I read your article "Festival of the Iron Men" and have just one criticism. The threshing steam engine came in about 1860. drawn by horses. And as early as 1867 the Russell Threshing Machine Company had a steam engine with a man steering it. However, in the state of Ohio, even if you had a self-steering steamer the law required you to put a team of horses ahead of the engine when traveling a public road, for "safety" reasons.

Our association had the first revival of the "threshing bee" on Oct. 12, 1941. Our biggest crowd was in 1953, when about 14,000 people attended.

If I have obtained from life a measure of wealth and happiness, it is to that book I owe it, for it revealed to me the workings of my brain.

Three years ago, I had the good fortune to meet its author, and I promised him to propagate his method, and today I am glad of this opportunity of expressing my gratitude to him.

I can only suppose that others wish to acquire what is, after all, the most valuable asset towards success in life.

WHEN Arthur Johnson decided to earn some extra cash during his spare time he chose the mail order business because it could be run right from his own home. He reasoned that it was one of the few fields still open in which you could start your own business with a minimum of capital. In fact, his total investment was less than \$100.00.



Witness the success of Arthur Johnson. He obtained a franchise from Mail Order Associates and within three months the profits started pouring in.




One Man "Road Tests" Eight Cars at a Time on Treadmill

IT TAKES ONLY ONE MAN sitting in a control room to run realistic "road tests" of as many as eight cars at a time at the Esso Research Center in Linden, N. Y. Magnetic tape recordings control the operation of cars and can be recorded for any type of driving desired. The recordings are made on actual road tests and then played back to control the cars on the treadmill.

The rear wheels of the cars rotate rollers which, in turn, spin huge blowers that provide the load for the tests and also provide cooling air across the radiators. Incidentally, the road tests reveal that rockand-roll music on a car radio can reduce gasoline mileage as the driver unconsciously jiggles his foot to the music's rhythm.



STAIR WAY Reprinted "PM Highlights" to the SEA

This is the year that the St. Lawrence Seaway opens its gates to let ocean liners and freighters sail the lakes—an epochal feat of engineering and of international cooperation

OR THE PAST FOUR YEARS, a Canadian-American army of mud-begrimed men in hard hats, numbering at times up to 22,000, has been digging a king-size ditch. To the clatter of jackhammers, the rumble of more than 150 giant shovels and draglines, and the roar of an endless stream of earthmovers, they have ground deep into

the ancient bedrock beneath a brawling 180-mile section of the St. Lawrence River. Behind miles of protective dikes and cofferdams, their clanking steel monsters have gouged out footings for a string of big dams, massive concrete locks and many super powerplants.

In early spring, when the last of the mud




Lake steamer leaves Eisenhower Lock and moves on its way to Snell Lock, about three miles downstream

has settled in the miles of canyonlike channels they have carved, and the last raw earth embankment has healed under a new hide of turf, the St. Lawrence Seaway will have become a Gargantuan \$1,090,000,000 reality.

Unlike the 50-mile Panama Canal and the 100-mile Suez, the world's third great inland seaway (built jointly by the United States and Canada) is a two-fisted giant. The mighty dams that back up its rapids into usable waterways also harness the once-wild river, steering it through batteries of sluice gates in two big power dams. One of these is second only to Grand Coulee. From its rumbling generators,

Cross-section of the Seaway from Lake Superior to the Atlantic Ocean shows relative location of the locks.







Controls for lock valves and gates are on console. Warning lights prevent operator from making mistakes

1,800,000 kilowatts of electricity will be fed into the power grids of Canada and the United States.

No less dramatic in its implications is the waterway created by the great dams. For the first time, deep-draft ocean ships will be able to sail 2370 miles from the Atlantic to the heart of North America. Midwestern cities fringing the Great Lakes' 8300 miles of shoreline will become true seaports. Cities like Chicago, Duluth, Milwaukee, Detroit, Cleveland and Toronto are destined to become world ports. You may climb aboard a passenger liner at Chicago, and sail to Liverpool, Bremerhaven, Cherbourg, Singapore — or where

Water level drops more than 600 feet, most of it within the 360 miles between Lake Erie and Montreal







you will. The Dutch-owned Fjell-Orange Line already has launched one passengercargo liner, with accommodations for 110, for the Great Lakes trade. Another is on the ways. Fare? About \$180 to Europe one way, they say.


You get some inkling of the staggering size of this project when you realize that the engineers had to devise a way to lift an ocean liner the height of a 60-story sky-scraper, for Lake Superior sits 602 feet above the Atlantic. The St. Lawrence River and its Great Lakes headwaters, draining a land mass greater than Britain and

France, make this drop in a series of steps like the cascading water in a tiered fountain. What the Seaway does is climb over those tiers on a series of great locks—huge "stairs" with water for treads.

Coming in from the Atlantic, a ship will steam up the broad Gulf of St. Lawrence and into the narrowing river as far as Montreal. Two miles below the Jacques Cartier bridge, the skipper will nudge his bow into a broad channel on the north side of the river. Massive 35-ton miter gates will yawn to admit his vessel into St. Lambert and Cote St. Catherine Locks — first



Cross-section of a Seaway generating station shows how water rushing from intake gate spins hydraulic turbine connected to generator. The gantry cranes are used to raise or lower gates




Vehicular tunnel permits trucks and cars to drive beneath ships at Eisenhower Lock on Wiley-Dondero Canal

two steps in the giant staircase. Like all the steps in the new waterway, these locks measure 800 feet long, 80 feet wide, with 30 feet of water over the sills. Allowing minimum clearance, a ship 768 feet long, 75 feet abeam and drawing 27 feet of water can squeeze in.

In two 25-foot leaps the ship will clear Lachine Rapids. Sailing up a broad pool in the river called Lake St. Louis, the ship moves westward toward Beauharnois

Huge turbine runner assembly for one of the dam's generators is moved into lowering position by gantry




Locks, which hoist the vessel 84 feet to the level of a broad canal, carved in solid rock, that feeds Beauharnois Power Dam. On this pond, the ship glides into another broad stretch of river-Lake St. Francis. Up to this point, the new system is entirely Canadian-built.

Fifty miles upstream the ship signals for clearance at the Bertrand H. Snell and Dwight D. Eisenhower Locks, on the American side. These two hydraulic elevators

Riding the top of power dam like giant four-legged stool is gantry crane that lifts and lowers gates





perform a 90-foot lift previously accomplished by 11 separate locks between the foot of International Rapids and the town of Iroquois, on the old Cornwall Canal that once accommodated small lake steamers. The old canals, locks and even the rapids themselves, lie deep under the placid water of a new lake, formed by water backed up behind mountainous piles of concrete—Long Sault Control Dam and Robert H. Saunders-St. Lawrence Generating Station

Ready crane at each portal would drop steel stop-logs on each side of the channel to stop water flow if gates were damaged



and Robert Moses Power Dam. These bulwarks, built through the combined efforts of New York State and Ontario Province, form the heart of the international seaway power giant. Between them they pile up a placid navigation pool for nearly 40 miles upstream, and use the 81 to 90-foot head thus created to spin the giant generators.

At the western end of this pool, another Canadian lock lifts the ship five more feet to Ontario-level waters behind Iroquois

> Dam, which controls the flow of water into the great power pool.

> Across Lake Ontario comes the spectacular 327-foot heave. This is accomplished in Canada's 28-mile Welland Canal, bypassing the Niagara River with its falls and gorge. Four single locks, a flight of three double locks and one guard lock do the job. Opened in 1932 to replace a century-old 14-foot-deep canal, the present locks and channels have been deepened to conform with the new Seaway specifications.

Once atop the Welland, a ship has navigated all of the official Seaway. The Soo Locks, providing the final lift into Lake Superior at Sault Ste. Marie, form the top step in the long stairway. But all through the Great Lakes big

"Venetian Blind" Reduces Jet Noise With High-Pressure Water


Jet-engine noise can be suppressed by a "Venetian blind" unit that turns the plane's heat blast into steam. Placed 12 feet behind the jet's exhaust, the apparatus absorbs the blast by ejecting high-pressure water through the first set of blinds. A second set deflects the reduced blast upward to final dissipation on a ramp.

Telescoping Dash Light Handy for Map Reading

Designed to blend with other dashboard devices is a telescoping light that can be pulled out for map reading. The lamp can be turned all the way around if it's needed to locate the ignition or to light the step. It fits in a one-inch dashboard opening.


Clothes-Drying Rack Hangs Over Bathtub

By hanging a wire rack directly over the tub, clothes can be dried in the bathroom without dripping water on the floor. When not in use, the rack can be unhooked from the uppermost fastener and lowered against the wall.

'Balloon' Houses 3-D Radar

AIRBORNE TARGETS are pinpointed as to distance, bearing and alti-tude by a new 3-D radar. Conventional radar systems yield no information on altitude. The new system, developed by Hughes Aircraft Company, can be moved in one equipment van, one power truck and an antenna trailer. At the radar site, air blowers are used to inflate a radome of rubberized nylon around the antenna. The dome, under slight air pressure, protects the antenna from wind, snow and ice. The information from the radar is displayed on two scopes; one gives target range and bearing, the other altitude. The information, in digital form, is fed to missiles for interception of targets.

IN ALL THE history of hocus pocus, no magician created greater turmoil than Houdini, master showman, when he made an elephant vanish at a pistol shot.


Houdini debuted with this illusion on the stage of the New York Hippodrome in 1918. A huge elephant was led up an incline and into a large cabinet. The open front of the box then was closed. The box was swung around on heavy wheels. Houdini fired a pistol. Presto—the box was empty!

At first, many thought a trap

door was used. That is, they thought so until they were reminded that directly under the stage was the huge water-filled tank which the theater used for bathing-ballet numbers. Besides, the box was raised off the floor.

The vanishing elephant was a masterpiece of stage magic, and will live in the annals of hocus pocus as long as magic survives.

The scientific secrets of illusions are zealously protected. The basic appeal of magic is mystery. Once the mystery is gone, there is no magic. By keeping their secrets hidden, wizards not only protect

their huge investments, but more important, keep magic alive as a diverting entertainment.

A prime example of such entertainment was offered more than 100 years ago when Robert-Houdin, the French innovator, baffled continental theatergoers with his "Suspension Ethereneene." Ether was then a mysterious new liquid. Robert-Houdin uncorked a bottle under his son's nose. Fumes seeped through the audience. The wizard announced ether would make a body lighter than air. The boy fell asleep. Rods supported him under his armpits, and a stool kept his feet above the stage. The stool was removed. Then one of the rods was taken away. The boy remained suspended by a single slender rod under his

arm. He was lifted until his body was horizontal. Only his elbow touched the rod. Still he remained suspended. The illusion was a sensation.

When the properties of ether became better known, performers omitted it from their presentations. And after suspensions lost their novelty, it was inevitable that illusionists would cause their assistants to float up, down and around the stage. John Nevil Maskelyne created a master method. Harry Kellar, the American, improved it. In his version of levitation, a hypnotized subject rose slowly from her couch at the wizard's command.

"Ah," thought many spectators, "wires or glass panels." But Kellar calmly passed a solid hoop over the floating body, then

tossed it down to the audience for examination.

Thurston. Kellar's successor, heard people say, "If only I could get closer to the floating girl, I'd discover the secret." He invited 20 or 30 spectators to come to the stage and watch her ascend from a few feet away. They were the most baffled people in the theater!

Large-scale sorcery is expensive to produce. Thurston told me that he spent \$50,000 to perfect the levitation. To the audience, there was no evidence of lifting power other than his words and the gestures of his expressive hands.

One of the greatest of the nowyou-see-it, now-you-don't illusions was created by William Robinson, better known to the public as the Chinese magician, Chung Ling Soo.

A chair was suspended by two ropes from the top of a framework. A securely tied assistant sat in the chair. At a signal from the wizard the chair dropped to the stage —

empty!

Charles Morritt, an Englishman, offered one of the most fantastic and colorful creations of all time. It was called "Tally Ho!" First he displayed a giant empty cabinet. It remained in full view on the stage. Then he fired a shot. Tally ho! To the stirring music, the production began. A fox darted from the box, followed by a pack of barking dogs, several huntsmen and a girl in riding habit on horseback. This incredible production of a complete fox hunt drew thunderous applause.

The Great LaFayette, a versatile quickchange artist, had one of the most elaborate productions ever staged, with magnificent scenery, his own musicians, a corps of assistants, dogs, horses and a lion. His greatest illusion was a playlet entitled "The Lion's Bride." A captured princess was thrown into a cage with a live lion as the action reached its peak. The lion crouched to spring. Timid onlookers shut their eyes. Suddenly, what was once a lion was now LaFayette, the conquering hero of the drama!

Horace Goldin made an illusion from the time-honored trick of rings in a nest of boxes. In the old trick, the wizard borrowed finger rings, loaded them into a pistol, and fired them at a box hanging at the side of the stage. When the boxes were opened, the rings turned up in the innermost container. Goldin used large, suspended boxes and added eye appeal with a girl instead of finger rings. He fired her



from a huge cannon. The climax came of course, when the girl was found deep inside the nest of boxes.

Perhaps the most frequently performed illusion in the world today is what is generally called the "Substitution Trunk." Houdini called his effect "Metamorphosis." The magician's assistant is handcuffed, then tied in a sack. The sack is locked in an examined trunk and tied with ropes. A cabinet is put around the trunk for a moment. The magician dashes inside the cabinet. In a split second the assistant dashes out. The cabinet is taken away. The ropes are untied, the trunk unlocked, the sack opened—and inside, securely handcuffed, is the magician. Top that one!


Boy Becomes Bathing Beauty

Steve Shepard, a California conjurer, has topped it with his latest illusion for water shows. A boy in a bathing suit is tied securely and locked in a trunk. The trunk is lowered into the water. After a brief, suspenseful wait, the trunk is hauled out. Has something gone wrong? The trunk is opened. The boy has vanished. Out pops a bathing beauty!

But what about that most discussed illusion of all time, "The Indian Rope Trick"? Here are the facts. An Arabian sheik, Abu Abdullah Mohammed, is the first known writer to describe it. He said he saw it performed about 1355 in Hangchau, China—not India. He said it was performed 1. One of the most famous of illusionists was Thurston, who presented an elaborate stage show. One of his illusions was a variation on the old mystery of slicing a girl in half. At left, blindfolded assistant is shackled to the sides of the cabinet

2. Thurston closes cabinet doors over center section of the girl's body. He then produces very thin metal plates, which he shows are made in one piece with no possibility of sliding sections. He inserts the plates to slice girl at her neck and knees

3. When Thurston opens the cabinet doors to prove that girl's body has been sliced, the audience discovers that her torso has completely vanished. Two assistants reach out through cabinet to demonstrate that the girl's body just isn't there any more



with a leather thong—not a rope. In his story, the boy climbed the thong to disappear from sight, and the wizard went up after him with a sword. Soon pieces of the boy's body fell from above. The wizard slid back into view. He gathered up the scattered anatomy and gave it a kick. Lo, the boy was whole again!

So, contrary to public opinion, the Indian Rope Trick isn't Indian. It isn't done with a rope. It isn't a trick, but an illusion. And the boy doesn't disappear.

Many wizards worked out stage versions, but to date, no magician has done it in the open air, away from trees or buildings.

Though the Indian Rope Trick may intrigue most people, the illusion that hopelessly fascinates me was advertised by a Mr. Ingleby in Birmingham, England, in 1806. I have the original handbill in front of me as I write:

"He will take two new-laid Eggs, the Whole of the Company may examine them, and any Person in the Room may break them, and a Child shall come out of one, and a Set of Bed Linen out of the other."


Matter of fact, Mr. Ingleby could skip the bed linen and I'd still give him the crown! ***






Operator, seated at a remote television monitor, watches X-ray images of parts passing down assembly line


Inspector Checks X-Rayed Products on TV Receiver



X-ray unit plus the special TV camera can be installed almost anywhere on the line to inspect hidden parts of the product. LFaulty circuit can be spotted in X-ray of electronic unit



MANUFACTURERS now can peer inside" their products with "X-ray eyes" to make routine inspections. Every product moving down an assembly line can be X-rayed on a continuous basis. The new technique is made possible by coupling a closed-circuit television system with the X-ray equipment. The system, developed by General Electric, makes it possible for an inspector to sit in front of a television screen in another part of the building and check each product even though it may be sealed inside a metal container. Fluoroscopes have been used for some time to inspect products, but the inspector could work only in a darkened room for short periods of time. The new equipment consists of an X-raysensitive TV camera, a control unit and a viewing monitor. It can be used with any standard X-ray generating apparatus. The camera picks up the X-ray image and passes it to the control unit, which feeds it to the 12-inch picture tube. Ordinary TV receivers may be added to the system, making possible simultaneous observations from separate locations. The system is expected to be particularly useful in checking aircraft parts and sealed electronic units.



Piggyback Bridge Eliminates Trestle Supports on Highway


When U.S. Highway 40 was widened at Auburn, Calif., engineers found the steel supporting towers of a railway trestle blocking the road. To clear the roadway, they built a 240-foot-long "piggyback" bridge on concrete pillars beneath the trestle. The trestle is now supported by the bridge.


Carbon-Monoxide Detective


Robot Fire Fighters

Families are earning extra money picking up pine and fir cones and selling them for their seed values

A NEW METHOD of reforestation used by Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, Tacoma, Wash., is giving hundreds of families in Oregon and Washington the opportunity to earn "pin money."

The method employs helicopters, affectionately known as "whirlybird cowboys," to spread the seed, while the families get into the act by hunting fir and pine cones to sell to the company. The cones are valued for their seeds. A filled, two-bushel sack brings anywhere from \$4.50 to \$20, depending on the type of cones inside. Last year, families and youth groups in the area earned about \$90,000 cone-hunting.

The cones must come from specific areas, because company research has shown that seeds will thrive best when planted at the same elevation as the parent tree, and under similar conditions.

Reforestation gets under way just as soon after logging operations as possible. Often the area to be reforested has to be plowed, or scarified. Large bulldozers push down the brush left after logging, since brush can choke out the seedlings. The dozer blades leave an exposed mineral soil in which the seeds find a good place to grow.

Chemical sprays, applied by helicopter, are another means used to kill off the competing brush. The helicopter, saving many man-hours in brush eradication, has also proved to be the ideal method for the reseeding part of the project.

Flying at a speed between 45 and 60 miles per hour, the helicopter never flies higher than 200 feet above the ground on seeding operations. The helicopter's maneuverability is advantageous in areas where it has to dip down between high canyons and mountain ridges.

On each side of the helicopter's bulbous "eye" is a seed tank or hopper that has a 200-pound capacity. Just below each hopper is a power-driven meter for controlling the rate of seed flow. Air tubes from the outlet of the meter lead to a centermounted, hollow disk, called a slinger, which is driven from the engine shaft. The slinger rotates in flight, distributing seeds in a 90-foot swath.

The seed tanks are loaded evenly to maintain balance when the copter is aloft. While in flight the pilot listens to an instrument that transmits the vibrations of the seeds leaving the slinger. It tells him when all the seed has been distributed from the tanks.

Since the seeds are scattered at the same elevation as the parent tree, the helicopters are loaded with seed for only one 500-

foot elevation level. Before they reseed another level, they must return to the ground for a new supply of seed.

Seed is generally scattered at the rate of one pound to an acre. It takes more than 40,000 seeds to make a pound, so an area one-mile square would receive about 25,000,000 seeds. They are sown in a cross-flight pattern that requires two flights over the area, with the second run at approximately right angles to the first. This is the best way yet devised to provide an even distribution of seed. An acre of ground can be covered in about 15 seconds.


An effective method of rodent control has been developed to discourage this traditional enemy of seeds. With chemical repellents on the seeds, rodents gradually develop a distaste for the seed that normally is their favorite fare.

The helicopter method of seeding has proved itself in two ways: It is much easier than hand planting of seedlings, and it is more practical. Hand planting takes many hours of labor, while the helicopter cuts labor down to minutes.


The operation is part of a longrange forestry program called "Operation Rehab," which has two objectives: To return to production those lands that do not adequately restock after being logged, and to reclaim old timberlands that have been lost to active production because of fires and brush encroachment. **

The auditorium, which will seat up to 14,000 persons, will have a retractable roof of stainless steel. The roof will be composed of eight sections, two stationary and six movable. The pictures show the auditorium with roof open and closed. The dome will require about 200 tons of steel.



Cook and Eat "Dogs" While You Drive

Now there's no need to interrupt long motor trips with food stops - if you can exist on a diet of hot dogs, that is. A compact two-barrelled heater plugs into the cigarettelighter socket and heats two frankfurters at a time. Buns are toasted by placing them atop the heater while the dogs are cooking. It takes about seven minutes to get the first pair of dogs to sizzle, but after that the heating time is reduced to about four minutes, according to the manufacturer.





TV Watches Tots For Motel Guests

Television is the "baby sitter" at a Florida motel. A camera suspended from the wall is trained on the sleeping child. Through closed-circuit TV, a nurse sitting in a central room can tend five children at once. She can speak and listen through an intercom system. If a child cries or doesn't heed instructions, she dispatches an employee to give personal supervision.



Japanese Police Station Designed With "Peaceful" Motif

Something new in the way of police stations is a circular, glass and brick-wall structure in downtown Tokyo. The designer, Professor Kichiro Taniguchi, insisted that the building be surrounded by flowers, that birds be kept in a cage to create a peaceful atmosphere and that all policemen assigned to the station be "handsome."








"Hurricaneproof" House on Stilts


Designed to withstand hurricanes and tidal waves is a house on nine-foot-high stilts at North Dartmouth, Mass. The stilts actually are part of a V-strut foundation intended to hold the house in place against the impact of rushing water. The V-struts are anchored to concrete piers buried deep in the ground. Two-inch bolts embedded in the concrete have a shearing strength of 40,000 pounds per square inch. The struts are made of 4 by 10-inch lumber. Screw-threaded nails fasten sidewalls to the studs and framing of the five-room house.

Navigation System Traces Flight Path of Helicopter



Helicopters have their own navigation system, now under evaluation by the Airways Modernization Board. In front of the copter pilot is a pictorial map of his regular route. During his flight, a stylus moves across the map, constantly showing his present position and the path he has flown. The automatically system measures radio transmissions from a chain of stations along the route. It is designed primarily to expedite helicopter operations in busy terminal areas, and is under test at New York City airports.


Venezuela also is the land of the incredible statistic, for only statistics can show the magnitude of the people's efforts to raise themselves to the jet age overnight. Venezuelans love to quote statistics to prove the magnitude of their effort. Here are a few:

 In the short span of 10 years, 200,000 people will have been moved from shacks into magnificent apartment buildings.

 A huge complex of chemical factories, built in less than three years, soon will be turning out 180,000 tons of fertilizer per year (more than three times Venezuela's own requirements) along with plastics, synthetic rubber and industrial chemicals.

 In just 18 months, thousands of workers and machines toiling day and night moved more than 15 million cubic yards of





dirt to build what Venezuelans say is the world's longest earthen dam, a dam that stretches for nine miles and will irrigate 300,000 acres of now-arid land, boosting livestock production by five times in central Venezuela.

 In central Caracas, the 400-year-old capital city, more than 400 buildings were razed to build a magnificent commercial center. Already \$90,000,000 has been poured into the center, and the total cost eventually will reach \$300,000,000 if the original plans are carried out — compared with \$100,000,000 for our own Rockefeller Center. In 15 years Caracas has been transformed from a sleepy overgrown village of 300,000 persons to an exciting metropolis of more than a million.

 In just 12 months Venezuela completed more than 1000 public-works projects costing some \$500,000,000. In five years more than \$2,000,000,000 have been spent on public improvements.

