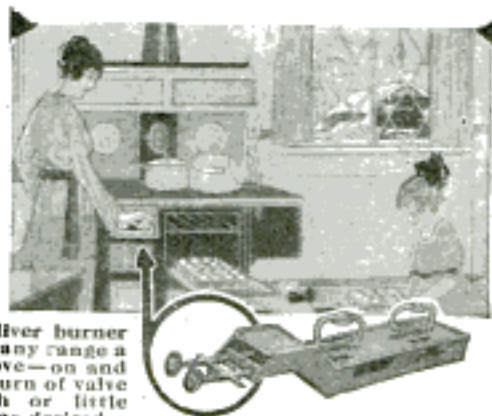

Romance of the Typewriter Revealed on Its Fiftieth Anniversary

ALTHOUGH it has freed the world from pen slavery, facilitated the tremendous growth of modern business, and opened the doors of opportunity to women, the typewriter is only 50 years old.

While it has knit the world closer together and its influence has been felt in the shaping of language and even of human thought, the man still in his fifties can distinctly remember when this "new-fangled" writing machine was only an object of curiosity.

Its birthplace was a little machine shop in the outskirts of Milwaukee where three middle-aged, thoughtful, and hard-working men, looked upon as "cranks" by their neighbors, labored upon pet inventions of their own.

One of them, a printer and "newspaperman" by trade, was engaged in developing a machine for numbering serially the pages of blank books. In this work, he had interested the second, while the third put in his time trying to invent a mechanical "spader" to take the place of a plow.

Chance caused the three to drop the inventions on which they

had been working and to pool their interests in a new and greater undertaking. According to the story of one of them, the idea arose out of a remark made when the paging machine was nearing completion:

"Why cannot such a machine be made that will write letters and words and not figures only?"

As a result of the remark they designed the "Pterotype," but it was never perfected. Model after model was built until 25 or 30 had been turned out, and finally, in 1873, a machine was constructed which was deemed sufficiently perfected for actual manufacture.

It wrote only capital letters and was a

very primitive-looking affair. The carriage was returned by a curious foot treadle, which, however, demonstrated its uselessness and was soon displaced by the now familiar hand-carriage return. Nevertheless, the fundamental principles of construction embodied in this first typewriter still survive.

The public took to the new invention rather gingerly. There was prejudice against printed letters to begin with. Many

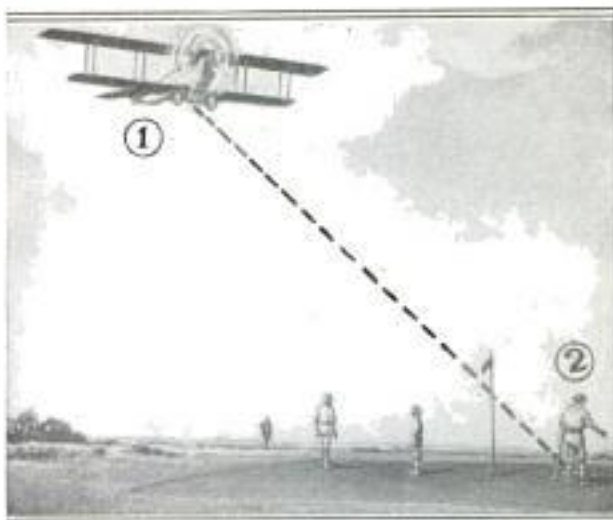

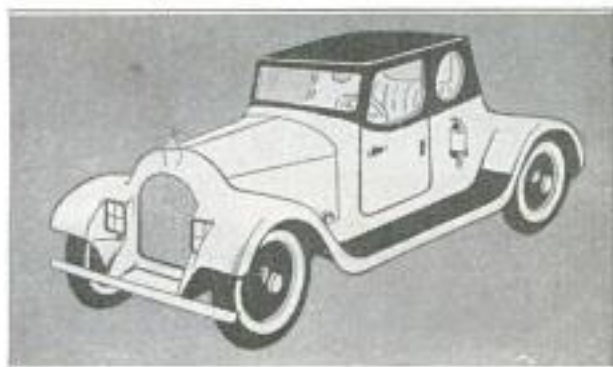

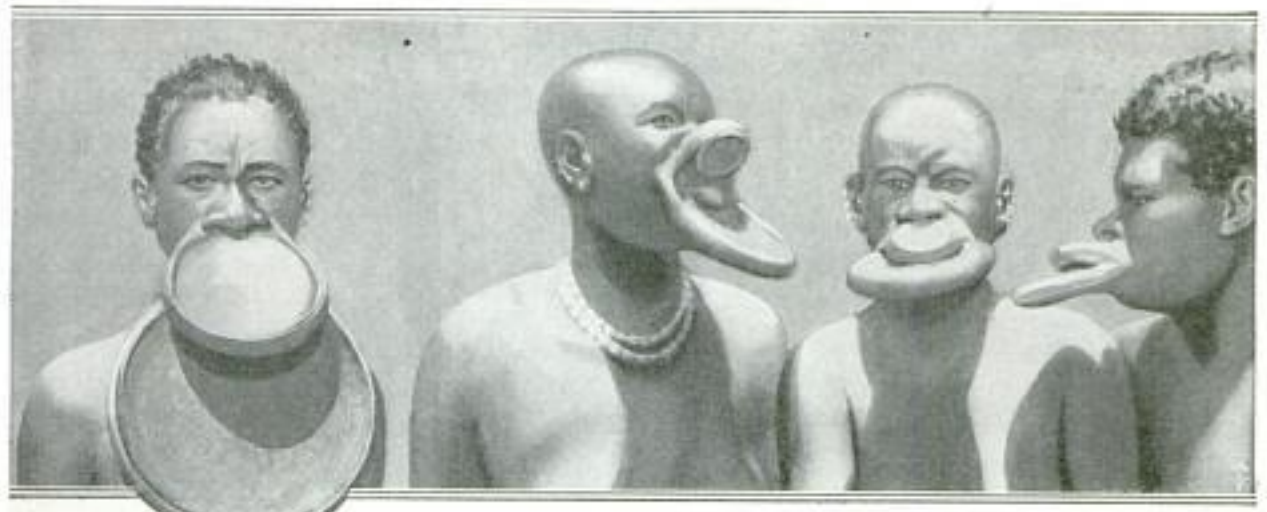
LIPS STRETCHING TO EYES

Through the exhibits there displayed, it is shown that practically every known gem is to be found somewhere in the United States. No longer need the jewel collector hie himself to South Africa for diamonds, since the diamonds are to be found in Arkansas, North Carolina, Kentucky, Georgia, Ohio, Wisconsin, Colorado, and California. Montana leads in the production of sapphires and also of rubies, while others of the same family,

especially the true emerald, which is often more valuable than diamonds of equal size, is found in North Carolina, and New Mexico. The topaz collection is remarkable for its size and the great range of colors shown. While the largest and richest of the blue variety of the topaz comes from Russia, Colorado has produced a marvelous reddish-brown stone, that cannot be excelled, while the clear varieties from New England and Utah are as lovely as a diamond. Many lands have given garnets, but the finest are from New Mexico. Nevada's opals have become important in the commercial world. Fresh water pearls come from the mussel and are found in the rivers of Arkansas, Indiana, and Tennessee.

POWER OF IDOLS STILL GREAT IN MANY LANDS

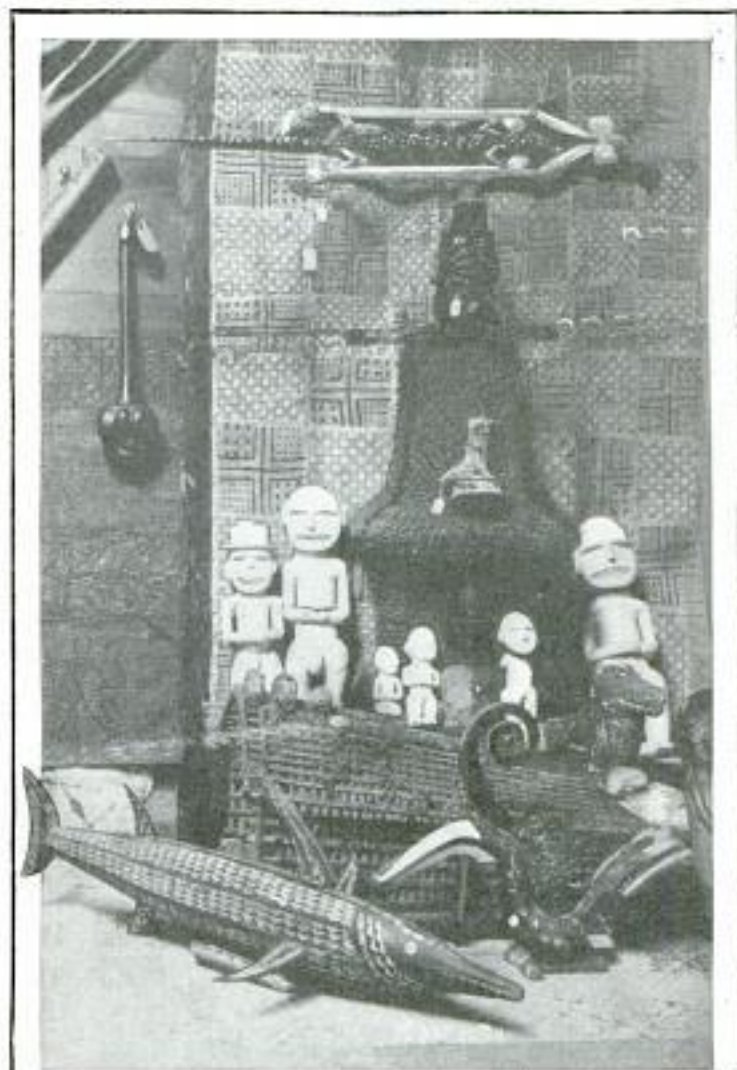
Great as have been the strides of civilization in the last hundred years, a very large portion of the world still is inhabited by men in a primitive stage, who fear and pay homage to strange idols of wood and stone. During some 25 years of roaming in out-of-the-way places, a Canadian has gathered together a unique collection of these heathen deities. One is a wooden carving of a crocodile from New Ireland, one of the South Sea islands. Another is the deity of the water paid homage to by the Solomon Islanders. To it they dedicate their canoes on launching, often making human sacrifices as part of the ceremony.

Then there is the special house built for the head devil of the Fijians and also the devil himself. The head god of the Battaks, an aboriginal tribe in Sumatra, who is supposed to subsist entirely upon human

bodies, also forms part of the collection. In obtaining six various-sized chalk figures, the collector nearly lost his life. These belonged to the New Irelanders, a primitive tribe of Papuan blood, who

are ancestor worshippers. When a member of a chief's family dies, one of these images is made from the chalk found in the Rossel Mountains. It is brought very secretly to the chief's house and placed in a chapel. The spirit of the deceased is then supposed to enter the figure and remain ever after. Among other idols in the collection are a god of ancient Mexico; three heads of coconuts carved in odd designs by natives of British New Guinea, and carvings of the rhinoceros hornbill made by the sea Dyaks, and

representations of a fish, the Bonito, that is held sacred in the Stewart group of islands.

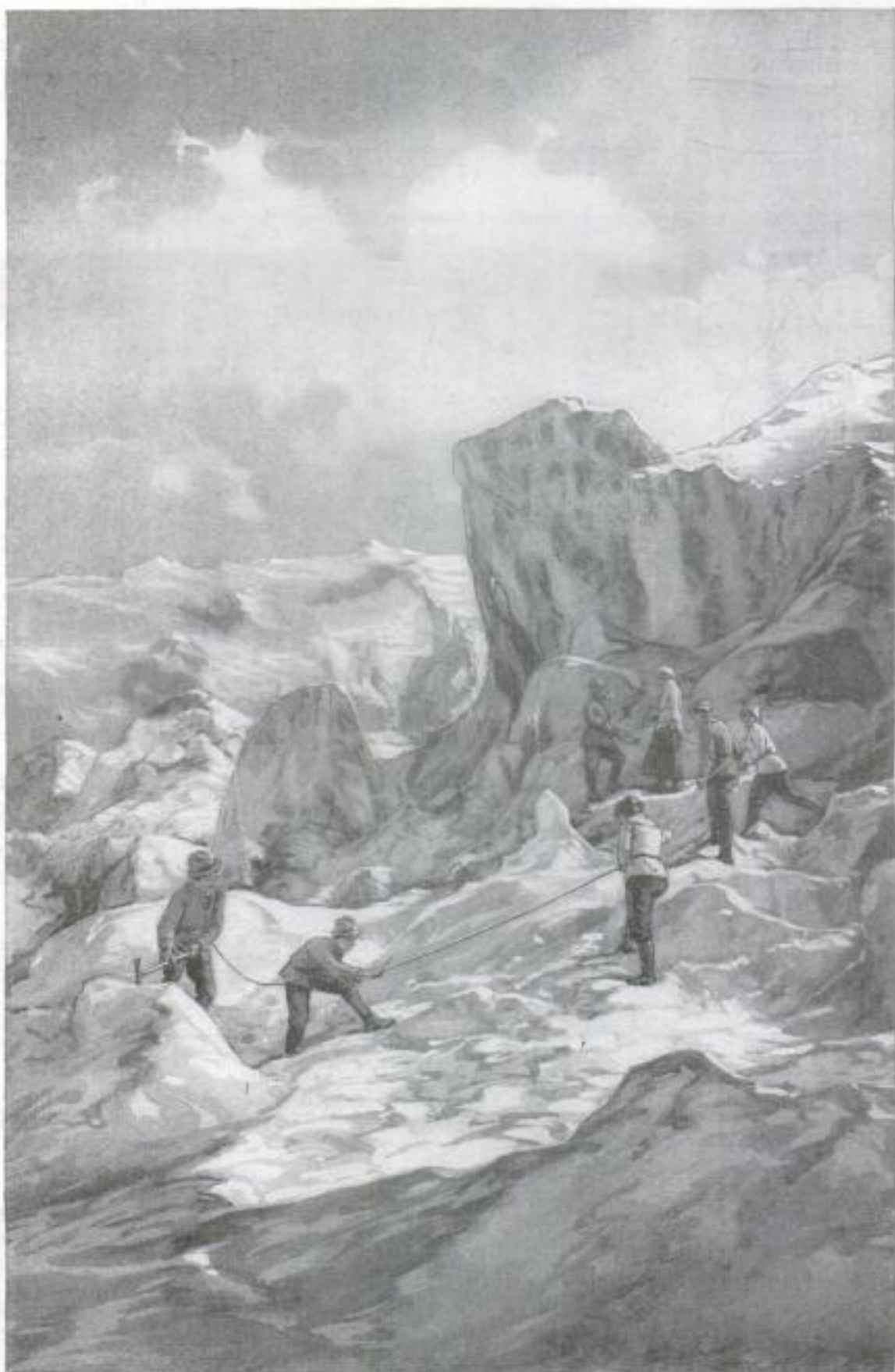
INSECTS' SENSE OF COLOR IS SHOWN BY TESTS

While naturalists have long known that insects have a highly developed sense of smell, recent investigations have indicated that they also have keen color preferences. For instance, the mosquito prefers navy blue to 16 other shades, and positively shuns yellow. Flies have no liking for pale blue, but will settle thickly

on white objects. Both flies and mosquitoes will respond to light and darkness. Colors of flowers attract many insects, but the more effective bait is their perfume. So pronounced is this excitement to odors that a scientist has asserted that it could be adapted to rid the cotton-growing states of the boll-weevil pest. He has suggested that the male boll weevil could be lured into traps by reproducing from coal tar certain fumes.

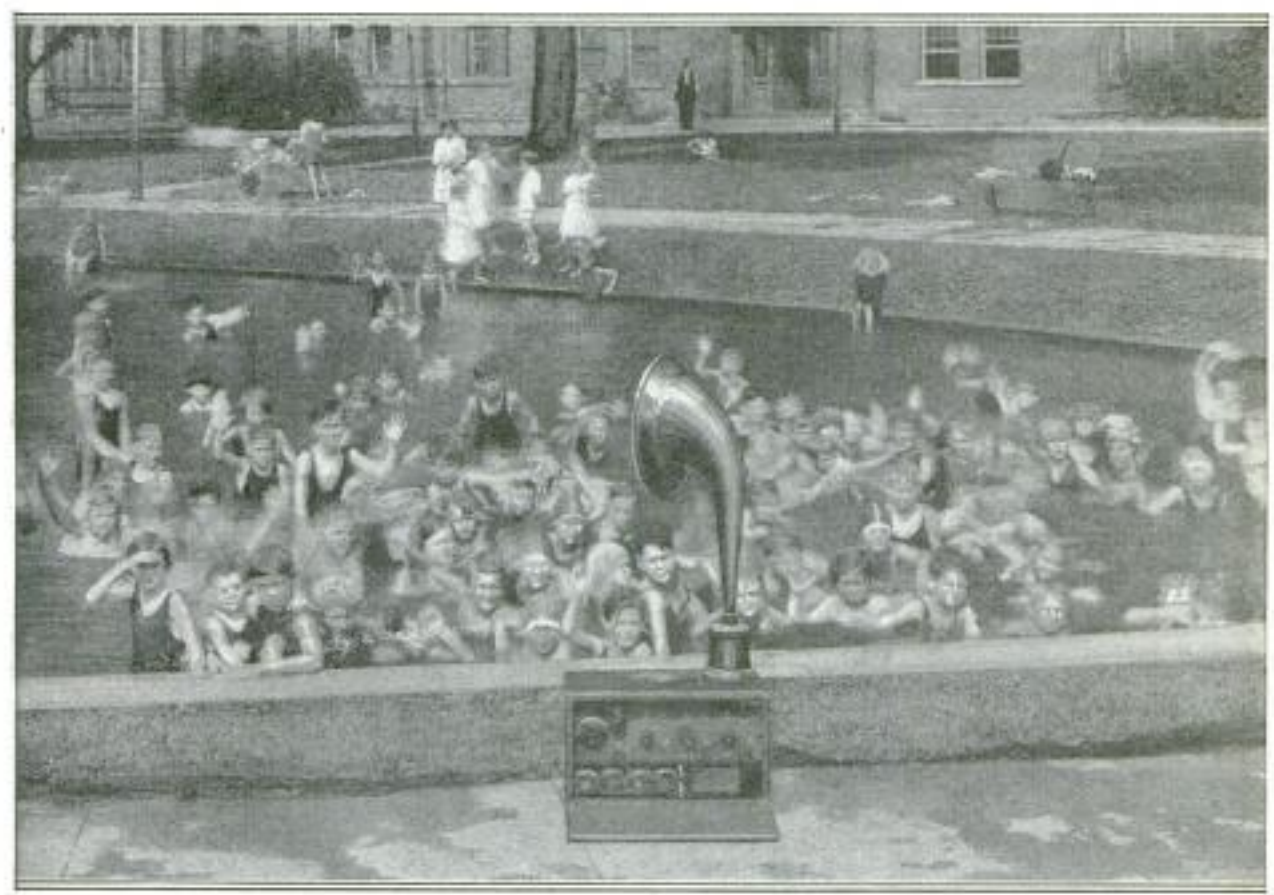

HEROISM OF ALPINE GUIDES SAVES LIVES OF MANY

Although they risk their lives daily amid snow-capped peaks, icy precipices, and treacherous glaciers, deeds of heroism by alpine guides are so common that they pass almost unnoticed. Cut off from the outside world, they are reared from the cradle to follow their hazardous profession, a heritage from generations of hardy mountaineers. Brought up among heights famed throughout the world for their beauty and grandeur, practically their only means of livelihood is guiding the thousands of tourists who flock to the great Swiss resorts every year. One of the

greatest proofs of the bravery of the guides is that, despite the many hidden perils of the winding mountain trails, serious accidents and loss of life are almost unknown. It is an honored tradition that these climbers must always be ready to sacrifice themselves to save those in their charge, and this is a code that is never violated. Usually they act in pairs, one in front and the other in the rear, with several travelers in between, all of them being tied together by long ropes about their waists. This is done, so that, even if several of the party are engulfed by a sudden snowslide, they may not become separated. Thus mountain climbing develops nimbleness and all-around strength.

DIESEL ENGINE FOR AUTOS
TO INCREASE MILEAGE

Through the use of a Diesel-type engine, recently tested in the West, in automobiles, motorists see the hope of ending fuel and ignition troubles, and the attainment of long mileages impossible today. While this design of power plant has been used previously on boats, it has not heretofore proved practical in small units. Its advantage is that it readily burns heavy fuel oils, and has no spark plugs, coils, or ignition system of any kind. The mixture is ignited by the heat of the air compressed by the piston. This temperature is so great that the fuel injected into the cylinder is instantly fired. At present the average consumption of "gas" in the United States is more than 10,000,000 gallons daily and the supply is limited by the fact that only about 20 per cent of the crude oil is available as gasoline. To supply the deficiency it has been necessary to "crack," that is, to distill under pressure, some of the heavier oils into motor fuel. This has resulted in fouling of plugs and carbon troubles.

With the Diesel engine these handicaps would be done away with as it is designed to take advantage of the greater latent energy in the heavier oils.

RANGE FINDERS FROM GUNS
USED AS TELESCOPES

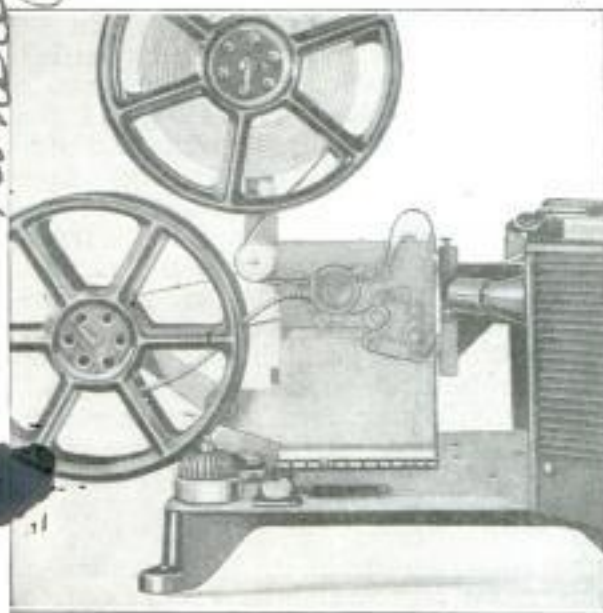

PAPER MOVIE FILMS TO END THE DANGER OF FIRE *2830*

For the use in homes, churches, schools, and other places outside of the theater, a portable motion-picture projector has been developed that uses inexpensive, noninflammable paper films. It is said that this machine eliminates all danger of fire, and that it is so simple it may be operated by a child. Besides being used for movies, it also may be employed as a magic lantern, showing solid objects on the screen in either plain or natural colors without altering it in any way. This feature is expected to prove of value in teaching botany, engineering, and chemistry. The device projects the pictures by reflection instead of, as in the ordinary projector, by penetration of light through the film. Rays from the lamp are thrown on the picture or object at an angle from the front, in-

Rewards of Farming and Teaching Professions Prove Attractive to Increasing Numbers of Graduates

WITH a record-breaking increase reported in the numbers of young men, seeking admission to universities throughout the country, the question of what the future holds for the graduate is more frequently heard than ever before.

college training was worth while, the answer in every case was:

"Yes!"

Many, however, qualified their answers by declaring that, while a degree was desirable, it was not absolutely essential to success in any line except, possibly, in medicine.

Agriculture, transportation, industry, and business are all calling for trained men in constantly increasing numbers. Law, medicine, chemistry, electrical and mechanical engineering are offering a wider range of opportunities. College-trained men are being sought everywhere.

"It all depends on the man," said one. "Take two men of equal intelligence and let one enter college and another go into business. At the end of four years the one with the practical experience will command a much higher salary, but usually the college man will advance more rapidly when he starts because he has a broader vision, greater ability to assimilate knowledge, and more confidence in himself."

And yet it is pointed out that Lincoln got all his knowledge of the law by the light of a log fire at nights at home. Edison was a train "butcher." Marshall Field clerked in a country store. One of the country's greatest steel men began life as a water boy, and numberless high railway executives started as telegraph operators, section hands, and in lowly clerical positions.

How conditions are changing in the world of industry was also reflected in a canvass of the 34 highest executives of an eastern railway. It was found that 27 of them were college graduates. Just a little more than a decade ago, these figures were almost reversed, it being the rule rather than the exception for the executives to come up from the ranks.

With these and countless other examples before them, many persons are inclined to question the value in dollars and cents of a full college course. "Does it really pay?" "Is it years wasted during what should be the period of easiest mental growth and manual training—time spent in obtaining a foothold on the ladder of success and the building of firm foundations for future achievement?"

Inquiries regarding the salaries paid college men at the start revealed that two of the most profitable openings were for agricultural graduates and school-teachers. Young farm supervisors were in demand at salaries ranging from \$2,400 to \$3,600 a year, while teachers received from \$1,500 to \$3,000.

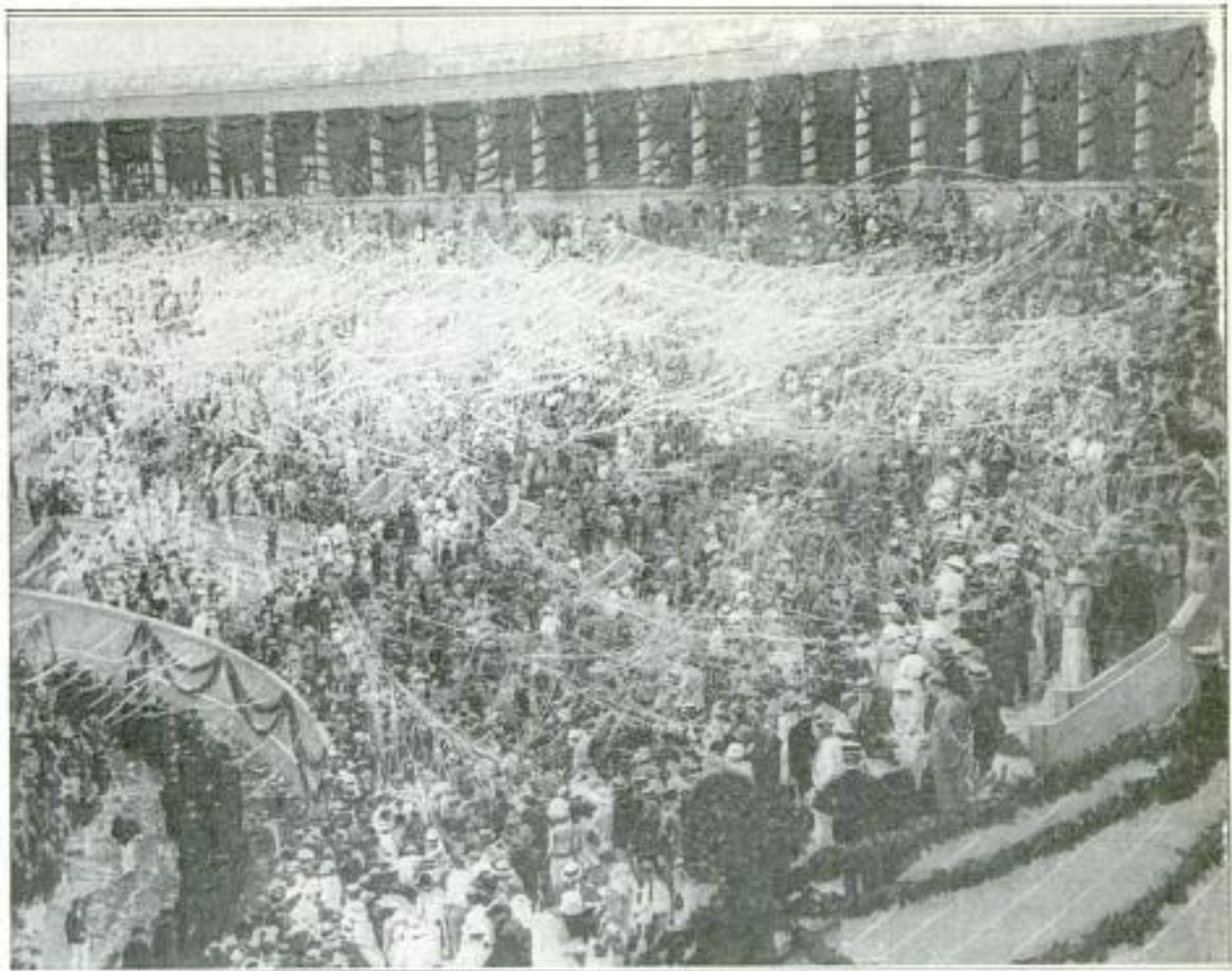

On the other hand the young doctor, who entered a hospital as an interne after his graduation, received nothing but his board and room for the first year, while dentists who went to work as assistants received an average of about \$1,800.

In the engineering lines, many of the larger companies have apprenticeship courses. Students begin these during the summer vacations while they are in school, thus cutting down the period required considerably.

This system also is being adopted by many of the great commercial organizations in training executives, the effort being made to add practical experience to the theoretical knowledge gained at college.

In picking men, employers have expressed considerable preference for those who have worked their way through school, believing that this training has resulted in greater self-reliance, and has developed ingenuity and imagination.



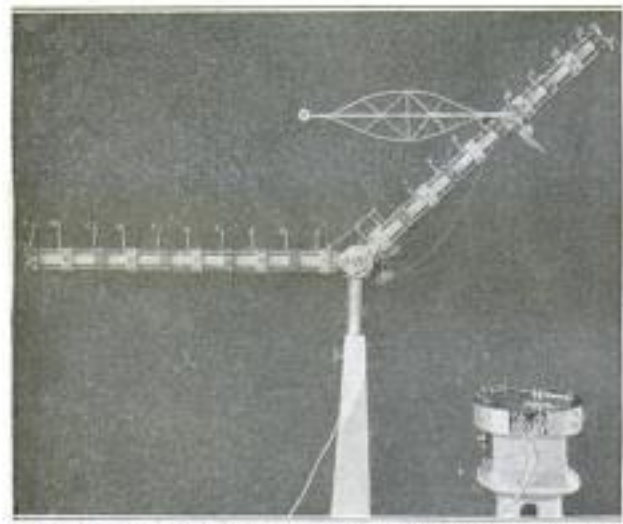

3046 Light waves were used to carry the human voice to a telephone receiver in a recent test in Europe. Selenium, a mineral that is very sensitive to changes in light reflected on it, was the principal aid. A beam was cast on a concave mirror which also received vibrations from a speaker's voice. Rays from the mirror were reflected on a selenium cell connected with an ordinary telephone receiver. As words were spoken the intensity of the light changed. The mineral cell carried these vibrations to the phone. At the test it was possible to send messages in only one direction.

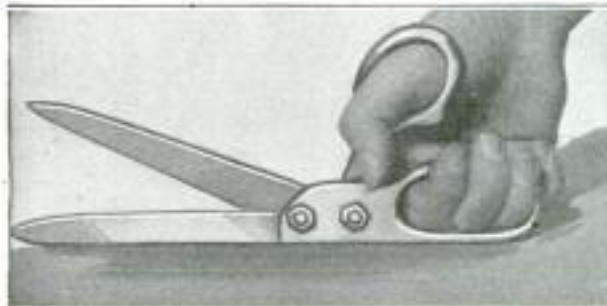

WEAVING PICTURES FOR OUR FLOORS

The machine-made rug or carpet, while of the best of materials, is not quite so costly as the hand-made article. Designed by men and women who have been trained in special schools, the entire fabric is carefully planned before the materials are given to the machine for weaving and finishing.

Cotton, hemp, wool, and often silk yarns are used in making the different grades of tapestries. The warp, or longitudinal thread, forms the main body.

Where a heavy pile face is to be put into the fabric, two wefts are needed.

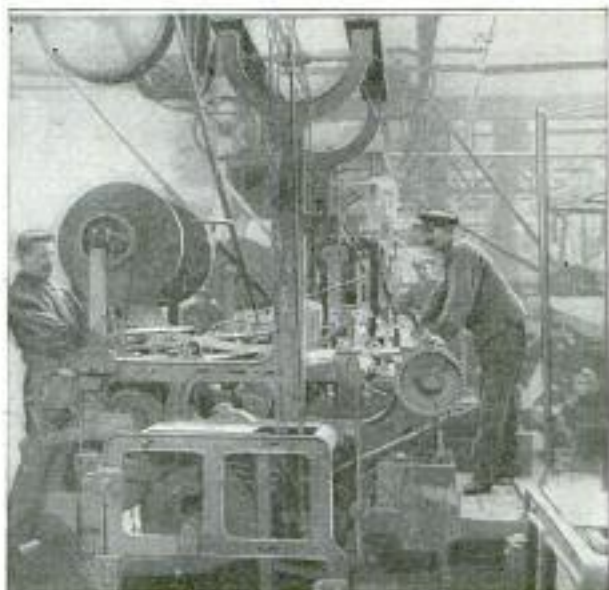

or background of the woven fabric. The number of warps used determines the width of the finished article. The weft forms most of the design, serves as a ground for the pattern, and determines length. Mechanical fingers pass the weft over and under the warp, knotting and looping it to give a close, durable finish.

then run through the shearing machine, where a series of brushes loosen the fibers of the pile so that the shearing knives in passing over them will leave an even velvetlike finish to the surface.

In many of the crude forms of rug weaving the body is first woven by hand on a wooden weaving frame which stands before the worker or is placed level with the ground. Removing the body from the frame, the weaver then knots in the design, using a needle and colored yarns to get the desired scheme.

Old hand-woven tapestries are today as highly prized as the rarest jewels, and much time and study are given to their collection by dealers throughout the world.

AIR PATROL OVER SAHARA GUARDS DESERT PEACE

Protecting travelers and safeguarding peaceful natives in a country three times the size of France, is the work of the aerial police in Algiers. Before this flying unit was organized, an army of thousands of men was kept there to defend the territory and to put down uprisings of rebels and roving bandits. Many soldiers were killed in these fights, but since the airplane squadron took up the patrolling, not one man has been lost. In most cases the sight of the flying machine is enough to quell any trouble, but in the

event that it is not, exploding bombs which the airmen carry quickly settle the disturbances. Until the French government occupied the region, the towns were frequently attacked and raided by warlike tribes of desert men. Strong, high walls were built around the houses and cities to aid in their defense.

ROGUES' GALLERY OF PESTS IS KEPT FOR FARMERS

For the benefit of farmers and fruit growers, government scientists keep a rogues' gallery that rivals in completeness that of any criminal institution in the world. There are recorded great numbers of insects that are ruinous to plant life. Each year the department sends out experts to hunt down "criminal" pests and to broadcast the methods of getting rid of them. Recently, after following a trail that led him over a great portion of Mexico, one of the scientists returned with specimens of the little-known fruit fly. It sometimes spoils shipments of Mexican fruit into the United States and in some sections has done great damage to crops, although it is not feared as much as its relative, the Mediterranean fly, since it does not thrive in certain localities. It bores into fruit while it is on the tree, causing it to fall to the ground and rot. Its eggs are laid in the ground.

Exploring a New World Underground



Rushing Rivers, Golden Minarets and Rainbows of Dazzling Beauty are Found Thousands of Feet below the Surface of the Earth Where Torrents Whisper Never-Ending Tales of a Dead World

FACES DEATH TO EXPLORE WONDERS BENEATH SURFACE OF EARTH

Scientist Finds Strange World of Darkness and Hidden Beauty

BURIED beneath thousands of feet of solid earth, a new world of darkness, of burning lakes, enchanting gardens, rushing rivers, golden minarets, and rainbows of dazzling beauty, has been found.

After many dangerous and futile attempts, the dark and silent abysses, where for countless ages the skeletons of strange animals have lain undisturbed, have been penetrated by man and forced to yield up many of their secrets.

Chasms without bottom, cataracts of great magnitude, splendid grottoes and rushing torrents whisper never-ending tales of a weird and dead world of spectral shapes and fantastic designs which for ages has been lying untouched almost beneath the feet of the living.

These wonders have at last been revealed through the daring of a French scientist, Edouard Alfred Hartel, who has devoted his life for the past forty years to subterranean explorations. His first investigations were at the mysterious holes of Dargilan and Padirac, which the natives for countless generations had maintained were inhabited by the devil and at the bottom of which was hell itself. Later he organized an expedition to enter fourteen gigantic crevices on the Plateau of Causses, into

which no human being ever before penetrated, although tradition has it that many beasts and men have disappeared therein.

One of his most fear-inspiring experiences was the trip into the grotto of Rabanel in France. So far as known, no human being had ever before dared to venture into its depths. Soon after this he succeeded in charting the great subterranean river of Sorgnes, near Sarzac.

It was on one of these expeditions that M. Hartel discovered the lake of fire. He was equipped with ropes, ladders, candles, ribbons of magnesium, matches, hammer, knives, a thermometer, a barometer, a gas mask and other scientific equipment.

Around his neck was strapped a small telephone so that he could keep in con-

stant communication with companions on the surface. The wire connections on the telephone ran through the rope by means of which he was lowered into the darkness.

Before the descent commenced, soundings were taken to indicate the depth, and thermometers lowered to find the temperature. Slowly and with great caution the explorer is lowered by half a dozen men at the mouth of the pit so as to avoid the jagged rocks lining the sides. Then over the wire comes a faint cry:

"Let 'er go!"

This indicates to the anxious watchers above that he has arrived safely on a ledge or at the bottom of the pit and is ready to follow some gallery into the eternal darkness beyond.

Silence follows. It is broken by the ringing of the telephone and the cry from the depths:

"Hold on to your rope! Hold on fast! I'm arriving at a bad passage."

An agonizing interval intervenes before the bell rings again and the distant voice says:

"I am adjusting the gas mask. Suffocating odors."

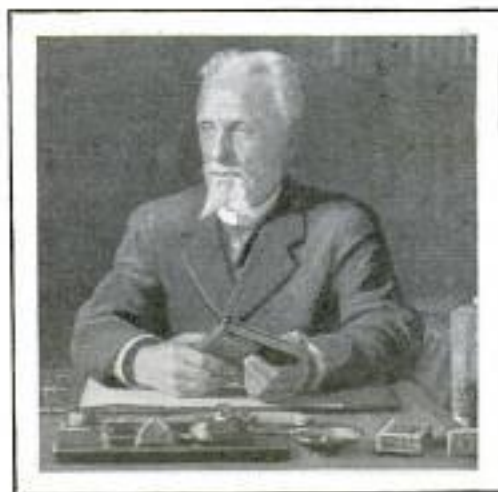
Ten minutes have elapsed. Suddenly a strong jerk on the rope. The telephone rings and a voice cries:

"Have lost the rope ladder! Candle went out. Have reached the bottom of the first pit."

A few seconds later he calls, "Light once more! Walking on dead animal carcasses recently fallen! Skeletons of all sizes five feet deep!"

Then he searches for the end of the rope ladder. After a few minutes he locates it and the telephone rings: "Let 'er go! Have reached the mouth of the second pit!" Silence. The journey is taken up again and now the rope registers 1,500 feet below. Again telephone rings:

"It's getting very cold! Damp! and mist! 1,800 feet. I have reached a large lake! Strange sight, burning incense. The abominable odor is getting stronger."

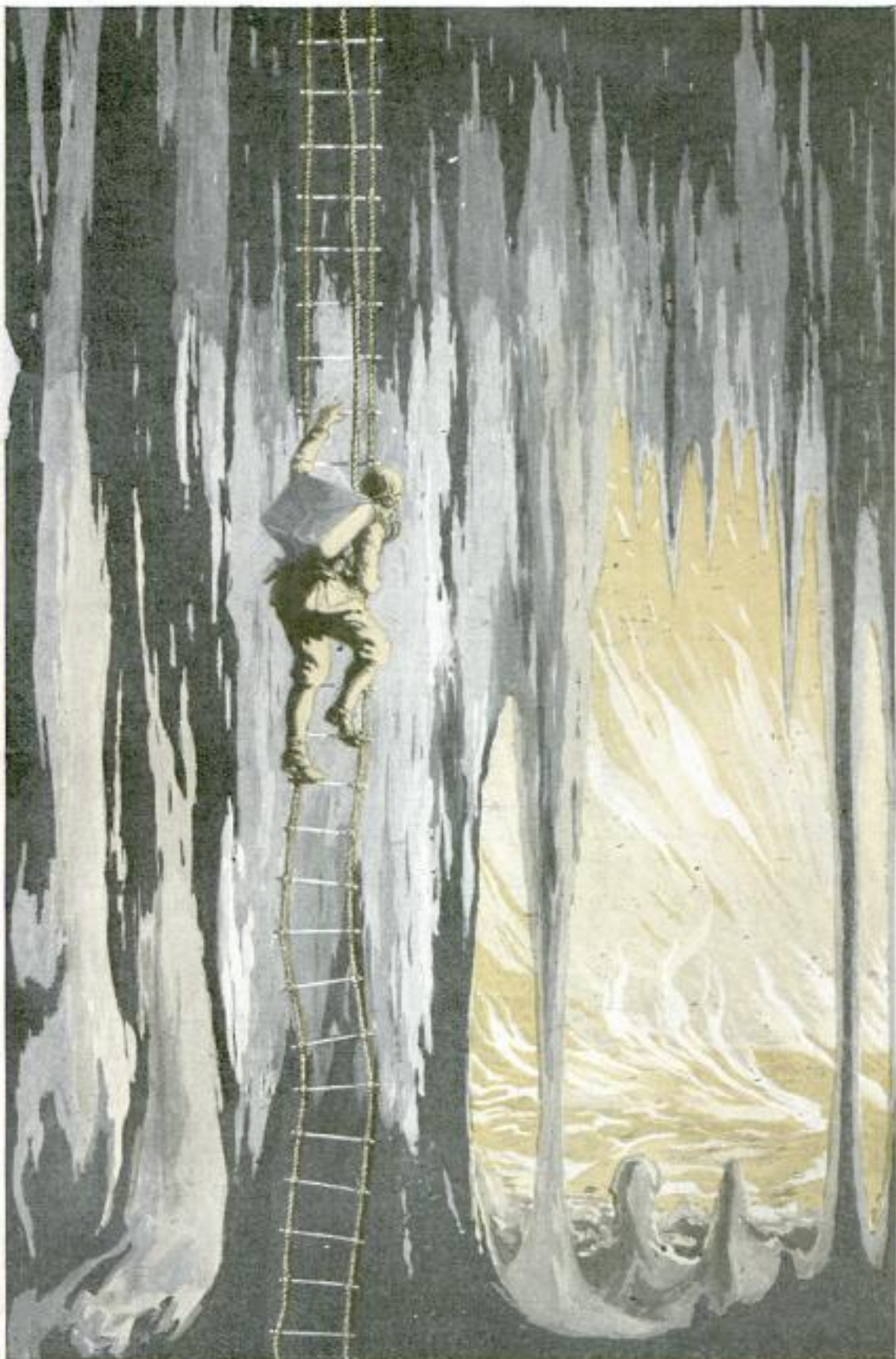

 Then the ascent is taken up by means of the rope ladder. The explorer is out once more in the world of the living, exhausted and hungry for fresh air. Next day preparations are made for the exploration of the underground lake already discovered by the head of the expedition. A specially constructed canoe which holds three to four persons is lowered.

Explorers Use Canoe

Now the descent is no longer hazardous since the first risk has always fallen on M. Hartel's own shoulders. The explorers are armed with every scientific instrument necessary for the survey. First, the head of the explorers' party, then follow his assistants. One by one, they are slowly lowered down the pit with the canoe trailing behind.

On and on goes science, never satisfied, always ready to risk more and more, in order to unfold to the outside world the great hidden mysteries of enchanting gardens, innumerable minarets of stalagmites, rainbows of wonderful colors, and never-ending tales that are buried underneath thousands of feet of earth.

The romance of Hartel's underground explorations occupies 10 large volumes. On several occasions his life has been in great danger. Once he and his two companions lost their frail boat while making a survey of the underground river Padirac. Their candles went out and fell into the ice-cold water.

On another occasion he made the exploration in the famous Gaping-Ghyll cave of Yorkshire in England. No one dared to accompany him, so he decided to go down alone and left Madame Hartel at the telephone receiver. Sitting on his swing, he began to descend. On his way he received several baths from dripping fountains above his head, but succeeded in reaching the bottom.

Telephone Line Fails

After making a thorough examination, he came back to the phone. "Hello! Hello!" No answer. The microphone was put out of order by the water! For almost half an hour he kept shouting to his wife and his aids. Finally he was heard and was pulled back half dead.

A few years later he was invited by the Russian government to make explorations of an underground thermal river in the Caucasus. Here he was taken out, almost asphyxiated from sulphuric

fumes. He has, also, made valuable observations in America. In 1912 he visited and explored the great Mammoth Cave, Yellowstone Park, and the Grand Cañon.

Born at Pontoise in 1859, the future scientist in his early life showed his appreciation of nature's beauty. His curiosity as to strange phases of nature was aroused when his parents took him upon a vacation in the Pyrenees, in 1866. Later he studied in Italy, Switzerland, Austria, and England. However, his father, a lawyer, took him into his office as a partner where he practiced law for twelve years.

Yet this did not prevent him from making frequent expeditions for scientific explorations in southern France and neighboring countries. His real work began when he made the acquaintance of a famous Alpine adventurer who, in 1882, had revealed to the public, for the first time, the wonders of the Tarn and of the Cèvennes caves.

Many Obstacles Encountered

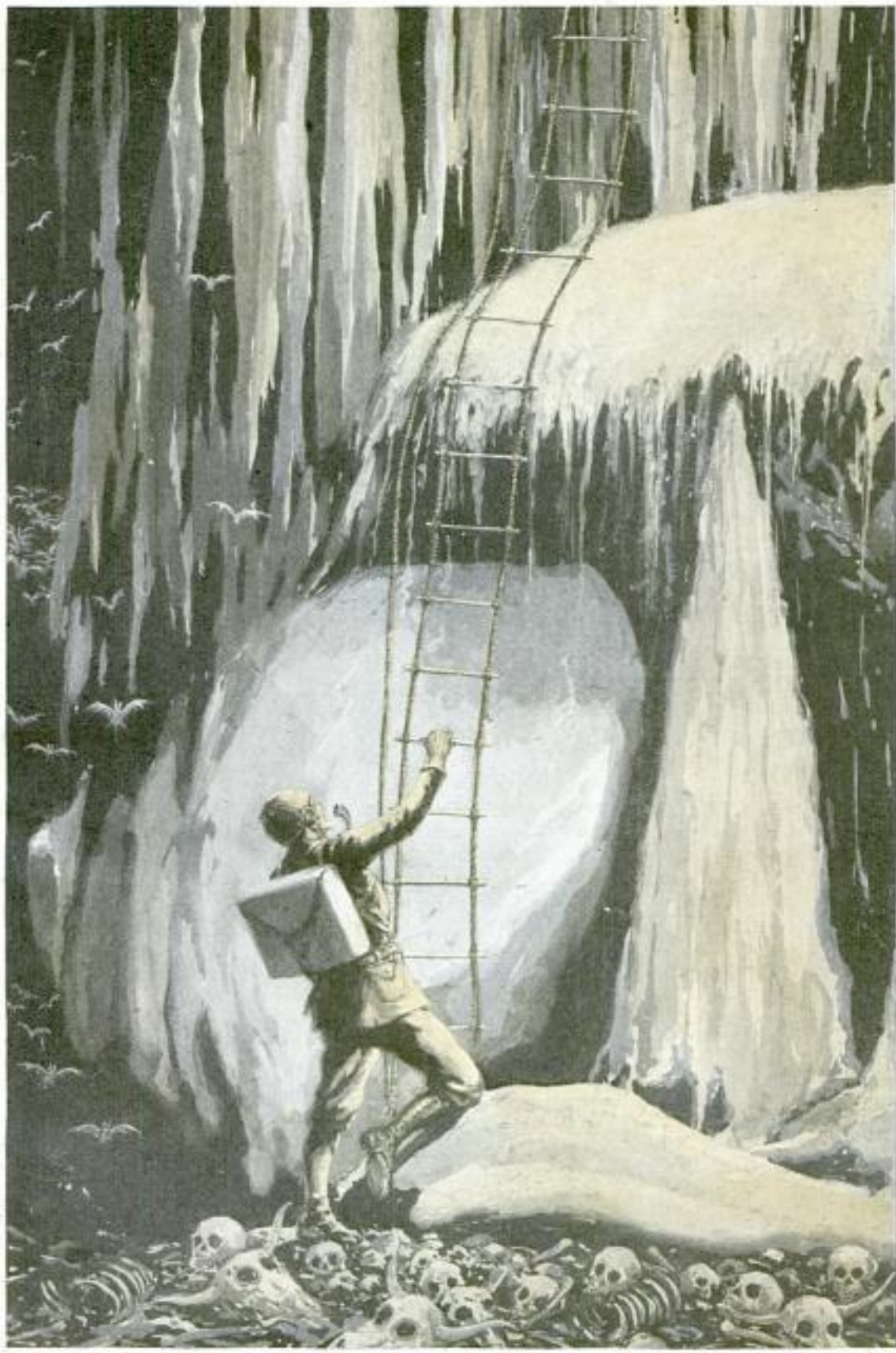
In exploring the uncharted grottoes, innumerable difficulties are encountered. It is necessary first to make a topographical and geological survey of the surroundings, at least 650 feet around the mouth of the abyss. This takes several hours. Then soundings are taken to determine the depth. For this, special instruments attached at the end of the rope are lowered down to take the temperature.

The subterranean outfit consists of several ropes, ladders, large candles, ribbons of magnesium, matches, elephant horn, hammer, knives, a thermometer, a barometer, several balls of string, a compass, topographic papers, gas masks, and other scientific instruments, first-aid packs, rum and chocolate.

Each member of the exploring party must wear the following outfit: strong laced shoes, gaiters, woolen clothes with numerous pockets, wide pantaloons, a blouse of strong material that will not easily tear by contact with sharp ledges. A cap made of boiled leather, to deaden the shock of falling rocks, and a knapsack complete the outfit.

In making the descent, the explorer installs himself on a piece of board, about half a yard long and tied in the middle by the end of the rope. A dozen men hold the rope at the mouth of the cave while another unwinds it as the explorer descends into the cave.

GASOLINE MADE FROM COAL BY DISTILLING PROCESS

With a system of distillation of coal recently developed, it is now said to be possible to obtain as much as 10 gallons of gasoline, as well as other gases and oils, from a single ton of soft coal. Under the old method, which requires 2,400 degrees of heat as compared with 1,050 or 1,100 necessary in the new process, little gasoline was recovered and other gases were destroyed. A plant for distilling coal in the new way is being erected in Canada by an automobile maker. In addition to gasoline, it is reported, a single ton of coal will yield 3 gallons of creosote oils, in some cases 6 or 8 gallons of lubricating oils, 60 pounds of pitch, 12 pounds of fertilizer, and 7,500 cubic feet of gas. And the left-over, 1,500

pounds of broken-up coal, may be pulverized for industrial fuel or made into briquettes for domestic use. It is said that the semicoke is similar to anthracite coal, high in heat value, smokeless, and moderate in ash.

SUGAR-SOAKED SPONGE USED AS TRAP TO KILL ANTS

Soaking a sponge in sweetened water is an easy way to get rid of ants. Serving as a trap, it may be placed where the insects play, and when they have crawled into the pores to eat, it may be dropped into hot water, thus killing them. As it is durable, the process may be repeated as many times as desired, making it inexpensive as well as effective. On the lawn or in the garden, the lure may be put near their holes.

WRITING IS SENT OVER WIRE BY PHOTO PROCESS 2772

In the exact handwriting of the sender, messages are being sent over telegraph wires in France at the rate of from 75 to 100 words in three minutes. Written on any kind of paper, a special ink is used that leaves a solid deposit and a slightly raised elevation when dry. This document is wrapped on a cylinder that revolves the message under a needle similar to that of a phonograph. Every time

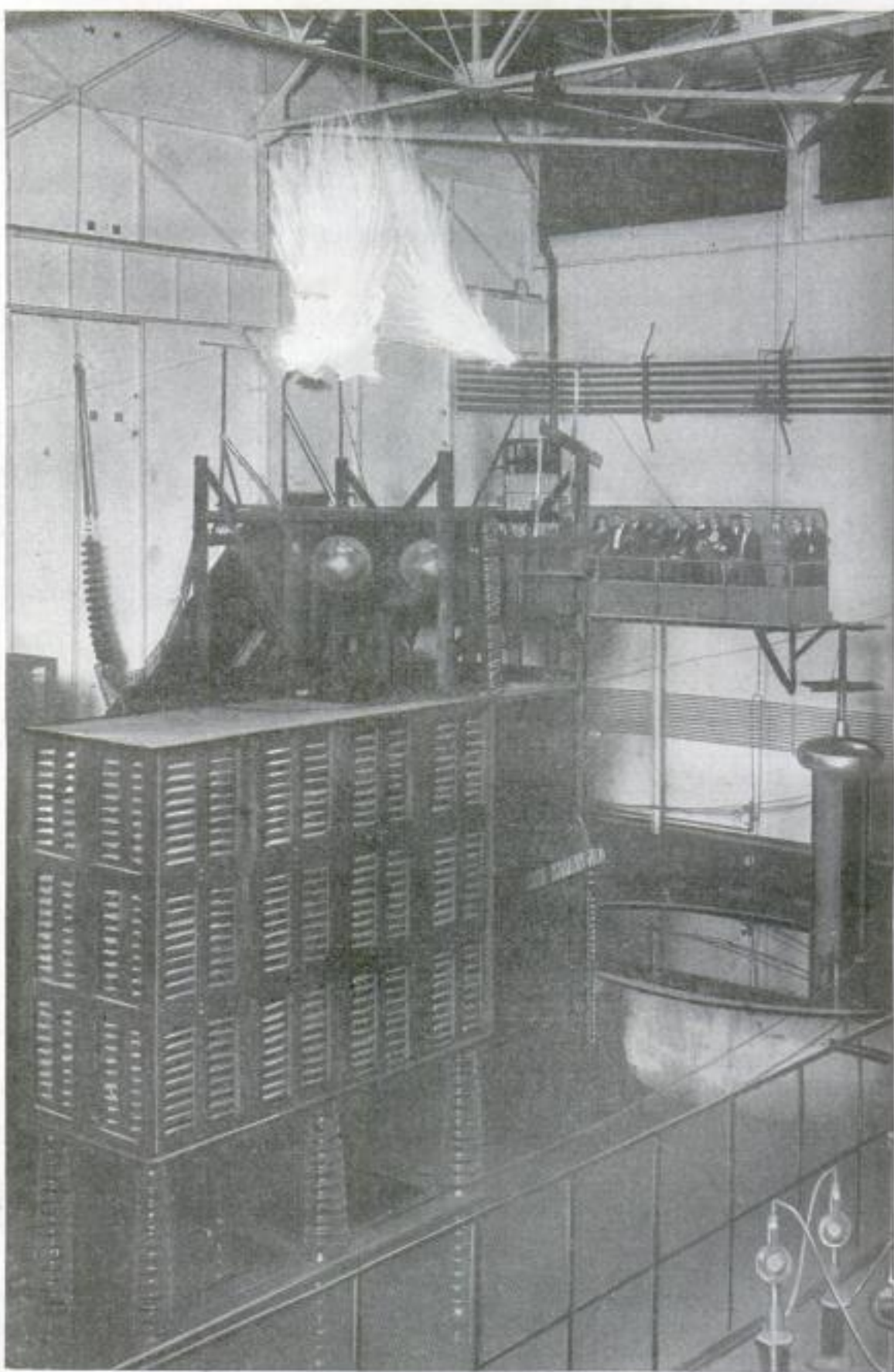
the point passes over one of the raised lines of the message, an electric current is interrupted. Every momentary stoppage of the current at the sending station causes a beam of light to be directed against a similar cylinder at the receiving end, carrying a piece of sensitive paper. When finished, the photographic blank is removed and developed, giving an autographic reproduction of the original message. The apparatus is now installed in several stations operated by the French government and has proved successful.

