

\[\]/HILE stamp collections are started in many ways, a large percentage grow without plan or guidance. In the early stages a stamp is a stamp even though torn and smudged. The beginner will not believe one stamp of the same variety can be worth more simply because it is cleaner and undamaged, or has better centering or a fairer cancellation.

Later when comparisons are made with other collections or with exhibits, the beginner notices some are better than others, and that this comes about through the selection of nicer copies of stamps, and through the care used in arranging the album, rather than through any difference in money spent. For the first time "condition" is noticed, and it should teach the collector to select his stamps when buying them. Years ago young collectors looked upon unused stamps as fakes or counterfeits, but following the world war, and the changes in value of monetary units in many countries, millions of leftover stamps were sold to dealers for packets. These may be mixed with the used stamps in an album without detracting from its appearance.

The beginner's first lesson should be on preparing stamps. They should never be "skinned" off the paper for this almost always damages them. They should be soaked in lukewarm water just long enough to dissolve the gum. Now scatter them over a newspaper and when partly dry transfer them to a book with soft paper pages for complete drying. A weight placed on the book will increase the crisp flatness, but may delay the dry-





ing process. There will be a few mishaps when soaking the first lots, for some ink is soluble in water, some changes color when wet, and some gum will not dissolve. A little salt added to the soaking water will tend to set the color in some red stamps which "bleed," and a little vinegar will loosen the gum.

Stamps printed in fugitive and changeable colors may be freed of paper by placing them face up on wet blotters. A difficult combination occurs in some British colonial stamps printed in soluble colors upon a chalk-surfaced paper, and which are provided with an almost insoluble gum. These cannot be soaked without losing the design, and paper must be removed by moistening from the back. To prevent curling, place the stamps face up on a sheet of celluloid and dry under pressure. Many stamps may be soaked in hot water but it is best to use cool water when handling unknown varieties.

Recent articles about rotary intaglio stamps, such as the current low values of Great Britain, call attention to size variations which occur from time to time. Since the process by which the stamp design is transferred from the die to the copper printing cylinder is photographic, it is difficult to set the step and repeat camera so a duplicate plate made later will not show a variation in the stamp size.

Similar results were found in the rotary offset United States stamps issued in 1918 and 1920. In the first two plates made for the three-cent value, the stamp designs measured nineteen by twenty-two millimeters, which closely approximated the size of the regular flat-plate engraved stamps, but in later plates the size was progressively reduced until the stamps finally measured about eighteen and one-half by twenty-one and one-half millimeters. The size variations in the rotary press line engraved United States stamps are due to other causes.

Some of the new stamps which have been made available to collectors recently and which include many interesting and beautiful designs

to collectors plays an important part in the postal program of most countries.

France has issued stamps to honor the centenary of Rouget de Lisle, author of the Marseillaise, and for the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the death of Pilatre de Rozier, pioneer balloonist. Her most recent issues honor the famous French socialist, Jean Jaures, and the Canadian monument at Vimy Ridge. Germany has issued two values for the International Health congress at Hamburg. Brazil has a symbolic design to honor the Eucharistic congress.

A bicolored set of four values in very large size has been issued by the Dominican Republic. These show a view of the ocean drive known as George Washington avenue in Cuidad Trujillo, and have an inset portrait of President Trujillo at the upper right. Italy has stamps inscribed "Etiopia," in Italian and Amharic, showing the portrait of Victor Emmanuel of

Italy, and bearing the inscription of "Poste Coloniali Italiane." A new stamp from Jugoslavia shows a portrait of Nikola Telsa.

A novel set has been issued by Netherlands for the three hundredth anniversary of the Utrecht University Foundation. The six-cent stamp shows a profile of Pallas Athene. and a twelve and onehalf cent shows the portrait of Gysbertus Voetius. Danzig has a series of stamps to mark the one hundred twenty-fifth anniversary of the foundation of the city of Brosen, and Cuba honors Gomez with two stamps.

The stamp mistake of the year will be found in the Bermuda stamp pictured in this column last month. The yacht upon that stamp was to be the "Viking," owned in Ber-

muda, but a mixup occurred and the stamp shows the "Lucie," owned by an American.

gle instance had been found in which fuel dope decreased carbon deposits, knocks, or caused any improvement in the general operation of the automobile to an extent that could be measured.

Don't let a money-back guarantee fool you. One company offered to refund the purchase price of ten bottles if they failed to reduce the carbon. The company will do exactly that, if and when

a disgruntled customer comes in with the empty bottles and definite proof that carbon was not reduced. The point is that few customers will use that many bottles, and only a few of those who do will bother to claim the guarantee if dissatisfied. This is known as the "one tenth of one per cent racket," which is just about the percentage of dissatisfied customers who actually ask for their money.

One man who had a "more miles" compound claimed he extracted it with kerosene from a rare mineral deposit. Perhaps he did, a laboratory staff for an oil company admitted after they tested it, but they couldn't find it improved gasoline. Another had a dope he declared was a

tetraethyl lead, a recognized anti-knock compound, which the "inventor" had secretly added to his mixture. But benzol, at about forty cents per gallon, is too expensive to use as a knock inhibitor in the quantities necessary.



ticulated units an entire lightweight streamline train can be built up. The twin unit weighs about the same as a standard steel sleeping car. Took ninety years to start the revolution that set the streamline train on its time-shattering career. You knew that revolution had come when you read that the fiery old iron horse had been stabled and in its place, trailing a string of coaches straight and smooth as an arrow's shaft, was no grimy black engine but a strange new power car of "cobalt and sarasota blue, golden olive and pimpernel scarlet." Like an arrow the streamliner shot across the country, caught the public imagination, beckoned a new generation that thought the railways outmoded and slow to come for a thrilling hundred-mile-an-hour ride in this aluminum bullet.

A new era in railroading was beginning, yet its seeds were buried ninety years ago. For the streamline train was first prophetically suggested in a British patent granted in 1846 to Sir Henry Bessemer, inventor of the Bessemer steel process. He proposed a "wedge form" for the piston carriage of "atmospheric railways," to "diminish atmospheric resistance and allow the carriage to move at higher velocities with less power. The wedge

form may be used both in the fore and hind parts of carriages or of trains, in addition to the closing of the intermediate spaces." In 1865, as the American Civil War closed, U. S. patent No. 49,227 was issued to S. R. Calthrop for a train designed to diminish wind resistance, but the train was never developed. At the turn of the century the "Windsplitter," America's first streamline train, was given trial on the Baltimore & Ohio tracks in Maryland. It was designed by F. U. Adams of Chicago, a newspaper man. It never was placed in scheduled service, and the streamline idea slumbered on.

The epoch of the streamliner was born, at last, of necessity. In 1920 the railroads carried a peak-year load of 1,235,- 000,000 passengers. In 1933 only 433,-000,000 passengers chose the rails for their thoroughfare. Passenger-miles dwindled from forty-seven billion in 1920 to a little more than sixteen billion in 1933. What drastic, dramatic gesture could lure back the lost passengers to the railways?

The streamliner was the answer. Dramatic "packaging" for the traveler. Mighty power plants wrapped in color—"sarasota blue and pimpernel scarlet," for one—that would draw thousands every day to watch them roar by, and would pile up a waiting list of passengers.

The railroads borrowed style from giant air transports and from streamline automobiles. But speed called for more

than mere styling, and the railroads went to the automotive manufacturers for an engine that would haul millionpound trains—built at a cost of a dollar a pound-across the continent day after day at eighty and ninety mile speeds without breakdown. Speed was nothing new to the old iron horse, for a record of 127.1 miles per hour marked up by the Pennsylvania's Broadway Limited in 1905 has yet to be challenged by today's fast trains. Even today the Chicago and North Western's conventional steam "400" matches the better than mile-aminute pace of the streamline steam "Hiawatha" and the Diesel-electric "Zephyr" between Chicago and St. Paul. But sustained speed, a thousand miles nightly from Chicago to Denver,

two-thousand-mile sprints from Lake Michigan to the Pacific, called for an engine with long-distance stamina, and the Diesel was given the assignment.

Climb into the massive yellow power car of the "City of San Francisco," one of the newest and most powerful of the growing fleet, and watch the engineer start his eleven-car streamliner on its journey of two nights and a day to the bay city from Chicago. Half-way across Nebraska this speedster will overtake the steam train that left Chicago eight hours in advance.

The Diesel-electric engineer is half automobilist, half electric motorman. His "fireman"—an obsolete term—climbs down into the grey power room that resembles the engine room of a great ship,

the electric drive draws more and more power. When the train reaches a speed of thirty miles an hour the controller is thrown back, as if to shift gears; the motor is switched from "series" to "parallel" and again the controller moves forward. There are eight speeds on the controller. At sixty miles an hour the engineer switches beyond "parallel" into the high cruising range, and the streamliner hits its stride.


Like an automobile, the Diesel is watercooled and the crew must keep its temperature around 160 degrees. Dials in the cab show the engine temperature, train speed, and air-brake pressure. There are warning lights to indicate overheated motor and low lubricating oil. Instead of semaphore signals, the automatic train control flashes a light in front of the engineer if the track ahead is obstructed, and if he fails to reduce speed in acknowledgment of the warning, the train is automatically brought to a stop. Temperature of the motors can




Sound projectors for race course atop 100-foot tower




Wyoming rancher unloads one of his sky-riding antelopes from the plane in which he took twenty-three animals to eastern zons





SUPREMACY on the ocean airways lies in the hands of a small band of airmen, the most skillful transport officers in the world.


Flying crews for Pan American clippers pass through the most intensive training ever given to men in charge of land, sea or air craft. Now five years old, the first ocean-flyers' school was organized by Col. Charles A. Lindbergh and other ranking officers of P.A.A. The school began in the Caribbean area, but now its operations have been extended to the Pacific, and soon they may include the Atlantic.

Anticipating a boom in transoceanic passenger, express and mail service, the company is training enough officers to handle the clipper ships when they are ready to go. More than 100 men already have taken their final examinations for responsible posts. They are the nucleus of a small army of expert pilots, engineers, radio operators, mechanics and navigators who will be in charge of America's destiny on






the ocean airways. Five years ago, engineers of this international air line were convinced that long-distance ocean flying was not only practicable, but that it would become an accepted fact within a relatively short period. That was when Col. Lind-· bergh and his associates mapped out a course of training for ocean flyers. They worked out the first conception of a flying ... boat crew as it is known today: captain, co-pilot, navigator, radio officer and flight engineer. All must be specialists in their chosen field, but in addition, they must be interchangeable. At a moment's notice, one officer must be able to assume complete responsibility for another's duties.


This is like having a train conductor who can drive an engine, and an engineer who can pinch hit as a conductor. To train men so exhaustively, schools were set up at divisional headquarters. Pilots, no matter how extensive their experience; passed

through instruction in blind flying, and were given a chance at
the controls of all the common
types of aircraft. All flying personnel took courses in meteorology, navigation, and radio. New
pilots were given long training
periods in engine shop work. For
years after joining the line, they
served as assistant pilots, as junior officers, and clerks in charge
of every detail of clearing cargoes
and caring for passengers.

The requirements for becoming an apprentice pilot in the oceanflying school are unusually high. To qualify for training, a candidate must be a graduate aeronautical engineer, the holder of a transport pilot's license, and not over twenty-four years old. If he passes the preliminaries, he receives a thorough education in the international transport business. This takes in a lot of ground. It begins with traffic handling and clearances, then leads to radio construction, radio operation, engine mechanics, airplane mechanics, and piloting.

To become a finished clipper, ship officer, he is also schooled in foreign languages, international



law, international maritime law, seamanship and kindred subjects. If these courses are passed, the candidate is in line for a rating as junior pilot. This rating implies he is a qualified traffic man, a licensed engine mechanic, a radio operator, a licensed mariner and a master seaman.

The next rating is flight engineer, for which the requirements are still higher. To become a first officer on an ocean clipper, you need at least 5,000 hours of transport flying and at least three years of service with the company. You must also have a supervisory knowledge of engines, airplane mechanics and radio operation, besides being a graduate navigator. The next highest rating, captain, requires 7,000 hours of experience in transport flying and four or five years with the company.

Officers who give evidence of superior judgment and ability, and who have all the foregoing qualifications, are in line for the highest rating—master of ocean flying boats. This title implies the holder knows how to man every post on an ocean clip-


An international airport where clipper ships land and depart and, below, signal light for an approaching clipper

Secrets of Earth's Interior

Revealed in Mineral Hall

With its walls constructed of rock strata found under Philadelphia, a mineral hall at the Academy of Natural Sciences reveals the secrets of the earth's interior. The mineralogical age of each strata in the walls is shown, with the strata drawn to scale. The entrance is like entering a cross section of the earth. On one side of the door are figures of animals which occupied the earth during the various ages. These figures are reconstructed from fossils. In the hall are exhibits showing details of the earth's interior.

Car Lighting System Guards Against Road Trouble

Designed to warn the motorist of trouble in the circuit, and at the same time to keep the lights burning sufficiently to reach a garage, a new automobile lighting system has been introduced. When a fuse blows out, or other trouble occurs, the system gives a noticeable signal. A heavy resistance connected in circuit with the

headlamps carries sufficient current to dimly light the lamps and has a capacity sufficient to prevent fire when the circuit is shorted. In addition, the system has a thermostatic switch in parallel with the resistance which periodically bridges the resistance and causes the lamps to light up brightly. Another system has a thermostatically controlled switch which causes the headlamps to flash on and off when there is a short circuit.

)F ALL the games in which a ball is used, table tennis by all odds is the "spinniest."


Willie Hoppe, the billiard wizard, puts plenty of "English" on the cue ball and Dizzy Dean flicks his wrist and manipulates his fingers as he whizzes the revolving ball through the air to get his "up" shoots," "outs," "ins" and "drops." Every golfer knows one sort of spinmakes his ball slice and a different one brings about a hook. Smartlawn tennis players consciously impart certain spins or twists to the ball to force their opponents into errors. Even topnotch bowlers get more strikes if they roll "hooks" by a simple twist of the wrist as the ball leaves their fingers.






START OF RIGHT-TO-LEFT SIDE SPIN SERVICE



FINISH OF RIGHT-TO-LEFT SIDE SPIN SERVE, NOTE VERTICAL POSITION OF RACKET






FINISH OF LEFT-TO-RIGHT OR BACK HAND SIDE SPIN SERVICE

of its flight—sometimes fast, sometimes slow, to the left or to the right, up or down, as the case may be. The table tennis ball, however, does more weird, mysterious, rapid-fire revolving than any other ball used in sports. The reason is simple. It lies in the construction and materials of the present-day ball and racket.

The little white sphere, made of sheet celluloid scarcely the thickness of a piece of paper, weighs only one-fourteenth of an ounce or 224 balls to the pound. The rackets, weighing between five and six ounces, have blades covered with a soft, pebbled-rubber cloth, which, upon close examination, reveals thousands of little pillar-like "nibs" which resemble goose flesh. When the zephyr-like ball comes into contact with this sensitive surface you find it not only possible to put enormous English on the ball but quite hopeless to prevent imparting some sort of spin to it.

It is obvious, then, that even a dub can spin a table tennis ball, but it is something else to put the kind of spin on the ball that

will fool the other fellow and enable you to return safely spin shots directed at you. All this may give you the impression that such shots are difficult to learn. Such is not the case. Many of them are very easy to master and it will surprise you how simply you can outwit your unsuspecting adversary and win point after point. Spin is part and parcel of the modern game and one of its greatest fascinations. Besides no one can become proficient without understanding the underlying principles.

Before telling you how to make spin and trick shots, I want to urge you to adopt the so-called "tennis" grip, the most natural and effective way to hold the racket. The winning shots and most of the trick shots are learned quicker and can be executed more effectively if this grip is used rather than the old-fashioned "penholder" method, still seen frequently among novice players. Also, use a racket surfaced with pebbled rubber which will give you better control and provide the means of imparting added English to the ball. Wooden and sandpaper rackets, of course, are still available.

We are now ready to deliver some fancy spin serves to make your receiver sit up and take notice. Let us first try the right-to-left sidespin service, so named because the stroke starts from the right side of the body and winds up on the left. Take a position a foot or two behind the table. The ball is held in the fingers of the left hand approximately waist high. The racket is held outstretched in the right hand and to the right side and the blade of the


racket must be at right angles to the table. Now quickly draw racket and ball together, releasing the ball when the racket reaches the center of the body. As the hands cross one another in delivering the stroke the left should be in front of the right. Get plenty of zip into the shot and keep the blade of the racket upright through the entire sweep of the stroke. This serve will impart violent sidespin on the ball and unless the receiver realizes what you are doing the chances are he will return

the ball clear off the table to your left side. This will score a point for you and should give you a kick if you enjoy outsmarting your opponent in any game.

The twin to this is the left-to-right sidespin serve. In this instance, deliver a backhand sidespin serve which starts on the left side and finishes on the right. The ball is held in the fingers of the left hand well out in front of the body. The racket hand lies across the


body with the racket about opposite the left hip. Draw the right arm quickly to the right and release the ball just as the racket crosses the middle of the body. This action will give you a powerful sidespin which your opponent most likely will return off the table, this time to your right side. Practice these two sidespin serves until you can put them on the table every time and at the same time put a lot of stuff on the ball. Then spring them on your friends and watch their faces.

But suppose your opponent springs these spinny sidespin serves on you. Are you going to be caught napping? Not if you follow this simple rule. Be sure to aim your opponent's service to the side of the table from whence the serve started. In other words, push the ball back in the direction opposite to that which your adversary's racket moved in slicing the ball. If it started from his left side, aim your

F | 39 Ships Without Portholes Seen in Air-Conditioned World

Office buildings without windows in the lower floors and ships without portholes are predicted for the air-conditioned world of the future by Willis H. Carrier, known as the "father of air conditioning." Double windows or a special type of double glass will replace ordinary windows as air conditioning becomes general, and the industry will bring comfort to hospital patients and to sufferers from hay fever and pollen asthma, believes Mr. Carrier. The cabins of airplanes already are air conditioned for comfort and such conditioning

will be a basic factor in future stratosphere flying, he predicts. While air cooling is important for hot weather, the greatest benefit from air conditioning, he asserts, comes in winter through proper humidification of the air. Dining rooms on some modern steamers already are air conditioned, and Mr. Carrier believes that entire vessels some day will be thus treated. Then portholes may be replaced with false windows decorated with artificial light, he hazards.

Windshield Cleaned by Jets of Water While Driving

Controlled by a button on the dashboard, an automatic windshield wash-

er will keep the glass clean while driving. Two small chromium-plated nozzles mounted on the cowl just in front of the windshield wipers are the only external parts, the glass jar used as a reservoir for clear water being mounted under the hood. The fountain is operated by vacuum, two jets thrown against the windshield removing dust, rain spots, mud and insects.




Spray of clear water from jar under hood cleans windshield at touch of button on dashboards

Sun's Rays Harnessed to Run Steam Engine

One of man's great ambitionsto harness the sun to a steam engine-has been achieved. Dr. C. G. Abbot, secretary of the Smith sonian Institution, has developed a solar heater and demonstrated that it would operate a one-half horsepower steam engine with sufficient efficiency for commercial purposes. The sun's rays are his fuel. Caught in three parabolic cylindrical mirrors of sheet aluminum, the rays are reflected in high concentration upon tubes of Pyrex glass. Passing through two concentric tubes of glass respectively one and one-fourth and seven-eighths inch in diam-


concentric tubes a vacuum is maintained so that the heat of the liquid is retained. Superheated, this chemical is circulated through pipes to a boiler where it generates steam. Experimentally, this solar heat engine had an over-all efficiency of fifteen per cent in producing steam power. Dr. Abbot believes the time may come when, with coal and oil supplies dwindling, sun power may be-

come essential. Even with the apparatus available today, he says, the sun can be harnessed

for cooking, refrigeration, evaporation and small power plants. Ranches and communities in cloudless regions are manifesting interest in development of sun power.



sissippi and through the southwest. Tomorrow you are likely to find them dotting the highways throughout the country for the idea is rapidly spreading eastward.

They are solving a problem that motorists have wrestled with ever since the first adventurous driver sallied forth in a horseless buggy, a pair of goggles, a long linen coat and a cloud of dust to conquer strange trails. This driver had only two choices. If he could afford it and could find one, he headed for a hotel and hoped for the best. If he couldn't, he camped out, cooked his meals in the open



and slept in a tent or possibly in his car.

But despite the discomforts, more and more motorists persisted in "making trips." It got so more travelers were arriving by auto in some sections than by train. So cities and towns began laying out camp grounds equipped with water hydrants, outdoor ovens and crude comfort stations. They proved a boon to the camper, but didn't aid the chap who wanted shelter of a more permanent kind. Later home owners along traveled highways saw dollars rolling past their doors and "rooms for tourists" signs began to appear. Then some astute service station owners built a few wooden shacks, installed beds, tables and chairs and the first cabin camps vied with the other forms of accommodation.

Each had its own particular advantages and disadvantages for motorists. Hotels offered more comforts and luxuries, but usually were located in congested, noisy sections and were the most expensive type of lodgings. Camp grounds were least expensive and





sometimes free, but comfort facilities were limited. Some cabin camps attracted undesirable customers and the motorist lured by a "rooms for tourists" sign had no way of knowing in advance the accommodations offered in such a private home.

The motor court combines most of the ad-

vantages of the above types of accommodation and eliminates the disadvantages. It is a collection of individual homes, each particular home intended to meet the needs of some particular motorist. Let's drive in and inspect, a typical court in California.