And Venezuelans seem determined to maintain such staggering statistics, come what may. Following the revolution last

January, a junta of military officers and civilians took over the administration of the national cash register. One of the first acts of this group was to announce:

"We intend to maintain a high level of public construction, placing emphasis on projects that are essential, such as railroad, harbor and highway improvements and development of new petrochemical and steel industries. Showplace projects such as fancy hotels and monuments, which often were pushed by the last administration,

will have low priority." Venezuelans are well on their way to their goal of lifting themselves by their oil derricks overnight. Gone are the ox carts around Caracas. Today the new Autopista, a six-lane superhighway, is jammed with Thunderbirds, Cadillacs, Jaguars and Imperials. For centuries the University of Caracas struggled along in the same ancient buildings. Today, with facilities for 7500 students, it is one of the most beautiful and modern universities in the world, boasting all spanking-new buildings within a period of four years. In the mountains above Caracas a 3000-kilowatt atomic re-



tisements, and Latin-type ducks squawk singing commercials from television screens. In downtown Caracas, prior to the revolution, you had to drop the equivalent of 30 cents into a parking meter for just one hour's parking. (It may be significant that as soon as the revolt was touched off, parking meters were ripped out by the dozens!)

Throughout the populated sections of Venezuela there is a throbbing urgency to tear down the old and build up the new overnight. A stop watch could well be the national symbol. You see construction gangs working 'round the clock everywhere. Nightfall is the signal only to turn on the huge floodlights. Standing on any of the hills of Caracas, you are surrounded by small armies of men working on projects

of breathtaking scope. And, except for the remaining slum shacks, a majority of the multistory buildings within your view have been built within the past 10 years. The sight is electrifying and in a way terrifying, for you wonder how the patient peasants of Venezuela can adapt themselves to this resounding environment of clanging bull-dozers and thundering concrete mixers.

Fortunately Venezuela can afford the pace of its progress. It is, indeed, a land of fantastic wealth. Again, only statistics can tell the story. Oil production has doubled since 1950, and now can run as much as 2,245,000 barrels per day. Venezuela is the world's largest oil exporter, and second only to the United States in the production of crude. And the ground will continue to

gush this black wealth for years to come, for Venezuela has 16-billion barrels of proven oil reserves, six percent of the world's total.

Down in the wild interior of the country are several vast deposits of iron ore estimated at well over two billion tons. In 1957, iron-ore production increased by a third to 15 million tons. Pockets of gold, precious stones and valuable minerals pockmark the trackless jungles. Many areas have not

even been prospected.


In Venezuela, despite changes in government, it's not a question of whether to spend for vast public works, but how best to spend the money that's pumped up by the oil derricks. In one recent year, 57 percent of the budget was set aside for public works. So far as is known, no other government in history has spent more than 30 percent on such projects. (Another sizeable whack of the budget has gone to equip the armed forces with the latest weapons including jet planes.) Part of the 57 percent for public works went into highways, industries and other projects essential to the economy. Another part went into the tremendous housing projects for lower-income workers.

But a substantial share also went to "showplace" projects, designed for the most

part to impress the rest of the world. A dozen tourist hotels of unbelievable opulence, built and operated by the government, are strewn across the country-but relatively few tourists check in, and many of the magnificent suites stand empty. At the time I visited the Hotel Humboldt, perched atop a 7000-foot mountain and accessible only by cable car, I spotted only half a dozen guests in a building which would put most other hotels throughout the world to shame. The Armed Forces Club, for sheer splendor, would outrank the pleasure palaces of ancient Rome. And at the very moment of the revolution a year ago, workers were putting the finishing touches on a spectacular \$50,000,000 racetrack.

It's a safe bet that the current administration in Venezuela will not emphasize such showplaces. However, projects necessary to a sound and diversified economy, as well as those of value to lower-income families, will be continued. Venezuela is a land of the poor and the rich, with very little in between. Its people now seem determined to use the gushing oil and mountains of ore to improve the living standard throughout the country—and do it at an incredible pace.

Electronic "Cat Eye" Photographs Stars in Daylight




Blind Operators Man Braille Switchboard






Face-Lifting Operation for the Old Man of the Mountain

Fusion Power for the World of Tomorrow

Here, simply stated, is where we stand in harnessing the H-bomb for peaceful uses. It may come sooner than you think!

THE SCENE WAS straight from a grade-B horror movie. Scientists at control panels pushed buttons and threw switches to create blinding bolts of lightning in a weird array of glowing vacuum tubes.


This was no horror movie, though. It was the Atoms for Peace exhibit of the 1958 Geneva Conference. The visitor could pause to inspect machines with such out-of-this-world names as Stellerator, Scylla, Astron, Alpha, Ogra, Zeta and the mildly optimistic Perhapsatron. The significance of this equipment—and the guarded opti-

mism at the conference-was inescapable.


All over the world, scientists are making big strides in their efforts to harness for peaceful ends the fury of the H-bomb.

Indeed, as the visitor paused before the machines in the exhibit hall, he may well have been witnessing nuclear fusion. Some of the scientists have a sneaking suspicion that at least one of the instruments actually was producing fusion energy while it was on display.

The best evidence of progress in this field is not success, but lack of failure. As former

Atomic Energy Commission Chairman Lewis L. Strauss has pointed out: "We think the fact that we have worked with it now for a number of years and have not been able to prove it impossible is a very considerable gauge of its eventual success."

Dr. Arthur E. Ruark, chief of controlled nuclear research for the AEC, confirms the optimism: "There is general belief in the American laboratories that the ignition temperature [the temperature at which the fusion reaction is self-sustaining] will be achieved within a few years."

Proof of success will be the discovery of invisible particles which the scientists wryly call "thermonukes" (thermonuclear neutrons). All over the world, right now, scientists are seeking thermonukes. It's a baffling search because a thermonuke is exactly like any other neutron, so how do you prove the origin of the little beast?

Whether thermonukes attended the Geneva Conference or not, scientists in attendance estimated that sometime within the next 10 to 20 years a switch will be thrown and the first full-scale, power-producing fusion reactor will go into operation. Even this first crude reactor probably will have a power output comparable to the huge hydroelectric plant at Hoover Dam.

That moment, if it comes, will be a pivot point of history. Nations need never fear that their power sources will run dry. For a time, obviously, petroleum will remain as a source of mobile power, and coal will continue to provide industry with heat. You can't change a way of life overnight. But eventually, according to the experts, oil will give way to some form of stored electrical power which has been derived from the fusion reaction, and coal will be simply another source of industrial chemicals.

At that supreme moment, man can look ahead through the halls of time for literally billions of years and still see a plentiful supply of fuel. Billions of years! When new kilowatts are needed, they simply will be plucked from sea water.

Advantages of Fusion

Why will fusion reactors be so much better than today's fission reactors?

 The fuel supply, as noted above, will be inexhaustible and inexpensive.

2. The problem of disposing of radioactive wastes will be negligible. This is a major problem of fission reactors. The critters are just plain dirty. For example, if all our current energy requirements were provided by fission reactors, we'd have to dispose of radioactive waste material equivalent to that from the explosion of 200,000 atomic bombs each year. Fusion reactors will produce very little radioactive waste.

The fusion reaction, by its nature, is



NEEDED FOR STABILITY


safer than fission. A fusion reactor could never explode. It would simply collapse and fail to function.


4. There's a fascinating possibility that electricity can be drawn directly out of a fusion reactor. In fission, the reactor produces heat, which then is pumped through conventional turbines and generators to produce electricity. This is a highly inefficient way of producing electricity from nuclear energy.

For these reasons, controlled fusion would be an infinitely greater achievement than wresting power from fission, shooting satellites into orbit or sending rockets to the moon. Indeed, inexhaustible and inexpensive power on earth may well give man the means of navigating to the stars.

Basic Power of the Universe

To achieve fusion, the scientist must crack the secrets of those stars, for nuclear fusion has been generating sunshine and starlight since the beginning of time. It is really the basic source of power of the



universe. In effect, the scientist must create a star on earth, bottle it up and clamp on a lid. If he succeeds, he can draw from the bottle any amount of power he wishes.

But each step in this field is a tremendous effort. Dr. Amasa S. Bishop, in a recent AEC report on fusion research, stated that progress may be "slow and halting" because of the many problems involved. but that as yet "no basic obstacle" has been uncovered.

Just what are the obstacles, basic or otherwise? Only a top physicist can understand the mathematics of the fusion process, but the basic idea isn't difficult to comprehend. Suppose you want to bottle up your own star. Here's how you'd go about it:

First, you might be wise to review the differences between fission (A-bomb energy) and fusion (H-bomb energy). In a fission reactor, the nuclei or "cores" of atoms are broken apart. The process has been compared to the explosion of ordinary TNT. Touch off TNT with a blasting cap. and the shock explodes one molecule, which explodes the next, etc., in a chain reaction. Similarly in a fission reactor, atoms are blasted into particles, which blast other atoms into particles, etc. Poof! You either have an A-bomb explosion or controlled fission, depending upon the speed of the process. In either case you get a scad of atomic particles and considerable energy.

Superhotfoot for Nuclei

In a fusion reaction, however, these atomic "cores" are forced, against their wishes, to unite. This process is somewhat similar to the burning of logs in your fire-place. You give the molecules of the logs a hotfoot by burning kindling under them.

They become so agitated they collide violently, forcing them to unite, and the logs burst into flame. Once the logs are ablaze, the fire itself continues to heat the molecules, so the reaction is self-sustaining. Similarly, in a fusion reactor you raise the temperature to force nuclei to unite. Only in the case of nuclear fusion, you must give the nuclei a superhot-foot, raising the temperature to hundreds of millions of degrees. You must create the temperature of the stars.

For a moment, forget about the problem of kindling such a fire, and concentrate upon the fuel itself. Where do you get atomic "cores" suitable for the fusion process? The most promising

source is deuterium, which is simply one form of hydrogen. Turn on the faucet at the kitchen sink, and you'll let an untold quantity of deuterium flow down the drain. Deuterium is found in ordinary water everywhere.

You might suspect that there is a hitch here, that it would be expensive to extract deuterium from water. The United States already is producing deuterium on a significant scale, and published figures indicate that it can be extracted so cheaply that deuterium as a fuel would cost about one percent as much as coal!

Furthermore the quantity of deuterium just asking to be extracted is staggering. Take the current power demand of the entire world and multiply that figure by 1000. There is enough deuterium in the oceans to supply this much power, year in and year out, for quite literally billions of years. No kidding.

Now assume that you have extracted just two of these deuterium nuclei, which are called deuterons. If you can hurl these two deuterons at each other with enough force to make them fuse, you will create three things: helium atoms, neutrons—and from 3.25 to 4 million electron volts, an incredible amount of energy. Here is an example of just how much energy: If you "burn" or fuse just one pound of these deuterons, you'll end up with 43 million kilowatthours of electricity, the equivalent in energy of more than a million gallons of gasoline!

If all the deuterium in the world were extracted from the sea and burned completely, it would produce one thousand million, million, million kilowatt-years of electricity, a figure beyond comprehension. To put it in a much more credible way, just

Jet Helicopter Uses Same Principle as Rotary Lawn Sprinkler



Diffused Light Saves Sight


Soft, glareless light for reading and other close tasks is produced by a new household bulb, below left. The inside of the bulb is coated with silica diffusing material which gives better light distribution.




Electricity From Heat

Slide Rule for Soils Figures Erosion on Farms

How much soil will be lost from a farmer's fields because of erosion? A Soil Conservation Service expert has developed a slide rule that will calculate the rate of erosion when several factors such as the kind of soil, the type of crops and the steepness and length of slope of the field are known. The device figures the annual loss in tons of soil per acre. The slide rules are not available to the general public; they are issued only to soil-conservation technicians. They are designed for use primarily in Midwestern states.

ROCKET SHOOT at M.I.T.



M UFFLED ROARS, beginning like claps of distant thunder, rumble through the basement corridors of the main building at Massachusetts Institute of Technology these days. But no one looks out, puzzled, at the clear blue sky anymore. Everybody knows what's up—the student Rocket Research Society has just "blasted off" another rocket engine on a static-test run in its armor-plated cell downstairs.

The thunder started five years ago when a group of determined amateur student rocket enthusiasts at M. I. T. wanted to make live studies of rocket-propulsion systems. Scouting military-surplus depots, they stumbled across a ponderous test cell about 10 feet square, made of one-inch steel armor plate. It had been used in a World War II research program to test fuels for high-altitude-burning properties. The multiton affair rode to the campus on a flatbed

truck, was jockeyed into its donated location in the cellar, and became what the amateur rocketeers believe is the finest, safest, amateur rocket-testing facility in the country.

Today, if you wander into their shop during a firing, you'll find most of the 37 members busy at a complex of homeassembled instruments and switching consoles reminiscent of a Canaveral test-pad blockhouse. All are engrossed in measuring and tabulating things like thrust, burning time and combustion-chamber temperatures, as white-hot flame scorches from the exhaust nozzle of an experimental homemade rocket engine bolted to a floating steel rack inside the vault. One man watches through a six-inch porthole of layered glass, alert for signs of malfunction. If there's an interesting motor on the stand, several members can watch at once

in a mirror rigged for peering through the port to reflect what's happening inside the vault.

Last year, under Reece Roth, their president (who won a \$1000 American Rocket Society award for his paper on a new way to measure rocket-exhaust velocities), the group ran 31 live firings with seven rocket

motors turned out in their own shop. Nearly all were made on a donated old metal lathe they rebuilt. Most test motors are steel cylinders six to ten inches long and capable of about five pounds' thrust. One, a unique affair for studying ignition and combustion patterns, has flat Lucite sides. Students can see the flame burning inside the combustion chamber. "The Lucite stands up about five seconds," says Roth, who designed and built it. "That's long enough to collect interesting data."

Though strictly an amateur group, there's nothing amateurish about the way these rocketeers work. Most are mechanical engineering and physics students.

"We keep a complete log of each firing," says Roth. "And the accent is on safety. Many amateur groups like to fire flight rockets. Besides being dangerous, such ventures yield little data." This year, the M. I. T. rocketeers debated sending up a sounding rocket they'd designed. The idea was dropped when all agreed the only thing they could learn would be the peak altitude reached (30 miles on paper). "Our membership hasn't flown a rocket since 1953 when the static-test chamber was installed," Roth reveals.

Fuels, one of the most hazardous ele-

ments in amateur rocketry, are handled with some tricky safety gadgets devised by the M. I. T. amateurs. Mix for solid fuels, such as asphalt and potassium perchlorate, is stirred up in a steel box inside the vault, by a man standing outside. He works a paddle handle that extends through a tiny hole in the wall.

Liquid and gaseous fuels feed to test motors via fuel lines from outside tanks. Automatic cutoff valves are shut electronically at the first hint of malfunction. Backstopping this is a manual cutoff switch to shut everything down and a carbon-dioxide bottle that turns on automatically if things get hot.


Amateurs in Trouble

"Many amateur groups got in trouble using fuels like zinc and sulphur," says Roth, "probably because they're easy to obtain. But they're tough to handle, detonate easily and give only 40 percent of the performance of liquid fuels. Amateurs using solid fuels should be sure they're really solid—not granular powders. Even in a long, pencil-thin rocket, granular fuel of this type can burn down an entire five or six-foot column in about \(\frac{1}{1000}\) second, and chances are good that the rocket will explode."

With all the precautions built into the M. I. T. rocketeers' lab, Roth has an impressive collection of twisted and distorted chunks of solid cylindrical steel two inches in diameter. Once they were rocket motors. One of them blew a steel plug against the vault wall with such force that it folded open like a flower.


To other amateur groups who query him for advice, Roth usually points out that there are two safe ways to static-test rocket motors: "You can enclose the motor in an explosion proof case," he says, "or you can enclose the people in a blockhouse. A supervised group can achieve the first solution by working out a well-planned pit with good walls and bunkers." * * *




Observer watches rocket-motor test through safety-glass porthole. Test cell has walls of inch-thick steel armor plate

Even rocket fuels are handled with caution. Student outside test cell works paddle that mixes fuels in small steel box










Barge Becomes Stage

Radar Through Trunk Lid

Chicago police are spotting speeders with a radar set mounted inside a squad-car trunk. Since a radar beam would be deflected by the trunk lid, alterations were made. The inner taillights were removed and panels, painted to match the car, were bolted over the openings. The panel in front of the set is Plexiglas, which doesn't interfere with the radar beam. The other panel is made of hardboard. Cars moving in either direction are tracked by the set, which reports speeds on a meter.





Unmanned Space Vehicle Designed for Trip to Mars



In Your Future: Rolling Refrigerator, Portable Bottle Warmer

Hostess carts that warm and cool foods in separate sections, and bottle warmers for traveling parents, are among electrical appliances now in the experimental stage. They use a new principle of refrigeration

and heating by devices that occupy little space and have no moving parts. The cart can be operated on batteries. The bottle warmer, which plugs into the car's cigarette lighter, also can be set to cool the bottle.




Fastener of Nylon Strips

Clothing, upholstery and other items can be held securely by a fastener that consists of two strips of nylon. One strip has a velvet-type surface with thousands of tiny loops. The other has thousands of tiny hooks. When the strips are pressed together, the hooks engage the loops. To open, you simply peel the strips apart.

Snow-Plow Blade Can Be Attached to Rotary Mower If you have a push-type (not self-propelled) rotary mower, you can attach a snow-plow blade to the machine and clear a 24-inch swath through a heavy snowfall. The snow blade bolts to the enginebase adapter plate of most four-cycle engine mowers with cutting widths up to 22 inches. The blade is made of extra heavy-gauge steel which is ribbed for added strength. It will move up to eight inches of dry or five inches of wet snow. Eyes Generate Electricity

In Normal Light

Your eyes generate about 1/10,000 of a volt of electricity while reading under normal room light. This is the estimate of Dr. Leo E. Lipetz of Ohio State University, a biophysicist. The scientist has been studying the electric current produced by nerve cells in the eyes of animals. The current is amplified about one million times and its patterns studied on an oscilloscope screen.



Air Holds up Steel Roof

Weighing more than 50 tons, the steel roof of a new grain storage building is held up by air pressure. The roof, made of aluminized-steel sheeting, covers 2.3 acres. End walls made of steel were erected first. The strips of roof sheeting were welded on the site. Then giant fans built up air pressure to lift and hold the roof in place. Entrance is through air locks.



Blind Learn to Read by Hearing Sound Patterns of Letters

Persons who are totally blind can learn to read printed material, including typewritten letters, with an electronic device called an aural-reading machine. When its probe is moved over a printed page, photocells translate each letter into a sound pattern with a specific pitch. The sounds do not resemble spoken words but are more like musical tones, or organ chords. By interpreting the tones, the blind person ultimately can attain a reading speed of 30 words per minute. The device was designed by Battelle Memorial Institute of Columbus, Ohio.



The CRUISER With the SUPERSONIC STING

THE RECENT commissioning of the USS Galveston, guided-missile light cruiser, was a unique event in the annals of modern naval history. The long and once-independent histories of the ship herself and the Talos missile that forms her most formidable armament are both of considerable interest. But it's the successful termination of these two formerly divergent projects that presents an example of the modernization of the new Navy.

Had the Galveston been completed, as scheduled, in the period just following World War II, she would have been armed exclusively with six-inch guns able to fire about 10 miles with accuracy. Today the Galveston is fitted in part with traditional armament, but it's also equipped with the Talos, which can be effective at distances up to 65 miles. The Talos affords not only greater range, but also more accurate fire-power. With only six-inch guns, the Galveston would have been just slightly more effective than her namesake in the Great White Fleet.

The Talos ramjet missiles can destroy enemy aircraft within 65 miles. They are equally effective against surface targets



The construction of the Galveston was authorized by Congress on July 19, 1940. Her keel was laid February 24, 1944, and on April 22, 1945, the ship was launched. Final construction was halted after the war, and the nearly completed ship was turned over to the mothball fleet.

On February 4, 1956, the Navy Department decided that the Galveston should be completed and partly redesigned to be the first ship to house and launch the deadly Talos missile. This remodeling involved the complete recasting of the afterpart of the ship's structure. On May 28, 1958, she was finally commissioned—nearly 18 years after being first authorized.


About the time the Galveston was being launched in 1945, the Navy's Bureau of Ordnance began the highly secret "Operation Bumblebee." The Bureau asked the applied physics laboratory at Johns Hopkins University to suggest a means to combat the Japanese kamikaze menace. Why the name was chosen for the project is uncertain, but it is believed that it may have

been prompted by a slogan displayed throughout the Johns Hopkins laboratory: "According to recognized aerotechnical tests, the bumblebee cannot fly because of the shape and weight of his body in relation to total wing area. But the bumblebee doesn't know this, so he goes ahead and flies anyway."

Not Impossible After All

At the time, the task of developing a ramjet engine to power the flight of a military weapon seemed almost as impossible as making a bumblebee fly. The ramjet had been a theory in physics since before World War I, and was thought to hold great promise as a supersonic engine. But it would not work efficiently unless boosted to nearly sonic velocity. Solid-propellant rockets, such as the German V-2, were thought to be a possible answer.

On June 15, 1945, the longawaited practical demonstration of a ramjet engine took place. A ramjet fashioned from the exhaust pipe of a Thunderbolt warplane made a successful flight over the sand dunes of Island Beach, N. J.,




At commissioning ceremonies, the USS Galveston was heralded as the first new ship of a new naval era

attaining a velocity of 1200 miles per hour. In October of the same year, a similar model was demonstrated in free flight with a thrust greater than its aerodynamic drag. A replica of this vehicle is on exhibit in the Smithsonian Institution.

The original test vehicle embodying the ramjet engine went through various phases of development. Diameters increased from six to thirty inches. Research also concentrated on such items as aerodynamics, propulsion, radar, guidance, control systems, launching, warheads, structure, simulation and ground and flight-testing. A new means of fuel and airflow controls was designed, thereby enabling the first simple model to be developed into present types, which

Guiding the supersonic missiles is a pair of super radars that can pick up targets many miles beyond the horizon have a much higher degree of thrust control and provide the propulsion plant of the Talos missile. While Bumblebee also developed other guided missiles, such as the Terrier and the Tartar, the ramjet engine itself was placed in a special division and called the Talos program.

The name Talos, taken from a mythological character, is appropriate for a weapon whose mission is to defend the nation. King Midas of Crete asked Zeus, the father of the gods, for someone to defend his island domain. Zeus in turn asked Hephaestus, god of metalsmiths, to supply him with a suitable defender. Hephaestus made Talos, a living brass demigod, who walked about the island three times a day to ward off any would-be attackers from the sea. Nearly indestructible, Talos had his "Achilles' heel" that proved his undoing. He had one vein that was plugged with a rivet in his foot. The resourceful enchantress Medea magically drew out the rivet and poor Talos bled to death.

Talos Is Versatile, Awesome

Propelled at supersonic speeds and guided by remote-controlled aiming, the Talos missile almost infallibly destroys an oncoming attack at distances up to 65 miles. While primarily a surface-to-air missile, it is sufficiently versatile to be used as a surface-to-surface missile in shore bombardment as well. While it is conceivable that


some defensive measures against Talos will be developed, the missile is presently an awesome weapon in our national-defense arsenal.

The weapon has already set a new level in the size and performance of solid-fuel booster rockets. It was the first missile to employ a dual-guidance system, accurate at both short and long ranges. The Talos program has also pioneered the introduction of atomic warheads to antiaircraft missiles. Adm. Arleigh Burke, chief of naval operations, has called it "the best missile in any arsenal in the world."

The Talos missile now in production weighs 3000 pounds and is approximately 20 feet long and 30 inches in diameter. Its 40,000-horsepower ramjet engine enables it to maintain a level-flight altitude higher than that reached by any bomber. It is accelerated to supersonic speed by a solid-fuel rocket propellant about 10 feet long. This booster is jettisoned when the missile reaches cruising speed. Here the ramjet engine takes over.

Like an Automobile Carburetor


Unlike a turbojet, the Talos propulsion unit does not require a complex and expensive compressing unit to inject large quantities of air for the combustion of the

Talos fucl (kcrosene). In the ramjet the motion of the missile itself serves to compress the air that enters from the front. The Talos needs only 10 to 15 percent of the fuel load a rocket would need to develop the same thrust for the same length of time. Further, variations in the rate of fuel injection determine the speed and thrust of the missile, somewhat as a carburetor does in an automobile.