With a 2,000,000-volt arc of sputtering man-made lightning scientists in an eastern city recently destroyed a miniature village in a steel house built for the test. 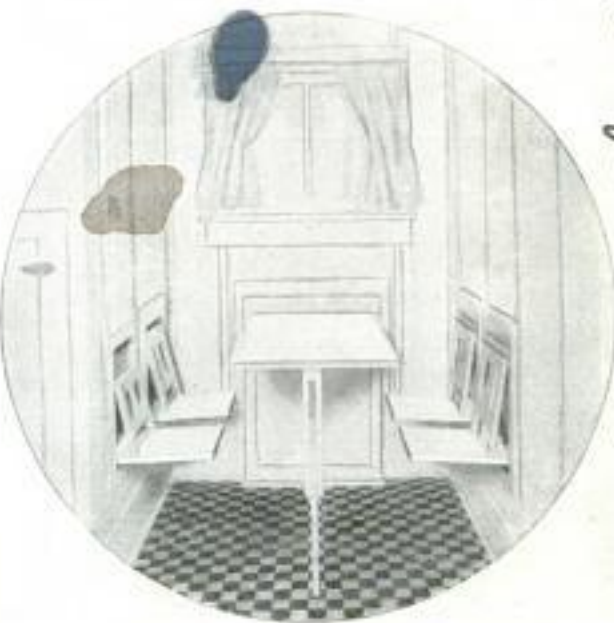
MEDICINE FROM "OIL BIRDS"

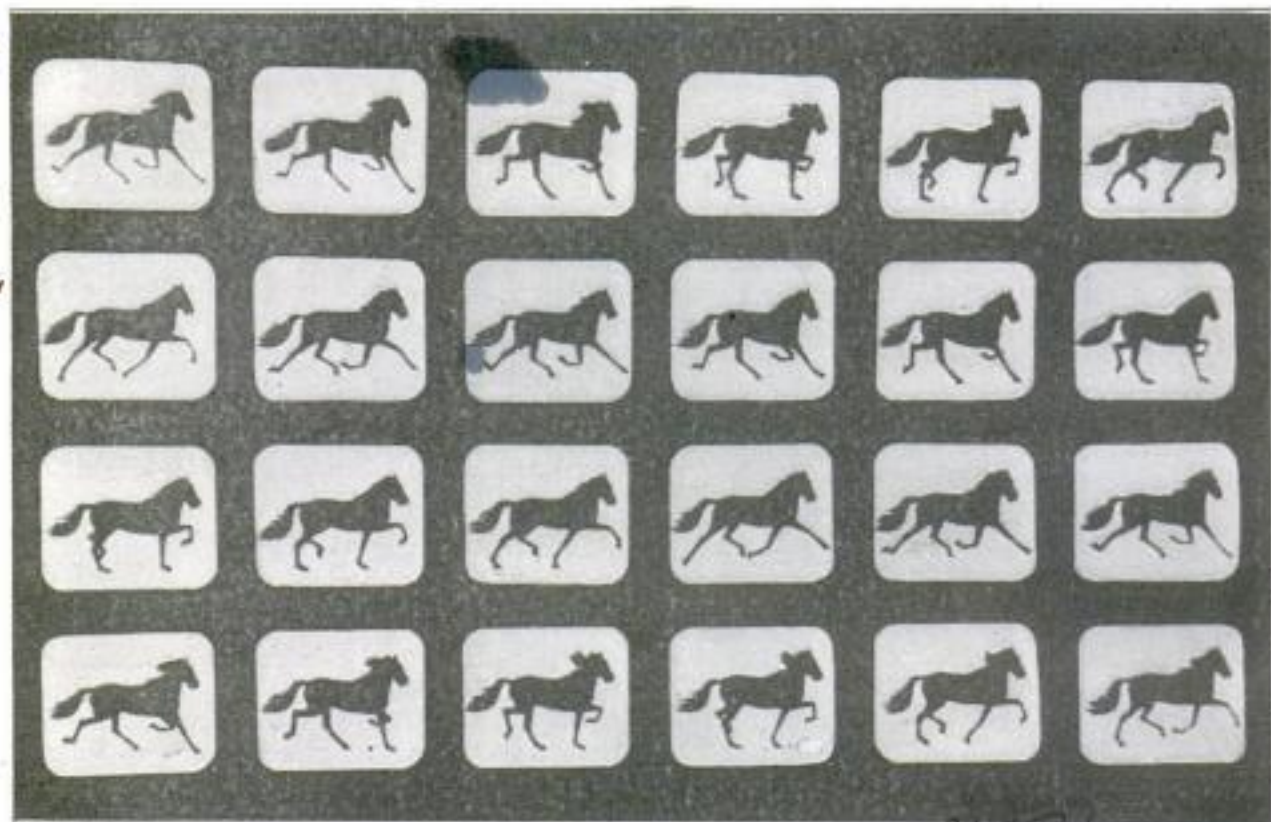

A badly arranged kitchen, the experiment showed, causes the housewife to walk an extra two miles a day. From the morning bacon and eggs to the dessert for the evening dinner, the demonstrator wore the device, which registered each step taken. As a result, a unit combining all the features of a kitchen stove, cabinet, sink, china closet, and refrigerator has been made, designed to save many steps. Fitted for use as a table, the top of the ice box, covered with porcelain, has one end connected with the sink.

"BABY" AIRPLANE ABLE TO FLY EIGHTY MILES AN HOUR

A "baby" airplane, weighing about 500 pounds with its pilot and load of fuel, performed successfully in a recent test flight, when it is reported to have climbed to an altitude of 1,200 feet. Having a wingspread of only 20 feet, it is said to be considerably smaller in that respect than the miniature French plane that was exhibited in the East not long ago. It was invented by an American aviation engineer and is equipped with a two-cylinder, 14-horsepower motorcycle engine, which, its designer asserts, will drive the craft at a maximum speed of 80 miles an hour. With the motor throttled down, the inventor believes that the machine can travel 1,200 miles on a single filling of its gasoline tank.

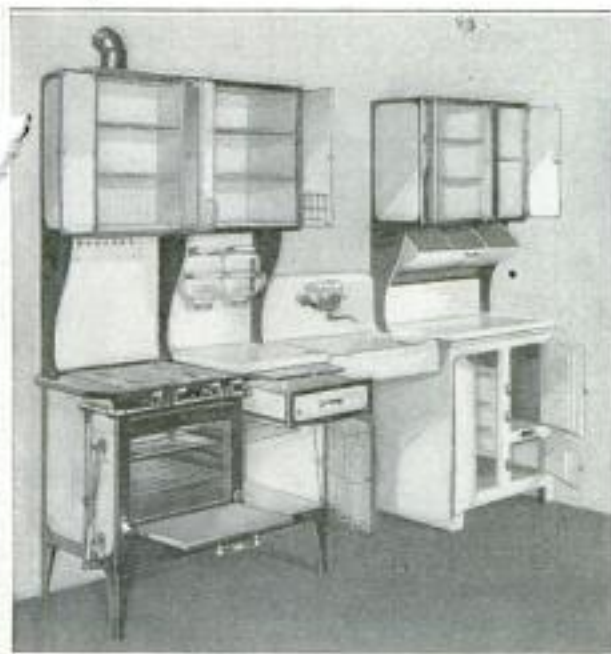

HUMAN HAIR MADE INTO CLOTH RESISTS HEAVY PRESSURE

Tons of human hair are being turned into cloth by a southern factory to supply the demand of cotton-seed oil mills of that section for a fabric that will withstand, for a time at least, a pressure of 4,000 to 4,500 pounds a square inch. Only that made from hair is strong enough. Formerly it was woven from camel's hair, but the price of that product went to such high levels as to prohibit its use. After a series of tests, a method was devised for weaving human hair in specially constructed machines. The search for a sufficient supply to keep the factory going ended in China, where buyers found a veritable army of coolies ready to sacrifice their long queues for American money. Bound in huge bales, the hair arrives at the factory ready for weaving, having already been inspected and sterilized on the way over from the Orient. Combed and carded, it is twisted into threads and fed into the looms, where it is woven into rolls of cloth 1/2 inch thick, the bolt weighing 400 pounds.

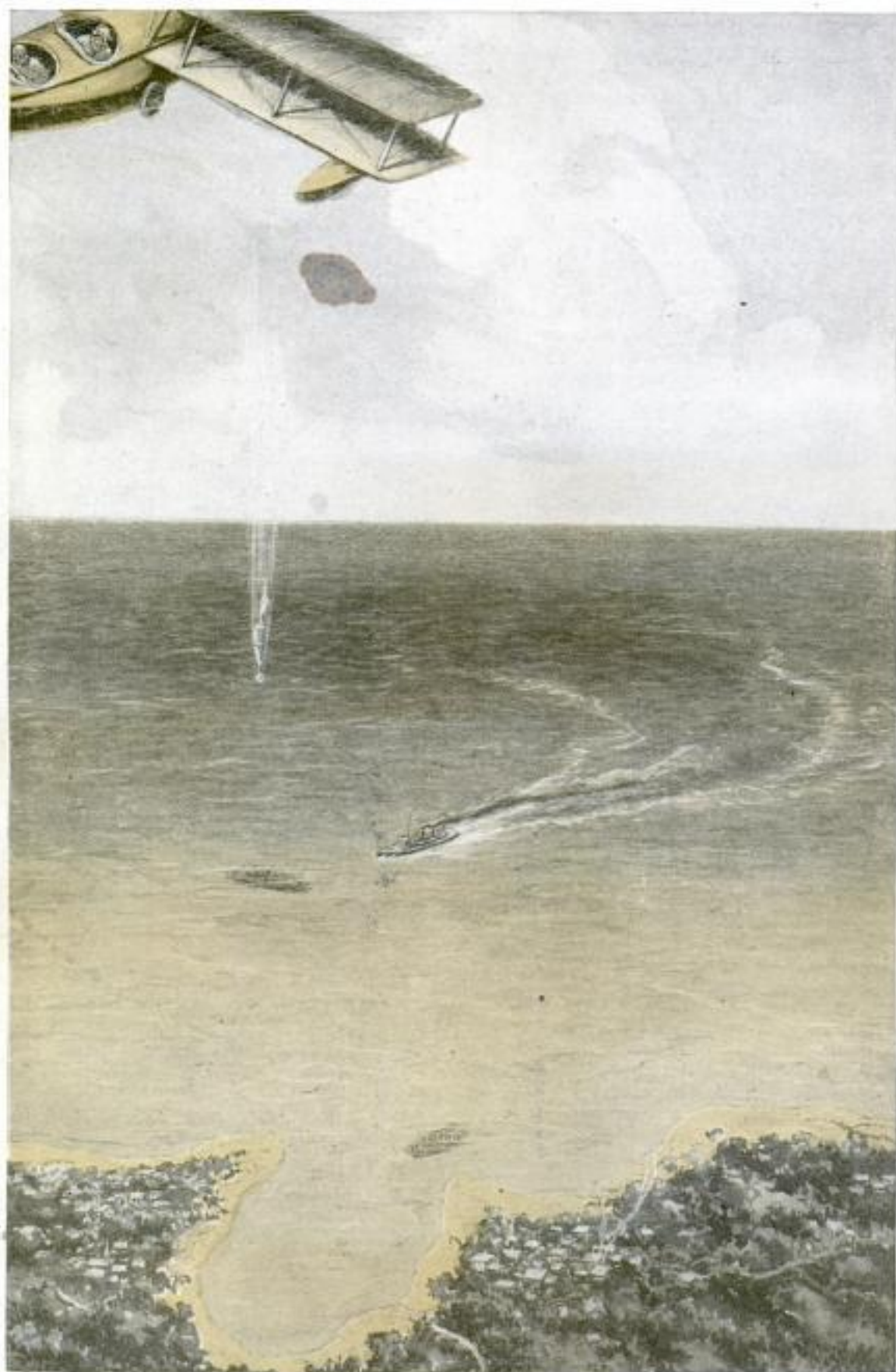

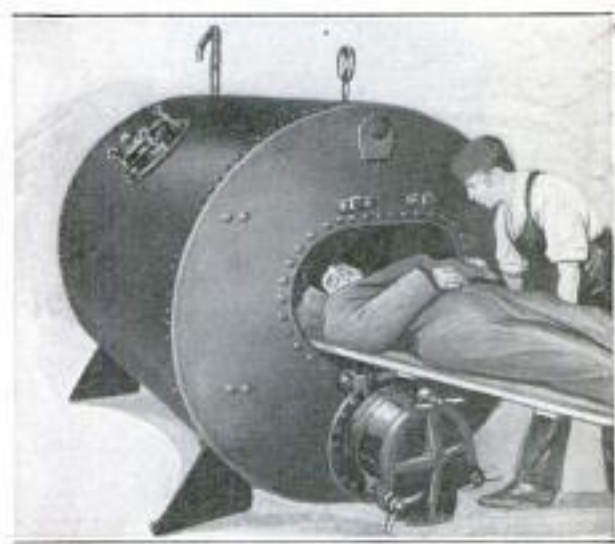

Driven from its course by a fierce winter storm and swept by flames which forced the crew to take to the boats, the steamer "O'Connor" sank in the northern end of Lake Michigan. The vessel, of considerable tonnage, was loaded with hard coal, valued at approximately \$50,000. In the hope of being able to salvage this rich cargo, a search was begun to locate the exact position of the vessel. Yet, after two months of ceaseless effort, the lake held fast the secret of the ship's resting place. During the war, aircraft had been used in spotting submarines. **RUINS OF ANCIENT BABYLON
YIELD WAR GOD'S TEMPLE**

Traces of structures erected during an early Babylonian period that are expected to add greatly to the known history of that time and to rival in importance the discoveries in the tomb of King Tutankhamen at Luxor, Egypt, have been found in Mesopotamia by the expedition of an American museum. Already stamped bricks of Samsuiluna, seventh king of the first Babylonian dynasty (2080-2043 B. C.), have been unearthed and translated, as well as tablets inscribed during the reign of Samula-Il'u, the second king of that line (2211-2176 B. C.), and the temple built by him to the war god Ibaba. Experts regard those preliminary finds as proof that the excavators have approached strata that conceal remains of the earliest Babylonian civilization. They expect to find many relics of historical value later.

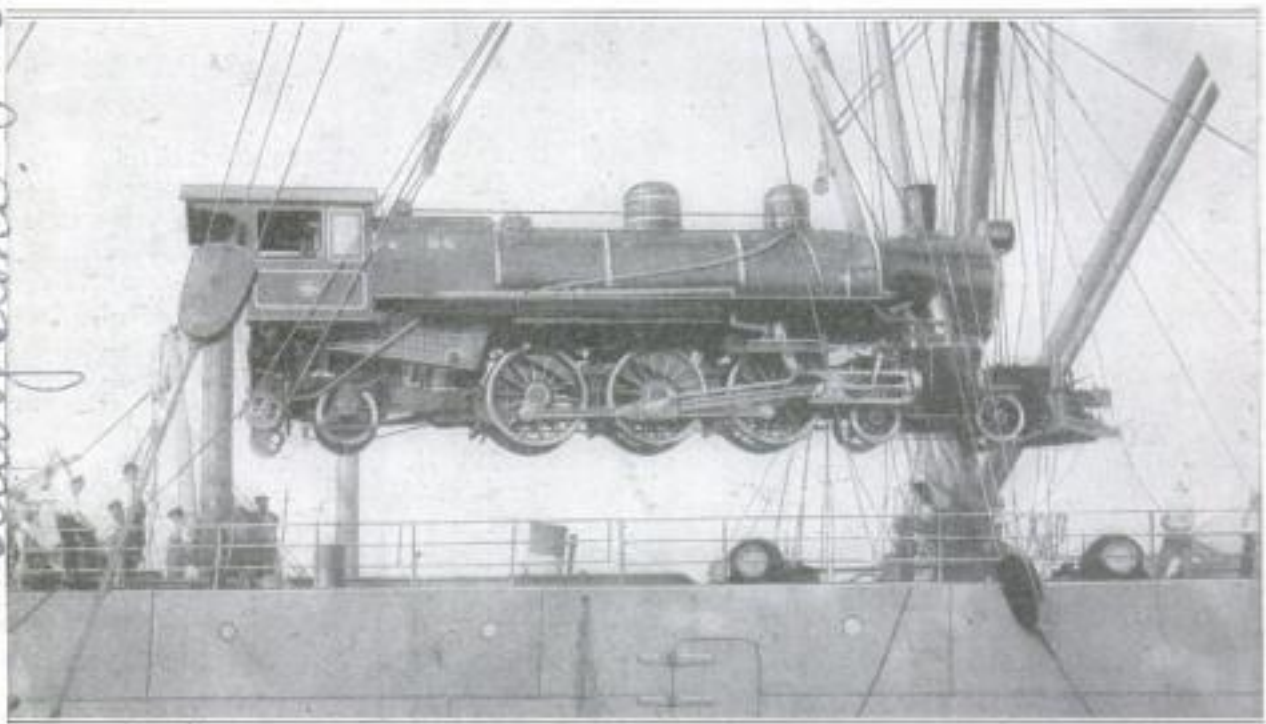

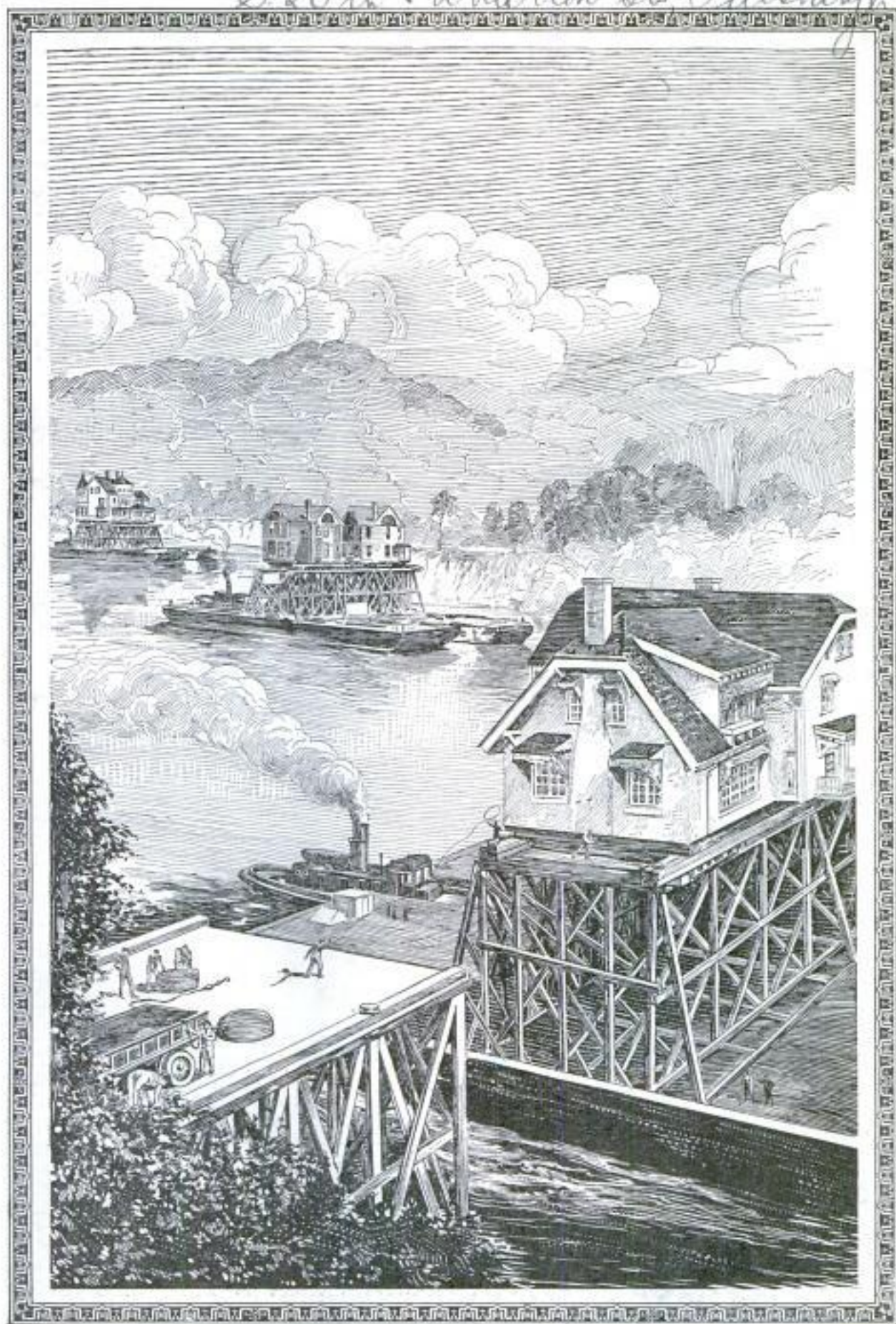

**PRINTING OF ONE DOLLAR BILL
TAKES MONTH AT MINT**

More than \$20,000,000 in greenbacks and \$1,000,000 in stamps are made by the United States government every day. Such great care attends the printing of notes that 30 days are necessary to complete the processes to which one single bill—\$1 or \$10,000—is subjected. Although millions of dollars pass through the plant daily and are left openly on desks, not a single guard is placed over the money, nor are employes searched as they leave the building. Instead, a rigid system of accounting is enforced, the notes being counted 15 times and the stamps 10 before being sent out. Should a shortage be discovered the plate printer and those who handled the bills must replace the amount of the missing notes. Most of the greenbacks are one and two-dollar notes. The \$10,000 note is the largest made, but there are only a few of them in circulation. Stamps, requiring less attention than the bills, come from the presses at the rate of 40,000,000 a day. While most of them are ones and twos, the government turns out some at \$5.

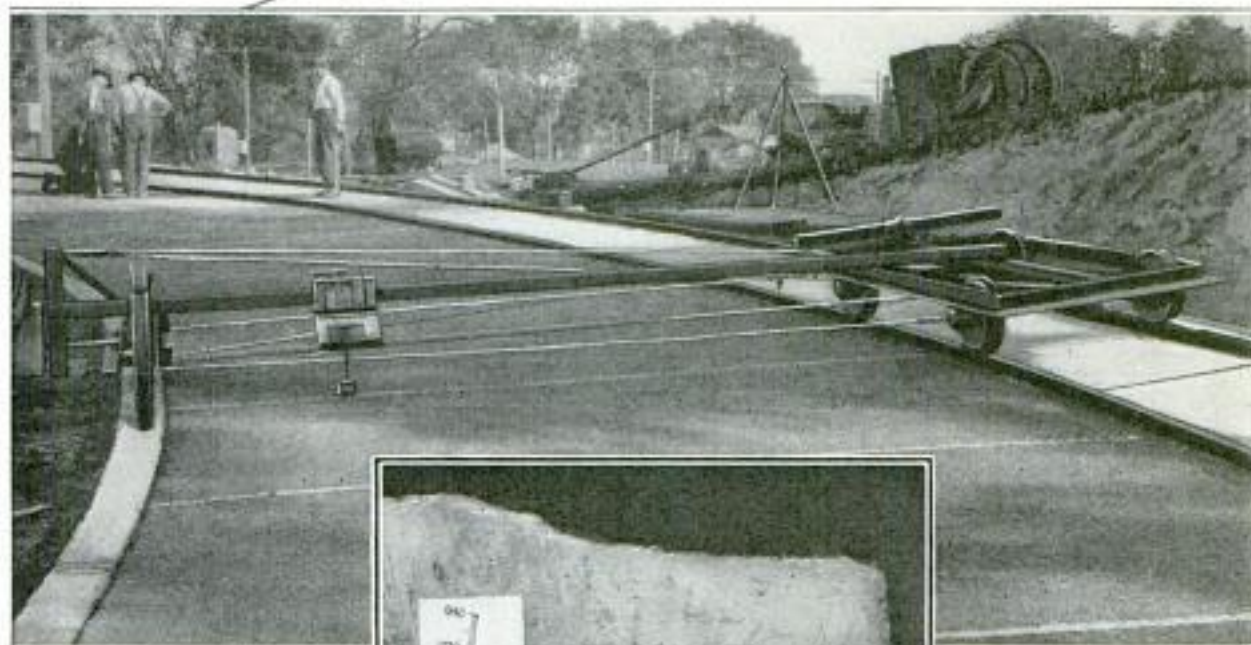

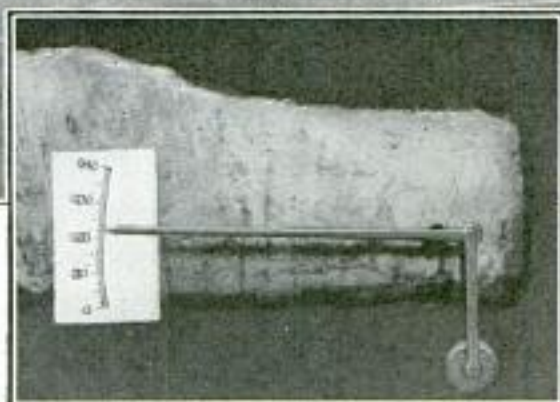

Adventures in Asiatic Paths

BY SVEN HEDIN

Sven Anders Hedin, noted authority on those little-known lands, Tibet, Turkestan, Mongolia, and central Asia in general, has spent a great part of his life—he is now 58 years of age—in exploring these strange lands. These journeys, performed at times amid extraordinary hardships and always at the immediate risk of lingering and terrible death at the hands of savages or by starvation, have won for him high honors and a world-wide reputation and fame. A noted scientist, a daring adventurer, a fluent writer—he is author of numerous valuable and weighty books. Doctor Hedin is an honorary or active member of nearly every scientific society in the world; is a member of the nobility of Sweden, to which he was raised in recognition of his work by the king; is the bearer of honorary degrees from most of the famous universities of the civilized world; is the personal friend of potentates and rulers, and is now on his way to Asia for another daring journey through the wild interior where he has found strange buried cities, grotesque and terrible customs, and where he has several times been forced to travel long distances on foot without water or food.—Editor's Note.

I HAVE traveled over 24,000 miles in Asia's beaten and unbeaten tracks, and in doing so have had adventures without number. In what follows I will tell the readers of the Popular Mechanics Magazine a few of the things I have seen and experienced in the interior of the largest continent on our globe.

I will start with my very first entrance in Asia. It was several decades ago, late in the summer. I was to drive from Vladikavkaz to Tiflis, a distance of 120 miles. I hired a strongly built Russian wagon, which is drawn by a "troika," the typical Russian three-horse team. Merrily the bells are tinkling in the bell collar worn by the middle horse, which is trotting along, hitched in between the shafts on either side. Over the horse's neck bends a wooden yoke, through the iron rings of which the reins pass. He is strapped so close to the harness that he cannot run in a gallop. But the two horses on the sides are galloping and turning their heads outward and downward, while the center horse is carrying his head high. The animals are accustomed to occupying this position, and it is a truly magnificent sight to watch a troika speeding along.

The road is level and good at first, but soon it begins to lead upward. We have reached the region of the mountains, whose dark-hued, steep walls are looming up before our eyes and hemming in our way more and more on either side. However, this road with its solidly ballasted bed and its cement rails

is evidently well built. It is traversing the Caucasian province of Georgia or Grusia and is called the Grusinian military way. It cost enormous sums of money.

When the czar dedicated it he said: "I thought I should travel on a way of gold, but I see that it is nothing but gray stone."

In grotesque curves it winds around the mountain sides and passes through valleys and glens. Up it leads and then down again. In the wildest rush we may whisk down a precipice; then suddenly there comes a sharp turn to the right. We cannot see where we are going, but we have an uncomfortable feeling as if horses, carriage, and everything would be flung into the gorge below before another minute has passed. But again we spin around a corner, so abruptly that the carriage is resting on the two outer wheels. Thank goodness! We have escaped this trap, too, and we now see a stretch of the road ahead, until the zigzag course begins again.

In winter the traveling is done in sleighs, but then the road is dangerous. Many spots have an evil reputation for avalanches. Where the snowslides are wont to shoot down from the mountains, stone tunnels have been built with walls 10 feet thick. Over these the snow masses of the avalanches will glide without injuring the travelers.

As a young student I once had a merry trip from Bagdad, the city of the caliphs and of the Arabian Nights, to Kerman-

shah in western Persia. I was alone and had no servant, and of the traveling fund there remained only 200 Persian "krans," or \$39. I was too proud to borrow money and thought I should succeed in pulling through without anybody's aid. In the bazaars I met an Arabian caravan, which was carrying goods on to Kermanshah, 50 miles. I hired from the leaders a mule for one-fourth of all I owned.

It was early in June and the heat was intense, so the merchants traveled only at night. The tinkling of the bells had a drowsy effect, and from time to time I fell asleep while seated in the saddle. Traveling this way, of course, I could not see anything of the landscape, and the third night I succeeded in persuading an old Arab to accompany me to Kermanshah in daylight. When the merchants heard us talking about this, they would not under any condition permit us to leave the caravan, so I had to escape by stealth on the hired mule, together with the old Arab, who demanded 25 krans daily wages. One dark night, just as the moon had set, we rode slowly ahead of the caravan. After awhile we increased our speed and got away farther and farther from the others. The sound of the bells gradually died away in the distance, and we were surrounded by the stillness of the night.

We advanced at a quick trot until we had reached such a distance that the others could no longer overtake us. There we reposed until the morning; then we resumed our journey, following the path of the large caravans. From time to time, itinerant company is sighted, most of them being pilgrims, partly living and partly dead. They are all on their way to Husein's grave at Kerbela, not far from Babylon. The men are riding on horseback, the women are sitting in wooden baskets, two of which are always carried by one camel or mule. In such a basket, called "kajeveh," the woman is squatting with crossed legs on soft cushions. She has a roof of white cloth over her head, which is upheld by arched laths, and in front of her are curtains so that she can at her option hide herself from curious looks. Women of rank make use of litters called "tak-terevan," which are borne by two mules. This style of journeying is more comfortable; the lady can lie down to sleep while the mules are traveling.

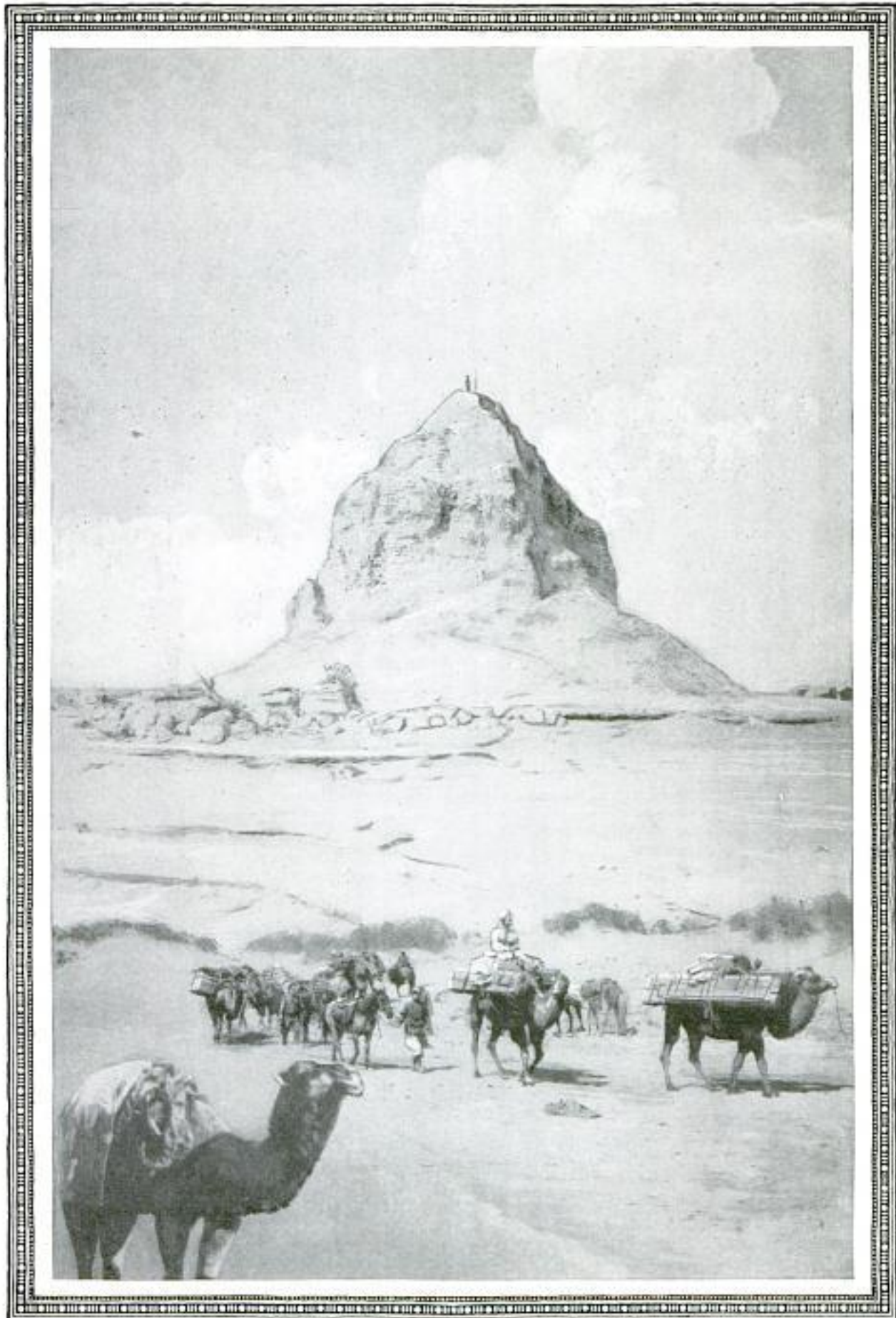
And then the dead persons that are carried to Kerbela! Wealthy Persians often set aside a certain amount of

money in their wills to have a grave bought near the Holy Mosque in Kerbela, under the dome of which the martyr Husein is resting. Another sum is allotted for transporting the body. When the rich man has died, his body is wrapped in white rugs with tightly fastened cords, and around everything dark-colored blankets are wrapped, which in turn are kept closed as securely as is possible with the aid of strings and cords. But as it is more convenient and less expensive to place two bodies on each mule, the deceased must wait until a comrade can be found for this last journey. It may even happen at times that an entire caravan of bodies is accumulated to be conveyed together to the "Holy City." I have met several such funeral caravans in Persia. If the wind comes from the direction in which they are approaching, a frightful odor will announce them even from quite a distance.

Another smell to which it is necessary to become accustomed when traveling on Persian roads is the one which is spread far around by rotting carcasses of camels, horses, or mules.

In the meantime I continued with my Arab the journey to Kermanshah. After I had paid him for the mule I did not have so much as a copper coin left in my pocket. In the small town not a soul was European, and I had hundreds of miles to cover before I could reach the nearest place where lived any persons from my country.

However, I had heard of a wealthy Arabian merchant by the name of Aga Muhamed Hassan, a resident of Kermanshah, who was doing business over all the Near East. I directed my steps to his house and was admitted in the large room where he was sitting on precious rugs and casting up his accounts with his assistants. It was not easy to make clear to him where Sweden was situated, but when I said that I was from the country of Charles XII, Aga Hassan's face brightened and he said: "Then you must stay as my guest for six months." I thanked him for his kindness, but explained to him that I had to continue my journey, after having rested for a few days. A magnificent house in genuine Persian style was placed at my disposition; I was given two gentlemen attendants and two servants who were constantly sitting to wait for my orders. I was offered the finest Persian dishes of rice and chicken, grapes and melons, wine and tea, and at night I slept in a charming garden, where limpid water

was murmuring in marble basins, where fountains transparent as gossamer were

playing in the moonlight, and where roses and lilacs were luxuriously spreading their fragrance. In the stable there stood precious Arabian thoroughbred horses, ready to carry me to the villages and antiquities I wished to visit.

But I had no money! I was a beggar, a tramp and had all the trouble in the world to keep up the appearance of a gentleman as long as possible. This masquerade could last only so long. One day the truth would surely become known. So I made a virtue of necessity and told one of my gentlemen attendants that I did not own one cent.

He was taken aback for a moment, but then he answered: "Money! You may have as much of it from Aga Hassan as you wish," and when the hour of parting came, he presented me with a pouch full of silver coins, which I carried stuffed into my saddle bag, as I, on a newly hired horse, continued my journey both day and night towards Teheran, the capital city of Persia. In this way I once covered as much as 90 miles in one day, which is the speediest ride on horseback I have ever made; this became possible only by changing horses five times.

In 1906 I traveled 1,400 miles on a Bactrian camel through all of eastern Persia to the border of Baluchistan. I had bought 14 camels and had six Persian servants. In the easterly part of the country there is a vast desert, called Kevir, which consists of salt and loam.

Many caravans have perished in this way. Notwithstanding this danger, I ventured upon crossing Kevir. I had with me two men and four camels. Just as we were about to start from the southern edge, it began to rain, so we had to wait. The loam dried only slowly. A caravan of merchants came along, and we decided to continue in the trail trodden out by its camels. The distance across the desert is 84 miles. When the expedition has been started, it is necessary to proceed without camping until the northerly edge has been reached. In all this malicious tract there is no shrub, no grass-blade.

We had covered far over one-half of the road when the sky darkened again, and presently it started once more to rain. We speeded the camels and their bells sounded briskly—almost like a churchbell sounding the fire alarm. No path was to be seen; what faint trace of it may have existed for a brief while was quickly blotted out by the next shower, and then tramped up again by the next caravan. It was drawing toward evening. The sky was clear only in the west. The sun was just setting; it glowed like a cannon ball. The entire western horizon was burning red, as if a steppe fire were raging, and the fiery gleam was reflected by the barren, level ground. The long lines of camels of the merchant caravan proceeded solemnly; laden with their bales of merchandise

they offered a fantastic sight. Their red outlines presented a striking contrast to the threatening background in the north.

We hastened northward so as not to remain sticking in the loam, which was softening more and more from the rain. According to a Persian superstition, the desert is the mansion place of evil spirits. Whoever remains behind, falls a victim to these fiends. Such a one listens and hears the tinkling of the bells, but believes that it comes from the opposite side. He turns there and is lured farther and farther into the desolate tracts, drawn irresistibly onward, with the sound of the bells in his ears all the time, until at last he falls dead from exhaustion, amidst the scornful laughter of the ghouls.

But I, too, was about to be inveigled by such a specter: black-winged sleep was fluttering around me, as I was sitting benumbed, half unconscious, on my riding camel. What a night! Would it never come to an end? The bells are ringing as if they wanted to announce a morning service, and still no dawn.

The rain continues splashing against the ground. The gait of the camels becomes more limping. Thump! There

one of them is lying in the mire; he must be raised. But soon another one falls. We urge them on frantically. The bells are ringing with a weird sound, like knells when a funeral procession passes. To keep sitting on the camel is too trying for my nerves; I alight and start to walk.

The night is pitch-black. The rain continues coming down. The loam continues loosening underneath our feet. The treads of the camels continue sounding their dull measure, the bells their rhythmic play. If the bells stop, we are the prey of the desert spirits. We have to free the camels from their burdens; we must sacrifice the goods and seek to save the animals. If the rain keeps up any longer, the camels are lost and the men must seek to save their own lives.

However, the genii of the desert relent. With the night still hovering around us, the caravan stops all of a sudden. "What has happened?" I asked. "We are at the Devil's Gutter," answers a voice in the darkness. We stumble over a bed filled with salt water. On its other side, tamarisk is growing and the ground consists of sand. The camels no longer limp. We are saved.

JUNGLE REVEALS BURIED CITY LARGER THAN OLD ROME

Buried for years in the jungle fastness of the island of Ceylon in the Indian Ocean, an ancient city, a contemporary of Rome but much greater in extent, has been unearthed by explorers. The founding of Anuradhapura, as the royal city was called, was in 437 B. C., according to decipherable characters that cover some of the ruins, and its desertion took place late in the ninth century, about 1,200 years later. Excavations have revealed that the splendid structures of the city proper covered many square miles, although its actual boundaries have not yet

been reclaimed from the jungle. Throughout the parklike domain, now the feeding ground for hundreds of cattle, were found remnants of the culture of the period—marble bathing pools, towering monuments, and thousands of fallen columns, hand-hewn and hand-placed, that once supported canopies and upper floors. Some still rest on wide marble platforms. One of the interesting features of that vanished civilization is the "dagoba," a memorial structure, evidently inspired by the worship of some religion. Four of those rival present-day skyscrapers in height. One, probably the highest, towers an estimated 280 feet in the air from a base 252 feet in diameter.

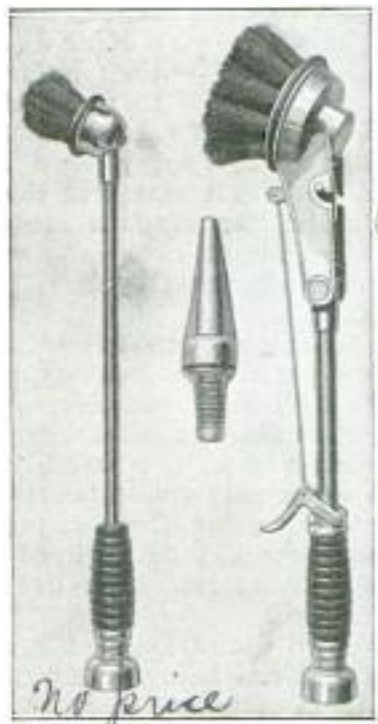
PACIFIC'S BOTTOM IS CHARTED BY TIMING SOUND WAVES

Charting the bottom of the Pacific ocean between United States and Australia is the task of a navy cruiser using a delicate apparatus to measure the time required for sound to pass from the surface of the water to the ocean's bed and return. Records are taken every five miles while the boat is moving. Knowing the speed of sound through water and the time elapsing between sending and returning of a signal serves to compute the depth.

CAR WASHER FITTED TO HOSE REGULATED BY TRIGGER

Attached to an ordinary garden hose like a nozzle, a device has been made for washing automobiles and other machines that ejects either a spray or jet of water through a heavy bristle brush. Without screws or bolts, the force of the water is controlled by a trigger fixed to the forepart of a ribbed handle. By pressing half-way down on it, the stream is forced through the cup-shaped top of the apparatus and changed into a fine spray for washing windows. Another attachment throws a 50-foot stream that cleans mud from the wheels.

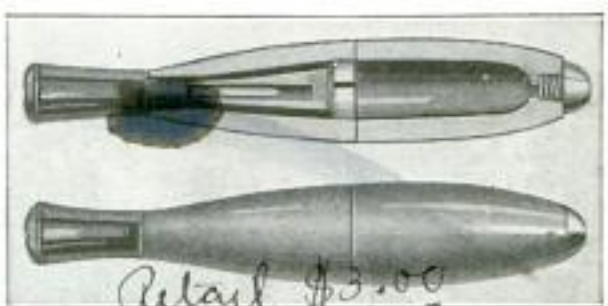

STAR FINDER TRACES COURSE OF FAR-OFF PLANETS

Costly telescopes and other expensive devices are made unnecessary for the amateur student of astronomy by the use of a constellation finder having an arrow mounted over a circular chart to locate star groups seen with ordinary field glasses.

Comment of Two Decades Ago

TWENTY years ago, according to the files of *Popular Mechanics*, engineers were discussing the possibility of joining the Atlantic and Pacific oceans with a canal in either Panama or Nicaragua.

Nine days were required then by the fastest liners to make the voyage from

New York to London that now takes considerably less than a week. Of these old boats, it was said that, "It seems as though the modern steamship of today offers about every convenience and accommodation that it is possible to provide."

That ocean vessels would be built with fast passenger elevators, swimming pools, tiled baths, massive, pillared dining rooms, daily newspapers, was never even conceived as a possibility in 1903. That opera music and concerts by notable artists given hundreds of miles away on the shore would be enjoyed by ocean travelers, was not even dreamed of by inventors.

Two decades ago, the discovery of the X-ray was being hailed as the latest marvel of science, electric headlights were being tried on some of the fastest railway express trains. The 100th birthday of the first locomotive was being observed in all parts of the country. Chicago began the use of its first subway, the tube being 100 miles long and designed for freight only.

Forecasting the coming triumph of the radio, Swedish engineers announced that they had succeeded in sending wireless messages for a distance of 28 miles, and a Belgian inventor exhibited a device designed to transmit the picture of the person talking over a telephone wire.

The possibility of telephoning without wires was considered but idle speculation.

What Liners Now Offer

AS a graphic example of the increase in speed and safety of travel during the past 20 years, a trip around the world in 1902 required 54 days.

Just a few years before, however, Jules Verne had written of what was then considered an impossible feat, "Around the World in Eighty Days." Just recently this trip has been made in 34 days, and this time is expected to be further reduced with the growing use of airplanes.

With the automobile in its infancy two decades ago, a queer craft running on wheels and propelled by sails was built to "skim the lifeless sands of the dreaded Mohave Desert." It was declared to be capable of carrying several persons at a speed of from 50 to 80 miles an hour, and plans were made for it to supplant the camels used in the great Sahara.

With the coming of the tractor, this strange ship on wheels has been forgotten, its place being taken by an automobile attached to a so-called endless tread.

Another strange craft was the boat fitted with an umbrella, or cyclone, sail. This was expected to increase the speed and to remove the danger of capsizing as the wind pressure did not tend to tilt the craft.

Although the device attracted wide attention at the time, it also has been forgotten with the coming of the fast motorboats, many of which have run at a speed of more than 60 miles an hour.

And yet within the memory of men now alive it took longer to go from Kansas City to San Francisco than it does now to encircle the globe. During the days of the prairie schooners in '49, this journey took over three months, while recently an airplane flew from New York to San Diego in 24 hours.

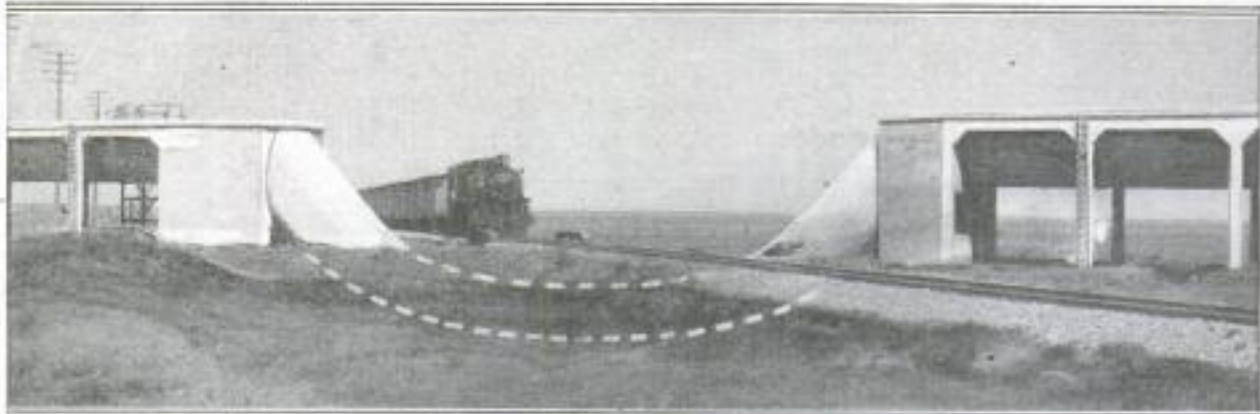

SIPHON CARRIES WATER UNDER RAILWAY TRACKS



Inverted Siphon, Connecting Opposite Ends of Flume, Carries Water beneath Railroad Tracks, as Height of Curved Shell did Not Provide Sufficient Clearance for Crossing above Ground

To irrigate hundreds of thousands of acres of land in the West, water is being brought for 2 miles over a reinforced-concrete trestle, 60 feet high.

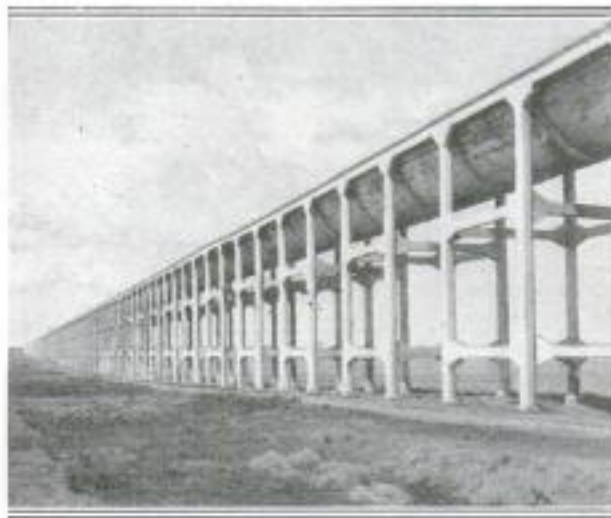
At one point, the rushing torrent is carried down into the ground through a siphon to enable it to cross the tracks of a railway at a speed of 12 cubic feet per second.

Hailed as a remarkable feat of engineering, the aqueduct is a curved shell suspended between heavy girders. Twisting like a huge snake across the landscape, it suddenly vanishes into the earth only to re-

appear on the other side of the tracks. Here, tapered ends at the inlet and outlet of the tube give an increased velocity to the flow with but a slight total loss of "head." There was no interruption

of traffic while the flume was being constructed. In building the aqueduct approximately 25,000 cubic yards of concrete and 4,000,000 pounds of reinforcing steel were used at a total cost of 650,000 dollars.

It carries water from Lake Newell across a valley between the Bow and Red Deer rivers to the Bassano irrigation project east of Calgary, Canada.

SILVER FOXES BRED ON RANCH TO OBTAIN RICH FURS

Because of the killing of fur-bearing animals, a silver-fox ranch has been established on Long Island within sight of New York City. In a five-acre inclosure, rigidly guarded, are kept 100 pairs of the beautiful animals. A number of their offspring are marketed yearly. Some are sold for breeding purposes while others are killed, painlessly, for their pelts. Protected from the dangers of life in the open and carefully attended, the animals develop furs of better quality, it is said. Mother foxes, often nervous in captivity, frequently disown their

young and then their places are taken by cats, but dogs rarely seem willing to "mother" young foxes. The industry has grown to such an extent that most of the skins that now find their way to market come from ranches that are scattered all over the United States. While the average prices paid for skins last season ranged from \$150 to \$370, a single fox for breeding purposes, with a fine pedigree, sometimes sells for as much as \$2,000.

**GOLDEN COLD-LIGHT FILTER
MAKES MOVIES SAFE**

Coated with pure gold, a filter has been made that removes 90 per cent of the heat from light rays used in projecting motion pictures, thus eliminating the danger of fire when the machine slows down or suddenly stops. By its use it is possible to halt the unwinding of a highly inflammable film and throw "still" pictures on the screen. The device consists of two small glass disks, with the gold-sprayed sides cemented together, thus making a single lens. Fitted above the projection aperture while a reel is being run off, it automatically drops into place when the machine loses speed or halts. While it reflects objects as readily as an ordinary mirror, it is transparent when held to the light. Rays filtered through it have a slight greenish cast, but not sufficient to blot out the picture. For years scientists have been searching for a means to take heat from light rays.

**DIAL TELLS HOW HOT IT IS
WITHOUT MERCURY**

Without the aid of mercury, a recently devised thermometer works from a coiled metal spring expanding and contracting under changes of temperature, revolving a dial horizontally behind a pointer. The scale, printed in large figures, may be seen at a considerable distance, making a convenient article for desks or walls. Ornamental designs are used to meet various requirements.

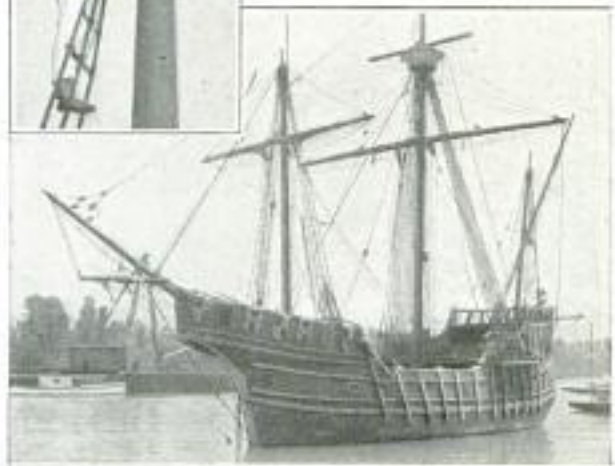

SPIRITS OF DEPARTED SPEEDED WITH WEIRD RITES

ONE of the most interesting subjects afforded a traveler in many lands off the beaten path of civilization is the

on top of a near-by high mountain where it is cold. Until recently these people made human sacrifices of slaves at times when living relations wished to send a message of importance to a dear departed, the soul of the slave supposedly carrying the message. Missionaries are now trying to stop this practice.

In another part of Borneo, the bones of the dead are taken up after about a year and are carefully laid beside the things the deceased most cherished in life. The gathered whole is then placed in a beautiful little house, six by four feet in size, which is a mass of very fine carving. The house is then reared high in the air on the top of a stout pole which is made firmly fast in the ground near the dead man's home.

Although separated by thousands of miles, the Dusans and the Eskimos still bury their dead somewhat in the same manner, while the Dusans and the Stapsans, living near each other on the same island, have not one thing in common in their burial custom.

various ways in which primitive people honor the spirits of the departed.

Tribes living within a few miles of each other are often found to have practices totally at variance, while races separated by thousands of miles do things almost in the same way.

