to Case No. 92-6091-CR-[REDACTED], a One-Count Indictment was returned in the District of Nevada, charging the defendant with Counterfeiting Federal Reserve Notes. the case was subsequently transferred pursuant to Rule 20 to the Southern District of Florida.

New bill designed to combat counterfeiters

WASHINGTON — A new \$20 bill is coming with high-tech features designed to trip up computer-savvy counterfeiters. But the change people will notice first is the larger and slightly off-center portrait of Andrew Jackson.

The new portrait, like the old, is based on a drawing from about 1820. But it's a close-up and shows the nation's seventh president with darker hair than the earlier version. The view on the back depicts the White House from the north rather than from the south.

Most of the changes are more than cosmetic. They're aimed at bogus bill makers armed with increasingly sophisticated color copiers, computer scanners, color ink jet printers and publishing-grade software.

"As we ... raise the hurdle even higher for criminals, we ensure that our currency remains respected and trusted

around the globe," said Treasury Secretary Robert Rubin, who unveiled the new design Wednesday with Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan.

The features include:

—A watermark to the right of the portrait and in its shape, only smaller, visible when the bill is held up to light.

An embedded polymer security thread to the far left of the portrait. "USA TWENTY" and a flag are printed on the thread. When exposed to ultraviolet light, the thread glows green.

—A numeral on the lower right corner of the front printed in color-shifting ink that looks green when viewed straight on and black when viewed from an angle.

—Very fine lines around Jackson's portrait and the picture of the White House. When duplicated on a copier, the lines come out in a wavy moire pattern.

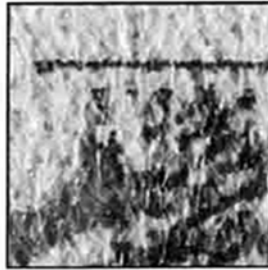

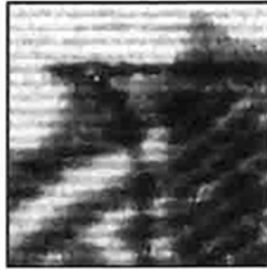

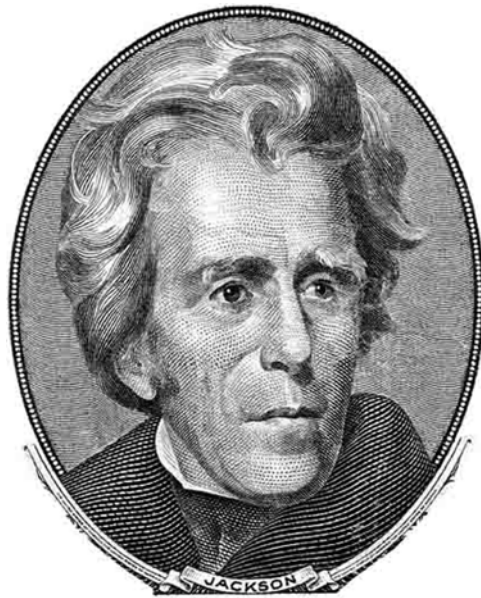

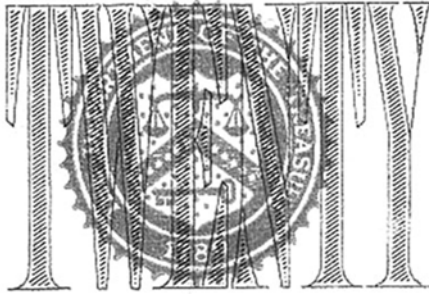