You'll find it set back from the highway among shade trees. You drive into a U-shaped court with a crushed stone or concrete driveway and stop at the office building. The owner-manager greets you and you walk along paths lined with trees, shrubs and flowers to one of the thirty or more cottages, each separated from its neighbor by a garage. The construction of the group in this particular state is likely to be stucco of Spanish or Mission architecture with tile roofs.

You enter a large living room with thick

carpet covering the entire floor. There's an overstuffed divan, two or three easy chairs, a desk, occasional tables, reading lamps, pictures on the wall, possibly a telephone and built-in radio. It's as comfortable and luxurious as any room in a good hotel. But this is only the living room. Adjoining it is a bedroom with comfortable twin beds, dresser, chairs, dressing table and a large closet. You note steam radiators in living room and bedroom, supplied from an underground central heating plant. The bedroom is carpeted too. Then there's a kitchen, completely equipped with table, gas range, electric refrigerator and you may find dishes and silverware in their places in the cupboard. Perhaps there's also a dinette with a folding bed tucked away in a closet to pro-

'Umbrella' Loud-Speakers Are Free from Echo



Free from echo effects and double sounds, a new type of loud-speaker was introduced at the Olympic games in Germany. The speaker somewhat resembles a double umbrella and its secret of eliminating echo lies in the wings and deflectors arranged inside the "umbrellas" so that the sound is radiated downward only. Five medium size speakers are installed in each of the two umbrellas, with each loud-speaker unit located to cover a certain sector of the grandstands. Another method of reducing noise in the public address system used at the Olympics was by means of a crystal microphone mounted with the pre-amplifier in a tube and wrapped in sponge rubber to exclude unwanted noise. This device was used by the announcer in the motor launch which followed the crews in the regatta.

No-Roll-Back Brake for Auto Works Automatically

Offered as a simple means of preventing the car from rolling backward on an in-



cline, a new safety brake is designed for installation on 1 the transmission main shaft behind the rear main bearing and in front of the universal joint. When the car is brought to a stop on a hill

the brake keeps it at that point without any operation by the driver. A clamp ring locks the shaft, holding the car on any incline. The device is handy for start-606

ing upgrade, since the driver is free from brake operation. The car is placed in gear, as usual, and started forward when the driver removes his foot from the clutch. Shifting into reverse is accomplished as usual, the brake releasing automatically. The brake is enclosed in a housing which is a part of the transmission housing or which is secured to it. It runs in a bath of oil.

Auto-Wheel Cover Prevents Hands from Slipping

Another contribution to motoring comfort is the cotton jacket for the steering wheel. Not only does it take the chill off the wheel in winter, but it is cooler in summer driving, absorbing perspiration and preventing the hands from slipping. The steering wheel cover is made of a durable, washable cotton fabric.

Is Driven by Remote Control



Model streamline electric locomotive built by Japanese is understood to have an automatic braking mechanism and remote-control drive

Automatic train control is understood to be a feature of a mysterious robot locomotive model built in Japan. Streamlined, but of a design unlike any conventional locomotive, the details of its mechanism have not been revealed. It is believed, however, that it will be operated electrically by remote control and will be equipped with a braking

mechanism which will stop it automatically if the rails ahead become dangerous.

Photo Enlarged with Air Brush Guided by Electric Scanner


Photographic enlargements are made in watercolor or ink by "remote control" under a method just devised in England. The original photograph is placed on the surface of a revolving cylinder while a photoelectric "eye" scans it, transmitting electrical impulses which control air pressure operating a brush that paints the image on paper or canvas wrapped around a synchronous cylinder. No sensitized photographic paper is needed for reception. The photograph can also be copied or enlarged on any flat surface. This method may be adapted to long-distance transmission of pictures by telegraph or radio.


Window with Double Glass Aids Air Conditioning

Designed for use in homes equipped with air-conditioning apparatus, a double-glass, window with a three-fourths inch dead air space is now on the market. Heat losses through windows

are said to be reduced more than fifty per cent and condensation and frosting are eliminated, under normal conditions. The window may be removed to permit cleaning of the inner glass surface.

F1042 Battery That Outlasts Auto Protected by Spun Glass

Carrying the guarantee that it will last as long as you own your car, a "lifetime" automobile battery is being introduced this fall. The secret of its claim to long life is a mat of spun glass that protects each positive plate. Adopting a principle that has been used in giant electric power plants of submarines, locomotives, dreadnaughts, traction motors and industrial plants for fifteen years, the flexible web of porous glass sheaths the plate and prevents tiny particles of lead from dropping away. In the ordinary battery, continual vibration and wear attack the active lead, breaking it down, weakening the power of the battery and shortening its



Cutaway view of battery with positive plates wrapped in spun-glass mats, shown below



life. In the new type the glass permits the electrolyte to reach the positive plate freely, in fact, aiding in its equal circulation to all parts of the plate, and offering no resistance to the current. Since less space is required for deposit of sediment at the base of the battery, there is more room for plates, and the plate area is twenty-two per cent larger than a comparable battery of the usual type. The lifetime battery will sell for one or two dollars more than the ordinary battery.







der small streams, the aqueduct will have a capacity of more than one billion gallons per day.

Ordinarily, a job like this would take a generation. Los Angeles wants the water three years from now, six years from the time work was started. Keeping up with this high-pressure schedule means breaking construction records. Unexpected difficulties must be handled without losing stride. Underground rivers that flood tunnels, sand that pours through the cracks in sheet piling like water, excessive temperatures above and below ground, all must be anticipated.

To get the job done in time Frank E. Weymouth, chief engineer of the Metropolitan Water District, gathered a corps of men famous in construction camps all over the country. Each superintendent can boast of having had a hand in some unprecedented engineering feat, from building spidery bridges in Peru to cutting shafts a mile deep in African gold mines. They are a tight-lipped, hard-working crew who have never been licked.

Even this gang couldn't do the job on schedule with ordinary methods. There are 108 miles of tunnels in the project and most of them will be large enough to handle a train. In the longer tunnels

such as an eighteen-mile bore that follows the backbone of the Coachella range, the engineers are pushing the work from as many as ten faces at the same time by means of elevator shafts leading from the surface to the grade of the bore.

Machinery takes the place of hand labor in modern tunneling. Drilling machines and dynamite break down the face of the rock, traveling belts and electric shovels load the broken material on cars, and tiny electric

When ordinary machines won't do the work the engineers invent something new. One is the "grasshopper," an elevated track from which empties are dropped for loading. Another is a huge ungainly structure that looks like a bridge turned upside down, a traveling "paver" that places a smooth concrete lining on the floor and walls of the open canals used for crossing parts of the desert. The paver lines 1,000 feet of canal a day. A canal trimmer something like the paver cuts and smooths the canal walls.

On other sections the water is to be carried in long reinforced concrete conduits. Ordinarily, conduit is precast in sections, then assembled on the spot. On this job, it is manufactured at its perma-



Floating Fire-Hose Monitor

Is Controlled Like a Horse



Here is the monitor, creeping over the water while its operator ashore guides it with reins like a horse

Controlled with reins like a horse, a new fire-hose monitor creeps on the surface of the water to fight the flames under docks and near water-front buildings. It is propelled by the force of the water pumped through the hose. The device is expected to find wide use in port cities, since it provides a new means of reaching sources of fires which have been inaccessible to other apparatus.

6 Gear Shifting Is Eliminated in Latest Transmission

Gear shifting and operation of the clutch are eliminated in an automotive transmission announced by Bendix. The device consists of an engine-driven hydraulic

turbine pump which transmits light oil to a turbine motor which delivers its torque to the drive shaft. The mechanism is contained in a compact housing which replaces the flywheel. After moving the control lever from neutral to high-speed forward position, the driver steps on the accelerator and the transmission automatically takes care of the gear movement. Acceleration at twenty miles per hour is double that of the conventional transmission, the rate gradually tapering off until at forty-four miles per hour engine and propeller shaft speeds are about equal. There is no mechanical connection between engine and rear wheels, so the car runs much more smoothly.





Insect Farmers Reap a Fortune in Butterflies

Ten thousand dollars for a butterfly! An English collector paid that for one rare tropical fly, the "Charaxes Fournierai," of which there are but two known specimensand that is why butterfly farming is a profitable, yet little-known industry. Among the loveliest things in nature are their flashing, fluttering, brightly pigmented wings. They are coveted by private collectors, natural-

flowers, herbs, vegetables, mulberry trees, scented rosemary, bayrose, beech, sycamore, even nettles and dandelions-whatever will please the fastidious palate of the caterpillar. At the proper time this "fodder" is collected in sacks and the caterpillars that thrive best on that particular diet are put in with the leaves. Twelve thousand swallow-tail butterflies are bred at one time, bringing enough income to pay the "farm hands" good wages. When the caterpillar starts weaving its chrysalis the farmer isolates it in a small "pen" to prevent spread of infectious disease. Another species is given a bit of bark, a matchbox or tin in which to await transformation. Others are left in treetops which are com-

pletely swathed in huge bags to protect them from birds. A brilliant blue butter-fly from the Dutch East Indies may bring \$300, and a gorgeous "morpho" from the Amazon tropics would bring a fortune if it could be raised in captivity. Instead, the only way they can be captured is by nets in Brazilian treetops.

With the SEA-GOING



GETTING a big liner to sea looks easy. With the tugs alongside and the shore lines cast off, a junior officer on the bridge swings the handles of the engine room telegraphs over to "Slow Speed Ahead."


Down on the operating platform of the engine room a horn blares and the pointers on the telegraph dials turn to the command. Engineers at the port and starboard engines wind their throttle wheels out and steam begins to hiss into the high-pressure turbines. Shafts spin, the propellers turn over slowly, and the ship begins to move. It takes only three men to start a 26,000-ton liner.

But it's not as easy as that. For the last five or six hours the engine room gang had been preparing for the command. Raising steam takes time. Ponderous as the engines are, they are almost as delicate as fine watches. A 25,000-horsepower plant gets more care than the sensitive engine of a race car.

Aboard the S.S. "Monterey," one of the fast Matson liners on the California-Australia run, Chief Engineer H. T. Keene calls his officers together half a day before

when it might have to maneuver on short notice, the engineers keep steam up and the engines warm so

One of the first steps in warming is to start a series of pumps. One of them circulates cooling water through the condensers, another pumps barrels of lubricating oil through the engine bearings. Other pumps begin to lift water out of the feed tanks and boost it on its way to the boilers where it passes through first and second stage heaters. After evaporation in the boilers, it passes through a series of superheaters from which it emerges as superheated steam. Meanwhile partial vacuums are created inside the turbines and condensers by means of steam ejectors that

draw off water vapor and air.


Finally, the engines are ready for warming up. Each throttle is "cracked" to release a little steam that rushes through the high, intermediate, and low pressure turbines of the engines. Little by little, the vacuum inside the turbines is increased and more steam is admit-

ted until the engines begin to turn. With the engines partly warmed up, they are operated ahead slowly and then astern for twenty-five minutes so all parts of the rotating units can come up to an even temperature. From then until sailing time, each engine is turned over for a few revolutions every few minutes to prevent it from cooling.

At sea the engine room is the hot spot of the ship, much hotter than the fire rooms in these days of fuel-oil furnaces and forced draft. Away from the small "islands" of cool air coming down the ventilators, thermometers in the moist atmosphere usually read around 100 degrees. Every minute the big ship is at sea, an engi-


neer stands close by the throttle of each engine. No one below knows when an order is coming down from the bridge, or whether the next order will be an emergency command. As a result, every order is treated as an emergency and executed with split-second speed. An engine room log records everything that happens during a voyage. The yeoman in charge writes down each command transmitted from the bridge, together with the hour and minute. He also reads the faces of forty or fifty instruments that show the condition of every part of the power plant and keeps records of the readings.

Giant Figure of Christ in Odd Church Design






Two handlebars of this chummy two-passenger bicycle are connected by rods to from fork

Coal 'Dry Cleaned' in Portable Air-Sand Plant

Operated without water, a "dry cleaner" for coal has been mounted on a truck for use anywhere. It employs air-sand, an artificial dry liquid, for separating the coal from slate and for similar specific gravity separations. The air-sand liquid is formed by bubbling air continuously through a mass of fine, dry sand. This makes a quicksand on which the pure coal floats through the cleaning box and into the chute while slate and sulphurous impurities sink and are discharged through gates in the bottom. A simple arrangement reclaims and recirculates the sand. The plant is made in units up to 100tons capacity. Costs of dry cleaning the coal are said to be small.

Photo Enlarger Reflects Light Protecting Film from Heat




Turning the hand crank of this photo-enlarging outfit adjusts the projector to desired print size

plane in metal shockproof containers. A motor pump, with 2,000 feet of hose is loaded into a lightweight steel box with parachute attached. Other strange-looking containers are hustled aboard and the plane zooms aloft with its load.

The boss of the ground crew assigns a number of men to start trenching in order to "pinch" the fire, then begins talking to the radio observer in the

"FIRE starting on degree 372 approximately twelve miles southwest from station three."

The supervisor in the main ranger station of a huge western national forest hangs up the telephone receiver and stretches a cord across a map from station three on the 372-degree mark in the required direction. He doesn't do anything more—yet. In a moment the phone rings again.

"Fire starting at degree 171 about nine miles northeast from station two."

That's what the supervisor has been waiting for. On the map he stretches a second string from station two, and where the two cords meet is the exact location of the blaze.

"All right, boys, let's go," he orders.
"Can't use the trucks—no roads. Tell the airport to drop a fifty-man equipment outfit and one centrifugal pump; there's a stream near."

The men set out, some on foot, some on horseback. All portable equipment is packed and ready at the station. Each man takes what he can comfortably carry and proceeds to the fire. Meanwhile, at the nearest National Forest landing field, fifty fire-fighting units are packed in the

plane now circling overhead. "Drop the pump near the stream!" he orders.

A black object comes hurtling from the plane and is suddenly checked by a mush-rooming parachute. It is a pump, capable of shooting twenty-two gallons a minute at 200 pounds pressure. Other smaller objects come plummeting down. They are pack units composed of a five-gallon can of water, hose and lever pump.

Here we have a picture of Uncle Sam's newest forest-fire fighting equipment in action. A combination of expert scientific detection, transportation facilities stepped up to the maximum of efficiency, and a system of "cafeteria delivery" of any equipment needed by air, has become so effective that, according to recent reports from the National Forest Service, less than one-tenth of one per cent of the total national forest acreage was destroyed by fire last year. After five years of exhaustive laboratory research, resulting in the largescale inventing of machinery peculiar to the needs of forest-fire fighting, the official guardians of over 200,000,000 acres of forest lands have at their command almost every known kind of fire-fighting equipment that can possibly be brought into play. Ultramodern methods of synchronizing old and new equipment, accurate and speedy methods of locating the tiniest incipient fire, new mechanical devices for automatically digging firebreaks and a ground-to-air-to-main-ranger-station ra-



ly different. Cutting through heavy brush while digging through to earth is a slow process. and the fire often catches up with the spade wielder. So our engineers have developed the automatic brush cutter, a powerdriven circular saw arrangement that cuts through tough underbrush, leaving the way open for the shovel man. The brush cutter does the work of several men in far less time-and time is most important in fighting forest fires.

dio communication system are but a few of the latest advancements made by the engineering and research staff of the Forest Service.

"Within the past three years," says David Godwin, associate chief of the fire-fighting division of the service, "the service has built fifty-five landing fields at strategic sections, mostly in the far west. No matter where a fire breaks out, it can be reached in a short time by plane. Furthermore, thousands of miles of roads have been built, closed to public traffic,

but used exclusively by forest rangers and CCC boys in fire fighting.

"Until recently, the main method of fighting a fire was to line up a number of men, arm them with picks and shovels and have them dig trenches parallel to the line of fire and thus attempt to pinch it out. In connection with this, upon favorable conditions, with the wind not too strong, backfiring was attempted, the uprushing current of air caused by the approaching conflagration drawing the backfires to it, despite the adverse wind.

"Today, trenching is still the major means of fighting fires, but the methods involved are entire-

"For the first time we have reached maximum efficiency in spotting fires. For years the army air corps cooperated with us by keeping forty planes constantly in the air to report fires. This system served as an excellent primary stage of the present method of detection. However, accurate location directions cannot be given from a fastmoving plane and the territory was not covered 100 per cent. Our present system of fire towers, manned day and night, keeps every square inch of national forest lands under constant observation. In almost every instance, fires are reported by two or more rangers at these stations, and by simple geometry applied on a chart map, the superintendent can deter-

mine the exact location of the fire down to the acre.

"Many times, of course, there are roads near the fire, which are not open to the public, but built for just such emergencies. Then the mobile ground units get into action. Tractors with plowlike arrangements for digging fire trenches, trucks, carrying men equipped with 'pack extinguishers,' picks, axes and shovels form the vanguard. Airplanes report progress

to the ground boss. Automatic brushcutters zip into action. A unit of our very latest equipment, a counterpart of a city fire truck, is capable of shooting powerful streams of water, and if no supply is available in near-by stream or lake, it carries a huge tank which can be refilled at headquarters.

"The whole battle is carried on as efficiently as any wartime maneuver. Planes and ground crews keep in constant contact by radio, and if equipment is needed in a hurry, it is dropped from the air by parachute, or 'free-dropped' in specially constructed nonbreakable containers. If the blaze is a large one and men must stay on duty for several days, the planes drop food as well as supplies.

"For the past three years the service has been building a system of reservoirs, pipelines and dams in small streams for a permanent water supply. At first the notion of men walking around with five gal-

Timing Switch for Enlarger Insures Right Exposure

Motorboats Hoist River Uphill to Supply Power for Refinery

So low was the Mississippi river this year that motorboats were employed to "lift" river water into a channel supplying power for a large oil refinery at Wood River, Ill. The river, at a record low stage, had fallen below the level of the intake channel and the refinery, 4,000 feet from the inlet, was threatened with a shutdown. Pumps being unavailable in the emergency, a river man suggested building a low

dam of wood stakes and planks across the mouth of the intake channel. Six small motorboats were then placed seven feet from the dam and securely fastened, stern ends to the dam. Pipes twelve inches in diameter and about eight feet long were arranged to take the wash from the propeller and lift it over the dam into the channel. When the engines were started each propeller thrust about 1,500 gallons of water a minute up and over the dam.


Lock in Cork Seals Bottle Tight Preventing Use of Poisons

sion cover, it can be installed in any conventional automobile transmission. Both construction and operation have been made quite simple. Gears are controlled from a lever at the top of the steering post. The mechanism is operated by a vacuum suspended cylinder, in which vacuum is maintained at all times.

Camera on Radiator Cap Photographs Accident


Hot Gas Mixed with Steam Cuts Heating Cost

NSULATIO

both the steam and the products of combustion carrying their heat through the radiators. A one-sixth horsepower motor regulates air supply, circulation and exhaust. Because of the method of collecting condensate and returning it to the generator, there is a minimum of corrosion and tests established that corrosion would be less than in an ordinary steam heating system. The plant heats up rapidly because only a small amount of water is needed in the jacket and because the hot gases reach the radiator quickly. The heater, applicable wherever gas is available, is designed for a five to seven room house, and in larger buildings extra units

Steam mingles with the burned gases in the radiators of a home heating plant which, in laboratory tests, has attained an efficiency of ninety-seven per cent in fuel use. The gas-vapor heater has just been placed on the market. Because its air supply is controlled, a large amount of gas can be burned in a small combustion chamber and the heating plant is therefore

quite compact. Around the combustion chamber is a water jacket. Exhaust vents lead the products of combustion into a space above the water where the steam beater. It is thermostatically controlled. and the spent gases are thoroughly mixed. This gas-vapor mixture flows through the piping to the radiators, where the moisture condenses and the gas cools. The J/(2 7 at Middle of Brain condensate flows back to the water jacket and is reheated and circulated again, while the cooled gases are separated and, under 2 pressure, discharged through a flue to the outside. In a new home equipped with this heater, a chimney would be unnecessary. A vent pipe only two and one-half or three inches in diameter is sufficient to exhaust the gas through the roof. There is practically no loss of heat in this system,



In one of the wettest spots on the globe, the rain gauge is read just once a year and the annual average precipitation is 451 inches. The gauge is at the top of Mt. Waialeale on Kauai, westernmost of the larger islands of Hawaii. In unusually wet years the rainfall sometimes reaches 606 inches. Because of the difficulty of reaching the peak through dense forest, undergrowth vegetation and sticky mud, a huge gauge which need be read only once anually was installed. It is of copper and will hold 900 inches. Tests of evaporation showed practically no loss, so the scientists assume, evaporation at zero. Mile-high-Mt. Waialeale is a moisture trap for rainladen subtropical winds.




Midget and Giant Pistons Both Made of Aluminum

Aluminum pistons such as are being employed in modern highspeed automobiles also are being adapted to many other types of engines, both large and small. A striking contrast in size is offered by the aluminum-alloy piston produced for the engine of a fiftyseven pound portable lighting plant and that turned out for a 450-horsepower Diesel engine. The lighting-plant piston weighs three ounces, while the one for the Diesel is nine and one-half inches in diameter, nineteen inches long and the casting before it is machined weighs sixty-four pounds. Tests have been made with such pistons for Diesels fifteen to thirty inches in diameter. These pistons in iron weigh up to 300 pounds while the same size in aluminum would weigh one-third that much.



vincing on the screen. Rainstorms of many kinds can be produced at a moment's notice with devices made by Harry Redmond, head of the R.K.O. special effects department. Misty rain is made by compressing water to about 150 pounds pressure and then releasing it through a fine jet. The jet has a half-inch thick wall around an elongated cavity the thickness of a pencil lead in which is a V-shape cut. The water strikes the cut, and is sprayed into a mist almost dry because of its fineness. Each jet covers an area of about fifty feet, and about 100 are used at once.