There are two phases to the direction of the weapon toward its target. Initially there is a beam-type guidance from the launching point to the target area. Guidance here is supplied from the launching area, where information on the presence of hostile targets is available by radar. In the second phase, control shifts from beam guidance to homing guidance. The control systems contain the latest applications of etched-circuit wiring and modular packaging to missile design. A safety and economy measure is the Talos Tactical Test Equipment (Tatte), which electronically records and reveals through flashing red and green lights whether each component is functioning properly prior to firing the weapon. Whether the Talos is equipped with atomic or conventional warheads, a proximity fuse sets off the warhead when it is within range of the target.





Powder Suspends Particles in Tube of Water



OF CARS

IT WAS a year of decision—a year in which major decisions had to be made, decisions that will set the course of the industry for years ahead.

Some were made, others postponed until the industry is more certain what you, the public, think. That makes 1959, your year

of decision.

It was a year for drawing the line—the little foreign cars went as far as they could be permitted to go. At one period in the year, they were selling 11 percent of the total market. That did it. The big boys decided to get into the game.

Before the 1959 World Series is over, you will be admiring the all-new domestic small cars as they scoot around the streets

of your town.

What will this new breed of American cars be like? Nobody is saying for sure, but it certainly will be handsome, it certainly will be economical, and it certainly will sell.

But there was more to 1958 than the small-car decision.

Most important (and most frightening) item in 1958 was the sharp drop in sales of new cars. Total industry sales were down about 30 percent. Some makes were down twice that much. Obviously, this must be stopped if the industry is to maintain its present stature.

Detroit experts blame the sales lag on the recession. Some critics outside the industry put the blame in a different order: They argue that the excessive opulence of the 1958 cars so out-priced the average

American that he couldn't buy a new model or, if he could buy it, he was so sickened by the excesses of the machines that he wouldn't buy. This, these critics claim, created the recession.

So the argument deteriorated into "which came first" and as with the hen and

the egg, nobody knew.

Meanwhile in South Bend, Indiana, where gloom had been hip-deep for years, the fast-weakening, almost desperate Studebaker-Packard Company came up with the biggest news story of 1959: A small American car that could make critics eat their words.

This new car, the Lark, is a mere foot longer than the tiny foreign cars and yet seats six (snugly, to be sure). It has a good, old-fashioned American water-cooled engine. It comes as a six or a V8, and the V8 is a scat-wagon in the best American tradition. It has a trunk in the back where the bellhop has learned to expect it.

How the public is taking to this car is uncertain at this writing (late November), but expectations are great. Not only South Bend, but Detroit also, is watching, because its reception will provide valuable information about other small cars' prospective sales.

Only two cars set sales records in 1958: The Rambler (with the help of its new and smaller brother, the American); and the

expensive Thunderbird.

Two more different cars would be hard to find. The only quality they share is dimensional. Both are smaller than other cars in their price classes. Yet the men who designed the Thunderbird do not credit the car's smallness with its success (see page 176). "Small" continues to be a verboten word in the industry. American Motors still isn't bold enough to use it in describing its Ramblers. (Even the current Studebaker Lark makes no mention of the car's smallness, describing it instead as a "new dimension in motoring.")

There just weren't enough Thunderbirds to satisfy the orders, so meteoric was its success. In its first year as a full-size car (with four seats, that is), the Thunderbird

What's under the sheet metal?

On the next 17 pages are photographs of all 1959 American cars and many European makes. In addition, there are drawings which show what the sleek, shiny metal hides: The frame; the suspension and running gear. These are the parts that make a car behave the way it does; these are the parts that most people never see.

Among the American cars there is considerable variation in frame design, less in running gear, and little or none in engines. European cars are more varied. They range from front engine, front-wheel drive to rear-engine, rear-wheel drive; from water to air-cooled; from two to three to four cylinders; from torsion bars to transverse leaf springs to horizontal coil springs.

The sketches are self-explanatory. The white arrow on each foreign chassis points to the front of the car. The small "X" inside the square on the American cars locates the universal joints in the drive shafts. Beneath each sketch is pertinent descriptive material.



took 22 percent of the prestige-car market. It sold more than twice as many cars as Imperial and about 25 percent more than Lincoln. Yet, says Ford, the smallness of the car has nothing to do with its success.


The Rambler American, a revival of a 1955 design, outsold even the most optimistic hopes of its sponsors. Not spectacular in either looks or performance, it is small, neat and practical—and it sells.

Among most of the new cars for 1959,

stylists were king. The engineer was in a hiatus between last year's achievements and the big promises for 1960.

The exciting advances of the 1958 models somehow seem less exciting one year later. Air suspension, introduced as the greatest thing since independent front suspension, failed to attract a market. It was too expensive, too temperamental, too marginal. The public didn't get excited about it.

Studebaker Lark's box-section frame is of heavier gauge than its previous models and being shorter, also, is about 30 percent more rigid. Actual frame design is unchanged except for the shortening to allow the smaller wheelbase. PLYMOUTH

Plymouth's straight-railed ladder frame is typical of the Chrysler line. Front-end springing is by torsion bars which, for 1959, have been thinned and shortened thanks to improved metallurgy. Rear suspension is Hotchkiss with conventional leaf springs. A change in the roof of hardtop sedans has given added rear-seat headroom and better seat padding over the drive-shaft tunnel.

CHEVROLET

Chevrolet keeps its bodies low by using a two-piece drive shaft with its center joint inside the tubular midsection of the X-frame. Coil springs at the rear make necessary a set of control arms to transmit thrust from the rear wheels to the frame. The narrow-waisted frame permits wide stepdowns in the rear floor. Coil springs are mounted conventionally at the front end.

Front and rear suspensions are conventional with coils in front and semielliptical leaf springs in the rear. PARADE OF FOREIGN CARS

THE CHART at the bottom of the page tells the story. It describes more graphically than words the spectacular sales rise of foreign cars in this country.

But it doesn't answer the question that still bothers Detroit: Why are they selling? It's this that bewilders the industry.

Is it simply size? Economy? Handling ease? If these are all, then Detroit has no worries. It can and will build cars that satisfy these demands.

But there may be something moresomething that Detroit can't possibly provide. It may be the glamor of the imported product. It may be the wide variety of styling that enables the buyer to own an economy car that is not a carbon copy of his neighbor's. It may be the variety of engineering (the chassis diagrams on the following pages show how much variety there really is among the imported cars). This variety gives the owner reason to brag about air-cooled engine, swing axles, rack-and-pinion steering, front-wheel drive, trailing-arm suspension, unit body and all the vast cabala of automobile design that seems completely foreign to the American-car buyer.

Whatever the reason, Detroit now realizes that the foreign-car success cannot be ignored any longer. What started out as a fad for funny fellows with berets has turned into an epidemic. Small foreign cars that were originally bought as second cars apparently are becoming first cars in more and more families.


The total foreign-car sales in this country for 1958 were about 275,000 cars, which is equal to the combined 1958-model sales of Chrysler, Edsel, Studebaker, De Soto, Lincoln, Imperial and Packard. And estimates are that 1959 sales will be higher.

Next year, the big American companies will have their small cars in the battle. Actually, these forthcoming small cars will not compete directly with the best-selling foreign cars in either price or size.

The new American small cars will be more like the Borgward and Peugeot in size and price. Cars like Volkswagen, Renault and Fiat (which currently combine to make most of the foreign-car total) will still have the below-\$2000 market to themselves despite the counterattack of the Americans.

Whether the difference between \$1700 and \$2000 (the expected domestic small-car price) will be enough advantage to keep these foreign cars in volume business remains to be seen. In any case, on the following pages are 18 of the best-known foreign cars, the cars that made Detroit admit that it may have been wrong.

WHERE DID THE INCHES COME FROM?

THIRTY YEARS AGO, a prominent Packard engineer, surveying the company's new low-slung hypoid rear axle, confidently predicted that American passenger sedans might some day be as low as 66 inches.


The 1959 model crop out of Detroit runs in height from 54 to 59 inches. Some models

are as much as two inches lower than corresponding 1958 bodies.

Yet the crystal-ball gazers tell us we're heading even lower—down to 52 inches. They say sales indicate that the low look is what John Q. wants and Detroit is going to give it to him.

Where did the inches come from? How

Here are the body's vital statistics. After 10 years, the problem is the same, but the solution is different



did we get so much lower than the best engineers were predicting 30 years ago? How can we possibly get any lower?

Good questions, all of them. To get the answer you must analyze what determines car height. Several vital dimensions add up to set the over-all height of a body. Starting at the pavement, we move up through the "ground clearance" area, the distance between the ground line and the lowest part of the car's undercarriage.


There has to be space here to clear obstructions on back-country roads and to provide ramp clearance at the center of the chassis for leaving steep driveways. Current models have minimum groundclearance figures ranging from a little over five inches to about seven inches. Engineers don't see how they dare reduce this even as much as a half inch on future models.


The vertical distance between the ground-clearance line and the floor of the passenger compartment is "open to negotiation," so to speak. It will depend on the layout of the chassis. If the car uses a frame, the floor can be dropped below the top of the frame side rails by putting footwells in the floor pan. This is the by-nowfamiliar step-down construction, used by all except Chrysler Corporation. It requires a special frame design to make room between the rails for wells while maintaining adequate stiffness.


Things are simplified with the unit body construction in which there is no separate chassis frame and the body is welded up as a sturdy box structure. In this design, you can place the floor anywhere you want. Of course, there still must be room under the floor for the exhaust pipes and mufflers. Running the exhaust along the frame rails (as on the Continental Mark II) is expensive. Finding room for the exhaust system is one of Detroit's biggest headaches today and you'll see radical changes by 1961.

The next dimension is seat height. Seats have been getting lower and lower for 10 years. The passenger is sitting more and more with his feet straight out in front of him. There's nothing particularly wrong with this, but it requires very careful seat design to get acceptable comfort in this position. Thigh and kidney support is vital. Some seats in low foreign sports cars do the job very well. Detroit is definitely behind in this problem. It looks now as though a minimum practical distance between the floor line and the lowest point of the compressed seat cushion (with an averageweight person in the seat) might be four inches. Many 1959 models are close to that right now.

Frame shape determines size of the floor wells for rear-seat riders. These drawings explain the reason



Next is one of the fixed dimensions in body design-the height of the human torso in a seated position. In a reasonably upright position, the average height is 34 inches from seat to the top of the head. There is little we can do to reduce this dimension on future cars. Of course, we could tilt the passenger back a little, putting him in a semireclining position. There is just a hint of this on some 1959 models. How much of this the public will put up with for style, only time will tell.

Above the head we must allow a little excess room for the taller riders and, in some cases, for hats. This dimension is not so fixed as some others. For instance, you would allow more headroom in a Cadillac limousine than in a sporty Plymouth Fury. The man who buys the Fury will put up with less headroom (perhaps even would be willing to take his hat off) to get the flashy body lines.

Probably an average allowance on all cars for excess headroom should be four inches between head and ceiling.

The thickness of the roof structure (upholstery and metal) doesn't need to be much over a half inch. If the roof panel is curved, obviously we're going to have waste headroom in the center. We must allow a certain minimum headroom at the sides and clearance at the center where the roof bulge is more than needed. This makes the body one or two inches higher than necessary.


Flat roofs are the answer, of course. And the 1959 flattops will be common to

the industry in the future.

Add up all these individual heights and what do you get? It looks as though the practical minimum over-all car height, using all the tricks, might fall somewhere between 48 and 53 inches. But only if we don't plan to seat more than four persons in the car.

We could reduce height to 52 inches tomorrow if it weren't for that center passenger in the back seat of our so-called sixpassenger sedans. Between him and the drive-shaft tunnel is about 90 percent of

Detroit's problem. There just isn't any room left there to play with.


Three significant dimensions are involved: First, there is the height of the top of the drive-shaft tunnel above the road. This is largely determined by tire radius and the design of the differential and drive shaft. The 14-inch wheels have helped some (although the latest low-profile 15-inch tires are just as low).


Ford reduced the drive-shaft height at the rear axle by designing the hypoid rearend gears to lower the pinion gear 34 inch on the ring gear (which, incidentally, was a very ticklish engineering and production problem). The GM divisions have gone to two-section drive shafts so there won't be so much up-and-down swing as wheels go over bumps, Oldsmobile even shortened its rear shaft section for 1959, to reduce further the amount of upswing. Ford and Chrysler have necked down the outside diameter of their one-piece drive shafts at the rear. On its bulky torque-tube drive, Buick designed a clever two-section tube with a kink near the rear axle under the seat.


The second dimension is the seat-cushion thickness above the tunnel. This is a killer. Every inch of cushion that the occasional center-passenger gets (and how often do you ride three in back?) is one inch added to the car's over-all height.


Detroit is trying to compromise here. On some cars compressed-cushion thickness over the tunnel is less than one inch and the passenger "bottoms" on many bumps on reasonably smooth roads. A heavy passenger may contact the tunnel all the time (which might be less annoying and uncomfortable than bumping up and down on it). On the other hand, some companies, by clever design all through the chassis and body, manage to get compressed-cushion thickness of two to four inches over the tunnel and still retain low body lines.

The third dimension is the passenger.

In this exclusive PM interview, Ford Motor Company's top stylists talk frankly about automobile styling

WHY DO OUR CARS

Here's what stylists say at Ford:

UESTION: Many writers are saying that you stylists are doing the best you can to destroy the automobile industry by your designs. It seems that this is a good time to ask you "What does a stylist do? How does he think?"

WALKER: Let me start off by saying that there are people who are asking "Why are cars so long? They won't go in my garage." This is not always true. The average garage is 20 feet long and there isn't a car that is 20 feet long. If they would take the baby buggy and the wheelbarrow out of the garage they could get the car in. Of course, we don't want to dictate to the public how to run their garages.

QUESTION: How do you define an automobile? What is this thing you design?

MAGUIRE: It is many things to many people. Today's Thunderbird is two or

three cars. It could be a tailored, refined car for the man who wants it to be that. It could be a spooky, sporty little car to the man who wants that. A car isn't like a radio or a refrigerator or a house. It has to have more character.

WALKER: When you think of an automobile, you think of movement and that

means aerodynamics.

ENGEL: You can easily define a refrigerator. It's a box to hold food that must be neat and clean. But a car is more than just a bus or taxi.

WALKER: It's the most expensive expendable product a family buys so there

is pride of ownership involved.

QUESTION: You say cars are many things to many people. Does this complicate your design problems?

George W. Walker, Ford Vice-President and Director of Styling:

"How many times a day does a person get in and out of a car? We say . . . about four times a day. Why would he forsake good silhouette just because he knocks his hat off a few times a day. If we were designing a milk wagon we would make it high enough so a man could jump in and out without knocking his hat off."

Here's what stylists say at Chrysler:

QUESTION: Why is there so much criticism of auto styling today?

EXNER: Everyone is looking for some place to lay the blame for the poor business conditions of the past year. If cars had sold the way they did in 1955 you wouldn't have heard any of this.

QUESTION: How do you define an automobile? How do you think of it while de-

signing one?

EXNER: First, it's a means of transportation, but it must be as exciting as possible. It should create a desire for ownership and a pride of ownership. A person is looking for something with a feeling of motion that inspires him with its grace and excitement.

SCHMIDT: If we can bring out a new car that is a fine means of transportation, but makes you enthusiastic about going into the showroom to buy it, then we've done an excellent job.

QUESTION: Then the stylist must create

demand?

SCHMIDT: I'd say so. We are really merchandisers.

EXNER: Your product must look more exciting than the other fellow's. First of all, though, it must look like an automobile. That's why we have this Dart theme, this look of motion.

QUESTION: You must be flattered to be imitated in this concept by General Motors.

EXNER: Yes, we are somewhat flattered. QUESTION: What is a good automobile design?

EXNER: I think we've already answered that, Excitement is the word for it. It must excite your desire to own it.

MAGUIRE: Right. You buy a car more because you want it than because you need it. The old car probably didn't wear out. You have a desire to acquire a new car. You don't have this feeling about a refrigerator. You get excited about a car. You don't get excited about any other product to the same extent.

WALKER: You should have been with us all afternoon. We've been looking at the '61 models and trying to

answer these questions for ourselves.

MAGUIRE: It's a frightening thing to look at future models. Over here, there will be a new concept of a car. Across the room, there will be another concept. Both are aimed at the same objective. Both will carry passengers. Which do you pick? Which fits the character we have created for our automobiles? The design must fit that character. If we were designing a radio or a desk, there would be more "form follows function" and we wouldn't have that problem. But a car is more than a machine. It has to be a lot more than just a machine.

ENGEL: And it has to be right because it involves

millions and millions of dollars.

MAGUIRE: Don't get me wrong. It also has to be a good machine. It has to be clean and nice, but it has to be more than just clean and nice. Many industrial designers don't understand that.

ENGEL: Industrial design has a little of the architectural quality about it, a little stiffness that you can't have

in a car.

QUESTION: How should an automobile look?

MAGUIRE: It is easy to say how it should not look. It is something else to be constructive. It's easy to say cars are too big, too low or have too many fins. But take all the fins off and you end up with a piece of soap with wheels on it. Those fins finish off the metal, they give the full length to the car. The question is how much fin?

QUESTION: In other products, the simple designs seem to be taking over. Like furniture, for example. Is this true

of automobiles, too?

ENGEL: Yes, there has been a change since 1955 or so when people wanted lots of chrome and two and threetoning. They want it played down a little now, want it a little quieter.

MAGUIRE: We have just looked at four brand-new concepts of cars for future use here. That's a hard job—to willfully get off, to drop, something that's doing well. You have to decide whether to stay with a good thing and just evolve or to cut off and start something real new. Today's Buick, for example, is utterly different from last year's. They must have decided to wipe the slate and start over. Fine. That takes nerve.

WALKER: We did a big thing with the Thunderbird. The public is saying it doesn't want luxurious, expensive cars. So we come along with the Thunderbird. It's not a cheap car, it sells for nearly \$5000 and we can't make them fast enough to keep up with orders.

QUESTION: But doesn't the success of the Thunderbird, which is small, indicate that there may be some justification for the criticism that cars are too big?

MAGUIRE: No. I don't think so. I think it just happens to be small, but the reason people buy it is because it's lush.

QUESTION: Then you don't think its appeal has anything to do with its size?

WALKER: "The American public is moving upward all the time. When the workingman gets a little more money, he wants a bigger car. You can't change that."



ENGEL: "I would say cars are not going to get much longer. But I'd never say they weren't going to get any lower. I don't know how low they'll go."

QUESTION: Do we need bigness to get this excite-

ment you talk about?

EXNER: It could be done in a smaller package. But the public has indicated its preference for larger packages through the years, through sales experience. Stylists don't want a lot of chrome either. But people have demanded it through the years. Every attempt I know of that has ever been made to strip a car, to take off its chrome, has met with failure.

QUESTION: Are you concerned with more than looks,

with the practical nature of the car?

EXNER: Contrary to what a lot of people think, we work very closely with engineering and manufacturing groups. Many things we might want to do strictly for looks are not practical and have to be turned down.

QUESTION: It seems to me that there have been great changes in styling in recent years, but few in engineering.

Are engineers failing to keep up?

EXNER: They are always working on changes, but many are too costly. That is one reason why they haven't appeared. But I would say that engineers have kept up. In fact, we couldn't have done many things we've done in styling if they hadn't.

SCHMIDT: No matter what car he buys today, the customer assumes it will be dependable. So the next question is, which car does he want to be seen driving? And then you're talking about the appearance factor. We make you want to buy our car because you'd rather be seen in it than in somebody else's.

QUESTION: Who initiated the demand for a lower car? Stylists or engineers?

EXNER: The stylists. It is to get better proportions. But in most cases engineering agrees with us because it gives the car more stability and that reflects well on them. The styling reflects well on us, so we both stand to gain from it.

QUESTION: Aren't there undesirable complications that go along with lowness?

EXNER: That's true. But we feel that the plusses outweigh the minuses. It took a lot of engineering, a lot of head scratching and hard work by a lot of people to get cars down as low as we have while retaining the same major chassis components. There's plenty of engineering in that low package. Perhaps it isn't as sensational as the styling changes, but it's still a lot of achievement.

QUESTION: Are we ever going to have comfortable six-passenger cars as long as we have low cars with high

center tunnels?

EXNER: I believe so. Continuous effort is being made, although it may seem slow to the public. Seats are being made more comfortable. We need some major changes

Two industrial designers offer an imaginative design for the most useful vehicle of all . . .

THE SUBURBAN RUNABOUT

IT HAS NO TAILFINS. It has almost no overhang (what little there is can be unbolted and replaced if damaged). It doesn't look like anything you've ever seen.

At the front it has the sleekness of a fast sports car. At the rear, the roominess

of a Greyhound bus.

It is an imaginative shopper-commuter vehicle sketched by two industrial designers as a possible solution to the transportation mess in urban and suburban America.

Jay Doblin, Director of the Institute of Design, Illinois Institute of Technology and former president of the American Society of Industrial Designers, and W. W. Fitzgerald, head of the Product Design Department at the same school, put this practical "dream car" on paper.

Popular Mechanics asked these men, typical of the industrial designers who criticize Detroit styling, to suggest a vehicle which, in their judgment, would be a practical, serviceable machine for housewife, commuter or small-city dweller—a new form of transportation appliance.

They were asked to design a car that might become the "first" car among America's fast-increasing two-car families—a car that would be used most of the time while the bigger, more powerful family car was saved for long trips and vacations.

Designed for urban use exclusively, the car they suggest would seat two adults in comfort, with ample headroom and legroom. There is space for three children in the rear-facing back seat.

It is very small. Wheelbase is only 80 inches, over-all length only 140.5 inches (making it almost six feet shorter than a Ford, Chevy or Plymouth). But it will do almost everything the average suburbanite requires of a car and do it, the designers

say, cheaper and more efficiently

than the big car.

The rear-facing back seat folds down to form an easy-to-load package shelf for hauling groceries or even such bulky items as chairs and tables for the PTA or the bridge club. Front seats fold individually so the handyman own-

> er can haul long boards home from the lumberyard for his week-end

projects.

Doors slide back (they don't swing) and the car parks in tight spaces without entrapping its occupants. Stoplights and turn indicators are mounted






high on the roof so big-car drivers can't fail to see the smaller vehicle. In traffic, the lights can be seen several cars back.

Rubber-tipped impact nose and tailpiece absorb minor bumps in parking jostling. More serious collisions would crumple the impact pieces, providing absorption of forces and reducing the chance of injury to occupants. Damaged pieces are unfastened and replaced (as are all body panels) by removing easily accessible bolts hidden under pop-out plugs.

ment and also supports the roof, permitting the use of the narrowest window posts. Brakes are big, open and well cooled.

A small air-cooled engine is proposed, probably a flat four. The designers suggest a two-speed automatic transmission.

Obviously, this car is not going to replace the great American automobile, but it does indicate what could result if tradition is ignored and designers take a fresh look at the old problem of sitting down while going from one place to another.

TO SOME OF US, a new car is to drive, to enjoy and, less pleasantly, to pay for. But to others, it's a challenge to invest in gadgets that claim to banish wear, eliminate friction, reduce gas consumption and boost performance.

Unfortunately, many "miraculous" gadgets are not all they are claimed to be. Some are out-and-out frauds. A few do have real value, others may even damage your car.

The most flagrantly worthless devices are usually the ones with the longest list of testimonials from satisfied owners. No real test data is given, only generalities. No real explanation is given of how the device works.

Testimonials are not necessarily proof of a product's value. If an utterly useless device is tried out by enough motorists, some will imagine that their cars run better and a few will even claim, as a result of slipshod tests, amazing increases in performance and economy.

If a device actually does have measurable value, the manufacturer will probably substantiate it by a test report from an independent test laboratory. Many laboratories are available that will run such tests at a

cost equal to a tiny fraction of the profits frequently made by a successful car gadget.

Anybody who makes a device that operates on a new principle will usually patent it to protect his rights. If a product is not patented, it is probably not a new principle. If the advertisement does give a patent number you can get a copy of the patent and find out exactly what is new about it simply by sending 25 cents to the Patent Office in Washington, D. C.