Among the Eskimos, when a man dies he is wrapped in his best furs and laid upon the tundra or prairie at some selected spot. Then a cairn of stones is built over him. Upon this is placed all the cooking utensils, weapons, and the boat he used in life.

For three days after death, the spirit is supposed still to remain within the body. During this time the deceased's nearest relative, usually his eldest son, comes for a short time each day and talks to the spirit to keep it from getting lonely. A tall pole is also erected over the grave from the end of which blow in the breeze bits of cloth, skin, or moss that keep away evil spirits. At the end of the third day all the dead man's possessions may be sold to white men or Indians, if such be in the vicinity, but on no account to other Eskimos.

In North Borneo, the dead are buried in the earth. Over each grave is erected a substantial and neat little house in which are placed the possessions of the deceased, particularly clothes, as the Dusans believe the other world to be

MILLION YEARS OLD

What is regarded as the earliest recorded fossil forest has been unearthed in New York State. Experts estimate that it is about 300,000,000 years old, and that it belongs to the Devonian period. Already 40 of the stone-tree butts removed from the excavation have been placed in the state's museum. Stumps were found in the rocks at two levels, one 60 feet above the other. Only a short distance below the lower forest, the rocks are said to bear true marine fossils. Authorities now believe that the western Catskill Mountains region was formed millions of years ago.

CITIES OF RARE BIRDS FOUND IN GULF-COAST WILDS

Miles from human habitation, in an isolated and wild section of the Gulf coast of Texas, enormous cities of birds were found recently. Some were of species not known to exist anywhere in the United States, except in limited numbers. Among these was the white-face, glossy ibis, the American cousin of the sacred bird of Egypt, whose gorgeous bronze plumage was used as a decoration for women's hats until laws were passed forbidding the practice. Living in another colony were the wood ibis, commonly called the American stork; the rare white-face ibis, sought by naturalists for years; and the roseate spoonbill, noted for its brilliant feathers.

Thrills Made to Order in the Movies at the Risk of Life and Limb

Stars of the Silver Screen Often Called Upon to Face Death as Result of Demand for More Realism in Pictures

HANGING by the heels on a 6-inch ledge with the street cavern yawning 12 stories below is no trick at all—in the movies.

Missing a foothold on the edge of a tall brick precipice and being caught by the hands of a clock 10 floors above the earth, however, contains almost as many thrills for the actor as it does for the spectators.

For these are the days of realism in pictures, the result of a ceaseless demand on the part of a public long accustomed to seeing speeding automobiles plunge over steep cliffs, death-defying leaps into a raging surf, and airplane crashes, for more thrills.

While only a few years ago most of the "stunt" pictures were the result of trick photography, double exposure, and splicing of the film in the cutting rooms, today the highest-priced stars of filmdom are often called upon to risk their lives.

In other cases "doubles" are employed to take the place of the star for the more hazardous undertakings. Dressed and made up to resemble the actor, they brave death in leaps from speeding trains to airplanes, jump over cliffs, and ride motorcycles into locomotives with no chance of winning either fame or glory for themselves. They are the unsung heroes of the movies.

Many risks, however, are taken by the stars. In one instance, during the filming of a western melodrama, the heroine was called upon to plunge into an icy mountain torrent and float downstream

toward a cataract. Camera men and the director trailed along in a boat behind so that a close-up of her face in the water could be obtained.

It had been found by experiment that the current would carry

floating objects to a sand bar just above the falls, and a watcher was stationed

there to pull her from the water as she swept past. But, instead, the current swept her to the other side of the stream and she would have been dashed over the falls

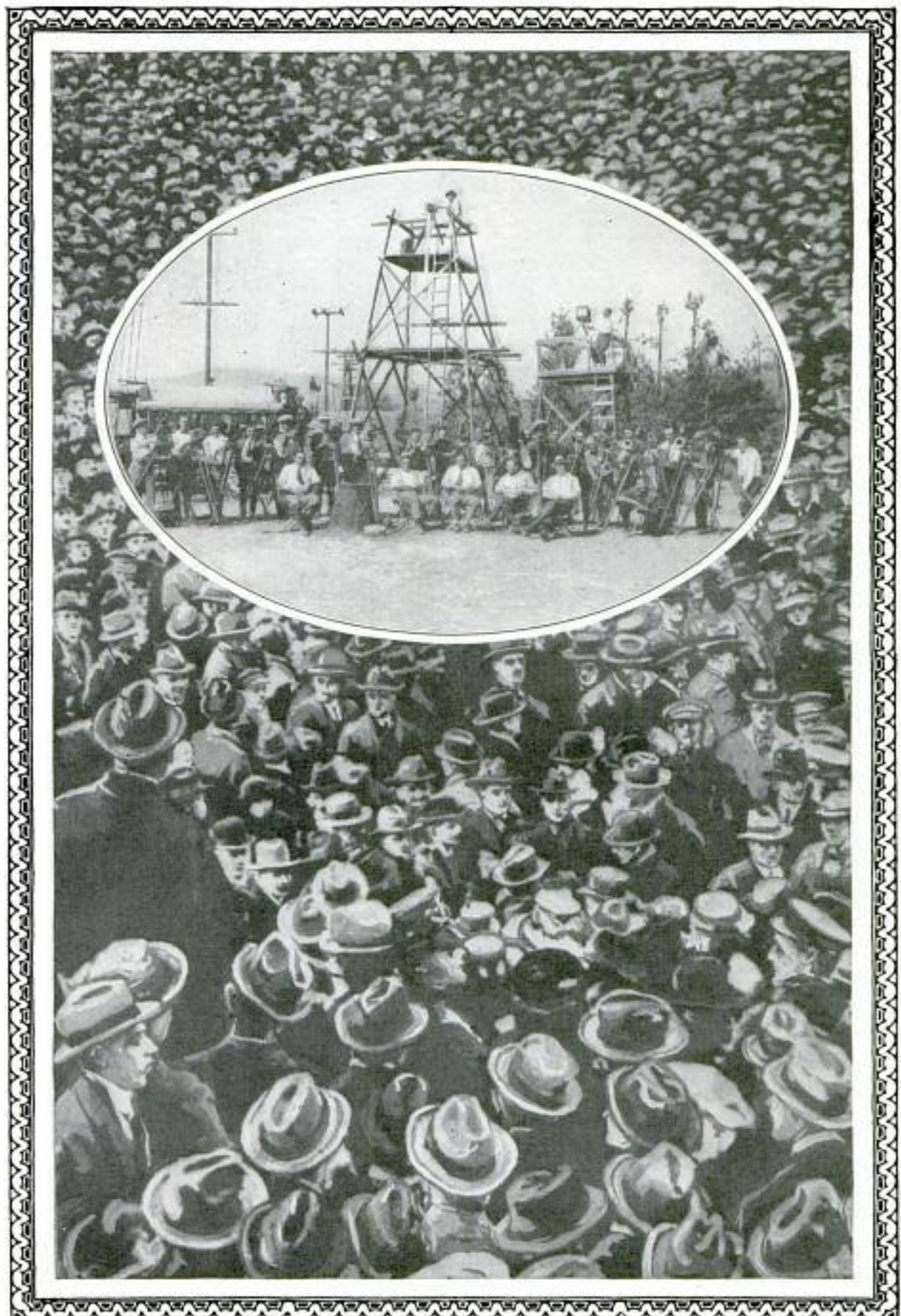
to certain death had not her secretary managed to grab a bit of her dress and draw her to the shore. One of the strongest bits of realism ever shown on a screen probably, was the expression of hopeless horror on the face of the victim as she realized her danger. This was caught by the camera in the boat.

Considerable hazard often is eliminated by the use of wires that protect the actor against falls. These cannot be seen when the picture is shown on the screen. In the comedies, also, many other tricks are employed. One is a rest at the back of an automobile that holds the actor out parallel to the road and makes him appear to be stretched out like a ribbon.

To do this two pictures are taken and spliced together. In the first, he chases after the automobile and catches the rear seat with his hands, throwing his feet into the air. Then the automobile goes back, the actor takes his place on the rack and it covers the same course. Later the films are cut and joined at the point where he first leaped into the air.

In making a picture of a man climbing the side of a building and doing apparently perilous stunts many floors above the street, a real building was selected and a circus performer employed to double for the actor in the "long shots." Then a fake building was built on top of the real one. The "set" was built in far enough so that the roof would break any fall and also would provide a platform for the camera. By "shooting" at a proper angle, however, the drop to the street looked straight down.





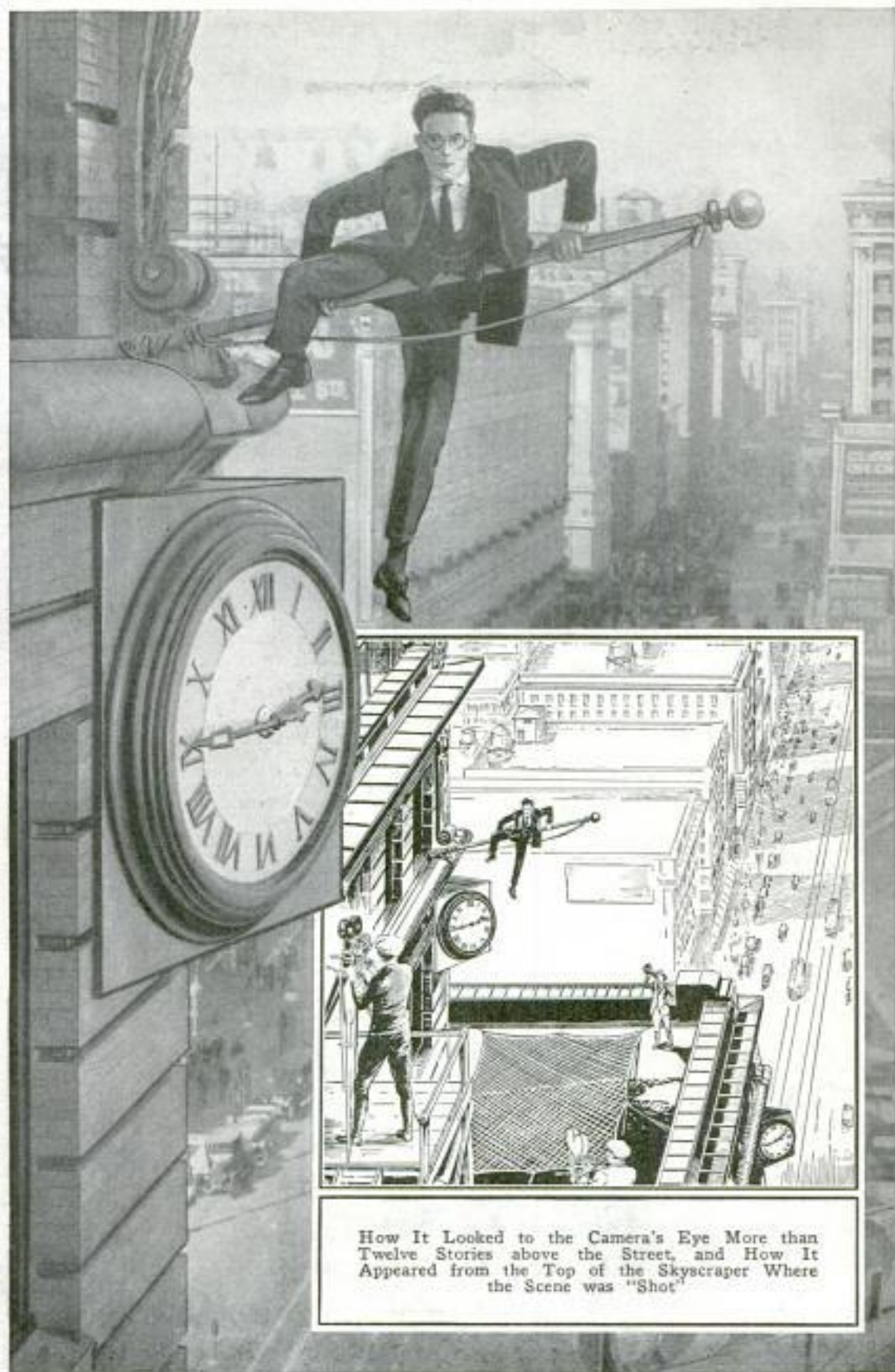

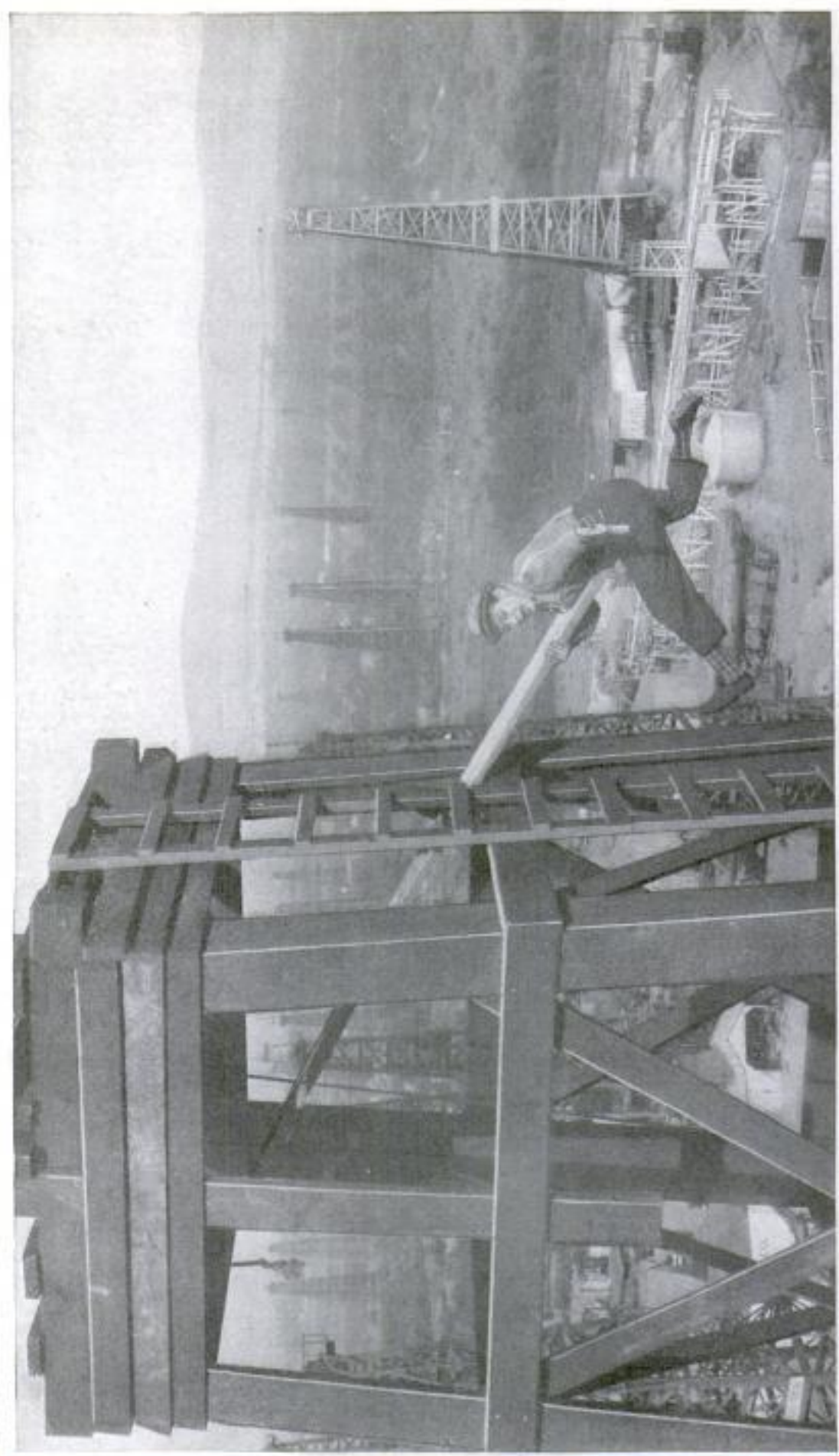

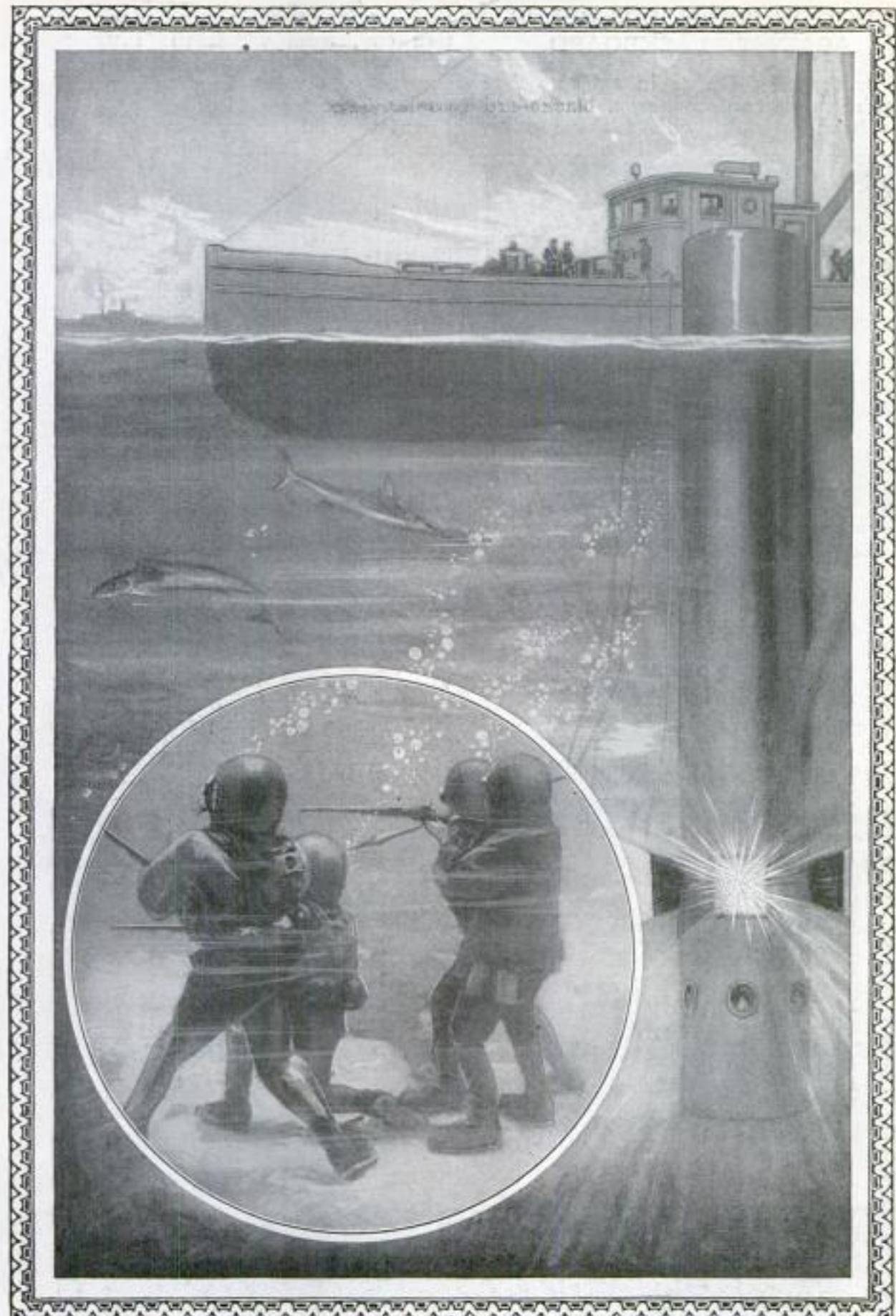

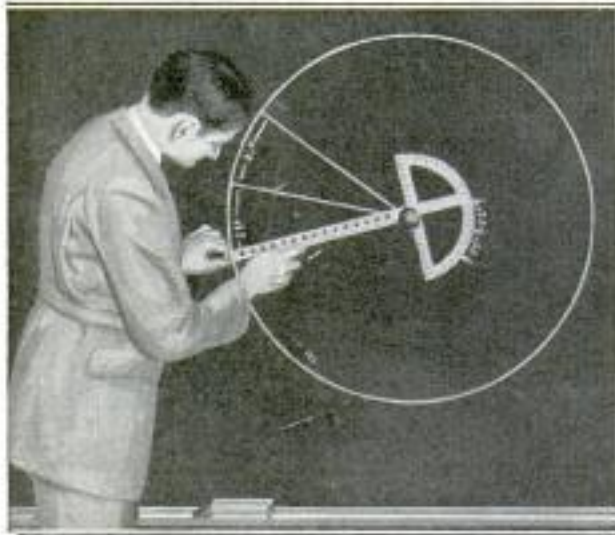

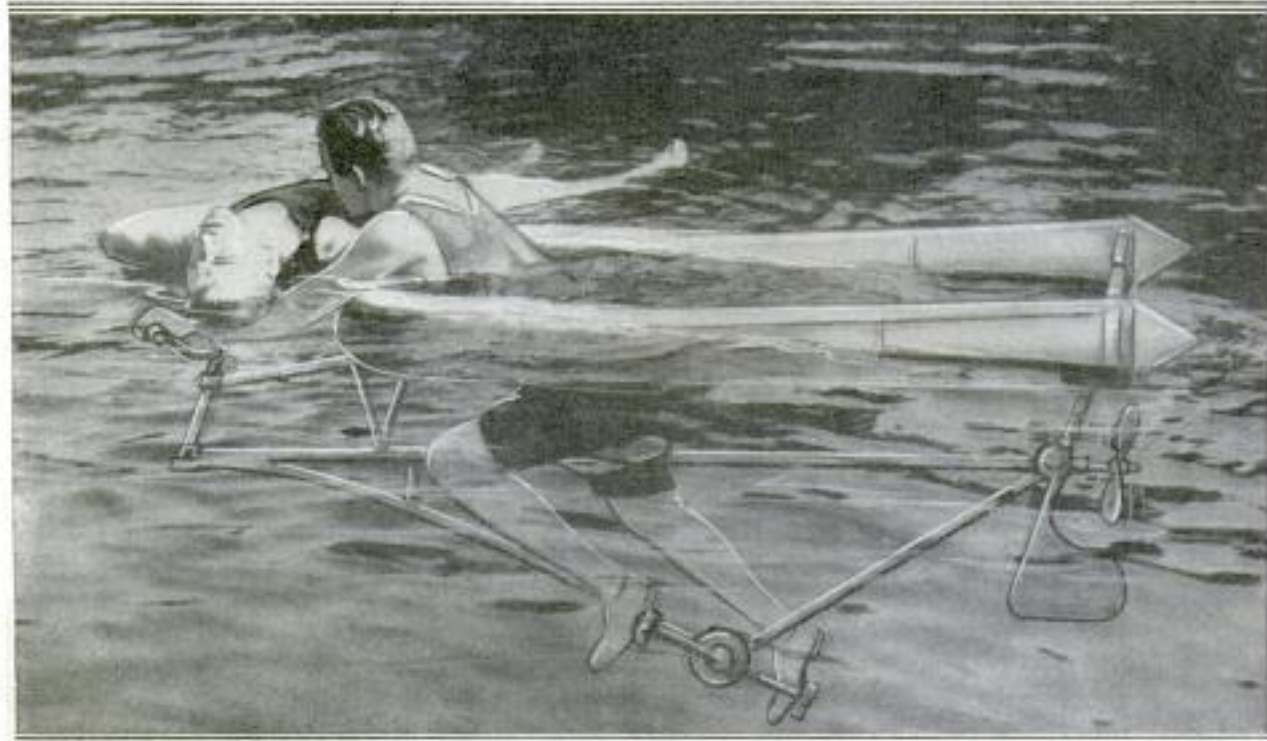

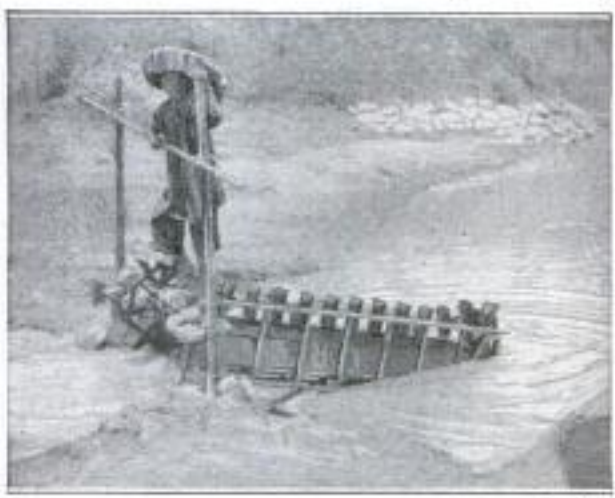
MANY SEA LIONS ARE SLAIN TO PROTECT FISH 3033

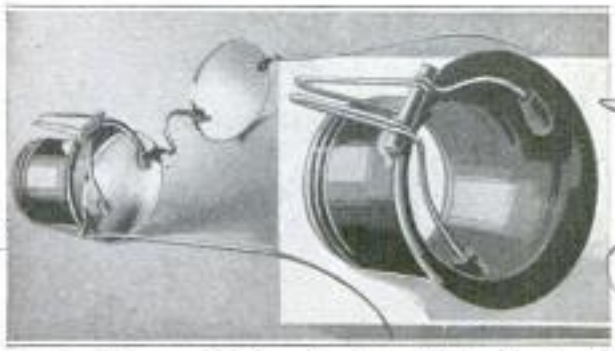

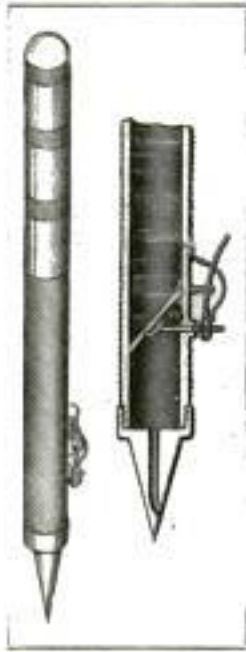

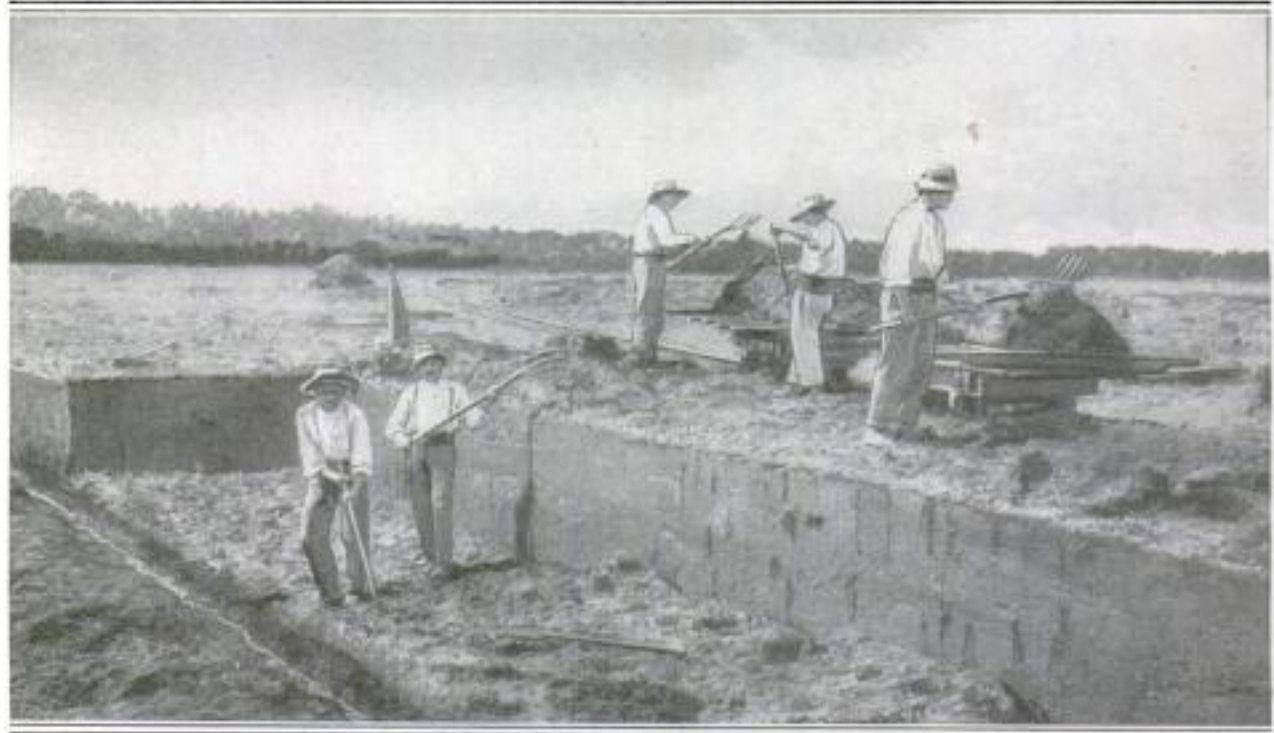

ALL the magic colors of the rainbow are being made to order on butterfly farms in France. From the almost invisible eggs and crawling, ugly caterpillars to the marvelously tinted specimens treasured by collectors, they are bred and cared for as painstakingly as the

rarest plants or the most valuable race horses.

Seeking to turn out shades that will rival nature's wonders, scientists are now trying to find a way to determine the color of the butterfly before its birth through experiments in crossbreeding that already have met with partial success. While previously only a pastime for amateurs, the study of the butterflies has now become the serious work of scientists.

Often a single rare specimen has been sold for \$3,000, the delicate body and wings being preserved with a varnishlike substance and used as a decoration for a hat or dress by women. They are also in great demand by collectors, and enable experts to study the formation and shading of colors.

Farms devoted to the cultivation of the insects provide plenty of trees, such as apple and pine, with abundant leaves, which form the chief food of the caterpillars. Great care is taken when the eggs start to hatch. They are placed on branches which are stuck in vases filled with water, while a protecting gauze prevents the feeble young insects from drowning. As soon as the leaves are devoured, fresh branches are provided. The room in which the eggs are hatched is well ventilated and an even temperature is maintained. After two weeks, they are removed to the open air. There protection is provided against birds, a sort of sleeve being placed over the branches.

When they reach the size of full-grown caterpillars, the protecting sleeve is removed. At this stage the danger from birds is remote, due to the extreme fat of the caterpillars, which is disliked by their feathered enemies. Soon the insects retire in cocoons or wrap themselves up in leaves. These later are collected and stored in well-ventilated receptacles, and the evolution into a beautiful butterfly is the next stage.

It has been found that a butterfly may change its coloring because of the action of heat and cold and, perhaps, electricity in the air. These changes are as follows: from light to dark brown, turning almost black. Other changes are due to the way in which the scales are arranged, tawny yellow sometimes turning so pale that it will look almost white. Red, yellow, white, brown, or black, as well as blue and violet, are so arranged that they are capable of displaying many shades.

Generally it has been found that the lighter shades indicate feebleness, while the darker forms show physical strength. With these lessons in mind, experts turn to their laboratories and apply in many ways a practical, scientific knowledge both of breeding and of colors.

To the eye, the wings of a moth seem to be covered with minute particles of dust that rub off on the slightest touch. But closer observation shows that they are coated with thousands of tiny scales, that

overlap one another in the fashion of shingles on the roof of a house. In those are the pigments, that together make the gorgeous colorings.

Nature has designed the colors to make the butterflies almost invisible while they are feeding or resting on flowers or trees, to protect them from their enemies, the birds.

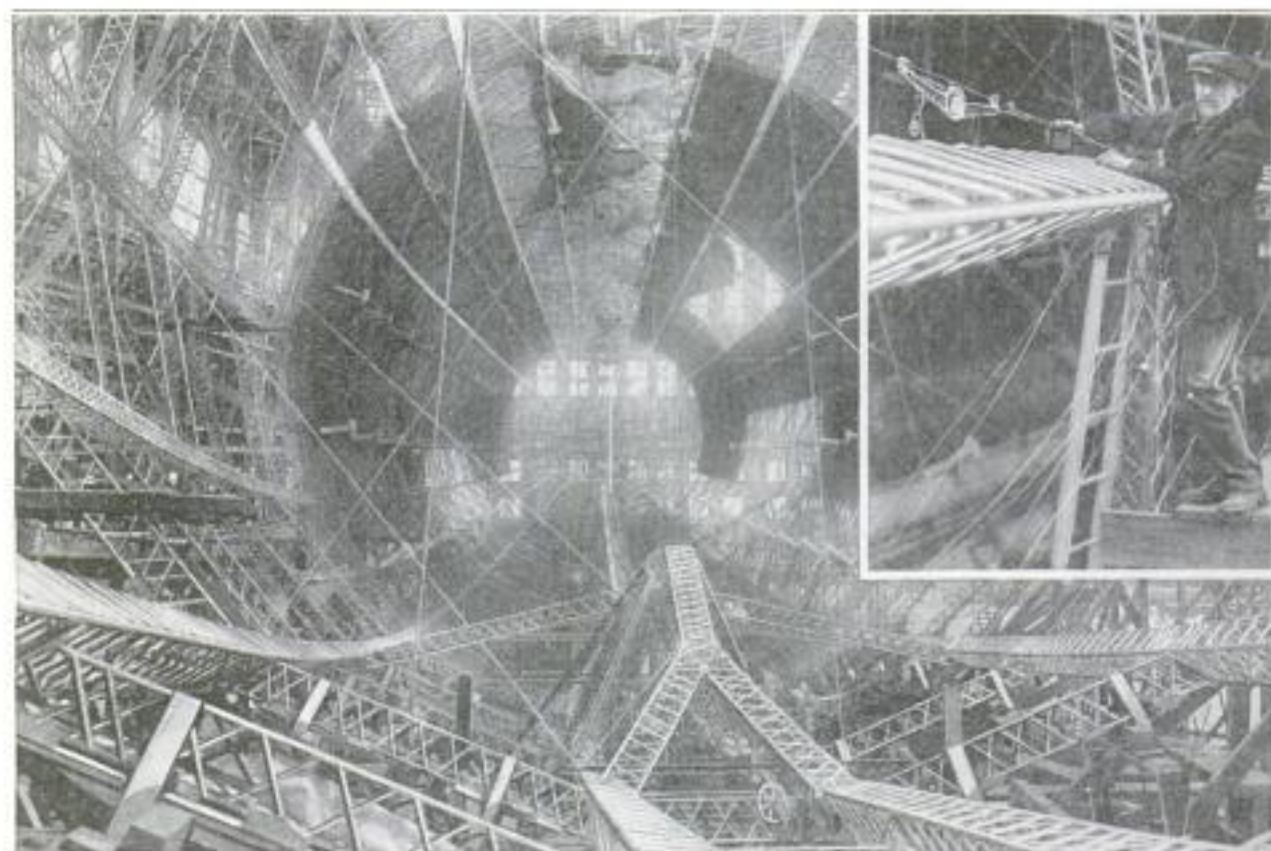

2783 NAVY TESTS GUARD LIVES OF AIR-CRAFT CREWS

To protect the lives of airmen, the navy puts every scrap of material used in building its airplanes and dirigibles to many tests. Hundreds of inspectors are constantly employed in this work and many special machines have been made to insure accuracy. When the great dirigible "ZR-1" was being built at Lakehurst, N. J., every wire was tested by pressure gauges before and after being installed, to insure its strength and that

tanks. Any excess of heat would cause undue expansion of the gas. Realizing that some hidden flaw may result in loss of lives, every effort is made to assure the soundness of the material used. In testing cloth, strips are suspended in a wooden framework and exposed to the weight of one load applied in a lengthwise direction at the same time as four variable loads are also pulling on the same sample in the other direction. An aluminum preparation is painted over the cloth to give it a surface that will reflect sunlight and thus eliminate the penetration of objectionable heat into the gas-storage

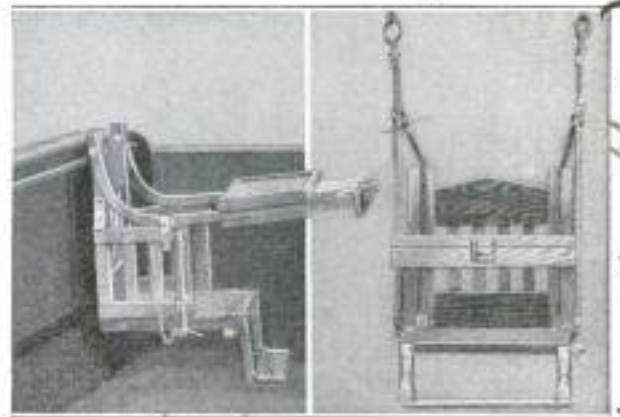

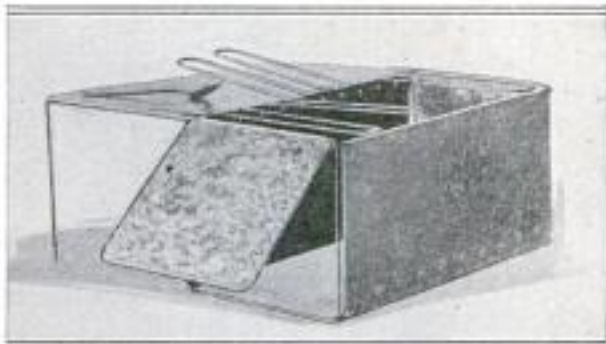

Several other similar incidents are attributed to differences in the top and bottom material, resulting in unequal expansion. The force exerted may be so powerful as to hurl broken blocks of concrete into the air, leaving large holes much like those made by charges of dynamite. In one case the upheaval left a gap 3 feet wide in the highway. Brick and wood-block paving, also, have been known to expand from heat or moisture, buckling with a sudden upward movement.

Heat is measured in British thermal units, known to engineers as "B. T. U." One of these is about the amount of heat given off by a match in lighting a cigar.

FLOATING AIR-CRAFT DEPOT IN MIDDLE OF OCEAN

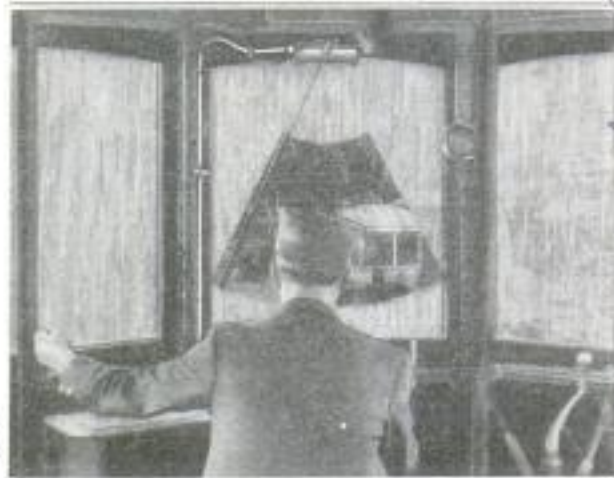

2806 NATURE'S TRAP YIELDS BONES OF PREHISTORIC MONSTERS

Death traps of nature, as the asphalt pits of a western state are known, have given up skeletons that have enabled scientists to add to their knowledge of prehistoric animals. Ages ago strange birds and beasts that long since have vanished, in seeking to cross what appeared to be solid ground, would become mired in the sticky substance. Floundering about in an attempt to pull themselves free, they would attract the attention of an enemy. Both then would become trapped, and, in time, would slowly sink from sight. Thus nature has provided scientists with a record, although perhaps incomplete, of creatures that no longer exist. Working in the pits, experts have uncovered many well-preserved skulls of the saber-tooth

tiger. The teeth, from which the animal was given its name, extended about 5 inches below the lower jaw. In those pits, many skulls have been found, among them that of another member of the cat family, which measured 19 inches through the cheek bones. Skeletons of the giant sloth, buffalo, horses, and wolves also have been taken from the deposits.

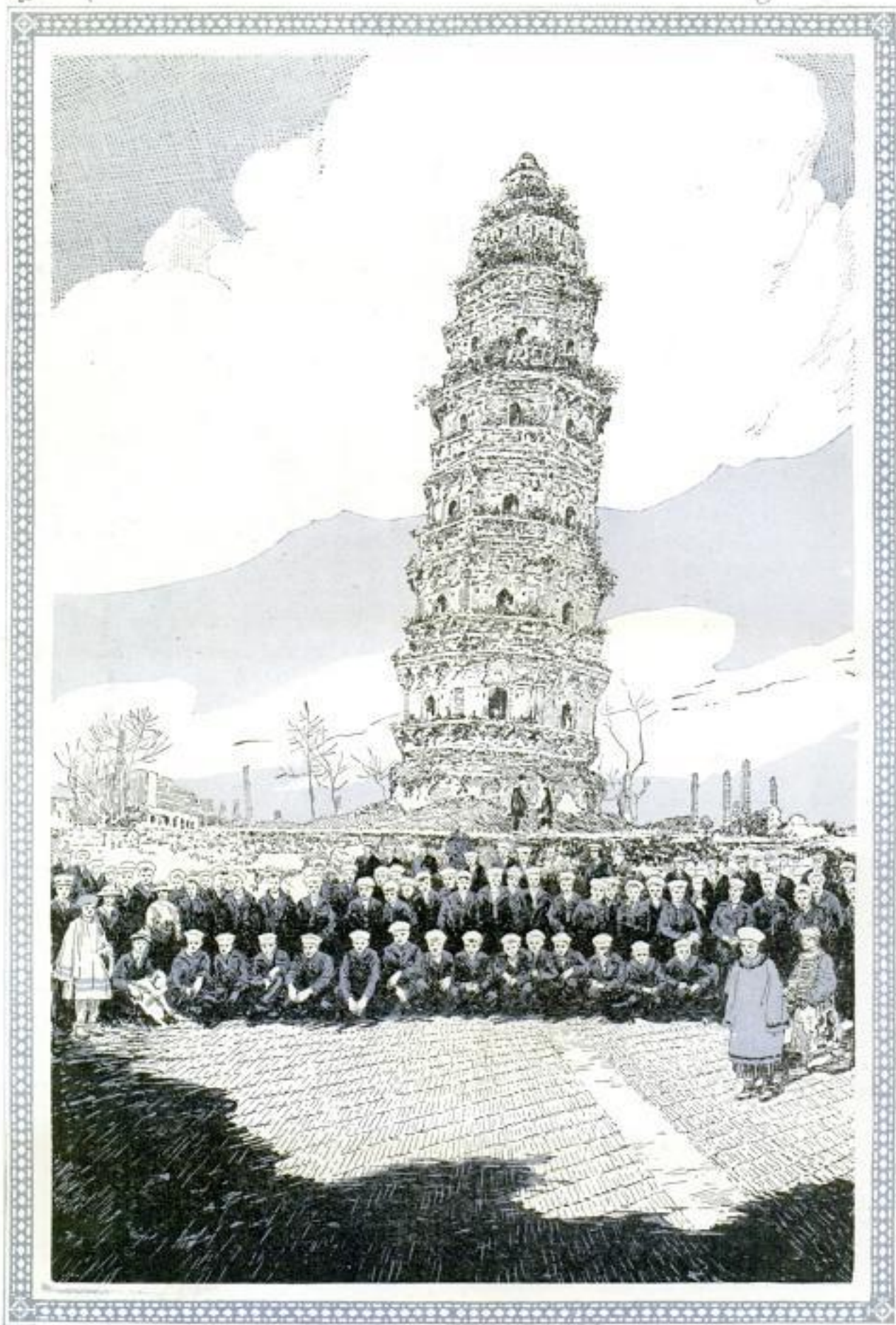

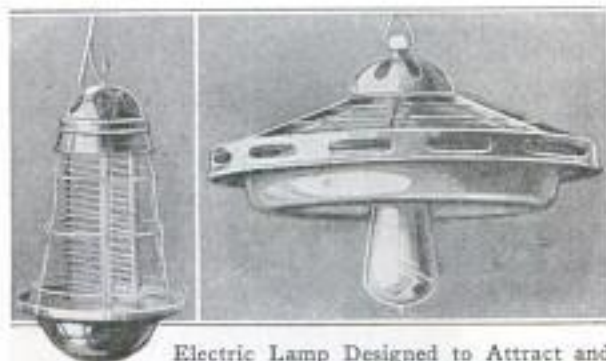
MYSTICISM OF THE FAR EAST IS BUILT INTO PAGODAS

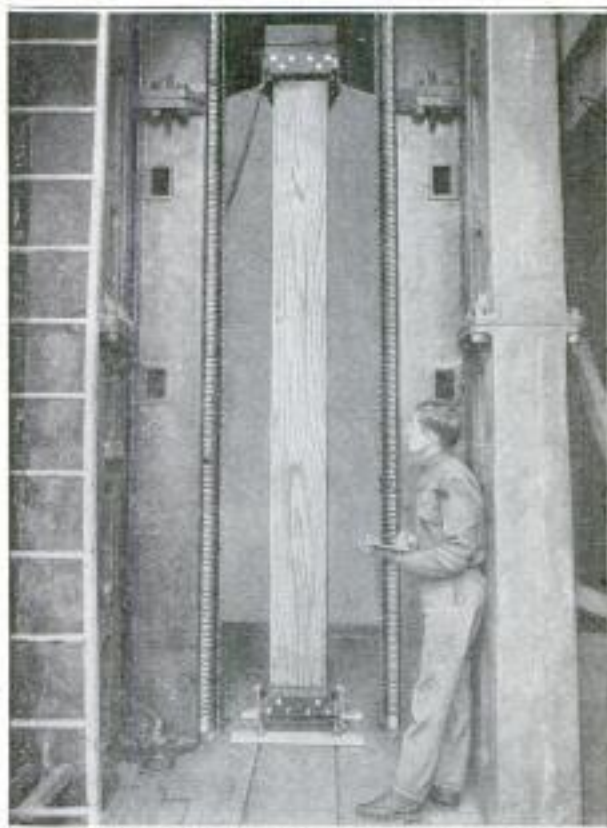

2820 FEAR OF KNOTS IN TIMBER CAUSES MILLIONS WASTE

Knots have little effect upon the carrying capacity of timbers, according to government experts. Tests are said to have proved that builders in the past have

wasted millions of dollars by excessive use of lumber in underestimating the strength of wooden columns. For instance, a piece of southern yellow pine, 30 feet long and a foot square, will hold as much as 432,000 pounds, while the same-size column of Douglas fir will sustain a maximum of 406,300 pounds. Two-foot chunks of wood were used in the knot experiments that are said to have demonstrated that those imperfections have little relation to the column strength. Forty-five feet high and weighing 150,000 pounds, the machine used in the research is powerful enough to exert a pressure of 1,000,000 pounds. Pressure is applied by two vertical screws, driven by a 5-horsepower motor. The pressure exerted is measured by a weighing beam, after the fashion of an ordinary pit scale.

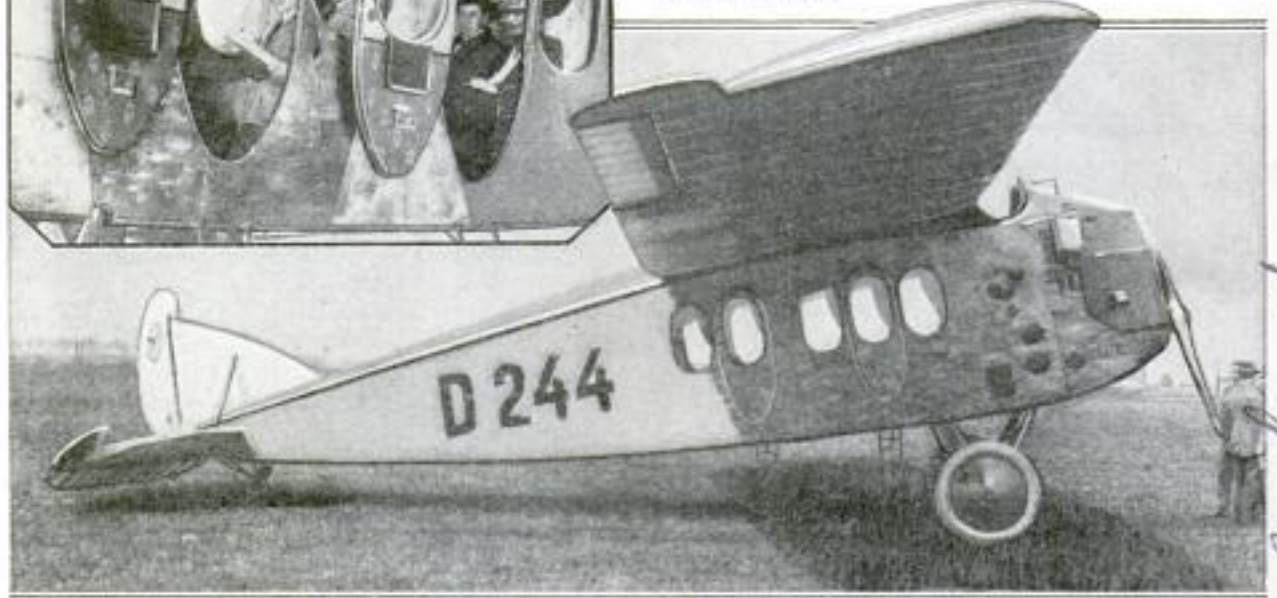

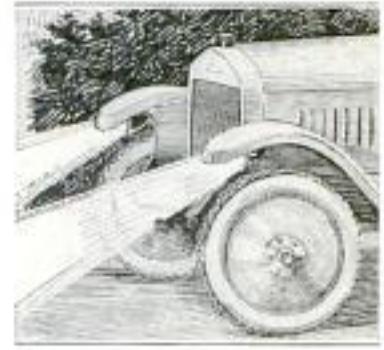

PLANE REFUELED IN MID-AIR THROUGH RUBBER HOSE 288

Refueling an airplane in the air has been successfully accomplished. It was done in two minutes while two planes were rushing along, one above the other, at a speed of 90 miles an hour. Flying 40 feet above, the supply craft with its load of gasoline dropped a steel-wire-incased rubber hose to the one beneath it, through which the fuel passed into that machine's tank. AUTO LIGHTS UNDER FENDERS REMOVE STRONG GLARE 283

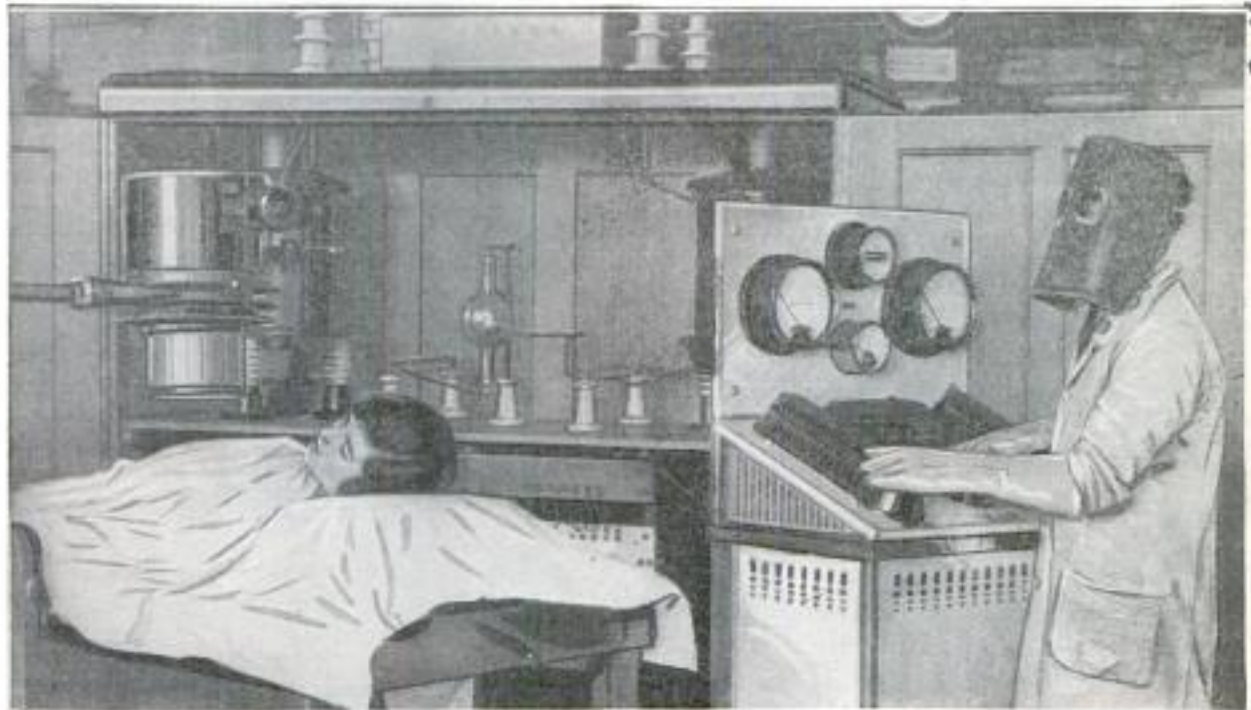
By having all of its rays strike directly on the road ahead, an automobile lamp attached by a single bolt to the underside of the front fender inside the wheel, does away with blinding glare of ordinary high-powered headlights that frequently annoy those driving at night. Its shaft of light, thrown for 300 feet, is low enough to avoid the eyes of approaching motorists and cyclists, and clearly shows the road from both directions, preventing many accidents and making dimming unnecessary. A bracket allows the level of the light to be raised or lowered with ease.



X-RAY USED FOR EIGHT HOURS IN CANCER TREATMENT 282

In seeking a sure cure for some forms of cancer, German scientists have applied a powerful X-ray to the patients for continuous periods of eight hours. It is claimed that this long exposure kills the germ cells, while the healthy tissue remains unaffected. Only one treatment is given, during the length of which the sufferer is kept on a surgeon's table while the physician watches from behind a screen. Lead glass, or shields, that the rays will not penetrate, afford protection for the attendants. A current of 200,000 volts is employed in the treatment.

With a mixture of half sawdust and the remainder chalk and chemicals, a scientist is reported to have made artificial wood by subjecting the combination to heavy pressure. It can be used as ordinary lumber, and is said to be as tough as oak, and rot-proof. It also withstands more heat than real timber.