For rain effects around street lamps at night, Redmond uses a special jet eight inches long, with a one-half inch interior cavity tapering toward the end. Arranged spirally around the jet are V-cuts which bite into the water stream because of the taper. At the end of the jet is a spray attachment. The large drops from the spray "catch" the light for movie rain drops while the V-cuts add the needed mistiness for proper photographic effect. Only a small portion of a set is made wet with this device.

When rain is seen pouring down outside movie windows, the part you don't see is a "rain tube" consisting of a one and onequarter-inch iron pipe made into a rectangular form. Into the pipe are drilled holes the size of a pencil lead. Low-pressure water gives the rain-drop effect. A


pan below the window out of camera lines catches the water.

For more elaborate rainstorms sprays known as "acorn jets" are screwed into pipes. The spray jet is shaped like an acorn with fine holes drilled into the "nut" portion. The pipes are suspended above the setting and are attached to a three-stage pump of 750-gallons-a-minute capacity. From 1,000 to 3,000 feet of pipe and hose are required for the usual rain scene. Increasing the pressure of the water adds to the fogginess of the rain.

When rain is to be "silenced" so it won't interfere with the sound recording, excelsior is laid about the set to absorb the noise. If artificial rainstorms are needed on location, tank trucks transport the water to the outdoor setting and pumps build up pressure to 125 pounds in the pipes to get the storm effect from the jets.

In the R.K.O. film "Mary of Scotland," a cloudburst effect was gained by shooting water from a fire hose into four-bladed propellers turned by 400-horsepower airplane motors. Wind machines are used to create the "blown effect" of slanting rain. By ejecting fuller's earth into the wind machines the effect of wind tugging at the clothes of the actors is produced. Without the fuller's earth, the illusion would not be so realistic.

Several new fog machines using chemicals are being used. The oldtime "fog-bucket" from

which an air jet sprayed lubricating or mineral oil is not extensively used because of the effects of the oil-laden atmosphere on the actors and their costumes. Instead, complicated machines manufacture fog according to the demands of the director. For "Mary of Scotland" Director John Ford asked Redmond for a special fog which would hang with clear spaces be-

tween layers of fog. The first layer was to cover the ground with a four-foot blanket, and over this was needed six feet of clear air. Above the clear air was required another layer of fog. A special machine was used that electrically carbonized oil and then, by a muffled-air arrangement, laid it as microscopic particles in a vaporous air mixture. By controlling the carbonization the height at which the particles floated could be ascertained. A small blower in the fog machine gave the drifting movement characteristic of fog.


Spray arrangements made after the principle of the paint spray gun are used when an impenetrable fog bank is needed. The chemical, silicate tetrachloride, is put in the spray gun and instead of air pressure, compressed ammonia gas operates the spray


Cutaway drawing shows how condensed moisture is collected in water pan to be re-evaporated

Condensation of vapor in the chimney, a cause of constant disintegration of the bricks, mortar and flue lining, can be controlled by installing a condensation eliminator developed recently. In the efficient furnace there is little waste of heat up the chimney, but as a result there is heavy condensation of moisture with a slightly acid content which attacks the chimney. In a gas furnace, from six to twelve gallons of water are generated in vapor form for each thousand cubic feet of gas burned. The condensation eliminator, installed at the base of the chimney, controls up-draft and down-draft. It collects the condensed moisture during the warming-up period and when the furnace is hot, the water is re-evaporated and carried out of the chimney as vapor. An acidproof flue lining protects the porous brick and mortar, and leaves a dead air space between it and the chimney, tending to prevent absorption of heat by the bricks and to maintain a stack temperature high enough to evaporate the moisture and carry it away





Top, jacking up wheel with air from spare tire. Bottom, the air-operated jack









There's just one message in all these figures—be careful or be killed. But how do these statistics concern you directly? You consider yourself a careful driver, you've never killed anyone, never injured anyone, perhaps never dented a fender. Well, that's where the law of averages comes in. If the present traffic accident rate continues, one out of every twenty persons in this country will be injured or killed in an automobile accident within five years. And that includes you!


Just jot down your name, then add the names of nineteen relatives and friends. One of you will be killed or injured in a traffic smash-up by 1941 by the law of averages. Here's another way of looking at it. Write down the

names of three children in your neighborhood. Two of the three are sure—not likely, but sure—to be injured in auto accidents during their lifetimes if the present rate continues. Or perhaps you have a sixteen-year-old boy. If he looks forward to a lifetime of driving and is exposed both to driving and pedestrian hazards, your son also is certain, by the law of averages, to be hurt in a traffic accident unless the present rate is reduced.

Not a very cheerful outlook, is it? Now let's compute the economic loss in addition to human lives wasted. Last year we spent about \$2,638,-000,000 for new cars and trucks. During the same

period accidents cost us more than \$1,600,000,000 in wage losses, doctor and hospital bills, insurance overhead and property damage. Thus for each \$1,000 spent for new cars in 1935, another \$600 went for accidents. Most of that was money wasted. Some of it was your money—paid in high insurance rates if for nothing else. Project this loss over the next ten years and you have a figure approximating half the national debt.

So there you are. Automobile accidents are costing you money whether you have accidents or not, and by the law of averages you or someone close to you will be killed or injured in one within five years if present conditions continue.

"So what?" you say. "I'm a very careful driver.
A lot of other fellows are causing all this. They
ought to be ruled off the highways. But why pick
on me?"


Well, you'll be just as dead if the "other fellow" kills you as if you do the job yourself. And are


you careful every minute you're behind the wheel, or do you think you are? For every accident last year which went to pile up the grim total of death and destruction, there were literally hundreds of near accidents-situations when something almost happened but didn't. Every driver has had these narrow escapes -some call them "lucky breaks." Now accidents don't just happen; someone causes them. It's human to blame the "other fellow" but the other chap can't always be in the wrong. You've got to accept part of the responsibility, at least part of the time.

Who had all those thousands of accidents last year? Some were physically defective, some didn't know how to drive. But the great majority were competent drivers who had acquired careless habits. They went too fast, passed on hills and curves, sped through intersections, jumped the lights and did a thousand and one other foolish things until the law of averages caught up with them. They didn't actually want to have an accident, but neither did they want sufficiently not to have one.

And that's the secret of staying out of trouble on the highways today. You've got to prevent the accident before it happens. And the best way to do that is to check up im-

to see only 200 feet, your stopping point at any moment is almost 150 feet beyond the distance you can see ahead. You would even be out-driving 300-foot head lamps at that speed.

Here's another startling conception of sixty miles an hour. At that speed your car has enough momentum to travel 120 feet straight up if it could "take off." So when you do sixty you might as well be 120 feet in the air if you hit something.


Just another way of saying that hitting a stationary object at sixty creates the same impact force as though the car were to drop from the top of a twelve-story building.

The higher the speed, the worse the accident. One accident in eleven is fatal at fifty miles per hour and above. At speeds of twenty and under, only one accident in sixty-one is fatal. But just driving under fifty isn't any insurance against accidents. Most of them occur at speeds under

mediately on your driving habits. If every one of 40,000,000 drivers discarded all careless and dangerous practices today, the deaths, injuries, property damage—and insurance rates—would drop tomorrow. If you'll overhaul your own driving practices, you'll go far toward avoiding an accident.

First, let's consider speed. Modern cars do seventy, eighty or even ninety miles an hour with ease. But can your brain go ninety miles an hour, or even sixty? Cars and highways are faster, but your reaction time isn't. And it still takes time to think. It takes about three-fourths of a second on an average. So from the time you see the heifer until the time you do something about it, your car travels about fifty-five feet if you're doing fifty miles an hour. Then after you get your foot on the brake, you need nearly 200 feet more to stop—unless you have poor brakes.

Did you ever do sixty at night on a good stretch? The chances are you were driving "blind" and didn't even know it. With good brakes and good road conditions, you need about 330 feet to stop at sixty miles per hour. Now if your lights enable you

that figure. It's quite easy to determine the type of accident you are most likely to have. Just study the kind most drivers had last year.

So here's a tip that will reduce your chance of killing someone nearly fifty per cent—always be on the lookout for pedestrians. Nearly half of last year's traffic fatalities were traveling afoot. The ratio of injuries to deaths is twenty to one for pedestrian accidents. Nearly 7,000 pedestrians jaywalked to their death last year but, on the other hand, mistakes by driv-

ers accounted for about two out of every three accidents of every type. If you're in the habit of letting pedestrians look out for themselves, you stand an excellent chance of killing someone. Incidentally, school children, trained to watch traffic, made a better safety record than adults last year.


Car defects cause, or help cause, at least fifteen per cent of all accidents, it is estimated, so here's another tip. You minimize your chances of killing or being killed by proper maintenance. Poor brakes and glaring lights are the mechanical defects blamed for most such accidents.

One serious mistake in driving may be your last, so don't be lulled into a sense of security just because you're on the open road. Since 1930 traffic deaths for large. eities have been declining while deaths on the open road have been climbing. And don't think you are careful just because 5 you exercise caution in turning. Nine out of ten vehicles involved in fatal accidents. last year were going straight ahead. Even at intersections, most accidents involve. vehicles going straight ahead. If you crossthe center line occasionally, or pass on a hill or blind curve, you should be interested to learn that twenty-six per cent of all fatal accidents and fifty-eight per cent



Handy Kitchen Wrenches

Saving the hands from cuts and burns, two wrenches with rubber teeth or jaws serve many purposes in the kitchen. One is handy for canning, serving to lift hot jars or cans from the water, to hold the jar while the cap is tightened or loosened, to grip wide-mouth jars and to lift potatoes, corn, bottles and cans from hot water or the oven. The other wrench grips the cap of any screw-top bottle, jar or can, removes hot pans and pots from the stove, removes hot lids from cooking vessels, lifts hot clothes from washer to wringer, cracks nuts and is strong enough for a pipe wrench.

Gas Extracted from Clover by Inexpensive Process

Popular-Size Films Developed in Adjustable Tank



Amateur photographers can develop their own-films in an adjustable tank which is made to accommodate various popular sized films. Just made available, the tank

will hold a quart of developer and is of stainless acid-resistant steel. The exposed film is wound on a reel in the darkroom, immersed in the tank of developer and covered. The rest of the process can be done in daylight, for the tank cover has a light-trapped opening through which solutions and rinsing water can be poured in or out without exposing the interior. The film remains in the tank until ready for drying. To change from one size film to another requires only a shift of the upper flange from one notch to another.


Surlight Cast into Dark Rooms by Automatic Reflector

Several hours of sunlight can be cast into dark rooms of city apartments and hotels by means of an automatic reflector. The device follows the sun whenever it is visible, sets its mirrors to catch its rays and then reflects them by a complicated series of prisms and mirrors to any 1,300-foot square area desired. The machine may be set up on the roof of an adjoining building to reflect the sunlight into rooms located on inside courts or perhaps on air shafts of large buildings.



"This leaves several spectacular fields of research open for amateurs," says Porter, who is acting as consultant for the new 200-inch giant telescope in California. "One of these is hunting for new comets and another is looking for some of the minor planets. Lunar occultation is another field in which amateur astronomers can do important work. The moon is not as steady as you might think and is often ahead of or behind schedule. We know the stars are steady, so by taking the exact time at

FOR a few dollars you can create an observatory in your back yard and with a homemade telescope explore the sky for new comets and planets.

Amateur star gazers are on the job in all parts of the world and frequently a member of this star patrol finds a new dot of light in the sky. It may be a new comet, an unknown planet, or a faint star that suddenly has exploded. Amateurs are actually beating professional astronomers in discovering new heavenly bodies.

The reason for this, explains Russell W. Porter, "patron saint of amateur astronomy," is that professional astronomers are usually busy on special problems and hardly have time to sweep the skies on the chance of spotting something new. Also, the large instruments of the observatories have small fields of vision which permit only tiny patches of the sky to be observed at a time.

making - \$3.00. PATROL which certain stars go into eclipse, behind the moon, amateurs may collect facts from which the reasons for the moon's behavior may be found. "Small comets that go parading back and forth through the solar system are often observed by am-

ateurs and when a new one is found the comet is usually named after its discoverer. There are thousands of small planets in our solar system about which little is known. Most of these are too small ever to be seen, but it is probable amateurs will discover a few more of the larger masses among the minor planets.

"Professional astronomers are also aided by amateurs in the study of variable stars. These wax and wane in brightness. The amateurs keep track of the varying brilliance of these stars and draw up charts of their behavior for the observatories. The sensational 'blowing up' of 'Nova Herculis,' a star normally 20,000 times brighter than our own sun, was first observed by an English amateur. In less than a month's time after it started to expand, 'Nova Herculis' increased its brilliance 160,000 times. Most of the variable stars observed since the beginning of the century were first found by amateurs."

Strange as it sounds, you can usually see the stars much better with a homemade telescope than with the mightiest instruments of the observatories. Small telescopes reveal the stars as steady, bright




time with the vibrations. "Seeing" is usually much better after midnight when the atmosphere has cooled off.

Early this year an Ohio draftsman, Leslie C. Peltier, discovered a new comet with a six-inch telescope he made himself. A few months later the comet was only a couple of light-minutes away from the earth and was the first that could be seen with the naked eye since 1927. Peltier made his first telescope eighteen years ago and is the discoverer of two other comets, as well as co-discoverer of three more.

Amateur telescopes are simple affairs, consisting of a curved glass reflecting mirror, a small mirror mounted diagonally above the main mirror to reflect its gathered light outside the tube, and an eyepiece that magnifies the image. These parts are assembled on an equatorial mounting that allows the telescope to be pointed at any part of the sky.

You can build such an instrument for

pin points of light, while in the larger telescopes the stars seem to dance and jiggle. Even the moon trembles and blurs. Planets are just as hard to see, although through amateur telescopes the planets appear to be bright, steady disks. This is because with the largest telescopes the "hot stove effect" of atmospheric disturbances is very pronounced. The twinkling of a star becomes a steady dance and astronomers must wait for exceptionally quiet nights to make visual observations. Routine stellar photography, however, may be made at nearly any time because the astronomers guide their cameras to keep

about \$12 and up, although one amateur completed his for a cash outlay of \$1.50. He found a thick piece of glass suitable for grinding out a curved mirror surface and used the lenses from an old pair of binoculars for the eyepiece, mounting them in a wooden spool. He picked up enough pipe and tubing in a junk yard to make a rigid mounting.

Glass for a mirror six inches in diameter costs about \$3, or you can use the heavy pane from a ship's porthole. Sections of large stovepipe or heating pipe make a satisfactory telescope tube although a solid tube is not necessary. A skeleton tube or merely a framework to hold the optical parts in position is enough. A good mounting on which to place the telescope can be assembled from the gears and rear end of a junked automobile. Many amateur telescope clubs assemble all the necessary parts into inexpensive kits which the members buy.

Fruit Trees Fed from Bottles to Speed Up Growth

Fruit trees in a Kent, England, research station are being grown on nourishment fed them from bottles, much in the manner of rearing babies. Small holes are made in the tree trunk for insertion of the ends of flexible tubing connected to inverted bottles of special chemical solutions hung in the top limbs. The trees absorb the chemical plant foods direct. Water may be supplied the trees in the same manner during droughts. The bottlefeeding method speeds up growth and makes possible direct feeding of any part of the tree which may be undernourished.

Spray Gun Applies Solder

Similar in principle to the paint guns used for applying lacquer, a spray gun has been developed for applying molten solder under pressure of compressed air. The tool eliminates the need for torches, soldering irons and liquid fluxes, the special body solder in bar form which is used being melted by an electrically heated element inside the barrel of the gun and converted into metallic spray by compressed air at a pressure of seventy pounds. The flux is part of a special compound in paste form which is applied to the surface being treated with a felt pad furnished with the gun. Little of the heat of the tool and the molten solder is transmitted to the metal panel, so the danger of igniting inflammable materials in contact with the panel is eliminated. A trigger switch controls both heat and air pressure. The gun is particularly adapted to filling dents in automobile fenders and bodies without removing the parts from the car. The secret of the tool's success lies in the absence of grease and dirt on the metal panel A power sanding machine is used to remove paint, primer and rust before soldering and for smoothing the finished job.

Salt Makes Gravel Roads Dustless

Highways are being "salted down" in the Canadian provinces of Ontario and Quebec and rural sections of the United States. Experiments in Nova Scotia indicated that salt not only lengthened the life of clay and gravel roads but virtually eliminated dust. Salt mixed in the clay retards the evaporation of moisture when the road is first laid, and the growth of salt crystals as the road dries out tends to diminish shrinking and cracking.

Traveling on one knee-action swivel wheel, a folding trailer, which opens up to seven times its original size, has beds for four, a table which folds into the floor, refrigerator, food compartment, storage space









Sinker Mold for Fisherman

Fishermen now can pour their own sinkers with the aid of an inexpensive mold which turns out smooth, balanced lead pellets in six sizes. The angler can pour six sinkers at a time, or any single size in the series desired, the weights ranging from one-fourth ounce to two and one-eighth ounces. Two sets of eye rods are supplied so a second pouring can be made while the first is cooling. The mold is assembled and heated, after which it is ready to receive the hot lead.

F Sound Film Traps Criminals by Recording Conversation



While the dictaphone has trapped
many criminals by
their own recorded words, its records can cover
only a small space
of time unless they
are changed frequently. To over-

come this difficulty, Ivan Eremeeff, sound engineer, has developed an apparatus which automatically records every sound in a room for a week and the time it occurred. The apparatus has been made possible by the high development of micro-recording on a sound-film track. A sound film thirty-five millimeters wide can carry as many as ninety-six sound tracks. With 3,000 feet of film and ninetysix sound tracks available, a week's conversation can be recorded. A small concealed microphone picks up the sound. The recording apparatus is driven by an electric motor and can be located at a distance from the microphone. A repeater winds the film which passes over the recording apparatus again and again. Knowing the rate at which the film runs, it is simple to find the time any sound occurred.

Camera "Sees" Black Lightning as Bolt Hits Monument

When lightning struck the Washington monument recently, a cameraman snapped the picture and captured the image of both

the black and white light in the bolt. The black lightning, which appears on the photograph as streaks at the tip of the monument, is a photographic mystery. Dalvert M. Little, chief of the U.S. weather bureau's aerological division, says that scientists have never been able to explain black lightning. One theory is that the peculiar wave length of the light causes a chemical reaction on the photographic plate. making a black streak instead of a white one.

Mask Guards Pilot of High-Flying Army Plane


For altitude tests in which the plane ascends



When the census taker calls on a bacteria colony he needs a high-powered microscope and a high-powered adding machine. Scientists at an English agricultural station took the census of living organisms in a sample of ordinary soil. In a gram of soil—one twenty-eighth of an ounce—there were from one to four billion living bacteria, a million particles of spores of mold fungi and more than a million protozoa, tiny animals slightly larger than bacteria. In rich, well manured soil the bacteria population was even greater.



A LTHOUGH the right kind of gun, shells and hunting ground are of primary importance to the hunter, the experienced shooter knows many a trip can be spoiled by lack of the right kind of accessories. A \$500 shotgun of the correct gauge won't keep a hunter comfortable in a duck blind if he has the wrong kind of boots. And the hunter who hasn't the right kind of raincoat, can't enjoy a rainy day in the marsh even though he has the latest long-range ammunition.

Here are a few tips on clothing, boots, mittens, and other things which often mean the difference between pleasure and discomfort on a trip. Nothing is quite as important in the hunting field as correct shoes or boots. Cold feet, wet feet or footgear too tight or too big can spoil a trip. The sportsman in a mild climate can choose lightweight leather walking or field boots for winter hunts while the sportsman of the north has a choice of fourteen-inch or sixteen-inch waterproofed leather boots, or a combination made of both rubber and leather for slushy, snowy weather.

For ordinary field shooting in





fairly dry weather many use a lightweight leather boot treated with a liquid dressing to increase its water-resisting qualities. With all-wool socks it offers real foot comfort. When the walking is very wet, the hunter can keep as dry as the Sahara by putting on a "pac" that has a foot of rubber and top of leather. You can use a lightweight all-rubber shoe or boot with a fourteen-inch top. Here's a trick to fix up the rubber and leather pac. First, have your cobbler put in removable arch supports. The boots naturally are roomy and fairly flat. By adding the arch supports your feet will not tire as quickly. If you like more heel on the boot, glue small rubber heels inside. Rubber is cold, but by adding a felt inner sole your feet will stay warm in cold, snowy weather.

In buying hip boots for waterfowl shooting, consider whether
the major use of the boots will be
in moderate weather or on very
cold days. Also, do you have a lot
of wading in water and mud?
Many use two different types of
boots for the two purposes. One
model, fairly new on the market,
is ideal for plowing the mud. It is
a snug, "form-fitting" boot with
ample foot and leg room, yet con-

main parts are made of horsehide, reinforced by a knit top of pure wool. This fits the wrist snugly. The palm of the mitten for the right hand has a slit in it with a tiny "trap door" over it. To shoot, you just stick your trigger fingers through the trap door. Back they go into the mitten when the shooting is over. Another practical garment for the duck hunter is the rubber glove for picking up decoys. Taking in block decoys on a cold, windy day is hard on the

structed around the ankle so the mud can't pull it off. This is a lightweight model ideal for marsh hunting.

For cold weather, there is a boot available that is entirely different. This one has almost no ankle or instep because it is made to take a wool-lined moccasin. If you suffer from cold feet, try these boots with the moccasins. When you put them on, tighten up the straps over the insteps and you need not worry about losing them in the mud.