Promises of "satisfaction or your money back" are not always proof of merit. Promoters know that only a small fraction of dissatisfied buyers will bother to remove, wrap and mail back a device that costs only a few dollars.

In the following pages we list several types of products, ranging from the worthless to the acceptable. Our judgments are based on available scientific and engineering knowledge.

Of course, the gasoline engine, the selfstarter and even the automobile were at one time considered impractical by experts. So there is always a chance that some genius will come up with one of the following that really works. But it is unlikely.

These Probably Won't Do What You Expect Them to

Ignition intensifiers, complex spark plugs or coils that claim to give more sparks or "hotter" sparks.

A normal ignition system in good condition consistently delivers a spark hot enough to initiate the flame wave, which in turn ignites the bulk of the fuel-air mixture.

If the ignition system is not in good condition, it may occasionally miss. But there is no such thing as a "partial" miss, nor can you get better combustion from a hotter-than-normal spark.

No matter how many electrodes a spark plug has, the spark will, at any given moment, occur only at the one that requires the least voltage.

Furthermore, some special coils draw excessive current which may rapidly burn distributor points. Some special spark plugs, because of their complex gap configurations, are difficult or impossible to clean and have gaps that cannot be adjusted for wear or to suit the requirements of a specific engine.

So-called igniters or other devices intended to be used in place of spark plugs probably are nothing more than spark plugs with a fancy name. They usually have the disadvantages of the complex configuration mention above.

Idle adjustments with additional air bleed.

These affect the proportions of air and gasoline at idle, but not at normal driving speeds. Standard carburetor adjustments permit complete control of idling mixtures and any result that can be obtained by the special adjustment screws can be obtained by adjusting the original carburetor.

Rebuilding engines by pills, pastes or liquids.

Tests in which gas-tank pills were weighed before and after use have shown no significant loss in weight of pills. Even if metal could be gotten into the cylinder (as by direct injection of liquids or pastes) it is hard to see how any metal could be expected to stick to the oil-covered cylinder walls. Not included in this classification are those cleansing agents and solvents which are designed to dissolve and remove deposits from carburetors and other parts of the engine. These solvents do have value for cleaning and freeing vital parts. They do not "rebuild" parts nor does any legitimate brand claim to.

Gas-tank additives or pills that reduce carbon formation in engine.

It is true that gasoline is 85 percent carbon, but the carbon is not "free." It is combined with hydrogen in various hydrocarbon molecules. Consequently nothing that can be done to it in the gasoline tank can, by any process now known, affect the way it burns in the engine.

Additives to make batteries last longer.

The National Bureau of Standards has tested scores of these and hasn't found a good one yet. A few years ago a promoter whose battery additive had been tested and found wanting by the Bureau persuaded a committee of the Congress that this was persecution of a struggling inventor by ignorant bureaucrats, but a committee appointed by the National Academy of Science (the nation's highest scientific authority) found, after thorough investigation, that the Bureau's findings were correct.

Nonacid electroyte for batteries.

These liquids are intended to be put into conventional storage batteries after the original dilute acid has been poured out. Plain water works about as well. Enough of the original acid adheres to the plates and the interior of the case to operate the battery, but at greatly reduced power and ampere-hour capacity.

Storage batteries guaranteed for unreasonable lengths of time.

The very best lead-acid batteries, at present, can't be counted on for longer than five years of automobile service. Guarantees of batteries that last forever are often limited (in fine print) to the time the battery is kept in the original car for which purchased and in the possession of the original buyer.

Waterless batteries which are claimed not to need periodic addition of water.

Any battery will operate for a while without additional water and these socalled waterless batteries usually last longer if water is occasionally added.

Generator-charge controllers for boosting generator output.

These are intended to increase charging rate for a short period each time the engine is started, then, by a time-delay circuit, cut out after a short overcharge. The standard regulator that comes with the car allows the generator to charge at the maximum rate it can deliver without overheating. Any higher rate involves risk of damage. If you want to take a chance on forcing a 30-ampere generator to deliver 35 or 40 amperes you can easily have it adjusted for that current. At least you know how much you are overloading the generator which is more than you can say when the "miracle" gadget is installed.

Theoretically, These Could Be Helpful. They Are Based On Reasonably Sound Principles, But . . .

Sintered-bronze oil filters.

It would seem that if properly serviced at frequent intervals these should be effective, but there is no test information to show that they would be more effective than the normally used disposable variety.

Magnetic crankcase drain plugs.

These have a magnet to remove iron and steel chips from the oil and, usually, have a small piece of magnesium to control acidity. A few iron and steel particles are found in most crankcases, but they seldom do any

harm. Acids do attack magnesium more readily than iron, steel or copper and every molecule of acid that reacts with the magnesium is, of course, one less to corrode vital engine parts. However, in the type of driving that keeps oil fairly warm, moisture does not collect, hence acid is not a serious problem. But a magnesium "sacrificial anode" could, if large enough, be useful in winter stop-and-go driving.

Radiator "neutralizers."

These serve the same function as the magnesium in the crankcase, but are not likely to do anything that won't be done as well, or better, by a liquid corrosion inhibitor which you should use regularly in your cooling system. If you live where antifreeze is necessary you won't need a neutralizer because most of the good antifreezes contain corrosion inhibitors.

Carburetor gadgets to admit extra air.

In some cars (those designed for economy of operation, rather than hot performance), carburetors are built to deliver the most economical proportions of air and gasoline. Admitting extra air, as the "miracle" gadgets do, can do no good and often can do considerable harm by oxidizing (burning) such hot parts as exhaust valves. In other cars, because the intake manifold does not distribute the mixture evenly to all cylinders, smooth operation and good power are obtained only by a mixture that is a little richer in gasoline than would be most economical.

In such engines, extra air in the right amount can improve economy a few percent, but too much air will burn the valves in the cylinders that inevitably get less than their correct proportion of gasoline because of the manifold shape.

In any case, the best way to obtain a mixture leaner in gasoline than afforded by the manufacturer's standard carburetor specifications, is to use the lean metering rods or jets with which most carburetor servicemen are familiar.

Some of these carburetor attachments also incorporate pinwheels below each carburetor throat. These add little or nothing to the performance of the device.

Extra air could substantially improve economy if (perhaps because of a partly closed choke) the mixture was much too rich to start with, but it would be simpler and cheaper to fix the carburetor than to buy and install a "miracle" gadget.

Fuel-pressure regulators, filters, neutralizers.

There are two general types: One reduces fuel-pump pressure (normally three to eight pounds) to about two or three pounds; the other type merely smooths out or damps the pressure pulsations. Most of them also have magnets to trap iron or steel particles, filters to remove other foreign particles, and active metals (such-as magnesium) to control acidity.

Every fuel pump is designed to deliver a certain pressure and the carburetor that goes with it in the car is designed to handle the amount of pressure the fuel pump delivers. A pressure regulator, of course, can be helpful when a defective fuel pump delivers too much pressure or when the carburetor is not working correctly and cannot control the gasoline flow. But in either case, the more logical remedy, it would seem, would be to repair the fuel pump or the carburetor.

Most cars already have fuel filters and also have fuel-pump air chambers to damp out pulsations. If Detroit wanted lower pressures at the carburetor, a lighter spring in the fuel pump would provide them without need for additional plumbing.

If the regulator substantially reduces pressure at the carburetor, it could, at high speeds and under heavy loads, starve the carburetor and produce the injurious lean mixture described previously.

As for the magnets, filters and active metals, the first two duplicate in function the filters that come on most cars and we know of no evidence that the active metal is necessary or effective.

These Will Work But May Be More Trouble And Expense Than They Are Worth . . .


Alcohol-water injector.

You may have noticed that engines are less likely to knock in rainy weather. It is well established that high humidity in the air entering the engine has an effect similar to a high octane number. Consequently, when water or, better yet, an alco-

hol-water mixture, is injected into the intake manifold, an engine will run without knocking on gasoline of a lower octane than usually required. In some cars, an injector might permit the use of regular gasoline instead of premium, but it would take

Trouble Lamp From Sealed-Beam Light Housed In Carrying Case



Housed in a carrying case fitted with a carrying handle, a discarded sealed-beam headlight provides a good trouble lamp. Use a light with one element still working. The case may be made of %-in. plywood. One side is cut out slightly smaller than the lamp, which then is mounted over the opening with metal straps across the upper

and lower sides. Wire the lamp to a female plug mounted on the back and fit an extension cord with a male plug at one end and a cigarette-lighter plug at the other end. A piece of red plastic over the lamp and a flasher in the line will convert the lamp to a warning light.

Several Factors Can be Responsible for Rough Idling of Engine

When an automobile engine idles roughly, first check to make sure the spark-plug wires are separated far enough to prevent cross fire. Then adjust the carburetor and inspect it for air leaks. Old rubber boots

on spark plugs may be conductive and cause shorting outside the plugs. Finally, check the heat-riser valve. If it is frozen shut, it will cause a back pressure that will prevent proper running of the engine.

Efficient Engine Operation Requires Clean Fuel Filter

If the engine of your car seems to lose power and "surges"—intermittently speeds up, then slows down—check the fuel filter and sediment bowl of the fuel pump before having the carburetor overhauled. Extreme temperature changes during winter weather tend to cause formation of water in the gasoline tank. This water, plus sediment, will partially block the screens in the fuel pump and the element in the filter. Clean the sediment bowls and filter elements then add a quality fuel-system demoisturizer to the gasoline tank to prevent further trouble.


RERINGING THOSE PISTONS

is only part of the job. You'll also have to check the pistons, cylinders, bearings, wrist pins and cooling system

To ASSURE maximum effectiveness, new piston rings should be installed in an automobile engine only as part of a complete overhaul. Rings alone seldom will eliminate excessive oil consumption in a worn engine. For example, loose connecting-rod bearings will throw too much oil up onto the cylinder walls. Even new rings cannot control this excess, Fig. 9, and the oil will be burned along with the fuel-air charge in the combustion chamber. Worn

wrist-pin bushings also allow an oversupply of oil to be forced onto the cylinder walls where it is wasted.


If an engine has a tendency to overheat, the cooling system must be flushed, timing set correctly or the carburetor overhauled to provide the correct fuel-air mixture, to eliminate the heating problem before the overhaul is started. Even when an engine is in good condition it will tend to operate at somewhat higher-than-normal tempera-



tures after tight-fitting new parts have been installed. Because of this, an engine that has been overheating will almost certainly run much too hot after an overhaul. The heat will destroy the oil film between the new rings and the cylinder walls, and scored or scuffed cylinders and pistons will result. The cylinders then will have to be rebored and new, oversize pistons installed.

A good reringing job begins after the head, or heads, and oil pan have been removed, but before the pistons are pulled. Due to ring wear on the cylinder walls there will be a shoulder at the upper end of each cylinder, Fig. 5. This shoulder must be removed before the pistons are taken out. It is true that a piston with its old rings probably can be pulled past the shoulder; there also is the chance that a ring land, Fig. 1, will be broken and the piston ruined. If new rings are installed without removal of the shoulder, the top ring will be broken during the first few revolutions of the engine when the square edge of the new ring slams against the radius of the shoulder. Use a proper reamer, and extend the reaming no more than 1/32 in. onto the ring-worn area, keeping it flush with that surface.


After the pistons have been pulled from the block and the old rings removed, the ring grooves are cleaned and the top groove of each piston is gauged. If a regular wear gauge is available, Fig. 2, it is used as indicated. If none is available, install the new top ring and insert a .006-in. feeler gauge between the ring and the groove. If the gauge will enter more than 1/16 in, in from the edge of the ring land, the groove should be machined to accept an insert, a ring and spacer, or the piston should be replaced with a new one. If the piston is aluminum, of the type that has a steel insert in the top-ring groove, also gauge the second groove, as it will wear














Above, twisting ring as shown, when installing it on the piston, will completely destroy its effectiveness



Above, on downstroke of piston, lower edges of rings scrape off excess oil, leave thin film for lubrication. Below, new ring checks depth of ring groove




more rapidly than the first ring groove does.

The new rings now are checked against the pistons and the cylinders. The top, or compression ring, is fitted into the top-ring groove on the piston and the groove depth is checked, Fig. 10. If the rubbing surface of the ring is flush or below the surface of the ring land, the ring is the correct one. If the ring projects, it is the incorrect size. A compression ring now is fitted into each cylinder, being pushed down to the lower end of the cylinder at the point of least wear by using an inverted piston. The piston also aligns the ring squarely in the cylinder. If the clearance at the ends of the ring is less than specified in the manufacturer's instructions that are packaged with the rings, the ring set is wrong for that particular cylinder. Insufficient ringend clearance will allow the ends to contact when the ring expands with heat. The ring will either break or jam out against the cylinder wall and cause scoring.

Although thin steel piston rings can be spiraled onto a piston, cast-iron compression rings and oil-control rings must not be twisted as is being done in Fig. 8. A cast-iron ring distorted in this manner will not lie flat in the ring groove to seal compression pressures. Fig. 4 shows how compression acts to seal itself above a piston by forcing the piston rings down in their grooves and

out against the cylinder wall. If any piston has to be replaced, the new piston must be fitted into the cylinder and checked for proper size and clearance. Because aluminum pistons, used in most automobile engines today, expand at a greater rate than the cast-iron engine block, sufficient clearance must be present between the pistons and cylinders to allow for the difference. One method of providing this expansion differential is to make the pistons "cam ground" in shape. This means that the diameter of such pistons is greater at right angles to the wrist pin than parallel to the pin, as in Fig. 3. The greater amount of piston expansion then moves along the wrist pin. When checking the fit of a piston in a cylinder, the piston is moved down to the lower end of the cylinder and a feeler gauge slipped between cylinder and piston. Clearance should conform to the specifications of the engine manufacturer. If a piston that is too large is installed, it will expand and "seize" when heated. The result will be a piston that looks like the one in Fig. 7.

Proper piston clearance also is affected by the fit of the wrist pin. If the pin is fitted too tightly, when it expands from heat it will distort the piston and cause it to expand at right angles to the length of the pin. Fig. 6 demonstrates what happens to a piston under such a situation. * *



DO YOU KNOW IGNITION?


I F YOU BELIEVE your new Super Duper V8 300-hp.-engine car has nothing in common with its brother of the '20s, look at the ignition systems above. Both the 4-cylinder engine that produced about 25 hp. in the '20s and the 300-plus-hp. engine of today have ignition systems with identical components. Refinements have increased the reliability of the units, but essentially the battery ignition system used in the '20s is the one used today.

Test equipment has made diagnosing of ignition problems much simpler for the modern-day mechanic, but correcting the problems requires the same know-how used by old-time mechanics. As an example: In the old days a mechanic shorted out each spark plug to determine which were not firing. Today, an oscilloscope might be used to show which plug is misfiring. However, after the plugs are removed from the engine, the mechanic must determine why the plug is not firing.

To refresh our memories, let's go through the ignition system, diagram top of page 190, to see how it works. When the ignition switch is turned on, current from a battery —6 or 12-volt—flows into a coil that transforms low battery voltage to high voltage. To finish this circuit another switch also

must be closed - the distributor contact points. With the points closed, current flows through the primary side of the coil, which consists of a few hundred turns of relatively heavy wire. A magnetic field is built up around the wire, but not instantaneously. A fraction of a second is required. The value of the magnetic field is determined by the resistance in the wire, the inductance of the winding and the length of time the points are closed. In actual operation, the magnetic field seldom reaches maximum because the points are closed only a short time. When the points open, the current in the primary circuit from the battery tends to become less. Due to an electrical phenomenon—varying voltage in a circuit causes an induced voltage induced voltage tends to keep the current flowing in an arc across the gap formed as the points open. Ordinarily, current flow would reduce gradually as the gap widened. This slow reduction of current would not collapse the magnetic field in the coil quickly enough to produce the required high voltage, and arcing would quickly burn out the points. The condenser now does its job, as in the diagram at the left. When the points open, current that keeps flowing goes into the condenser. By

the time it is fully charged, and ready to discharge, the points have opened far enough to prevent an arc. The primary current stops quickly, the lines of magnetic force collapse quickly across the several thousand turns of fine wire in the secondary winding in the coil and high voltage is induced in the secondary circuit. Under ideal conditions when the points open, voltage in the secondary circuit may reach 25,000 volts. In actual operation, when sufficient voltage is reached to jump the spark-plug gap-usually between 4000 and 10,000 volts-voltage drops off. An oscilloscope will show that this voltage drop is relatively slow. Called the inductive component, this latter part of the spark does not aid in firing the fuel-air mixture, but does cause electrical interference and severe erosion on the spark-plug electrodes. For this reason, resistor spark plugs, with a built-in resistance that chokes off most of the unwanted inductive spark, have longer electrode life and reduce electrical interference. Because the inductive portion of the spark makes the brightest flash, eliminating that part will produce a spark with much less light. It can be understood, then, that brightness of spark does not necessarily indicate that one plug is better than another in its operation in an engine.


Spark plugs too often are blamed for trouble that actually can be traced to other components of the ignition system. If the coil is connected incorrectly so polarity is reversed, from 20 to 40 percent more current will be required to produce the required voltage at the spark plugs. No matter which way the battery in a car is grounded, current to the plugs is negative,




as this causes the spark to jump from the center electrode to ground. Lower voltage is required because electrons will flow more readily from the hotter center electrode. Badly burned distributor contact points will cause plugs to misfire. The burning of the points, in turn, may be caused by a voltage regulator that is set for excessive voltage.

Because today's powerful V8 engines are frequently driven at slow speeds in traffic where only part of their power is required, lead deposits from gasoline tend to condense on the surfaces in the combustion chamber, including the spark-plug insulator. When the car then is driven at high speeds on the highway, or suddenly accelerated, the resulting increase in heat melts the deposits and they become conductive, shorting out the plugs. Sometimes the plugs can be sandblasted clean and regapped. To help overcome this problem, additives now are used in gasoline, and spark-plug makers have produced plugs with extended insulators that project into the combustion chamber. At low speeds exhaust gases keep the insulator hot and burn away deposits. At high speeds the insulators are kept cool by the inrushing fresh fuel-air mixture to prevent preignition. These plugs are available in various heat ranges that must be selected for a particular engine. These plugs are used in overhead-valve engines only. In valve-in-block engines the extended insulators might be struck by valves or pistons. The extended insulators on these plugs also provide a longer fouling path, as in the diagram above. This longer path presents greater resistance to passage of current, preventing misfiring.

Four reaches, or thread lengths, are available in spark plugs, as in the photo








below. Should a long-reach plug be used in an engine requiring a short-reach type, a valve or piston could hit the plug end. Also, the exposed threads would glow and cause preignition. Removing the plug would be difficult when the threads filled with deposits. In the opposite instance, a short-reach plug in a long-reach cylinder head would be so shrouded it could not properly ignite the fuel-air mixture. Exposed threads in this case would be in the head. Installing the proper plugs would be difficult if the threads in the head were filled with deposits.

The distributor, top of page 191, is the device used to distribute the high-voltage current to the plugs by means of a rotor. The points, and usually the condenser also, are located in the distributor. The highvoltage current must be delivered to each spark plug at the proper moment. The correct time of firing will vary with engine speed, engine load and other factors. So there must be a means of changing spark timing. For maximum power, combustion must be completed by the time the piston reaches about 20 deg. after top dead center. Details at the bottom of page 191 show an engine that is assumed to be designed so that combustion ends at 23 deg. after T.D.C. for most efficient combustion. Detail A shows that at 1200 r.p.m. the ignition must occur at 18 deg. before T.D.C. if combustion

is to be completed at 23 deg. after T.D.C. When the engine is speeded up to 3600 r.p.m. as in detail B, it is necessary to advance the spark to 40 deg. before T.D.C. (gasoline burns at a fairly constant rate). To obtain spark advance, distributors have a centrifugal-advance mechanism, detail B, page 191, consisting of spring-loaded weights that are thrown out to advance the breaker-plate cam as engine speed increases. Under part-throttle operation there is a high vacuum created in the intake manifold. The fuel-air charge is not so highly compressed and burns more slowly. An additional spark advance will increase fuel economy, so a vacuum-advance device, detail C, provides this. A diaphragm is connected to the breaker-point plate by a lever. The opposite side of the diaphragm is connected to a passage in the carburetor by a copper tube. The passage in the carburetor is on the atmospheric side of the throttle plate, and when the throttle opens, the passage is under manifold vacuum. The diaphragm then moves the breaker plate to advance the spark according to the amount of vacuum. A spring returns the diaphragm to a neutral position when vacuum reduces. Available voltage from the battery, as shown in the chart on page 190, determines ignition efficiency. Loose connections lower available voltage, worn plugs and burned points increase required voltage.





ESIGNED for that dining alcove that must serve as a dining room when entertaining, this king-size, drop-leaf dining table folds and rolls and takes its place against the wall when not in use. It opens into a table 40 x 60 in., seating six persons nicely. Brass posts give it just the accent needed to enhance the elegant sweep of its teakwood or African-mahogany top.

Construction is simple. The swinging legs are made alike and in pairs from 13/4in. stock, 21/4-in.-wide pieces being used at the tops, 2½-in. pieces at the sides and 4-in. pieces as the bottom. These U-shaped assemblies are half-lapped at the corners and glued. Holes for the brass posts are bored 1 in. deep and holes for caster sockets are drilled 1% in. deep. Rounding the ends of the members is a simple job if you have a disk sander. A rasp and sandpaper attached to a flat board will do the trick, however, when working with hand tools. In each case, the radius should be marked on top and bottom edges beforehand. Even with a disk sander, final sanding should be done with a sanding block to blend the rounded ends into the face grain. When



assembling the members, remember the brass posts must be in place before the corners are lapped, glued and clamped.

If you have difficulty finding brass tubing, you can use 1-in. hardwood dowels instead. In picking them out, select four that are as straight as you can find. The best way to do this is to roll each dowel over a flat surface. Any bow or twist in the dowel can be detected right away.

The center framework to which the


swinging legs are hinged with piano hinges, is made ¼-in. higher, or 28½ in. This is done to allow for the thickness of the felt-covered furniture glides which are driven into the upper corners of the swinging legs. You'll notice that the top member of the center frame is dadoed for a ¾-in. flat board, and that counterbored holes are drilled from the underside for two of the six screws which are used to fasten the table top. Like the legs, the members are

half-lapped at the corners. Holes for two caster sockets are made in the bottom.

The three-section top is made of 34-in. veneer-faced plywood, the edges of which are later covered with veneer tape to hide the plies. Holes for dowel-pin stops are made on the underside of the table leaves 7 in. in from the edges. Bore these not more than 1/2 in, deep and use a twist drill so the point won't poke through the top surface. The stops limit the swing of the leg supports and automatically align them. The butt hinges which are used to hinge the leaves should be mortised flush into the underside and the hinge pins should be positioned a bit off-center to allow for finish. Use short enough screws in attaching the top to the understructure so there is no chance of the points breaking through the

surface or even forming telltale bumps to mar it. Screws that are too long can be shortened by snipping off the ends.

A finish resulting very close in tone to that of the virgin wood can be obtained by using one of the new synthetic finishes, such as Satinlac. After a thorough sanding




and a close inspection of the work, particularly the top and leaves, to spot any flaws, apply a coat of lightener to the bare wood. After it dries, sand lightly and apply two coats of Satinlac. The resulting "natural" finish does not darken or yellow with age.

Stainless Lubricant in Stick Form Has Variety of Uses

Used much in the manner of a child's crayon, stainless lubricant in stick form is available for many uses around the home, shop and office. For zippers that are slightly difficult to work when a garment is returned from the cleaners, simply apply a light coat of the lubricant from the stick. Friction catches on cabinets, ranges and refrigerators work smoothly and easily when touched with a bit of the lubricant. Another use for the long-lasting, non-

staining material is to make double-hung sash slide easily. Doors that stick against the jamb also can be freed with the stick. If the bar of soap you keep in the toolbox for lubricating wood screws does not stay soft and usable, substitute a stick of lubricant that will never dry up and always is ready to help with the driving of wood screws. A touch of the stick to the cutting edges of saws, planes and other tools aids in smoother cutting.



