Introduction to Pseudo Code



This section introduces the basic concepts of pseudo code and shows some examples.

What is Pseudo Code?

It is quite difficult to define the **pseudo code** exactly. It is a kind of structured English for describing algorithms. It allows the designer to focus on the logic of the algorithm without being distracted by details of programming language syntax. The pseudo code describes the logic of the program and acts as a blueprint for the source code to be written by the programmer.

Below is an example of pseudo code and its counterpart in Java. It is not necessary to understand what this does; it only demonstrates the differences:

There are two main reasons for using pseudo code:

- Programming languages evolve at a rather rapid pace. Pseudo code is programming language neutral and can be (re-)used no matter what programming language is used.
- A designer can influence and understand the workings of a system to be built. It also provides a communication vehicle between a designer / modeller and a programmer.

Pseudo Code Notation

There is no universal standard notation for Pseudo, since it is read by other people, not by the computer. For instructional purposes it is helpful if people working on the same project all follow a similar style. For the purpose of this course, the following notation is used:

All pseudo code is written using a mono space (non-proportional) font. The advantage is that columns line up nicely, which makes it easier to read the code. Below an example of pseudo code from the OO and UML course.