Rubber boots always get damp during a day's use. Hanging them up by the feet to dry out is not easy and the same problem comes when it is time to store them for the season. It is unwise to hang them by the tops because they get out of shape. A folding metal device weighing just six ounces makes the job easier. It attaches to the foot of the boot and holds it securely so the boot will drain and ventilate.

Next to the feet, the most important comfort problem of the hunter concerns the hands. For cold-weather hunting, many prefer the trap-door mitten. The





hands but these rubber gloves give complete protection as they are waterproofed and lined with wool fleece.

But if there is any one accessory the hunter finds a tremendous help on cold days, it's the little heat pack that can be "started" by simply adding water. For the man who waits on a deer run when the temperature is low and the ground is covered with snow, for the duck hunter in a



Two similar three-link sections parted under pulls of 657 and 690 tons, respectively.

Poison Found for Locusts

Sodium arsenate has been found effective in poisoning locusts in Argentina where the pests destroy about thirty per cent of the country's crops. The country is obtaining more and larger machines to spray and sprinkle this poison during the autumn and winter when the locusts have to cross the desert regions, and again in the spring when they move south. Many methods have been tried in Argentina to combat the locust plague but none has been entirely successful. One of the most common methods has been to erect sheetmetal barriers to divert the insects into trenches where they can be destroyed.

Electrical Robot Tells the Time Every Three Seconds



Listening to sound-track voice which recites the correct hour and minute every three seconds

Utilizing sound track movie film, an electrical robot operated by a synchronous motor tells the time in a loud, clear voice at three second intervals. It was designed particularly for use by radio stations and metropolitan telephone exchanges. There are two small endless belts of sound track film, less than twenty feet long; hours are recorded on one and minutes on the other. A scanning optic and photoelectric cell travel the length of the film and return every three seconds, and at the end of each trip the exact time in hours and minutes is announced. After twenty trips a cam moves the minute belt one notch, changing the time and the oral announcement; after sixty moves of the minute reel the hour film is moved up one notch. For advertising purposes, sound track carrying the name of an advertiser could be inserted for announcement with the time.

Fruit Is Kept Free from Decay by Iodized Paper Wrapper

Thin wrapping paper slightly impregnated with iodine is used in England to keep oranges, tomatoes, apples, peaches, plums, grapes and other fresh fruit from decaying. It was found that iodine prevented the formation of mold on the fruit during shipment and storage, thus saving considerable loss. The small amout of iodine does not affect the flavor, nor does it hasten nor delay the ripening of the fruit.


Shielded Loop Antenna Helps Pilot Keep on Course

Enabling pilots to ascertain their location by a turn of a loop antenna and a simple calculation of a dial reading, an improved radio direction finder is being installed on Transcontinental and Western Air planes. The loop antenna, of the shielded type, has the property of reducing static to a minimum. In operation the direction finder consists of an auxiliary receiver and the antenna which can be turned on an axis to a position providing the best reception qualities in tuning in on any selected radio station. At the position

giving the best reception, a reading is taken on the loop dial. A pilot flying the radio beam needs to tune in only one station off the beam to determine his exact location. The angle denoted on the dial in relation to the direction of flight gives the accurate position of the plane.

FIVE METERS

NLIKE the usual 5-meter transceiver, this portable combination receiver and phone transmitter has separate tubes and tuning controls for the r.f. functions of the receiving and

transmitting sections. The audio system, however, is common to both, acting as a signal amplifier for receiving and as a speech-amplifier and modulator for transmitting. Two independent 5-meter anten-

nas are used: therefore it is. possible to adjust the transmitter for maximum efficiency at the frequency desired, after which the entire band may be covered with the separate receiver control without making compromising antenna ad-

justments. The complete unit shown in the photos is called a "transceptor" by the designer in order to identify it from the ordinary transceiver. It employs two type-30 and two type-19 tubes, and is housed in a 7½ by 15 by 15-in, metal cabinet provided with a hinged cover to protect the controls as shown in photo No. 1. A back view of the unit with the rear cover removed, appears in photo No. 2. It will be noted that there is a shield between the receiving and transmitting r.f. circuits. A door in the side of the cabinet provides easy access to the handset compartment. Separate headphones and microphone may be used instead of the handset if preferred.




LTHOUGH the amateur actress in the above sketch is holding a doll in her arms, the audience hears a real baby crying lustily. This is only one of many recorded sound effects available for amateur theatrical use. Others include laughter, mixed cheers, applause, dog barking, angry mob, street and carnival noises as well as trains, airplanes and many additional background sound effects. These records, recorded from the actual sound sources,

are inexpensive, and, when properly amplified and reproduced, add realism to amateur dramatic productions.

The two-channelinput amplifier to be described, is built from standard parts and delivers 18 watts of audio power, sufficient for auditoriums seating up to 500 persons. A single potentiometer controls the volume and permits the operator to select either the phonograph or crystalmicrophone channel

at will. Adaptable for public address, dance orchestras and school use, the output is capable of operating from one to four loud-speakers.

Modern metal tubes are employed in an amplifier circuit which has a flat frequency response and practically no distortion.





150-Watt all-band TRANSMITTER

By R. E. Davy—W9GKU F. L. Brittin—W9DCX

OBTAINING maximum results with a minimum of parts, this all-band transmitter of advanced design might be compared to an improved model automobile motor for which the manufacturer claims some 500 less parts are required.

All-band transmitters usually consist of a

crystal oscillator, operating at the lowest frequency "longest wavelength" used, and a number of frequency-multiplier stages and amplifiers, depending upon the power output desired at the highest frequency. As the frequency increases, so do the losses, making efficient operation more difficult; thus a transmitter which is perfectly stable on 160 or 80 meters may become erratic and operate at low efficiency on 40 or 20 meters. If the experimenter has to check through a number of doubler and amplifier stages it may be weeks before the trouble is located.


This 150-watt all-band transmitter has but two stages to adjust. A type RK-20 pentode tube is used in a "tri-tet" oscillator circuit which employs the tube both as an oscillator and frequency multiplier. The second stage consists of two RK-20's in push-pull as amplifiers; the high-power oscillator fully excites this amplifier either on the crystal frequency or harmonics. A 160-meter crystal also permits operation


on 80 or 40 meters, an 80-meter crystal further serves for 40 and 20-meters, while for 10-meters a 40-meter crystal is used.

The complete 2-stage R.F. section is mounted on a metal base 18 by 12 by 3½ in, deep. As

the tuning condenser frames are grounded, they are mounted directly on the underside of the base together with the various fixed condensers, resistors, R.F. chokes and filament coils L and L. "Thrupanel" insulators with plug-in coil jacks are used to keep all wiring below the base. This










THIS striking model gives the attic railroader a real-life glimpse into the future of high-speed rail transportation.

You start out in the same way as you would in building a ship model. In examining Figs. 1, 2, and 4, you will notice that the body consists of five lifts, the %-in. lower lift being in three sections to make room for the trucks. The second is solid, with a slot cut down the center. This lift and those above it are % in. thick. The first three and the last two lifts are glued together as separate units and form the two parts you see in Fig. 1. The latter unit







to give the wood a thin coat of shellac. Figs. 2 and 3 give you a clear idea of how the motor is mounted to drive the propeller. Dimensions of the mo-


tor and propeller-shaft compartments are not given as these will depend on the motor you use. The motor used to propel the original railplane is of the type designed for driving the conventional ¼-in. scale model locomotive. Its free-running speed is about 6000 r.p.m. Motors of this type will usually run on 12-volts d.c. or 16-volts a.c. Though the motor runs cool-



a.c. will operate it.

Note from Fig. 1 that the entire power plant is fastened to the top section of the car body, the motor

dropping into the well which is already formed in the lower section as in Fig. 3. The motor, as you see, is bolted to a 1/32-in. brass angle plate, which is screwed to the roof of the "conning tower." It will be necessary, of course, to pare away some wood to get the motor in position to line up with the propeller shaft. The latter is a length of %6-in. drill rod connected to the motor through a flexible coupling made of rubber tubing as in Fig. 3. The ends of the rubber tubing are bushed with short lengths of brass tubing, and holes are drilled transversely through the meeting ends of the motor and propeller shafts for cotters made from ordinary pins. When you assemble the coupling, coat the sleeves and the inside of the rubber tubing with rubber cement. To allow for error, you use a 56-in. bit to drill the hole for the propeller shaft, Fig. 2. The shaft can be made to run in a long bushing, or "log," or it can be mounted in two separate bushings, as in Fig. 2. It must be carefully lined up so that there is a minimum of



friction. Before you line it up permanently, notice that there is a sleeve bearing just ahead of the coupling. This is made "freefloating" by lashing it with heavy thread to a base, made of flat brass and screwed to the roof. With this in place you can line up the shaft. Wood putty is forced in around the bushings to hold them in place as in Fig. 2. Do the same if you use the single bushing, or log.

Now, with the motor mounted, you're ready for the propeller and trucks. The former is shown in Fig. 5 and making it is

In Figs. 6, 7 and 8 you have the details of the trucks. The wheels are ball-bearing and are available ready-made just as you see them here. They are designed for "0"-gauge track, which measures 1% in. between the rails. On the original, the side frame members are of 3/2-in, hardwood, as is the balance of the truck frame. You can use 3/32-in. brass if you wish. The frame is pinned and glued together. Some fitting will be necessary to get the trucks to swivel freely when you mount them under the body. The trucks swivel on a pivot pin passing through a rabbeted hardwood block or bolster recessed into the body, as in Fig. 2. Pivot pins can be made from small nails. To finish the assembly install the headlight, the third-rail shoe, window

and door frames, windshield and the wiring. You'll find these details in Figs. 2, 3

and 6. Use rubber-covered wire for all connections and solder all joints. Because the truck frames are wood, electrical connections are made directly to the axles as in Fig. 6. Use No. 22-ga. wire, spring the side member away from the wheel, and wind three turns of the wire around the axle. When the frame springs back it will hold the wire in place. Repeat the operation on the second wheel. Then make "pigtail" connections to this wire, solder them and connect to the car circuit.

Use aluminum paint with an asphalt base for finishing the body. Paint trucks yellow and black. Notice in Fig. 2 that the two members of the body are fastened together with %6-in. machine screws. The screws pass through a metal plate and turn into nuts mortised into the roof. The screws are located off center in the truck wells so that they may be reached with a screwdriver without removing the truck. When you test the railplane see that the track curves are banked and that the trucks take the curves without binding. It may be necessary to cut away more stock to allow the trucks to swivel freely.

This Depth Gauge Can't Slip

Made from a short piece of ¾-in. brass tubing, this depth gauge will fit auger bits or drills from ¼ up to ¾ in. Adjustable



Handles of Pliers Are Notched to Cut Wire


A pair of ordinary pliers can often be made into practical wire cutters by slot-



Instead of earrying a heavy ash can, why not fit it with a couple of casters and wheel it to the alley? Bolt a couple of blocks to the bottom, near opposite sides as shown, one being considerably thicker than the other to keep the can level when casters are attached. It's a good idea to rivet a sheet-metal shield to the top of the can on the same side as the casters to keep the ashes from falling out when the can is tipped to wheel it.

New Feet for Your Sink Strainer



Does the portable strainer you keep around your sink cause black marks on the porcelain? If so, put three rubber feet on it. Get three s mall rubber bumpers and three faucet washers

from the dime store. File off the points of the screws on the bumpers and drill a hole at each corner of the strainer. Then screw the bumpers through the strainer holes into the washers.

Rounded Surfaces Smoothed with Hose Sanding Block


The next time you have a rounded surface to sand, such as a table edge, chair leg, etc., try using a short piece of large rubber hose as a sanding block. Split it up one



side and then cut a piece of sandpaper to fit inside. A small quantity of shellac applied to the back of the sandpaper will help hold it in place.

Mono-Scooter Is Speedy

With a little practice, you can get more speed out of this mono-scooter than out of a pair of roller skates. It is made from two roller-skate wheels and a hardwood block as wide as the shoe and about 5 in. longer. Round the ends of the block and slot them to take the wheels. Steel rods serve as axles, and washers are placed on either side of each wheel to keep it true. These should be lubricated. Triangular blocks serve as heel and toe plates, and a single toe strap keeps the scooter on the shoe. Tilting the foot to one side brings the block into contact with the sidewalk to get efficient braking.

Angle Sawing for Economy



HERE'S a novel scroll or band-saw technique, which can be used to good advantage in making lamp bases, book ends, model boat hulls, and many other projects. The two lamp bases shown in the top photo are typical examples. Each of these bases is cut from one piece of


wood, the size of the original board being the size of the largest piece of the base.

The "beehive" lamp base illustrates the procedure: The lines on which the stock is to be cut are laid out, starting with a radius of % in., and increasing % in. until a radius of 31/4 in. is reached. Small holes are drilled to permit the insertion of a fine scroll-saw blade, and the various rings are sawed out. The saw table is not level, but is on an angle of about 2 degrees.

Forms glued up in this fashion can be turned or otherwise machined to form wooden bowls, boat hulls, etc. The principle used is thoroughly practical, and will effect a considerable saving in material on production work where the nature of the project permits its use



A center jig can be used, or the cut can be guided by hand. Each of the rings, being cut on an angle, will project a certain distance from the next larger ring. One of the illustrations shows how the rings are projected to form the lamp base. Glue is used to maintain the pieces in this position. In production work, a master form would be used to set each ring quickly at the required distance.

The small holes necessary for scroll sawing can be plugged or filled with plastic wood readily. The edge of each circle of the original lamp was rounded on the shaper, but a master form could be used for the same operation done on the lathe after gluing.

Clothespins soaked in a soap solution and dried without rinsing, will not freeze to the line or clothes in cold weather.

Hat Rack Pivoted to Closet Door Utilizes Waste Space



This rack raises and lowers, the parallel links holding it horizontally in any position

Screwed to the door or wall of a small closet where space is limited, this hat rack is raised out of the way, utilizing waste space above the garment rails, and is lowered to a convenient height for selecting the hats. A wood disk carrying seven "mushroom" supports is pivoted to the door by means of two pairs of parallel links or arms, the link brackets on the disk being cut from heavy sheet metal, while those on the door are short pieces of angle iron. The pivot bolts or rivets should be drawn up snugly so that friction will hold the rack in any position.




Profile of Lathe Turning Tools Checked with Special Gauge

Take a piece of sheet metal of any convenient size and file the profiles of the various tools in the edges as shown. Attach it to your grinder where it will always be at hand. Different profiles may be ground on each end of a tool to save material.

Roll-Film Guide Simplifies Tray Development



Eliminating the possibility of scratching the emulsion side of roll film, when developing it in a tray, this simple guide also effects a saving in developing fluid and prevents the film from curling and getting out of the tray. The guide consists of a small, round bottle, a brass arm and a plywood base. The parts are assembled as shown in the detail with the tray resting on the base as indicated in the photo. The bottle cap, which is cemented to the glass to keep it from loosening, is fastened to the end of the arm with a machine screw. and the arm is attached to the base with small bolts and wing nuts to permit easy removal, as it must be taken off to empty and clean the trays. It is best to use separate guides for developing and washing, and all metal parts should be given several coats of lacquer to keep them from affecting the fluids. In use, the tray is filled with enough fluid to come well over



the bottle, after which the film is slipped under the bottle, emulsion side out, and pulled back and forth through the fluid, this operation being continued for the length of time necessary to develop the film.—Robert J. Williams, Chicago.


Rooms Facing Narrow Court Brightened by Reflected Light

If buildings are so close to your home that they darken the rooms, you'll be surprised how much the rooms can be brightened by setting white-cloth frames outside of the windows at an angle. The cloth is tacked to wood frames, which are hinged to the window sills, small chains being used to hold them in place. White oilcloth, or pieces of sheet metal, painted white, may be used instead of cloth, and they are easier to keep clean.

■Unsightly deposits that often form at the water line of fish bowls and aquariums may be removed by rubbing them with a cloth saturated in vinegar; rinse the bowl thoroughly before filling with fresh water.



Cool Handle on Furnace Poker Prevents Burned Hands



No matter how hot the lower part of the poker gets you can always grip it with this sliding handle


Made by wrapping several turns of sheet asbestos on your poker, clinker hook or similar tools used around the homeheating plant, this sliding grip is always cool, regardless of how long the tool is kept inside the firebox. The turns of asbestos are cemented with water glass.

Dangers in Diving Helmets to Be Avoided

There is extreme danger in using homemade diving helmets. No person should attempt to submerge in such a device unless he is a good swimmer and is physically fit. For amateurs, a diving helmet must be designed so that it can be dropped off the wearer's shoulders any instant, and for this reason a harness must be avoided. The diver should be able to rise to the surface at will, without being dependent on anyone above. A diving helmet, therefore, should fit over the head with enough excessive space to permit "dumping" it by a forward movement of the body. A constant flow of fresh air pumped into the helmet through a single length, unspliced, non-kinking hose by means of a pump having a capacity greater than needed, must be provided to assure the diver enough fresh air. Never use hose that is joined and taped together. Breathing in a helmet should be easy, and the air inside should be as "fresh" as outside air; if this is not the case enough air is not being delivered and the hose or pump may be at fault. If the air inside seems stale, "dump"

the helmet at once-don't continue to wear it because, should the supply of fresh air be inadequate, gradual suffocation from lack of oxygen may result, and you may not be able to hold your breath until you reach the surface. For the novice, it may be best to leave the practice of diving to professionals, but if you are determined to use a diving helmet, no better advice can be given than to practice in water not over six feet deep until you are thoroughly aware of any emergencies that may arise. At no time should a person use such an apparatus at a greater depth than he can make a surface dive. Further, no novice should use the equipment until it has been tested by persons who are in a position to know whether it is safe.

Cutter on Spool of Heavy Thread



Attached to a spool of thread with a thumbtack, this handy cutter eliminates the trouble of locating a pair of scissors every time you wish to cut off a piece of thread. The cutter is made from sheet metal and filed to a sharp edge. In use, the

thread is brought down over the end of the spool and across the cutting edge.

Teeth on One Side of File Filled to Protect Adjoining Work

When smoothing the bottom of a narrow slot where it is necessary to prevent

marring the adjoining work, coat the teeth on one side of the file with water glass. Apply it liberally and wait for it to dry. When the job is finished remove the water glass with a file card.




Upholstered DEN COUCH has storage space



TWO frames of the same size hinged together, the top frame upholstered, the lower mounted on four turned legs and provided with a plywood bottom-and there's your combination couch and storage chest. The upholstering is so simplified that if you can drive tacks you can do the job. The first thing is to find an old set of bedsprings and dismantle it. What you're after, of course, are the coil springs and holders. Now, the top half of the couch frame is made up as in the details on this page. Then the spring-holder bars are cut to fit between the side pieces, to which they are anchored with screws. It is a simple matter to snap the springs into the holes provided in the holders. Next, both lateral and longitudinal strips of cotton tape or webbing are tacked to

sides and ends of the frame. Each spring is sewed to the tape at the four points with a waxed string. The springs are first covered with a heavy material, preferably canvas, which is tacked at about 2-in. intervals completely around the frame. It is to be expected that the two outer rows of springs will be compressed to a greater degree than the inner rows.

Four rolls of cotton batting are spread over the canvas, layer upon layer. Be sure that the thickness of the padding is uniform then cover it






with an old linen sheet or other similar material, tacked to the frame in the same manner as the canvas. This cover will prevent the padding from shifting with use. When tacking the tapestry, be sure to draw it evenly to prevent wrinkles. Space the tacks about 1 in, apart and keep them in a line 1/4 in. above the bottom edge of the frame. This precaution must be taken in order that the tacks will not show after the binding has been applied. The binding comes in various widths and can be purchased in any department store handling upholstery materials. It should be of a contrasting shade of the same color as the cover. For the back, pillows can be made of material left over from upholstering, filled with kapok, and fitted with slip covers of a matching color. This finishes the upholstering job.

The lower frame is now assembled as indicated in the details. It must have the

top frame. Care must be taken with the corners because they will be exposed as finished wood in the completed assembly. The plywood bottom should be placed immediately after the lower frame has been assembled. It can be nailed directly onto the underside of the frame and the corners beveled with a hand plane to prevent showing, or set in a rabbet and fastened with screws as shown. The legs can then be turned and screwed into place. The proper method of mounting is with screws driven through the four corners of the leg. This done, the hinges are mortised into the frames and fastened with screws. Use brass butt hinges with removable pins. You can now finish the lower frame and legs in any color you desire. First, give the wood a thorough sanding with progressively finer grades of paper. If you use an open-grain wood it will require filling with a paste filler, then stain, shellac and wax. Or, in place of the latter, you can use a high-grade varnish, laid on over a coat of white shellac.

Nicked Nails Easily Broken Off

Where nails often must be used that are a little too long for the job, I find that instead of clinching the projecting ends it




is better to file or cut a series of notches in each one as shown, before driving them. Then they can be broken off with a couple of twists. This method is

especially handy on work where it may be necessary to use a plane after nailing. —W. S. Houseburg, Pittsburgh, Pa.



To increase the efficiency of a storm window that doesn't fit snugly in the casing, strips of tape, such as Scotch drafting tape, placed around the inside surface as shown, have been found

effective in sealing the joints against passage of cold air. Before applying the tape, the surfaces that it contacts must be cleaned thoroughly so that it will stick. The tape is easily stripped off.







sharpening both edges. A rubber disk with a slit in the center slides on the blade and serves as a stop so that a number of holes can be cut to the same width.








bulb and the revolving switch, which are joined by a copper strip. The switch must work freely. By making the tube in two parts, the assembly is easy. Paper wrapped around it completes the joint. Four bands of black paper are wrapped around the telescope to make the sooty eyepiece less conspicuous.