Improvised Float Arrangement Controls Electric Pump at Farm Well




Requiring only occasional testing of the electrical circuits to make sure it is all right, this device was assembled by one farmer to make the filling of a stock-watering tank automatic. An empty 5-gal. oil can, soldered shut to be watertight, acts as a float to actuate a system of levers pivoted in a slot in the barn wall. Inside the barn the levers act on an extension screwed to the toggle of a mercury-type switch that controls the water pump. The switch is not spring-loaded, and the mercury mechanism is long-wearing. — Henry Josephs, Gardenville, Pa.

Old-Style Buffet Cut Apart to Make Modern Furniture



Long, oversize buffets that once were popular in dining rooms are too large to fit in modern dining

areas that usually are fairly small. However, these pieces of furniture can be cut down and used for other purposes. In the example shown, the buffet was cut as indicated along the dotted lines to produce two end or lamp tables. The legs also were shortened to match the trend to lower furniture surfaces. The center section of the buffet contained drawers. These readymade drawers are ideal for use in built-ins, or in any furniture built in the home workshop. Their size and shape might, for example, suggest a small piece of furniture that could be used in some particular location. When the buffet shown was modified, the center section of the top was refinished and fastened to the wall in a hallway. With a mirror mounted above it, it is the ideal spot to display fresh cut flowers. Save the portions of the turned legs that are removed. They might be just the thing for a low coffee table, or, with some slight modifications, could be used simply as decorative knobs or columns. If the newly ex-



posed sides of the sectioned buffet are of plywood or hardboard, cover them with a piece of hardwood-faced plywood to match the finish of the rest of the resulting end table, or with plastic veneer.










1. YOU WOULDN'T USE your best card table for this but an old one fitted with a plastic-screen top makes it quite simple to dry a sweater. The outline of the sweater is marked on the screen with chalk then washed and later spread out on the plastic screen to coincide with the chalked line

2. SHEET-METAL SCREWS are better than regular ones when it comes to fastening fixtures to thin material, such as hardboard and plywood facing on doors. The reason is that the threads on sheet-metal screws run right up to the heads of the screws which makes them hold their full length

3. WHEN MAILING CHECKS or cash or other material of a personal nature and you want to make the envelope lightproof to conceal the contents, cut a piece of aluminum foil to fit the envelope and slip it inside. It will make it "tamperproof" and add very little to the weight of the letter






Wire "Tongs" Speed Application Of Paint Stripes on Golf Balls

An easy way of marking golf balls for positive identification is to roll a stripe of brightly colored enamel on each of them from a freshly painted scrap of glass or metal as shown in the drawing at left. The small handle used for gripping and rolling the balls, is made from a length of steel wire that is pointed on both ends. The wire is then bent in half and twisted together, leaving enough of it straight at each end to form "tongs" with which to grasp a ball.

Before starting a project requiring the use of dowels, heat the dowel stock in a low to medium-warm oven to remove the moisture from the wood. This slightly reduces the diameter of the dowels so that they are easier to position in the work. Then, after being glued into position, the dowels absorb moisture again resulting in a tight fit. — M. Beasley, Jackson, Mich.




Block Clamped to Jointer Fence Permits Uniform Chamfered Cuts

To permit chamfering the edges of several pieces of wood so that all chamfered cuts are uniform, clamp a stop block to the jointer fence in the position shown. The stock to be chamfered must be fed into the jointer knives so the latter cuts with the grain and not against it which would result in splintering and chipping. The chamfered cuts produced, of course, are slightly concave. For purposes of illustration only, the jointer is pictured incomplete and without a guard. Notice that a wide follow-up block is used to support the work vertically and rigidly.

Molding Strips Nailed to Ladder Top Retain Work Materials



Strips of quarter-round molding nailed to the edges of the top of a stepladder as shown at left, convert that surface into a handy tray for holding screws, nails, tools and small parts when working from the ladder. Wooden strips of other than quarter-round stock may be used for this purpose but the joints should be mitered for a good job. Use small finishing nails for attaching the strips to avoid splitting them or the ladder top, and to prevent catching clothing on the heads as might happen if common nails are used and the flat heads work out. Use stove bolts for attaching such strips to the top of an aluminum ladder.—Ted Fenn, Skokie, Ill.


SHOE CABINETS

Hinged to Closet Doors



IF YOUR WIFE or daughters have been complaining of lack of closet space for shoes, here is a way of giving them the desired convenience without enlarging present closets or building new ones. Simply build shoe cabinets like the ones illustrated and attach them to existing closet doors by means of the hinge arrangement shown in the details. Friction catches keep the cabinets closed tightly when not in use to exclude dust and prevent interference with access to the closet. A single shoe cabinet may be added to a closet with one door by altering the height and width of the cabinet to suit. The spacing of the carriage bolts, that are used as pegs on which to hang the shoes, is adequate for most adult sizes, requiring two pegs for each pair of shoes. Men's shoes may be stored in the cabinets as well, except that there is space for only one shoe on each pair of pegs. The bolts that are used for pegs should be painted black, or left natural if cadmiumplated or galvanized. When tightening the bolts in place, turn outside nuts flush with the ends to guard against cuts from exposed threads.


A cubicle is provided in the bottom of each cabinet for footwear that cannot be hung on the pegs. The dimensions of this compartment may also be changed to best suit individual needs. Note that a closet that is to be provided with a shoe cabinet or cabinets must be of sufficient depth to permit clearance between the clothes and the cabinets when the doors are closed.






Fig. 6: Attractive patterns and colors available in linoleum make it an excellent covering material for cornice to give interesting treatment to kitchen window. The smooth surface can be kept clean with very little effort







Fig. 8: Desk top is covered with remnant piece of linoleum in solid, dark color. Edges of linoleum are beveled on all sides for attractive and serviceable writing surface. Ink stains and soil are easily removed with a damp cloth















Infant's Bed-Playpen Fits Between Front and Rear Seats of Car






Drill-Bit Rack Is Nonclogging






35-MM. BULK-FILM LOADER



DESIGNED for the photographer who shoots 35-mm. film extensively, and buys in bulk to save up to 75 percent of film cost, this jig makes quick work of rewinding the film on 20 or 36-exposure spools. As indicated, the empty spool is fitted between the spring-loaded uprights and the crank is fitted on the end of the spool to permit rotating it. Tension is kept on the roll of bulk film by means of a spring and thumbscrew. The correct tension may require


some experimentation to determine at what setting the film unrolls to provide a properly wound spool for insertion in its casette. Thirty rotations of the crank on the spool will produce a film length of 5 ft., which is the equivalent of a 36-exposure spool. All rewinding of bulk film is, of course, done in total darkness. This rewinding jig is designed for simplicity of operation in the dark, but it still is necessary to use care to avoid scratching the film or finger marking it. Cellulose tape fastens the end of the film to the empty spool.

MODELING THE FRENCH




Guns, deck fittings, longboat and masting

A TTHIS STAGE of building your model Chebec, which began in the Nov. 1958 issue, you are ready to proceed with the deck fittings and other small equipment as well as the masts and yards. Fig. 36 shows the appearance of the deck with all fittings except the longboat after the model has been completed, including the rigging.

Making the Guns

There are 24 six-pounder cannon positioned on the main deck at locations indicated in Figs. 14 and 42. Details on making them are given in Fig. 37. You may be able to purchase somewhat similar guns already mounted on carriages and thus eliminate considerable work. But if you intend to make them, turn them from either brass or maple, using a cutting tool that you have ground to the gun shape. Drill the guns crosswise for pins that serve as mounting pivots. The gun carriages are grooved to take the pivots and the barrels, and the guns are glued in place. The carriages are pinned to the deck to fit snugly against the bulwarks. It is possible to cut 12 carriages from a single small block of maple by following the procedure outlined in Fig. 37. The carriage wheels are punched from 1/16-in, fiber and are pinned in position.

There also are 34 two-pounder blunderbusses; eleven at each side of the poop deck, and six on each breastwork, if you wish to include all of them. Originally the


blunderbusses had universal movement, but those made for the model only swing horizontally since they are soldered or glued to holders also detailed in Fig. 37. You make the holders by doubling tiny strips of shim brass on pins, spreading the ends to the gun diameter, and then soldering the brass and pin together. The pins are cut down to the required lengths later. Those at the sides of the poop deck extend into the ends of the timberheads about 1/8 in., but those on the breastworks are necessarily shorter. The guns are painted gold to represent brass. The cannon carriages are red and the blunderbus holders are black. It's best to wait with installing the guns on the model until after the rigging has been completed as they are easily broken.

Galley and Ladders

For location of all the deck fittings refer to Fig. 42. You can start on these by making the galley, Fig. 38. This is simply a wood block, the bottom of which is sanded down concave so that it fits the deck properly for gluing. However, if you want to eliminate such shaping, just glue little blocks to the four bottom corners. The roof, which projects equally on all sides, is a piece of ½2-in. veneer glued on. The two doors also are overlays of either cardboard or veneer. The hinges are painted in black over the red galley surface. The smoke pipes of the galley face forward, not aft.

Construction of the two ladders and







hung. The poop breastwork is more ornamental than the forward breastwork. The molding along its upper edge can be glued on, produced with gesso, or merely simulated with a band of black paint on the red surface. After the breastwork has been installed, you can fit the single stanchion that supports the edge of the poop deck at its center, also detailed in Fig. 40.

As shown in Figs. 41 and 43, the aft end of the poop spar fits between the two diagonal braces on the taffrail, and rests on the center post. The forward end of the spar is held by a decorative support of which the upper part is turned. The lower part, which is left square, is glued to three knees. These, in turn, are glued to the deck so that the center of the support comes about 3/10 in. on the starboard side of the








42. One single-hook cleat is located on the main deck just ahead of the mainmast. To it is glued a smaller cleat which is notched to fit. Six ½-in. cleats are glued to the main-deck rails for the attachment of rigging lines. Their positions are also indicated in Fig. 42.

Hatchways and Grating

Fig. 44 shows the two-piece main hatchway, which is scored and stained like the deck. The detail includes the two pumps on either side of the mainmast. Tiny wire eyelets at the base of the mainmast, to be used for rigging, are to be installed later. Their size, position and purpose will be detailed in Parts IV and V.

The forward breastwork is provided with two supporting knees connected with a cross cleat as detailed in Fig. 46 which also shows cleats on the deck at either side



hull centerline so it will clear the mizzenmast. A small cleat is notched and fitted to the center knee of the support.


The spar also is supported near its midpoint by a guardrail. Both are pinned and glued together, which gives additional reinforcement to the taffrail. The guardrail may be square copper bus-bar wire, or aluminum rod filed square, both being easy to bend. Or, you can make it from a strip of maple, steam-bending the ends. Note how the ends are pinned and glued to the knees that brace the sternboard, which arrangement also helps to support the poop rail.

Fig. 41 shows the shape and size of the three kinds of cleats that are used. Four large ones are fastened with glue and pins to the poop-deck timberheads just below the top rails at locations indicated in Fig. of the foremast. These are easy to glue in place even though the bolster plate and crossrail unit are already installed. The center and fore hatchways are located ahead of the main hatchway. They vary slightly in size and height above the deck as shown in Fig. 45. The grating used on hatchways is the same as that used between the guns as detailed in Part I.

The longboat shown in Fig. 47 can be made accurately with the aid of templates for which station lines and contour lines

are given. The boat can be whittled to shape, hollowing out the inside so a piece of veneer or fiber cut to represent seats can be glued in place. The two chocks that support the boat are notched to take the keel and are shaped to fit the hull contour near stations 2 and 5. They are glued to the longboat hull and also to the main deck of the ship at the location indicated in Fig. 42. Except for the well of the longboat,

which is painted white, the rest of the interior is red. The outside is black above the water line and light oak below. It is possible that you can purchase a longboat of approximately correct size from a modelsupply house and thus eliminate the work of making one, even though the details vary a little.

Figs. 48 and 49 show the shape and size of the two anchors. These can be purchased

ready-made. If you do make them of wood, use maple. Drill a hole through the stock to take the tapered end of a ½-in. dowel, which you sand or file square after gluing it in place. The lower end of the shank is whittled down to form a tenon that is glued in the piece that forms the flukes. Fig. 42 shows the location of the anchor cable, one end being glued in a hole drilled in the corner of the center hatch.

Bowsprit, Masts and Yards

Being slender and fragile, the bowsprit detailed in Fig. 52 is installed after all the deck fittings have been placed. Besides glue, pins are used to secure the bowsprit to the headrail and stem. It also is lashed to the stem just behind the figurehead. Use the same kind and size of thread as for the yard wooldings given in Fig. 52. A detail shows how the free ends of the thread are self-held. An added spot of glue helps to prevent loosening. One end of the bowsprit lashing is left extending for attachment of a rigging block.

The lateen sails are the distinguishing features of the xebecs, and are held by yards arranged diagonally as seen in Fig. 3. Details of the masts are given in Fig. 51. Their length includes square masthead blocks which are formed when tapering. The blocks are drilled and grooved as indicated in Fig. 50 to represent sheaves for some of the running rigging. As shown in Fig. 52, the yards are made by sanding two flats on dowels of proper size, then cutting the ends and scoring grooves so that each yard looks like two pieces lashed together with wooldings. Note how the ends are cut so that the rounded end of one member seems to fit into a groove in the adjacent member, which keeps them in alignment and provides both strength and flexibility. The letters in Fig. 52 indicate the size of the parts, spacing of wooldings, number of turns, as given for the three masts in Fig. 53. It's best to paint the yards black before applying the wooldings.



Unburned Gas Pollutes Air

According to Champion Spark Plug Co., about half the cars on the road have one or more spark plugs misfiring. This means a tremendous waste of fuel and power. But it also means a lethal dose of air-polluting gas is being pumped into the air we breathe. Automobile mechanics can do much to correct this condition by servicing the spark plugs and air cleaner regularly and by keeping carburetors properly adjusted.

Three-Stage Cut Prevents Binding When Bandsawing Bushings

To prevent binding of the blade when bandsawing bushings or collars, one machinist runs a first and second cut, the first cut running only halfway through the wall thickness of the bushing. Then he turns the bushing 180 deg.




and runs the second cut all the way through, finishing the first cut from the inside. This prevents any tendency of the cut to close up.


Holder for Steel Square

Although a nail or hook usually is driven into the shop wall to store a steel square, a short strip of flooring nailed in place horizontally will make a much neater and even more secure support. The square drops easily into the groove of the flooring strip.



Protecting Hole Finish

You can prevent possible scoring of the hole finish when counterboring by using a fixed pilot made to suit the job at hand. Remove the regular pilot from the counterbore and fit the big end of the pilot into a reamed hole in a piece of flat steel




which is placed under the work in the setup. Then place the work over the pilot spindle and center it. Finally, bring the counterbore down to the required depth. The pilot should be a light press fit in the hole.

ALUMINUM LETTER CADDY

By Bertram Brownold

LETTERS AND BILLS that are to receive your attention or be placed in a file, will not be neglected or misplaced if they are kept in a correspondence holder like the one illustrated. This is a one-evening project requiring a minimum of experience with hand tools. All parts of the holder, except the letter opener and beads used for the feet, are made of aluminum bar and sheet stock that is available at large hardware and department stores.

To make a holder, cut the perforated aluminum to size as indicated in the squared pattern. Then from a sheet of embossed aluminum, make the cutout for the frame, position the perforated piece on it as indicated by the dotted line and bend it over on the edges of the perforated piece, after which the frame is hammered flat. The corners of the frame must be cut as shown to permit the metal to be properly crimped in those areas. The handle is cut and formed from ½-in. stock as shown and should be fastened to the bottom of the holder before bending the sides into position. The feet are riveted to the corners with small cut-down nails as in the drawing. Ornamental medallions are riveted to the handle of a plain letter opener to complete the job.




Above, handle is located in center of correspondence holder so that unread mail can be placed on one side, unanswered letters and unpaid bills on other side

gained the use of leg muscles and requires more freedom for further development. 
with steel brackets screwed to both ends of it for bolting the device to the walker as shown in the drawing and detail C. A strip of foam rubber folded over the upper edge of the separator protects the child's legs from bruises. The rubber is held in place by a strip of leatherette fitted over it and tacked to the sides of the separator.

To permit the patient to move the walker across a smooth floor with ease yet require some exertion to develop muscles, the front legs are mounted on 3-in. casters and the rear ones are fitted with swivel glides. These are installed in the open ends of the tubing by first gluing a short length of dowel in each of the legs. Then the dowels are drilled to take the glide and caster assemblies as indicated in the details.

Use a 34-in. thin-wall-conduit bender for making the right-angle bends in the tubing as required in each of the assemblies. If a welder is not available, take the assemblies to a welding shop to have this work done. Added wall thickness to the conduit is provided for the thumbscrews by welding nuts over holes in the pipe. Nuts are not needed for the 1-in. pipe.

ERE is an easily constructed orthopedic walker that is designed to help restore the use of muscles of the lower body of a child who is recovering from polio, or is a cerebral palsy or muscular dystrophy victim, by helping him exercise with little or no assistance. Used at the University of Illinois Division of Services for Crippled Children, the walker consists of a base unit of welded-steel tubing and four accessories, the shoulder support, bar support, foot separator and handle bar. The former three are adjustable vertically so that they can be raised as the child grows. providing proper support at all times.

The shoulder support is designed to completely enclose the trunk of the body to provide maximum support and stability in the beginning stages of rehabilitation. The dimensions given in the drawing and details A and B are suitable for a child of four or five of average size and can be changed as required. Padded edges protect the child from bruises and provide comfortable underarm support. The bar support is used in place of the shoulder support after the child has partially re-

Balanced Suspension Keeps Scale Handy for Weighing Milk



When keeping a record of the milk produced by each cow in your herd, the scale used for weighing the milk can be kept conveniently at hand by suspending it from the ceiling of the dairy barn by means of a counterbalanced rope-and-pulley arrangement similar to the one-shown at left. When not in use, the counterweight automatically pulls the scale up to the ceiling where it remains out of the way until needed again. The counterweight used should be only slightly heavier than the scale, so that the latter gently rises to the ceiling without impact of a force that may affect the accuracy of the scale.

New engine pistons that are to be installed as a set should be carefully weighed on an accurate scale to check on excessive weight variation. If there is more than ½-oz. difference between the heaviest and lightest pistons, objectionable engine roughness will result. Such pistons should be returned and exchanged for a set that is within acceptable weight tolerances.

Ignition Trouble From Oil Vapor

Not infrequently, auto-ignition trouble is the result of vaporized crankcase oil condensing on the breaker plate of the distributor which induces arcing and rapid burning of the points. This may occur when the distributor shaft is worn, allowing vaporized oil to travel from the crankcase to the distributor, or it may occur when the cap on the oil-filler pipe is clogged, restricting passage of air. A clogged cap is easily cleaned with gasoline but a defective distributor shaft requires replacement of the shaft or bushings to correct this trouble. The latter should be done by an experienced mechanic.

Reversed Tip on Soldering Iron Produces Better Joint on Flat Work



If your electric soldering iron has a removable copper tip that is of the same diameter throughout its length, try reversing it the next time you have a soldering job that requires joining one or more flat surfaces, such as enclosing the end of a tube as shown in the photo at left. The flat end and cylindrical sides of the reversed tip permit better contact with the surfaces of the joint to make the melted solder flow evenly. It is difficult to avoid forming irregular and poorly bonded metal when soldering such a joint with the pointed end.

Keep Your Knives In a Wall Cabinet



THERE'S NO BETTER PLACE for household carving knives than a dustfree wall cabinet conveniently located, but out of reach of small fry as shown in the illustration. The cabinet may be flush mounted in a wall, or screwed to an existing cabinet or wall as desired. For a flush mounting, the front of the cabinet should overlap the sides, top and bottom by at least 1/4 in. to conceal the edges of the cutout that is to receive it. Fir or hardwood plywood may be used for all parts of the cabinet, except the slotted knife rack which is made of solid stock and screwed to the inside of the door as shown in the two details at the bottom of the drawing. The dimensions given are intended to serve only as a guide and may be enlarged to accommodate more pieces of cutlery, or they can be reduced to fit a smaller space.


The door pivots on pins made from screws. To install these, tightly wedge the door into position in the frame and drill holes through the top and bottom of the inside frame to take the shanks of 2½-in. No. 8 screws. Then drill pilot holes in the upper and lower edges of the door, drive the screws into position and cut off the heads. A washer placed on the lower pivot when the screw is driven, serves as a spacer and bearing as indicated in the detail.



A S MOST EVERYONE knows, a piece of molding is just the thing for covering up an ill-fitting joint. But that's far from all it can do. Each of the hundreds of different moldings that you will find in a well-stocked lumberyard was made to do a certain job. Add a touch of ingenuity and they will do more in the way of smart cabinet-door handles, facings for plywood edges, unique picture frames and so on. In addition, moldings can be used to add


height, or lowness, to separate surface planes and to create textural effects. The effect—the decor—can be either traditional or contemporary.

Shapes Standardized

Most moldings are of softwood, with the lion's share coming from pines, firs, redwoods, spruces and cedars of the Western states. In the past, many mills made fairly similar "standard" patterns, but pieces




seldom matched exactly unless they all came from the same stack. However, in 1957 the Western Pine and West Coast Lumberman's associations joined in establishing exact sizes and shapes for more than 500 standard patterns of molding, and the mills in the West and many others have replaced their molding knives to conform with those standards. Today, you'll find that most of the moldings obtained at different times or places will match.


The names given to some standard moldings are confusing. Crown, bed and cove moldings, Fig. 8, are similar, mechanically, and in the larger sizes, are used primarily for wall-to-ceiling joints. Bases are base-boards. Base shoes are designed to cover the joint between the baseboard and the floor. They come in varied patterns and can replace ordinary quarter-round for many other usages. Picture moldings are not for picture frames (though many will



shows how a board-and-batten treatment of common screen-stock will relieve the plain, uninteresting look of a one-piece overhead garage door. When the same treatment is carried out on a board-andbatten exterior, the door becomes less conspicuous by blending in with the rest of the house. An overlay of molding in the design of a gate as shown in detail A, Fig. 1, adds the feeling of lowness and width to a garage door. Fig. 2 shows how molding can be used on a ceiling to give the illusion of height. Applied in the form of nesting frames, the molding permits the ceiling to be painted several colors without losing the unity the plane gives to a room. Detail B. Fig. 1, shows how regular screen molding can be used to transform dated porch screens to modern Shoji screens. screen areas are divided into a grid pattern by nailing the molding back to back with the wire between. An example of how halfround molding will serve to emphasize length and lowness of a built-in sofa is shown in Fig. 3. Here the molding is run horizontally on the walls and the areas between are painted different colors. Novel bed headboards consisting of molding attached directly to a bedroom wall and framing inserts of cloth, cane mat or wallpaper, is another way you can use molding to good advantage. Clever cabinet and






drawer handles that are both decorative and practical are nothing more than strips of picture molding applied in the manner shown in Fig. 4. What you can do with molding to decorate your window shutters and entrance doors is suggested in Fig. 5. Note particularly how quarter-round molding applied to the face of a plywood panel closely simulates louvered shutters. Interiors can be given added interest and the feeling of warmth by facing the doors with squares of cloth or paper which match the room drapes or wallpaper. In the example shown in Fig. 6, squares of cloth matching the pattern of the bedspread are framed by applying strips of molding over the edges of the cloth. Gives the effect of paneled doors and makes them belong to the rest of the room.

Coping Molding





Fig. 11. In placing molding completely around a ceiling, two methods can be used. You can cope only one end of the four lengths, cutting the others square, or cope both ends of two lengths, leaving the ends of the other two lengths square. In the later case, the uncoped lengths are applied first. In all cases, the coped ends butt against the face of the adjacent molding. The reason for coping instead of mitering an inside corner is that corners of rooms are seldom square and you can compensate for this more easily with a coped end since you can trim away front or back edges to make the joint fit perfectly. Even if the joint is a little ill-fitting, or if some shrinkage in the wood should occur, the joint will still look neat because the cut itself cannot be seen except when sighting along the line of the molding.