IS MOVED BY GAS**

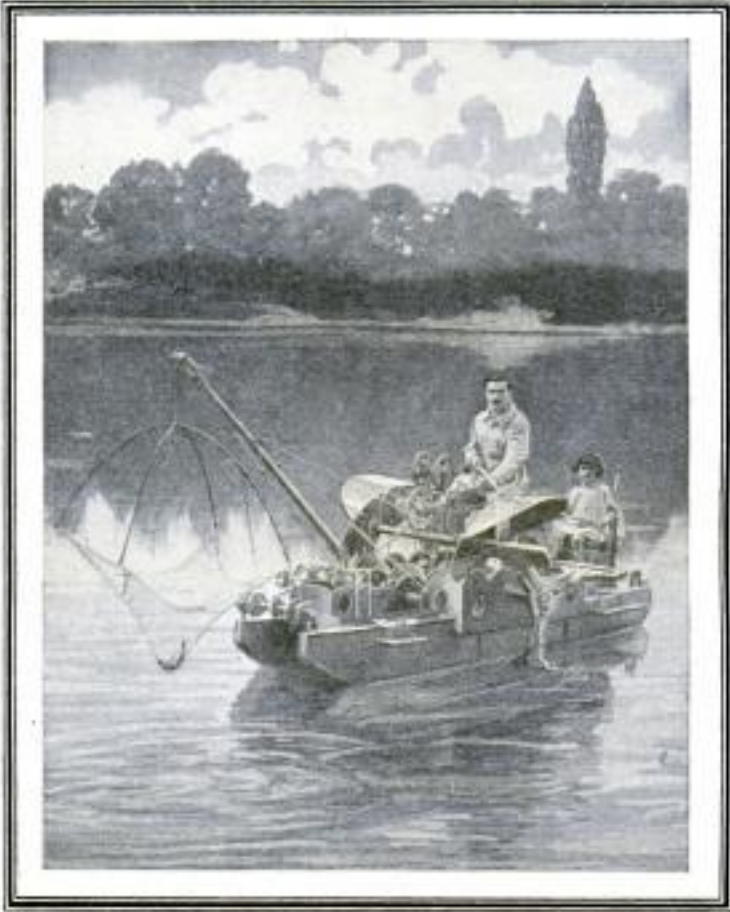

Curious-looking junks in Chinese ports are rivaled by some of the boats plying the River Po, between the Alps and Apennine mountains, in northern Italy. One such craft was built by a fisherman from metal and boards found in a scrap heap. While in appearance it is crude, a small motor pushes it along at a speed that seems a rapid pace in comparison with the boats moved by oars. As the course of the Po is marked by sand bars and shallows, fishermen are kept constantly on the alert. At some points though, where high banks confine the channel, its bed is above the surface of the surrounding land. From farms along the river the roughly made boats present an odd appearance as they move back and forth with their cargoes. There are still evidences of canals and roads built along the winding Po in old Roman days, but save for the occasional use of an engine, there is little difference between the types of boats used on this stream then and now.

Preliminary reports from a Danish scientist, now on his way home from an expedition to the central and western parts of the Sahara Desert, tell of his visits among the Tuaregs, whose ruler has his headquarters on the Ahaggar mountain plateau in Morocco. In the villages of these nomadic Arabs he found a blond race, of whose existence unconfirmed tales have been current for a long time. This people bears every mark of being a remnant of some northern tribe that may have invaded Africa long before historic times. The scientist describes them — both men and women — as possessing great beauty and being very careful of their fair complexion. The men, he says, wear dark veils for this purpose, use rouge and powder, and bedeck themselves with ornaments. The women, on the contrary, go unveiled and do not seem to be as vain as the men. Agriculture, goat and sheep herding are their occupations, but the women do not work, having black servants even for household duties. They live in mud huts and are fond of "parties," at which music, singing, and storytelling form the chief entertainment.

**VICTIMS OF GAS ARE SAVED
BY RESPIRATOR MASK**

To save the lives of persons overcome by gas, a mask has been made so that a constant stream of fresh oxygen is fed into the lungs and then exhausted into the air, the process being similar to that of breathing.

Lung and heart specialists, after tests in France, declared that the apparatus seldom will fail in bringing an asphyxiated person back to life, unless the victim is already dead.

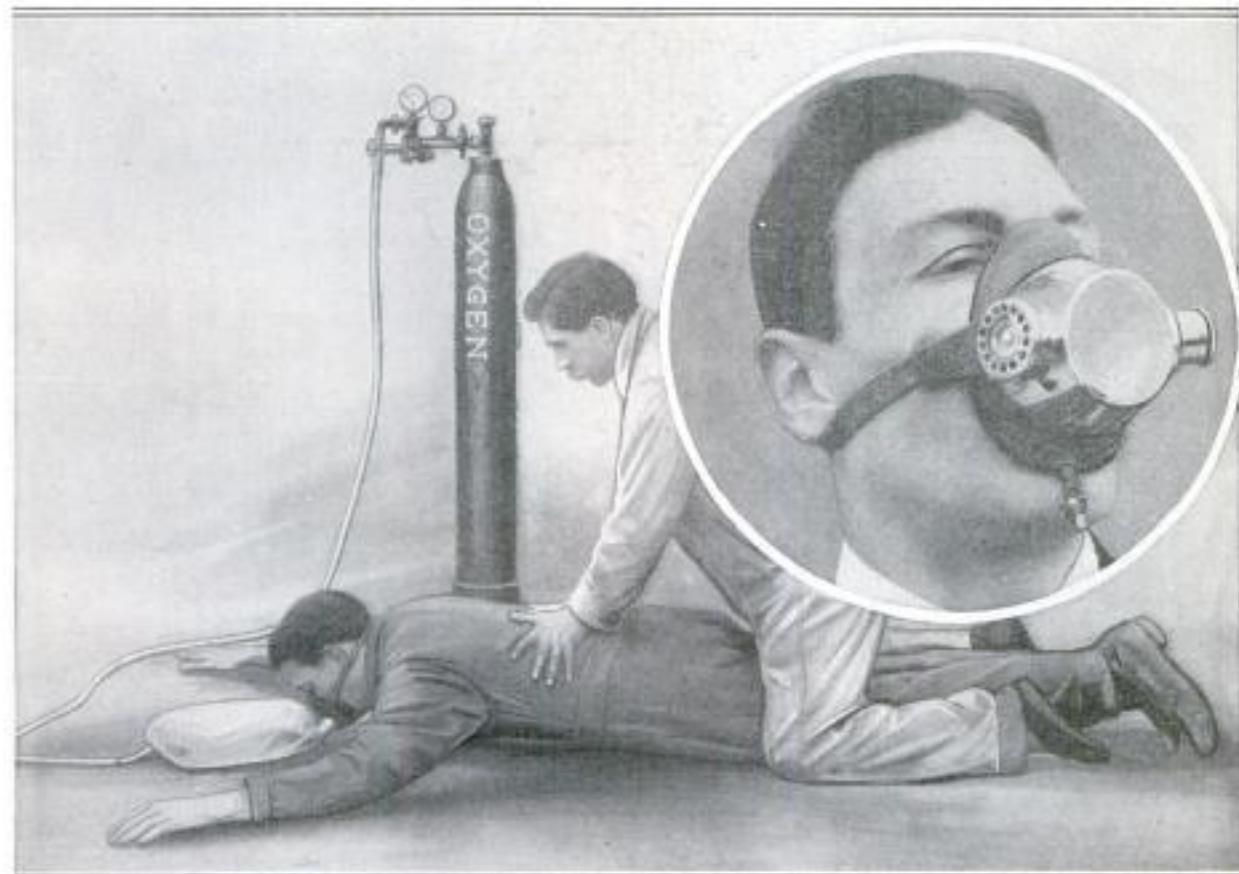
Although chiefly intended for use in factories, where the danger from suffocation is often encountered, as in illuminating-gas, carbon-dioxide, and electric-battery plants, the device also is being used in mines and on beaches.

Prompt application of artificial respiration is necessary when a victim is stricken. First aid is of great help in retarding the poisonous effect of the fumes on the blood. This usually requires stretching the patient flat, rubbing the spine, and moving his arms and legs vigorously until an oxygen tank can be applied.

Under the method now in general use, however, inhalation and exhalation by the

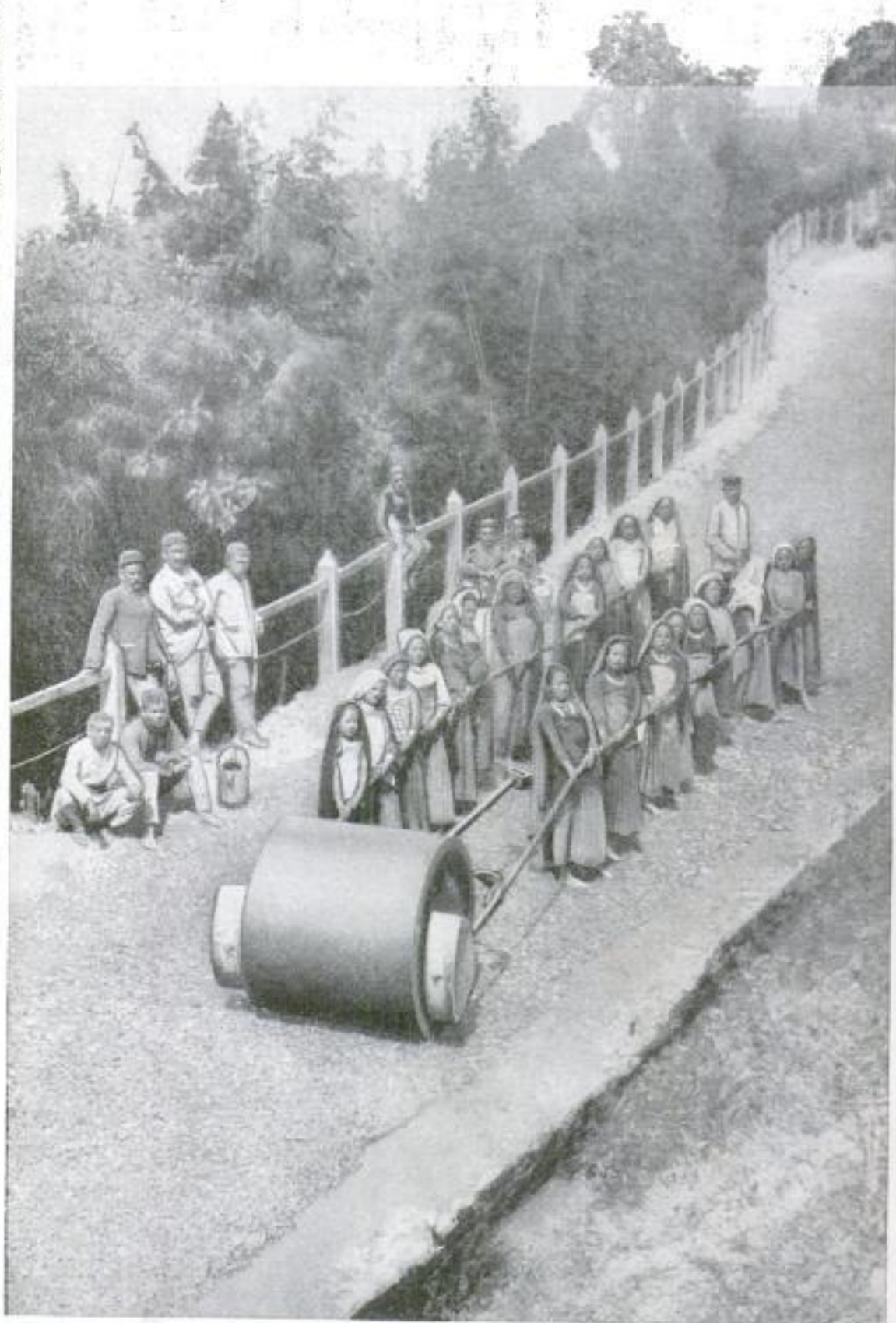
patient is done through a single connection with the tank. The result is that, when pure oxygen enters into the lungs by inhaling, it becomes at once stale by coming into contact with the poison in the patient's system. This impure air returns and mixes with pure oxygen by the action of exhalation, and is taken back and forth into the lungs.

This is prevented in the new apparatus, as the mask is fitted with two valves and a pneumatic rubber cushion, attached to the face by a strap. The cushion creates a vacuum, preventing the oxygen from leaking through facial irregularities. One of the valves is connected with the oxygen tube, while the other discharges impure air thrown off by the action of exhalation. Both valves open and close automatically. While the patient inhales, the first valve opens and lets the oxygen flow into the lungs, at the same time allowing the other one to close, thus shutting off outside air. In exhaling, the former closes and the latter opens to let impure oxygen escape. Since the victim breathes nothing but pure oxygen, the chances of reviving him are increased more than 50 per cent, it is claimed by those who have conducted many tests on victims of gas and smoke.

Bound by traditions handed down for countless generations, the natives of India prefer the methods of the past to the comforts of modern civilization. In one instance, the effort of an English company to install an incline railway to carry passengers and freight up a steep height almost caused a revolt. "What can we do if there is nothing for us to carry?" demanded the natives, who had been acting as beasts of burden. Even after months of argument, they remained unconvinced that the object was not to rob them of their means of livelihood, and so today the road, that was built despite their protests, carries only passengers, while freight is still transported on human backs. Women are often used to carry heavy burdens and in the making of roads. The men seldom engage in manual labor.

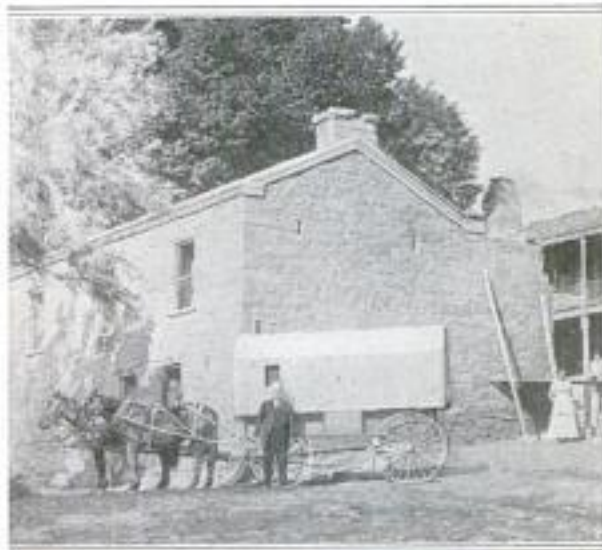

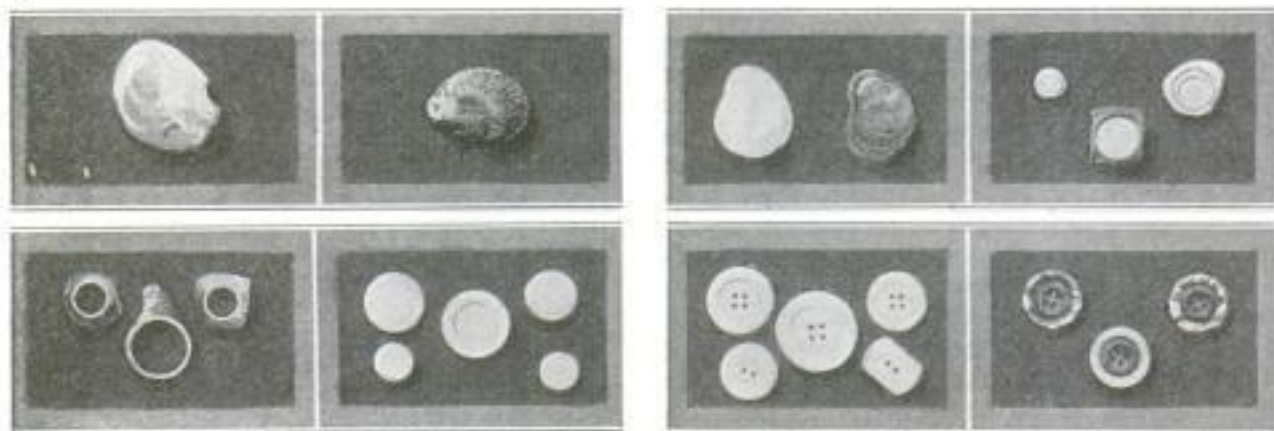

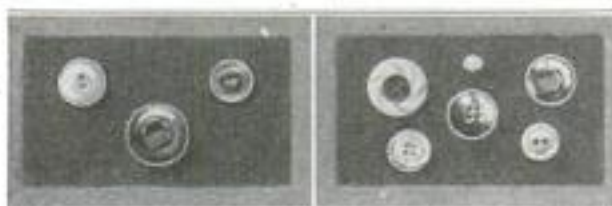

2921 GROUND PHONE TO HELP SAVE THE LIVES OF MINERS

From a war-time instrument, the geophone, a sound-ranging apparatus, has been developed by government experts into a peace-time device that may be used effectively in locating entombed miners, mine-fire areas, and to reduce accidents resulting from blasting. It was first invented by the French to detect enemy underground operations. Later improvements have increased its sensitiveness, and tests have indicated that under certain conditions it will register the pounding of a sledge hammer through 3,000 feet of solid rock; 2,000 or more feet through coal; 500 feet through mine "cover," and 300 feet through clay. Built on the principle of a seismograph and mechanical in action, the machine consists of a flat iron ring, from the center of which is suspended a lead weight fastened with a bolt through two metal disks. A rubber tube conveys the vibrations to the ear.

BEHIND THE SCENES IN A GREAT MUSEUM



Priceless Treasures of Art and Nature Brought from All Parts of the World are Prepared by Skilled Artists and Then Carefully Guarded

HIDDEN away behind the priceless treasures to be found in a great museum are the workshops of the skilled artists who restore to lifelike form specimens of strange beasts and birds gathered from all parts of the world. While hardy adventurers are risking their lives on jungle trails and at outposts of civilization gathering material, these scientists, working with microscopes and strange tools, reconstruct a prehistoric monster from a single bit of fossil, and give a semblance of reality to a dried piece of fur that would almost deceive Nature herself.

Tawny lions, striped tigers and zebras, spotted leopards and jaguars, giraffes, black, brown, grizzly, and white bears, antelopes of all sizes and colors, buffaloes, and foxes of many hues, are represented in a veritable Noah's ark of exhibits gathered together by explorers so that wild life may be studied in the midst of civilization and without the hardships of perilous trips to strange lands.

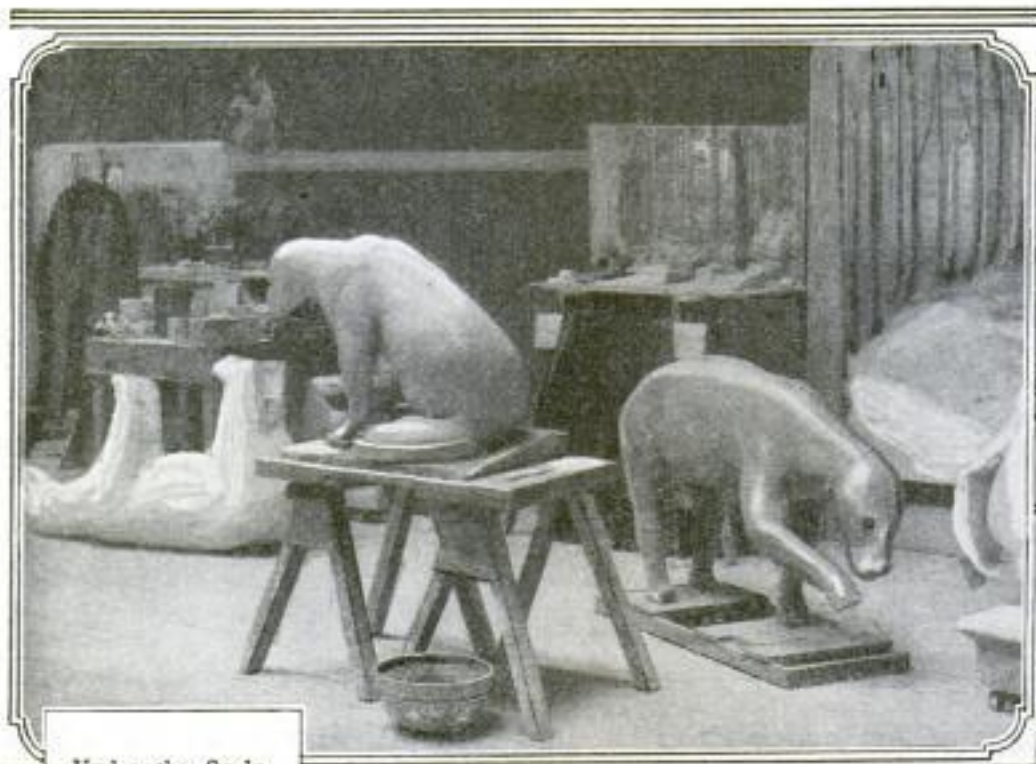
Under the skilled hand of the hidden artisans, these treasures in furs, made to assume the appearance of life, are shown in their natural surroundings, stalking their prey, guarding their young, engaged in mortal combat with an enemy or in the endless search for food. Animals seen in a zoo generally are poor prisoners who have adapted themselves to a hope-

less level of an inane and artificial existence, while those in a museum have been so skillfully restored that they actually seem to live and breathe, with all the sleek strength and beauty of life.

To obtain these results requires that the worker be something of a wizard, an artist, a mechanic and, of course, a zoölogist. While the methods employed are generally those of a sculptor, the modern taxidermist is rigidly confined to the exact lines laid down by nature. Absolute accuracy in every detail is required, nothing being left to the imagination. In form, color, the arching of a neck, the raising of a cautious foot, and in the background, bits of trees and brush, all as nature, and not man, planned it.

First comes the tanning and preparation of the hide, an art in itself. Machines known as "kickers," consisting of two huge, mechanical legs worked by electricity, dance a jig on the tough pelt until it is softened and turned into leather. It is then placed in a cleaning machine, containing a quantity of sawdust, and revolved until it is thoroughly cleansed. Then it is placed in storage, where it remains until the time when the taxidermist is ready to resurrect the animal to an appearance of life.

The old-fashioned process of "stuffing" is a thing of the past, and the replacement in the older museums of specimens

by the new process represents a considerable item of annual expense. Like a sculptor, the modern taxidermist generally experiments and crystallizes his ideas into a small clay model before he ventures on the actual work. Having accomplished this, he prepares a "core" on which to model the beast.

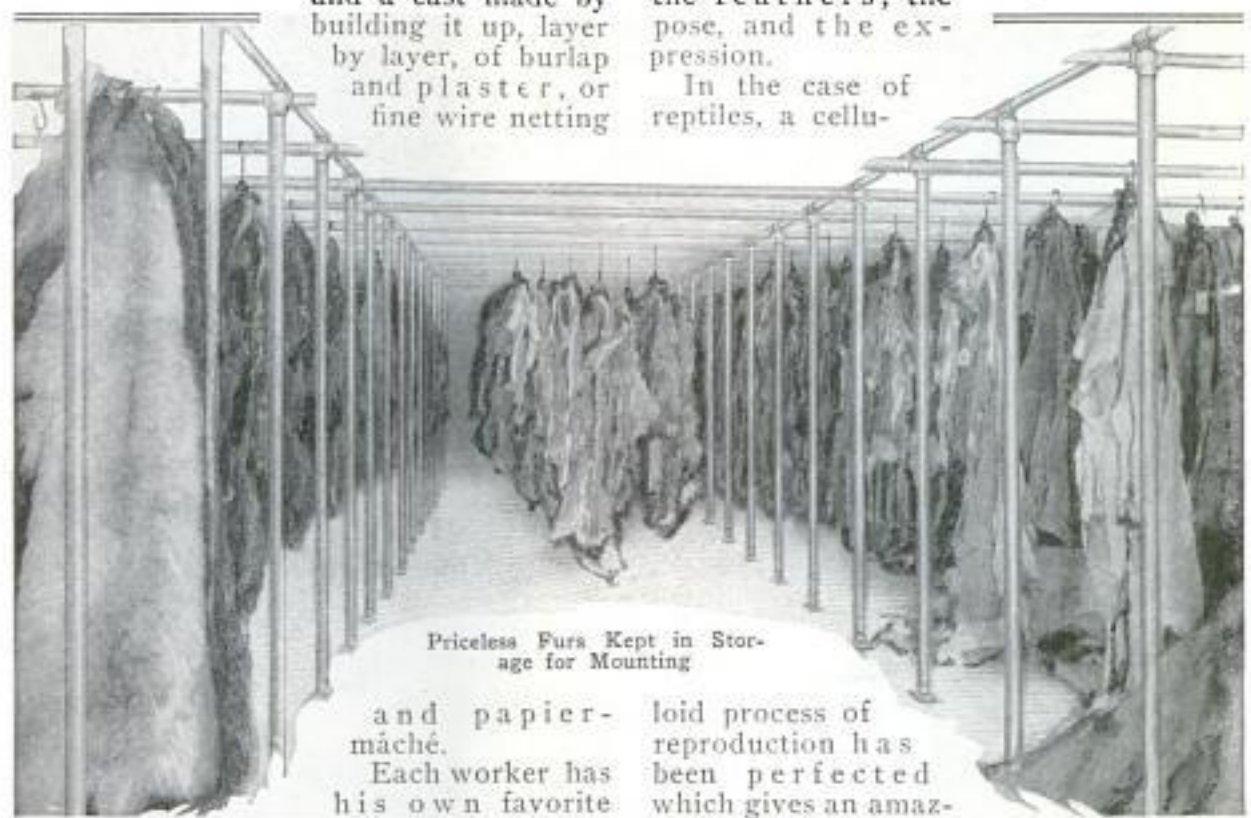
If available, the leg bones and skull are used to insure exact proportions. If not, he builds up the clay body in characteristic attitude to measurements taken in the field. After the model is finished, it must be reproduced in some lighter and stronger material. For this purpose, a plaster mold in several pieces is taken

and a cast made by building it up, layer by layer, of burlap and plaster, or fine wire netting

the services of the artist who adds realistic accessories in the form of vegetation, trees, and rocks which merge into the background. Having thus secured a natural scene, the case is ready to take its place in the exhibition halls.

Bird taxidermy is an art by itself. The skin is first relaxed by a thorough damping, and then cured with chemicals. An artificial body is made of cork or wood wool with a neck of wrapped tow fitted into the skin. The head, wings, and feet are securely wired, and the bird made to adopt the position it would assume in life. This part is purely mechanical, the difficulty lying in the proper adjustment of the feathers, the pose, and the expression.

In the case of reptiles, a cellu-

and papier-mâché.

Each worker has his own favorite methods, but all

result in a light, strong duplicate, called a manikin. Over it, the skin, that first has been poisoned against moths and vermin in a sealed room, is drawn and permanently adjusted. Lastly, the muzzle and nostrils are carefully molded in papier-mâché and the eyes are set.

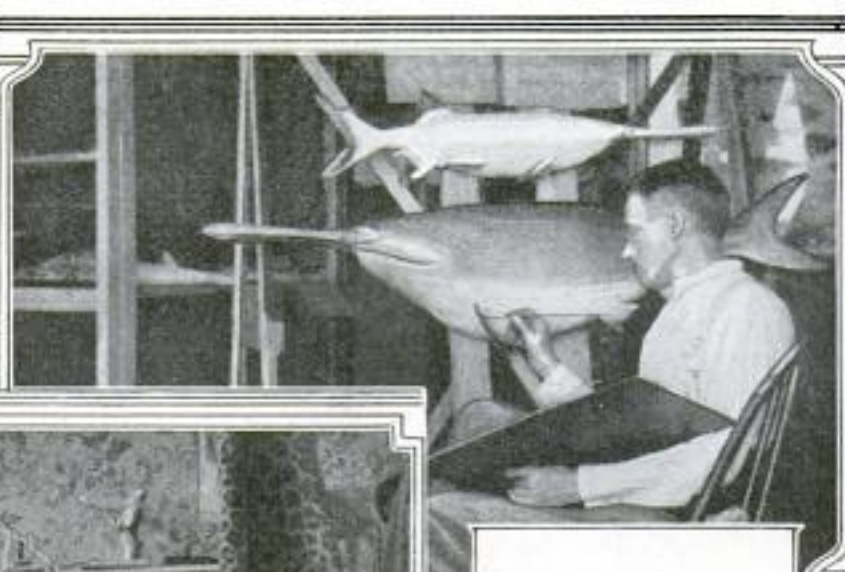
It now remains to mount the animal, to do which a study must be made of its anatomy, habits, and characteristic attitudes in the wild state. A klipspringer assumes its natural poses only on rocks. A sloth cuts an impossible figure apart from its beloved tree, and bears, for instance, must be represented as they really appear on their native heath, with a proper background.

For this work the taxidermist requires

laid process of reproduction has been perfected which gives an amazingly lifelike appearance to the models. While the details of the process are kept secret, the plaster mold plays a prominent part in the operation. The result is a practically unbreakable model.

Fishes placed in the exhibits also are plaster casts, taken from molds. Usually the natural fins and tails are utilized. The greatest difficulty is in the coloring, the artist being forced to reproduce the infinite shades and colors of nature.

After the specimens have been placed on exhibition, they are guarded as carefully as the crown jewels of a European kingdom. In many cases, they are displayed only under artificial light, as it has been found that daylight and the sun's rays have a destructive influence.

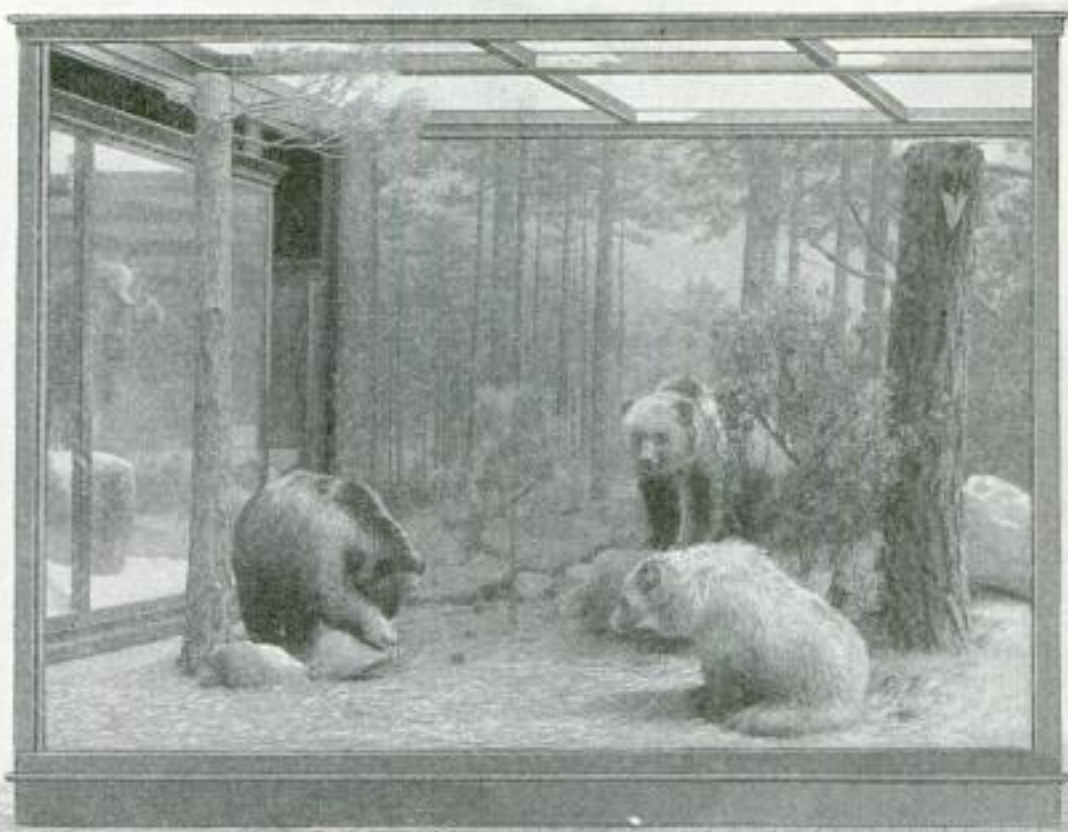

GEAR WITHOUT COGS HAILED AS ENGINEERING MARVEL

Defying many of the known laws of mechanical engineering, a small piece of steel mechanism was tested recently at an eastern technical school. Without a single cog or tooth, the apparatus, which is in the form of a shaft, was connected to a 5-horsepower motor and speeded up to 17,000 revolutions a minute. The other end, however, was turning only five times an hour, but was able to lift a weight of 10 tons. Simple in construction, the device consisted of the driving shaft that fitted into the end of the driven shaft, turning freely in it on ball bearings. Instead of resting on a journal, the outside, or driving shaft, turns between three or four rollers, one or two of which are larger than the others. These run inside

of a steel ring, slightly off center. As the inner rollers turn on the high-speed shaft, the outer ring becomes the driving gear. Difference in the diameters of the parts establishes the rate of reduction in speed and increase in power.

OLD AUTO TIRES ARE BURNED TO SAVE GRAPE CROPS

Worn-out auto tires are used in some western vineyards serving the same purpose as smudge pots, which prevent damage by frosts. Tires bought from a junk dealer for about \$30 per ton are saturated on the inside with oil. They are placed about the vineyard in piles of three or four and, when lighted, they furnish enough heat not only to ward off frost but also to save the grower trouble and expense of a second pruning.

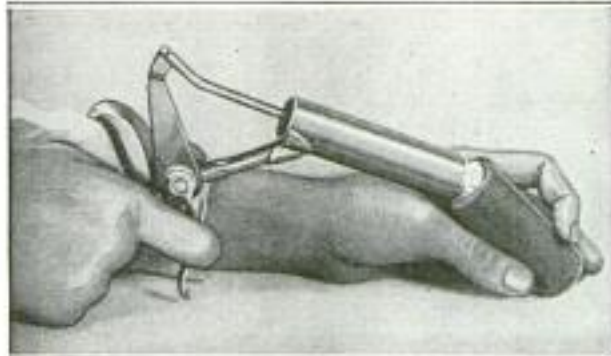

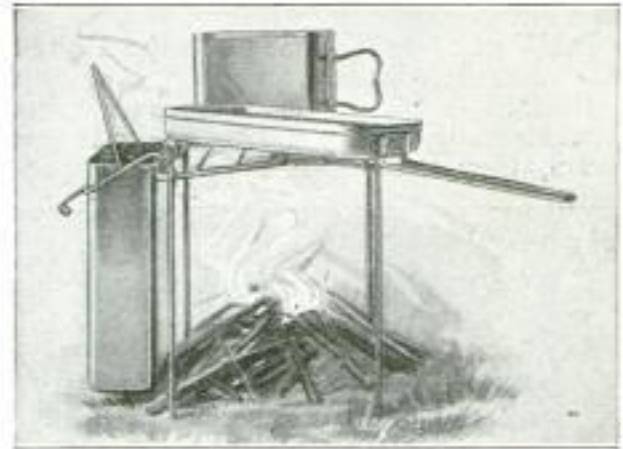
Plunger of Gun Pushing Ice Cream into Cake Shell Covered with Chocolate

OUT of every 300 people in the United States, it is said, one is wearing an artificial eye, but, owing to improvements in their manufacture during the past few years, they are difficult to detect, per-

ing of the colors. Enamelled gold was tried later, but proved too heavy to be held in the eye cavity. Pieces of leather on which artists reproduced the iris and pupil on a white background, attaching them to velour-covered wires that fastened over the ears, also were tried.

At the beginning of the 18th century, the perfectly shaped glass eye, having the brilliancy of the natural organ, made its appearance, resulting in the present article that does everything but see.

These are blown out of glass by artists, working from a painted copy of the natural eye, so that every detail may be exact. The workbench of the eye maker is a riot of colored glass tubes and slender sticks of crystal, from which he gets the thousands of tints that combine to make up the shades.

For the eyeball, a white or opaque tube

fectly matched, and are moved by the muscles of the eye socket.

The first glass eyes are believed to have been made and sold in the city of Venice in the year 1580, by a Florentine jeweler, who painted glass balls with enamel, covered with a thin sheet of polished lead to prevent irritation and fad-

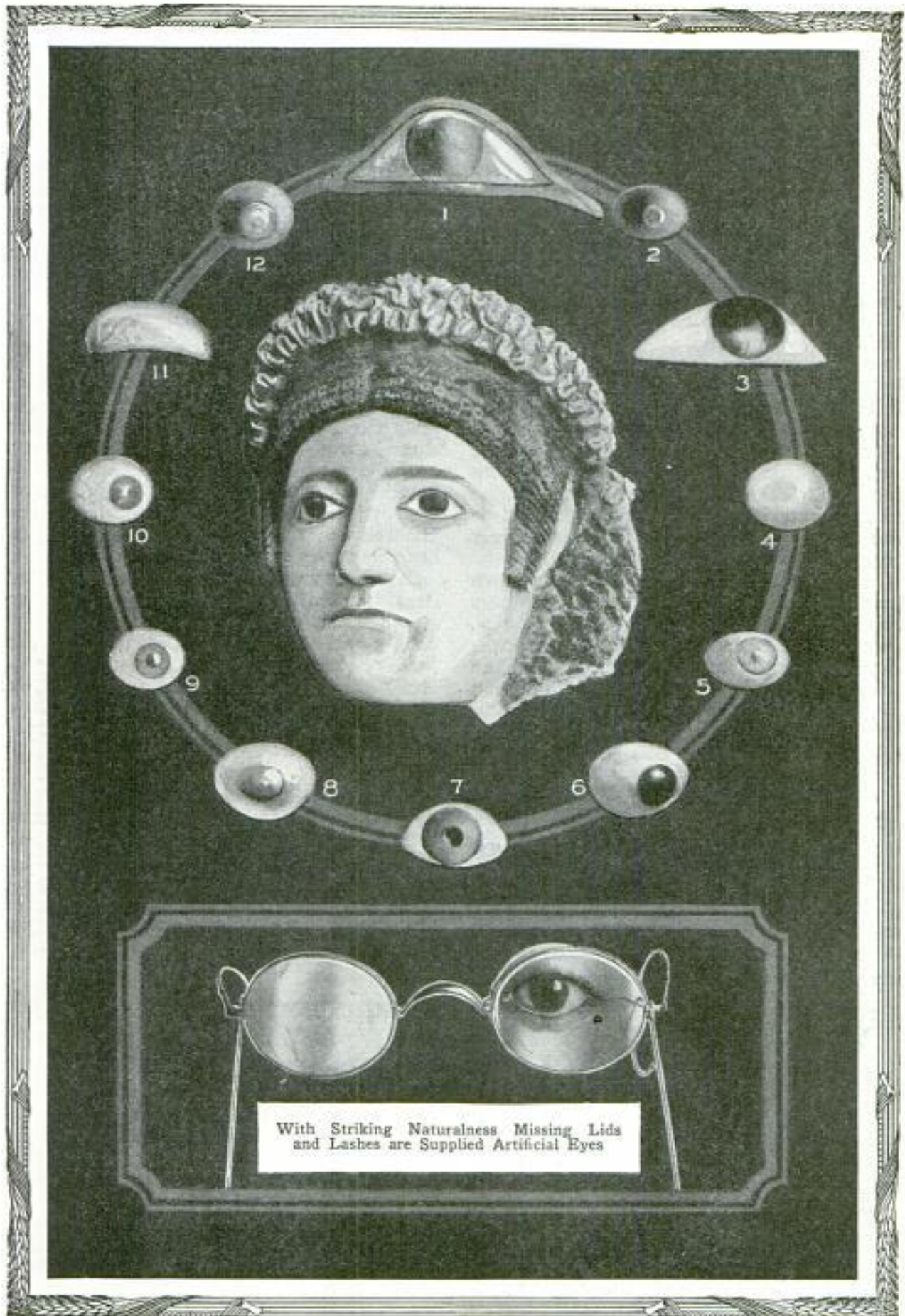

is selected, and from it a small globe is blown by means of a torch and blowpipe. Tipping and revolving the ball downward in the flame, tends to cause the molten glass to flow toward the bottom, forming a thicker, tapering wall at the front, where the ground tone of blue, gray, or brown, is traced in a circle from one of the colored sticks of crystal. Into the center of this the pupil is inserted.

Few natural eyes are of solid colors, the iris generally being made up of slight brushlike lines and dots, radiating out-

ward from the pupil. These the worker imitates with threads of glass he has first drawn out over the torch, touching their ends to the globe as he slowly revolves it to insure evenness, afterward putting in the tiny veins so often seen scattered over the white of the normal eye. Shaping the "reform" eye, as it is called, and coating it with a covering of clear crystal to blend the colors and give it natural brilliancy, must be done before the stem is withdrawn for sealing the shell at the back, finishing a task that requires less than an hour.

In a well-equipped establishment an artificial eye can be fitted with as much ease, and in the same space of time, as is required for a pair of shoes, some dealers carrying from 50,000 to 100,000 in all the ordinary color combinations. For those that are made to order, not more than two or three days is necessary to turn out a perfect match, for although most of the materials are imported, as well as the stock eyes, a scarcity of them rarely happens under normal conditions.

Many manufacturers keep one or two duplicates of the eyes of their customers constantly on hand for emergencies, since their delicate construction exposes them to frequent breaking under the handling of the wearer, and the action of the acids of the body. Instances of artificial eyes exploding are known, but seldom with any injury to the socket, the

vacuum on their interior drawing the broken pieces inside the shell.

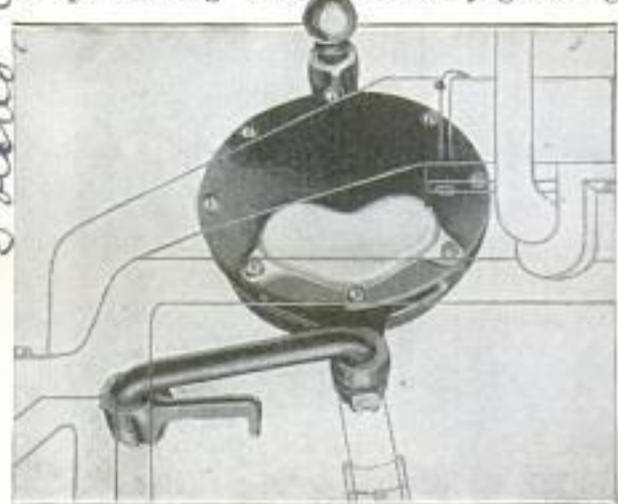
Loss of the eye is often accompanied by destruction of all or parts of the lids, which are now reproduced on the artificial eye in glass, colored to match the skin and worn as a spectacle. A drooping or paralyzed lid can be supported in normal position, by a small shelf of clear crystal built across the eye. After a natural eye has been removed, temporary globes are inserted into the cavity for a period of two months to enlarge it for the regular one that follows.

Accounts of the ancient peoples show that as early as the days of the Egyptian emperors, attempts to reproduce the human eye in mummies and statues were made by embalmers and artists. From buried tombs along the banks of the Nile, there have been taken bodies having crudely made artificial eyes, formed of plaster or wax and precious stones, covered with white-enameled shells of silver and other metals, pierced by holes to represent the pupils.

Many, found in the same locality, had eyes of baked and painted clay, or rounded out of marble, studded with colored gems. A funeral mask made in the first century contained a pair of perfectly shaped eyes in imitation of nature's work, evidence of man's untiring efforts to produce by his own hands the masterpieces of creation which surrounded him.

To make small automobiles steer as easily as large cars, a device has been made to increase the leverage. It helps in preventing accidents by giving

Fitting directly into the steering post, it acts as a stabilizer and equalizer, and all vibration is absorbed before it can reach the hands. No dirt can get into the moving parts, which operate in oil.

MILLIONS OF GOLF BALLS ARE USED IN U. S.

Because of the growing popularity of the game, experts estimate that 13,200,000 golf balls will be bought this year in the United States compared with 12,000,000 in the preceding 12 months. About one-quarter of the supply comes from England and Scotland. Between September, 1922, and April 30, 1923, American dealers imported from those two countries 1,927,697 of the little white pellets, valued at \$792,641. With those figures as a basis, trade authorities judge that the total of importations this year will be 3,140,000 balls, with a value of \$1,297,000.

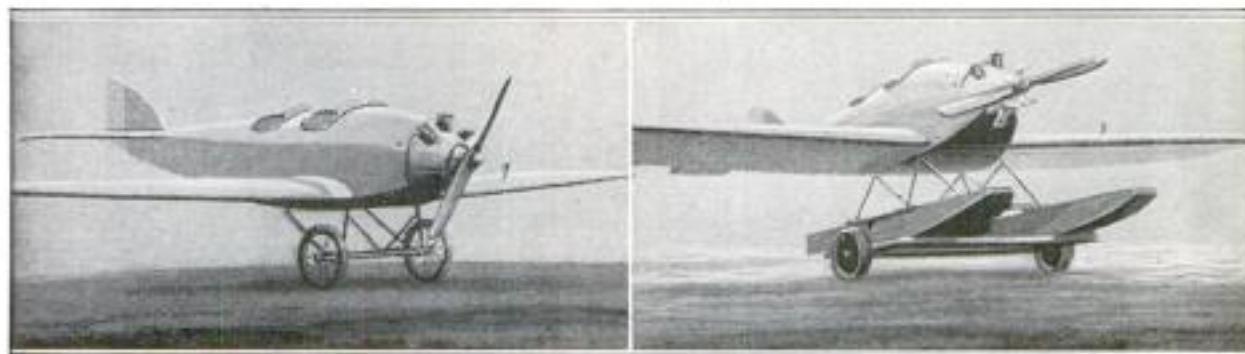

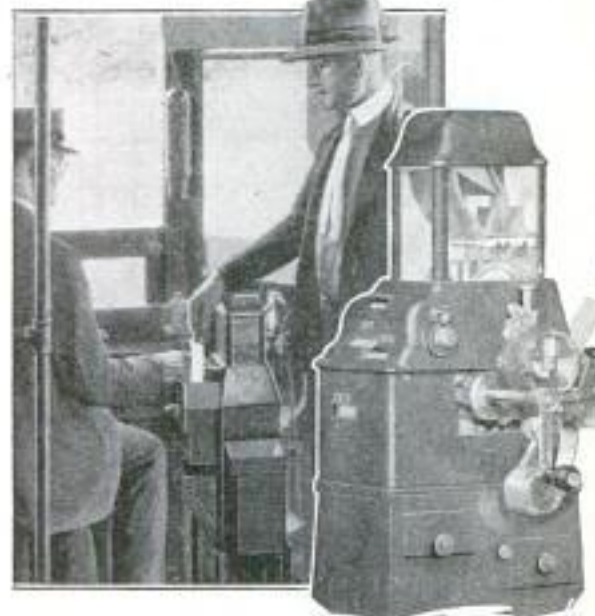

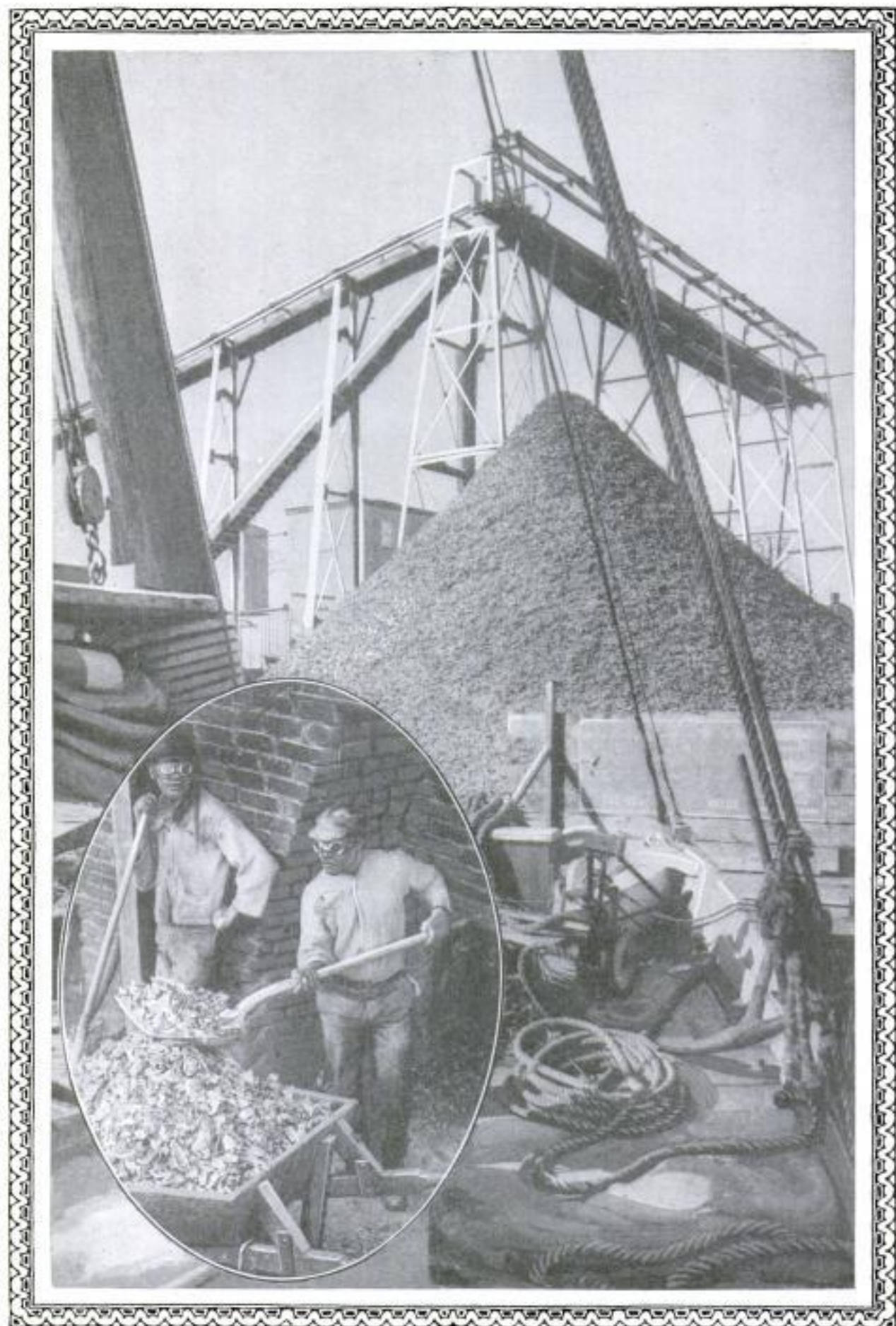

OYSTER SHELLS BRING RICH CROPS FOR FARMERS 2725

Burning and grinding oyster shells into a powder to make plants grow, is a growing industry of the South. A recent scarcity of nitrates forced farmers to look for some other fertilizer, and they adopted the oyster. To use something that lives at the bottom of the sea, the food of a starfish, for improving land seemed impossible at first, but in the powdered shells were found qualities that enriched the soil and so they are now being widely used. The shells are burned on a grate over a roaring fire. They are hauled by wheelbarrow to a conveyor which carries them to the place called a pulverizer, where they are mashed and ground into fine dust, ready for the farmer. This recently developed industry has brought oyster hunting to a state where it is said to be more profitable than any other kind of fishing.

PLAGUE OF LOCUSTS RETURNS AFTER SEVENTEEN YEARS 2810

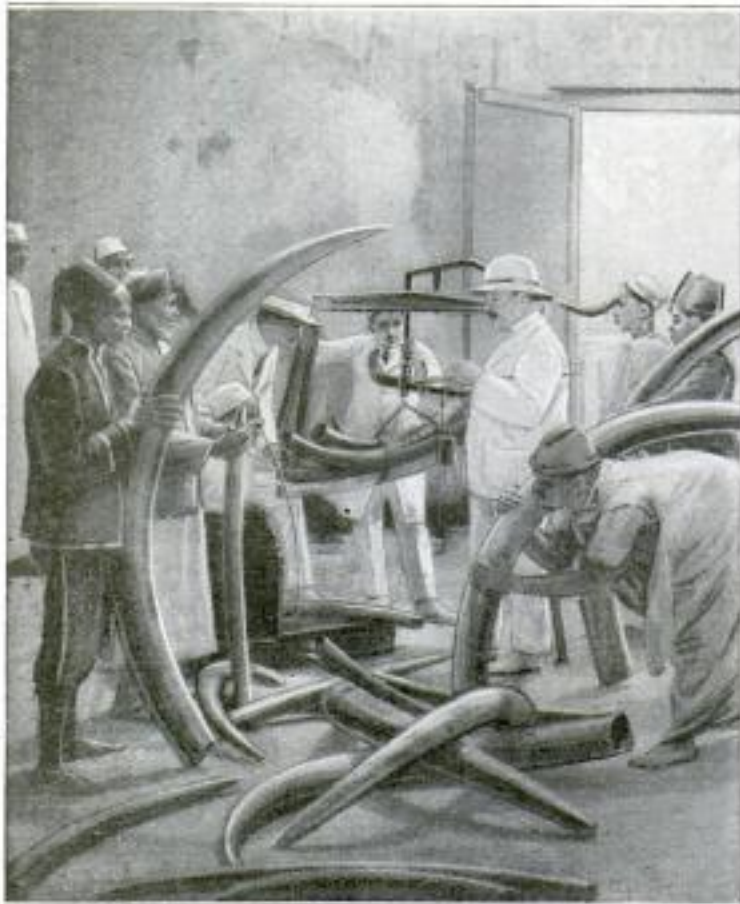
With a plague of locusts sweeping over Africa, many sections of the United States have reported a return of the periodical pest. After 17 years underground, grubbing among roots, the insects make their appearance in the world, living for one month in a winged state, and then die leaving millions of eggs behind. One curious fact in the life of the locust is the way in which it changes skin after coming from the ground. It climbs the tree, on whose roots it has been feeding and, fixing itself firmly to the bark, waits for the shell to split along the back. Then the winged insect appears. After laying its eggs in small branches, the pests cut the twigs nearly through so that eventually they will fall. Having made this provision for the future, they depart from their brief hour in the upper world. Grubs born from the eggs burrow at once into the earth and stay there for 17 years. Although they injure vegetation, the locusts do not harm human beings.

Some of them are of huge size, weighing 150 pounds and being 9 feet in length. The skilled hunter often gets tusks without the danger of shooting an elephant, because he knows where to find animals that have died a natural death. Shrewd business ideas of the trader, and the native's longing for what the white man offers, have combined to make the ivory market one of the chief industries of central Africa.