Fig. 4 shows an elaboration of the popular "grab-bag" idea. In this case a large carton is equipped with three shelves, which fold up against the sides of the box, giving free access to the favors for guests in the bottom. Lights are arranged so that the inside of the box is dark. After two or three merrymakers have drawn prizes from the box, an attendant "in the know" lets down one of the shelves by means of a concealed string. This shelf may have on it a shallow pan of lard, or a sheet of paper coated with lampblack or graphite and oil, or red grease—anything that will not flow when the shelf is in the vertical position. In the laughter which follows the victim's predicament, the attendant draws up the shelf and another guest is invited to draw from the box, this one of course brings out a favor. Eventually the other two shelves are let down to provoke more laughter.

A collapsible chair can easily be made from a common kitchen chair, and, if others of the same design are placed in the room, the tricky one will not be noticeable. Remove the legs and round off both ends as in Fig. 6. They are then joined in two pairs consisting of one front and one back leg connected with a rung. Coil springs, concealed inside of thin tubes are substituted for the front and rear rungs.





The tubes should fit into the holes formerly occupied by the rungs, and are painted to resemble them. As soon as a guest sits on the chair the tubes pull out and the chair sprawls. Strong tension springs should be used.

A most surprising effect is afforded by the "X-ray" helmet shown in Fig. 7. This, briefly, is a cardboard box with two mirrors arranged to throw the vision directly behind. The user of the helmet will have the strange sensation of seeing what appears to be the foreground receding from him as he progresses, and although there may appear to be an open door ahead, more likely he will fetch up against a wall.

For a confetti blizzard, an electric fan is rigged as shown in Fig. 8. This also can be operated by an extension switch. Make a large cardboard cylinder to fit over the fan frame, paste a disk of tissue over the front end, just enough to hold it until the blast strikes it, and then fill the space half full of confetti. When the unwary guest steps in front of the fan, he is deluged with a shower of confetti.

Ideas for Halloween costumes are pictured in Figs. 9 and 10. The frog suit is an ordinary union suit dyed a light green, with dark green cloth spots sewed or cemented on. Cardboard, plywood, wire and cloth are all that is necessary to make the turtle costume. By cutting the back halves as indicated and joining along the ridge with adhesive tape, a very convincing shell can be made. The anchor is simply made of plywood and cardboard, and the wearer should be clad in trunks and have tattoo figures on arms and legs painted with harmless coloring, such as fruit juice.






Twist Tamper Does Not Stick in Clay or Concrete



Twisting the tamper slightly tends to break the vacuum between it and the wet material

The tendency of wet clay or concrete to adhere to the bettom of a tamper can be avoided by giving it a slight twist as it is lifted each time. The twisting action tends to clean the surface of the tamper and break the vacuum that exists between it and the wet material. To facilitate twisting the tamper, a hand grip is provided.

Flexible "Finger" Picks Articles from Small Gratings




For retrieving small articles in places where you can't reach them with the hands, such as heating registers and gratings, you can use this simple "finger." It consists of three lengths of spring brass wire twisted together, leaving three prongs at one end,

which are bent to form jaws. Insert the assembly into a length of flexible conduit and form an eye on the other end of the wires. Moving them back and forth in the conduit opens and closes the jaws.

Upholsterers' Gimp Is Spread with Steel Ball

Depth of Small Holes Measured with Automatic Pencil



Here is a simple method of measuring the depth of small holes. The point of an automatic pencil is inserted in the hole and the lead is forced out until it touches the bottom. When the pointed end of the pencil is even with

the surface of the work the projecting lead is equal to the depth of the hole.

Broom to Sweep Snow and Slush Stiffened with Wood Backing

Stiffened with a piece of plywood, an ordinary broom can be used effectively for cleaning sidewalks of fairly deep snow. Cut the plywood to the



shape of the broom and drill a few small holes through it to take fine wire, which attaches it to the broom. It is best to cut the plywood about an inch shorter than the broom straws so that they will project from the bottom edge. Thus, the plywood pushes the heavy snow, while the projecting straws sweep the walk clean.

Oven Rack Has Guard on Edge to Prevent Accidents




There won't be any danger of accidentally pushing a roaster off the rear edge of a wire rack in an oven if the rack is fitted with a metal guard as shown. To make such a guard, you simply bend a

piece of galvanized iron of suitable length at right angles, drill holes through the metal, and wire it onto the rack.

Pipe Insulation in Metal Sleeves Is Well Protected

When heavily insulated steam pipes pass through a room where the insulation is likely to be damaged by objects striking



If some insulation has been knocked off your steam pipes, replace it and sheath it with sheet metal

or rubbing against it, you can avoid such trouble by encasing the pipes in sheet metal as shown. Use a metal light enough to be formed around the insulation by hand and fasten it at the seams with sheetmetal screws.

Putting Up Cloth or Paper Sign in Windy Weather



Wind cannot tear a paper sign when putting it up if it is rolled on a broomstick

It's a simple matter to put up a cloth or paper sign single-handed on a windy day, if it is first rolled on a stick. Fasten the free end of the sign and then gradually unroll it as you tack down the edges. With this method, the untacked portion of the paper is kept tightly rolled so that there is no chance for the wind to tear it.


Reflector for Photo-Flash Bulbs from Small Hand Mirror

control the bulb, a small toggle switch should be fastened to the block within easy reach.—Paul Hadley, Piggott, Ark.





Generally speaking, gun fit hinges on just three dimensions of the stock, which you will find in Fig. 3. These are the length measured from the trigger to the center of the curved butt plate, and the comb and heel drop measured in inches from the sight line. Manufacturers, considering the design of their own product, have worked out average stock dimensions that are intended to be suitable for

most shooters of average stature. Then there is the structure of the gun itself. For example, you might find a double gun, similar to that in Fig. 1, unsuited to you individually, while the repeating or autoloading gun, with essentially the same stock dimensions, might fit exactly. This would likely be due to the variation in the type of gun rather than in the stock alone.

Now, to find out whether the gun in hand fits you individually: Sometimes this is rather difficult to determine fully at the outset. With any one of the four shotguns shown in Fig. 1, at your shoulder, go through the five positions shown in Fig. 7. In each case, the arrow indicates the direction in which the gun is pointing at the start of the swing. The foot positions are only approximations, of course, but if you practice them until you acquire the habit, they will help greatly in balancing for a quick shot. Remember that your arms must "lock" the gun to your shoulder; your feet do not move. Your body does the swinging. Now take the first two, in Fig. 7, as an example. At the start of the swing, in each case, hold the gun as in




Fig. 6. In the first swing, left to right, you'll notice a gradual tightening of the muscular tension as you come around, also a more or less involuntary tendency of the cheek to slide backward on the comb. The latter will be more pronounced if the stock is too short for you, although it is not as evident as it will be when you try the second swing on an imaginary overhead incoming target. This time the cheek will tend strongly to slide forward. Some shooters take this shot with a backward body bend; others by arm swing.


Now go back to Figs. 2, 3 and 4. Most crack wing shots use a "straight" stock, which means, first of all, but little variation between the comb and heel drop, Fig. 3. Most of these shooters habitually "cheek" the gun hard, that is, the cheek is pressed firmly onto the comb in all shooting positions. This has a tendency to

"lock" the gun, the head acting as a sort of base of the triangle formed by the arms. Now, suppose as an example that the gun you have in hand has a heel drop of 3 in., and a comb drop of 11/2 in. Although some men can use a stock of these dimensions, you may note some difficulty in swinging the gun quickly into position, that is, you will be conscious of an effort required to swing and point it. You may even have to raise your head slightly to catch the front sight. Obviously, these additional movements will distract your attention from the target and be a decided handicap in fast shooting. Trying the same type gun with a

heel drop of only 2 in., the comb drop being $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. as before, you will probably note a difference at once. The straighter stock will bring your eye above the breech as in Fig. 6, and the barrel, or barrels, will be in full view, as in Figs. 2 and 4. Such a position enables you to judge distance and lead quickly and accurately. Keep in mind that in all tests of this kind as well as in actual shooting, you should acquire the habit of keeping both eyes open. This utilizes a principle of stereoscopics, the value of which you can easily check by closing one eye and then attempting to gauge the distance quickly to either a moving or stationary object.


Length of the stock and degree of pitch also have something to do with the "feel" of a shotgun. Most shooters find that a stock length of 14 in. is right for them. This, combined with a heel drop of 2 or




2½ in. and a comb drop of ½ in., will prove suitable for a majority of those of average stature. Man-

ufacturers can usually furnish such stocks as standard on the better grades of guns. Stocks are usually furnished with a 1-in. pitch, Fig. 3, but this also varies from zero to as much as 3 in. Certain physical characteristics may make it necessary to specify a special type of comb when selecting a new gun. For instance, if you are fullfaced you will probably find a narrow comb, Fig. 5, more suitable. A man with a thin face will likely find a wide or raised comb an advantage. In all this the shooter must determine for himself, by experiment, just what stock characteristics suit him best. Fig. 8 shows one way of lengthening the standard stock that is too short. A new butt plate is made of a pressedfiber material. The butt is squared and the longer butt plate is screwed in place and worked down flush with the wood, A rubber recoil pad will also accomplish the same thing. Any reputable gunsmith can fit the latter for a nominal charge. As a rule nearly all types of shotguns balance at a point from 4 to 6 in. above the trigger as in Fig. 9. Under certain conditions it may be advisable to shift this slightly to make a gun handle better. By taking off the butt plate as in Fig. 10, and boring two or more shallow holes in the stock you can move this point forward, or, by filling one or more holes with lead the point will be moved nearer the trigger. Another stock alteration is shown in Fig. 11. Here you can do either of two things, change both drop and position of the butt plate, or change the drop alone. Either is a comparatively simple job but it must be done with care. By raising the comb and butt plate as in the first two details, you can correct a tendency to undershooting. If you have an expensive gun, it's best to







take it to a gunsmith to have this work done, as he can probably fit a new stock made to your own specifications for little more than the alteration would cost. But if the stock is plain, straight-grained wood, you can do the job yourself. It is only in later years that the "beavertail" forearm, or fore end, as it is also termed, has come into widespread use. Its real advantage is its greater length and width. On most



older guns the fore-end construction will permit the alteration detailed in Fig. 13. Careful fitting is, of course, necessary. The added wood will shift the point of balance slightly, but you can easily compensate for this by "loading" the butt stock as in

At the present time, you can, when purchasing the better-grade shotguns, just about "write your own ticket," for they are now made with varying stock dimensions designed to suit the great majority of shooters. In addition, practically all manufacturers can, for a nominal extra charge, furnish a gun with a stock made to your own specifications. Of course, you must determine beforehand the stock dimensions that suit you individually. You also have a variety of barrel boring to choose from. These are the cylinder, or open bore, the improved cylinder, the skeet chokes, No. 1 and No. 2, the modified, the improved modified and the full choke. These terms signify the degree of choke boring. Fig. 12 shows two representative shot patterns. The modified barrel is the best all-around choice, but for quick work at close range the improved cylinder or skeet chokes are preferable.

Chest of Drawers Hides Single-Room Lavatory



Built with two false drawers and three regular ones, this plywood chest is open at the back so that it can be pushed against a wall over a lavatory to conceal it, as is often desired in rooming houses, hotels and dormitories. The drawers are about two-thirds the depth of the chest, the top one sliding freely over the basin, while the two lower ones slide under it and in front of the plumbing. The false drawer fronts are made by cutting shallow grooves in a solid panel, the use of four wood-knob drawer pulls adding to the deception. Four easy-rolling casters make it a simple matter to move the chest.



Metal Spinnings Lubricated by Ordinary Candle



A candle rubbed on the surface of metal-spinning work lubricates it nicely

I have found that a candle stub is satisfactory for lubricating the surface of metal while spinning it, and in many cases, where sheet lead and other soft metals are to be stretched to shape inside of a hollow form, it is superior to other lubricants I have used. Just hold the end of the candle against the rotating work, and friction will melt the wax, which will s read evenly over the surface. If maple dowels are used for tools, the wood ends pick up some of the wax, but even then an occasional application of the candle is advisable. This prevents cutting of the surface and, except for a final touching up with steel wool, the work is ready for the finish after having been spun to shape.


Thread Kit from Poker-Chip Rack



Gutter Nailed over Storm Door Carries Away Rain




Water will not run down your back when you open a storm door if this small gutter is installed



mum. Trim squarely both corresponding pairs of pieces to measure 1134 by 14 in. and 9½ by 11¼ in. respectively. To do this accurately, place the veneer between two pieces of scrap stock and plane it straight as in Fig. 2. Corresponding pairs are now placed diagonally one on top of the other and fastened down temporarily with tabs of gummed tape. The pieces are cut diagonally from corner to corner, using a straightedge for guiding the knife. When cut in this manner, two sets of four equal segments are produced. Pieces of corresponding size and grain are then selected and are cross-banded together with short lengths of gummed tape to form four triangular shaped assemblies as in Fig. 4. The joining of the four segments into one piece completes the taping, and the veneer is ready to be glued to the core. Sufficient clamping pressure can be applied with a number of handscrews and a few crowned edge blocks. Run the edge of a backsaw over the surface to roughen it slightly and then spread a uniform film of glue over the entire surface. When the glue becomes tacky, center the veneer sheet on the core, taped side up, and work out the wrinkles with a large dowel stick or a rolling pin. Any air bubbles appearing in the veneered surface can be split open with the edge of a razor blade. Lav a sheet of heavy paper over the veneer, place a panel of ¾-in. wood over this and begin applying the clamps. Remove the clamps after 24 hrs., trim the veneer ¼ in. back from the edge of the core and sand smooth. Fig. 6 details the molded edge.

The U-shaped legs are worked up from 11/8-in. stock. Four pieces 21 by 23/4 in. for the uprights, and two pieces of the same stock, 23 and 14 in, long, for the half-lap sections, will be required. The four set-in corners are cut from a block measuring 18 by 1¾ by 2¾ in. Before the straight members of the legs are tapered, tenons are cut for the corner blocks. From the side and front elevations, Fig. 6, find the correct length for these pieces, allowing for tenons. The half-lap joint, Fig. 8, is carefully cut for a snug fit. Blocks for the curved corners are 4 in. long and are angle cut 45° to a length of 21/8 in. These are mortised to receive the tenons on the adjoining pieces. Dowel joints can be used, if desired. Tapering operation can be done on the jointer. However, the tapering of the width of the leg should not be done until after the corners have been glued and clamped as in Fig. 8. The corners are then scribed with a 234-in, radius and are bandsawed outside the line as in Fig. 5 so that when sanded, the edges of the adjoining pieces will come flush. After cutting, the legs are tapered in width. The shaping must be done, of course, before the half-lap is assembled. In all shaping operations, the work is held on edge with the spindle collar bearing against the face of the work as in Fig. 7. Details of the leg molding are shown in Fig. 6. Molding cuts on the inside face of the legs are stopped at the half-lap. Attaching the ball feet, Fig. 8, completes the table as you see it in Fig. 1. These are bandsawed in much the same procedure as is used in cutting a cabriole chair leg; the scraps removed in the first cutting are saved and tacked back on to form a flat surface for making the final cut. The ball effect of the feet is then formed with knife, file and sandpaper. They are attached with \%-in. dowels and glue.

Getting Good Draft in Chimney Accommodating Two Stoves




Chimney draft passing extended end of stovepipe creates strong suction in second-floor stove

After installing a stove on the second floor of a building where the same chimney also served a stove on the first floor, I found that the draft was very poor, due to the fact that there was a strong draft up the chimney from the lower stove. To eliminate this trouble, the end of the stovepipe was cut to the shape shown and pushed into the chimney for about twothirds its width. With this arrangement, it was found that air flowing up the chimney created a strong suction inside the stovepipe on the second floor. A drain should be cut in the bottom of the pipe that extends into the chimney so that rain water will not collect in it.






This hinged shelf will keep large garments from reaching the floor and getting soiled






Hot-Dish Mat of Wood to Match Your Table




Resembling a hubless wheel, this hotdish mat is decorative and can be made from a wood disk and some dowels. Mount the disk, which should be ¾ in. in thickness, on the screw chuck of your lathe and turn it to 8 in. in diameter. Then, ¾6 in. from the edge, recess it to a little more than half of its thickness, leaving an untouched circle 1¾ in. in diameter in the center. Drill 24 equally spaced holes through the rim for ¾6-in. dowels. Be sure that each hole points true to the center of the disk. Insert the dowels, butting the ends against the unturned portion in the center of the disk. This assures that they will project an equal distance inside the rim. Then pull them out about ½ in., and coat the portion that goes inside the rim with glue, after which they are pushed back in place. When the glue has dried cut off the ends projecting outside the rim and turn them down flush. Now sand the rim, move the tool rest to the back of the work and cut out the center of the disk. Finishing the mat to match the table and chairs makes a nice job.

Photo Enlargements Vignetted with a Piece of Cardboard

Amateur photographers who want to vignette their photos when making enlargements, can do a good job with a homemade vignetter cut from cardboard. Get a piece larger than the printing paper to be used and cut an opening in it the shape you want. The opening should be smaller than the actual size of the image as it appears on the easel of the enlarger. When ready to make the exposure, hold the vignetter between the lens and the easel so that the light will pass through the opening onto the portion of the printing paper to be exposed. The card should be moved slowly backward and forward so that the edges of the photo will be softly blended into the border. The only requirement of this method is that the photo have a white or light background.

SMALL SEWING KIT

[/ACATION snapshots in a match pad, a favorite print on your coat hanger. in an "hourglass" mounting or on the face of the alarm clock-these are some of the novel mountings you can use to "individualize" your photo collection. Take the first one, a really personal match pad. Here the photos are printed on double-weight printing paper and an attractive border is formed by masking. The strip on which the photos are printed is then folded, the scratching surface is glued to one edge, and two rows of matches are inserted and stapled. Or you can omit the matches and insert instead, a number of prints

to make a novel midget album. Carrying the same idea further, a complete needle-and-thread sewing kit can be installed as shown in one of the details. Two pieces of cardboard are used as holders, one being scalloped to hold a supply of thread as shown. The other is fitted with a "cushion" for holding the needles.

At the top of the page are shown a number of applications of prints glued to a plywood backing and then outlined by sawing to the border lines of the figure. The first one, left to right, is designed as a toothpick holder. A piece of 3/8-in. plywood is used as a backing. An enlargement of the head and shoulders is glued to the backing and sawed to the outline. Then a number of holes are drilled in the edge of the plywood to hold the toothpicks. The alarmclock mounting is a more detailed project. Here you remove the original face, replace it with a photo print and then letter on the numerals with India ink. The print is glued to the plate which forms a backing for the original clock face. The latter is usually heavy paper in NOVEL MOUNTINGS



and is easily stripped off. Care should be taken to center the main feature of the photo so that the job appears neat and attractive. Now, another method of printing the numerals is to place a thin sheet of celluloid-a piece of old film with the emulsion removed will do-over the original dial and trace the markings right on the film in India ink. In making the print, place the celluloid in contact with the negative used and print both at once. The numerals will then appear in white on the photo. They can be left white, or colored to obtain contrast. The third item, a coat

hanger, is made in essentially the same way SAND as the first except the entire hanger and backing for the photo is sawed from %-in. plywood. You can use any ordinary wooden hanger for a pattern in laying out the shape and size. The hook is bent from heavy wire. The fourth novelty is designed to hang on the wall and consists of a base screwed to a piece of 4-in. plywood on which the photo is mounted. The plywood is then sawed away to the outlines of the face. The match box slips over a small block of wood glued to the base. Miniature boxes of matches, obtainable at any cigar store, are best suited to the purpose as they are small and neat. The last item is a photo ash tray and it's made in the same way as the match holder except that the base is larger and supports an ash tray or cup. This can be a radio coil form or a short length of brass tubing with a brass disk soldered to the bottom. In all cases the edges of the plywood backing the photo print



Then you put the photo in place under the window, fill one of the pockets with fine, sifted







Coating Metals with Silver, Copper and Nickel without Using a Tank



I T'S possible for anyone to plate readily with silver, copper and nickel without using tanks and solutions and without the necessity of completely dismantling the object to be plated. Like other processes

of electroplating, it is important that surfaces to be plated be thoroughly cleaned to remove every trace of dirt and grease which would prevent the adhesion of the plate. The surfaces should be thoroughly polished also as the final plate will be no smoother than the base metal to which it is applied.

Removing Grease: Grease and

oil, if present in large quantity, should be removed by a careful wiping followed by a thorough scrubbing of the parts with gasoline, naphtha, or carbon tetrachloride as in Figs. 2 and 3. The application of solvents is to be recommended particularly when cleaning parts of automobiles and machinery. The solvent is applied with a stiff brush. Deep cracks containing grease should receive partic-

ular attention. If it is impossible to use gasoline or other solvents for the removal of grease, the parts may be wiped as clean as possible and thoroughly scrubbed with a hot solution made by dissolving soap in water and adding soda ash, about 6 oz., to each gallon of soap solution. This solution should be applied hot as in Fig. 4. After the surface has been thoroughly cleaned with soap solution, it should be rinsed with several changes of clean water as in Fig. 5. It is not sufficient simply to rinse the surface several times with one batch of water, but rather the water must be changed at least

three times, washing out the brush thoroughly in between. Where solvents are used for cleaning, it is advisable to rinse the work thoroughly with soapsuds to assure the removal of any remaining traces of oil film. Soapy water will emulsify this film and thus make certain its complete removal.