The trick of good joinery with moldings is to miter all outside corners and to cope all inside corners. Figs. 9, 10 and 11 show how to cope molding when fitting it around the ceiling of a room. First, the piece of molding is held against the back-guide of a miter box in the same position it will be when installed, and it is cut off at a 45-deg. angle with the saw. In the photo the piece to be coped is at the right, behind the saw. If you were making a mitered outside corner with this same type molding, you would cut it the same. The piece to be coped is trimmed off with a hand coping saw, using the inside edge of the miter sawcut as a guide line. Saw perpendicularly, trimming away the wedge of wood left by the 45-deg. cut. The piece also can be coped on the jigsaw by laying the back side of the molding flat on the table. When coped, the end will have an exact reverse profile of the molding against which it is to be butted,


Joining Molding

When two or more pieces of molding intersect as in Figs. 14 and 15, it is best to use a symmetrical molding, such as a round casing, or a half-round. Then the pieces can be smoothly joined together. The piece to be let-in is trimmed to a point by two 45-deg. cuts and it is used as a pattern to mark the notch in the other piece. When different or symmetrical moldings are being joined, a plinth block is used as in Fig. Likewise, a plinth block can be used in a corner to avoid coping. Standard moldings come up to 16 ft. or more in length but sometimes it is necessary to splice, or join, two pieces. Fig. 17 shows how both pieces are mitered 45 deg. and lapped. When glued, a stronger joint results and is less noticeable. A partial V-cut gives the most attractive joinery where pieces of mullion casing or the like, which are shaped only along the edges, are to intersect.

Sectioned Insert on Window Gives Multipane Effect


To change double-hung sash with single panes into windows that appear to have multiple panes for a colonial effect, one homeowner made inserts to fit flush against the inside of the windows as illustrated. All members of the inserts are \(^{5}\mathbb{8}\xi\) x \(^{5}\mathbb{8}\xi\)-in. pine. Joints are half-lapped and glued. Friction catches fitted on the sides permit easy removal and replacement of the inserts when desired. Such inserts also can be made for use on a picture window to provide the appearance of multipane windows at each side, or the entire window can be covered as desired.


Metal Handle Converts Injector-Razor Blade Into Stencil Knife

When fitted with a handle, injector-razor blades are handy for stencil cutting, silkscreen work and other cutting jobs requiring a sharp knife. A blade can be ground to almost any shape desired. To do this, first sketch the shape on the blade. Then insert one end in the handle and shape the other end on a fine-grit wheel. The handle is formed from a %6 x 5-in. strip of sheet metal, as indicated in the drawing. To form the channels along the sides of the strip, clamp it between two 1/32 x 1/16 x 5-in, lengths of flat steel and then fold over the edges. The channels are then closed with a center punch a distance of 1 in. from one end of the handle to prevent the blade from sliding into it beyond the desired point as shown. After the blade is inserted in the handle, punch marks are made on the chan-



nels at a point ¼ in. from the blade end to further secure the injector blade in the handle. When not in use, remove the blade from its cutting position and tape it to one side of the handle to prevent injury.



Household Cleanser on Tape Ideal for Small Polishing Jobs

When very fine grit abrasive cloth is needed for polishing small metal parts with round surfaces, one home craftsman uses a strip of friction tape coated on both sides with a powdered cleanser, such as is used for scouring pots and pans. The cleanser is applied by sprinkling a light coating of it on a flat surface and then firmly pressing the tape on the cleanser several times until completely coated.

A HARD-HITTING HANDGUN for use as a side arm when hunting large game or working a trapline where dangerous animals may be encountered, is quite easily converted from a single-shot rifle chambered for high-velocity cartridges. The conversion pictured above was made from a Remington rifle with a rolling-block action and chambered for the 7-mm. Mauser cartridge. Before converting this rifle make sure the action is tight, that all parts are in reliable working order and that the chamber is in good condition. If there is any doubt, have the arm checked by a com-

petent gunsmith. Unless you have facilities for altering the tang as in Fig. 3, it may be a good idea to have this done by your gunsmith. It's a rather tricky job as it involves altering the original flat lock spring. The rest of the work you can do yourself with a few simple tools.

After acquiring the rifle of your choice for conversion, remove the stock and forend wood and then cut off the barrel to the desired length and crown it. Care in selecting a rifle with a good barrel may save work and the expense of rebarreling the action. Next, a standard rifle ramp with a wide

partridge-type front sight attached is silversoldered to the barrel. The rear sight used is a Micro adjustable sight installed by drilling and tapping two shallow holes in the receiver directly above the chamber to take the mounting screws. To accommodate the curve of the revolver-style grips, the tang members must bent into a downward curve as in Fig. 3. Since the upper member of the tang would be too short after bending, it is cut off near the receiver and a rod of the proper diameter and length is welded in the position shown. After this is done, it is necessary to reshape the hammer spring to make it work properly. Note that the hammer spur has been bent downward to streamline the gun, Fig. 3. Care must be taken to anneal all steel parts that are to be bent to avoid breaking them.

Grips for the gun may be hand-carved from walnut to any style desired, or the gun can be sent to a custom-grip maker for this phase of the work, Fig. 4. For a more professional appearing and easier job of carving the grips, first make wax models of them. To do this, wind masking tape over the parts of the tang having open spaces and then dip the entire tang in melted wax a sufficient number of times to build up a mass from which the grips of the desired style can be carved. When sat-



isfied with the appearance and feel of the wax prototype, cut it in half with a hacksaw blade to form the left and right halves of the grips. Then, carefully remove them from the gun. Use the wax models for patterns and as a reference when cutting and carving the walnut grips. Carefully cut the grooves in the grips so that they tightly clamp the tang when bolted in place. Next cut down the forend wood (the wooden piece fitted against the underside of the barrel) to a pleasing proportion, Fig. 1. The lug on the forward end of the receiver is then drilled and tapped to take a rod threaded on both ends and slightly longer than the forend. A knurled ejector-rod head of the type used on some revolvers is turned on one end of the rod and the other end is inserted in a hole drilled in the forend wood and then turned in the tapped lug to securely fasten the forend in place.

Since a pistol of this size and shape will not fit in a stock holster, it is necessary to custom-make one as shown in Fig. 5. Use heavy, stiff leather for the body of the holster and close the seam at the back with a leather thong as shown, or have it sewn at a shoe-repair shop. Parts of the holster may be tooled. A thong lacing and a loop for one spare cartridge give the holster a Western appearance.

Jig Aids Cutting Rock-Wool Batt

Cutting a rock-wool insulation batt with a handsaw is easy when this jig is used. It consists of cleats nailed across the ends of two boards to space the latter 1 in. apart. It is used to support the insulation and provide passage for the saw. The jig may be used on saw horses or other supports.

Renew Wire Brush by Grinding

To give an old steel-wire brush a better "bite," hold it against the side of a rotating grinding wheel to remove the rounded ends on the bristles. When doing this, hold the brush lightly against the grinding wheel and wear safety goggles.


Photo Lamp on Rafter Illuminates Attic

Instead of searching in halfdarkness when looking through trunks and boxes stored in an unlighted attic, use a photoflood reflector, with 100-w. lamp, that can be clipped on a rafter as shown. If there is no electrical outlet in the attic, run an extension cord from an outlet downstairs, but be sure to disconnect the cord when the lamp is not in use. When the trunk light of one motorist's car stopped providing full illumination, he soldered one end of an electrical wire to the frame and the other end to the trunk lid to establish a better circuit. Such lights utilize the car frame and body for one side of the circuit and when rust and grime accumulate on hinge pins of the trunk lid, the flow of current to the light is reduced.



It is a good idea to provide some kind of cover to keep dust and dirt off the abrasive surfaces when not in use.





Tricks in Sharpening Edge Tools That Every User Needs to Know



TAKING THE TIME to sharpen a cutting tool to a keen edge pays off in greatly improved performance, better workmanship and, in the end, an actual saving in job time. In general the procedure is divided into three simple steps: Grinding the beveled cutting edge to the correct angle, whetting on an oilstone to remove the wire edge formed by the grinding operation and finishing on a hone or leather strop to produce a smooth, razor-keen edge. These three steps apply to nearly all types of cutting tools, either hand or power-operated. In some instances, such as sharpening auger bits, filing is substituted for grinding as the first sharpening operation, but the end result is the same.

For the initial step in sharpening tools, your grinder must be in good condition. A direct motor-driven unit with fine and coarse wheels turning at 1750 r.p.m. is preferred by many skilled craftsmen for sharpening edge tools. Others prefer the higher speed grinders with wheels turning at 3450 r.p.m. Abrasive wheels driven at the higher speeds cut a trifle faster and













When grinding and finishing the edge of a plane iron check the squareness. Squaring the edge will make it unnecessary to tilt the iron sidewise in the plane


Second step after grinding plane irons and chisels is finishing edge on oilstone. If edge is used for rough work, form double bevel as detailed above







smoother, but additional care must be taken to avoid overheating the tool and drawing the temper.


It's important that the wheels run true on the spindle and this should be checked occasionally. On all small grinders the wheels are held in place on the spindle with two undercut washers and a nut, Fig. The wheels are cushioned by blotters (disks cut from blotting paper and cemented to the wheel) and a lead bushing. Be sure not to damage the bushing or the washers when removing or replacing the wheel on the spindle. When the wheel becomes glazed (loaded with fine particles of metal) and the corners rounded due to prolonged use, the wheel should be trued up, or dressed, with a wheel dresser. Several types of wheel dressers are detailed in Fig. Handle these tools carefully as they cut very fast, especially the diamond dresser, Fig. 20, which is perhaps the best of the three types.

For the second operation in sharpening tools you will need an oilstone and a hone, or slipstone, Fig. 3. The type needed depends on what tool is being sharpened. Ordinarily, you will need the fine oilstone (boxed if desired) for such tools as plane irons and straight chisels, a tapered oilstone for gouges and a straight and tapered slipstone, the latter used for the final operation of honing, or slipstoning.

Grinding plane irons and straight chisels can be done very accurately on a grinder fitted with a blade-grinding attachment, Fig. 4. With this unit you get a square edge and a true bevel. If you do not have the attachment, then it is permissible (although not a recommended procedure) to









grind plane irons and chisels on the side of the wheel as in Fig. 5. Use care and light pressure. Check for squareness as in Fig. 8. Grinding leaves a wire edge shown exaggerated in the right-hand details, Fig. 6. This is removed on the oilstone as in Fig. 9.


Edge tools, such as chisels, gouges and plane irons, that are to be used for heavy cuts in hardwood, usually are finished with a double bevel, Fig. 6, A and B, and also Fig. 7. Grinding and finishing the edge with a double bevel gives the cutting edge greater support due to the added thickness



It's permissible to sharpen outside gouge on side of wheel as in Fig. 14. Figs. 15, 16 picture two methods of finishing inside gouge. In the first, Fig. 15, gouge is moved, stone is stationary. In Fig. 16, stone is moved




Above, auger bits are sharpened with special file and finished with abrasive stick. Below are methods of sharpening and finishing inside, outside gouges





of metal. In the two views in Fig. 7 the bevels are, of course, exaggerated. Normally the second bevel is formed in the second sharpening operation, Fig. 9, and should not be more than 1/32 in. wide. Normally the bevel on plane irons and chisels is ground to 25 deg., Fig. 6, but craftsmen often vary this to suit special conditions. As a final touch in whetting a plane iron or chisel, turn it over, lay flat on the oilstone as in Fig. 10 and smooth up the edge with a few light strokes. For average work craftsmen often finish the cutting edges of plane irons, chisels and gouges with a slipstone and dispense with stropping on leather as a final sharpening operation. With care this third step produces a cutting edge very nearly equal in smoothness to that obtained by stropping.

Carbon-steel and high-speed-steel twist drills can be used in either wood or metal but will not perform satisfactorily in either material unless they are correctly sharpened. A drill-grinding fixture, or jig, Fig. 12, provides the best method, but you can do very well freehand if you use a gauge, detail A, Fig. 11, to bring the cutting edges to the correct rake angle and included angle, details B and C, Fig. 11. Thinning the webs of twist drills shortened by repeated sharpening can be done on a round-faced wheel. Grind a bevel back of the cutting edges as in the right-hand detail.

Sharpening an outside gouge (bevel on convex side of blade) can be done on the side of the grinding wheel as in Fig. 14. This is permissible if only light pressure is used. The inside gouge is ground on a round-faced wheel as in the upper detail, Fig. 18. Unless it is badly dulled or nicked,








Always use a wheel dresser to true up a grinding wheel before sharpening any type of edge tool


grinding is not always necessary as the edge can be sharpened with a tapered stone as in Fig. 19. The outside gouge is finished on the oilstone (fine side) by either of two methods. In the first, Fig. 18, detail A, the bevel is simply rolled right to left with only a slight sidewise movement across the stone. In the second method, details B and C, the bevel is rolled from B to C in a sweeping stroke right to left and back. Users generally choose between the two methods, using the one that produces the best results for them individually. There also are two ways of finishing an inside gouge, Figs. 15 and 16. Some craftsmen prefer to hold the tool stationary and move the slipstone, Fig. 16. Others hold the stone stationary and move the tool, Fig. 15.

Lips and cutters of auger bits should be sharpened with an auger-bit file, Fig. 17, details A and B, and finished with a fine abrasive stick, or slip. If you have a hollow-chisel mortising attachment for your drill press and have no way of sharpening the chisel, Fig. 21 shows a simple and practical way of doing the job. The short length of dowel also can be held in the drill chuck.

Owners of choice pocketknives use various methods of sharpening the blades. One method quite generally favored is shown in Fig. 22, that of sharpening against the edge rather than with it. Likewise, some users of axes prefer to sharpen away from the edge, lower detail, Fig. 22, but others prefer to reverse the direction of the sharpening stroke, that is, make the strokes against the edge rather than with it. Some use a circular stroke, gradually decreasing the pressure, in sharpening a pocketknife or ax when a very keen edge is desired. ***


Bracket Permits Clamping Sketch Board in Vise at Desired Angle

If you have occasional need for a small sketch board in the workshop, here is an excellent way of supporting the board at a convenient angle for drawing. Simply bend a length of ½ x 1-in. flat steel to give the angle desired and drill two holes near one end for attaching to the back of the sketch board as shown. The other end is clamped in a bench vise.


When cleaning paintbrushes that have been suspended in turpentine, one home craftsman uses a square of insulating wall board to remove old paint and solvents. The porous material absorbs the solvent and the rough texture of the surface permits rubbing off the pigments without damaging the bristles. Handled Socket Wrenches Assembled Into Four-Way Wrench



For more convenient use of screwdrivertype hexagon wrenches, braze the four
most-used sizes to a steel disk as shown at
left. Besides saving time, this arrangement
affords greater leverage and causes less
wrist fatigue than does the use of such
wrenches in the conventional manner. The
wrenches are arranged on the disk so that
the sizes are in consecutive order. Size
numbers may be stamped next to the
shanks on both sides of the disk for easy
selection. If the wrench is to be used on
work requiring less leverage, simply reduce the length of each shank.



Level Drill Press With Bolts

About the best way of leveling a drill press or other shop machine is to place a bolt in each of the mounting holes and turn a nut on each as indicated in the detail at left. When the machine is in an upright position, the weight of it bearing against the nuts holds the latter in place, permitting the bolts to be turned as required to obtain level and solid position as shown in the photo. For heavy machines, the leveling bolts should be threaded for their entire length so that they can be positively secured in the mounting holes with locknuts to prevent vibration and lateral movement when a machine is in operation and pressure is exerted against work. Grind ends of bolts to a point to overcome any tendency of the machine to creep.

CLUTCH CONTROLS POWER TOOLS

A clutch permits smooth, gradual starts and stops, achieves a degree of spindle control not otherwise possible on small machines


THIS CLUTCH is especially useful for controlling a small lathe or milling machine when you're doing close work and it is necessary to start and stop the machine frequently. As detailed, it is assembled with pulleys of the same diameter for use with a small bench lathe without changing the original motor-to-jack-shaft pulley ratio. Pulleys of varying diameters can be used to adapt the unit to other uses.

The braking mechanism consists of a drum controlled by internal-expanding shoes actuated by a hand lever. Parts of the clutch are pictured in Figs. 3, 4 and 5 and an assembly view and sectional view are shown in Fig. 6. The clutch is pictured being assembled in Fig. 1, the hub being machined in Fig. 2 and the clutch completely assembled and mounted to drive a small lathe is pictured in Fig. 7. The parts are assembled on a 101/2-in. length of 1/2-in. steel shafting, the shaft being mounted on 1/2-in. ball-bearing pillow blocks. The pulley A, Fig. 6, on which the clutch mechanism is mounted, is bronze-bushed as it must turn freely on the shaft when the clutch is disengaged.

The clutch mechanism is attached to pulley A, Fig. 6, and consists of the back plate B, the

hub flange C, the split ring D, the halves of which carry the shoes, the clutch hub, arms and sliding cone. These parts in their relative positions are shown in the sectional view, Fig. 6. The drum can be made from extra-heavy pipe or from steel tubing having a ½2-in. wall. The backplate B, Fig. 6, is cut from ¾6-in. steel plate and is drilled near the edge for 6-32 screws, the holes being equally spaced. Using the plate as a template, drill and tap holes for 6-32 screws in one edge of the drum. On approximately the same spacing, holes are drilled for the








¼-in. rivets which hold the plate to the web of the pulley, A. A center hole is drilled and reamed to ½ in. to fit the shaft. The brake shoes, or clutch shoes, are semicircular segments cut from steel tubing having a ¾6-in. wall and an outside diameter of 3½ in. The shoes are faced with regular brake lining riveted in place. One edge of each shoe is drilled and tapped for three 6-32 screws so that the split rings, or segments, can be attached to the shoes in the same manner as the drum is attached to the backplate. Note that the assembly




(shoe and split ring, D) is riveted to the hub flange, the rivet ends being peened over on washers to permit each shoe free movement in and out as the clutch is engaged and released.

The hub, Figs. 6 and 8, can be made by turning to outside dimensions and then filing in the grooves, but it is best to have it milled to final shape. Note that the hub is shouldered at the big end to take the flange. The latter is pinned (with two round pins) to the hub. The pins are held in place with screws and retaining washers as in the detail, Fig. 6. Main parts of the clutch mechanism are detailed in Figs. 8 to 12 inclusive. The base, Fig. 6, is dimensioned as 7 x 11 in., but its general construction and the

height of the riser blocks will depend to


some extent on the application.

In an assembly of this type some hand fitting will be necessary. As an example, note in Figs. 6 and 9 that the arm pivots are fitted with locknuts for adjustment. This adjustment usually can be determined with fair accuracy when the brake-shoe unit has been assembled to the stage pictured in Fig. 4. The control ring, Figs. 6 and 11, should be hand-fitted as it is necessary that it be shimmed to just the right amount of clearance. If the ring is fitted loosely, it may tend to bind. Although not detailed, it's a good idea to provide small oilholes in the hub of the pulley A, the clutch hub and also in the control ring. A drop or two of oil placed in the oilholes occasionally will cause the clutch to operate somewhat more smoothly and, equally important, will help to reduce wear on the parts when the work requires frequent starting and stopping with comparatively long idling periods. As pictured, the clutch operated smoothly at speeds up to 500 r.p.m. Higher speeds are not advisable.

Cutting Edges of Bit Modified to Produce Broken Brass Chips



To avoid producing brass-drilling chips in sharp, brittle ribbon form that frequently cause painful cuts when handled, one home craftsman modified the cutting edges on the bits used for drilling such material as shown in the details. All such work should be done on a fine-grit grinding wheel, as when sharpening a drill bit. To do this, first grind the cutting surface on the bit point to the desired angle for brass drilling (usually a wider angle than when it is used for drilling steel) and then carefully grind a new cutting edge on each side to a zero or slightly less than zero rake. This means that the angle formed by the new cutting edge and the surface of the bit point will approximate 90 deg. Be sure not to grind away more than half of the land width to assure accurate hole size.


Broken Hacksaw Blade Repaired Temporarily to Finish Job



If you break a hacksaw blade half-way through a job, and another one is not available, the broken blade can be "patched together" to permit completing the work. Shorten the hacksaw frame enough to allow the broken pieces of the blade to overlap about 1/2 in. and clamp them together with a C-clamp. In case a clamp is not available, use a couple of ¼-in. nuts and bolts. The edges of the bolt heads and the nuts are clamped over the edges of the blade sections by drawing them up tight. One nut and bolt is used on the lower edge. and one on the upper edge of the blade. When cutting with the clamped blade, take short strokes to avoid striking the doubled portion of the blade against the work.

This welding jig provides an easy way of holding pieces of work that are to be welded at right angles to one another. To make the jig, cut out a square from one side of a piece of heavy-gauge sheet metal and bend the two legs formed by the cutout so that they are at right angles to each other. The jig then is placed in a vise and the workpieces are positioned and held on the legs with C-clamps as shown in the drawing at left. Also, the legs of the jig can be bent to form many other angles and positions to facilitate welding pieces of a job at the exact angle or location required by the design.


Simple Accessories Provide

MORE WORK FOR THE VTVOM

MODERN ELECTRONICS is a complicated business. The electronics technician working in a well-equipped shop may have access to a dozen different test instruments to help him in his everyday

work. The home experimenter or hobbyist, however, is often limited only to a vacuumtube volt-ohmmeter, VTVOM for short, with which to check or repair electronic circuits. Yet, with a few easy-to-build accessories and simple modifications, the VTVOM can handle a variety of jobs normally calling for the use of separate test instruments.

One of these jobs is the measurement of extremely small a.c. voltages. While most modern VTVOMs provide accurate indications for signals as low as 100 millivolts (.1 volt), below this value the needle-swing is too small for any degree of accuracy. In high-fidelity work, where voltages on the order of a few millivolts are often encountered, the VTVOM needs a little help.

Fig. 1 shows the schematic diagram of a simple preamplifier which increases VTVOM sensitivity by a factor of 10. Its use permits voltage measurements from magnetic phono cartridges, tape heads or low-level generators whose signals are too small to activate the normal VTVOM meter movement.

The circuit is that of a conventional r-c coupled amplifier having a high input resistance and a flat frequency response over the entire audio range. A bridge-type rectifier employed in the power supply permits the use of an inexpensive power transformer and reduces power-supply ripple to a minimum. Switch S1 is a feed-through switch which permits the preamplifier to remain connected between the VTVOM and the signal under test even for normal voltage measurements. With this switch in the X1 position, any signal applied to input jack J1 is transferred directly to output jack J3 without being amplified. With the switch in the X10 position, the preamplifier

Schematic diagram and photographs of simple capacitor checker. Bottom photo shows wiring simplicity



provides an amplification factor of 10. The small amount of power required for the preamplifier may be obtained directly from the power supply of the VTVOM, if the latter contains a well-filtered source of B+ between 70 and 120 volts. The preamplifier could then be installed as a permanent part of the VTVOM and its construction cost would be cut by more than 50% due to the elimination of a separate power supply. If the VTVOM power supply is not well filtered, a portion of the preamplifier's filter section, R7 and C4b, should be retained. R7 should be connected to the cathode of the VTVOM rectifier and its value should be reduced to approximately 10,000

With the parts values indicated, an accuracy of better than 10% can be expected. For greater accuracy, resistor R2 should be replaced with a 10,000 ohm, linear-taper

potentiometer, connected as a rheostat, so that the circuit can be accurately calibrated.

A low-voltage calibrating signal can be obtained from a voltage divider connected across the 6.3-v. filament winding of the power transformer, as shown in Fig. 1. With the VTVOM and preamplifier set up as in Fig. 2, measure the voltage across the 15-ohm resistor with the preamplifier switch, S1, in X1 position. Then, with S1 in the X10 position, adjust the calibrating potentiometer until the same test voltage provides a meter reading of 10 times the original value.