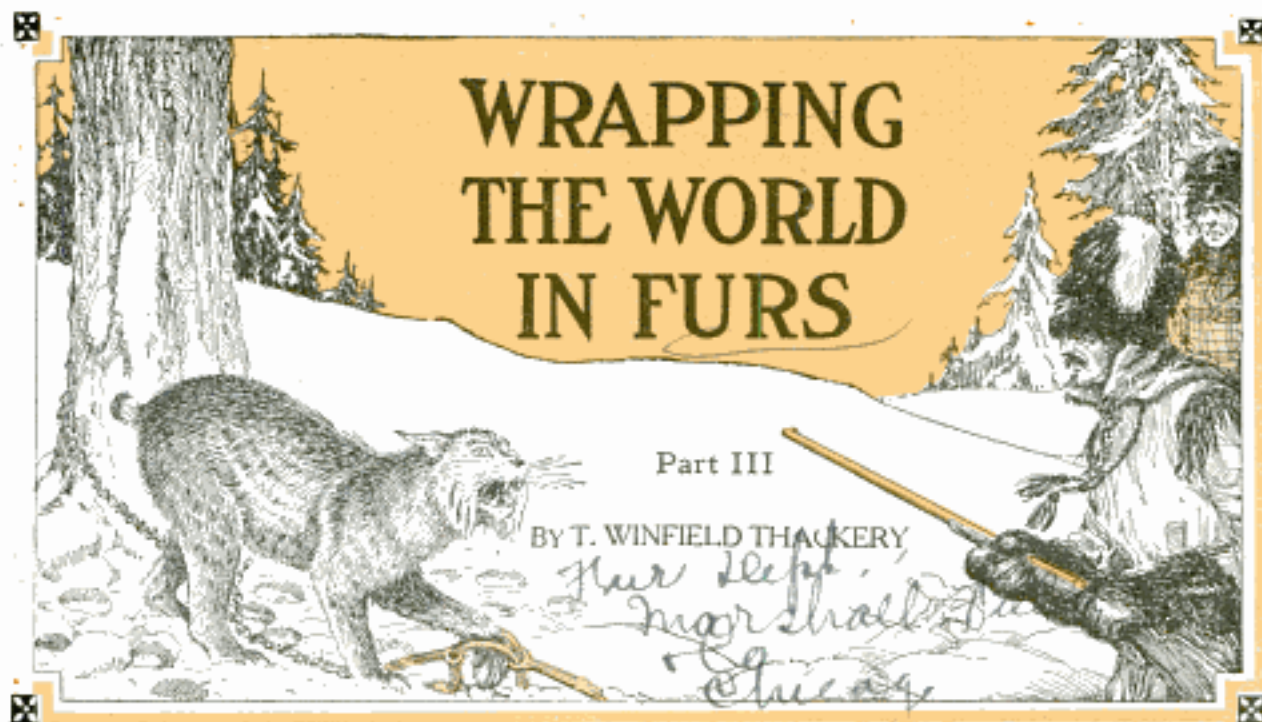

FURS from remote antiquity have formed at once the protection of man from the cold and the insignia of royalty and power. They have been the price of ransoms for royal captives, the gifts of emperors and kings, and the peculiar badge of the power of government. Today they hold the same valuation, but because of the spread of democracy throughout the world, they are no longer the possessions of the rich alone. By their abundance, and the cheapness of some kinds, furs in the last hundred years have come within the reach of the man of moderate means.

The story of furs can be read in the travels of Marco Polo, as when he grows eloquent in describing the marvelous furs of the Khan of Tatar; in the lament of the early churchmen who said that the introduction of furs into the life of Rome and Byzantium was evidence of "barbaric and depressing luxury"; in the romantic history of the French occupation of Canada; in the tale of the early settlements of America; in the records of the Hudson's Bay Company, and in the annals of the trade of today.

A great many misconceptions are entertained by the general public as to the fur business. There are many strange superstitions afloat which need correction.

As an example, many people believe that the skins of the unborn Persian lamb are used for the trade. This is an error, for such pelts would be entirely

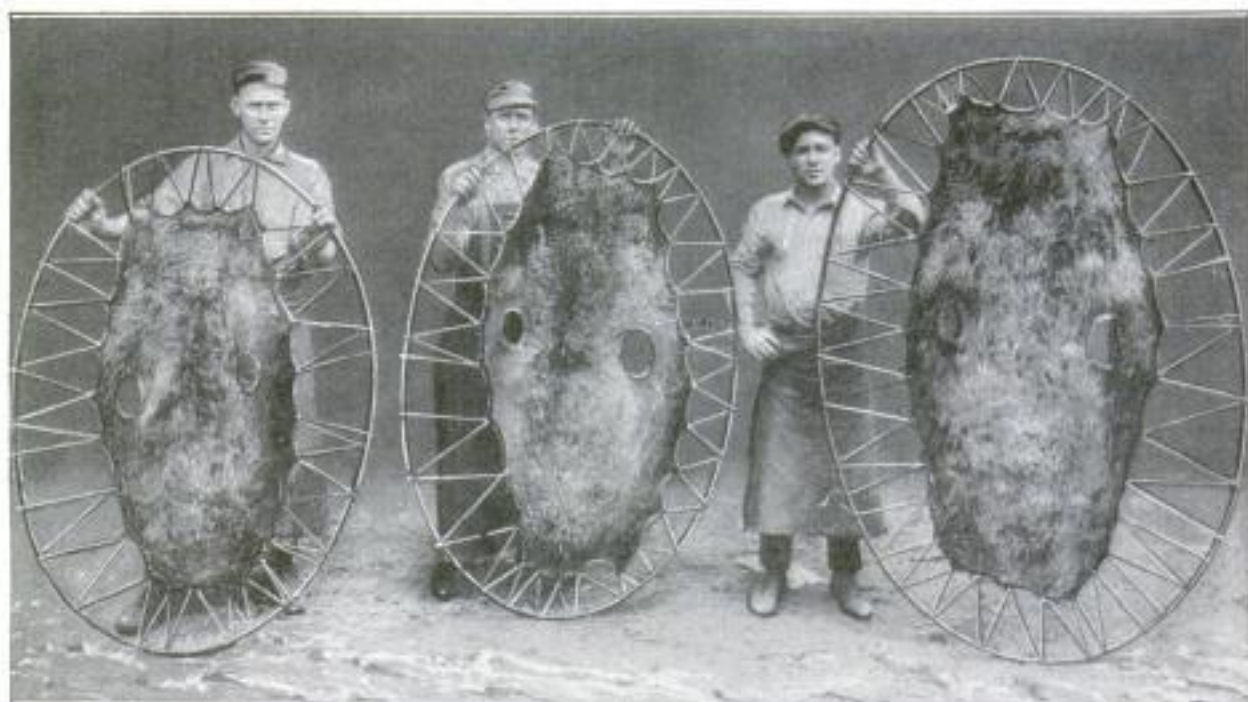
too delicate to be worked up into furs or to wear well. Occasionally, in severe winters, broadtail—as the lambs are called—are born prematurely and few of such pelts come into the market. While all the "secrets" of the fur trade could not be described in anything short of a large library, a few of the more interesting facts may not be out of place here.

With the exception of Alaska sealskin and some other fine furs, the majority of pelts are treated in the same way after the animal is killed. The majority of fur bearers are trapped or snared, shooting them usually spoiling the coat. When the skins have been carefully removed, as soon after death as possible, they are tacked out, most of them fur outwards, and, without being exposed to the sun, are allowed to dry in a moderately warm, shady place. With the exceptions already mentioned, all raw skins come to the market dried in this simple manner.

In preparing the furs for the market a furrier or skin merchant must have a good eye for color, for the difference in value due to the color and variety is very great. Furthermore, he must know whether a skin will turn out to be soft and strong after dressing, and whether the raw pelt is in the best condition when he buys it.

Now, while the dressing of fur turns the skin into leather, the process is not the same as when ordinary hides, such as

cowhide, are prepared for the market. In the latter case tannic acid is used. On a fur skin this process would destroy the fur itself and harden the skin. In a moment we shall see how sealskins are

prepared, but other pelts of less value are generally placed in an alkali bath as the first step, then, working by hand with a blunt wooden instrument, the moisture in the pelt is worked out and

the superfluous flesh removed. Special grease is then rubbed in and the skin is run through a series of machines from which it emerges in condition to be cut up and made into garments. A great many natural furs have to be dyed before being made into scaris, wraps, and the like.

For example, the caracul lamb, and indeed all lambs, are naturally a rusty black, brown, or white in color and, with few exceptions, are dyed a jet-black in manufacture. It may surprise many to know that most so-called Hudson Bay sables are naturally a medium brown and many are quite yellow.

The various processes through which the sealskin passes from the time the animal is killed, on the far-off Pribiloff Islands, as described in this series of articles heretofore, until the beautiful fur is displayed in shop windows, exceed more than 100 in number and are very interesting, both to the women who eventually wear the skins and to the men who ultimately pay for them.

As will be recalled, we found the barrels of salted sealskins leaving the Pribiloff Islands by boat for Seattle, Wash. From there they are shipped by train to St. Louis where they are placed in cold storage at a moderately low temperature.

The skins must be kept in a wet, salted state until they are put into the process of manufacturing, for they contain a great deal of oil which would burn the skins through evaporation if allowed to dry out.

The first thing that is done in a dressing operation is to grade the raw skins according to age, quality, length, and

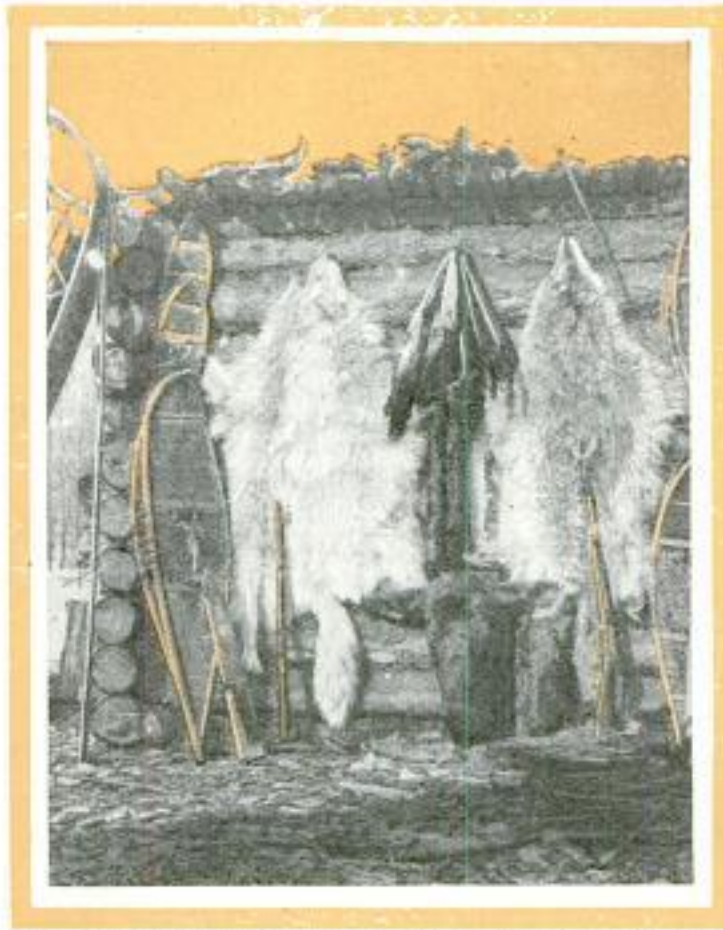
thickness of the fur and the condition of the skin itself. On the living seal, as on most animals, the fur is the soft silky hairs close to the skin. It is protected by what is called the "overhair," really longer stiff bristles. This overhair serves to protect the downy fur and keeps it from becoming matted down on the animal. For commercial purposes this overhair must be extracted from the skin, for it is not pleasant to the touch and, in most cases, is not very beautiful. Therefore, one of the first steps in dressing sealskin, after the surplus oil and blubber

is removed from the pelt and fur in special washing machines, is to "unhair" the skins. This requires great skill and fine judgment on the part of the workmen in order that these long guard hairs may be taken out by the roots without damaging the soft "underfur," or the skin itself.

The skin next moves to the leathering department where, after being worked into condition, seal oil—which is made from the blubber that was taken off the skin in

the first place—is applied to the back of the pelt and the whole is put into a machine which transforms the raw pelt into leather.

Scientists have been baffled in trying to discover exactly why it is that by merely kicking the skin about it is turned into leather. Some sort of chemical change takes place, but just what this is, or how it comes about, is not known. When the white man first came to America he found the Indians changing raw skins into leather simply by putting natural grease on them and then rubbing them up and down in their hands or

pounding them in a mortar. When the explorers went to the Far North they found the Eskimo women putting the seal blubber onto the skins and then chewing the latter in their mouths, thus producing leather. Many of the older women's teeth even today are worn down to the gums from this constant chewing of skins.

Taking their cue from this, the white men at first used to throw the skins into a big tub, and after adding enough grease or oil, jump up and down on them with their bare feet until the leather was made. From this it was a simple step to make machinery which, even today, simply kicks the skins around. Of course, it should be understood that

every furrier does not use this kicking process. Many still use acid. The processes here and later described are those used by the Fouke Fur Company of St. Louis, which handles all the Alaska sealskins for the account of the United States Government.

After the skin has been turned into leather, the surplus oil and dirt is removed from the pelt by tumbling it about in sawdust. The oil is absorbed by the sawdust and thus removed.

The skins are now ready for dyeing. This is a very complicated process and requires from three to four weeks, during which time the skins are handled every day. The dye is put on by hand with a scrub brush. This requires very

great skill. As it is known, the natural color of the seal is a very light, unclean-looking brown. In putting on the dye, the workmen are so expert that they are able to color almost exactly half of the depth of the fur a rich chocolate brown and the top half another shade of brown so deep that it looks jet-black. Anyone familiar with the appearance of fur when it is "soaking-wet" will appreciate the skill of a workman, who, with a heavy scrubbing brush, can put on the dye so that it sinks in exactly as he wishes it. Also, his art is made the greater in that the fur is, of course, not equally deep all over the skin. For instance, under the flippers of the seal the fur is only a fraction as long as it is in the middle of the back; yet a sealskin expertly dyed will show the hairs evenly colored throughout.

After being dyed and again cleaned the skin is cut down to the proper thickness. This is necessary because those who manufacture the skin into garments find that natural variations in thickness make skins hard to match up and sew together. The method formerly used to accomplish this was "hand-shaving," but a machine has been invented to do this.

Next comes a most interesting step. As might be supposed, there are small guard hairs growing out in the skin of the animal when it is killed. These are short, stubby bristles hidden by the fur itself. If they are allowed to remain in the skin they interfere with its soft, even appearance and the silky "feel" of the fur. Because these hairs are covered by the fur they could not be removed at the time the first stiff guard hairs were taken out. A wonderful machine has been invented which actually runs in through the soft fur and cuts off these stubby bristles. This feat is accomplished by an ingenious arrangement of air blowers, combs, and knives, and is a secret process.

To prepare the sealskin for the market requires four months, and from start to finish the skin is worked on nearly every day and a good many nights. Extra care must be taken in certain steps because if the skin is allowed to remain damp or wet it is liable to rot in a single night. No one can see or feel the exquisite fur and dainty, soft, light-finished pelt, without sensing its charm. The skin eventually is just like chamois and a big one may be drawn through a man's good-sized finger ring. It takes an average of six skins to make one coat for a woman.

After preparing the skins for the market the Fouke Fur Company, which alone is allowed to kill the seals on the Pribi-

loff Islands, must sell them at auction. They then go to the manufacturer who makes them up as he sees fit.

The art of the furrier is an old one and the workers must really be artists. Many factors go into "Wrapping the World in Furs." For instance, it is a recognized law among high-class furriers that furs should be simply arranged, that is, that an article of wearing apparel should consist of only one fur, or of two furs of a suitable contrast. Illustrative of this, it may be explained that a brown fur, such as sable, marten, mink or beaver, will match well with a black fur, while those of a white or gray nature, such as ermine, chinchilla, blue or silver fox, or gray squirrel, will look well when set on seal or black furs, such as Persian lamb, astrakhan or caracul.

For a long period of years, furs made into garments were most imperfectly tailored. It is only comparatively recently that new methods, in which America led the way, have resulted in a fur garment as accurately and gracefully fitted as velvet or other cloth. Fur-sewing machines have been on the market since 1890. There are, however, certain parts of garments, such as the putting in of sleeves, which are best sewn by hand.

Another branch of the fur business is that which has to do with hats, cloths and shawls. The best felt hats are made from beaver and muskrat wool and the cheaper kinds of nutria, hare, and rabbit wools. For weaving, the most valuable pieces are taken from Angora goats.

Fur skins do not always appear as they were in life. Most gray squirrels seen on the streets come from Russia, where, after the dressing process, the backs of the squirrels are made up separately from the under and thinner parts of the skin. The smaller and uneven pieces of heads and legs are made up into linings.

The most of the odd-shaped pieces from the heads, legs, sides, and paws of all animals are exported to countries where cheap furs are in the biggest demand. A good many other skins, such as foxes and ermines and others having specially handsome markings, are sliced up and the manufactured neckpieces may often be in several-pieced sections sewn together.

In all, there are more than 100 kinds of skins known to the fur market; this, of course, does not include varieties of the same species of animal. Even the house cat is pressed into service. The best of these latter come from Holland, but although in color, weight, and warmth they

are very good, the fur is apt to become loose and fall off. They are used mostly for coat lining.

Dog skin also is used, though the only ones used in civilized countries are those imported from China. These are heavy and coarse and only used in the cheaper trade, chiefly for rugs. All kinds and conditions of goats give their skins to the trade. The Chinese export thousands of skins in black, gray, and white, mostly made into rugs of two skins each.

Most monkey fur once belonged to the black monkey taken on the west coast of Africa. The hair is very long and bright, with no underwool, but having a white belt at the base of the hair. It is interesting to learn that monkey fur was in great demand and very fashionable in England back in 1850. Also it appeared in fashion marts in America in 1890. For the next 30 years they were mostly bought in Germany, but as we now see, they are again in fashion in this country.

The kangaroo is another animal whose fur is acceptable to the trade. The best of the lighter weights of kangaroo fur are often not strong enough to stand wearing in a coat. A variety, however, coming from a species of the animal, which is known in Australia as the swamp wallaby, is dyed to imitate skunk skin and looks very well.

The very limited number of musk oxen may be one of the reasons why these skins are not in greater use. The ani-

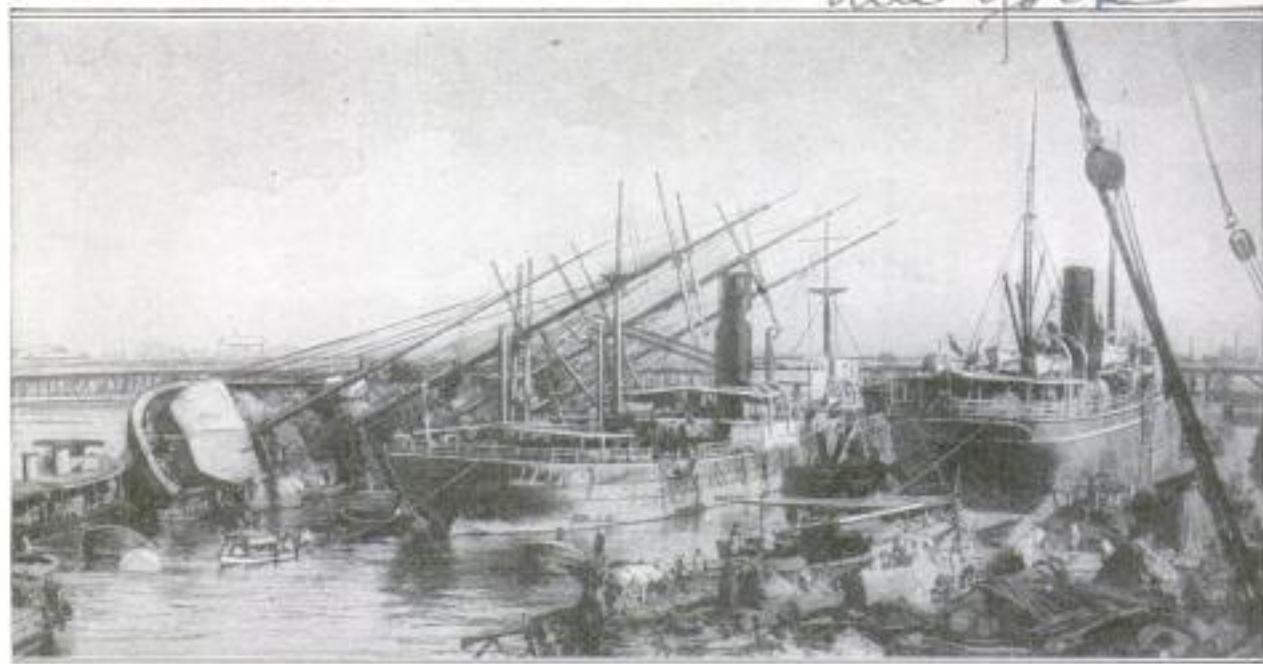
mals have a very dense coat of fine, long, brown wool, with very long dark-brown hair on head, flanks, and tail, and in the center a peculiar pale, oval marking. There is no other fur so thick, and were it not so scarce it would be greatly used for robes and greatcoats.

Most people being used to seeing the brown of the muskrat fur probably do not know that a very few thousand skins of the Russian muskrat are annually imported. This is a very pretty silvery-blue and silky fur, which, did it not have the odor of musk, would probably be one of our most valuable skins. Raccoon furs are a common sight, but perhaps it is not generally known that the animal itself is a kind of wild dog, and while having a close relationship to the bears, is not more than a cousin many times removed.

A word or two in conclusion may well have to do with the care of furs. Most people do not know how to best preserve their furs. Sunlight encourages the development of moth eggs and also tends to bleach the fur; therefore, continuous exposure to strong sunlight, especially in the warmer months of the year, is to be avoided. When furs are wetted by the rain they should be allowed to dry in a current of air without exposure to sun or fire; this after they are well shaken. Where cold storage is not available when one wishes to put up furs for the summer, they should be well shaken, then packed in linen and kept in a perfectly cool, dry place.

SAILORS FEAR PERILS OF PORTS MORE THAN SEA

Hidden dangers lurking in crowded ports are more feared by sailors generally than the hazards of the sea. When far from land, the seaman may avoid many mishaps by skillful handling of his vessel or by fleeing before storms too severe to be faced. But tied up to a dock or at anchor in a busy bay where there is no room to maneuver, the constant menace from fire, collision, sudden shifting of the cargo that might upset the ship at its dock, and other perils that cannot be foreseen or provided against, must be faced. Anchors may drag or mooring lines part under the strain put

upon them by strong winds, setting the vessel adrift to smash itself among other shipping. Unexpected sand bars in rivers and harbors are another danger dreaded by mariners. In tropical seas, tidal waves, swept before terrific storms, roll far up the rivers and invade the gulfs, crushing everything in their path and leaving the beaches piled high with wreckage. As a result, sailors the world over never feel so safe as when their ships are at sea with land far in the distance. Aided by warning devices, the approach of bad weather is known hours ahead, nearness of icebergs floating from frozen seas is foretold, while hidden reefs, shoals, and rocks are shown on the captain's chart, enabling him to avoid them.

MUSIC NOTES DEFY MECHANICAL TYPESETTING

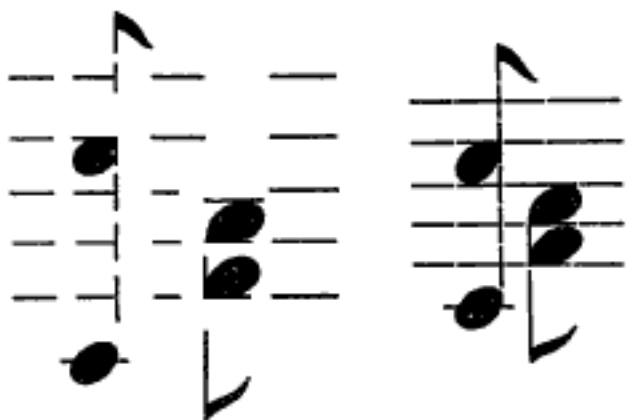
Little-Known Trade at Which There Are Only 75 Workers
in the United States

BY GEORGE BARNARD

NO one has yet succeeded in perfecting a machine which will set up type for sheet music. Newspaper stories occasionally laud an alleged success. But according to that rare survival, the music typesetter, the trade is still waiting for something practical to supersede its old-fashioned but effective methods.

There are ways of reproducing musical scores without setting them up in type. In fact, lithography and engraving have practically supplanted the old method. But for certain classes of work the old style is still supreme, and is putting up a gallant fight against extermination. The musical notation in most hymn books is produced by means of movable type. The advantage of the use of type in this connection is that the words are made to coincide more exactly with the notes to which they are related; and as the hymn-book page is smaller than an ordinary song sheet, it is difficult by means of engraving to inscribe the words sufficiently clearly in so small a space.

But hardly any song sheets are printed by the movable-type process nowadays, and as the demand for hymn books is small, in comparison with the total production of musical scores, the survivors in the old musical-typesetting industry are few and far between. It is estimated that there are fewer than 75 men in the whole of the United States who are com-

petent to set up music type. There are perhaps 10 shops in the whole country in which this kind of work is done; and throughout the rest of the world the music-type printer is proportionately rare. In New York there are probably

only two or three concerns which set up music type. In Chicago there are two, Cincinnati still claims one, and there are two or three elsewhere in America.

The art of the music typesetter will probably die in the not far distant future, unless some one comes along

with a machine—at present inconceivable—that will give type-set music an advantage over the engraved kind. In one music-typesetting shop, for instance, there are no apprentices—a significant fact. Boys do not rush in to learn such a trade. Apart from the fact that the future is uncertain and the opportunities small, the work itself requires considerable application and is difficult to learn.

Some of the troubles which beset the man who strives to perfect a machine, after the fashion of the linotype, to set music notes, will be seen from a consideration of the task before him.

In the mechanical setting of ordinary type each line is set separately, as most people know, and one line has no relation (so far as the exact position of the individual letters is concerned) to the line above or below it. One character is simply read in its relation to other letters in the same horizontal line, and they do not even have to join on to one another. A linotype machine works from one end of the line to the other. It cannot set one character exactly above another character except by minute and laborious calculation on the part of the operator. Unless a "music linotype" were fitted with hundreds of thousands of keys, and corresponding matrices, it would have to be able to set one character above another, as well as one character beside another, and it would have to do both with extraordinary precision.

A study of the accompanying diagrams

will best explain the intricacy of the task of setting music type. A page of music, composed of music type, is a mosaic made up of little pieces of metal which singly are meaningless. A single note with its stem is never merely one piece of type. It is usually made up of three pieces, and sometimes of more. The lines must, of course, be set up, as well as the notes and other characters, and they must all fit together exactly.

The number of pieces of type in a given space will vary according to the intricacy of the musical passage. Three hundred distinct pieces of type in a single line of music is a fairly low average, or 3,000 in a medium-sized page of a hymnal.

A music compositor's output will vary according to the copy. On average copy, the setting of two pages of hymn-book music is considered a fair day's work for one man.

Music type is of standard type height. Its other dimensions are not measured by the "point system" known to printers, but one kind is distinguished from another by names which formerly were used in connection with ordinary type before the point system came into vogue: "excelsior," "agate," "nonpareil," "diamond," and so forth.

An ordinary printers' "composing stick" is used by the music compositor. Of course he has to set the type from right to left, as it will reverse in printing. But whereas an ordinary compositor merely places pieces of type side by side, the music compositor has to build in two directions at the same time.

A font of music type is contained in cases very similar to the printers' alphabetical case, but the number of characters in a font is considerably greater. A font of music type usually contains over 3,000 characters. Some of the characters differ only slightly from others, some sections of "line," for instance, being just a hair's breadth longer than other sections. Yet, so expert does a music compositor become that he cannot only set music type as easily as another man can manipulate the alphabet, but he can distribute the type into the proper departments of the "case" with the greatest facility.

As the demand for music type is so small, each printer who handles this class of work has to supply his own matrices when ordering from a type foundry. It now costs about \$7 a hymn-book page to set up music type. Yet, in the long run, it is cheaper to produce music by this method than it is to work with engraved plates.

VOLCANO IN FRESH OUTBREAK DESTROYS MANY HOMES

Inactive since 1911, Italy's Mt. Etna recently broke forth anew in violent eruptions, with rivers of molten lava streaming down its sides and across the countryside from five new mouths. Thirty thousand persons were made homeless and much property was destroyed. For a year prior to this outbreak, the volcano had shown signs of becoming active. Through that period, dense clouds of smoke poured from its crater, accompanied by heavy rumblings. Familiar with the disasters that have attended past outpourings of the fiery masses, the natives fled in terror. Sun-obscuring clouds of black smoke filled the air for miles, and white-hot lava spread over the surrounding territory, enveloping everything in its path. Be-

fore one wave of lava cooled, another and greater one was pushing it forward. Mount Etna's recorded eruptions, numbering over 80, have resulted in the death of more than 100,000 persons. Sixty thousand were killed in 1693, when an unusually severe earthquake occurred at the same time as an eruption.

LUMINOUS CLOUDS TO LIGHT

Luminous clouds of artificial light are used in experiments being made to find a method for taking photographs and moving pictures of the ocean's floor, where the "Lusitania" and many other ships, some laden with treasure, lie buried out of the reach of divers. By spraying the water with a chemical designed to reproduce the phosphorescence of waves, a scientist believes it may be possible to light up the sea sufficiently to take pictures of objects, many fathoms below the surface. At present, beyond a depth of 50 feet, it is virtually impossible to see more than 10 feet in any direction.

Perched at the tops of long ladders, balancing the weight of the hose, many veterans can direct water onto distant parts of a fire.

RADIO IS TAUGHT IN SLEEP
BY PHONES ON EARS 2888

Teaching the novice how to send and receive radio code messages more speedily by giving him instructions while he sleeps, is a method recently adopted and said to be proving successful at a naval air-training station. Before retiring at night, the student puts an ordinary headset of telephone receivers over his ears. All night long skilled operators send messages, usually ten words a minute in excess of the student's capacity. The next day in his conscious hours, it is reported, the beginner is able to transcribe communications at the speed they came to him during his sleep, and to send code words faster than the day before. Some committed to memory passages of literature flashed to them while they slept.

NIAGARA FALLS TO BE LIGHTED
BY SUBMERGED ELECTRICS 2858

Added grandeur to the play of water over Niagara Falls is expected to result from the installation of submerged electric lamps to replace the system of flood lighting now used to illumine the falls at night. Built after the fashion of a depth bomb, metal containers, with white or colored water-tight electric globes set in the tops, will be anchored by cable underneath the cascade. The bulbs will point upward so that the colored rays will be reflected upon the tumbling water.

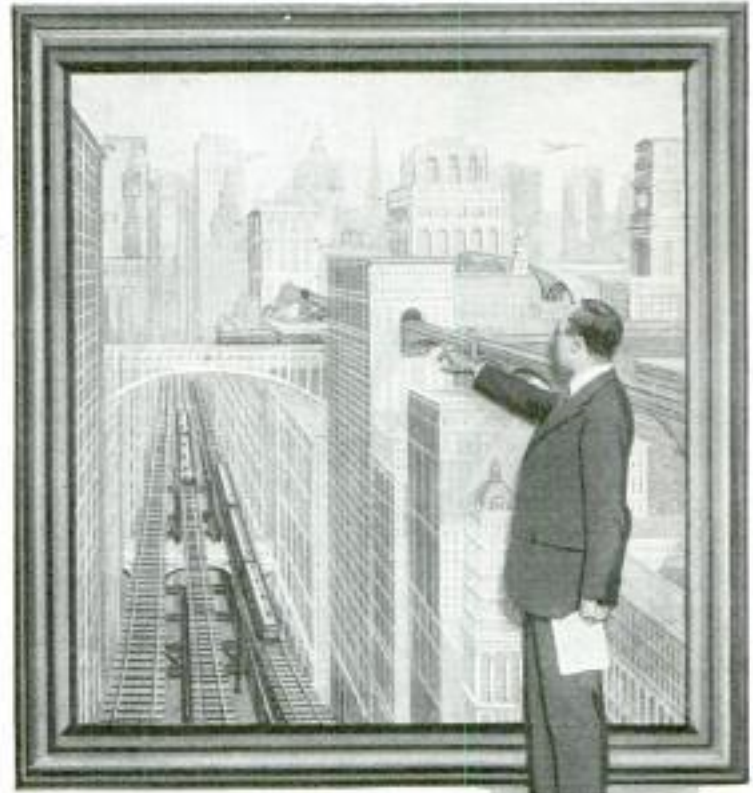

FAIRY CITY OF FUTURE FORECAST AT EXHIBIT

Dreams that the builders and architects of today hope to see realized in the city of the future were displayed at an exposition in the East recently. Overhead thoroughfares supported on great arches between towering skyscrapers, double-decked streets, moving sidewalks bordered by a maze of show windows, stores connected by artistic bridges and covered promenades, will serve to crowd the lives of the citizens. One of the exhibits that attracted much attention was a jeweled electric fountain of elaborate design and beautiful effect.

VANISHING RACE OF INDIANS VISITED BY EXPLORERS 2879

In the southernmost inhabited land, Tierra del Fuego, lives an almost extinct tribe of Yaggan Indians, called "Firelanders," who speak a rich, beautiful language containing 32,000 words, and who worship only one god, whom they call "Watainourva," signifying "The Ancient in Heaven." For more than a century the "Firelanders" have been pictured as barbarians, without education, moral sense, or religion, and as cannibals who ate their aged parents. But two priests, who spent months with them and were made members of the tribe, have returned recently to contradict those reports. Their investigations also have enabled them to make a valuable contribution to science on the habits of the people. Like most primitive races, the Yaggans reach their educational heights in religious functions, which often last for weeks. During those ceremonies the young mem-

bers are initiated into the traditions of the tribe. For the last 30 years, because of the rapidly decreasing membership, only one part of the rites, known as the "Coxans," has been observed, although the second portion, the "Kina," was performed for the two explorers. In 50 years, their ranks have decreased from 2,000 to not more than 70. As only a few plants thrive in that cold region, the natives obtain most of their food by hunting and fishing. 2856

"WORMHOLES" SOLD IN EUROPE

Exporting wormy oak for manufacture into "antiques," may soon develop into a thriving and profitable industry, according to government experts. One consignment of faulty timber that was sent abroad recently found no sale until it was offered to an "antique"-furniture manufacturer. He bought it at a premium because the worm-made holes eliminated the necessity of boring them.

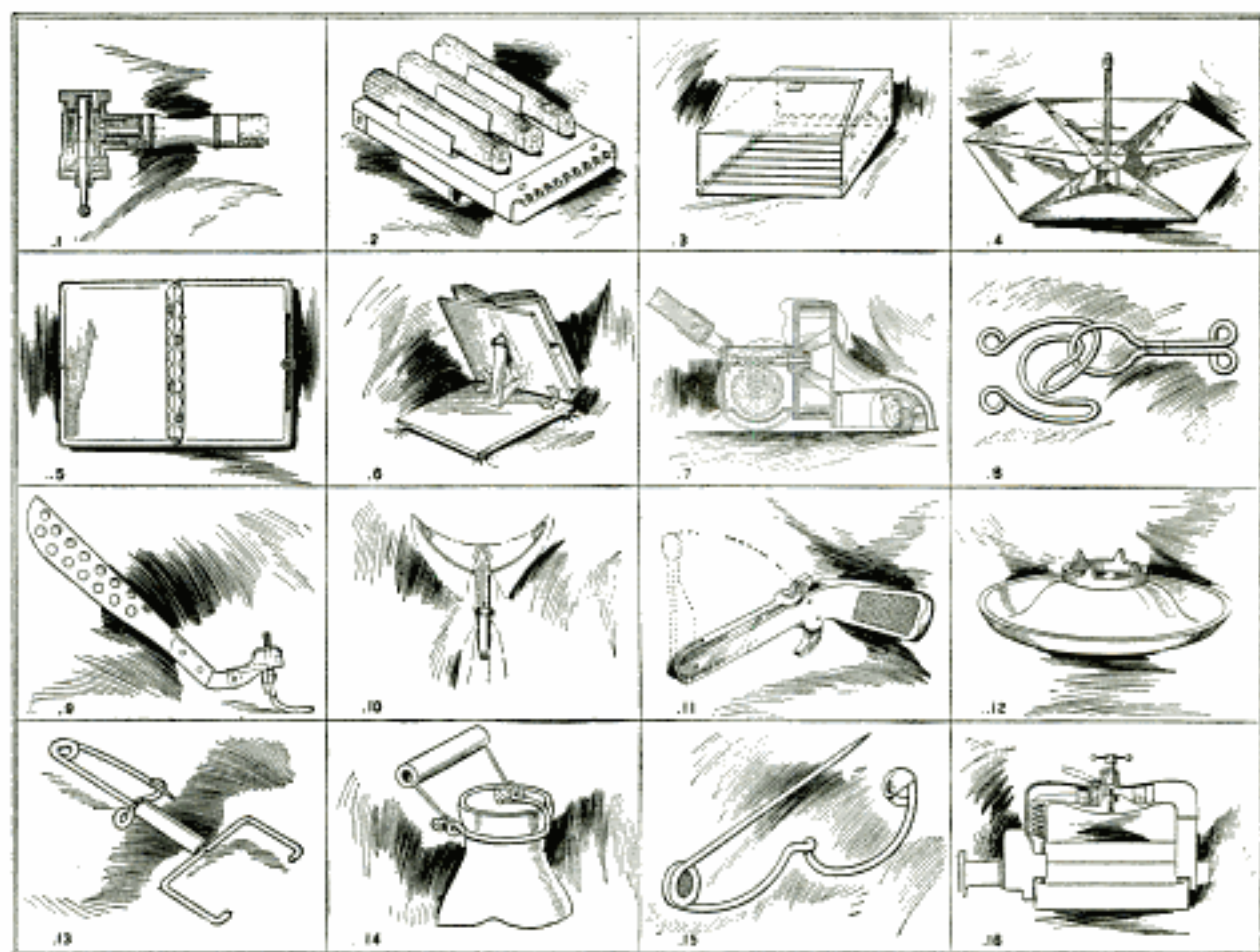

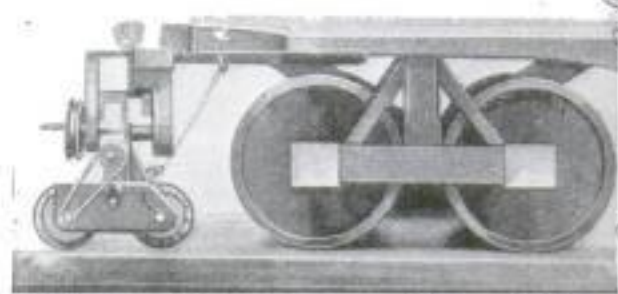

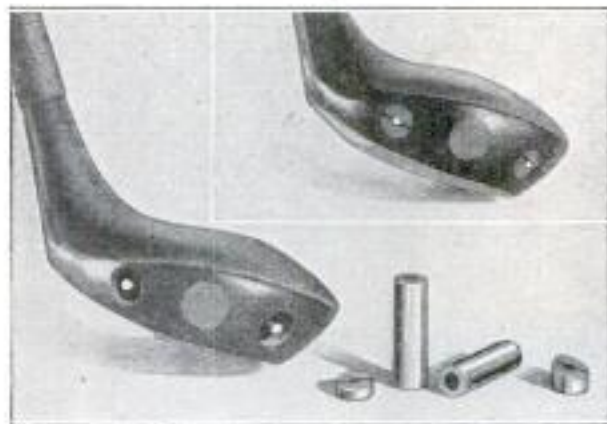


Throwing Net into Air, Where It Spreads like Huge Fan and Then Sinks around School of Fish

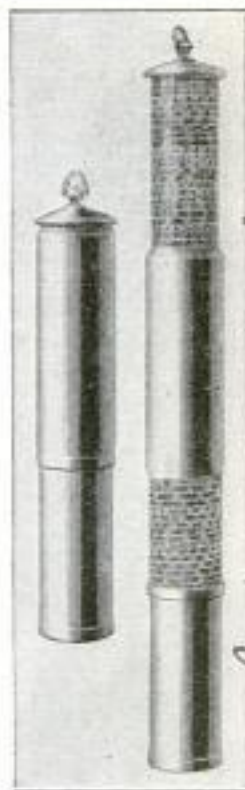
Golf Club with Removable Weights in Head So That It may be Changed to Suit Player

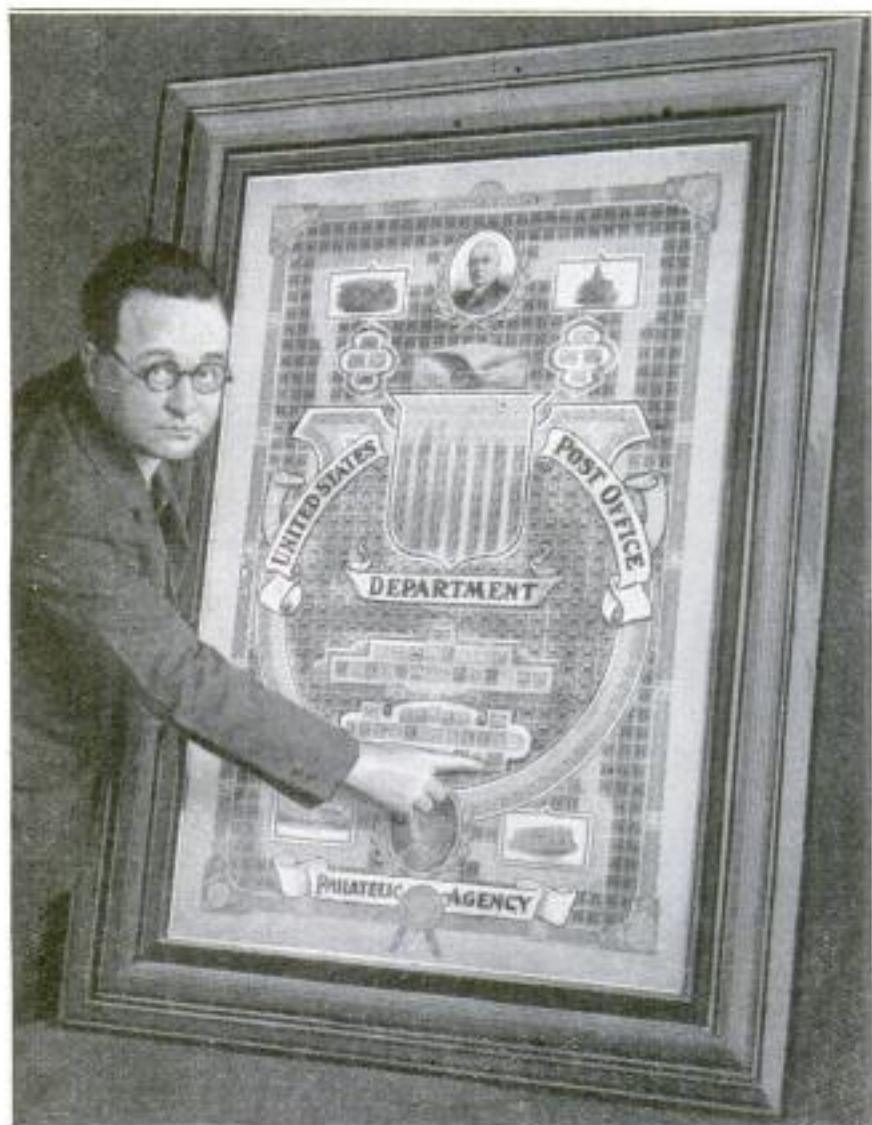

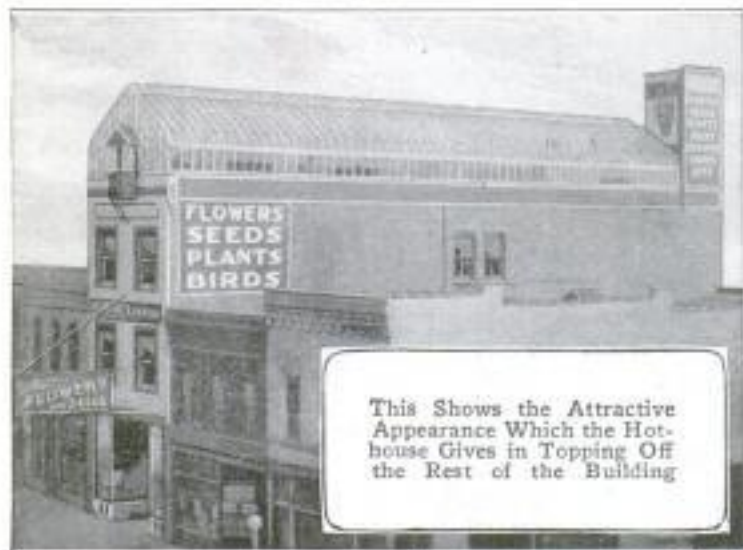

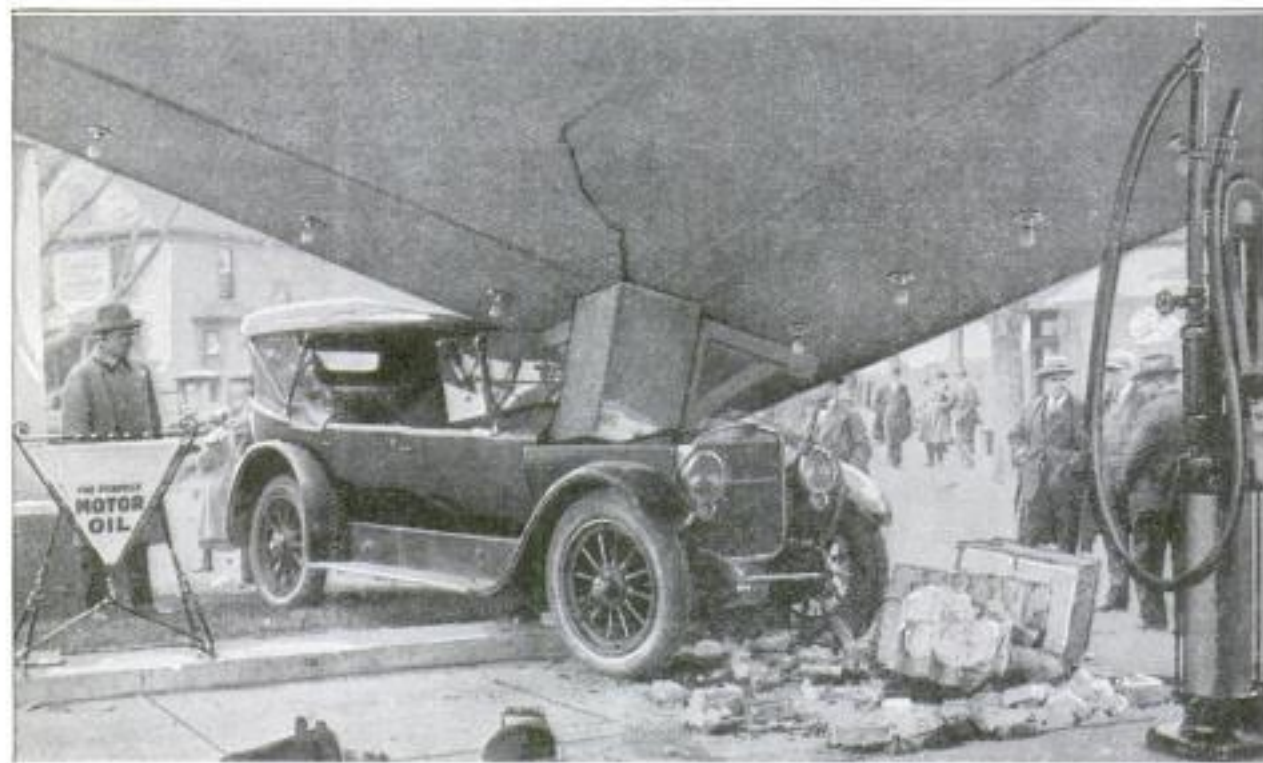

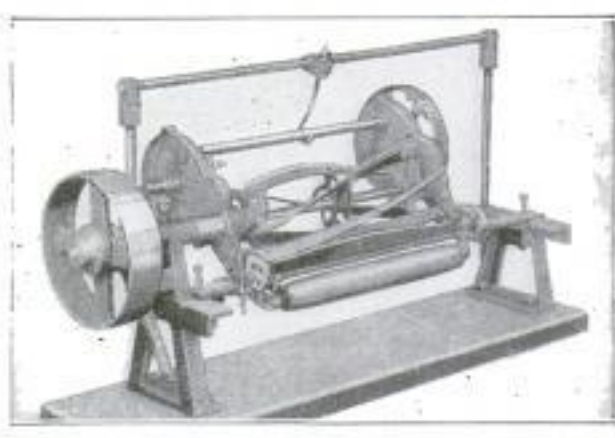

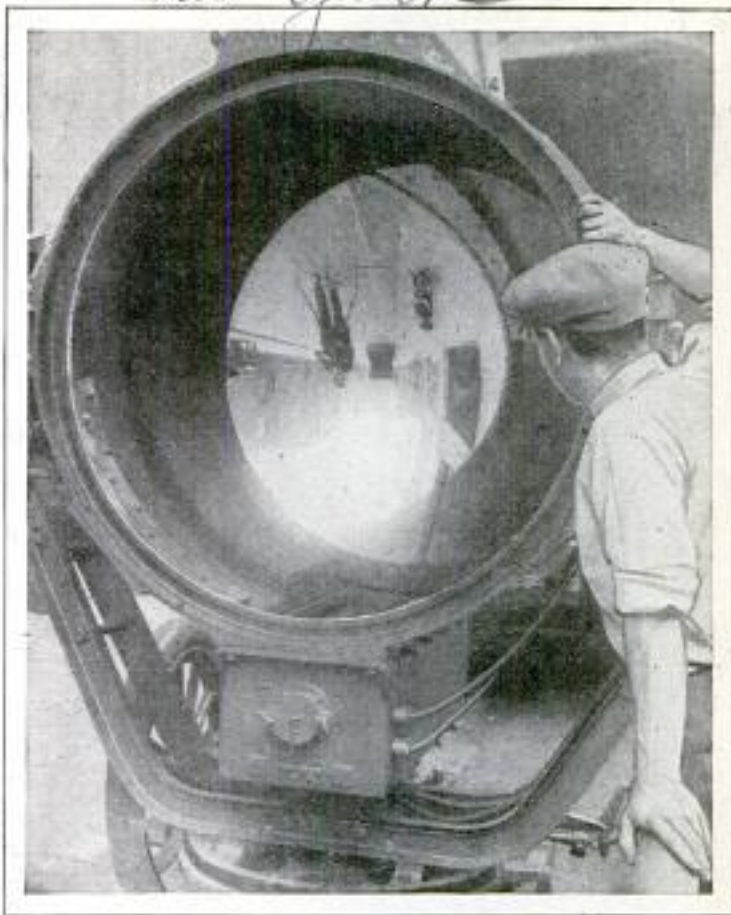
Machine for Sharpening the Blades of a Lawn Mower without Removing Them from Wheels

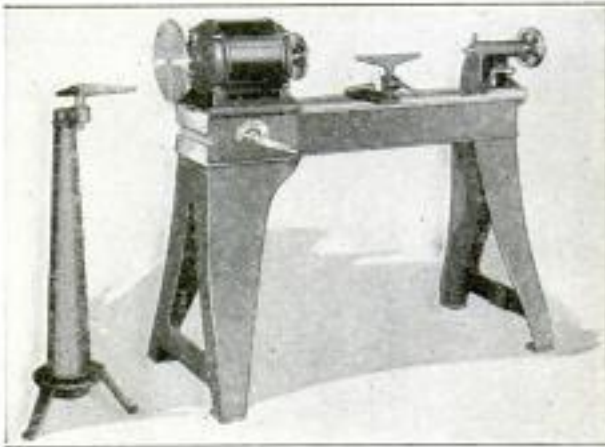

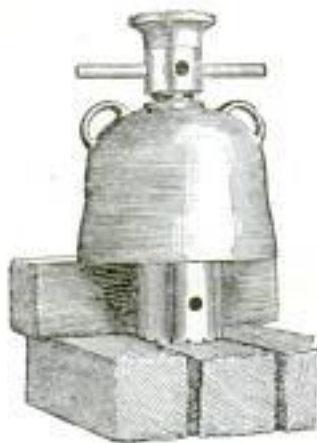
Wood-Turning Lathe with Motor Built into Headstock, Dispensing with Belts and Countershafts

The rear end of the motor-headstock is fitted with a faceplate for pattern work, and many attachments, such as a band saw, saw table, jointer, and planer, can be fitted to the head end of the bed. The carriage has an automatic feed.

49 CONTINUOUS-LIFT JACK
WORKS EASILY (156 3)

Using a common jack, it is necessary to block the object lifted when the jack has been screwed out to its limit, then



to run the screw in and block the jack to a new height. All this is rendered unnecessary by a continuous-lift jack, which permits a new foundation to be built under it while still sustaining the load. The jack resembles a common bell jack, with a larger bell of low height, but carries, at the lower end of the screw, a cylindrical thrust cap,

which is drawn inside the bell as the screw is turned outward.

Blocks are first placed under the rim of the bell, and the jack screwed up until the bottom of the thrust cap is inside the bell. A block is then placed under the cap, and the screw backed down until the load is taken off the bell, which can then be run up the screw until it is close to the jack head. Additional blocking is now placed under the bell rim, and the screw operated again until the thrust cap is within the bell, when the blocking operations are repeated.

19 PENDULUM INSTRUMENT TESTS
HARDNESS OF METALS

Working on an entirely new principle, an instrument for testing the hardness of substances ranging from lead to sapphire has recently been put on the English market. The instrument pivots on a hardened-steel or ruby ball, held in a chuck at its center; this is placed on the piece to be tested and the instrument tilted so that the bubble in a curved tube at the top of the instrument comes



to zero on the scale provided. When released, the instrument swings like a pendulum, the swings gradually decreasing in length owing to the expenditure of energy at the point where the ball rests on the

work. The position of the bubble at the end of the first swing shows the work done by the ball on the specimen, and measures its hardness.

There is another method of using the instrument, by means of "time" tests, in which the time for a certain number of swings is taken, and used as a measure of the hardness of the piece being tested.

By "reversing" the pendulum, it is claimed that minute differences of hardness may be determined. The instrument dispenses with all microscopic measurements, and the tests take only a few seconds. Heavy loads are not used, so the instrument may be used on thin or fragile articles without risk of breakage or defacing surfaces, which cannot easily be done with other instruments.

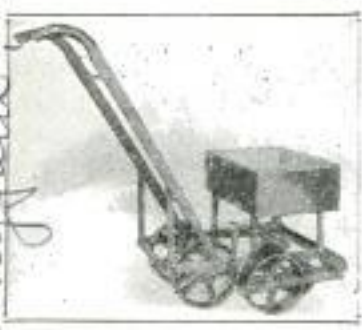

DRILL COMBINES STRENGTH AND ACCURACY 30

High-speed twist drills have in the past been made by two processes, forging and milling. The forged drill was used wherever great strength and penetrating ability were required, while the milled type was used when accuracy was of first importance. Each type had advantages over the other for certain classes of work. A single type of drill, combining the advantages of both the forged and milled drills, is now available. The drill is first hot-forged, to insure strength and toughness, then machined in the same manner as a milled drill, to produce an accurate central web. The cutting quality is thus equal to that of the forged drill.