Removal of Corrosion: If the metal surface to be plated is corroded or badly tarnished, it will be necessary to apply an acid rinse as in Figs. 8 and 9. A good wash for removing oxide can be made as in Fig. 8. In mixing acid solutions of this


type, it is important that the sulphuric acid be added slowly to the water, not the water to the acid. The solution should be made up and stirred in a 1-gal, glass or stone container. When applying the acid solution, it's best to wear rubber gloves to protect your hands. A medium-sized brush is used for applying the acid solution. Only a small amount of the surface should be cleaned at one time and, following the application of the acid, the surface should be rinsed off thoroughly with clean water to remove the acid as rapidly as it has accomplished its purpose of dissolving oxides and corrosion. After cleaning and thoroughly rinsing with warm water, the cleaned object should not be touched by the hands. It's important that all preparation for plating, such as arranging the equipment and mixing of the plating salts, be carried out before the cleaning operation is started.

Plating with Copper and Nickel: By this process, powdered electroplating salts are held in a bag attached to a holder and metal anode as shown in Fig. 7. The top plate and clamping plate are materials which do not conduct electricity, and the anode, shown in Fig. 2, consists of a sheet of the metal which is to be plated onto the work. For nickel plating, this must be a piece of sheet nickel; a copper sheet is used when plating copper. Brass machine screws register with the holes in the plates and one of these screws is sufficiently long to receive a nut and the terminal lug from the battery.

The bag for holding the plating salts is usually medium heavy duck, canton flannel, or other strong material and is equipped with a drawstring, as in Figs. 7 and 12, so that it can be pulled tight around the clamping plate. With the bag charged with plating salts and securely tied, the




top plate is dropped in place, the wing nuts are drawn down by hand and the outfit is ready to use.

Fig. 1 shows the connections to a storage battery. A long lead of flexible wire, approximately 6 ft., should be attached to the negative pole of the storage battery. The other end of this lead is fitted with a heavy-duty battery clip which has enough spring action to take a secure "bite" on the part to be plated. The positive pole of the battery should be connected to a 6ohm, heavy-duty radio rheostat which may be mounted on a small panel or clamped to the battery itself. The other terminal of the rheostat is connected by a 6-ft. length of flexible wire to the plater. To assure good contact, the end of the cable from the rheostat should be equipped with a terminal lug.

The only other equipment required to complete the assembly is a ½-gal. stone crock to hold the water into which the plating applicator is dipped from time to time as plating progresses. As the wet applicator is rubbed over the surface to be plated, the water, which has dissolved a part of the plating salts, makes electrical contact between the work and the anode exactly as if the unit were installed in a plating tank, thus completing the cir-

cuit so that the metal may be deposited. In electroplating by this method, it is important that the rheostat be adjusted with high resistance in the circuit at the start, and adjustments made as trials progress until the proper adjustment is found to produce the most satisfactory results.

Nickel Plating: Prepare the electroplating salts by mixing together the dry materials required and grinding them relatively fine, preferably in a mortar as shown in Fig. 11. An excellent formula for nickel-plating salts is shown in Fig. 10. The salts are carefully weighed and thoroughly mixed. Now, with all preparations made as described, the plater is rubbed over the surface to be plated with uniform strokes. A little experience will indicate the proper movement for the production of the best appearing plate. If the applicator is rubbed over the surface too slowly, the plate will become too thick in spots. To



avoid this, medium strokes are used with regularity and after the entire surface has been covered once, the operation is repeated until the plate has been built up to the desired thickness.

Certain metals, such as zinc, are rather difficult to plate by this method unless a special salt mixture is used. If the plating salts are made by mixing nickel sulphate, 9 oz., ammonium chloride, 2 oz., sodium sulphate, 14 oz., gum tragecanth (powdered), ¼ oz., and boric acid, 2 oz., it will be found that better results will be produced on certain metals which are otherwise tedious to coat with nickel.

The above formulas will produce electroplates of nickel which have the characteristic appearance of this metal. If a more silvery white finish is desired, the formula for mixing the salts should be compounded by mixing together nickel sulphate, 9 oz., cadmium sulphate, 2 oz., ammonium chloride, 21/2 oz., sodium sulphate, 10 oz., boric acid, 2 oz., and gum tragecanth (powdered), 1/4 oz. The amount of cadmium sulphate added will determine the whiteness of the plate. If effects different from those produced by this particular formula are desired, the quantity of cadmium sulphate may be varied.

Silver Plating: A brilliant and somewhat durable, though thin, coat of silver may be readily produced on metal surfaces by applying a preparation mixed as in Fig. 15. The powders are thoroughly mixed while dry and immediately before use, a small quantity is reduced to the consistency of a thick paste

with water as in Fig. 16. The paste is applied to the well-cleaned surface to be silvered with a piece of cloth as in Fig. 17 in the same manner as would be used for applying metal polishes. To avoid stains on the hands wear rubber gloves. As the rubbing proceeds, a lustrous film of silver will be coated over the entire surface.



Copper Plating: If the well-cleaned surface to be plated with copper is wiped over rapidly with a solution made by adding copper sulphate, 3 oz., and sulphuric acid, ¼ fl. oz., to water, 2 qts., a thin, tenacious film of copper will be formed. In applying the above solution, rubber gloves should be worn and a piece of stiff fabric used for making the application. The surface should be gone over but once, inasmuch as repeated wiping with this solution will tend to remove the initial fine coating. After the surface has been covered with a thin film of copper by this means, it is washed with clean water. Any spots which have not been covered may be wiped over again to assure complete coverage. Although the above coating of copper is not sufficiently thick nor durable to be of any value, it will serve as a base over which a satisfactory copper plate may be applied with the plater. The salts, Fig. 13, are ground to small particles and placed in a clean bag which is mounted on the plater equipped with a copper anode as in Fig. 14. The plating process is the same as that previously explained for nickel. The first application should be made briskly and with a minimum of overlapping to insure the formation of a smooth coating. After the first application, additional quantities of copper may be deposited on the surface to give the desired thickness of plate.

Final Polishing: In all cases, the finished electroplate should be polished to bring out the full luster of the metal. For this purpose, precipitated chalk or Vienna lime should be applied with a moistened polishing cloth. A motor-driven polisher such as that shown in Fig. 6, is useful if handled carefully.

Bolts Coated with Plastic Are Removed Easily

When bolts are used where it may be necessary to remove them frequently, just

Harness Lines Have Rings to Ease Hand Strain

To ease strain on the hands caused by gripping the lines for long periods when driving a spirited team of horses, punch a couple of holes in each line and insert a key



ring as shown. When holding the lines, let the rings rest behind the palm of the hand and you won't have to grip so tightly.

Steel Paper Cutter on Job Press Is Aid to Operator



No need to search for a knife or pair of scissors when this cutter is attached to the job press

This paper knife will be found handy for cutting strips for use when a new job is made ready. It is merely a flat steel strip screwed to the delivery board, with a thin washer under each end to hold it slightly above the board. When the pressman needs a piece of paper, he can slip a sheet under the strip and tear it off neatly and evenly to the size required. The cutter does not interfere with the normal use of the delivery board.


Roll-Up Tool Kit Is Handy on the Stepladder

An electrician who had to do considerable work on a stepladder used this kit, which could be unrolled instantly and supported conveniently on the top of the lad-



der. The kit is merely a piece of heavy canvas with several pockets sewed in one side and the ends hemmed to slip over iron-rod standards which are put into holes bored in the stepladder.

Sliding Board on Book Shelves Serves as Reading Table

In libraries, law offices and similar places, a sliding board attached to the underside of one of the book shelves will be found a handy support for an open book. Heavy plywood is just the thing for this purpose and slides to hold it can be shaped from sheet metal. A drawer pull may be screwed to the underside near the edge.

Faceplate Jobs at Higher Speeds Possible without Vibration

We made up a number of lead disks of different sizes and kept them at hand for

counterbalancing faceplate work so that the lathe could be run at high speeds without excessive vibration. For forms in which to cast the weights, we used the outer rings from discarded roller bearings ranging in diameter from 3 to 6 in. The weights were drilled in the center for attaching them to the faceplate, and the weight of each one was stamped on its surface.—J. H. Jobson, Mentone, Ala.

Auger Bits Are Rubber Capped to Protect Points

Drawing Longitudinal Lines on Round Stock




When a regular tool is not available for drawing lines parallel to the axis of a shaft or other cylindrical stock, a substitute tool for this work is a piece of angle iron or

Part II-Machining the Castings




BEFORE you do any machining on the set of castings, it's a good idea to check the lathe centers for accurate setting, clean the chuck of all excess grease and chips, and see that the lathe tools are ground and shaped properly for the work. Be especially particular to see that your drills are properly ground. This means

that the cutting edges of each bit must measure the correct angle, otherwise you are apt to have trouble doing the precision drill-

ing necessary on this job.


Although you can begin with most any part, it's best to start with the cylinder casting, finish dimensions of which are shown in Fig. 17. Chuck this with the flanged end out for the boring and lower-end facing operations. Keep in mind that the first roughing cut must, in all cases, be deep enough to get under the scale on the surface of the casting, but make certain to allow sufficient stock under the roughing cut for finishing. The cylinder bore is brought to final dimensions with an expanding reamer. The best way of machining the outside of the cylinder barrel and the cool-





ing flanges is to mount the casting on a mandrel. Otherwise you can finish half the length of the barrel before re-chucking after the boring operation. Then with the work reversed and re-chucked you finish the balance of the flanges and face the top end ready for the head. In any case the first method is the surest, as it avoids the possibility of error in rechucking. Special care must be taken in chucking the cylinder-head casting, Fig. 18, for the facing operation. The important thing is to get the casting properly centered. After the head has been faced off and fitted to the cylinder, drill one 1/8-in. hole in the center of each valve stem guide. Then, in the lathe, drill ¼ in. deep, following each of these 1/8 in. holes in from the faced side with a 13/12-in. drill, and finish the guides with the hollow mill shown in Fig. 19. Finish the valve seats next with the facing tool shown in the drawing. Next the flanges for the carburetor and exhaust should be finished, by center-drilling the location for the holes before they are drilled out and turning the head between centers in the lathe. Then drill out the exhaust, intake, and rocker-arm pin holes. Do not neglect to file or mill flat the sides of the rocker-arm support. Drill the screw holes as spotted and mark the location of registering holes in the cylinder top from these.

Machining the crankcase halves is about the most ticklish job of all, for here you have the problem of producing identical work on two separate parts. First you chuck each half and finish the face, then drill and ream holes for the main bearings. Be especially particular with the




flanged joint between the halves, for when the latter are placed together the mainbearing holes must register exactly. Now, to finish the holes for camshaft bearings, the halves are set up on the faceplate separately with a locating pin passing through the main-bearing holes and bolted to the faceplate. To assure absolute accuracy the locating pin should be machined to a snug, slip fit in the main-bearing hole. Now, one thing to look out for: Notice in the details, Fig. 20, that the camshaft-bearing holes break into the inside of the crankcase. Because of this, each half is counterbored with a %-in. drill, the counterbore being started on the inside of each half. This precaution avoids trouble with the reamer when you finish the holes.

When the camshaft-bearing holes are finished, the two halves of the crankcase



should be placed together, and two short %-in, mandrels inserted in the holes to line the pieces up. Then the holding-bolt holes are drilled, where spotted on the casting. The bolts are put in, and 1/16 by 5-in. mandrels are substituted for the shorter ones previously used. With this setup made you're ready to finish the job. The cylinder may now be set in place and the holes for the cylinder-base screws marked, drilled and tapped. Holes for the tappets and for bolts holding the engine on its base should be drilled at this time. The breather hole is made by first drilling from the top, ¼ in. deep vertically, and finished by drilling through on a slant with a 3/2-in. drill. Then the case is reversed and the 3/2-in hole is followed from the inside to meet the first hole.

The piston casting, Fig. 22, can be finished very nicely by first chucking it with the top end against the chuck face and truing up the skirt inside. Be careful when you true the bottom edge, to make allowance for facing the top end. Then the piston is re-chucked, turning it end for end, for finishing and cutting in the ring grooves. This is a rather fussy job, as you will note the piston is tapered, that is, it is .003 in. smaller at the top end. Although details are given in Fig. 22, you can save a lot of trouble by purchasing the rings ready-made. The wristpin, of course, must be made to suit.



Now go back to Fig. 16 for details on the connecting rod and crankshaft. Because of its small size, the former is comparatively easy to finish up. At the big end, you first drill and tap for cap screws, then saw off the cap, which is fitted to the rod by filing or milling the meeting faces flat. The cap is then screwed to the rod. This done, you're ready to drill and ream the holes for the crank and wrist pin. Mount the rod on a mandrel to finish the sides of the bearings.

The crankshaft is made from a piece of flat, mild steel. The stock is 5½ in. long and should be cut away by milling to the shape shown in Fig. 16. Then when the main and offset centers are located, mount in the lathe as in Fig. 15. Rough-turn the main journals, and finish-turn the crank pin. Cut off the projections with the offset centers and finish the main journals, then turn the taper and thread the front end. The keyway may be cut at this time. Counterweights are made from a steel disk which is finished true on a %-in. mandrel, then split, paired and filed or milled to fit the crankshaft. The screw

holes should be laid out in the bottom of the square notch, drilled from that side and counterbored from the opposite side. When this is done the crankshaft should be marked through these holes and drilled and tapped. Bearings are made from a piece of bearing bronze mounted in the lathe chuck. Cut off each bearing as finished and press into place in the crankcase. After the bearings are in place drill ha-in, oil holes from the inside of the crankcase into the main bearings as shown in the assembly drawing, Fig. 21.

Next, the flywheel, Fig. 25. Rough-turn the casting on the outer side, then finish the inside, including the tapered hole. Mount on a tapered mandrel and finish the outer side. This procedure will give a true running wheel. The mandrel should be made just before the tapered end of the crankshaft is turned so that the same setup can be used. To make duplicate setups the mandrel must be made the same length as the crankshaft.


The camshaft involves some hand work. After turning out the blank as in Fig. 23, you have to lay out and file the cams to


detailed further in Fig. 16. This leaves only the timer yoke, Fig. 22, and the carburetor, Fig. 24, to complete the parts. Purchase of the valves and timing gears ready-made will save time.

To make and fit the camshaft you proceed as follows: File the exhaust cam to the shape shown in the drawing. The camshaft may be held between the lathe centers to do this, using the lathe merely as a vise. With the engine assembled, time this cam so that the exhaust valve begins to open about 30° before bottom dead center and closes on top dead center. Set the piston at the center of the intake stroke, which begins at 5° past top dead center and ends at 10° past bottom dead center, and mark through the tappet hole to locate the peak of the intake cam. Then file the cam to the shape shown. Both cams may have to be dressed a little one way

or the other to obtain the correct opening and closing points of the valves.



Assemble the engine in this order: Mount the piston on the connecting rod, put the rings on the piston, mount the connecting rod on the crankshaft, and assemble the crankshaft and crankcase parts.



Put on the cylinder and cylinder head, on which the valves, rocker arms and push rods have been assembled. Key the crank and camshaft gears, then insert the camshaft. Adjust the tappets to .002-in. clearance and time the valves. Put on the timer cam and place so that the flat is on top when the intake valve is at its closing point. Assemble the timer and set so that the points break at about 10° before the piston reaches the top dead center. The gap at the points should be from .018 to .020 in. The exact firing point is important and can be best found by experiment. Then put on the flywheel. If there is a slight gap between the crankshaft gear and the flywheel hub it should be filled in with a washer. Lastly, mount the carburetor, to which the gas tank and fuel suction pipe have been attached. Put in the spark plug.

Now the engine is ready for a running test. Mount it on a block of wood and clamp this in a vise. Wire up the ignition system as in Fig. 26. Put about a table-spoonful of oil in the crankcase, and fill the gas tank with high-test gasoline. Close the needle valve tightly and then open it about one-sixteenth of a turn, choke by placing a finger over the end of the car-



buretor and turn the flywheel a few times to draw gas up the fuel pipe into the cylinder. Wrap a stout cord around the cranking groove of the flywheel, switch on the ignition and pull the cord. If the engine fails to start, the spark timing and needle valve may need some adjustment. Normally, the engine should run at a speed of about 3,600 revolutions per minute.

Add oil to the supply in the crankcase from time to time when the engine is running. Oil in the proportion of one teaspoonful per two ounces of gasoline may be added to the gasoline in the tank for the breaking-in period. A half-hour run with a load, such as pressing a stick against the inside rim of the flywheel, will serve to break the engine in. The breeze of an electric fan will help keep the engine cool during the running-in period.


Rubber Hose on Carpenter's Bar Avoids Marring Surfaces

When using a carpenter's bar to pull large nails and spikes in places where it is necessary to protect the surrounding surfaces, a short piece of hose split along one side and slipped over the end of the bar as shown will do the trick. The hose



can be moved up on the bar out of the way or removed when it is not needed.

Mirror Used as Protractor Handles Many Jobs



When a protractor is not at hand, you can often substitute a mirror or even a pan of water and make a check by means of reflection. Fig. 1 shows how a pan of water is helpful in determining whether a post is perpendicular. When the reflection appears in line with the post, the latter stands straight one way. Then the pan is shifted around 90° and the check repeated. Two mirrors hinged together as in Fig. 2, which may be done with a strip


of adhesive tape, will help to divide a circle into a number of equal segments. The photo shows how to measure 60° or ½ of a circle. Other angles are measured in a similar manner. The mirrors are adjusted so that the lower edges are in line with their images. In Fig. 3, a wood block is being checked to see if the end is square, which will be the case if the reflected edges are in line with the edges of the block, as observed from two adjacent sides.

Tar Roofs Smoothed with Heated Roller to Imbed Gravel

To get a gravel covering imbedded thoroughly in a new or repaired tar roof so that it will not be dislodged easily by wind or rain, one contractor goes over it lightly with a self-heating roller. The heat from the roller softens the surface of the tar so that it seals tightly around the gravel. The roller can be made from a lightweight, 10-gal, drum, the sides of which must be smooth and straight. A flat-iron yoke to take a handle is pivoted to the drum ends, one of which has holes for inserting hot coals to heat the drum. A little coke or charcoal added occasionally will keep the fire going. The roller should be just hot enough to soften the surface of the tar, and do not apply too much pressure as this will force the gravel through the felt base.

There is no possibility of a tool kit opening while carrying it, if these handles are used

After having his tool kit fall open while carrying it along the street, one carpenter removed the hook latches and substituted interlocking handles. They consisted of hinged wire loops, one on each side section of the kit in such a position that they dropped down over a similar handle in the center. These proved so handy that he used the same idea to prevent his stepladder from opening while carrying it.

Lathe Tool with "Stellite" Tip



On a job of turning a large number of narrow grooves in castiron rolls, we found a piece of Stellite welded to the lathe tool enabled us to increase the speed of both the lathe and feed screw

without burning the tip, thereby reducing the time of doing the job considerably. Also, we found that by carefully grinding the tip to size, both sides of the groove could be finished in one operation, resulting in still greater saving of time. We have used Stellite on the tips of boring tools with good results, especially when working with cast iron.


Wrist Strap on Paint-Spray Gun Helps Relieve Strain

. Pockets in Carpenter's Apron Kept Open by Wire Frame





Inserted inside the pockets of a carpenter's apron, wire frames of the type shown will keep them open so that it is easy to pick out nails. The frames are made from fairly stiff wire and all joints

are soldered and then smoothed with sandpaper to protect the hands.

Rubber-Tipped Putty Knife to Set Glass Pane

Glaziers who often tap a tightfitting glass pane in place with the putty knife, will find that a rubbertip handle will reduce the possibility of breaking the glass. Just drive a rubber-head tack into the handle.






Tinner's Shears Operated by Foot Handle Large Wire-Cutting Job



Small shop owner quickly turns out large order for short wires with foot-operated shears

Having an order which required cutting several thousand short pieces of wire, the owner of a small shop that was not equipped for this work turned out the job quickly with a pair of heavy tinner's shears as shown. One handle of the shears was clamped in a bench vise, after which a strong strip of rubber fastened to the ceiling, and a wire fastened to a pedal on the floor were attached to the other handle. This permitted him to operate the shears rapidly with his foot as he fed the wire between the blades, a stop block, nailed to the bench, serving as a guide.

"Kick-Off" Spring Saves Time on Some Lathe Jobs




Many production jobs on a lathe can be speeded up by using this kick-off spring, which directs the parts into a box at the rear of the lathe as they are cut off with a parting

tool. The spring is bent to hug the work and is fastened to the top of the parting tool. It should touch the work before the parting tool so that when the latter advances the spring is compressed sufficiently to give the work a kick the moment it is severed.

Dividing a Ream of Paper into Equal Parts

In printing shops and other places where it is often necessary to divide reams of


paper into equal parts, the job can be done quickly with a ruler. If, for example, the ream is to be divided into three parts, place the ruler against the end of the paper and force the top back to slant the sheets until the measurement from



top to bottom of the ream is exactly 3 in. as shown. A card or piece of paper inserted between the sheets at each inch mark on the ruler will mark the division lines.

Heavy Drill-Press Vise on Skids Is Moved Easily

In a shop where heavy drill-press vises often had to be shifted from one machine to another to complete a drilling job, the



The left detail shows a piece of flexible tubing attached to the anvil of a riveting machine so that the rivets fall into a can as they are punched from brake shoes, thus making it unnecessary to sweep up after each brake-lining job. A muffin pan fastened to the head of the same machine keeps several different sizes of rivets separated and always at hand. The right-hand de-



tail shows how two short, headless studs can be used as guides to install a cylinder head and gasket single-handed without damaging the latter. The upper ends of the studs are slotted to take a screwdriver so that they can be removed after a few of the cylinder-head bolts have been started. In the center detail, a creeper is fitted with a drawer in which several small tools are kept handy, thus making it unnecessary to crawl from under a car to get them.