The setup in Fig. 2 is used for all a.c.-voltage measurements. The preamplifier switch, S1, should be set to the X10 position only when the voltage under test is too small to be measured accurately on the lowest VTVOM scale without preamplification.

Capacity measurements

About two dollars' worth of parts, most of which are probably available from your "junk box," is all that is needed to convert your VTVOM into a direct-reading capacity meter. With this simple accessory, see Fig. 3, you can measure the values of all nonelectrolytic capacitors between .003 and 2 mfd. When the VTVOM is used in conjunction with the previously described preamplifier, values as low as .0003 mfd. can be accurately measured.


The operation of the capacitor checker is simple. The unknown capacitor and a series resistor form a voltage divider across the 117-volt a.c. line. Compared to the capacitive reactance, the resistance value is so low that it contributes almost nothing to the total circuit impedance. The current in the circuit, therefore, depends entirely on the value of capacitive reactance.


Current-flow through the resistor, however, does produce an a.c. voltage drop across this unit which can easily be calculated and measured with the VTVOM.

In actual use, small capacitors ranging from .0003 (if the preamplifier is employed) to .1 mfd. are connected between jack J1 and J2, and the a.c. voltage is measured between J2 and J4. Larger capacitors, from .1 to 2 mfd., are connected between J1 and J3 and voltages are measured between J3 and J4. The relationship between typical capacitor values and VTVOM readings are shown in table 1.

To eliminate any possibility of shock, a normally open, push-button switch, S1, is inserted between the a.c. line and J1.

A few additional parts will permit any VTVOM to measure d.c. Parts can usually be mounted inside VTVOM case as shown below

Unless this switch is pressed and held down, no voltage is applied to the binding posts. As a second precaution, all parts should be mounted in a plastic or wooden box, as illustrated in Fig. 3.

WARNING: Capacitors above .1 mfd. often retain a charge for a considerable length of time. It is a good idea to discharge them, by shorting their pigtail leads, after each test.

Adding a D.C. Milliampere Function


Until the invention of the transistor, d.c. measurements were considered much too time-consuming for ordinary servicing or design work. Now, however, current measurements are routine procedures in many instances involving transistor circuits. With a few simple wiring changes and additions, and some easy calculations, you can modify your VTVOM to add this useful function to its range of operation.



Cleaning White Tile

Q — The ceramic-tile floor in my bathroom is discolored after many years of use. Dirt seems to be embedded in the surface of both tile and joints and scrubbing with a strong cleaning solution appears to have little, if any, effect on it. I tried rubbing with the fine side of an oilstone and the results were mildly en-

couraging but the method too slow. Is there any other way? — T. L., Fla.

A—There are several methods of cleaning tile, but where the tile are old and have seen a lot of service some of these methods do not always prove satisfactory. One method that is quite generally reliable is to make a paste, about the consistency of thick cream, by mixing white portland cement and water. Spread this mixture on the tile with a brush or cloth, allow to stand for a few minutes and then rub with a coarse cloth or a piece of burlap. When the cement film thickens, dip the cloth in water and continue rubbing until all loose material has been picked up by the cloth. Immediately dampen a clean cloth and wipe the surface, then go over it with a dry cloth. Used in this way the cement acts both as a cleaner and as a filler which works into the worn tiles and joints and brightens the floor quite effectively.

Applying Gold Leaf


Q-How does one apply gold leaf, such as is so often seen on old picture frames and other ornamental objects? I'd like to learn the procedure and I have several old picture frames practice on. These are small and quite plain, and two have liners which have apparently been coated with gold paint. Can you outline a proper procedure for me? — E. C., Vt.

A-We hesitate to recommend that you attempt to apply gold leaf, not that it is a difficult process, but rather that it requires such close attention to but rather that it requires such close attention to detail that results of one's first efforts are likely to be disappointing. Space will not permit a complete outline of the methods of gilding with gold leaf, but if you are determined to learn the general procedure then perhaps the following suggestions will be of help to you. Preparation of the surface has everything to do with the success of the job. Clean off paint (with remover) and grime to the bare wood. Sand smooth. Then coat the surfaces to be gilded with a mixture of glue and whiting. When this is dry, sand smooth and finish with very fine steel wool to a glass-smooth surface. Coat the surface with a prepared gold size and allow to stand until the size becomes rather ish with very fine steel wool to a glass-smooth surface. Coat the surface with a prepared gold size and allow to stand until the size becomes rather stiffly tacky. Gold leaf comes in a "book" containing a number of gold leaves placed between specially prepared sheets of paper to which it will not adhere readily. Don't attempt to pick up the leaf with your fingers. Cut it into small pieces with a razor blade by placing the edge on the leaf and pressing down lightly. Gilders use a special brush, usually referred to as a tip, to pick up gold leaf, but a clean camel's-hair brush is a fairly good substitute. Stroke the brush briskly on a piece of fabric, place the bristles over the piece of leaf, lift it and then tip it onto the area which has been sized. If the size has been allowed to reach the correct degree of tackiness the leaf will adhere readily. Immediately place a piece of waxed paper over the applied leaf and press it very lightly into contact. Repeat the process, tipping the second leaf onto the sized surface so that one edge slightly overlaps that previously applied. Portions of the leaf that overlap the sized area can be removed by brushing lightly.

Finishing Log Siding

Q—I plan to build a summer home to be finished on the outside with precut log siding. I want to preserve the natural color of the siding; don't want it to turn dark on exposure to weathering like some other log-siding jobs I've seen. Also, want to treat the wood to prevent damage by insects. What do I use?—O. W., Minn.

-If you have visualized the wood of the log A—If you have visualized the wood of the log siding remaining in the natural color indefinitely, you are likely to be disappointed. Even though you use a specially prepared log-siding finish, the wood itself will darken somewhat in time, due mainly to the effects of light and the variations in temperature and humidity. The wood will age slowly under any nonpigmented finish. However, the color variations intensified in this process are not at all objectionable, in fact, are quite attractive. When using a prepared finishing material be sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions in all details.

about two years to pay back the purchase price (about \$35) and there will be the annoyance of keeping the auxiliary fuel tank filled.

Automatic fan release.

The fan is needed less than five percent of the time. It uses up about ½ horsepower at 2000 revolutions per minute (engine speed) and 4 horsepower at 4000. In one test, removal of the fan boosted gas mileage by two percent at 60 miles per hour. At this rate you would have to drive 100,000 miles to get back the \$40 the fan release costs. And the improvement is even less at the more usual, slower driving speeds (greater at higher speeds). An extra benefit of the device is the tiny increase in horsepower and the reduction of fan noise, objectionable in some cars.

Oil-firing spark plugs.

The National Bureau of Standards (along with most experienced mechanics) has found that in an engine with oil-fouled spark plugs, ignition is better if there is an extra air gap in the wiring connection at the top of the spark plug. The gap may be built into the plug or just added to the

top of the plug.

This is easily explained. The coil delivers energy to the plug, not instantaneously, but over a short period of time. When the plug is oil fouled, the charge may leak through the oil film as fast as it arrives and never build up a charge strong enough to jump across the electrodes and ignite the fuel mixture. With the extra air gap at the top of the plug, the charge is held up there until its voltage is enough to jump this extra gap. Then the full charge arrives instantaneously at the regular spark-plug gap inside the cylinder and fires the mixture.

The auxiliary gap should not be used all the time. In some cases the coil does not develop enough voltage to jump both gaps while the battery is cranking the engine. This would obviously prevent the engine from starting, especially under extreme conditions as in subzero temperatures.


Dashboard spark control.

Cars using high-octane gasoline accelerate a little better than normal if the spark is slightly advanced. The same cars will perform fairly well on low-octane gasoline if the spark is slightly retarded. To permit the driver to make these adjustments, a spark control on the dash is convenient. switches and a separate pair of test-lead jacks must be added. Fig. 4 shows these additions on a Knight VTVOM kit which has been converted for this purpose. The location of the added parts is not at all critical. They can be installed any place on the panel or case where they will not interfere with the other wiring.

In order to convert your instrument, sensitivity and internal resistance of the meter movement must be known, and the calibration of the d.c. voltage scale must be taken into consideration. Meter specifications are usually printed in an instruction manual which was supplied with the VTVOM, but they can be obtained from the manufacturer if the manual is no longer on hand.

Fig. 5 shows the parts and wiring which add a ma. function and 3 ranges to any VTVOM. The original VTVOM wiring need not be disturbed, except for the two wires which connect the meter movement to the VTVOM function switch. These must be unsoldered from the switch terminals and connected to the center terminals of the added function switch, S2. Two wires connected to the terminals at one end of the new function switch are then soldered to

the VTVOM switch terminals from which the meter leads were removed. With the new function switch in the VTVOM position, the original VTVOM circuitry is restored. With S2 in the ma. position, the meter movement is connected to the ma. range switch, S1, in a typical ma-meter circuit. Shunt-resistance values given in the material list are correct for meter movements having an internal resistance of 1000 ohms and a sensitivity of 200 microamps. The current ranges are 0-1.5 ma., 0-15 ma. and 0-150 ma. for range-switch positions 1, 2 and 3, respectively. Exact values can be read on the 0-15 voltmeter scale.

Shunt resistance values for meters with other specifications and ranges can be calculated as described in the following example.

GIVEN:

Meter sensitivity=400 microamps for full-scale deflection.

Meter resistance=2000 ohms.

Lowest voltmeter scale=0-3 volts. PROCEDURE:

Because the lowest voltmeter scale is graduated from 0-3 volts, we will settle for milliameter ranges of 0-3, 0-30 and 0-300 ma. The correct current value can then be read directly on the 0-3 volt scale. For the 0-3 ma. range-switch position, a maximum

of 3 ma. will flow through the meter and shunt. Only 400 microamps may be permitted to flow through the meter itself, with the rest of the current going through the shunt. The shunt, therefore, must carry .003-.0004=.0026 amperes of current. The shunt resistance value can be calculated by means of the formula:

R shunt=R meter X I meter

The closest commercially available, ½-watt resistors provide sufficient accuracy for all

ordinary applications.

The newly installed test-lead jacks are employed for all current measurements. Both of these jacks must be insulated from the meter case (if the latter is made of metal) in order to eliminate any shock hazard.

When measuring current in a circuit, the VTVOM need not be turned on. Remember, however, the test leads must always be connected in series with the circuit under test. Carelessness in observing this precaution will almost certainly result in a burned-out meter movement and shunt resistor—a mistake which is likely to entail considerable expense.

Semiconductor Checker

With transistors becoming increasingly popular, there is a definite need for a simple, inexpensive device capable of indicating transistor quality. The semiconductor checker in Fig. 6, used with your VTVOM, not only checks all types of germanium transistors (not including power transistors), but can also be used to check the performance of selenium rectifiers and crystal diodes.

As shown in the schematic diagram, the unit is self-powered by a 22½-volt battery which, because of the low current requirements of the circuit, will have almost

"shelf life" in actual operation.

Two transistor sockets are mounted on the front panel. These are so wired that the correct battery voltage is applied to either PNP or NPN transistors when these units are plugged into their corresponding

sockets. The leakage-gain switch, S1, is a d.p.d.t., spring-return slide switch wired so that it is normally in the leakage position, as shown in the schematic. In this position, the base of a transistor plugged in the socket is open-circuited and only a relatively small leakage current will flow through the transistor. When the switch is moved to the gain position, a small bias current is applied to the base through resistor R2 or R3. Consequently, the transistor collector current increases appreciably. The ratio of gain-to-leakage current is a good indication of transistor quality.

To check transistor quality connect the d.c. probe of the VTVOM to J2 and the "common" lead to J1. Set the VTVOM range switch to the lowest voltage range (usually 1.5 volts) and plug the transistor in the correct socket. (Check catalogue description or manufacturer's literature to determine whether the transistor is an NPN or PNP unit.)

Move the gain-leakage switch, S1, to the gain position and adjust the calibration potentiometer, R1, to obtain a meter reading of 1.5 volts. Release the switch so that it returns to the leakage position and note the meter reading.

For a good quality transistor, the gainto-leakage ratio indicated by the meter will be high. The greater this ratio, the greater is the potential current gain of the transistor.

If no meter reading is obtained with the switch in either the gain or leakage position, the transistor is open-circuited. If the leakage current equals or exceeds the gain current, the transistor is short-circuited. If the leakage current approaches the gain current, the transistor is capable of very little or no amplification.

SELECTING MATCHED PAIRS. For push-pull or complementary symmetry circuits, the transistors used should have very nearly the same characteristics. A pair of transistors is "matched" if the gain and leakage currents of both transistors are the same. or nearly the same. By checking a number of transistors, those with the closest corresponding characteristics can be selected for critical circuit applications.

CHECKING TRANSISTOR NOISE. Low-level amplifiers, such as preamplifiers, require the use of low-noise transistors. The relative noise level of a number of transistors can be compared by connecting a pair of crystal headphones to the double phone jack, J3, and adjusting the gain current of each transistor for a 1.5-volt meter reading. (A pair of magnetic headphones may be used for this purpose by connecting a .05 mfd. capacitor in series with one of its leads.) Transistor noise will be audible in the headphones.

CHECKING RECTIFIERS AND DIODES. Rectifiers and diodes can be checked with a pair of test leads plugged into the double phone jack. This jack must be wired so that the terminal marked (+) in the photograph is connected to the positive side of the battery and the negative terminal is connected to one end of potentiometer R1. To check forward-to-reverse conduction ratio of rectifiers and diodes, connect the lead from the negative jack of the tester to the positive terminal of the rectifier or diode, and the positive test lead to the negative rectifier or diode terminal. (The positive terminal of crystal diodes is often marked with a band, a dot or a "K.")

When so connected, the rectifier or diode is forward biased and R1 can be adjusted for a 1.5-volt indication on the VTVOM. Now reverse the test-lead connections to the rectifier or diode and note the meter deflection. With good components, the reverse-current is very low so that a ratio of at least 20 to 1 is obtained. (Some highconduction diodes, such as video detectors, are good if the forward-to-reverse current

ratio is 10 to 1, or greater.)

Selenium rectifiers, in addition to having a high forward-to-reverse current ratio. must have low internal resistance when biased in the forward direction. Otherwise, they might break down under full load. To check for this possible defect, short out the test leads and adjust R1 for a meter deflection of 1.5 volts. Then, without disturbing the setting of R1, connect the negative test lead to the positive rectifier terminal, and the positive lead to the negative terminal. If the rectifier is good, the meter should read at least 1.35 volts.





the spark to prevent knocking on the occasional tankful of gasoline that may have a below-average octane rating. The engine can, of course, be damaged if the driver is so foolish as to run with the spark far enough advanced to make the engine knock.

It is also possible on many cars to get a few percent more gas mileage at some spark setting other than standard, but few motorists will have the ability or inclination to make the lengthy tests required to find the correct setting.

A simple, inexpensive cable, such as used on a hand choke, will work about as well as the special controls sold for the purpose. The micrometer (so-called) adjustment on the latter has little real value.

Relay for using 12 volts on six-volt system.


At temperatures lower than 10 below zero, the starter may not be able to crank the engine fast enough to start it running (a properly winterized car with electrical equipment in good condition should start without trouble at temperatures above that). A relay, which when used with two six-volt batteries delivers 12 volts to the starter, will give a substantial increase in cranking speed on extra-cold days. However, there is some risk to the starting motor because it is not designed to operate on 12 volts. Most of the advantages can be obtained without any risk of damage by using an oversize six-volt battery or two standard six-volt batteries permanently connected in parallel (positive to positive, negative to negative).

Mushrooms Grow in Three Days



Fusion Power for the World of Tomorrow

10 gallons of ordinary tap water contains enough deuterium to supply all the electrical requirements of your family for one full year. And this much fuel, even now, can be separated from the water for less than 30 cents!

Such are the stakes in this scientific game.

How do you go about fusing deuterons? Each deuteron has a positive electrical charge, so they repel each other with incredible violence. Whenever two deuterons approach, they instantly fly apart. The only way to force them together is to heat them. Then, like ants on a hot stove, they'll move so fast they'll collide blindly before they have a chance to recognize each other.

The temperature of the "stove" must be a hundred million degrees or more. At that temperature, atoms break down into free electrons and nuclei. This gaseous mixture is called a plasma. The electrons in the plasma will be traveling 90,000 miles per second, and the deuterons at 1500 miles per second. This is precisely what is happening in the stars of the sky.


Bottle to Hold a Star

Obviously, finding a bottle to hold a star is the toughest obstacle science has ever tackled. The melting point of the most heatresistant of known solids is around 3000 degrees. Strange as it sounds, however, heat is not much of a problem, as there is very little actual heat in the bottle. The plasma is such a thin gas that, although individual particles are superhot, the total heat content is not very high. In fact, even when a liter of the gas reaches 350 million degrees it will hold just about enough heat to make a cup of coffee palatable!

The big problem, from the standpoint of the physicist, is *keeping* the gas hot. If the deuterons, in their wild dance, should touch the sides of the bottle, the gas would instantly be cooled to a point where fusion couldn't take place.

Since the ants on this hot griddle all have an electrical charge, they should be subject to control in a magnetic field. This is the approach that is being tried on a worldwide basis in the search for the elusive thermonukes. Anyone investigating this field is somewhat surprised to discover that there are virtually no security wraps on the research in magnetic bottles. Research papers show that scientists apparently are approaching the last difficult steps to success.



Significant numbers of neutrons have been captured in some of the equipment. Whether they are true thermonukes, or neutrons from side reactions, has not yet been proved.

Four Approaches

So far, four different approaches to the magnetic bottle have been tried:

1. The first method takes advantage of the so-called "pinch effect." In this method, a strong magnetic field is created around the plasma, forcing it away from the sides of the bottle and into a sort of a rope. As the current is increased, the rope tends to shrink, constricting or pinching the deuterons into a narrow field where the temperature builds up and they are more likely to collide. This is the technique used in the famous Zeta machine of the British. The principal difficulty is that the plasma rope begins to writhe, creating such kinks and "sausage links" that it destroys itself. As Dr. Ruark says, "Asking the pinched current to stay quietly in the middle of the tube is something like asking a boa constrictor not to constrict." Still, ways are being found to tame the boa. One is to place a strong magnetic field down the middle of the plasma, giving it a sort of a spine or stiffener.

2. A more recent approach, under investigation at the University of California Radiation Laboratory, is a "magnetic mirror." This instrument consists of a long straight tube surrounded by coils of wire to create a field around the plasma, preventing it from reaching the sides of the tube. At each end of the tube, extra strong magnetic fields or "mirrors" reflect stray particles back, holding the plasma in an unbelievably hot ball. This creates a more stable plasma, but there is one disadvantage: Before this reaction will be self-sustaining, it may be necessary to raise the temperature of the plasma to a billion degrees or more.

Most Promising

3. One of the most promising approaches is the Stellerator at Princeton. In this technique, the tube is either doughnut-shaped or formed into a figure 8. After the plasma has been heated to about a million degrees, the deuterons are further speeded by alternating the field rapidly (called magnetic pumping).

4. An apparatus called DCX at Oak Ridge National Laboratory is basically a new means of injecting deuterium into the magnetic bottle. The deuterium atoms are shot into a static magnetic field, where a carbon arc blasts them into electrons and





nuclei. This creates a very high temperature plasma from the outset, and the system, if successful, should be useful in the Stellerator and some of the other instruments.

Scientists Are Optimistic

Scientists, who normally are cautious men, tend to be surprisingly optimistic about one or more of these approaches. An AEC brochure at the Geneva exhibit, for example, states that when Stellerator C is completed in 1960, "it is expected to be capable of producing abundant thermonuclear fusion reactions."

Even if reactions are achieved, there is no guarantee that a true power-producing reactor is possible. But the stakes are so high in this game that most countries are boosting their ante each year. Since 1953 the AEC funds for fusion research have increased 1000 percent.

The best part of this game is that if one player wins, all win. It seems quite likely that within the next year, scientists at a laboratory somewhere on the face of the earth, will capture significant quantities of genuine thermonukes. And in 10 to 20 years, the first successful fusion reactor will go into operation.

Such a tremendous stride will herald the day when bottled stars will glow everywhere, and every man will have an incredible amount of power at his fingertips.

(Don't be too sure that caviar you ate last night was from Russian sturgeon. They're processing caviar now from fish eggs of Ohio River channel catfish, freshwater drum, paddlefish and gizzard shad.





dredges, working under U. S. Army Engineers, are busy deepening harbors and interlake channels to the seaway's official 442-foot bottom width and 27-foot depth. Target date for the last of this work is 1962.

Locking through the seaway will be swift and efficient. At Eisenhower and Snell Locks, which began lifting lake steamers through their concrete walls last July, you get a preview of what a trip up the finished waterway will be like.

"We cleared a backlog of 109 ships in the first 48 hours of operation," Norman Ashley will tell you. Ashley is one of the lock control operators on the 3½-mile Wiley-Dondero Canal linking Eisenhower and Snell. "The Canadians up at Iroquois figured we'd be a bottleneck because of our inexperience with this type lock, but it turned out we kept them hustling. We've lifted ships the entire 45 feet in six minutes

In a glass-enclosed blockhouse, jutting from the lock's broad apron like an airport control tower, Ashley operates the great miter gates and flood valves at a console of lights and switches. "Everything works in sequence," he points out. "If the big boom isn't down, I won't get a circuit okay to close the gates. If the gates aren't closed properly, I won't get a clear circuit to open the valves."

At his big board, Ashley watches as a lake-bound freighter enters the down-stream gate and sails into the cavernous lock chamber in which water has been dropped to downstream level. Actually, the new locks can take two lake steamers with room to spare. "A cabin cruiser wants to come through—let him in," Ashley suddenly shouts over an intercom to the downstream control operator.

"Those small-boat skippers," he explains, "are sometimes scared to come in with a big ship for fear they'll get banged all over the lock by water rushing in as the lock fills. Even in the Panama locks that happens. Here you'll hardly see a ripple as she comes up. Watch that little boat slip a bight over the floating bollard—that's all the mooring he needs."


Gates Protected by Fenders

With both vessels tied up, Ashley and the downstream operator begin to throw switches in orderly sequence. The massive gates swing shut. Outside in the downstream canal, a huge girder lowers across the channel like a railroad crossing gate. "Each gate is protected by a fender like that," said Ashley. "It will stop an ocean freighter traveling at four knots."

Down below the control house, two giant whirlpools form outside the upstream gate as a pair of intake valves opens and gravity sucks a roaring torrent down through 15 by 16-foot culverts running through the sidewalls of the lock.

Deep in the lock chamber, the mirrorlike surface of the water creeps up the footage markers, faster and faster.

Secret of the smooth lift, according to L. W. Angell, chief engineer for the seaway project, is a tricky system of intake ports. Instead of shooting straight up from the bottom, as it does in older locks, the rising water is fed through culverts in the sidewalls and shoots out into the 85-foot-deep lock bottom. Side ports from these transverse mains face each other, so that the water's tremendous energy is expended against itself. "We ran model tests that told us we had a good system," says Angell.

Plugs That Hold the Water

Going downstream, ships enter a full lock, and the water is dumped through outlet ports at the lower end.

Looking at the towering level of water outside the sheet of steel upstream of an empty lock, you can't help wondering what would happen if a ship should rupture that gate and let the whole upper St. Lawrence roar down the valley.

Not likely, according to Angell. The outside fenders protect that side of the big gate from ships. "Inside," he reveals, "two more fenders lying across the lock bottom lift up fore and aft of the ship to protect the gates from sharp prows and stern projections. This accounts for the fact that a 768-foot ship is the longest you can put into the 800-foot lock chamber. The difference is safety clearance."

That's not all. On the upriver side of Eisenhower Lock, facing the huge power pool, there's a superbackstop—a 350-ton vertical lift gate sunk in a deep slot in the massive concrete sill. "It will raise itself hydraulically," says Angell, "right through a full head of water roaring into the lock."

On top of that, beside each gate stands a crane and a pile of "stoplogs"—28-ton steel panels that can be dropped into slots just outside the gates.



When it is finished, the new Seaway between Montreal and Ontario will climb through a total of seven locks, instead of 21, as on the old canal.