FLOOR-MARKING MACHINE WORKS CLOSE TO WALL 22

Aisles, safety zones, and stock spaces in factories may be marked off quickly by means of a machine recently placed on the market. The machine is different from the usual type in that the marks can be made close to machines, posts, or side walls, and the work done as quickly as a man can walk. The paint container has



a capacity of 6 quarts; the flow of paint is controlled by means of a hand lever, and, when once set, is maintained automatically. The wheels are

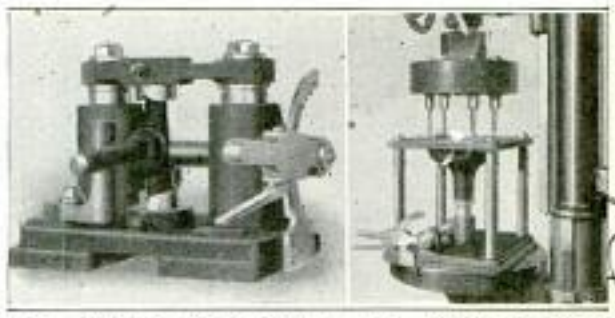
lined up rigidly so that the machine will run straight without effort on the part of the operator. A 2-in. marking pad is supplied for general factory use; where rough usage is expected, or for marking pavements and streets, a 4-in. marker is furnished.

UNIVERSAL DRILL JIG SAVES TIME IN SHOP 33

Two types of universal drill jigs, designed to take the place of the common leg-and-box and screw-bushing jigs, respectively, are now available.

The first type consists of a square base with a post at each corner, carrying the plate that contains the drill bushings.

The work is set under the plate and locked in position by a plunger, which is forced up by a handle and locked by means of a simple latch. The latter type is similar, except that there are two plungers, carrying the bushing plate, and

working downward against the work. These jigs are much more convenient to use than common jigs, as it is merely necessary to place the work on the lower bushing, in one type, or on the plunger in the other, and to pull the handle down, thus locking the piece securely; there is thus no need of removing the jig after once placing it on the drill-press table, and loading and unloading is rapid. Any number of different parts may be drilled by changing the bushings or top plate.

HAND SHAPER AIDS LIGHT WOODWORKING 18

For rounding corners up to 7/16-in. radius, and for cutting beads and fancy edges on the inside or outside of curved or straight pieces, a small shaper that may be held in the hand has been developed. The tool is electrically driven, and is suitable for use on either alternating or direct current. Bead cutters of almost any design, and radius cutters, ranging from 1/16 to 7/16 in. in size, can be furnished, making the tool a most flexible one. The shaper can be fitted with a chuck for drills, and with a shaft extension for emery wheels, thus further extending its range of usefulness. The motor is provided with an insulated, knurled casing, to provide a cool, easy grip, and an efficient ventilating system is built into it.

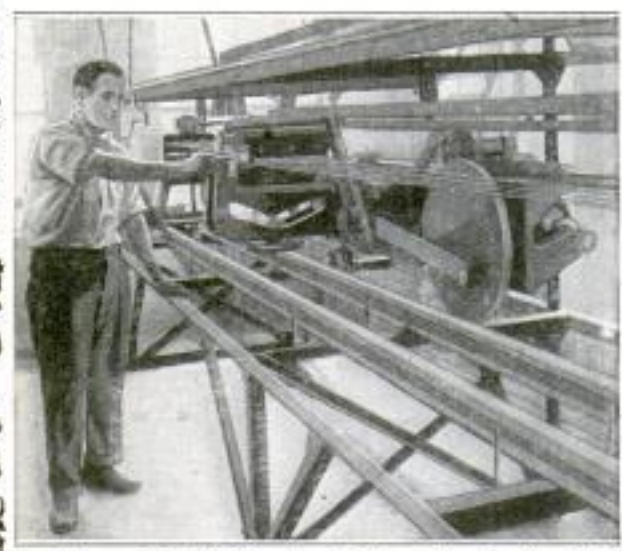

**GUT STRINGS FOR RACKETS
 POLISHED BY MACHINE**

Sheep-gut strings, used for tennis rackets and musical instruments, may be twisted and polished by means of a ma-

chine invented by an eastern string maker.

The machine is 40 feet long, enabling it to take tennis-racket strings at full length. The polishing is done by means of pumice-stone blocks, and, as the strings are twisted while the polishing mechanism moves back and forth, they are polished all around in one operation. The machine does the work hitherto requiring five men, and polishes six gross of tennis-racket strings per day.

A rather interesting point about this process is that the pumice stone used is imported from Italy, where it is quarried on Mt. Vesuvius, and in the Lipari Islands.

**HEIGHT OF TRACTOR DRAWBAR
 QUICKLY ADJUSTED**

Tractor drawbars are usually attached at fixed heights, which vary, according to the make of the machine, all the way from 10 to 22 inches. An improved drawbar, which has the same side adjustment as the fixed type, can be adjusted to any height from 8 to 23 inches, thus enabling the farmer to "hook" any implement to his tractor at the best draft height. The adjustment only requires a few seconds, and as the height of the drawbar has a decided influence on the efficient working of implements such as plows, harrows, etc., this drawbar is decidedly practical.

**PIPES LINED WITH CONCRETE
 BY MACHINE**

With the object of avoiding incrustation, it has been American practice for some years past to line metal water pipes with a thin coat of cement, applied by means of a brush, cement gun, or by hand.

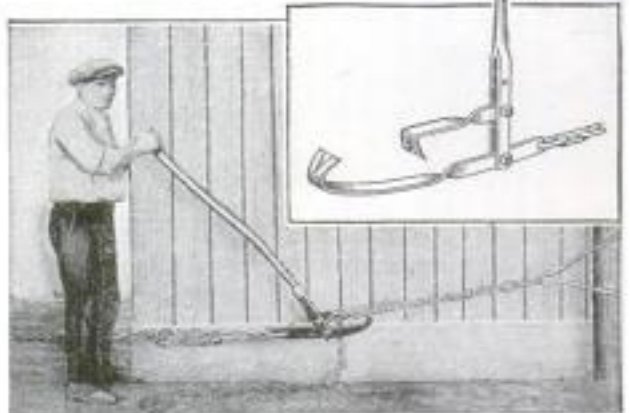
During the course of some experiments in England it was discovered that the machines used in the centrifugal-casting process of making concrete pipe could also be used for lining steel and cast-iron pipe, the resulting coating being very dense, and attached very firmly to the inside of the pipe. In large pipes, the lining is made about 1/2 inch in thickness, but this may be increased to 1 inch where desired.

Using this process, new pipes, which are considerably lighter than standard cast-iron pipes, have been made in sizes ranging from 4 to 72 inches in diameter.

While not new in principle, an improved wire stretcher, with specially made chain, and claws that hook onto the heavy links



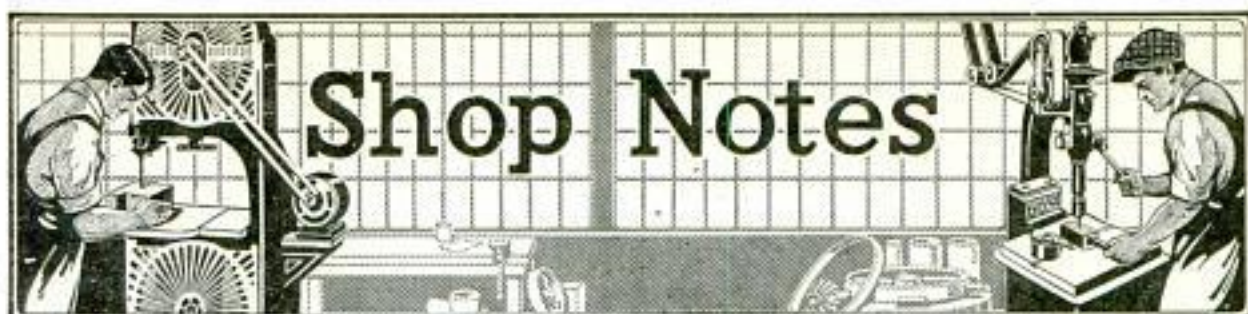
Wire Stretcher Operating with a Chain: Insert, Close-Up of the Claw Arms

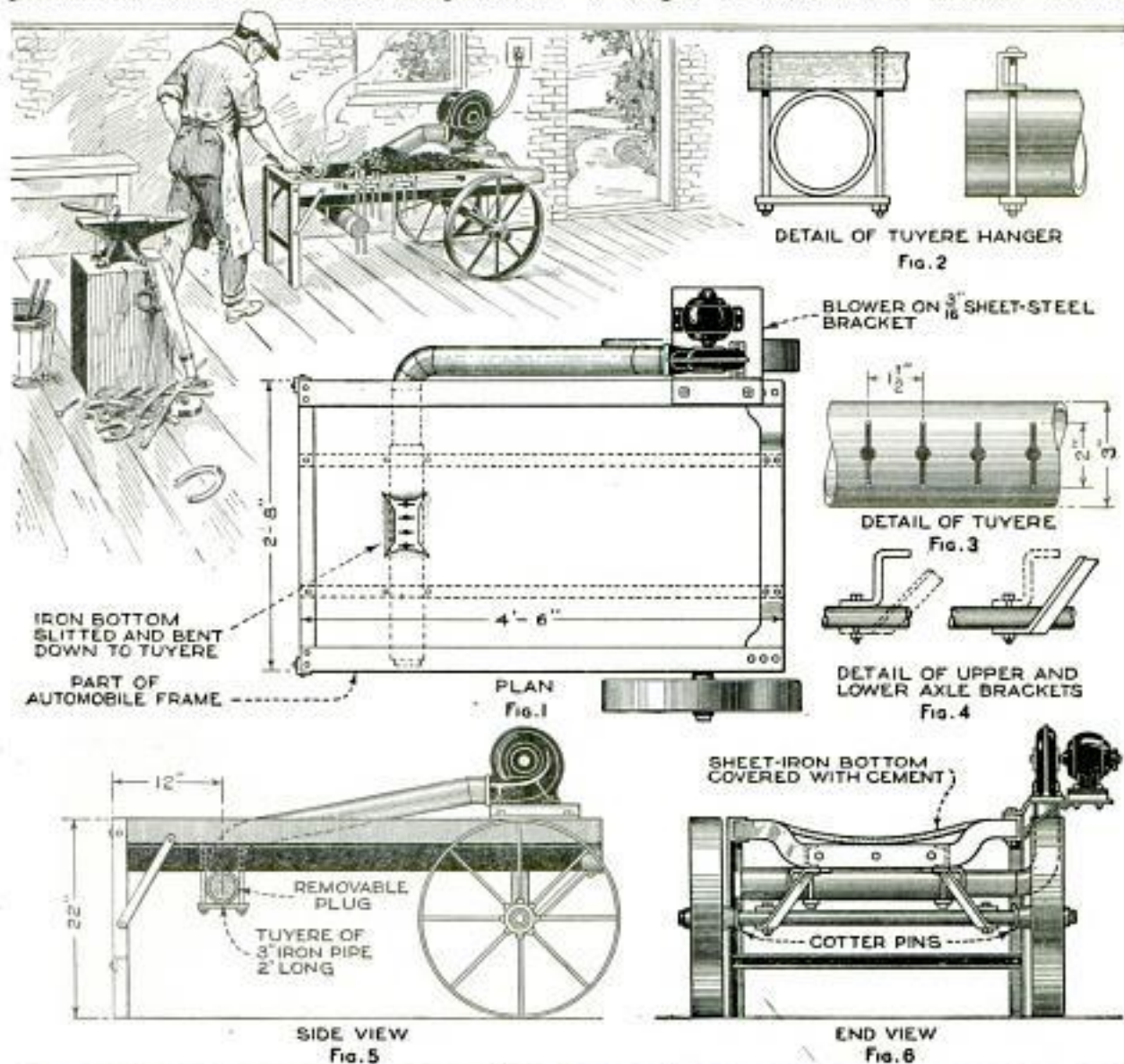
A Portable Electric Forge

By EDWIN M. LOVE

A PORTABLE forge, large enough to take care of any ordinary automobile or wagon work, is a great convenience in and around the small workshop, and will also be appreciated on the farm. The one shown in the illustrations has proved its usefulness in the shop where

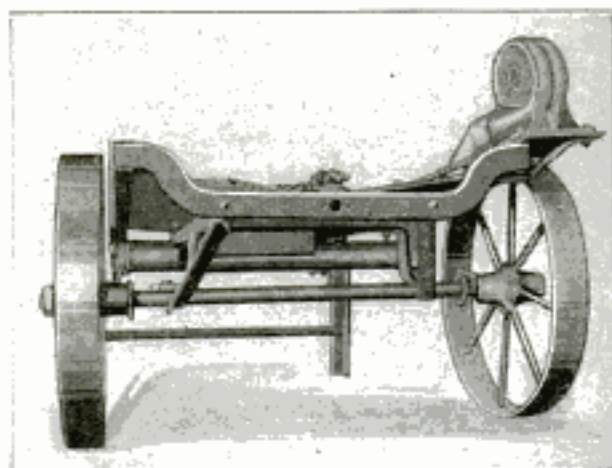
it was built, as it can be moved about easily. The blower is operated by electricity, which is available in cities and towns, and also on most farms.

The frame of the forge consists of the rear end of an automobile frame, cut to a length of 4½ ft. and covered with a

heavy dished sheet of iron; over this a 3-in. layer of cement is laid, to protect the iron from the intense heat of the fire. To this frame is attached an axle with two steel wheels and two legs, as indicated in the illustration. The axle is a 1½-in. iron pipe, bolted rigidly to the frame by means of four flat-iron brackets, as shown in Figs. 4 and 6. The wheels

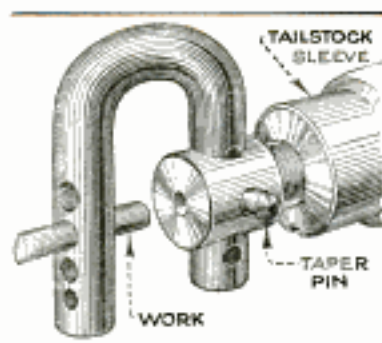


Rear View of a Portable Electric Forge That Is Very Convenient for Use in the Shop

themselves are the kind used on farm implements, and can be found in most junk heaps. The legs at the front of the forge are lengths of angle iron bolted to the

Supporting Long, Thin Bars.

The support shown in the drawing will be found very useful by anyone having a variety of bar work to do on the lathe, especially when the bars are long and small in diameter. Centering does not work very well in these cases, the diameter not being large enough.



A piece of ⅝-in. cold-rolled steel rod is bent over as shown, one end fitting into a holder that is turned on the shank to fit the tailstock sleeve. When these two parts are finished so far, they are fitted together, and a hole is drilled through both. Three other holes in line with this one are similarly drilled, then all are reamed for a taper pin. The pin is driven tightly into the holder and the first hole in the rod, and a hole for one

corners of the frame, and supported by flat braces, attached as shown. An electric motor and a small blower are securely bolted to a ⅜-in. sheet-steel bracket, which extends over the left wheel and is bolted and braced to the frame. A 3-in. sheet-steel blower pipe extends from the blower to the tuyère, which is made of the same-size iron pipe, and is located underneath the front end of the forge. The tuyère is suspended by hangers from two lengths of channel iron running lengthwise underneath the frame, and is bolted to it at each end, as indicated by the dotted lines in Fig. 1. Each hanger, as shown in Fig. 2, consists of two long bolts and a cross plate, drilled to slip over the ends of the bolt and held by nuts. The open end of the tuyère is closed with a removable wooden plug, so that the ashes that sift through the draft outlets can easily be removed. The draft outlets of the tuyère, as shown in Fig. 3, are simply holes and cuts in the pipe; they are made by drilling four ⅜-in. holes and slitting the pipe crosswise, 1 in. on each side of the holes, with a cutting torch. At the point where these draft outlets are located, the iron bottom of the forge is slitted; the slits are 4 in. long, and the flaps thus formed are bent down to the tuyère and cement-lined.

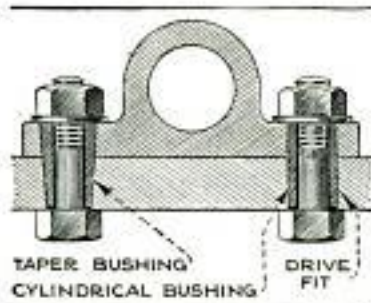
size of bar is then drilled and reamed through the opposite end of the support, using a drill held in the lathe chuck. The taper pin is then driven into the next hole in the support, and another size of hole is drilled and reamed, and so on. When in use, the support is held in an upright position on the tailstock, the taper pin being inserted in the hole in line with the hole required for the work, which is held on the other end by a collet or a three-jaw chuck.

Etching Glass

Most of the processes for etching on glass call for hydrofluoric acid, which is difficult to obtain and to store, and is so violently poisonous that it is even dangerous to health if inhaled; it also causes intense irritation to the hands. However, a dilute solution, for immediate use, is easily made by dissolving 20 gr. of sodium fluoride in 10 oz. of water, and adding 15 minims of hydrochloric acid (poison). This solution should be used with care, the hands being protected with rubber gloves and the solution handled in rubber or wax-covered trays.

Combination Dowel and Bolt

Bolts, studs, or capscrews cannot be depended on to prevent lateral shifting of assembled machine parts, their main function being to hold the parts closely together. To prevent lateral shifting, taper pins or dowels are usually used, if there are no machined male and female



interlocking sections provided. In cases where there is little room for dowels, hollow dowels can be used, the bolts then passing through the dowels, as indicated. The holes are tapered, or taper-reamed, and a taper bushing is driven in, then the bolt, stud, or capscrew is passed through and tightened. If a taper dowel is impracticable, a parallel hole is drilled, and a cylindrical bushing driven in. The bolts should fit freely in the bushings.

Homemade Horizontal Tool Grinder

A horizontal tool grinder is often more convenient than the common vertical kind. A novel tool grinder of this kind



for the home workshop is shown in the accompanying photograph. A carborundum or emery stone is attached to the mechanism of an old cream separator by fastening a $\frac{3}{8}$ -in. bolt to the bowl, and allowing the threaded end to extend above the latter far enough to take the emery wheel, washers, and nut. The advantages of this grinder are its substantial base, high gear, and convenient working height.

Live-Stock Frame for Farm Scales

The photograph shows a frame for farm scales, mounted on rollers and a track, so that it can easily be pushed over



Convenient Live-Stock Frame for Farm Scales: It is Mounted on Rollers Running on Tracks

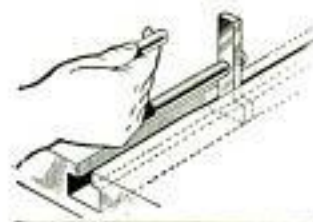
the scales when needed for weighing live stock. It is substantially built and well braced at the top, a feature that is not possible with a frame that must be taken apart in order to move it off and onto the scales. This kind of frame saves considerable time and much lifting, as it only takes a few moments to push it into place over the scale platform and to open the end gate.—J. C. Allen, LaFayette, Ind.

T-Slot Cleaner

When equipped with a tool like that shown in the drawing, it is an easy matter to clean out machine T-slots thoroughly from end to end. A piece of round steel is used for the handle, and a flat piece, shaped to fit the slots, is fastened to it

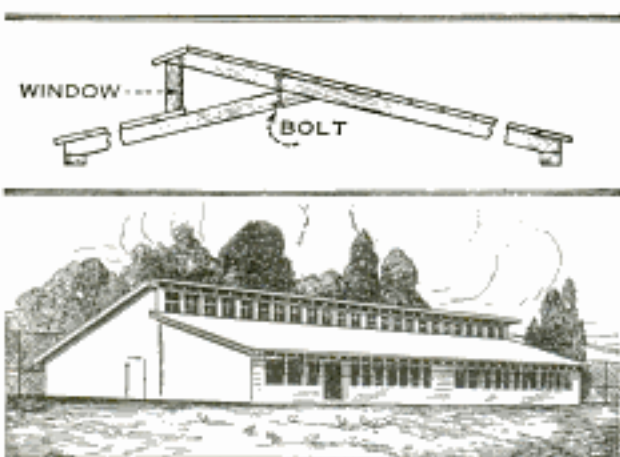


loosely by a washer and screw. In assembling the tool, the handle is attached to the scraper so that the former rests on the surface of the table when the T-piece is in the slot. By making it this way, the tool can be drawn along forcibly without jamming in the slot. When using the tool, the straight part is run through the slot first to break up the cuttings, and then the other end is turned down and run through it to finish the operation.

In the simple rafter design illustrated, cross braces are dispensed with, thus eliminating undesirable roosting places for the

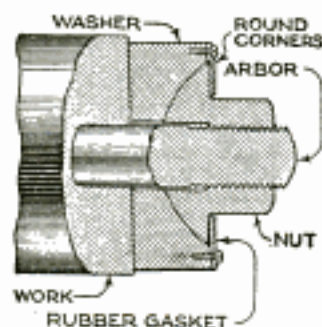


A Semimonitor Laying House with a Simple Rafter Construction Having No Cross Braces

The rafters are joined in pairs, a bolt being used to fasten them at the point of junction, as shown; washers are used on both ends of the bolt so that it will not tear through the rafters. One rafter is extended a few feet beyond the bolt, and a vertical brace is attached to it near the end, and to the other rafter below. Windows are fitted between the vertical braces as shown in the drawing. Rafters for spans not greater than 12 ft. may be made of 2 by 4-in. material, but for spans between 12 and 18 ft., 2 by 6-in. stuff must be used.—Edward R. Smith, Walla Walla, Wash.

Floating Nut and Washer for Arbors

An ordinary nut and washer, used to tighten work on a threaded arbor, serves very well when the face of the work is square with the axis, but there are occasions when the work is not square or



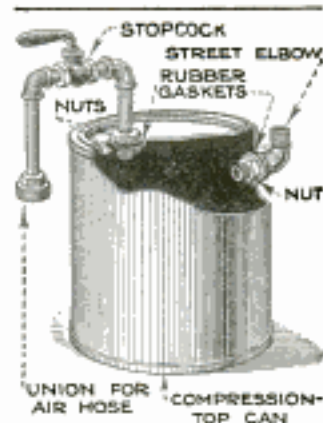
the face is left rough. Some method of "floating" the washer must then be tried, or else the arbor will be bent when the nut is tightened. The nut and washer shown were designed to be used on work having one face milled off at an angle, the pieces being after-

ward finished off in the lathe on a threaded arbor. The shouldered nut is turned to a radius on one end and the washer turned to fit it. The bore of the washer should be larger than the diameter of the arbor shank, in order to allow for the necessary "float." To keep the nut and washer together to facilitate handling, and also to exert a slight tension to keep them both in line when off the arbor, a rubber gasket is fastened to the back of the washer by four screws, as indicated. A thin sheet-metal washer underneath the heads of the screws will prevent them from cutting into the rubber. With the floating movement shown, the nut always tightens up in line with the shank of the arbor, and thus there is no danger of straining and bending the latter.

Blowing Soapstone through Conduit

Soapstone is generally used by electricians to facilitate pulling rubber-covered wires through conduit, but it is not an easy matter to force the soapstone through long lengths of conduit. On large jobs where compressed air is available, the soapstone can be blown through with the device shown in the illustration.

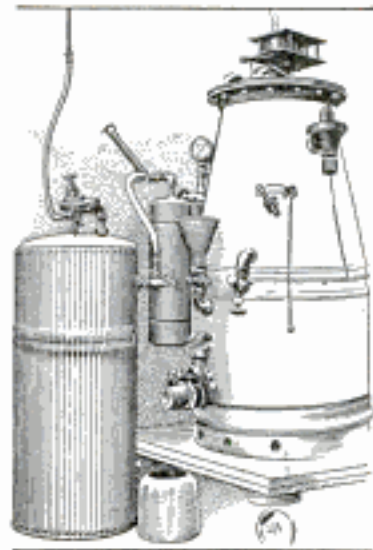
It consists of a tin compression-top can, with an inlet for the compressed air and an outlet for the soapstone. The inlet, which can be located conveniently on the cover, is fitted with a union on the end for connecting to the air hose, and a stopcock for controlling the supply. The outlet, which consists of a street elbow, is fitted



on the side as indicated. Rubber gaskets are used to make the connections on the can air-tight. To use the device, a handful or two of soapstone is put in the compression can, the street elbow is inserted into the end of the conduit through which the wire is to be run, and the air pressure is then applied, which will blow the soapstone through with considerable force, and will prevent it from accumulating in the pipe. Very little air pressure is necessary; and as any high degree of pressure will blow the top from the can, the stopcock should be opened gently.—W. W. Parker, Lead, S. D.

Increasing Capacity of Acetylene Generator

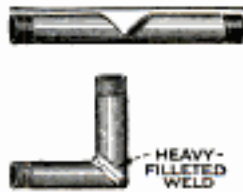
A welder who uses a popular make of acetylene generator found that it did not generate rapidly enough to supply a heavy welding tip for a considerable length of time. To remedy this, he cut



a section from an old hot-water tank, welded the two remaining pieces together, and connected the resulting tank with the generator, as illustrated in the drawing. The regulator was put on the auxiliary tank. The generator was thus enabled to store a larger quantity of acetylene, and the feeding mechanism operated with greater efficiency, with the result that a large tip could be used without difficulty.

An Emergency Elbow

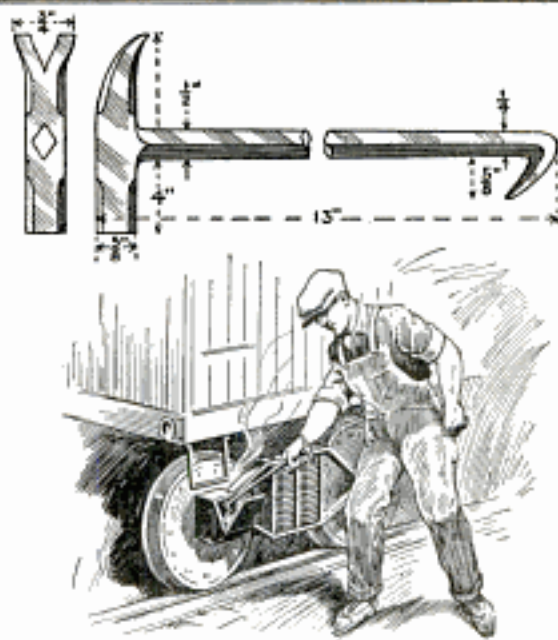
When installing a large overhead-irrigation system, we found that an additional 3-in. elbow was needed, and as it was necessary to finish the job at once, we resorted to making an elbow from a piece of pipe. A 4-in. length was threaded at both ends and a V-notch cut out of the center as shown, the cuts being made with an acetylene torch. The back of the pipe, which was left untouched, was heated to a cherry red and bent as indicated, so that the ends of the pipe were at right angles to each other, a carpenter's T-square being used to test the accuracy of the angle. The seam was then welded, with a heavy fillet; this completed the elbow, which served the purpose just as well as an ordinary one.—A. S. Jamieson, Springfield, Mass.

Car Inspector's Tack Hammer and Journal Hook

The combined tack hammer and journal hook shown in the illustration is simple to make and has proved to be of considerable usefulness for railroad-car



A Combined Tack Hammer and Journal Hook That Greatly Facilitates Railroad-Car Inspection

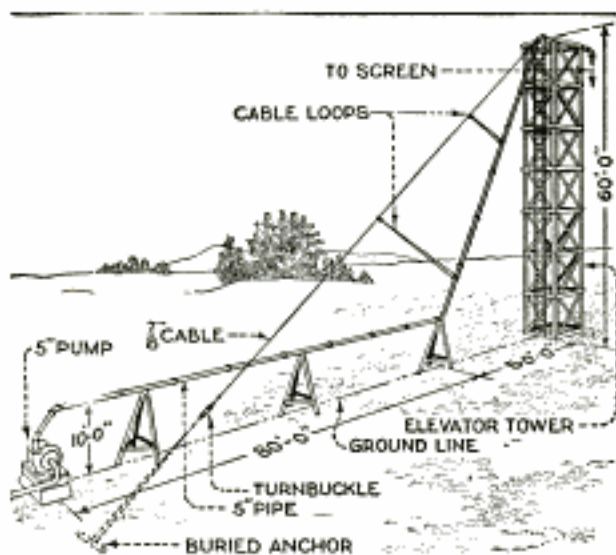
inspection, as it eliminates the necessity of carrying separate tools. This tool allows the inspector to do his work without getting oil on his hands, and as a result the record books and "bad-order" cards will be clean. The tool can be made from a scrap coke fork. One end is bent over to form a hook for "feeling" the journals to detect cuts, etc., and a hammer head and claw are formed at the other end. The tool is strong enough to be used for prying doors open. The measurements of the tool are given in the detail, but can, of course, be varied as desired.—T. B. Aldridge, Jr., Denver, Colo.

Novel Method of Lowering Tank into Pit

An ingenious method of lowering a large steel fuel-oil tank into its pit, in the absence of suitable derricks or tackle, was adopted in a small British Columbia generating plant. All the tank outlets were plugged, the pit was filled with water and the tank simply rolled into it. It naturally floated on the surface of the water, which, when pumped out, allowed the tank to sink into position gradually.—G. R. Dymont, Hamilton, Can.

Supporting a Long Discharge Pipe

When installing a 5-in. centrifugal pump to furnish water for the screens at a gravel-washing plant, it was decided to run the discharge pipe so that no bend



Efficient Method of Supporting a Long Discharge Pipe at a Gravel-Washing Plant

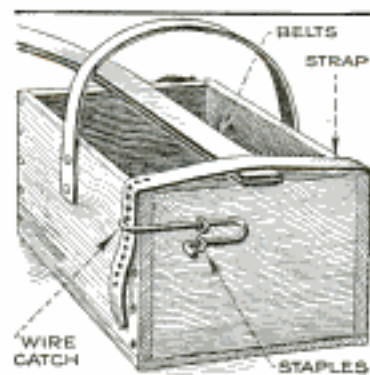
would be greater than 45° , in order to eliminate friction as much as possible. The pipe was run from the pump to an elevation about 10 ft. above the ground, and was carried for a distance of about 80 ft. at this elevation, three tripods being used to support it. A 45° bend was then made, and the pipe run up to the top of a 60-ft. elevator tower. The pipe was strong enough to support itself while being erected, but sagged about 2 ft. in the middle, necessitating additional support. A $7/8$ -in. cable was run from the top of the elevator tower to an anchor in the ground near the pump. A turnbuckle was fitted in the cable near the ground, so that it could be reached easily. Two loops were clamped around the main cable and the pipe as shown, and, by screwing the turnbuckle, the middle of the pipe was lifted until it was straight. This arrangement, which eliminated clumsy timber supports, has been in use for two years and has held the pipe quite securely.

The ease of erection of this support is one of its commendable features. The anchor was fixed first, and the cable was then run from the top of the tower to the turnbuckle, and then attached to the anchor, being drawn tight by means of rope blocks before clamping it to the turnbuckle. To get the loops of cable around the main cable and the pipe, a snatch block with a hand line was at-

tached to the main cable at the top. A seat was attached to the hook of the snatch block so that a man could ride down the cable. A set of rope blocks were also hung on the main cable with a sliding sling around the pipe. As the man was lowered to the position of the lower loop, he slid the set of rope blocks along with him, these being used to draw the main cable and pipe together before attaching the cable loops. After the lower loop was made and clamped to the main cable, the process was repeated at the upper loop, and the man then pulled back to the top of the tower. The turnbuckle was then screwed up a few turns to straighten out the pipe.—A. W. Burg, Lake View, Ia.

Holding Belts for Cutting and Punching

The drawing shows how a belt repairman utilizes his tool box as a holder for the ends of the belts while measuring them for cutting and punching. One end of a leather strap is nailed to one side of the box; the other end of the strap is left loose and has a number of holes punched in it. A slide catch, made of stout wire, is used to hold the strap. This wire is bent to a hook shape at one end, so that it will enter the strap holes and a hole in the box, and is held to the box by



means of a couple of staples, as indicated. The ends of the belt are clamped by placing them between the box top and the strap, the latter being pulled tight and the hook passed through the strap into the hole in the box. The belt is held securely, as the weight of the contents holds it down while it is unrolled.

Filing Crosscut Saws

The work of sharpening crosscut saws is greatly facilitated by marking off the correct tooth angle, which is 30° , on the top of the saw clamp at 1-in. intervals. If the file is kept parallel to the marks while filing the saw, the angle of the teeth is sure to be correct.—Fred W. Page, Winfield, Kan.

A Reboring Fixture for the Garage

By J. V. ROMIG

WHEN the automobile engine is being thoroughly overhauled, all connecting rods and pistons are refitted. Oversize wristpins are usually fitted where the original ones are worn enough to warrant it, the wristpin holes being reamed to fit.

The reaming process is not a very accurate one, and many pistons so fitted either stand "cocked" in the cylinders, causing excessive wear and unsatisfactory operation, or, if the connecting rod is twisted and set so that the piston will check with an alinement gauge, the wristpin itself is not properly fitted, and wears rapidly. A better way to fit new wristpins, and one that insures alinement, is to re bore the holes, and to use the reamer merely to size them.

The fixture described in this article will do this job perfectly and quickly, and can be used for a multitude of small boring jobs where accuracy is required; for instance, connecting rods can be rebored, after babbiting, by the addition of two V-blocks to the fixture. Anyone with ordinary mechanical skill can build the tool easily, and will be more than repaid by the improved quality of the work done with it.

The worktable, full dimensions of which are given, is made of gray cast iron, from an easily made pattern. The top and edges must be planed perfectly flat and at right angles, and particular care should be taken with the planing or shaping of the 2-in. side groove, and the 2 $\frac{1}{4}$ -in. top groove, to insure that they are square with all surfaces.

The table is mounted on a 3-in. pipe column, which screws into a threaded hole in a boss on the underside of the table casting. The base of the column is a pipe flange, by means of which the

machine is bolted to the bench. All parts should be screwed up tightly.

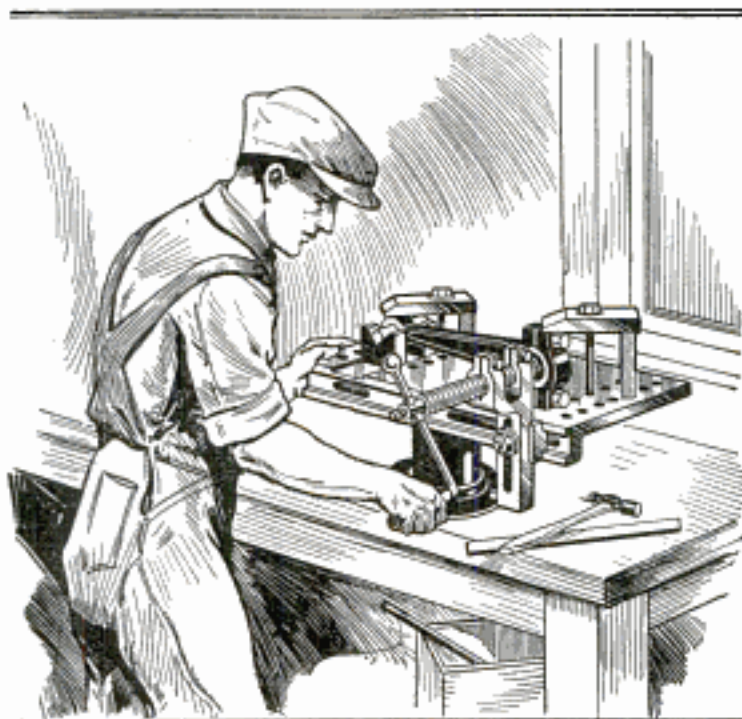
Two slots are cut through the front of the table, as shown, for the passage of the boring-head clamp bolt, and holes for $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. studs drilled and tapped in the surface of the table. Holes for $\frac{3}{8}$ -in. screws are drilled and tapped in the back edge of the casting, to hold the braces.

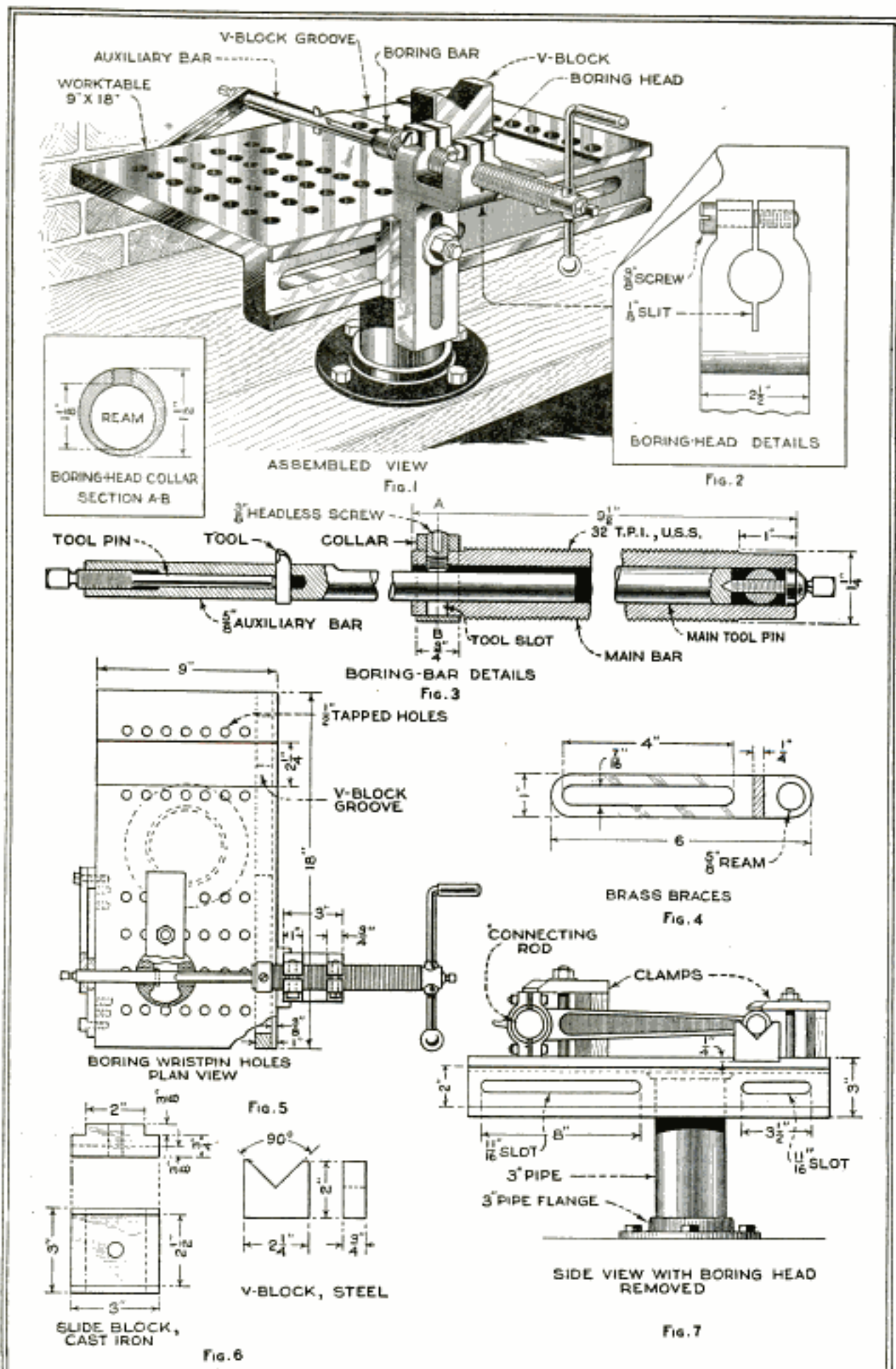


Figure 1 Shows the Fixture Completely Assembled; Figure 2, Details of the Boring Head; Figure 3, Main and Auxiliary Boring Bars; Figure 4, Braces for Auxiliary Bar; Figure 5, Set-Up for Boring Wristpin Holes; Figure 6, Dimensions of Blocks, and Fig. 7, Method of Reboring Connecting Rods

The boring-bar head is a bronze casting, 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. long over all, and is machined as shown in Figs. 1, 2, and 5. The arms are bored and threaded for the 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ -in. boring bar; this job is best done by clamping the head to the faceplate of a lathe, after shaping. The arms are then drilled and tapped for the adjusting

screws and slitted, as shown in Fig. 2. The boring bar, which is made of steel, is now turned, bored, and threaded, as shown in Fig. 3. The thread pitch is 32 per inch, and the screw should be fitted accurately in the arms of the head. As will be noted, there are two boring bars, a main bar and an auxiliary one. The main bar is 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. long, and is turned down

to 1 $\frac{1}{8}$ in. diameter for about $\frac{3}{4}$ in. at each end. At the nose end, a $\frac{3}{8}$ -in. square hole is machined for the tool bits, and at the other, a $\frac{5}{8}$ -in. round hole for the crank handle. The latter is made of $\frac{5}{8}$ -in. cold-rolled steel, turned down to $\frac{1}{2}$ in., except for the ball end and the center portion, which latter is left $\frac{5}{8}$ in. in diameter to fit the hole in the bar. A setscrew hole is drilled and tapped in this $\frac{5}{8}$ -in. section for the clamp screw.

The tools are clamped by means of a $\frac{5}{8}$ -in. tool pin, sliding in the hollow bar, and pushed against the bits by means of the tool-clamp screw just mentioned. One end of the pin is spotted to receive the pointed end of the screw.



Reboring a Connecting-Rod Big End with a Portable Hand Fixture: Note How the Rod is Clamped

When boring wristpin holes, it is necessary to use an auxiliary bar, which is shown in position in Fig. 1, and in detail in Fig. 3. This bar telescopes into the larger one, the main tool pin first being removed, and is locked in position by the special collar shown in the detail. The headless setscrew in the collar is run through the tool-bit hole in the main bar and tightened on a flat milled on the auxiliary bar. The tool in this bar is also clamped by a tool pin, which, in this case, is a part of the clamp screw.

When boring a piston of large diameter, it is necessary to adjust the bar for each hole. The use of the auxiliary bar also necessitates the making of the brass or bronze braces shown in Fig. 4. These are fitted as indicated in Figs. 1 and 5, and keep the bar true and steady.

The feed is secured by the action of the threaded bar, turning the crank to the right feeding the bar forward, and to the left, backward. If it is desired to cut on the backward movement, the tool, of course, must be reversed. When the work is clamped close to the head, quite heavy cuts can be taken in the softer metals.

The method of boring wristpin holes is indicated in Fig. 5. To insure ac-

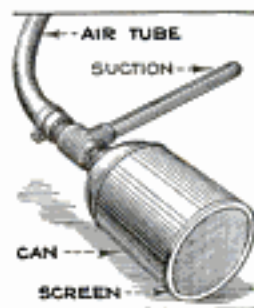
curacy when sizing, after the holes are rebored, a shell reamer should be used, held on the boring bar. For connecting rods, two V-blocks should be made, hardened and finished by grinding so as to be as accurate as possible; these must fit snugly, without any side play, in the groove in the table top. When reboring a connecting-rod "big end," a wristpin is slipped through its bearing and laid on the V-blocks, one being placed on each side of the bearing. The rod is then clamped down, as indicated in Fig. 7, and bored, using only the main bar, with the assurance that all bearings will be square.

When boring the wristpin bearing for an oversize pin, the same method is followed, using a mandrel in the big-end bearing. As the feed is $\frac{1}{32}$ in., the tools used should be ground with a flat top, slightly over $\frac{1}{32}$ in. wide, so that the tool marks will overlap.

Bushings that are too small in the bore can be rebored by clamping them in one of the V-blocks; the machine can also be used for most work that cannot be handled in the drill press because of the lack of large drills, and, as no power is necessary, it may be carried close to the work, and clamped or bolted to any convenient bench.

Suction Cleaner for Machinery

A handy suction cleaner for use around machines, such as knitting and paper-perforating machines, weaving looms, etc., is a great convenience. A cleaner of this kind can readily be made to operate on compressed air, if constructed as shown in the illustration. It is made from a discarded benzine can and a few standard $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. pipe fittings. The bottom



of the can is cut out, leaving a margin of about $\frac{1}{4}$ in., to which is soldered a piece of fine brass screen. The cap of the can is removed and a short nipple soldered in its place. A tee is screwed on the nipple, and a length of pipe, about 1 ft. long, into the tee, this pipe being flattened at one end so that the opening will be about $\frac{1}{8}$ or $\frac{1}{16}$ in. wide. It is not essential to have the pipe straight; it may be bent to any convenient shape, and its length may also vary to suit the user. Another short nipple is screwed into the tee, as

shown, to permit the attachment of the air hose. The rapid passage of air from the hose through the can creates a strong suction in the pipe, and the dirt and scraps of light material are easily picked up and deposited in the can. Where fine dirt or dust is to be cleaned up, a cloth bag, such as a mailing bag, is tied over the bottom of the can to retain the fine particles. Unscrewing the connection at the tee permits the contents of the can to be shaken out.—H. I. Wheeler, Westwood, Mass.

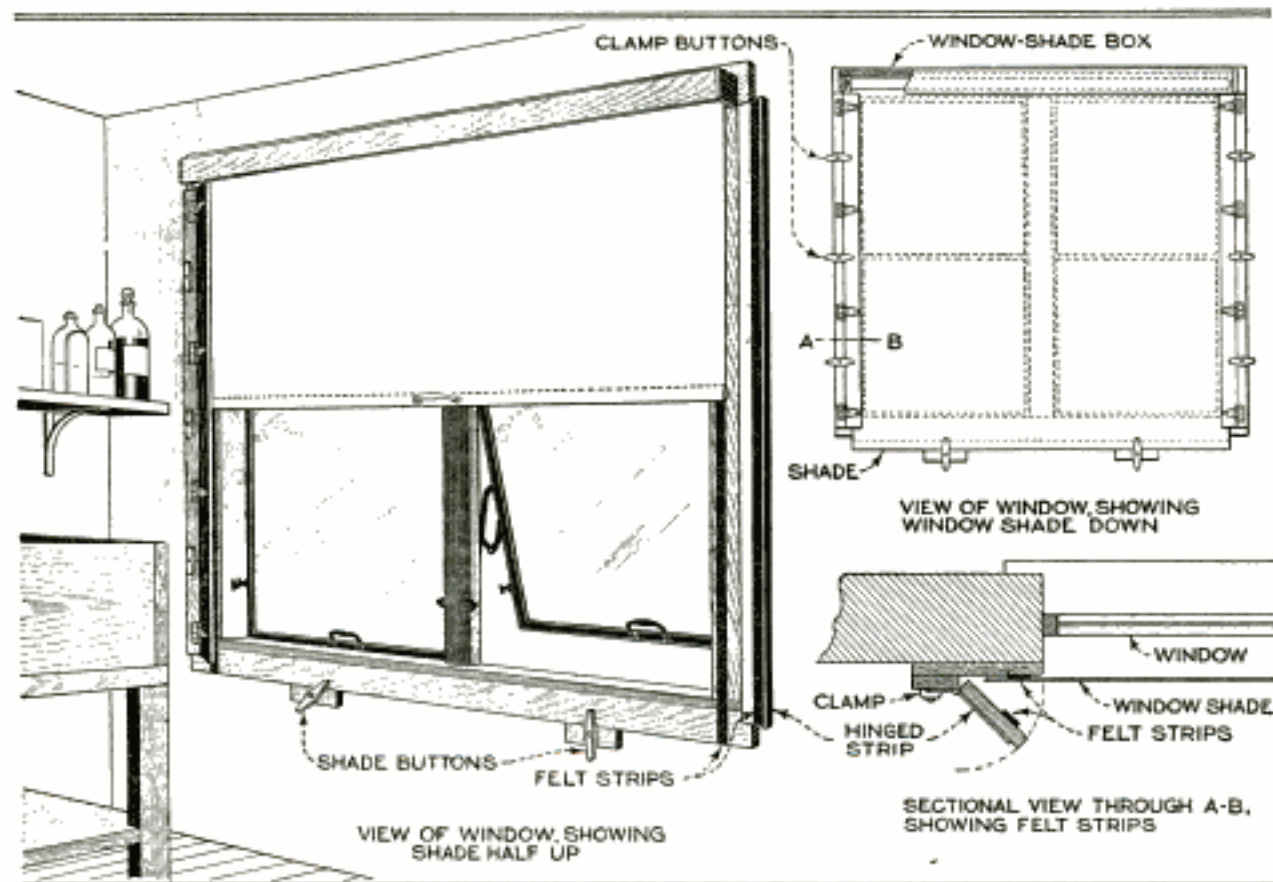
Comfortable Handles for Buckets

I have found that a short length of flexible metallic tubing, such as is used by electricians, provides a comfortable handle for a bucket. It is slipped over the wire handle with which the bucket is equipped. On a job where we had several heavy paint buckets to carry, all of them were fitted with these handles, which made the job very easy on the hands. Pieces of waste tubing can be picked up around almost any new building where the wiring is being installed.—Reuben Stafford, Jr., Washington, District of Columbia.

Making Window of Dark Room Light-Proof

The method of making the window of the dark room light-proof shown in the drawing should prove of interest to pro-

fessional photographers, or even to the amateur, as it is a very simple one. This is the method used in Popular Mechanics' dark room, and has proved entirely satisfactory.

Strips of wood, $\frac{1}{2}$ in. thick by 5 in. wide, and as long as the window frame, are fastened to the wall on either side of the window, as shown. On the outside of these strips, $\frac{3}{4}$ by $1\frac{3}{4}$ -in. strips are nailed, and $\frac{1}{2}$ by $3\frac{1}{4}$ -in. strips attached to them by hinges. The 5-in. and hinged $3\frac{1}{4}$ -in. strips are faced with felt, as shown in the sectional view, the window shade, when down, being gripped tightly by the felt. Wooden turn buttons are used to clamp the hinged strips when closed, and two other buttons, mounted on strips of wood fastened to the wall below the window, are used to hold the lower end of the shade tightly against the wall. The shade roller is inclosed in a light-tight box, as shown in the perspective and front views.

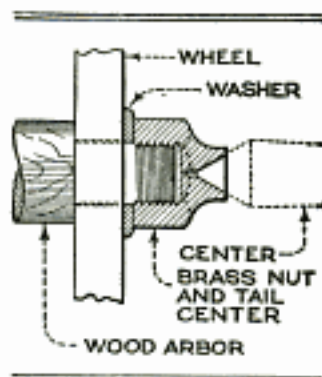
The free working of the shade is thus not interfered with in the least, while it is perfectly light-proof in use.

Soldering Tinfoil

When making fixed condensers for use in radio work, it is often desirable to solder leads to the tinfoil sheets. This is difficult to do because the solder does not readily adhere to the tinfoil, and because the foil melts so easily. This difficulty can be avoided by placing the foil on a sheet of copper, and using a flux made of vaseline, paraffin, and sal ammoniac. The vaseline and paraffin, in equal parts, are heated and mixed together. While the liquid mixture is still hot, half the total bulk of sal ammoniac is added. The whole is then thoroughly mixed and allowed to cool. The flux thus made is effective, providing, of course, the work is thoroughly clean.—Leroy Western, Plainfield, N. J.

Tail Center for Wooden Arbors

The use of a wooden arbor is at times necessary in woodworking and pattern making, for special work; emery and

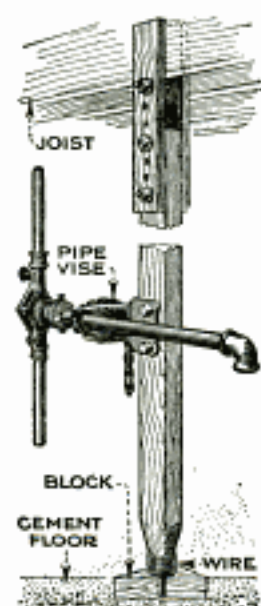


sand paper wheels are also usually mounted on wooden arbors. However, workmen sometimes hesitate to use one because the wood around the tail center has a tendency to split open while revolving at a high rate of

speed, which loosens the arbor and is, of course, dangerous. This danger can be eliminated by screwing a combined brass nut and center on the end of the arbor. The nut is made of hexagon brass stock, threaded to screw on the wooden end, and is center-drilled to fit the lathe center, as indicated in the illustration.

Pipe Fitter's Vise Support

Pipe fitters usually do their work before the inside of the building is finished, and, consequently, it is often a problem

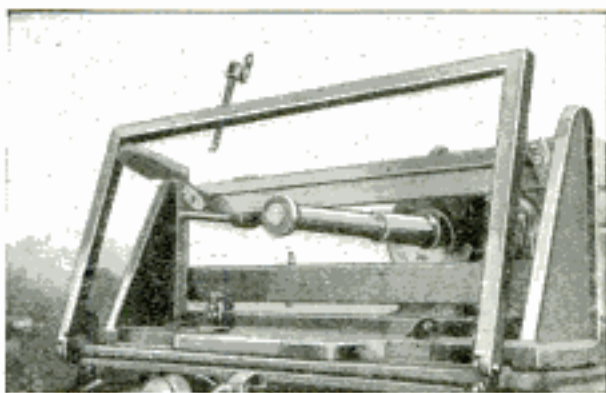


to find a suitable place for the pipe vise, particularly in the basement. The arrangement illustrated makes it possible, however, to use a pipe vise wherever the floor joists are exposed, anchorage being obtained by a pin driven into the wire-wound foot of the upright. A 2 by 4-in. stick is used for the upright, with two pieces of 1½-in. boards bolted to opposite sides, for clamping the device to an overhead floor joist. The pin in the

bottom end is made from ¾-in. rod, and is allowed to project about 3 in., fitting into a small hole drilled in the joist. In the basement, a hole may be chipped in the floor, and a wood block fitted to take the pin, as shown, or a small hole drilled right in the floor. In either case, it is a simple matter to fill up the hole.

Clamp for Cylinder Grinder

A mechanic, finding that the regular clamps furnished on his cylinder-grinding machine did not hold the cylinder block

solidly enough to prevent a slight vibration—which tended to produce imperfect cylinder walls—constructed the clamp shown in the photograph to overcome the difficulty.

It consists of a U-shaped frame, made by welding together 1-in. iron bars, and hinged to lugs bolted to the grinder carriage. A hole is drilled and tapped in the horizontal bar to receive a setscrew fitted with a crank handle. When the cylinder block has been placed in readiness for grinding, the clamp is swung to a suitable position over the block and the setscrew is screwed down against it. Since the clamp has been used, vibration marks and spoiled cylinders have been eliminated.