Armrests Ease Shoulder Fatigue of Rumble-Seat Riders

Those who have ridden in rumble seats for any distance will readily understand the comfort afforded by these detachable armrests, which clip over the edges of the seat opening. Each rest consists of a wood block padded with sponge rubber to which are bolted two clips of flat, spring steel. Body construction around the seat opening will determine the shape to which the clips should be bent. After the armrests are completed, the steel clips should be covered with rubber tubing to prevent marring the car finish.




Roller on Luggage Compartment Aids in Removing Suitcases



Lifting and straining is unnecessary to remove heavy luggage when you use this roller

Salesmen and others who carry heavy suitcases and similar objects in their luggage compartments, will find that a roller mounted at the lower edge of the compartment opening is a great help in removing the luggage. Instead of climbing on the car and lifting the objects out of the compartment, you can stand on the ground and pull them out, letting them rest against the roller as they are removed. The roller may be made of wood, or from a piece of pipe filled with cement in which a rod is centered. The rod turns in metal brackets welded to the car body.

Cushioned Boot in Truck Tire Gives Long Wear



Cushioned with a piece of inner tube, a large boot placed over a break in a truck tire was found to give longer wear than when it was used without the cushioning rubber. When installing

the boot, the inner tube was cemented inside the tire directly over the break, after which the boot was cemented to it in the regular way. In such an installation, the inner tube comes in contact with any foreign matter that works in through the break in the tire, and, being more resilient than the boot, withstands the wear better. Thus, the only function of the boot is to serve as a stiffening reinforcement over the break in the tire.







There is no possibility of the pin in your trailer hitch working out if you use one of



slipping short pieces of greasecoated screen wire under the ends of the leaves. As the greatest points of friction are at the ends of the spring leaves, the screen




wire retains the grease and lubricates these points much longer than is possible by merely spraying the springs with a penetrating oil.

To assure that the ends of a broken band-saw blade will be brazed together in perfect alinement, I clamp them in the jig shown while making the repair. It consists of a hardwood block grooved lengthwise to take the blade flush, and two smaller blocks, which clamp it securely in place. A large hole bored in the center of the block allows the torch flame to pass around the saw blade without burning the wood. If desired, several grooves of different widths may be made in the jig to accommodate various saw blades.



The Amateur Sky Patrol

The big job is grinding and polishing the mirror glass. It may take twenty or twenty-five hours to get the right concave surface so all the parallel light the mirror picks up is reflected back to one point. The rough grinding is done with different grades of carborundum by pushing a grinding tool back and forth across the surface of the glass, with the mirror glass mounted on a small table so the builder can walk around it slowly. The tool used is a glass disk similar to the mirror disk. The final operation is to polish the concave surface, and for this the grinding tool is covered with pitch facets and a compound of jewelers' rouge suspended in water is used. Then the disk is ready for its reflecting coat of silver.

With an inexpensive six-inch telescope you can see all of the major planets, the rings of Saturn, pick out craters on the moon only a mile in diameter, and make out the nebula in Andromeda that is 900,000 light-years away. 'A good telescope of this size will reveal stars of the thirteenth magnitude, as compared to the naked eye which sees stars of the sixth magnitude, and the 100-inch telescope on Mount Wilson with which stars of the nineteenth magnitude may be seen. Equipped with an electric "slow-motion" motor that turns the telescope across the sky at the same speed as the stars, longexposure photographs may be made. Some amateur pictures of the sun, moon, and planets compare in quality with those made at the large observatories. Some of the amateur comet hunters do all their exploring by photography. With a camera hitched up with their telescope, they take pictures in which it is easy to pick out the long comet trails among the round dots that represent the stars.

During the day you can use an astronomical telescope for looking at interesting things on the earth. A six-inch instrument will allow you to read a newspaper a block away or tell the time from an alarm clock a mile away. With such a telescope you can see cars on a distant road as plainly as if they were across the street, or watch passengers on the decks of ships far at sea. With a red filter to cut through the blue haze, the individual branches of trees on mountain tops 100 miles away have been seen. Many amateurs use heavy permanent mountings in their back yards to hold their telescopes steady and also have light portable tripods that enable them to set up their telescopes almost anywhere on automobile trips.

It is estimated that 10,000 amateur telescope enthusiasts in the United States, including the memberships of fifty clubs, have built their own telescopes. One association with 350 members in all parts of the country is doing work of professional importance in keeping track of the variable stars. Some of the instruments built by amateurs are as fine as any in the world for their size and are valued at thousands of dollars. One builder made his own patterns and castings for his electrically driven instrument and values the telescope at \$3,500. Other amateurs have developed new ideas in telescope gear that have been adopted by the large observatories. A simple solar camera that takes good pictures of sunspots was built by one amateur for a few cents. It consists merely of a light-proof film holder behind a shutter. The shutter is a very thin slit between two pieces of metal and is drawn rapidly across the photographic film by a piece of rubber inner tube when it is released by cutting a string. Exposures lasting one-six-thousandths of a second may be made.

Three amateurs, a bridge builder, a dentist, and a manufacturer, built an entire observatory which they presented to a university. Among their instruments they invented a "spectroheliokinematograph" which takes motion pictures of sun phenomena. Motion pictures are also taken of solar eclipses and the movements of Jupiter's moons.

"Amateur telescope builders should plan to use their instruments after they finish building them," Porter urges. "Often an amateur works many hours to finish his telescope, calls in the neighbors a few times to look at the moon, and then lays it away. Really, the most interesting part of his hobby has just started. With a few star charts and tables to guide him, there is always a chance he may make an important discovery."

vide room for Junior. And last of all there's a tile bath with hot and cold running water and a tub and shower.

There's nothing to do but drive your car into the adjoining garage, get your bags out of the trunk and "set up house-keeping." Near by there's a service station to condition your car for tomorrow's trip, and within walking distance you'll find a good restaurant and a grocery store to obtain provisions if you're doing your own cooking. After dinner you'll find outside your overnight home a comfortable bench where you can sit and admire your own individual flower garden and your own individual palm tree.

There's maid service if you need it and next morning you're ready to leave as soon as you step outside your home and stow your bags in the car. There's no tipping, no one to disturb you during the night and you disturb no one because your neighbors are far enough distant so your radio or conversation is inaudible.

And the price? Three rooms, bath and garage for your car in any good hotel offering similar conveniences would probably cost you at least eight or ten dollars, perhaps more. In the motor court your overnight home costs you from two to five dollars, depending on the size of cottage you require and the number in your party. Through the west, you can make a three weeks trip, live in a motor court cottage each night, and pay less than \$75 for this form of luxurious living.

The moderate rates are due to the location of the courts. Rarely are they found in downtown areas of high-priced real estate. You'll find them on the edge of the city or on the fringe of a quiet residential neighborhood. And while the construction is substantial, it is inexpensive as compared with the cost of a large hotel.

There's a business opportunity today in motor courts for the man with a few thousand dollars capital. A court of twenty to thirty units in an average locality can be constructed and furnished for from \$40,000 to \$50,000 including the ground, and credit usually can be obtained for part of this sum. Most courts provide a public lounge or lobby and some have their own dining rooms. One elaborate

southern establishment has separate quarters for chauffeurs and maids.

This indicates that a different class of motorists is attracted to the courts, also called "motels," "autels" and "autotels," than patronizes auto camps and tourist parks. You'll find your neighbors are people of means, driving good cars—people

you ordinarily would expect to find at the best hotels. They are attracted to the courts because of the conveniences offered.

Hotels which years ago did not accord a very hearty welcome to travel-stained motorists have seen the day when most of their guests arrive in their own cars, at least in many cities, and they are taking a lively interest in the motor court idea. So it will not be surprising to find motor courts conducted under hotel management. Some of the best today are run by oil companies or individual service stations.

One of the most pretentious organizations is United Motor Courts, an association of more than 100 individually owned and operated courts in the west and middle west. Members can only enter this association if their courts come up to certain high standards. There are also other associations of court owners in the west and southwest.

A few years ago touring motorists lived mostly in wayside shacks, clapboard cabins, private homes catering to tourists or hotels. Today they have available 1,500 de luxe motor courts, another 2,500 of exceptionally high standards and catering to people of substantial means, and 6,000





Building a River in the Desert

nent location. The webs of reinforcing steel are bent to shape, forms are erected, and the concrete is poured in. When the forms are removed the conduit is ready

One problem was to eliminate the hazards of the dangerous dry rivers of the desert. These rivers, nothing more than deep, dry arroyos, remain arid for months at a time. Then a wall of water ten or twenty feet high comes rushing down one of them. A tremendous cloudburst in an adjacent range of desert mountains is the cause. To prevent their aqueduct from being destroyed in such floods, the engineers are using huge inverted siphons to cross under the channels. That way, the artificial river will be carried safely under the sudden floods.

The project has disclosed that, if properly trained and cared for, men can work face to face with the pitiless desert sun all summer long without hardship. Heat exhaustion, the district's medical corps has learned, results from loss by evaporation of part of the normal saline content of the body. A prescription of a small amount of ordinary table salt per day, in a glass or two of drinking water, restores the saline balance and keeps the men in good shape.

Temperatures underground are almost as high as above the surface and the moisture from subterranean streams creates a humid atmosphere much more uncomfortable than the dry air above. In addition, the chemical action that occurs while concrete is hardening creates its own heat, and the tunnels are lined with concrete. Thermometers in the tunnels have registered as high as 130 degrees.

The aqueduct cuts through one of the most highly mineralized sections of California, in a district where gold and other minerals are often found, so desert prospectors are following the construction crews and carefully sampling the rock taken from canal ditches and blasted out of tunnels. So far no ores of commercial value have been reported although numerous ledges containing very small amounts of gold, silver, copper, and other metals have been discovered. The digging has, however, led to the uncovering of tons of prehistoric bones. Teeth of sabertooth tigers, miscellaneous skeletons of dinosaurs and early elephants, and even fish fossils, have been unearthed in the tunnels. Petrified trees of types no longer existing also have been discovered.

Selecting the best route for the aqueduct was a tremendous task in itself. Much of the country west of the Colorado had never been surveyed and in some sections even general exploring was incomplete. Driving their light, specially built cars through the dry hills and guiding themselves by compass, the district's surveying parties accurately mapped 25,000 square miles. Seven possible routes were compared before the best one was selected.

More than a dozen temporary towns have been built in the desert to provide quarters for the men. Most of the dormi-





tories are air cooled and each little city has its own ice plant. Half a dozen hospitals are maintained and all the camps have crews of trained rescue and first aid men. In spite of the new speed records that are being made, and the use of 7,000,-000 pounds of dynamite, accidents have been considerably under average.

Water is the staff of life in southern California. Already served by a 233-mile aqueduct that delivers water fresh from the Sierras to Los Angeles, that city and twelve adjacent towns will actually tap the snow banks of the Rockies by means of the new aqueduct. Flowing down the Colorado and through the power houses at Boulder dam, the water will be diverted into the aqueduct 155 miles below the big dam. In all, the water will travel some 1,500 miles from Wyoming, Utah, and Colorado, on its way to kitchen faucets on the coast. The \$200,000,000 aqueduct will practically double the water supply of southern California and provide for a population of 7,000,000 people. It is estimated that from forty to eighty years will elapse before additional water supplies must be sought.

Here are some other facts about the aqueduct. Pumping plants along the line will use enough electricity to serve a city of 2,000,000 population. Before starting work on the aqueduct it was necessary to construct a paved trunk highway 150 miles long, a "baby" aqueduct of steel pipe 200 miles long to carry water from desert wells to the construction camps, a \$2,000,-000 high-voltage power line along the right-of-way, and a private telephone system that includes five exchanges.

The steamer "Queen Mary," new Titan of the seas, could not during all her normal life, carry the excavated material from the aqueduct to England if this enormous mass of dirt and rock, equal to the bulk of thirteen pyramids the size of Cheops, could be delivered in New York for shipment abroad. The concrete for tunnel linings, and canals, siphons and conduits, would make a continuous sixfoot-wide street walk extending from Los Angeles south to Buenos Aires. The 22,-000,000 bags of cement wrought into the aqueduct would, if placed end to end, equal the height of 2,000 Mt. Everests.

No ordinary cement is good enough for this immense water-transport structure. Aqueduct engineers know that the gnawing teeth of terrific winds, of temperatures that soar above 130 degrees, and alkalies of fierce corrosiveness are striving constantly to rip asunder their efforts. The finer the cement the stronger its bonding qualities. So the 7,000,000 barrels of aqueduct cement was re-ground to face-powder fineness to add an important tenacity of life and strength to combat the merciless forces of nature. Men and machines may be seen nearly any day drilling out concrete cores which are taken to the desert-edge laboratories of the aqueduct administration where, with the aid of elaborate scientific instruments, they are tested for strength and endurance.

Under the crushing jaws of hydraulic compression gauges the cores are tried for their failure points. Others are locked in automatic refrigerators that dampen and freeze them, in ovens they are dried and heated, so that in a few weeks, they yield the same evidence as the same number of human generations in normal aqueduct life.

In general, the fewer the air holes, the stronger the concrete. So the aqueduct engineers invented a mechanical "patter" whose two steel hands, actuated by compressed air, jar rapidly against the freshly poured mixtures, compacting the concrete into what the system's builders believe is the closest knit construction of its kind ever developed.

To the layman such detail may seem trivial, fantastic. But the engineer knows that every irregularity means compounding friction, cutting velocity and capacity. And he's leaving no loophole whereby posterity, living in one of America's most productive agricultural and industrial communities, can point to an era whose inhabitants failed to secure its permanency by insuring for themselves a continuing supply of water.

of the non-fatal ones last year occurred in collisions between automobiles. Passing on a hill or driving on the wrong side is an excellent preliminary to a collision.


If you're in the habit of looking after you get on the railroad track instead of before, you're headed for the same fate that overtook six per cent of those killed last year and five per cent of the injured. They were killed and hurt as the result of automobiles hitting or being hit by vehicles other than automobiles.

Ever take a curve too fast and find yourself struggling for control? If your 4,000 pound car hits a curve of 100 feet radius at thirty miles per hour there's a force of 2,400 pounds trying to pull you into the ditch. That's centrifugal force. Twelve per cent of last year's fatalities and six per cent of the injuries were caused by accidents involving no collisions with anything. Which might prove that anyone can round a corner on two wheels-once. And this brings up skidding. You can't blame a skid on the "other fellow." Twelve per cent of all rural accidents in Ohio last year were caused by skids. But when roads were wet, snowy or icy, one-fourth the accidents involved skidding. The lesson seems obvious-but remember also that four out of five traffic accidents occur on dry roads and in clear weather, so don't get careless just because the road is dry.

Night accidents are more serious than daytime ones and, on a mileage basis, the accident rate at night is higher. Traffic, accidents and fatalities reach their peak about five in the evening, and their low about three in the morning. Also there are fewer accidents on Tuesday than any other day in the week, and more on Saturdays and Sundays. So in theory, the safest time to drive is about three o'clock of a Tuesday morning.





unit is shown at C in the rear-view photo of the 5-ft. homemade rack-and-panel assembly. The antenna-matching network is on panel D. For phone work, two RK-31's in class-B easily modulate the full input; this assembly is on base B and includes the Thordarson input, output and filament transformers. Combined plate and screen modulation is used, the T-7826 modulation transformer having secondary windings to



carry both the plate and screen current. An original material list of all parts used, including coil data, rack-and-panel construction details and tuning instructions is available from Popular Mechanics radio department without charge. The blueprint number is R-231.





Uncle Sam's Forest Fire Fighters

lons of water on their backs and a dinky hose to fight a raging forest fire sounded ridiculous, but it was learned that fifty men carrying five gallons each can put out a lot of small fires that could quickly develop into big ones. And when one of the high-pressure pumps comes into action, efficiency in quenching the flames is decidedly stepped up. The pack units of water are used in 'mopping up' after the fire has been brought under control."

On duty the year round are 801 rangers and 149 superintendents. In the firehazard months of the spring, summer and fall, 2,599 trained fire guards are on duty. In addition, 81,770 boys from 481 CCC camps in national forests are on constant call. Furthermore, forest rangers in any state have a right to call on the common citizen in time of emergency. However, this is seldom done. This major defense line protects 160 national forests comprising 203,082,847 acres. Almost every forest has a superintendent with a trained crew of rangers under him. Every square foot of his park is covered by strategically placed observation towers. If roads and terrain are suitable, headquarters is supplied with water trucks and pumps and the superintendent is in radio communication with the nearest of the fifty-five airports. Each observation tower is equipped with telephone and radio as well as an "Osborne fire finder," an amazingly ingenious device for locating fires. It has on its surface a small replica of the map that always hangs in the superintendent's office. A small blaze located through one of these finders presents a fairly accurate determination of its location, and when two or more different stations report the same fire, which is almost invariably the case, the determination is accurate down to almost the square inch. Furthermore, rangers carry portable radio sets.

The highly efficient radio communication system of over 1,500 stations was almost wholly developed by research engineers of the service who maintain over twenty-five laboratories and workshops. These laboratories have developed and invented the brush-cutter as well as the motor pump dropped by means of a parachute from an airplane. The latter can

pump water 2,000 feet and deliver it at 200 pounds nozzle pressure, but weighs only forty-six pounds.

Another remarkable device, the "fire predictor," has just been put into use. After painstaking data on fires had been compiled during five years of experimentation a mathematical wizard evolved the "predictor." Taking into consideration such factors as location, type of timber, weather forecasts, visibility, time of year and other elements, the highly dangerous zones can be accurately indicated.

When a fire gets out of hand, the weather bureau is called to help. A truck, complete with meteorological and weather-forecasting devices, as well as sending and receiving radio station, goes to the scene. In fighting a widespread conflagration, knowledge of forthcoming thundershowers or changes in wind is important. Such news is radioed to the fire bosses who shift their lines of attack accordingly.

Despite laborious research work, only one chemical has been found that can be used to good effect in fire fighting. It is a form of carbon dioxide, known as a "fire foam." The main difficulty has been to get any chemical to stick on trees-the wind soon dissipates it. However, the introduction of licorice, of all things, has proved successful in making the carbon dioxide adhere. The combined mixture comes out of the nozzle like a white plume and sticks to whatever it hits. The service hopes to further improve its chemical equipment, and experiments involving hand and motor pumps, extinguishers and chemicals, are being conducted.

Mr. Godwin urges precaution on the part of citizens in preventing disastrous fires. Over half of last year's blazes were caused by careless smokers, campers and incendiaries, natives with fancied grudges against the service, or just plain "firebugs." The total destroyed area was about one-third of the total area of all the state parks in the United States.

Where is the danger of forest fires the greatest? Mr. Godwin says it is unquestionably the Montana-Idaho area. The region is very wild, in many parts inaccessible, and the dense covering of thickets makes blazes hard to control.

combines the fumes of an acid and ammonia. The fog is conveyed to various parts of the setting by secreted tubes. The volume and density are controlled by the amount of air pressure.

In some outdoor settings where fog effects are needed and the settings are too large to inclose with walls, Redmond has developed a system of "laying" down a smoke wall which prevents the artificial fog from drifting away. The dense smoke wall is made with chemicals and hangs suspended long enough for the scene to be filmed. After the smoke walls are built up the fog is filled inside.

Snowstorms are made by sprinkling unbleached potato chips, corn flakes, or ground chicken feathers, according to the kind of storm needed. The "snow" is placed in drums two feet in diameter and four to sixteen feet in length situated above the setting. The drums which are revolved are made of wire screen, the mesh of which governs the kind of storm produced.

To simulate the early morning vapor which rises out of a meadow, "Dry Ice" is dropped in pans of water secreted about the setting. The vapor photographs very realistically. For snow on the ground, marble dust is used over which is sprayed silicate of soda to get the proper glistening effect. Corn meal ejected from special blowers makes a good sleet storm.

The sun's rays are fabricated by throwing a beam of incandescent light into the setting. Into the beam, ground mica is puffed to make a floating dust effect so the beam will photograph better. The sun's rays from reflected water which dance on the walls in ship scenes or water-front settings are made by throwing a beam of light into a polished pan containing a small amount of water. The jiggle and dance are gained by thumping the pan to agitate the water.

Fires which will burn in a prearranged manner are produced with special tools and chemicals. Fire is projected in shooting flames by what is known as a "fire head" for scenes where the entire setting is not to be destroyed or "spot" fires are required. A mixture of gasoline and oils is placed in a drumlike device into the head of which is inserted a large hand pump and controls. Leading from the drum is a manifold with a series of jets to which is connected copper tubing to carry the oil mixture to the desired places. The outlets are so placed that the confusion of shooting flames gives the illusion of a roaring fire. The size of the flames is controlled by valves behind the outlet jets. While one operator works the pumps to force the liquid into the pipes, a second controls the size of the fire at various points by manipulating the valves. To prevent a fire from destroying the entire setting, the woodwork is first soaked with water which permits the burning oil to cling to the wood and other parts of the setting although it does not ignite the materials of which the set is constructed. Some studios also fireproof the sets, or paper them with asbestos. By varying the oil mixture the flames can be timed to burn a certain number of minutes.