Far from being a recent brainstorm, the idea of slipping vessels around the cascades flowing down from the Great Lakes dates way back. Pioneering trappers and traders scooped out a tiny ditch around Lachine back in 1700 in order to float fur-laden freight canoes safely past white water. By 1908, Canada had built the chain of locks and canals that, until now, has carried small lake ships from Montreal to Lake Ontario. Slowly the 14-foot-draft canal was

extended and improved.

Then came Canada's big dream — the joint U. S.-Canadian effort to broaden and deepen the channel and locks to accommodate ocean shipping. For nearly half a century the plan was kicked around by U. S. politicians and pressure groups. Then, in 1953, Canada threatened to build it alone. That did it! Within a year the St. Lawrence River valley became a bedlam of roaring machinery, shouting men and flying earth. Ontario's Hydro-Electric Power Commission and the New York State Power Authority combined forces on the power part of the project while the United States' St. Lawrence Seaway Development Corporation and Canada's St. Lawrence Seaway Authority tore into navigational problems.

Exactly 210,515,000 yards of earth had to be moved to make way for the giant seaway. If you piled it all on a football field, that much dirt would reach 25 miles in the air. Or, as M. W. Oettershagen, Deputy Administrator for the Seaway, puts it: "you could haul it away in 60,000 trainloads of

100 cars each."


Tough Rock Wrecks Drills

None of it was easy. Paul Bunyan's fabled deeds pale beside some of the tales that are bandied about Massena, N. Y., where the heart of activity is centered. Canadian contractors on the Beauharnois Canal had to gouge their two-mile channel—to standard seaway depth of 30 feet—through solid rock so tough it wrecked the best steel drills in eight hours. Kerosene torches burning at 4000 degrees were used to soften it so blast holes could be sunk.

To make room for the new power lake that would flood 38,000 acres in the International Rapids section, seven complete Canadian towns were moved, lock, stock and tavern on the backs of gigantic, multitired house-moving flatbed trucks; 42 miles of highway and 35 miles of railway had to be relocated; 21 miles of dikes had to be built to contain the new waterway.



Canadians, working through the crackling northern winters, had to blast great ice floes that threatened cofferdams; their fresh-poured concrete had to be kept under a barrage of steam jets to keep it from freezing. In summer, dredge operators, who had to work in white-water rapids, cabled their barges to bedrock ashore, or tied on to great blocks of concrete on the bottom to keep from being swept away.

Oettershagen likes to recount the adventures of an ingenious contractor named Badgett, who brought in a gigantic 650-ton walking dragline from Madisonville, Ky. "It had feet," he recalls. "Great snowshoelike platforms, about 15 by 30 feet, with a camlike device that would pick 'em up and lay 'em down. Badgett inched that thing overland 18 miles to the Green River in 68 days, put it on a barge and sailed it up here. When a two-lane highway bridge got in his way he got permission to unhook it from its piers, lifted it on the dragline's boom, sailed down river about 50 yards with the bridge dangling, then swung around, put the thing back in place and continued on his way.

"In Chicago they told him he'd never run the Galop Rapids with that monster—but he did. Welded the whole works to the barge deck, dragged his big boom and bucket behind him in the river bed, like an anchor to windward, and shot the rapids in fine style."

Rhythm Breaks the Ice

Contractors didn't have all the ingenuity. When three-foot-thick river ice held up the start of spring construction on the power and control dams, Frank Matejka broke it up by opening and closing the control dam's new gates rhythmically and putting the whole ice table into harmonic motion. "We gained six weeks' construction time," he points out.

On June 30, 1957, everything nearly went galley-west when a hurricane's low-pressure eye literally tipped Lake Ontario backward, so that its water was several feet higher downstream than upstream! Bob Connors, one of Matejka's engineers, had the headache of facing all that water as it roared down from Iroquois on a wild night that knocked out all communications. Using radio cars to report water levels upstream, his gantries were still inching up gates in the unfinished Long Sault Control Dam when the wall of water hit Massena. "We barely got enough gates open," he says. "The level at Massena went to 204.4 feet-just 11/2 inches from flooding the Cornwall canals on the Canadian side."

Job Finished on Schedule

In spite of it all, the St. Lawrence was harnessed on schedule. "Last April first was deadline day for removal of the cofferdams at the powerhouse," says Matejka. "And on April first the last pile was pulled. May first was scheduled for commencing closure of rail and road access gaps in the dikes, and on that day we began pulling spikes. July one was set for the pool raising, and that was the day we blasted the cofferdam plug."


Today visitors can stand on any one of a dozen parks and sites, carved out of the river's lush banks and scenic islands, and look out on the inspiring sight of some 250,000 gallons per second of tumbling white spray as it roars from the two dams' batteries of sluices, marching across nearly two miles of river. Along the top of the 167-foot-high power dam, mammoth gantries, resembling four-legged stools for some giant to sit on, rumble along tracks atop the dam crest, raising and lowering gates to adjust the flow through the 32 big turbines (half for Canada, half for the U. S.) buried deep in concrete. Already, many of them are turning generators.

Everything you see is living proof of what the administrators cheer as an historic example of international cooperation.

Where Did the Inches Come From?

We add the usual 34 inches of torso height and three to five inches of excess headroom. Add these up and if you accommodate the center passenger you get about 54 inches minimum instead of 50 or 52—and therein is the big problem today of the Detroit body engineer.

You might be surprised at the difference in corporation policies regarding the relative values of comfort and convenience and styling lines. Ford Motor Company is probably the most conservative at the moment. Its low-pinion rear axles, step-down "Coke-bottle" frames and flat roofs have given reasonably low body lines while maintaining headroom and respectable cushion thickness over the tunnel. But its 1959 bodies are not quite so low as GM's and who knows which way Ford might jump in 1960?

The GM divisions have put a tremendous amount of time and money into engineering for low body lines while maintaining acceptable headroom and seat height. GM Styling set an arbitrary limit of 40 inches metal-to-metal distance between the top of the drive-line tunnel and the roof, measured near the center of the rear seat. Such a limit gives at least two inches of compressed-cushion thickness and four inches excess headroom. It forced engineers to concentrate on step-down frames (all GM uses them), roof and drive-line design. And it paid off with the lowest-looking line of cars among the 1959 model crop.

Chrysler Corporation, which was once the most conservative on things like seat height and headroom, pulled out all stops two years ago to get under competition. It lowered its bodies with a minimum of tooling changes. It uses no step-down frame and its floor line is above the frame rails. Seats and seat mountings had to be lowered to compensate. A single-piece drive shaft with the modest 11/2-inch pinion drop meant a relatively high tunnel. This has been compensated somewhat by limiting the upward rear-axle travel by rubber stops and accounts, in part, for the superior stability in high-speed cornering of Chrysler products.

It is obvious from the above that major changes in chassis and body layouts will be necessary in order to take many more inches out of car height. There are several possibilities.

It would be simple if we could get rid of the center passenger in our sedans. The four-place Thunderbird is an example. It is 52½ inches high with excellent seat

height and headroom. This type of body will most certainly grow in popularity in the years ahead.

We'll get a substantial reduction in driveshaft tunnel height by switching to independent rear suspension, in which the differential is mounted rigidly on the frame and the shaft doesn't move up and down at all—only the wheels. Look for this by 1961.

Ford is working hard on front-wheel drive which gets rid of the shaft altogether. Other things like lower-profile tires, smaller wheels, more compact rear axles, drive shafts in the form of a thin torsion bar instead of a big tube will help also.

Wheeled Aluminum Frame Helps Move Light Loads

Old cardboard boxes can be attached to a two-wheel aluminum frame which serves as a caddy for hauling grass clippings, leaves or weeds. Long springs with clip ends hold the container in place. The frame is designed to carry loads up to 100 pounds. The caddy also can be used to carry golf clubs, laundry, luggage or groceries.



Photos Snapped at 10,000 Feet Detect Disease in Cereal Crop

Aerial photographs of cereal crops, taken from 10,000 feet, can detect infected areas missed by trained ground observers standing only 10 feet away. Infrared, color and panchromatic films are used. The same photographic methods can be used to distinguish soil and mineral types, plant species and water depths, as well as to single out timber stands vulnerable to epidemic-size disease or insect attacks.

Extract Takes Bite Out of Sting

Injecting an extract of bee venom under the skin makes some people less sensitive to bee stings, according to a South African medical scientist. The extract is made by grinding up whole bodies of bees, since this is easier than preparing an extract from stingers alone. The extract was reported successful in 19 of 24 cases treated.



MAGUIRE: Well, my wife likes the size of it, yes.

WALKER: And my wife likes the size

of it.

MAGUIRE: I'm not denying the size thing altogether. The fact that the Thunderbird is smaller than the Lincoln appeals to her. But she has told me that she would just as soon drive the Lincoln. It's as easy to maneuver as the Thunderbird except in parking. I think the Thunderbird sells because of the spooky, lush quality of it. It's a distinguished car.

WALKER: They keep talking about cars being too big to park. How many times does a person park a car or get in and out of it in a day? We say somebody gets in and out of a car about four times a day. That's not very often. Why would he forsake good silhouette and design just because it knocks his hat off a few times a day? If we were designing a milk wagon we would make it high enough so a man could jump in and out without knocking his hat off.

MAGUIRE: The Thunderbird is very low and I don't hear any owner complaining about it. I don't think size has as much to do with its success as you seem to think. People are buying it because it's a spooky style leader. I am distinguished when I am in it.

WALKER: But I am sure that if it sold for \$3000 you'd still see a lot on the road. It wouldn't be as exclusive, but it would sell just the same. The balance of the car is so nice, the silhouette is so nice, it could be the concept of a whole new line.

QUESTION: When are you going to have a four-door version?

WALKER: I couldn't answer that. I don't know.

QUESTION: Would a four-door model hurt Lincoln's business?

MAGUIRE: I think you could say that it is hurting Lincoln's business right now. That is one thing that makes it so difficult to make decisions in this business. Lincoln is trying to sell a quality car. What is a quality car? A big one? Here we have a quality car that's a little one.

QUESTION: Isn't it true that by the time you can afford a fine car you prob-

ably don't need a big one?

a bigger house and he wants a bigger car. You can't change that.

QUESTION: A favorite with the Detroit detractors at the moment is sex symbols. Is there any deliberate attempt to put sex symbols in cars?

WALKER: Absolutely not.

MAGUIRE: A car gets into a face symbol very easily with its headlights that look like eyes and a grille that looks like a mouth. Sometimes you work like a dog for a couple of weeks on a front end and you come in one morning and you've got a mouth with four teeth in it, with eyes over here and a nostril opening in the power dome. It shocks you. You wonder how you could go that far without noticing it.

QUESTION: Why do we need four taillights? They don't tell you anything more than two.

WALKER: They give balance when they're done right. And they are a decoration that makes a little more flash and splash at the rear.

MAGUIRE: Let me say something about the size of taillights. Why shouldn't a taillight be a big thing? When Ford stoplights go on you know it's stopping. When I drive down the highway I miss those big lights if they're not there.

WALKER: Taillights are partly safety and partly styling. They add an exciting element to the design. Of course, you can get bizarre with it if you're not careful.

QUESTION: Why do you insist on hiding the gas filler pipe?

MAGUIRE: Why shouldn't it be concealed? Who has to know where it is? Only the gas man and he knows.

ENGEL: It's just an ugly square shape on the side of a fender. It helps to get it out

of sight, smooths up the lines.

MAGUIRE: That's a funny question because it's the kind of question that's hitting us now. It's the "gray flannel" question. It's asked by the same people who write that automatic transmissions are terrible and we should go back to the stick shift. This is the year to be against automobiles. But, good heavens, would those people want to get rid of the automatic oil burner in their homes? Is there merit to shoveling coal? Why stop at the stick shift? Why not go back to the tiller? Why not go back to the horse? Where do you stop?


ENGEL: I can imagine what the car would be like if we designed one to please those people. It sure wouldn't sell.

problems. We design a car and the minute it's done we hate it—we've got to do another one. The 1957 Ford was great, but right away we had to bury it and start another one. We design a car to make the man unhappy with his 1957 Ford along about the end of 1958, so he'll buy another one. Planned obsolescence, I guess. It's a nasty word nowadays, isn't it?

QUESTION: Is it really necessary—this

planned obsolescence?

MAGUIRE: It is, if the country is to keep on doing what it's doing.

QUESTION: Are cars going to get any

longer?

ENGEL: I would say not. Not much

MAGUIRE: Sounds logical, but I hate

to make such a statement.

ENGEL: I'd never say they weren't going to get any lower. I don't know how low they'll go.

QUESTION: Will perhaps all cars be about the same length with the differences

being in luxury, in lushness?

MAGUIRE: We're getting close to this now. The new Buick is big, but it doesn't look as big as it did. That's a funny thing. We used to be proud of making a car look longer than it really was. Have we reached the point where the trick is to make a car look shorter than it is?

QUESTION: It appears that the stylist has taken the ball and run with it, leaving the engineer in the shadows. Is this true?

ENGEL: When a person walks into the showroom to look at a new car he doesn't see the engine. Sure, the engine is important, but the customer sees styling first.

MAGUIRE: Engineering is less of a problem then it used to be. Cars run now.

QUESTION: What's the truth about the industry's espionage system, which is supposed to inform each company what the other is doing years in advance?

ENGEL: I don't know anything about it. Styling doesn't have anything to do with it. Any information we get somebody else gives us.

QUESTION: Is espionage widespread?

ENGEL: I don't think it's as big as it's made out to be. I think a lot of it comes when a stylist moves from one company to another. If a couple of guys left here today they could tell General Motors or Chrysler exactly what we're thinking about for '61.

MAGUIRE: We never find out things

early enough anyway.

QUESTION: How important will styling be to the success of the small car?

ENGEL: Price is the most important thing on the small car, economy of operation is second and then styling, I would say. The owner is buying transportation and economy, not styling.

MAGUIRE: I'm not so sure. I have never seen a poor man in a Volkswagen yet. I have seen gray-flannel nonconformists in Volkswagens, but I don't think they're

after economy.

ENGEL: The Volkswagen is an ugly car, but it's economical and it sells. They haven't changed that thing in 15 years. They've got a good thing there and they probably would ruin it if they changed it. Maybe they're better off not worrying about styling—it's no bed of roses designing a car. When you get into the financing, production and the public taste—it's a real tough problem.

WALKER: That's right. It's not like designing a vacuum sweeper or a TV set. You've got to remember to be "automobiley." That's Maguire's word for it. Engel, here, has the concept of the nice, crisp line that has been characteristic of Ford products. We think that our competitors are becoming aware of the crisp highlights of our concept of styling for the first time this year and we're flattered.

in the chassis, such as moving the transmission to the rear, but they would be very costly.

QUESTION: The public seems to be showing better taste about furniture and homes these days. And cars too, I think. But it seems to me that car interiors are still very garish when compared with living rooms. Why are they that way?

EXNER: The type of interior we are doing is what the sales department has in-

dicated that the buyer wants.

SCHMIDT: It's the same story as the exterior-chrome story. We designers would have very few moldings if we had our way. But if you put a chromed-up job beside a plain job in a showroom, in most cases the car with the brightwork will sell sooner than the plain one.

EXNER: Perhaps it is the initial impression that sells. Maybe that is where

this extra "busyness" is needed.

SCHMIDT: Remember we are merchandising people. A stylist is here to design cars that will sell, so we must satisfy the

tastes of most people.

EXNER: Product planners may feel that the busy design makes the average buyer think that he is getting more for his money. But there is a very slow move towards greater simplicity and we stylists like it. But we may have to get busy again later. Look at the appliance business. Washing machines are simpler to use than ever, but they are designed to look busy.

QUESTION: A favorite charge of the iconoclast is that of sex symbolism in styling. Is there anything to this charge?

EXNER: Absolutely not. Frankly I think that's coming from people who are more concerned with that sort of thing than they should be.

QUESTION: What about the push-button control? Is it a styling or an engineering

device?

EXNER: It's a combination. It's a very simple, functional control that meets both esthetic and functional requirements.

QUESTION: Don't you think all controls of this type should be standardized?

EXNER: Strictly from a safety standpoint, I could see that it would be an advantage to have every transmission control the same. But if you come out each year with exactly the same arrangement, somebody is apt to say this instrument panel doesn't look much different from my old one. You have to have new arrangements to make the panel more attractive, more exciting.

SCHMIDT: The whole industry puts the light switch at the extreme left side of the panel so you know where you reach to turn on the lights in the dark. It's not a written law but we all do it-perhaps there will evolve some similar system for push buttons.

EXNER: I think the stylist has a right to put the buttons in a new location if he wants to, providing he can find an equally functional location. He almost has to have this freedom because the dashboard arrangement is never fixed-it changes.

QUESTION: Why is so much effort spent

on hiding the gas filler pipe?

EXNER: One reason could be that shapes are more complicated in the quarter panel and you don't have the right kind of surface for placing the filler cap.

QUESTION: Isn't upholstery unnecessarily luxurious for use in the automobile? Shouldn't it be more practical?

SCHMIDT: In general, upholstery is expensive and getting more so. We're going to materials that have bolder, tweedy effects. Instead of putting a lot of trim on the seat as we do today we're coming out with striped materials that have the design right in them.

EXNER: Of course, we put sprays on fabrics so they can be washed. And they are impregnated with solutions so you can spill ice cream on them and still wipe it off. You couldn't do that with most upholstery on your home furniture.

QUESTION: Why must we have such a broad, useless shelf over the dashboard? It reflects sunlight and takes up needed legroom, doesn't it?

EXNER: Just put your hand under there and you'll see there is no wasted room in it. We must leave space for a radio, a speaker, for air-conditioning parts as well as other things.

SCHMIDT: That's proved by the small glove boxes. They are left until last, after all the functional units are located. That is the most complicated area in the body.

QUESTION: Why do we have expensivelooking carpeting in cars? Why not rubber mats?

EXNER: It's not so expensive. A rubber pad would be more practical, but the buyer certainly prefers rugs. They look much better.

QUESTION: Stylists have been saying cars won't get much longer for 10 years now, yet they keep getting longer. Will cars continue to get longer?

EXNER: I really don't feel that they will get much longer. We're asking for fractions of inches now. There won't be the increases in the next five years that

there have been in the past. Maybe we need a little more clearance for bumper protection or for taillight clearance, but that's all.

QUESTION: There seems to be a tendency for all cars to be getting closer together both in size and in luxury. How do you keep your Plymouth from looking more expensive than a Dodge, for example?

SCHMIDT: You put more money into the fabrics, in the carpets, in the engine. The cost factor automatically keeps the

cars in proper price categories.

QUESTION: Suppose you came up with a design that was elegant enough for the Imperial yet cost no more to make than a Plymouth. Would you make it an Imperial

or a Plymouth?

SCHMIDT: You wouldn't say that just because it was cheaper it was in the Plymouth bracket. If it fits in the Imperial picture you'd make it and spend any money you might save on the rest of the package, on the fabric, the carpeting, the hardware.

EXNER: We call it horsetrading. If we can save \$5 on a rear bumper we might take that money and put it into a more expensive grille. We are given a cost target. We don't have to spend a certain amount on each part of the package, but the total cost must not exceed a certain amount.

SCHMIDT: Elegance usually costs more. Low-price cars often have an inexpensive stamped grille. You touch it and it's sharp. It rattles in the wind. The die-cast grille costs more money and looks more elegant. It adds richness. You feel it and you know it costs more. It's stiffer and doesn't rattle in the wind.

QUESTION: What would you stylists do if the industry gave up its annual styling changes?

EXNER: There would still be plenty of work because there will always be this desire to have something better looking than the other fellow has.

SCHMIDT: We just wouldn't be so rushed.

QUESTION: Will the day come when the automobile will be completely devoted to passenger space, from stem to stern, rather than being divided into engine compartment, greenhouse and trunk?

EXNER: It's always easy to predict in this business because if you live long enough it will probably happen. But that hinges on the size of the power plant.

QUESTION: Do you think engines are coming down in size rather than getting bigger?

EXNER: I think so. They will, I think, get more efficient so they should get smaller. But that's strictly in the prediction department. Strictly a guess.





Fuel injection was virtually abandoned. Only one of the 1959 cars now offers it—Chevrolet. Pontiac and Chrysler dropped it so quietly no noise was heard. American Motors did also (in fact, AM hardly picked it up after its first flurry of publicity early in the 1958 season).

Push buttons went back into the Ford archives as Edsel (which last year was almost synonymous with push buttons) and Mercury decided they weren't worth the extra cost and effort.

Mention of Edsel brings to mind that this car celebrated (with muted horns) its first birthday. It was far from the lusty infant we had been promised at its christening party last year. It had picked a bad year to enter the medium-price field and its dream of 200,000 cars in the first year be-

came a reality of only 63,000 cars.

There was a death, too, in 1958. The great name of Packard was removed from the roster. The Packard car had been buried in Detroit a few years earlier when it was moved, in name only, to South Bend to become a luxurious version of the Studebaker. Now the masquerade has been given up and the name Packard has been put into a crypt beside Hudson and Nash.

But let's not linger in the graveyard. What about 1959? There have been some startling changes in product personalities, perhaps the most radical in history.

There was a time when the rash style leader, the car for the flashy set, was Ford. The Chevrolet was quiet, unobtrusive, substantial, but certainly not rash. Plymouth (after a long career as an old maid) became the glamor girl of 1957 and the young-inheart turned toward it lovingly. Now what has happened? Ford this year describes itself as the car with "dignity" unlike the "gaudiness or extremism" of its competitors. Chevrolet has switched faces and is now the industry's jazz-wagon. Plymouth is somewhere between. We've had a complete switch of roles—as though you had to learn the cast of characters all over again right in the middle of the third act.

Buick, too, has transmigrated. Gone is its fat, prosperous, overstuffed look, replaced by a sleekness, an alertness, that looks almost indecent in garages of long-time Buick owners.

Pontiac has had a similar change and Cadillac, once dignity on wheels, has entered the spaceship era.

Generally, styling is less "buckeye," less cornball, than in previous years. There is evidence of the increasing maturity of both



Glass is everywhere, with problems. Double-wrap windshields cut into the roof, causing annoying reflections on the inside of the glass. Rear windows curve well up into the roof, exposing rear-seat riders to the summer sun like plants in a hothouse. Glass is heavy, boosting car weight. Glass is expensive, boosting costs and insurance rates. But glass makes cars look modern and, the stylists hope, makes them sell.

Manufacturers are trying hard to mollify the customer. Today's cars may be bigger with more sheet metal to take care of, but they don't have to be polished, so permanent are the new paints. At least, that is what the manufacturers claim,. It is unlikely that car owners will give up this inexpensive form of recreation, however.

Exhaust systems are made of heavier metal, are coated with noncorrosive materials, are made with double-wall designs to lessen condensation, as companies try to increase the life span of this, the first to go of all parts.

Power steering is more effortless this year. General Motors has moved to the Chrysler concept of a full-time power assist. GM cars handle better than ever due to this and to their lower center of gravity.

Economy is the word of the year. Cars may cost more, but they're cheaper to run, say the ad writers. Refinements in the automatic choke of the 1959 Cadillac increase gasoline mileage by 10 percent. This could save the buyer of that \$6000 machine about \$20 a year—a critical saving, we all know, in the budget of a Cadillac owner! Yet the idea that gasoline economy is so important to the Cadillac owner indicates a trend.

More cars advertise that they use regular gasoline. Last year, they were bragging about their higher compressions, which made use of regular gasolines impossible.

And so the pendulum swings. But the full arc of the swing won't be realized until next fall when the industry presents its first really new car, the first completely new design, the first "we-started-with-a-clean-sheet-of-paper" model since the Model A replaced the Model T.

What this new small car (and there will be at least two of them by 1960) will do to the industry is anybody's guess and certainly you are entitled to make your own.

This reporter's guess is that within five years, these new "small" cars will have become the top-selling models and will bring back a once profitable export business.

As in musical chairs, there may not be enough seats to go around when these new cars take their big chunk of the market. Which makes will be left standing? Now it's your turn to guess!