A Sprinkler Guard

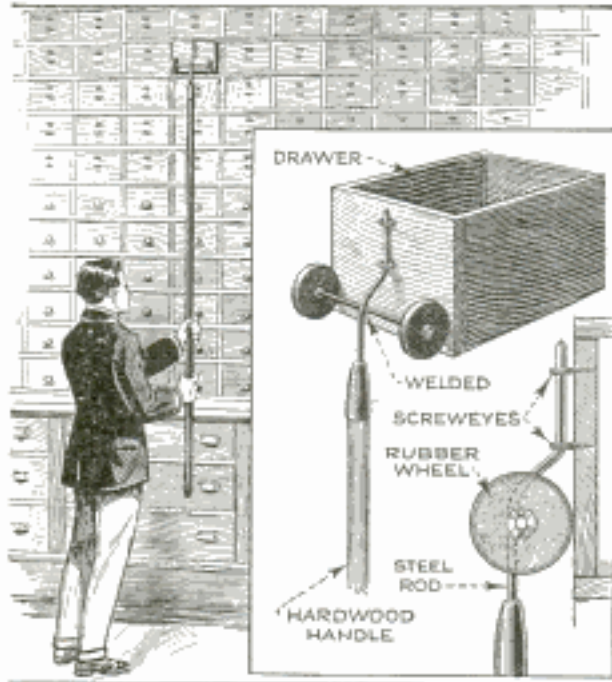
The moving stairway in a large department store ran close to a line of sprinkler piping, and the sprinkler-head links were often accidentally broken or brushed by parcels carried by persons using it, or tampered with by meddlers. To prevent this, a simple guard was made and placed over each head within reach of the stairway. The guards consisted of a clamp made of sheet metal, fitting around the base of the head, and provided with a number of U-shaped wires, soldered into holes drilled in the upper edge of the clamp, as shown.



Since installing these, no further trouble has been experienced.

Lifter for High Drawers

In stores where an increase of stock of small parts makes it necessary to put in drawers above the original ones, if lack of floor space does not permit addi-

tional cabinets, or it is not desired to install these, a rolling ladder is commonly used. However, a good substitute for a rolling ladder is a drawer lifter of the kind shown in the drawing. This even has advantages over a rolling ladder in that it does not take so much space, and as several may be provided if necessary, no time is wasted in waiting for the ladder until some one else has finished using it farther along the shelves.

It consists of a strong hardwood handle on which is fitted a short length of steel rod, bent to the shape shown. A crosspiece of the same size steel rod is welded across the first piece, and small rubber wheels are fitted at each end, these being kept in place by means of cotter pins and washers. In use, the bent rod is slipped into screweyes driven into the front of each drawer, and it is then an easy matter to pull the drawer out and lower it. The length of the handle depends on the height of the upper line of drawers.—L. H. Georger, Buffalo, N. Y.

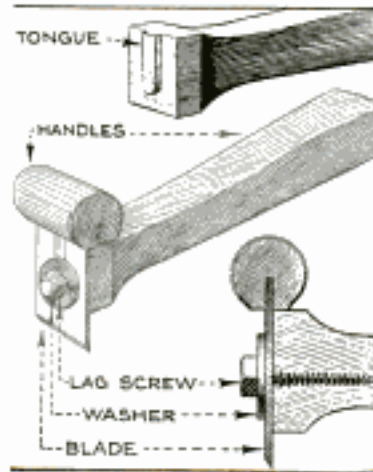
An Offset Screwdriver

For working in very close quarters, an offset screwdriver of the type shown in the drawing will be found very useful. It consists of a handle carrying a head that has four narrow blades formed on it. Each blade is set at an angle of 45° with the two on each side of it, so that in using the tool, it is only necessary to move the handle slightly before one blade can be engaged in the groove of the screw. Where headroom is limited, and a screwdriver cannot be used, this tool will be found to remove the screw much more quickly than the common close-quarters screwdriver, which has but two blades, set at right angles to each other at opposite ends of the handle.



A Good Cabinet Scraper

The illustration shows an easily made wood scraper that has been found very practical for cabinetmakers and other woodworkers. It consists of a wooden handle, shaped square, with slightly rounded corners and edges. The head is square and has a tongue formed on it as indicated. The scraper blade consists of the end of an old plane bit, and is attached to the handle by means of a



lag screw or round-head screw driven into the end, a hole being first drilled in the handle, to prevent splitting. If a lag screw or round-head screw is not at hand, a nut can be countersunk to take the head of a flat-head screw, and the two soldered together. To protect the cutting edge of the blade, a short piece of round hardwood, about 1 in. in diameter, and slotted to fit the blade snugly, is provided. This piece is used as a hand rest when using the scraper, being then attached to the top of the blade, as shown.—M. E. Dugan, Kenosha, Wis.

Rotary Blower Made from a Tin Can

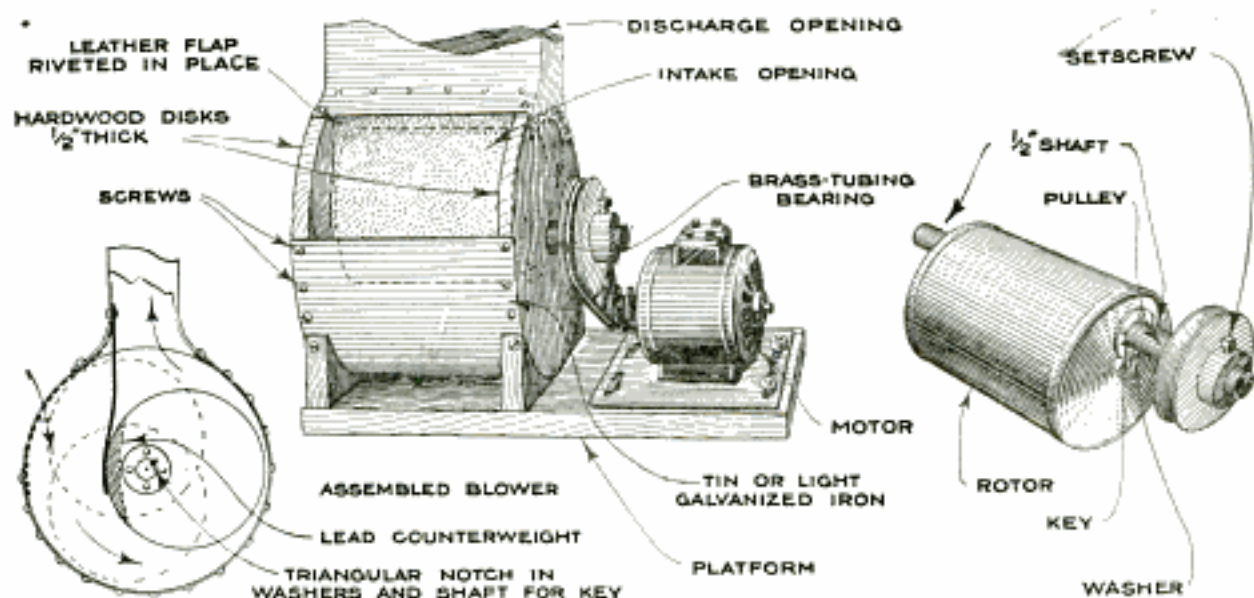
A ROTARY blower that will suffice for the small shop or laboratory can be made with nothing but ordinary tools, except for the wooden end disks, which should be turned in a lathe for best results. However, if the disks are carefully sawed out, even the lathe will not be needed.

The rotor is made from a sheet-metal cylinder, for which purpose a strong tin can may be used; if an extra good job is desired the cylinder may be built up of heavy sheet metal, using wooden ends. A $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. hole is made in each end of the can, $\frac{7}{8}$ in. from the center, and the holes are reinforced by riveting or soldering on washers with a $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. opening; both holes should line up exactly. A piece of $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. shaft is fitted through the holes, leaving

forming a discharge passage at the top. The wooden ends must be spaced, so that the rotor can turn freely, with about $\frac{1}{32}$ in. of end play. The rotor is put in place before the casing is finally assembled. The discharge opening should be curved, as shown in the section, to provide an easy passage for the outgoing air.

The leather flap valve is an exceedingly important part of the blower; leather that is fairly thick, but very soft and pliable, usually gives the best results. It is attached to the lip of the discharge opening with small rivets, as indicated. It will be observed that there is a little clearance between the rotor and casing so that the former can pass the flap at each revolution without sticking.

The rotor should be counterbalanced

about $1\frac{1}{4}$ in. projecting at one end and 2 in. at the other. Triangular notches are filed in each washer and corresponding grooves are cut into the shaft, so that a piece of brass wire can be forced into each of the small keyways thus formed; the shaft is then soldered or brazed to the can, and the outside ends of the keys cut off flush with the washers.

The casing requires two disks, about $6\frac{1}{4}$ in. in diameter and $\frac{1}{2}$ in. thick; holes are drilled at their centers for the short lengths of brass tubing that form the rotor-shaft bearings. The bearings are forced tightly into the holes, and oil holes drilled in them. The housing is then made from sheet metal, as shown in the drawing, and screwed to the disks, leaving a large opening for the air intake and

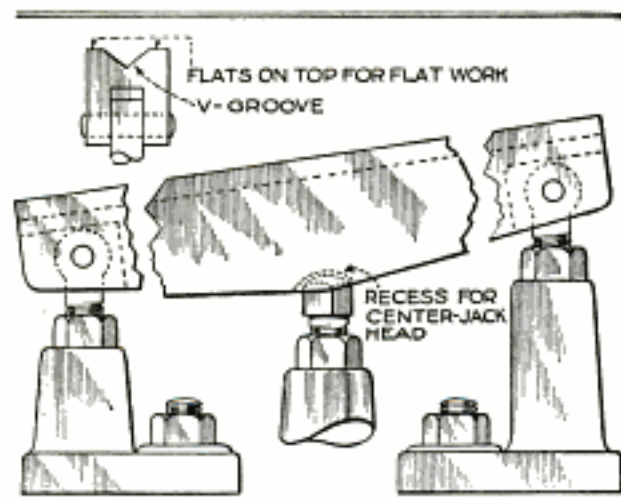
so that it will run smoothly. When it has been finished, rig up the end disks of the casing temporarily so that the shaft can be put in place and rotated. Attach strips of lead temporarily to the outside of the rotor, at the point nearest the shaft, and run the rotor at a speed of about 250 or 300 revolutions per minute to see how it balances. Try pieces of different weights until one is found that allows the least vibration and seems to balance the rotor properly. When the right weight has been found, melt the lead and pour it through a hole in the end of the can so that it will settle and solidify at the point nearest the shaft. The lead will stick in place if, before the rotor is assembled, the inside is cleaned and coated with a little soldering paste.

Give the leather flap a good rubbing with light graphite grease on the side that comes into contact with the rotor, and coat the surface of the latter in the same way, without using too much of the lubricant. The best operating speed will have to be ascertained by experiment, and as the leather valve works itself into shape and acquires pliability, operation will be improved. Sometimes it will be found that a very light strip of wood tacked across the bottom of the leather

will help somewhat. Such blowers can be made in any size, but if made with a housing much smaller than $6\frac{1}{4}$ in. in diameter, the results will be hardly worth while, although it can be made a little smaller and still do fairly good work. It is not intended for high speed; in fact, if driven too fast it will not work well. The operating speed depends largely upon the action of the leather valve, which refuses to function properly beyond a certain speed.

Steady Rest for Tapered Work

The steady rest shown in the drawing will be found a considerable improvement on the ordinary one furnished with a milling machine, which is rather limited

in its use. It consists of a truss-shaped beam, mounted on end jacks as shown, and having a recess cut on the underside to fit on the center-jack head; several center jacks can be used, and the beam made long enough to suit any length of work. A V-shaped groove is cut in the top side, for round work, and the flats are used for flat work. The rest may also be used for grinding.—Henry S. Laraby, New Haven, Conn.

Cheap Concrete Forms

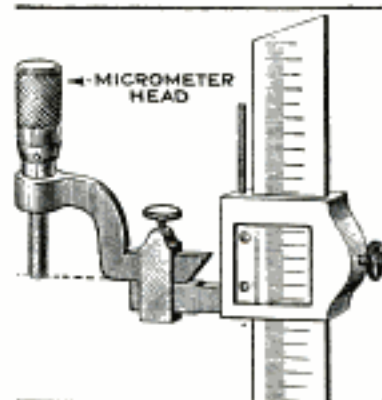
By using tar paper to face forms for rough concrete work, a cheaper grade of wood can be used for making the forms, and the total expense of the forms considerably reduced. They are covered with a single layer of tar paper, and the concrete can be poured in without the danger of its running out through knotholes or cracks. It is also much easier to remove

the forms, since the cement will not stick to them as it will to wood forms in which the joints are not tight. This method is particularly adapted to horizontal floor or sidewalk slabs.

Micrometer Attachment for Height Gauge

In checking a drill jig that had a number of holes in line with each other, I found that a quick method of discovering errors in the location of the holes was to use a micrometer attachment on a vernier height gauge. The micrometer head is fitted into a steel bracket, shaped as shown, and clamped to the gauge in place of the regular blade. When the micrometer thimble is at zero, the end of the spindle is exactly in line with the top of the gauge jaw, thus eliminating any additional calculation. A

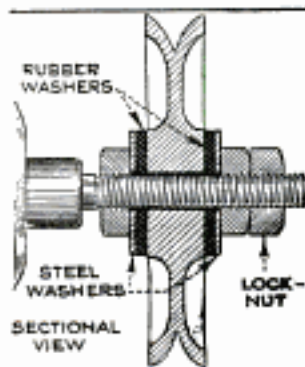
standard pin is fitted in the first hole, and the height gauge is set so that the micrometer spindle touches the top side of the pin. The reading



of the thimble is carefully noted. Having the correct height established in this way, the pin is set into the next hole and the height gauge is slid along so that the micrometer spindle is located above the pin. The spindle is then turned down against the top side of the pin as before. If the reading is the same in both cases the holes are in line; if not, the amount of error is at once apparent. In this way all the holes can be carefully measured.—Alexander Malcolm, Providence, R. I.

Fastening Pulley to Small Motor

A small pulley that is not subject to heavy load can be held on the motor shaft without a key or a setscrew. The entire length of the shaft outside of the motor is threaded and the pulley is fitted

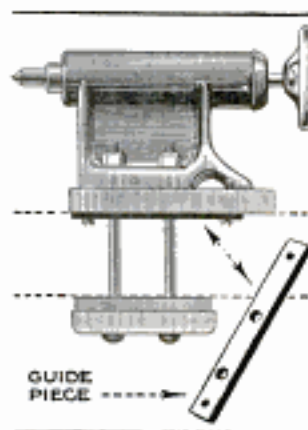


on the shaft between two rubber washers. These are forced tightly against the face of the pulley by means of nuts screwed on the shaft. Thin steel washers are, of course, used between the nuts and the rubber washers, and a locknut is provided, to prevent the other nuts from loosening. With this arrangement the pulley will not slip unless placed under an abnormally heavy load.

Improving Lathe Tailstock Clamp

In a popular engine lathe the tailstock is clamped to the ways by means of two bolts, which pass through the base of the tailstock and extend down through a clamping bar that bears on the lower edge of the lathe bed. As these bolts are held loosely at their upper ends, there is a decided tendency for the clamping bar to bind when the tailstock is moved along the ways, unless the bolts are loosened far enough to allow the bar to clear the lathe bed, which necessitates several part turns of the nuts.

This trouble has been overcome by installing a guide piece as shown in the illustration. It consists of a flat piece of steel, $\frac{1}{4}$ in. thick and $1\frac{1}{4}$ in. wide, with two small holes drilled through it to receive screws that fasten it to the base of the tailstock, and two larger holes which are a snug fit for the bolts. With the addition of this guide piece, a quarter turn on the nuts is sufficient to permit the tailstock to be moved easily.—Edwin Kilburn, Spring Valley, Minn.



Preventing Stream Erosion

Along many streams it is necessary to hold the bank back in some efficient and cheap manner, otherwise the ground will

gradually slump down into the stream, due to the washing away of the banks. An excellent method of preventing this is shown in the illustration.

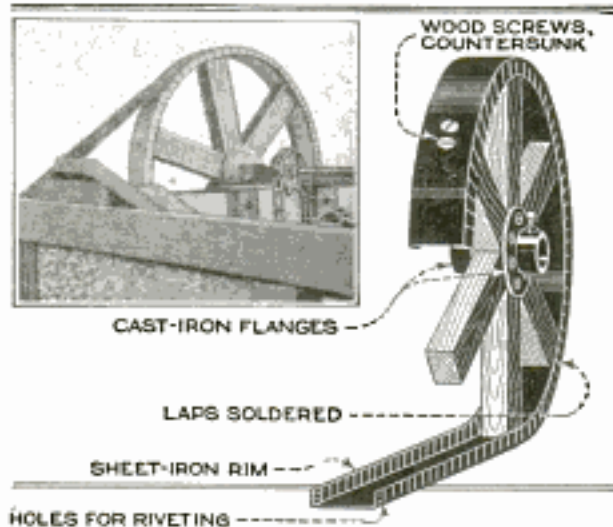
A woven-wire fence is erected where the new water edge is to be made, the fence posts being driven into the bed of the stream. Brush and saplings are then deposited as indicated, the branches pointing away from the water, and the butts inserted into the fencing. Earth is thrown on the brush to make the wall solid, and in a short time the new bank is knit together by marsh grasses and rushes.

Removing Dust from Batch Hopper

During the construction of a large power house, the concrete foreman constructed a square sheet-metal hood and chimney over his batch hopper, to remove the cement dust. A $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. pipe, connected to the compressed-air supply, was arranged so that it pointed up the center of the hood, and, when the air was turned on, a strong suction was created in the chimney, which caused the dust to be drawn up. The expense of this attachment was about \$10, which was more than repaid by the cleanliness of the mixing room and the increased efficiency of the men.—Aaron Evans, Rockport, Wash.

Large Homemade Pulleys

Most mechanics in out-of-the-way places find that when they need a pulley,



Large Pulleys That Are Light but Rigid can Readily be Made in the Out-of-the-Way Workshop

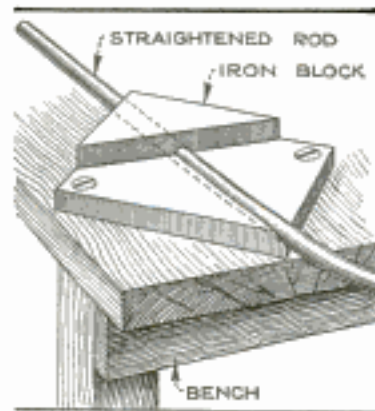
they cannot wait to have it cast, or until one can be delivered, but must have it at once. One resourceful mechanic constructs his own pulleys, when necessary, from wood and sheet metal, as shown in the illustration.

Two cast-iron flanges, specially made for this purpose, and a number of which are kept on hand, form the hub of the pulley, wooden spokes being bolted between them, and a sheet-iron rim of sufficient thickness provided on the outside. The flanges are fitted with setscrews to lock the pulley to the shaft. The spokes are beveled at the inner ends to fit together properly at the hub, and are rounded at the other end to conform to the curvature of the rim. The rim is made of a strip of sheet iron, the length being equal to the circumference of the pulley, plus 2 in. for the lap. Cuts are made along the edges by means of a hacksaw, and the strip is bent along the cuts as indicated. If the sheet metal is light, the pieces cut should be made to overlap each other when the strip is bent around the spokes, but if it is heavy, the cuts should be V-shaped, and of such size that their edges will fit closely together when bent. Solder is then run over the flange to fill the openings between the laps, making the rim rigid. If this is done neatly, and the rim given a coat of paint, the cuts cannot be seen. The ends of the rim overlap about an inch, and are riveted together. The rim is attached to the spokes by means of flat-headed wood screws, the holes being countersunk in the rim.

Most of the pulleys made in this manner have been about 2 ft. in diameter, with a 3-in. face, and for these 6-in. flanges, 2 by 3-in. spokes, and 22-gauge rims have been used. Because of their lightness and rigidity, these pulleys are much preferable to those made of cast iron or wood for slow speeds, especially when they are very large and are to be used on a light shaft.—Jonas Byberg, Silverton, Ore.

Bench Block for Straightening Rods

For straightening brass or copper rods, the bench block shown in the drawing will give excellent results. This device was used for straightening a number of 1/2-in. brass rods that had previously been used on tank work and were bent to a semicircular shape. It is made from a square block of steel, drilled diagonally, the hole being made a trifle larger than the diameter of the rods, and part of the



block is cut away to half its thickness as shown. Holes are drilled in opposite corners for screws to hold the block to the bench. The bent rods are inserted in the hole as

far as possible, then tapped down with a lead hammer and pushed through farther, until the rod passes through the hole.

Before this form of block was made, an ordinary flat block was used, but too much time was required to get the rods straight, as they warped in different directions when struck with a hammer, and it was necessary to go over each one several times. In the case of the block shown, however, the straightened part of the rod remains straight, as it is supported in the hole, and therefore it will be quite straight after it has passed through.—Harry Moore, Montreal, Can.

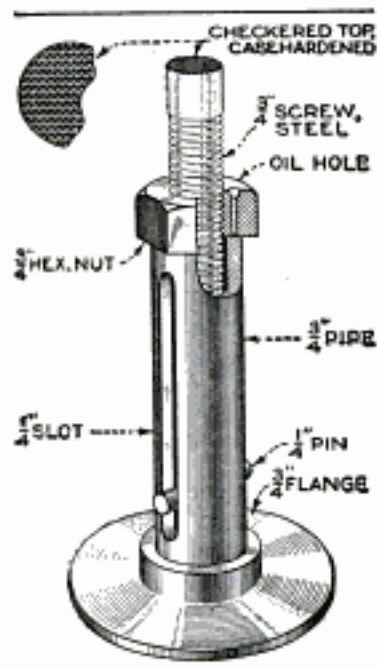
Satin Finish for Goldplated Work

To satin-finish gold, the articles must first be scratch-brushed with a revolving brush made of fine steel wire, the brush being driven at high speed. The brush and work are kept wet with bran water,

which is made by immersing in a gallon of boiling water a bag containing $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. of bran; the bag must be well squeezed to be sure that the water is made "strong." The water is placed in a drip can suspended above the wheel, and a tin or cardboard guard is mounted above the wheel to prevent splashing. After scratch-brushing, the work will show a satin or dulled finish; it is then dipped in hot ammonia water, after which it is plated, using a rather weak current. Bicarbonate of soda and water is afterward used, on a handbrush, to clear the color of the work, which is apt to become rather foggy in the plating bath.

Homemade Jack for Erectors

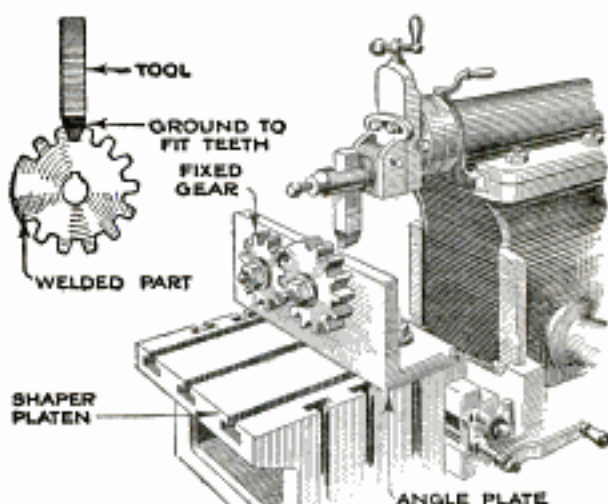
Machinery erectors and other machinists frequently require jacks smaller than the average, which are often too high to



be used to advantage. A set of several small jacks will make erecting and assembling work easier, and will quickly pay for the time spent in making them. The body of the jack shown in the drawing is made from $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. extra-heavy pipe, such as used for hydraulic and high-pressure purposes, fitted at the bottom with a floor flange. The pipe is screwed into the flange flush with its lower face, so as to make a firm and continuous supporting surface. The elevating screw is made from $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. round steel, threaded to within an inch of the head, which is checkered and casehardened to give a good non-slipping surface; the checkering can be done before casehardening by making deep cuts at right angles to each other with a three-cornered file. The screw is drilled and fitted with a $\frac{1}{4}$ -in. pin, which slides in a slot cut in opposite sides of the pipe and prevents the screw from turning. A good casehardened hexagon nut is used to raise and lower the jack.

Cutting Gear Teeth on the Shaper

Gears that had a number of broken teeth filled in by welding were machined

on a shaper by means of the method shown in the drawing.

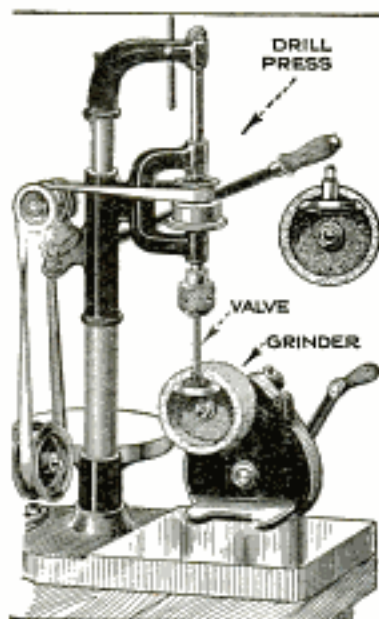
An angle plate was set up on the table of the machine, and a cutting tool was made, using an unbroken section of the gear as a template. The welded gear was placed against the angle plate and secured by a center bolt. A pinion was then bolted to the plate, so as to mesh with the unbroken teeth of the gear to be machined, with one of the good tooth spaces of the gear at the top. The gear was then brought up to the tool to locate the correct position of the shaper table. The welded section was now set under the tool and the cutting commenced, using only the vertical feed. The small pinion meshing with the larger gear was bolted solidly to the plate and was not disturbed until the work was done. As each tooth was cut, the work was turned by detaching it and turning it one tooth, so that a fresh surface of the new metal was brought in front of the cutting tool.

Melting Sulphur

Sulphur is often used to anchor bolts in cement or stone floors, but as it catches fire so easily when melted over an open flame, its use is somewhat inconvenient. This difficulty can, however, be avoided by first melting some lead, and then partly immersing the sulphur vessel in the molten lead. The sulphur will be melted in a short time, and there it will not catch fire, unless the temperature of the lead is allowed to exceed 625° Fahrenheit.

Facing Valves on Drill Press

A novel method of refacing valves is shown in the illustration, a drill press and a hand grinder being used to do the work. A cupped emery wheel is fitted on the grinder, and the valve face is ground with

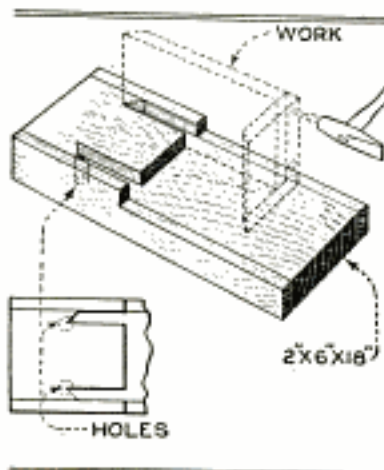


the inner surface. This makes the face round, which, by many mechanics, is considered superior to a flat face, as it seats more readily and uniformly, and the smaller contact surface removes all carbon particles that become lodged on the seat.

The grinder is revolved with one hand while the drill-press spindle is lifted to bring the valve face in contact with the inside surface of the emery wheel. In grinding, only the smallest possible amount of metal is removed from the valve, and therefore the valve must not be held on the wheel for any considerable length of time.

Miter Nailing "Jack"

The miter nailing "jack" shown in the illustration is used for holding the mitered end of a piece of wood while the other end is being nailed as indicated,



the object of the jack being to avoid bruising the beveled edge.

The base of the fixture is made of 2 by 6-in. wood, about 18 in. long. A piece of $\frac{7}{8}$ -in. wood is then cut with recesses for the beveled edge of the work,

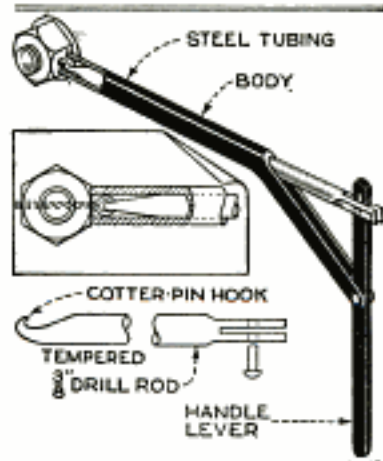
and this piece is nailed solidly to the base near one end, as shown. Strips are

then nailed to the sides to complete the slots in which the mitered pieces are placed while nailing. Small holes, drilled through the base at the points of the slots, prevent the accumulation of sawdust and dirt in the points. The dotted lines show the position of the work when nailing.—F. M. Arthur, Bethune, S. C.

Long-Range Cotter-Pin Puller

The cotter-pin puller shown in the illustration was devised by an automobile mechanic, and has been found to be of considerable assistance in removing cotter pins from places where it is difficult or impossible to use pliers or other tools. This tool can be used without the preliminary work of straightening the ends of the cotter pins, and also without the danger of scratching and bruising the hands.

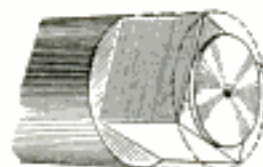
The body of the tool consists of a length of steel tubing of about $\frac{3}{8}$ -in. inside diameter. A $\frac{3}{8}$ -in. steel rod that slides freely inside of the tubing is filed or forged to a hook shape at one end,



as indicated, and the other end is slotted and drilled for a small pin. One end of the tubing is cut and bent to form a support for a handle lever, which is pinned loosely to the end of the rod. The lever is also pivoted on the support extending from the tubing. In use, the body of the tool is held against the side of the nut while the rod pulls the cotter pin, the handle providing a good leverage.

Locating Squares on Shaft Ends

When cutting a square on the end of a shaft, take a square-nose tool and cut down a short length on the shaft end, in the lathe, until its diameter is equal to a side of the square. This enables the mill-



ing cutter or shaper tool to be fed down to the correct depth at once, without further measuring.



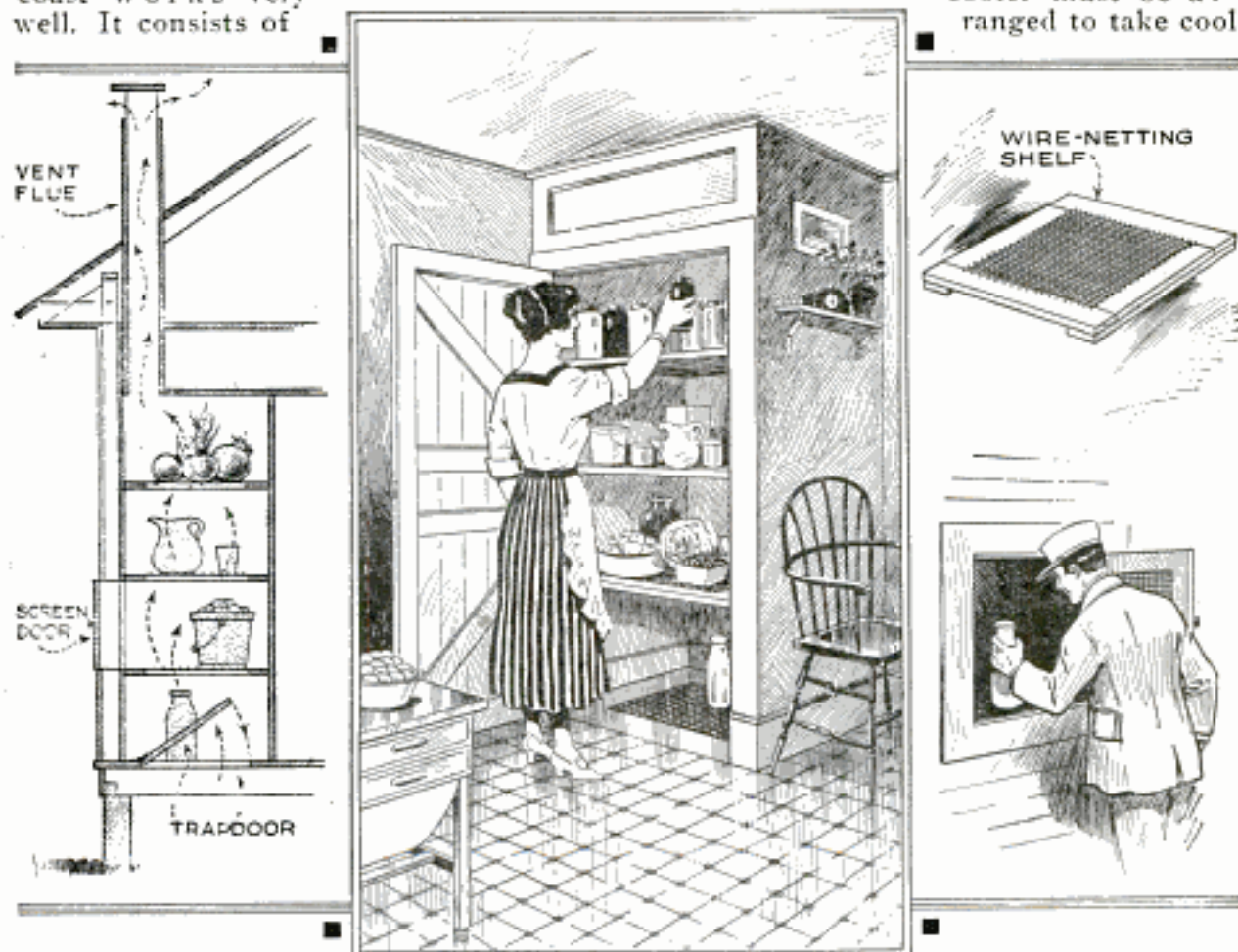
The "California Cooler"

THE "California cooler" is well known on the Pacific coast, and should be better known elsewhere in the country. It is used to keep vegetables and other perishable foodstuffs fresh and sweet, and in the cool climate along the sea coast works very well. It consists of

supposed to keep the food fresh, and, as a matter of fact, does so quite successfully.

For use farther east, however, this simple construction must be modified; as the outside air is often very hot, the cooler must be arranged to take cool

nothing more than a simple closet, fitted with screen-wire shelves, with a small screened opening in the house wall, near the bottom, and another at the top. Fresh air enters the closet through the lower opening, and passes out of the upper one; the constant current of air is

air from the cellar, and to make it pass through fairly rapidly.

A closet, of matched boards and of any size convenient, is built in one corner of the kitchen, on an outside wall. From the top, a sheet-metal or wooden flue is run above the roof, as shown in the left-

hand drawing. This is better than merely cutting a hole in the side wall, as, when the flue is heated by the sun, the air within it rises more rapidly, drawing the cool air in at the bottom. The vent is usually made 4 in. in diameter or 4 in. square; in the drawing, it is shown passing through a low attic, but in my own bungalow it runs up through a second-story room, behind a wallboard partition.

Near the bottom of the closet, an opening, about 8 in. wide and 12 in. high, or any other convenient size, is cut through the wall. This is cased in, and a small screen door fitted in place with spring hinges. In the bottom of the closet, an opening is cut through the floor, and fitted with a small trapdoor, about 12 in. square. The trapdoor opening, as well as the opening in the vent, should be covered with fly-screen wire.

The shelves are made of heavy galvanized cellar-window wire netting, tacked to 1 by 2-in. wooden frames, and resting on cleats screwed to the inside of the closet.

In cool weather, the trapdoor is kept closed, and the air taken from the outside. When the outside air becomes too hot, the trapdoor is opened, and the screen-door frame filled with a piece of wallboard or thin wood, cut to fit nicely and held in place by turn buttons.

The cold closet will not do away with the refrigerator by any means, but I have found that for a large part of the year it enables one to get along without ice very well. If milk bottles are wrapped in a wet cloth and set in the cooler, the current of air causes rapid evaporation and keeps them quite cold. Fresh meats are put in closed kettles, and the kettles wrapped in wet cloths; fruits and vegetables do not require this, as the cellar air keeps them cool enough.

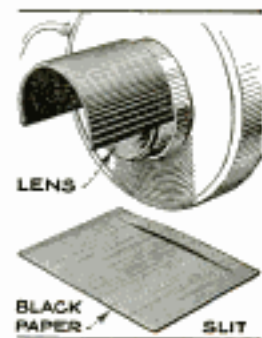
Milk and grocery deliveries can be made through the outer door, and for the milk especially this is a decided advantage, as it is placed in a cool place at once, not left in the hot sun as usual. All told, the constructor of a California cooler will not regret it.

Emergency Lens Shade

All motion-picture cameras are provided with lens shades, which is the reason that the operators can obtain such

effective scenes "shot" against the sun. Amateur photographers will profit by using such a shade. One can easily be made from a card or piece of paper of a dark color, preferably black. Cut a piece to suitable size and make a slit in the end equal to exactly half

of the circumference of the lens tube. Open the slit and slide the shade over the lens as shown. To cover the entire lens, use two cards.



Bucket Used as Heater

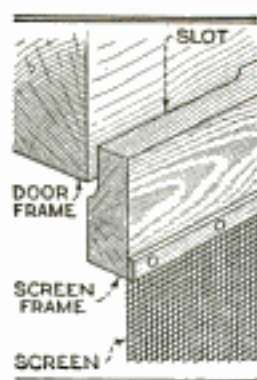
During cool weather in spring and fall, when it is not necessary to use a furnace, but some heat is necessary to take the "chill" from the room, oil and gas cookstoves are frequently used. Although these provide considerable heat, it does not radiate properly, but rises to the top of the room. This difficulty can be avoided by placing an ordinary metal bucket, with holes punched

in the bottom to permit air circulation, in an inverted position over the burner. The heat given off by the stove will then radiate from the sides as well as the top, causing a more even distribution of the warmth.—Joe H. Hudner, Bautista, Calif.

Fly Exit on Screen Door

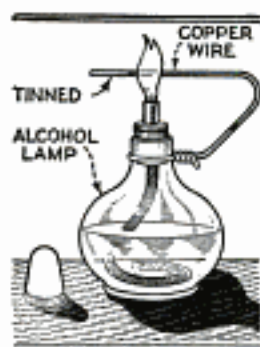
Despite care in keeping screen doors shut, flies will gain entrance, and will collect on the inside of the screen where they have no means of escaping until the door is opened and they are driven out.

If a slot is cut or planed along a short length of the top edge of the screen-door frame, as shown in the illustration, the flies, which constantly crawl from the bottom to the top of the door, will be attracted by the strip of light and will crawl through the slot to the outside, but as the inside of the slot is not so well lighted, they will not return. It is still better, if possible, to cut a few slots where the screen joins the frame, which can be accomplished with a little more trouble. The planed surface is then painted a dark color.—Harold E. Benson, Boulder, Colo.



Soldering with Alcohol Lamp

A very convenient method of soldering the wire connections on radio sets, or on any other delicate work, is to use a piece of copper wire heated by the flame of a small alcohol lamp. The lamp can be



purchased for about 40 cents at any physicians' or dentists' supply house.

The length of copper wire, which should be No. 14 gauge, is thoroughly cleaned, twisted around the neck of the lamp with a pair of pliers, and bent to pass through the upper

part of the flame, leaving about $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. of the end projecting beyond the flame. This end is tinned in the usual way, and used as the soldering bit. Experiments will determine how far the tip must extend from the flame to obtain the best results. The device insures a hot point of constant temperature, and because of its size, it is much more efficient than a soldering iron for small work.

Saving the Gatepost

Careless drivers often neglect to allow sufficient clearance between the wagon and the gatepost when driving in a large load, and as a result the post is often struck and loosened, or it may even be broken.

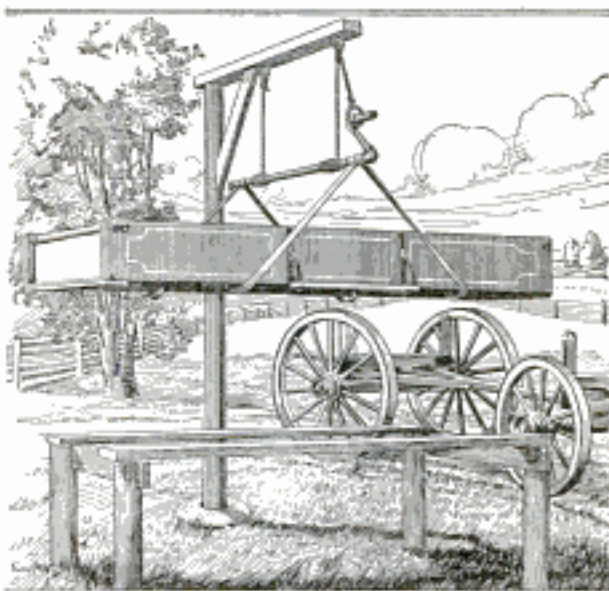
To prevent this, a farmer mounted an old wagon wheel on a 2 by 4-in. timber and spiked it on the top of the fence post, so that the tire projected about 3 in. beyond the post, as shown. The wheel was



bolted to the timber, a thimble from an old wagon axle being used for the wheel to turn on, and a large washer and nut on the upper end prevented the wheel from being lifted up. When a load passes through the gate too close to the post, it strikes the wheel, and the wheel keeps it clear of the post.

Easily Made Wagon-Box Derrick

On the average farm it is seldom that more than one set of wagon trucks is kept for the different boxes and racks, and this naturally necessitates frequent



Simple Derrick Used for Hoisting Wagon Boxes and Racks: It can Easily be Operated by One Man

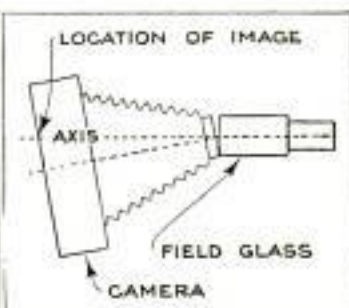
changes to meet the seasonal requirements. The task of lifting the boxes is usually beyond the strength of one man without some mechanical assistance. For this reason the revolving derrick shown in the illustration was designed. With it one man or boy can easily remove a box or rack from the truck and place another in position.

The standard of the derrick is a 6-ft. oak post, set in a cement base; the post fits loosely in the base so that it can be easily turned, the socket being filled with hard grease to facilitate swinging. A 6-ft. arm projects at the top and is supported by a stout brace. Two strong ropes are attached to the arm with eyebolts, as shown, and a windlass, made of $1\frac{1}{4}$ -in. pipe, is suspended from the ropes, the ends of the ropes being securely attached to holes drilled in the windlass. The hooks are made of heavy tire iron, bent and sharpened at the lower ends to hook under the box, and with eyes forged in the upper ends to hang on the pipe. A short length of rope with an iron ring is tied to one of the eyebolts, and is used to hold the pipe crank, to prevent it from unwinding.

☐ A waterproof glue is made by dissolving gelatin in hot water, to the consistency of thick cream, and adding a tablespoonful of acetic acid to each pint.

Miniature Photography

There are many cases where miniature photographs are better than none at all, and if the photographer is running short of films and is carrying a pair of field glasses along with him, he can, after an

experiment or two, get a considerable number of negatives on the space that would ordinarily be a single $3\frac{1}{4}$ by $5\frac{1}{2}$ -in., or similar, negative.

First focus the field glasses on a distant object in such a manner that the image seen seems to be at a distance. This is termed "focusing for parallel rays," and is most easily done by looking at the distant object with the unaided right eye, while at the same time looking with the left eye through one barrel of the glass, which is also directed at the distant object. Focus the glass until the left eye sees the image of the object just as distinctly as the right eye sees the object directly. This focus may be marked once for all by making a scratch on the draw tube of the glass to mark the position.

In practice, the focusing device of the camera is set for 100 ft., and the draw tube of the field glass is set at the scratch. The objective, or large lens, of the field glass is held firmly, in proper alinement, against the lens or lens mounting of the camera, with the small end of the field glass directed toward the view to be photographed. The exposure—time or snap—is made in the usual manner. Upon development the result will be a miniature photograph of a size proportional to the power of the field glass. All the light entering the camera will fall upon a small circular area of the plate or film, on the axis of the lens system, the rest of the film being untouched by light. This fact

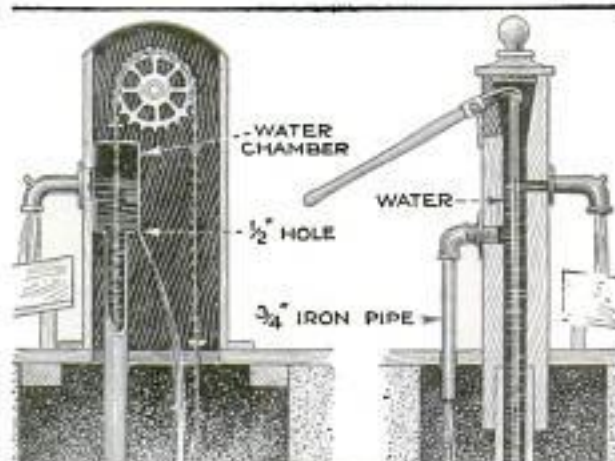
makes it possible, after an exposure, to turn the film forward by an amount equal to the diameter of the miniature negative and then make another exposure for a new picture.

The illustration shows how two such exposures were made using a film shift of 2 in., which was larger than necessary. In the case of this particular camera (postcard size), it is quite possible to take nine of these miniature photos on the $5\frac{1}{2}$ -in. strip of film normally devoted to one photograph. A little dexterity in holding the axis of the camera lens system at a slight angle to the axis of the field glass, as shown in the diagram drawing, will enable one to take three of the miniature negatives without shifting the film at all, one where the axis of the camera lens system strikes the film, and one on each side of this spot. This scheme may be followed for each shift of the film so that upon development one has three rows of miniatures extending from end to end of the film, resulting in a possible 150 exposures on an ordinary six-exposure film.

Care should be taken, however, not to tilt the glass much; a slight movement only is required, and too much will admit light between field glass and lens, fogging the film.

Aerating Well and Cistern Water

The water in cisterns and slow-running wells is apt to become more or less stagnant. This can be remedied by aerating

a part of the water in the manner shown in the illustration.

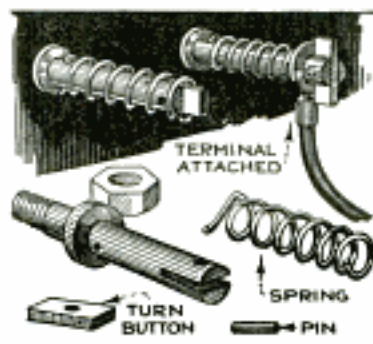
In the case of a chain pump, a $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. hole is punched in the bottom of the water chamber toward the rear, as indicated, so that part of the water will

escape through it and fall back into the cistern. While falling, the water is broken into drops, and these absorb some of the oxygen of the air, which purifies the water and improves its taste.

A similar method can be used on an ordinary plunger pump, by drilling a hole about 4 in. below the level of the spout and screwing a $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. nipple into it. An elbow and a length of $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. pipe are fitted onto this nipple, so that part of the water will be returned to the well.

Quickly Detachable Binding Posts

On electric switchboards and panels where wires must be changed frequently, quickly detachable binding posts of the kind illustrated are much better than the ordinary kind, on which the nuts must be screwed down so tightly, to prevent them from being jarred off by vibration, that a wrench must be applied to loosen them, which, of course, consumes considerable time.



The binding post shown consists of a short, shouldered copper rod, threaded at one end and slotted at the other. The threaded end is pushed through the hole in the panel, and a nut is screwed on from the opposite side. A washer is then slipped on from the slotted end and also a coil spring. The inner end of the spring is pushed through a small hole, drilled through the post near the shoulder, as indicated. A brass turn button, which must not be wider than the diameter of the post, is riveted loosely in the slot, so that it can be turned around to either of the two positions shown in the upper details. It is then an easy matter to attach or remove the terminal of a conductor by turning the button parallel to the post. The coil spring keeps the lug tight against the button, assuring good contact, and as it can be compressed considerably, several conductors can be attached to the same post.

☞ To freshen the appearance of the leather chair seats, bags, etc., that are shabby from wear, rub them with the well-beaten white of an egg.

Serviceable Camp Stove

The drawing shows a serviceable camp stove that can be made at small expense, and that will give excellent service. It

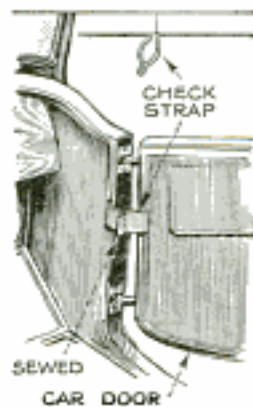


A Serviceable Camp Stove, Made from a Steel Oil Drum, and Equipped with a Chimney

consists of a half of a metal oil drum, the head being used as the stove top. A square hole is cut in the side, near the bottom, to serve as a door through which the fuel is supplied. Just below the top, and opposite the fuel opening, a 4-in. hole is cut, and a sleeve is welded on so that a 4-in. elbow and a length of stovepipe can be added, thus providing a chimney. —C. K. Meller, Fargo, N. Dak.

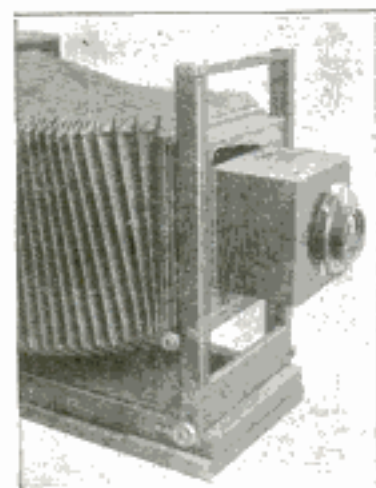
Improving Auto-Door Straps

The leather or fabric straps used on automobile doors, to prevent them from swinging open too far, sometimes cause trouble by bending the wrong way and jamming between the door and door frame, thus preventing the door from being closed, and also straining the hinges or loosening the screws. To overcome this, fold the strap and sew a hem at its center, as indicated in the illustration. This will cause the strap to be bowed outward, and prevent any further trouble. The hem should not be so large that it will shorten the strap much.



Photographing Objects Full Size

When it is desired to photograph small pictures or other objects in natural size, a short-focus lens can be used, but, as this gives greater distortion, it is much better to lengthen the bellows, which should be double the focal length of the lens used; that is, if a camera with a 7-in.



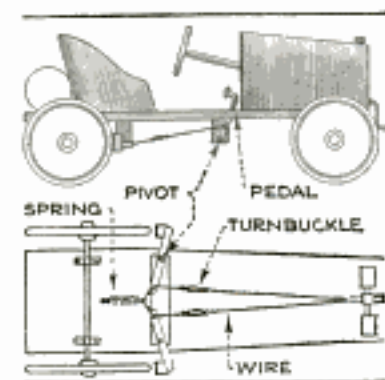
lens is used, the bellows must be extended 14 inches in order to record the image in natural size.

The best method of increasing the focal length is to use a "cone," which is merely a tight-fitting box attached

to the lens board, the lens being removed from the latter and fitted to the cone. The cone may also be fitted to the lens-board opening; if fitted to the lens board itself, the latter should have as large an opening as possible, so that the rays from the lens will not be cut off from the edges of the plate. If the cone is made sufficiently long, objects can even be photographed enlarged.—J. G. Pratt, Washington, D. C.

"Pushmobile" Brake

On a toy "pushmobile," the usual brake is a short lever, operated by hand and pressing on one wheel. An improvement upon this, consisting of two brake levers, with leather-faced blocks attached



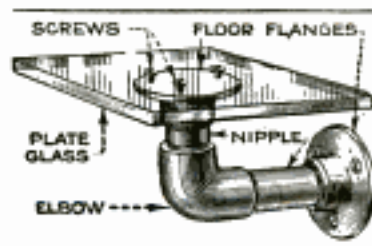
at the ends, and a pedal to operate them, is shown in the illustration. The brake levers pivot at their centers on a block attached to the underside of the car. A coil spring, connected to the inner ends of both levers, and attached to the underside of the car as shown, holds the outer ends away from the wheels. Two

wires are attached to the brake beams at the same points as the coil spring, and are connected to the pedal. Turnbuckles are used on the wires to take up the wear of the brake surfaces. Pressure on the pedal applies the brakes to the wheels, and the coil spring disengages the blocks from the wheels the moment the pedal is released.—Harold E. Benson, Boulder, Colo.

Broken Windshields Make Plate-Glass Shelves

Pieces of plate glass, cut from broken windshields and mounted on brackets made of pipe and fittings, form attractive and sanitary shelves.

The glass is cut to the desired proportions and the edges are ground down. Three holes are drilled and countersunk in the glass to receive flat-head screws. The holes are drilled with an old three-cornered file, held in a breast drill, a mixture of emery and water being used as an abrasive. The holes are countersunk by means of a piece of steel ground to a 60° point, used with the same abrasive. It is surprising how quickly the drilling is accomplished. Care must, of course, be taken to feed the drill lightly, so as not to break the glass.



The bracket consists of two floor flanges, two short nipples and an elbow, all nickelplated and arranged as shown. The glass is screwed to one flange and the other flange is attached to the wall. When attaching the shelf to the bracket, a piece of thin felt should be used between the flange and the glass to absorb any uneven pressure of the screws.

Insulating Paint

The sealing composition found on storage batteries makes a good insulating paint. If placed in a container and set in hot water, it will melt readily, and can then be applied with a paintbrush. Nearly every car owner has an old storage battery available for this purpose, but if not, the composition can be obtained from a battery-service station at small cost.—C. M. Wilcox, Torrington, Conn.