Explosive fire effects are produced by "shooting" pyro aluminum dust into a gas flame with a bellows or by air pressure. When an actor throws something and a little puff of dust is seen, the effect is gained by a compressed-air line and fuller's earth. When he dives through a flaming window, the flames are so controlled and timed that when he is actually going through the window there are no flames, although the action is so rapid the audience does not notice their absence. A trigger valve controls the duration of the flame so that when the actor jumps the flames can be shut off. However, some of the stunt men wear asbestos suits and actually dive through flames.


In every film the special effects department is called on to produce or fabricate some illusion. Things as simple as the burning of a flashlight require special mechanical and electrical equipment. Ordinary flashlights do not give enough light so a shell of a flashlight is converted into a movie flashlight. A fifty-candlepower automobile headlight globe is used which gets its juice from twenty-four flashlight batteries carried in a vest under the actor's clothing. The batteries are connected to the light by a wire which runs up the actor's coat sleeve.

The New Era of Railroading

be controlled by shutters at the front of the locomotive, regulated from the cab.

At the end of the 2,260-mile run they park the big streamliner over a greasing pit and give it about the same care you give your automobile after a week-end trip. They vacuum and scrub the cars inside and out, man the grease guns and fill the oil and water tanks. The Diesel itself they leave pretty much alone. It's good for a few hundred thousand miles with scarcely a look. And that is why the Dieselelectric is stealing the show from the steam locomotive, which can travel just as fast. It takes no less than four steam engines—a change every 500 miles—to pull a passenger train from Chicago to the coast, with many another stop for coal, or fuel oil, or water. Half-hour stops for servicing are common. The Diesel spurns relief, stops no longer than ten minutes to refuel, keeps ordinary stops within a minute's span. The "City of Denver" pauses just forty-five seconds at Boone, Ia., for change of crew. It is this saving in operating delays, and its endurance at high speed, that enables the Diesel to clip twenty-two hours from the transcontinental time of the steam trains.

Too, the Diesel economizes in fuel and water, as well as in maintenance cost. It burns a relatively inexpensive fuel oil. It needs no boiler water, thus eliminating a cost item for such railroads as the Santa Fe, which must haul water in tank cars as far as 100 miles in dry regions of the southwest.

But the Diesel-electric locomotive still costs approximately two and one-half times as much as a steam engine, and its life span is unknown. No steam locomotive has been put to the test these Diesels are meeting. A decade may prove the old iron horse supreme, after all. Meanwhile the glittering streamliner of the new era has brought speed and glamour—and passengers—back to the railroads.



contact Amphenol tube sockets are used without metal adapter plates, being held in position by means of their retainer springs under the base instead of screws.

All four of the Jefferson transformers are fully shielded and provided with color-coded leads which are brought out



through holes drilled in the metal base for sub-panel wiring. A drilling template for this chassis base is shown in Fig. 3, indicating the correct location and size of all mounting and lead holes, with the exception of a % in. hole for mounting the potentiometer R5. It should be located at front, midway between the input and driver transformers. This metal base is available in a black crackle finish with all socket mounting holes cut, for those who do not wish to make their own; also an optional perforated metal cover for protecting the parts. are used for convenience in wiring and help to support some of the fixed resistors and condensers.

Common ground connections are made to the heavy lead shown in Fig. 2; this consists of No. 12 bare tinned-copper busbar wire, the actual ground point being at the soldering lug on the mounting screw of choke No. 1. Ordinary wafer-type sockets are used for the speaker-cable plug and input sockets. The open-circuit input jack has a grounded mounting and was added for convenience when plugging in a crystal microphone. Your phonograph pick-up leads should be connected to a standard plug at the prongs indicated for input channel No. 2. Shield-



ed leads must be used where indicated, to prevent hum pick-up. The speaker, or speakers, may be any good self-powered dynamic type; a Wright-DeCoster unit was used in our laboratory tests. Note that the speaker socket provides a wide choice of voice-coil connections, one connection being made at common black and the other to the resistance value specified for your speaker. A separate 500-ohm outlet is provided for those who wish to use the unit as a speech amplifier for an amateur radiophone.





Learning to Fly the Clippers


per. The preliminary air-mail clipper service across the Pacific has been utilized primarily for the training of personnel. Six clipper ship crews already have been prepared for their difficult duties, and four of these crews will be assigned permanently to service in the Pacific division. To date, they have safely covered more than 200,000 miles without a mishap.


The flying personnel are not the only men trained especially for duties connected with the running of an ocean air line. There are scores of men in the ground crews-meteorologists, radio operators, operations men and inspectors. More and more, the air-transport business is becoming a complex organization whose activities call for the best men and the highest possible skill. Stations in such remote spots as Midway, Wake, and Guam are wholly or partly dependent upon supplies from the outside. But soon the land surrounding these newly established bases will be yielding fruits and vegetables the year round. Hundreds of tons of rich soil have been carried to the islands.

The success of this first ocean air line is largely due to the intensive training and rehearsal of the men in their assigned duties. After Captain Edwin Musick had made two round trips across the Pacific, he turned his command over to Captain Sullivan who had served under him as first officer. The other officers were also rotated from trip to trip, until six full crews had been trained for manning the twenty-five-ton Martin clippers. These men have amazed the world by the precision and near-perfection of their performance across the globe's widest ocean. When new lines shoot across the Atlantic, you will find these graduates of the oceanflying school manning the new clippers.

Long before the twenty-five-ton Martins had begun to fly across the Pacific, the officers had been rehearsed and drilled for their respective duties. This is illustrated by a remark which First Officer Sullivan made to Captain Musick on their first actual crossing.

"Old stuff, this," said Sullivan. "We've flown this route so many times in training that I've recognized every cloud we've passed since leaving 'Frisco."

With the Sea-Going Engineers

The engine room telegraph is a twoway instrument. After an engineer has carried out a command, he pulls the handle of the telegraph around to match the position of the needle that points to the order. In turn, this swings the needle of the instrument on the bridge as a report that the command has been obeyed. In addition, a private telephone system connects the bridge and engine room.

Aside from constant inspections to make sure that the engines are functioning perfectly, the engineers have an emergency system of red lights on their main instrument panels. If anything goes wrong with the water, steam, lubrication, or vacuum, the proper red light flashes. Lubricating oil flowing through each bearing spins a little metal flag projecting from the cap and as long as the flags spin attendants know the bearings are receiving oil.

When you enter one of the fire rooms of the "Monterey," you pass through an "air lock" that cuts you off from the rest of the world. The air in the fire rooms is kept under compression like the air in a deepsea diver's suit to increase the draft in the furnaces. To enter the hermetically sealed compartment, you unlock a door leading to a small air chamber, lock it behind you, then open another door that leads into the fire room. That way, no air escapes. With both doors of an air lock open, you would hardly be able to stand against the gale of air escaping from the fire room. Each of the two huge fire rooms of the ship contains six boilers, with an air lock also separating the two rooms so the engineer in charge of one can raise or lower his atmospheric pressure without affecting the draft in the other compartment.

If the air pressure should fall off combustion would be incomplete and the ship would start to lay a dense smoke screen across the sea. The engineer in charge of each fire room can tell the efficiency of each boiler without leaving his post. Each boiler has a periscope that projects light through the gas passes of the boiler and to the instrument panel. A clear patch of light in a periscope shows the boiler fire is burning properly, while if a fire is smoking the smoke is visible in the peri-





scope. In spite of the furnaces the fire rooms are usually comfortable because "mechanical lungs" are constantly breathing in quantities of fresh air to maintain the forced draft.

These days ships are equipped with brakes but the brakes aren't used to stop the ship. Attached to the propeller shafts, they are called friction clamps and are tightened around a shaft to keep it from turning when an engine is stopped for adjustment or repair. Otherwise the drive of water past the blades of the idle propeller might cause it to spin, in turn revolving the engine.

An engine room crew can make almost any kind of repair at sea without calling for outside aid. One of the worst things that can happen is the stripping of blades of a turbine. When this happens the engine is stopped and taken apart, the stripped blades cleared away, and the engine re-started. Not as efficient as before, the turbine is still able to perform part of its work. Burned-out bearings can be replaced with hardly any delay. About the only breakdowns that would put one engine out of the running are a broken tail shaft or the loss of a propeller.

Not only are the engineers in charge of the power plant, but they are responsible for the maintenance of nearly all the mechanical gear on the ship. The large refrigerating plant, the intricate electrically operated bridge controls, fire extinguishing equipment, and the lighting and ventilating systems, the elevators and telephone systems, are under their control. There are large electrical and machine shops where repair work is done at sea.

A comparative handful of trained men keeps the engines of the "Monterey" running. There are forty-eight men below decks, divided into three watches of sixteen each, which in turn spend four hours on duty and eight off. These include firemen, oilers, wipers, electricians, machinists, and other specialized trades.

"Men on board ship perform just about the same duties they would in the same trade ashore," Chief Engineer Keene says. "There is not much difference between operating the engines that drive a ship and running a stationary steam plant in a city powerhouse, except that at sea break-







downs must be guarded against more carefully.

"A sea-going electrician throws switches, runs a motion-picture projector, or repairs an electric stove in the galley just as he would on shore. There is not much novelty between a water pump or steam line just because it happens to be on a ship. The hardest work of the engineers is done in port. When we are under way we simply operate the engines and keep them in good condition. After we dock we have a chance to tear down a condenser or make light overhauls that might have interfered with the ship's schedule at sea."


Like the captain, a chief engineer stands no regular watch. That means he is always on call and often gets less sleep than his assistant officers. In foggy weather and during any maneuvering he is always on the operating platform, overseeing the work of his engineers as they "answer bells" from the bridge.

On small ships the bane of the engineers is the heavy storms that pitch the propellers clear of the water. In such storms an engineer must gauge the lift of the ship and spin the throttle down every time the stern lifts, to check the engines and prevent the propellers from racing. Otherwise the vibration is apt to damage the engines and propellers. Such storms hardly affect the large passenger liners and in case such a ship should pitch its propellers clear, automatic governors keep the engine speeds down.

Just as in getting up steam, stopping a ship's engines is a long job. This time the purpose is to cool off the power plant slowly and evenly. In the home port, when the telegraph pointers down below move across the dials to "Finished with the engines," the engineers kill the fires under all but two boilers. These are needed to furnish steam for moving cargo and to keep the auxiliary power plants running. Then the main steam lines to the engines are closed and the last wisps of steam are drawn out of the turbines.

But the engines are kept turning, this time by means of small electric jacking motors geared to the shafts. For another hour, also, pumps are kept going to circulate lubricating oil through all the bearings. Finally, the engines cool down and the pumps and motors are stopped.

Does Your Bathroom Flush Tank Waste Water?



Flush tanks of this type waste a quarter to one-half gallon of water every time they are tripped

Even though every valve may seat perfectly in your bathroom flush tank, it may be wasting from 1/4 to 1/2 gal. of water every time it is flushed if it is of the type shown in the drawing. Note the curved copper tube running from the trip valve in the supply pipe to the overflow. This tube passes water to the overflow while the valve is open, its purpose being to ease pressure and reduce noise. To stop wasted water and still keep the noise at a minimum, remove the tube and relocate it as indicated by the dotted lines. Then partly close the valve under the tank. It will take a little longer to fill the tank when the valve is partly closed, but this is not objectionable in most homes.

Wood Turn Button Kept Tight by Rubber Lock Washer

The tendency of a wood turn button to loosen and turn from vibration, wind, etc.,

can be prevented by putting a rubber washer under the screw head that holds it in place. Cut the washer from a piece of inner tube and drive the screw snugly



against it. The rubber will maintain a light pressure against the button regardless of whether it swells or shrinks with weather changes.

blind when a bone chilling north wind is blowing, and for other sportsmen who must face the elements, this heat pack often is a life saver. The pack is a square. It has a cover which buttons. When you want heat, you add about two tablespoonfuls of water, shake the contents of the bag until it gets warm and then slip it inside the container. It will generate heat for many hours. On very cold days, put one of these packs in the front of your hunting coat to warm your hands between shots.

The real test of the hunter's outside clothing is a snow or rainstorm on a cold day. It's fairly easy to assemble enough woolen underclothes, wool trousers, shirts, sweaters, and jackets for warmth on a dry day. But let it rain on a chilly autumn day and the hunter must turn to a different outfit. In a rain or snowstorm, the neck and back of the head are the first places to get wet and chilled.

To outwit the elements some rely on two equipment items. First, there is the parka-style rain shirt with a hood over the head. The second garment is the waterproof hunting coat that has in the collar a small compartment containing a waterproof hood. On a fair day the hood is tucked into place on the collar where a zipper arrangement keeps it out of the way. The parka rain shirt is a one-piece garment that slips over the head. It is made of heavy waterproof material, buttons around the wrists and has a hood to cover the head, thus keeping the rain from running down your neck.

Keeping shells, lunch and matches dry is a problem for the marsh or waterfowl hunter who parks in a blind for hours at a time where the wind and driving rain have full play. There is available a metal, waterproof shell box, oblong in shape, which costs about as much as three boxes of shells. Besides shells, this box will accommodate a small bottle of drinking water, extra matches, wooden duck caller, smoking necessities, an apple or orange, a bar of chocolate, and one or two film packs for the camera. Last but not least, the handle is recessed so you can use the box for a seat in a blind without "furniture."

One of the most practical things for the

waterfowl hunter is just a piece of heavy cord. Tie it to your duck, goose or crow call and drape it around your neck or you're going to be hunting for it continually and it will never be ready when you

want it.

It's amazing how many pheasant and waterfowl hunters apparently have everything they need for comfort and then are in a dilemma as soon as a couple of birds are shot in the field. The reason is that they have no way to carry birds. Of course, most hunting coats contain big pockets for carrying game. These are very serviceable but many dislike the drag on the shoulders that results from putting birds in the coat pockets, so they use a game carrier. This puts the weight of the birds around the waist because it can be worn like a belt. This carrier has small loops into which you slip the heads of game birds.

For ducks there is an inexpensive rawhide carrier with five thongs on each end and slits to loop over the heads of birds. If you have ever tried to walk any distance carrying game birds you know how heavy they get after the first 200 yards. By using one of these carriers you can balance the birds on your shoulder easily. And it practically never wears out.

Last but not least, one of the handiest things for the upland game or marsh hunter is just a large belt or pocketknife. Often on marsh hunting trips you must either repair or build a blind. Without a big knife the job is not easy because you cannot gather many bundles of tall grass, weeds or willow branches without a knife or small belt axe. And with the knife or small belt axe, take a waterproof matchbox that will float in water, and a compass. No deer hunter should be into the woods without these. That waterproof matchbox is protection against the possibility of going without a fire some day when things do not go right. With a knife or small axe and matches one can face many an emergency in the woods.

return in that direction. After a little experimentation you will be able to handle these tricky serves with little trouble.


Sidespin serves are a valuable asset to your game because even though you don't score aces outright you have a good idea where the receiver will return them. If you know approximately where the ball is coming, you can get set to smash it for a sure winner.

Another effective serve is the chop. You do just that. The stroke starts shoulder high. Then you strike down and forward very quickly, keeping the top edge of the racket tilted backward during the entire stroke. This serve if properly executed will generate a lot of underspin on the ball and your opponent will be almost certain to stroke it low, into the net. Be sure to hit the ball crisply, using generous wrist action. Don't peck at the ball, and make sure to follow through. If the other fellow pulls this serve on you-and you should be able to mark its coming by watching him closely as he serves-simply aim the ball farther above the net than usual and keep the blade of the racket slanted back-

Although finger-spin and knuckle-ball serves have been outlawed by the United States Table Tennis Association, they are still held legal in twenty-three other nations affiliated with the International Table Tennis Federation. While they may not be used in this country in official play, you can have fun experimenting with them and using them in informal contests. Practice will enable you to develop all sorts of weird varieties of these devilish deliveries—serves that will drive many rivals to distraction.

The easiest finger spins are the knuckleball types. Place the ball between the thumb and fingers of the right hand like a marble. The ball should rest on the side of the third finger and is held by the thumb and first finger. Now shoot the ball like a marble with the thumb doing the propelling onto the face of the racket, which is in the left hand. For variety change the position of the hand and the angle of the racket. For different spins the ball may be ejected by the thumb of



the left hand onto the racket, clasped in

Still another variation involves holding the ball between the pad of the thumb and the nail of the middle finger, which in this case ejects the ball. Or hold the ball between the pads of the thumb and third finger. Now snap these fingers and this will shoot the ball spinning into the air. As it comes down, bat it with the racket and the rapid spin on the ball will give the receiver something to worry about.


But there are other tricky spin shots besides serves that can be used to advantage during an actual contest. Here is a real fooler, a shot that can be employed when you are on the receiving end of a serve. Some call it "Old Faithful" because the ball shoots high and abruptly into the air and reminds them of that spout of water in Yellowstone park.

It is easier to execute this shot successfully when the serve is delivered to your right or forehand side. Hold the racket pointing forward and tilted slightly backward. As the ball is served toward you, advance the arm forward and contact the ball with an upward lift on the half-volley or directly after it has touched the table. You sort of scoop the ball. The upward movement will cause the ball to soar high in the air, and the forward impetus of the stroke will impart excessive underspin. Try to so strike the ball that it will land just over the net on your opponent's half of the table. If you can do this the underspin should be strong enough to make the ball jump back to your side of the net without the receiver being able to even touch it with his racket. This will score a point for you even though your adversary finds it impossible to reach the ball. This return of service comes as a sensational surprise. It is not an easy shot to learn but if mastered it will give you no end of satisfaction. Of all the trick shots in table tennis, this shot probably is the most unusual and sensational.

in comfort until the metal cools off. Or they dress you in a light suit of asbestos overalls, and hold a roaring blowtorch to your chest.

But this conquest of fire was far from easy, as you learn for yourself by talking with C. E. Bridgman, one of the young men accustomed to loafing inside glowing furnaces and sitting in blazing planes.

"We began experiments in 1933 to produce asbestos helmets, gloves and suits for fire brigades," he explains. "The first experiments indicated a new asbestos yarn was required, for when subjected to fire, gloves and helmets fell off the wearer in pieces. After this problem was solved, the helmet withstood fire, but there still were two serious defects and it is fortunate a dummy was used for this test, instead of a man. The dummy was seated in a large packing case, with wood wool soaked in gasoline heaped about it. We watched the flames envelop the dummy, and then a heavy piece of wood fell on the helmet that might have proved fatal if a man had been inside. Our next helmet had a crashproof crown and a nice visor, but when I used it, my nose was burned. So we altered the shape, and made noses quite safe by using two pieces of mica with an air space between them.

"Before taking any serious risks in the open with a burning plane, we experimented with a furnace built at one end of a brick tunnel. I tried first to enter the tunnel without an asbestos suit, but the heat was unbearable. With the suit on, I was able to enter the tunnel in comfort and approach the furnace at the other end. It was warm inside the furnace, of course, but not uncomfortably so at first. I stood in the fire for two minutes before having to clear out, and under such circumstances this is a long time.

"After coming out of the fire there is a strong temptation to tear off the asbestos suit, but this would mean such a startling change of temperature as to be a shock to the human system. One has to 'cool off' for about twenty minutes before the suit can be removed with safety."

These asbestos suits are intended to be a part of the fire-fighting equipment at all

British airdromes. Asbestos experts also have developed a cockpit insulated against fire. A man wearing a heavy suit of asbestos was able to sit in an insulated cockpit, with the whole machine in flames around him, for five minutes.

The experiments at Slough have been watched by architects, shipbuilders, and chemical and paint manufacturers. Houses of the future may have ceilings lined with asbestos instead of laths and plaster. A fierce fire beneath a lath and plaster ceiling broke through in seven minutes, but the same fire failed to penetrate a ceiling: lined with asbestos. Also it is quite possible to insulate a ship's engine room so a fire there cannot get beyond its walls. Big buildings such as schools and hospitals could be made safer by asbestos curtains fitted at the end of each corridor. The curtain is rolled up in a metal container. and is automatically released by the heat.

knock properties of these materials are well known and the ones with any actual value are already patented and available in the regular gasolines of responsible oil companies. One service-station operator in California ran his fuel business up to 3,000 gallons per day with a proposition that seemed sure-fire. He explained his gasoline gave better mileage because it contained a secret compound smuggled to him from Germany. He urged every customer to check the mileage from five gallons of ordinary gasoline, then have any remaining fuel drained from his carburetor, and fill up with five gallons of his special gas. Invariably the customer found he really did get two or three more miles per gallon with the treated brand. The secret of this performance was that when the service-station operator put in five gallons of his own fuel for a test run he always threw in a half gallon or more extra gasoline. This was hardly enough to register on the average gasoline gauge and yet was enough materially to increase the distance five gallons of fuel would go.

An even greater hoax was the tablets that seemed to change water into gasoline. In this case the "slicker" would drive into

a service station and calmly fill his fuel tank with water from a hose. That was the last the service-station man ever saw of his money or the motorist. The answer, of course, was that the motorist had a hidden fuel tank and the rear tank into which he poured the water was just a dummy.

"Motors Overhauled, Fifty Cents per Cylinder," is another bait on which many drivers bite. The advertisements usually state lost compression is restored, rings are freed, valves reseated, and other benefits are performed by capsules or paste placed in the combustion chambers. The capsules generally contain some form of mica and wax that builds up on the walls







of the cylinders. The benefits are extremely temporary, experts explain. What really impresses the motorist is the improved performance that comes from the good tune-up that is given as part of the installation service. Better business bureaus say the pellets are sometimes used as "come on" inducements to attract drivers into a garage. Then strong efforts are made to sell them new coils or other expensive ignition parts so "the compound will have a fair chance to help the motor,"

Human Eye's Sensitivity to Light Increases with Darkness