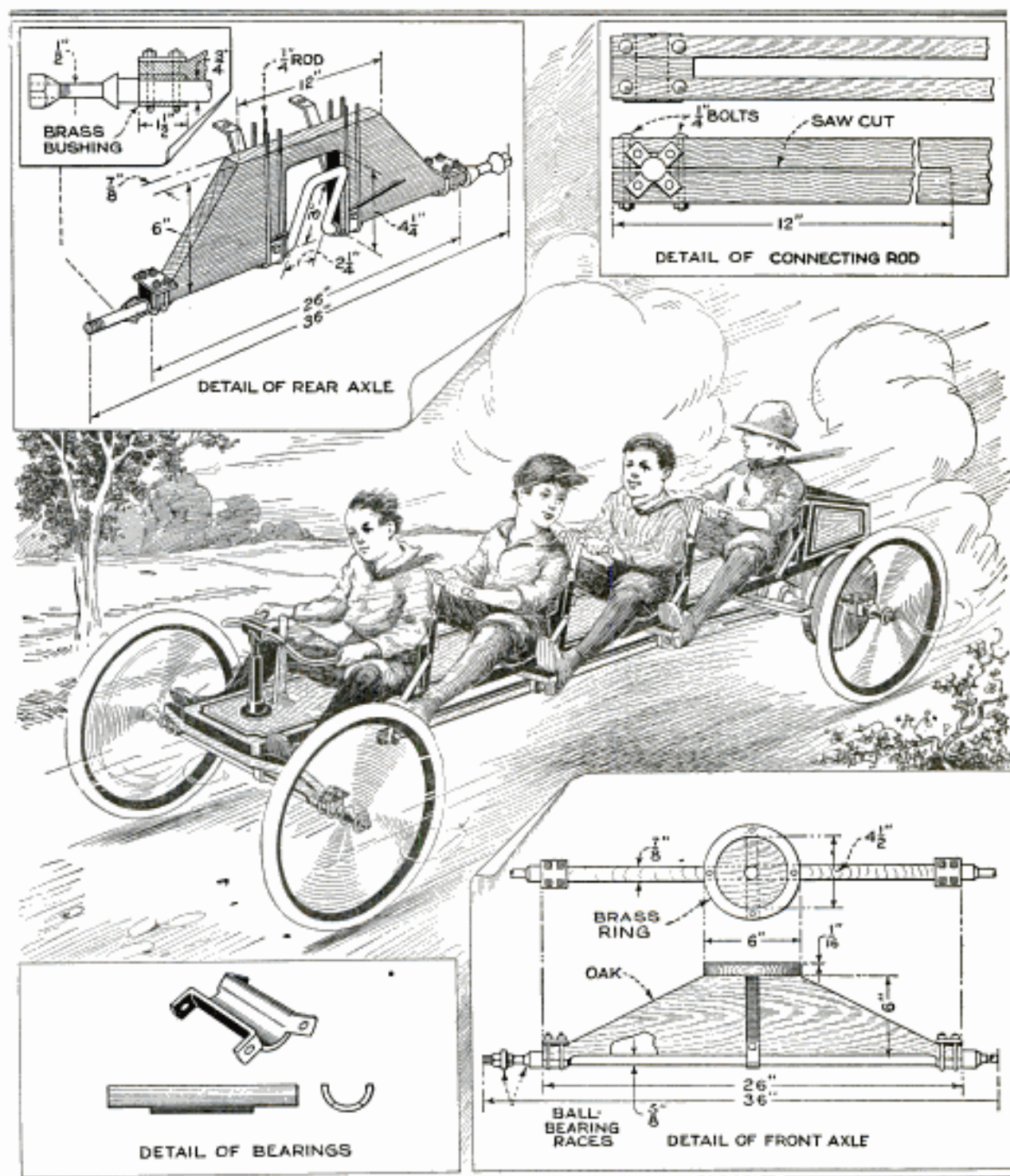
Building a Four-Passenger Hand Car

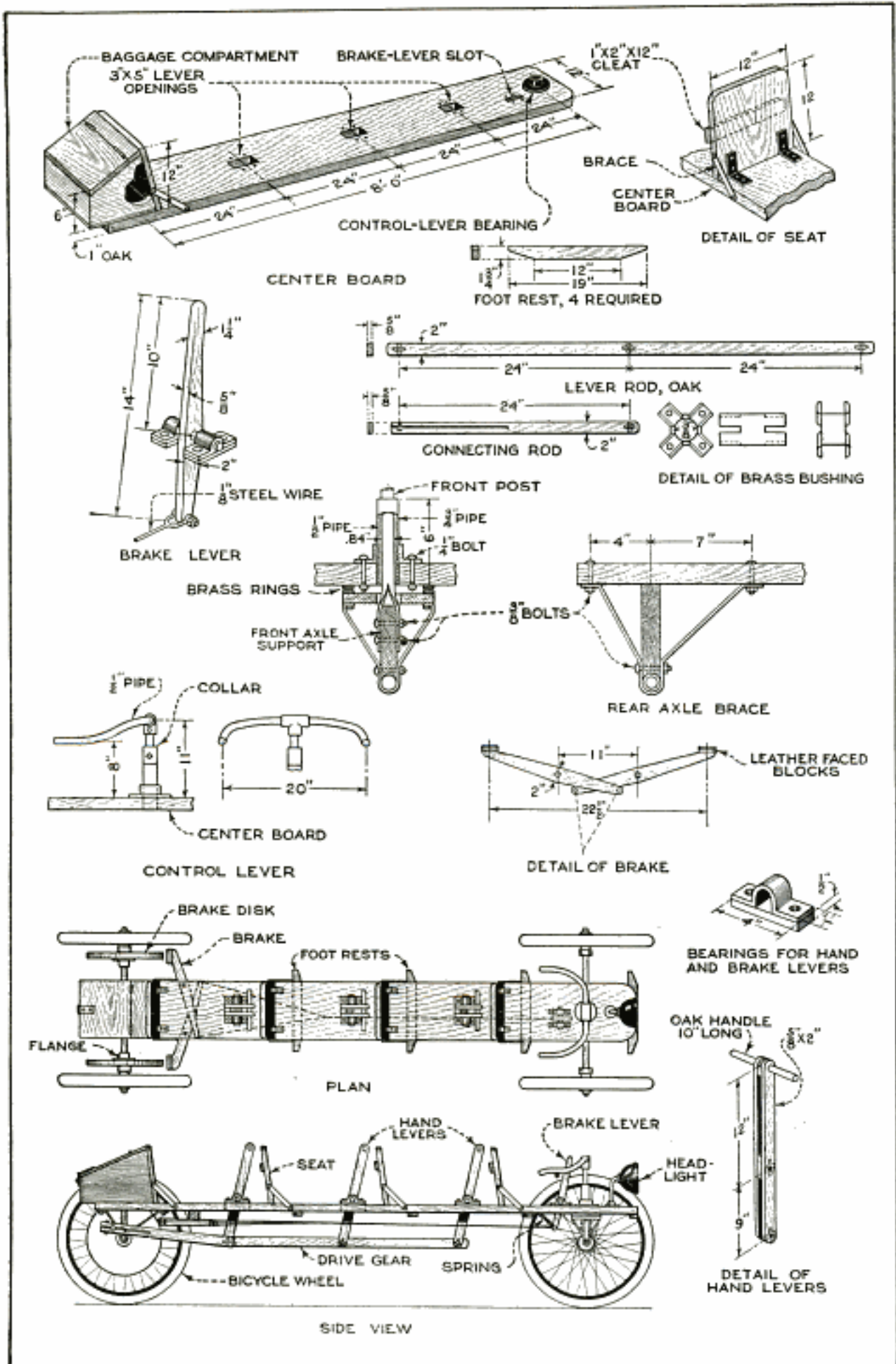
THE four-passenger hand car described in this article will provide a great deal of healthy exercise and fun for the boys building it, and as most of the parts are made of wood, and are designed to be made with simple tools, a group of boys should not encounter any great difficulty in its construction.

The main member is a 12-in. oak plank,

1 in. thick. The exact length will depend to some extent upon how long it is desired to make the baggage compartment, and whether or not a headlight is desired, but the plank should not be less than 9 ft. long. Four 3 by 5-in. slots are cut along the center line of the plank, as shown in the detail of the board, and a hole to fit a $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. pipe is bored at the

forward end, on the center line of the front axle. The axle centers are 8 ft. apart. The axles are made and attached first; it will probably be beyond the skill of the boy to make his own axles, but any blacksmith will turn them out if given a copy of the drawings. The rear axle is made from $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. iron or steel, with a crank of 3-in. throw, $2\frac{1}{4}$ in. wide, forged in the center. It is turned down at the ends to $\frac{1}{2}$ in. diameter, threaded, and fitted with the cone nuts that hold the wheels firmly in place. These nuts can be obtained from any cycle-supply house. The axle runs in bushings made of brass tubing, which are held to the wooden axle frame by U-bolts; these bolts are also best made by the blacksmith, as well as the flat-iron axle braces.

The front axle is made of $\frac{5}{8}$ -in. round steel, fitted in the same manner as the rear axle, but the front wheels can be allowed to run freely on the axle and provided with regular bicycle ball bearings, if desired; in this case, no brass bushings will be necessary, the axle being tightened firmly against the axle bracket. On top of the axle bracket or support, a 6-in. disk of wood is fastened, and a brass ring screwed to this, as indicated. This ring bears against a similar one screwed to the underside of the main board. This arrangement permits the front axle to be turned easily if the rings are kept oiled. The method of pivoting the front axle should be closely studied. A piece of $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. pipe is threaded into a floor flange, which is bolted to the main board; the end of the pipe passes through the hole in the board. A $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. pipe passes through the $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. pipe, and is split at the lower end, drilled, and bolted to the axle support; this forms the steering post, and is fitted with a collar that bears on the end of the $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. pipe. The upper end of the post is fitted with a tee, and the handlebars, also of $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. pipe, are screwed into this after being bent to shape.

The drive arrangement is very simple, and all parts are made of oak, bushed with brass tubing for bearings. The pieces of tubing are sawed at the ends to form ears, as shown in the details, drilled, and the ears bent so that they can be bolted to the levers and connecting rod. The end of the long lever rod fits between the ends of the connecting rod, and is attached to it by a $\frac{3}{8}$ -in. pin, fitted with washers and cotter pins. The hand levers are connected to the lever rod in a similar manner.

The construction of the brake is quite

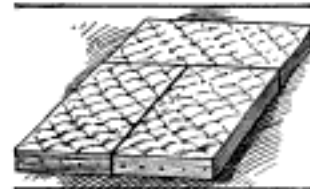
clearly shown in the drawings; as the brake is only used for emergency stops, all ordinary stopping being done by gradually slowing up on the hand levers, the brake disks may be omitted, and the brake levers allowed to act directly on the rear wheels. If brake disks are used, they should be turned and fitted with floor flanges, setscrewed to the shaft. This will necessitate lengthening the shaft by an amount equal to twice the thickness of one disk and flange. The rear-brake levers may be connected to the hand-brake lever by light rods, in which case a spring on the hand lever will release the brake, or by heavy steel wire, which will require a spring to be fitted to each rear-brake lever. The details of the bearings for the hand and brake levers are quite clearly shown; they are bolted to the main board as shown in the plan and side elevation.

Where greater speed is required than can be obtained with the direct drive, a gear drive can be fitted. A small pinion gear with about 15 teeth is keyed or pinned to the rear axle, the crank being omitted, and a gear with about 75 teeth is mounted in bearings in front of it so that the teeth will mesh. This gear should be provided with a $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. pin, screwed into it 3 in. off center, and the connecting rod shortened and fitted on the pin. This will give a much greater speed than the direct drive.

The seats should be padded with burlap, stuffed with excelsior, and tacked to the board. For long trips, an acetylene or electric bicycle headlamp and an oil tail lamp should be carried, fastened to the main board by simple brackets.

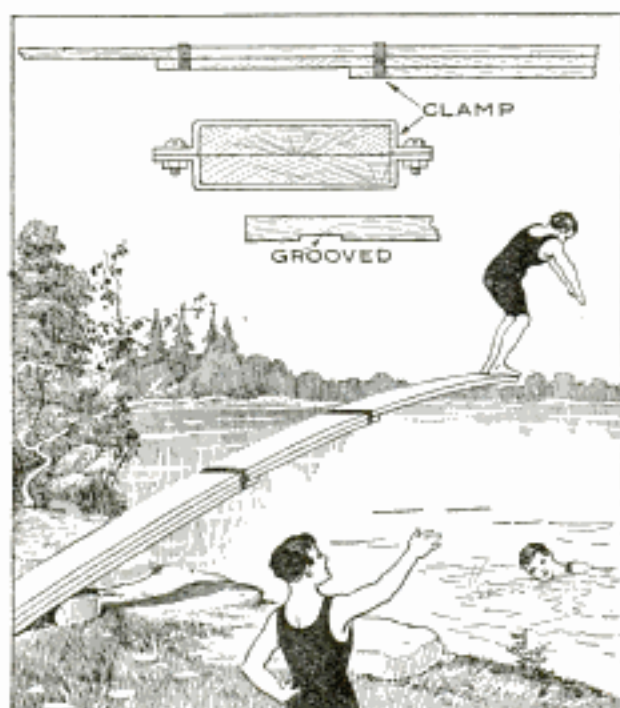
A Three-Piece Mattress

An ordinary mattress, cut into three equal pieces as shown in the drawing, and with the cut edges rebound with canvas and strong waxed thread, will be found of advantage in the sick room. Each piece is very easily handled, making the job of airing the bed much less laborious than with the full-size mattress. In addition to this, if the three pieces are interchanged often, the formation of lumps or hollows is prevented, as the weight is evenly distributed over the mattress, thus adding greatly to the comfort of the patient.



Making a Diving Springboard

A springboard for the swimming pool or the "old swimming hole" that actually has "spring" to it, is made by connecting

three boards somewhat after the manner in which the leaves of an automobile spring are assembled. In this way the spring obtained is much greater than that produced by any single board.

The top board is the longest, the next is about 3 ft. shorter, and the lowest one is about 4 ft. shorter than the second. The inner ends of the boards are set flush, and all three are fastened together throughout with screws, and at the points illustrated with iron clamps, which should be as unyielding as possible and made with sufficient space between the ends so that the boards can be clamped together tightly. The clamps are fitted into grooves cut on the underside of the bottom and middle boards, but the upper surface is not countersunk.—Robt. P. Lincoln, Minneapolis, Minn.

Turf-Cutting Tool

A single-bladed chopping knife can be made into a turf cutter for edging lawns around walks and flower beds. It is only necessary to remove the wooden handle with which the chopper is provided, and to drive the tang into a longer handle, which may be the handle from an old spade, or similar implement.

Using Badly Worn Phonograph Records

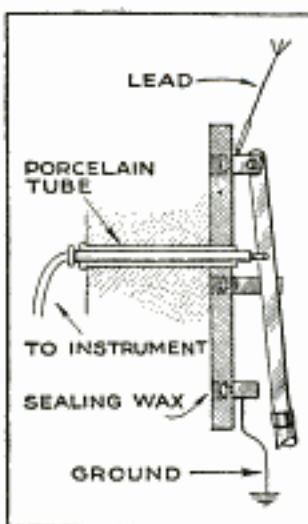
Some of the older phonograph records in every collection have become concave, and, from constant use, much of their original quality has been lost. One of these can be used to improve the playing of other records, however. To the convex side of the record, four felt or leather washers, just thick enough to keep the record out of contact with the turntable, are glued at equal distances. The record, so fitted, is then placed on the turntable, and the record to be played placed on top of it. This arrangement will slightly increase the volume of sound and also bring out the low tones more distinctly.—James E. Noble, Portsmouth, Ontario.



Plug-Type Aerial-Ground Switch

In order to use a radio set without running a permanent wire into the house from the aerial, an arrangement similar to the one shown in the drawing can be used. The lightning switch, which is of the single-pole, single-throw type, is opened or grounded as the plug is attached or removed. The switch is arranged on the outside of the building.

A hole is drilled through the window casing or wall, in line with the switch blade; this hole should be $\frac{13}{16}$ in. in diameter and a $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. porcelain insulating tube inserted into it. A second tube, $\frac{3}{8}$ in. in diameter and 2 in. longer than the first, is fitted with a strong spring switch clip small enough to pass through the larger tube. The wire running from the clip through the smaller tube should be regular high-tension automobile-ignition cable, and a flexible cord, which reaches to the instruments, is soldered to this. It



will be seen that when the inner tube is pushed through the outer one from the inside, the clip will make contact with the switch blade and at the same time push it out, breaking the ground connection. Upon pulling the plug in, the aerial is automatically grounded, but there is no metallic circuit into the house. A stop is provided to prevent the switch blade from being pushed out too far.—Edwin J. Bachman, Fullerton, Pa.

How to Make a Bed of Boughs

Thousands of men who camp in the woods sleep on twig beds, but it is safe to say that comparatively few know the proper way of making such a bed, so that it can be slept on comfortably. The mere cutting of a mass of branches and covering it with a blanket does not make for that enviable comfort so much talked of by old campers. A single thick branch will cause a sleepless night, not to mention what an armful unevenly distributed will do. There is only one way of making a



twig bed that is worth while. The twigs selected should have stems not thicker than $\frac{1}{4}$ in., while smaller ones would be still better. Take a canvas or blanket, go to a tree, cut off a supply, and bring it in. Two men working at the job will

soon have the bed ready for the night. The head of the bed should be higher than the foot, and the drawing shows how the twigs should be arranged at an angle, with the butts of the stems resting on the ground. In this manner the thick matting of the twig tops will keep the body from coming into contact with the sticks. When completed, stretch the covering blanket over the boughs. It should be mentioned that it is a good idea to fasten straps or cords at the four corners of the covering canvas or blanket; these can be tied to the tent pegs and drawn tight. Balsam-fir and cedar twigs are the best materials to use for the purpose; branches from most other trees are practically useless.

Basket on Pole Hives Bees Safely

A Wisconsin beekeeper, whose general farm work allows very little time for capturing the swarms that escape his

apiary, has found the method illustrated both easy and quick. The device used for the work, he claims, has saved him many hours of labor as well as numerous painful stings.

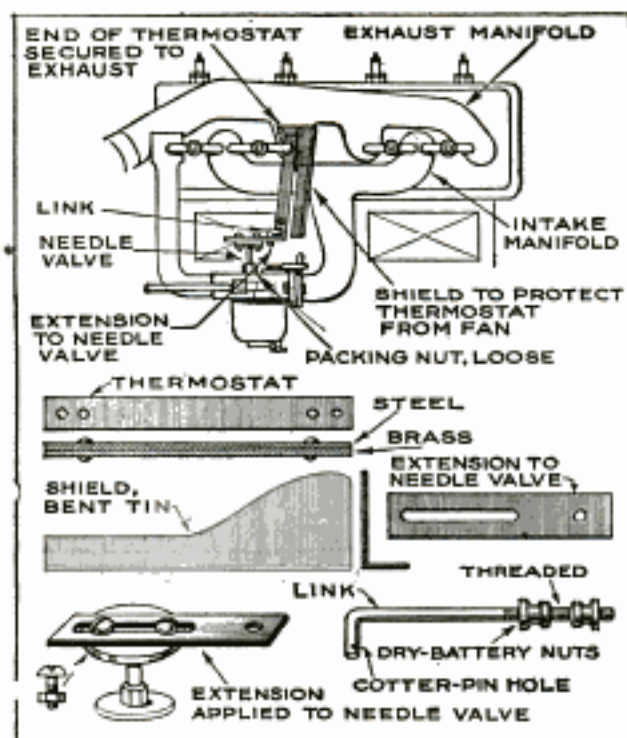
The device is simple to make. It consists of a circular rim and a supporting fork made of $\frac{1}{4}$ -in. iron rod, and a cone-shaped screen-wire basket attached to the rim as shown. A stout cane fishpole is used for a handle, making the device light and easy to handle.

When the bees swarm, they usually alight in one of the trees of the orchard, and often at such a height that it is almost impossible to capture them. As soon as the swarm is located and fairly settled, the basket is raised under the swarm and shaken so that most of the bees will drop into it. Of course, many bees escape but they will return to the swarm and cluster on the outside of the basket. When all is quiet again, the basket is lowered in front of an empty hive and the bees are induced to enter their new home without much trouble.—G. E. Hendrickson, Argyle, Wis.

Thermostat Control for Carburetor Needle Valve

By adding a simple thermostat, the needle valve of an automobile carburetor may be regulated automatically without

attention on the part of the operator. The thermostat operates an extension on the needle valve, opening it slightly when the engine is cold and closing it when the engine warms up. The thermostat is made by riveting two pieces of dissimilar metals together, in this case strips of brass and steel. Metal, about $\frac{1}{8}$ in. thick by $\frac{1}{2}$ in. wide, is suggested. Owing to the fact that one of these metals expands considerably more than the other when heated, the thermostat will form the arc of a circle. By fastening one end of the thermostat securely in the manner shown, the opposite end is made to operate the carburetor.

On a common type of light car the upper end of the thermostat can be fastened underneath one of the manifold clips, and the lower end connected to the needle valve by an extension rod, fitting into an adjustable extension fastened to the top of the needle-valve wheel. By making the connecting link adjustable, various settings can be tried until the best effect is obtained. With the light-car engine, the needle valve should be opened a quarter turn for starting, and then turned back as the engine becomes warm; and approximately the same

rule will apply to similar types of carburetors. With a heat-controlled regulator of this type, the thermostat must be shielded from the direct blast of the fan by means of a shield, cut from a piece of tin and fastened under the thermostat.

Breaking Force of Water from Hose

A great disadvantage in irrigating a garden with an ordinary hose is the washing away of the ditch or furrow banks, owing to the force of the water as it issues from the hose. This trouble can easily be overcome by taking two cans, one somewhat smaller than the other, and arranging them as shown in the illustration. A hole is made in the bottom of the larger one, to receive the end of the hose, and the



small can is placed inside the larger, with its open end toward the hose. Both cans are fastened together by means of a wire, run through them as shown. In use, the arrangement is placed in a ditch, the hose is fastened in place, and the water is turned on. The water strikes the end of the small can, is deflected back, and issues in a slow, broad stream from the opening between the cans.

Nonslip Feet for the Tripod



Those who do much photographing in the home experience considerable trouble in keeping the tripod from slipping on linoleum or hardwood floors. By pushing an ordinary fuller ball from a faucet over the point on each leg of the tripod, no further

trouble will be experienced, as the rubber balls will hold the tripod securely on any surface.—K. H. Hamilton, Chicago, Ill.

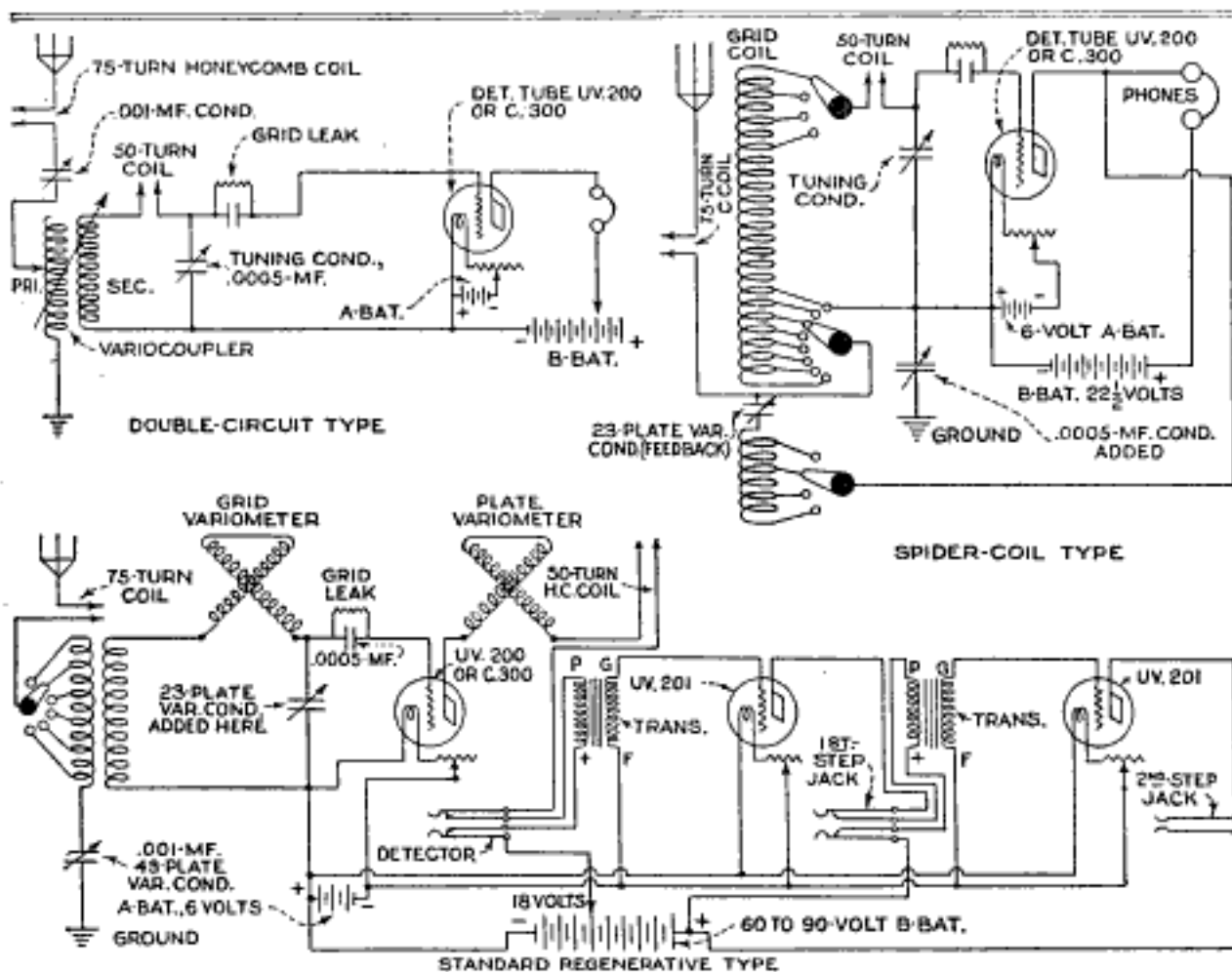
Increasing Wave Length of Receivers

BY F. L. BRITTIN

THE National Radio Conference recently held in Washington has made radical changes in the wave lengths on which the various broadcasting stations are permitted to operate, with a view to clearing the air for public benefit. The new wave lengths allotted to broadcasting stations that are now operating below 3,150 meters, can be divided into three classes, namely: Class A, which includes those stations not using more power than 500 watts and which are to operate on wave lengths between 288 and 300 meters; Class B, which includes stations

to enable them to receive stations operating on wave lengths greater than those for which their sets were originally designed. Most receiving sets now in use were built to tune to wave lengths from 200 to 500 meters, when using the average type of aerial, and in these cases it is only necessary to make minor changes in order to enable the operator to tune to maximum signal strength.

If a very short aerial is used, an inductance is necessary in the aerial circuit, controlled by means of a variable condenser connected in series with the

using power from 500 to 1,000 watts, to use wave lengths from 300 to 545 meters, and Class C, which includes stations that are operating on a 360-meter wave length and that will be permitted to continue using this wave length.

On account of these new rules, many amateur radio fans are confronted with the problem of making the proper changes in their receiving instruments,

aerial. Honeycomb coils are excellent inductances to use for this purpose, as they are small, compact, and easy to install. Another method of adjusting the antenna circuit to longer wave lengths is to place a variable condenser across the tuning inductance. The condenser should have a capacity of .0005 mf., which is generally known as the 23-plate size, and be of the vernier type.

On the double-circuit type of receiver, using a variocoupler, a 75-turn honeycomb coil is placed in the aerial circuit between the aerial and the primary of the variocoupler, and a 50-turn honeycomb coil is connected in the secondary circuit, this coil being placed in the lead running from the secondary tuning condenser to the secondary winding of the variocoupler, as shown in the upper left-hand diagram. A method of switching out this coil must, of course, be provided in order to permit tuning to the shorter wave lengths. In the case of a single-circuit receiver, using a tuning coil and a variable condenser in the aerial or ground circuit, a 75-turn honeycomb coil is placed in the aerial circuit.

With a regenerative receiver of the spider-coil type, the wave length can be increased by placing a 75-turn coil in the aerial circuit between the aerial and the coil, and a 50-turn coil in the secondary or grid-coil circuit, between the switch

and the variable tuning condenser, as shown in the upper right-hand diagram. A .0005-mf. variable condenser is also placed in the ground lead to assist in tuning.

In the case of a standard type of regenerative receiver, consisting of a variocoupler and two variometers, a 75-turn honeycomb coil is placed in series with the aerial circuit, and a 50-turn coil in series with the plate variometer; a 23-plate condenser is also connected across the grid variometer and the secondary winding of the variocoupler, as shown in the lower diagram.

The circuit diagrams show exactly where to connect the honeycomb coils and condensers. Switches must be provided for cutting out the coils when they are not required. These switches can be mounted on the panel in any convenient position. Single-coil mountings are now on the market, and they can be attached to either the front or rear of the panel.

Doorstop Made from Hook

It is frequently necessary, when sweeping, scrubbing, or moving pieces of furniture in and out of the house, to provide



some means of holding the screen door open. A simple and effective stop can be made from a screen-door hook. The hook is straightened out as indicated and screwed into the lower part of the door, a screwhook being driven in near it, for the hook to rest in when not in use. When it is desired to hold the door open, the hook is lifted from its place with the toe, and allowed to drop down so that the point digs into the floor.

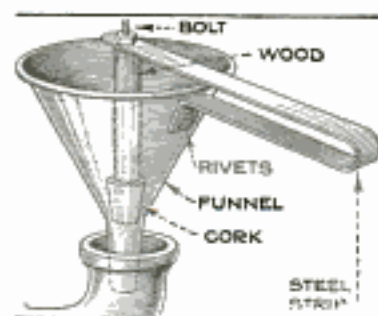
Blackening Metal Parts of Camera

Interior metal parts of cameras must be colored a dead black to prevent light reflections. Brass parts can be painted with a solution of copper nitrate, followed by an application of nitrate-of-silver solution, after which the metal is heated until the color is deep enough. Zinc is placed in a fixing solution of hyposulphite of soda and chrome alum, which

will turn it a dark green. Both metals can be lacquered by heating and applying shellac or hard-drying varnish, if used on the outside of the camera.

Combined Oil Funnel and Container

A combination funnel and container which is of considerable convenience, is shown in the illustration. Any ordinary metal funnel can be used for this purpose, providing it is large enough to hold about a quart of oil. A strip of flat spring steel is riveted to the side and bent over as indicated so that the loose end comes over the center of the funnel; a hole is drilled through this end. A short length of round wooden rod, and a cork that just fits into the wide part of the neck, are both drilled lengthwise to receive a long bolt, then attached to the end of the handle as shown. Pressure on the handle forces the cork into the neck of the funnel, closing it, and allowing the funnel to serve as a container or carrier for the oil. When the liquid is to be discharged, the pressure on the spring is released, and the cork is pulled out of the neck.



Handy "Built-In" Shoe-Polish Box

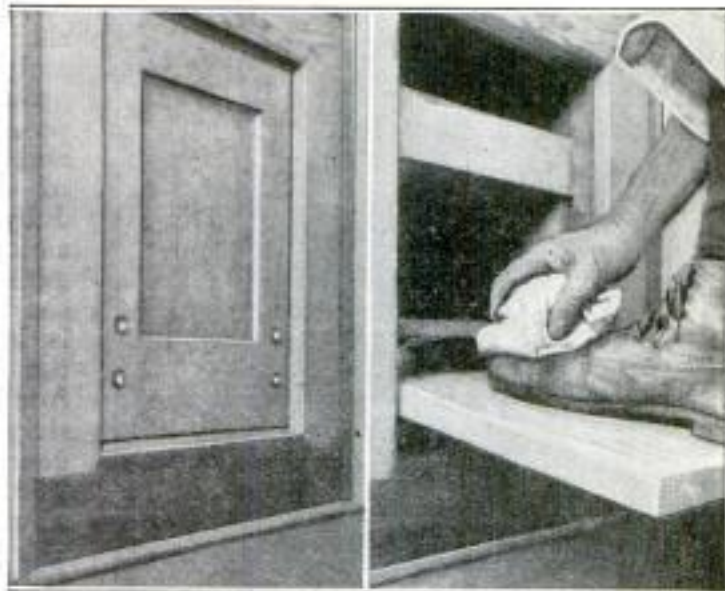
Convenience and usefulness are combined in the "built-in" shoe-polish box shown in the photograph. It provides space for keeping the polishes and brushes, and when opened, serves as a footrest as well. Being small in size, it can be installed in any suitable place in a wall, as it slips between the studs, which are usually spaced 16 in. apart.

Build the box of 1-in. stock, 12 by 18 in. inside measurements, gaining the top and bottom pieces into the jambs. The depth should be such that after the back, which is made of panel veneer or other suitable thin stock, is nailed on, the front of the frame will be flush with the plaster when the box is set in place. The shelves and partitions indicated in the photograph should be set back from the front edge of the frame $\frac{3}{8}$ in. so as to form stops for the door, which measures $1\frac{1}{8}$ by 12 by 18 in.

The door pivots on a piece of $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. gas pipe, $13\frac{3}{4}$ in. long. The ends are carried in holes bored in the side jambs, $2\frac{1}{2}$ in. from the bottom and $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. from the front. Ordinary pipe straps screwed to the inside of the door act as hinges. A stop must be so placed inside the frame that the door, when open, slopes forward at a convenient angle for the foot.

Case the box to match the trim of the

room, bringing the inner edges of the casing flush with the inside of the box. It has been found that the most convenient height for the box is about 1 ft. from the floor, measuring from the bot-



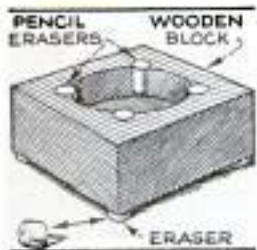
Convenient Box for Shoe Polish and Brushes: The Door Opens to Serve as a Footrest While Polishing

tom of the box. The edge of the lower casing will then bear against the top of the baseboard.

If the box is to be installed in a house already built, cut out the plaster and laths between two studs until the height of the opening is 20 in. Cut two lengths of 2 by 4-in. wood and nail these between the studs, above and below the opening, so that the casing nails may be driven into them.

Homemade Ink-Bottle Holder

A serviceable ink-bottle holder that can easily be made from a block of wood and some ordinary pencil erasers, is shown in the illustration. A block of $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. wood, about 4 in. square, is obtained, and a circle, a trifle larger



than the bottom of the ink bottle, is scribed on one side of the block, in the center. Then another circle, with a radius $\frac{3}{8}$ in. larger and concentric with the first, is scribed on the

block. The circles are divided into four equal parts by scribing diagonal lines from corner to corner of the block. At

the points where the lines intersect the outer circle, punch marks are made, and holes, a trifle smaller in diameter than the rubber tips of pencils, are drilled with the punch marks as centers. The large hole for the ink bottle is then drilled to the desired depth.

Pencil erasers are forced into the four holes drilled for them. As is apparent, they serve to hold bottles of slightly varying diameters snugly. Pieces of pencil erasers are attached to the underside of the holder with small brads to serve as feet and prevent marring of the finish of the desk or table. Two coats of black shellac give the holder a good finish.

"Propping" Pear Trees with Twine

A successful California fruit grower has found ordinary binder twine a good substitute for the wooden props ordi-



Binder Twine as a Substitute for Wooden Props Ordinarily Used to Support Fruit-Tree Limbs

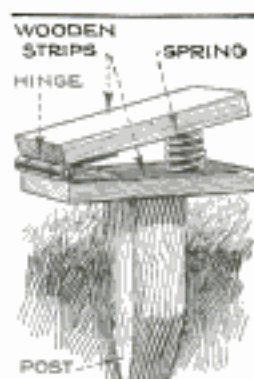
narily used to support heavily loaded branches of pear trees. The twine is wound around the tree as if it were a huge bundle of grain. This is done after the fruit is well set on the trees, but before it is large enough to bend the limbs. The work of tying up the trees is conveniently done by two persons. One carries a ball of twine and a forked stick to hold the twine at any desired height while moving around the tree, and the other, mounted on a stepladder, ties up the branches. It is frequently necessary to wind the twine around the tree several times at different heights.—W. L. Salvage, Beaumont, Calif.

Saving Radio Tubes

After completing a radio set and hooking up the batteries, it is highly advisable to apply a voltmeter to the filament terminals of the sockets before inserting the tubes, with the rheostats first off and then turned to operating position. If the voltmeter indicates more than the filament voltage of the tube, look over the wiring and see if the B-battery lines are connected across the filament lines, and make the proper changes. Under no conditions should the tubes be subjected to a higher voltage than that for which they are designed, as the filaments will be burned out very quickly.

Stop for Garage Doors

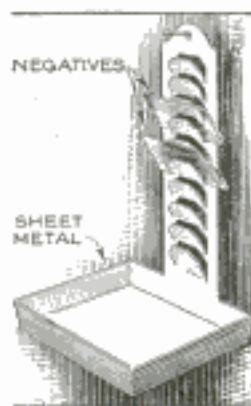
The usual method of "propping" the garage doors to hold them open may be dispensed with by providing an automatic stop of the kind shown in the illustration. A short post is sharpened at one end and is driven into the ground near the open position of the door, and two short strips of wood, about 1 by 3 by 8 in. in dimensions, are hinged together at one end as shown. A coil spring is fastened between the strips to raise the free end of the upper



strip, the ends of the spring being stapled down. The lower strip is nailed to the post so that the hinged end points toward the door when the latter is opening. When the door is swung open, the bottom strikes the inclined plane of the upper strip and, after depressing it, slips over the end; the spring then lifts the strip and prevents the door from closing. A stake should be placed beyond the stop to keep the door from swinging open too far. When driving the post into the ground, care should be taken that the post is sunk deeply enough into the ground so that the door will be sure to slip over the strips.

Convenient Drying Rack for Negatives

The drawing shows a convenient rack for drying negatives. It is made of sheet zinc or brass, and can be hung on the wall, or placed on the bench or table. It is made of sheet metal, cut to shape, with the wide end formed to make a shallow tray, while the long strip is bent at right angles to the tray. Cuts are made in the strip as indicated and the parts so formed bent out to an angle of about 45°.



A small hole is drilled at the top of the rack so that it can be hung on the wall. Plates must be placed in the rack with the emulsion side up, or the film surface will be scratched, ruining the negative, and all sharp edges must be rounded off smooth.

Musical Instruments from Cigar Boxes

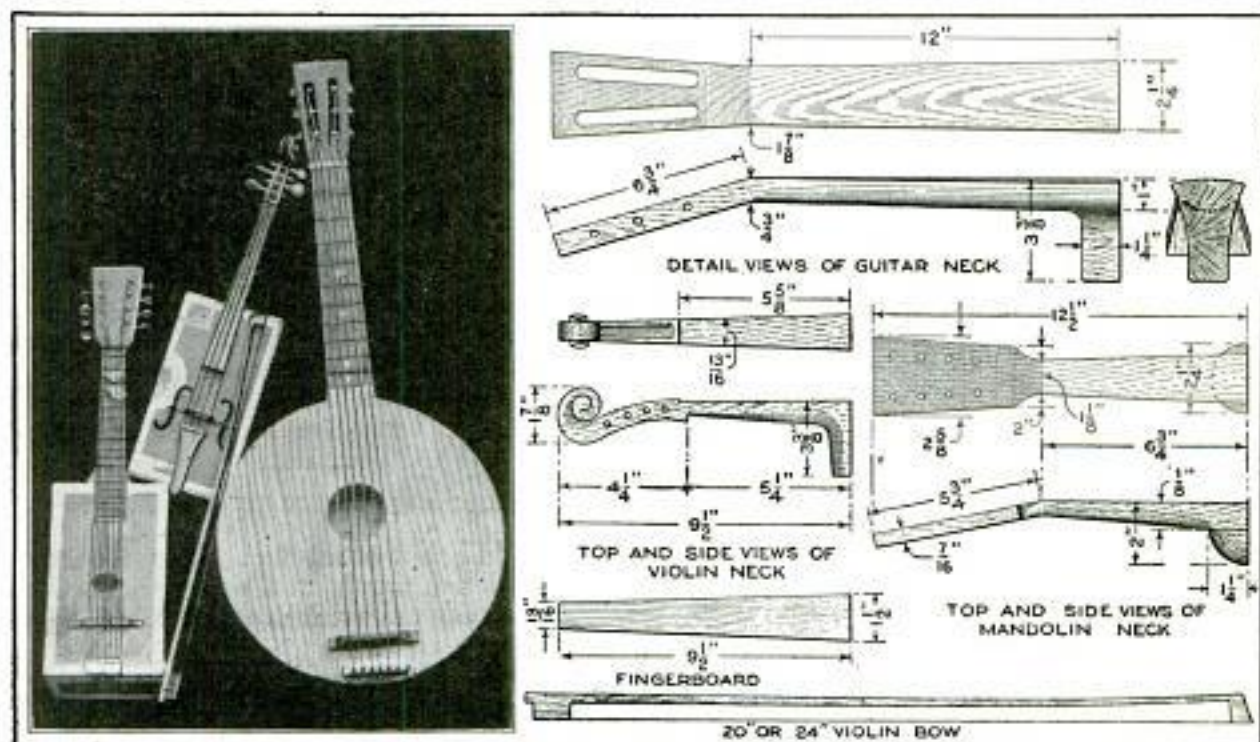

CIGAR boxes, which may generally be obtained for the asking from any tobacconist—who will be glad to get rid of them—can be used to make very passable violins and mandolins. Of course, it is not expected that a "fiddle" of this variety would possess the tone of a Cremona or Stradivarius, but, in the hands of one knowing how to play such an instrument, very creditable results may be attained.

The drawing shows the dimensions and appearances of the various necks in case it is desired to make them at home. However, if the best results are desired, it is recommended that these, as well as the bridges, tailpieces, strings, and simi-

box, to make it stronger. When the neck has been completed, drill two or three holes through the block and box into the neck for screws; then glue the neck in place, and screw it on tight. Next fasten the fingerboard in place, drill a hole in the rear end and rear block, and glue into it a small peg to hold the tailpiece. The bow is also made of poplar, and the hairs can be obtained from a long-tailed horse or bought from a music store; ordinary thread can even be used, where it is not possible to obtain horsehair, or to purchase a bow.

For the mandolin, a box about $5\frac{1}{2}$ or 6 in. wide, $2\frac{3}{4}$ to $3\frac{3}{4}$ in. deep, and $9\frac{1}{2}$ in. long, will be best. The lid, as in the

lar fittings, be purchased from a music-supply house. If made at home, poplar should be used.

The cigar-box violin should be made from a box about 3 in. deep, 5 in. wide, and from $9\frac{1}{2}$ to 13 in. long, according to the person for whom it is made. Let the lid form the back of the instrument, but do not nail it down until the work has been completed. Glue a block, $\frac{3}{8}$ in. wide by $2\frac{1}{2}$ in. long and the same depth as the box, in the end to which the neck is to be fastened, and a smaller block at the opposite end. Cut the F-shaped sound holes in the top and then drive in a few more nails around the edges of the

violin, forms the back and is not fastened down until the remainder of the work is done. The sound hole, which is about at the center of the box, is $1\frac{1}{4}$ by $1\frac{3}{4}$ in. in size. Glue a piece of wood, $\frac{1}{4}$ by $\frac{5}{8}$ in. in dimensions, across the box, midway between the sound hole and the end of the box, to keep the bridge and fingerboard from pressing in the top. A block, $\frac{3}{8}$ in. wide by 3 in. long, and the same height as the box, is glued inside at the neck end. The neck is made as indicated in the drawing, and is attached to the box as described for the violin.

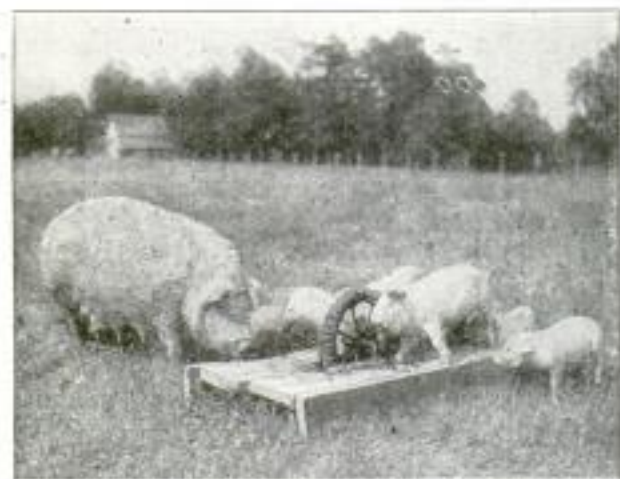
The guitar is made from part of a cheese box instead of a cigar box. A box

made from a single piece of wood, instead of one made up from three-ply veneer, should be selected. Cut the rim down to $3\frac{1}{4}$ in. in width, and attach the neck at the point where the ends meet, after fastening a $\frac{3}{4}$ by $3\frac{1}{4}$ by $3\frac{1}{4}$ -in. block on the inside. The neck, when in place, must stand above the rim a sufficient distance so that, when the top is applied, the neck will be flush with the top. After the neck has been fitted, as described above, the top and bottom can be put on; these pieces may be sawed from pine, poplar,

or almost any kind of lumber, about $\frac{1}{8}$ in. thick. The sound hole is a little above the center and is $2\frac{3}{4}$ in. in diameter. The top is glued and nailed to the rim and is reinforced by three $\frac{1}{4}$ by $\frac{5}{8}$ -in. strips that are glued edgewise across the underside of the top to prevent it from being pressed in. It is also advisable to glue two or three such strips on the bottom before it is attached. A lug, $1\frac{1}{4}$ in. long by $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. wide, is left on the bottom cover, and fastened to the underside of the neck.

Homemade Hog Oiler

An easily constructed hog oiler, made from a wheel taken from an old wheelbarrow, is shown in the photo. The

wheel, covered with burlap, is mounted in its original bearings on the wooden base that contains the oil trough. The wheel turns as the hogs rub against it, thus continually taking up a fresh supply of oil. This treatment keeps the hogs free from lice and other vermin.

Making Sparrows Useful

If a small quantity of cracked corn is thrown on the heads and under the stalks of cabbage plants, the sparrows will gather up the corn, and, while getting down through the leaves after the small grains, will also eat the cabbage worms.

Some corn is first scattered near the patch to attract the birds, and the grain is then thrown in and around the head of the cabbage plants about every two days; if the patch is a large one, every three or four days will do. The sparrows will not eat the cabbage, but will get the green worms.—Joe Dunn, Meyerdale, Pa.

Vacuum Cleaner "Blows" Organ

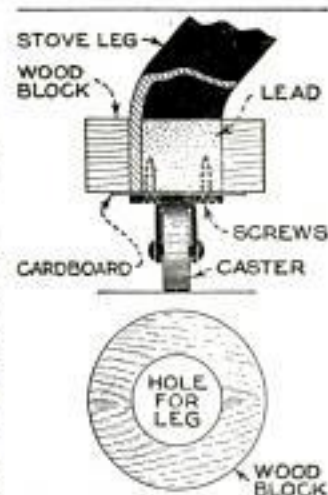
In a church where an ordinary reed organ with pedal-operated bellows was used, it was desired to install an electric blower. As the reeds of such an organ are sounded by suction, the air being exhausted from the wind chest by the bellows, it was found that a common vacuum sweeper could easily be made to do the work. A small hole was cut in the wind chest, and the end of the vacuum-cleaner hose inserted, the connection being made air-tight. The cleaner itself was set in the basement where it could not be heard while running. The result was entirely satisfactory, the cleaner doing the work just as well as an expensive electric blower.—Phil H. Brehmer, Rutland, Vt.

Attaching Caster to Oil Stove

The addition of casters to an oil stove, which is ordinarily not fitted with them, increases its convenience considerably, as it can then be moved about more easily.

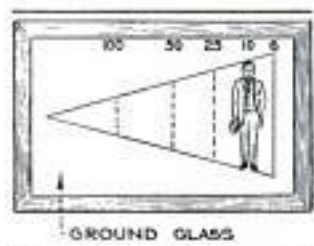
A piece of 1-in. hardwood is cut to a circular shape and a hole is drilled through it as shown, so that the leg of the oil stove fits in the hole snugly. The bottom of the hole is closed with a cardboard disk, a flat-top caster is placed in position underneath it, and the caster screws pushed up through the cardboard.

Melted lead is poured into the hole in the block from above, and this, when cool, will hold the screws securely.



Using Camera Finder as Range Finder

Any small camera finder, having a ground glass, can be used as a range finder by marking two horizontally converging lines on the ground glass as shown in the illustration. Distances of 6, 10, 25, and 50 feet from the camera are marked off on the ground, and, with

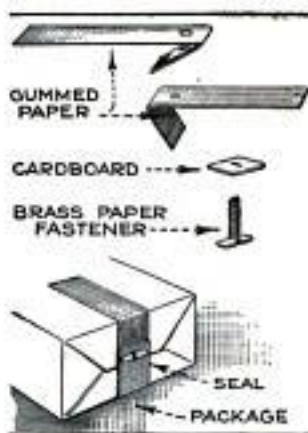


a person of average height standing at these points successively, his position is marked on the ground glass at the points where the images of head and feet

touch the upper and lower lines. Vertical lines are drawn between the points thus located and the distances marked on. If the finder is too small for many figures, the lines marked can be the same as those on the focusing scale, and the numbers dispensed with. Thereafter, when making a snapshot, it is only necessary to find the line corresponding in height to the person to be photographed in order to know the correct distance to set the scale.

Package Fasteners

When it is necessary to send a package at unsealed-mail rates, and a supply of regular parcel-post package seals is not on hand, perfectly satisfactory ones can readily be made from two 4-in. strips of 1-in. gummed paper, such as is used for sealing packages. Fold over about $\frac{3}{4}$ in. at one end of each strip and insert a flat-headed brass paper fastener, as shown, in one of



the strips, and a small piece of cardboard in the other. Then stick the ends down to hold the fastener and cardboard in position. Punch a hole or cut a slit through the piece of cardboard for the fastener to pass through, and then fasten the strips to the package as shown, so that it can be opened for inspection by the postal authorities.—Leighton Powell, San Francisco, Calif.

Temporary Wire Fences

The photograph shows the construction of a temporary fence for "hogging down" corn or other forage crops on a



Temporary Wire Fence That can be Set Up or Taken Down in a Very Short Time

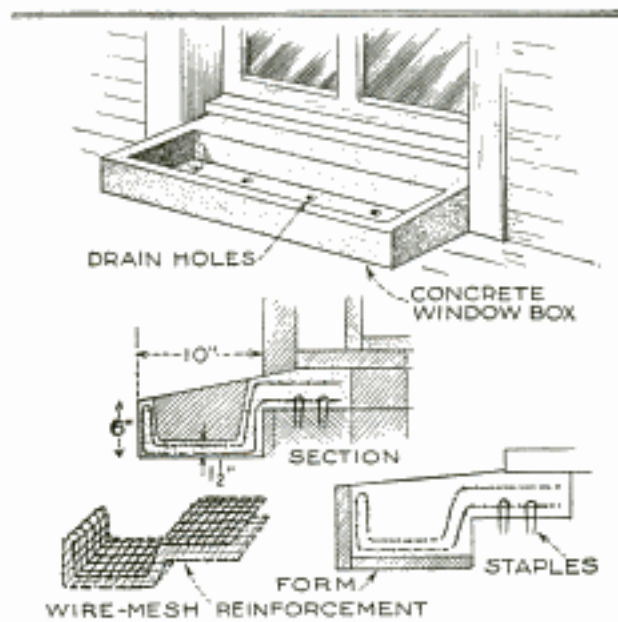
farm. Each stake is made from a length of pipe, which is flattened at one end so that it can be easily driven into the ground. A number of holes are drilled in the pipe, in pairs, at equal distances apart, and a small loop made of wire is inserted into each. The wire fence is then stretched in the usual way, and a long straight piece of heavy wire is slipped down through the small loops to hold the fence in place. With this arrangement the fence may be put up or taken down in a very short time.

When Felloe Bolts Become Loose

Bolts that are used to hold demountable rims in place on the felloe have a tendency to loosen, partly from screwing them up tightly, and partly from running stresses. A simple repair is as follows: Remove the bolts, and plug the holes with wooden dowels, then drill new holes half-way between the old ones. The size of these holes should be such that the bolts must be driven in.

Combination Window Boxes and Sills in Concrete

When remodeling his building, an owner included the concrete combination window boxes and sills shown in the il-

lustration, adding considerably to the appearance of the house, and insuring permanent sills. The construction is simple and durable, the concrete being reinforced with wire mesh, doubled as shown, and stapled to the plate under the sill. A wooden form was made, 6 in. deep at the front, 10 in. wide and as long as the window frame, lightly nailed in position, and the concrete, a mixture of 1 part cement to 2 parts sand, poured. The interior was cut out and troweled smooth while the concrete was still plastic, and $\frac{1}{2}$ -in. drain holes made through the bottom. The form was not removed until the concrete had set, and the sill was kept wet for a week, before any weight was placed on it.

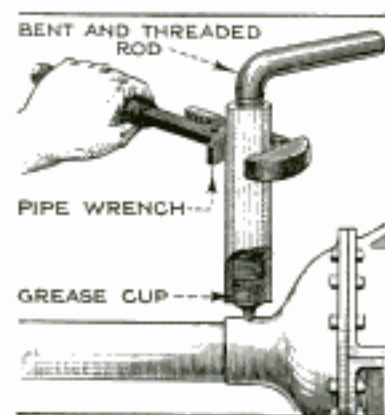
When the Crankcase Oil Runs Low

Owners of automobiles provided with the splash system of oiling will appreciate the kink given below, when a low supply of oil in the crankcase threatens to "freeze" the pistons and burn out the connecting-rod bearings.

Pour a quart or two of water into the crankcase. As oil is lighter than water, it will rise to the top, and will be splashed up by the crankshaft and connecting rods as usual. By doing this the car can be run to the nearest supply station, where the crankcase can be drained and refilled.

Special Wrench for Removing Grease Cups

The wrench illustrated was devised to remove grease cups of the screw-cap type, such as used on automobile axles, the threads on the outside of the cup preventing the use of a pipe wrench because



of the damage to the thread, and the hexagons on the lower parts being usually so much worn or so placed, as not to allow a wrench to be used. The tool consists of two parts: a short

length of pipe, tapped through its entire length with the same thread as the grease cup, and a rod, threaded to fit in the pipe, and bent as shown, to facilitate turning it. In use, the pipe is first screwed onto the grease cup, after which the rod is screwed down tightly against the cup, thus locking it securely in the pipe. A pipe wrench is then used in the manner indicated to unscrew the cup.

Mirror an Effective Lure for Fish

While the bait shown in the illustration makes use of a mirror, it is the greed of a fish that leads to its capture rather than its vanity, for, seeing the bait attractively reflected in the mirror as well as the image of what seems to be another fish, it becomes a question of which one gets the worm first. While glass mirrors can be used they are open to the objection that applies to all glassware—they break. Consequently a concave mirror made of polished metal, such as the bowl of a silver tablespoon or large measuring spoon, is better, and the results equally satisfactory, the convex side being blackened. The hook is fastened on a line passed through a hole in the edge of the mirror and drops to the center, where it can be baited in the usual way.—J. W. Matley, New York City.

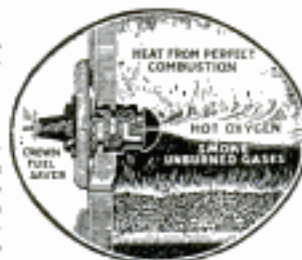
