To the Editor:

I have just read the November issue of Popular Mechanics. I was particularly interested in an article titled, "Nature Pulls Plug—Lake Loses Water," by James J. Cox.

I have no idea who Mr. Cox received his information from, but I have never read an article in a national magazine with so many

complete falsehoods in it.

For one thing, and I quote Mr. Cox, "within a few days the five-mile long lake changes from fresh water to salt water." This statement could not be further from the truth. At no time in the history of the lake has it ever changed from fresh water to salt. It is true that there is a hole in the lake which, when the lake is high, drains off the excess water into the Gulf of Mexico. But only once has any salt ever got into the lake, and that was only a slight amount, about four percent of the amount in the Gulf. Since we are only six feet above sea level, it is rather difficult for salt water to go uphill into the lake, but at one time that did happen. The lake had just dropped



to the lowest level in years, and at the same time we had unusually high tides backed by a wind off the Gulf which did force some salt water into the lake.

Mr. Cox also claims that the last time the lake "pulled her stopper" was in August of 1957. This also is not true. The lake has been up and down at least five times this year alone. It is very doubtful that the hole is ever stopped up. We had about 73 inches of rain this year, and the lake has been high from time to time all year. When we get a lot of rain in a short time, the lake rises, since the hole cannot handle all the water pouring into the lake. As soon as the rain stops, the lake starts dropping. The hole is always open.

Also, to my knowledge there has been only one salt water fish caught in Lake Tarpon—a 4½ pound sheepshead, which was caught a short time ago. There are many ways that the fish could have gotten into the lake besides through the hole. Most salt water fish will live in fresh water, though they will not usually reproduce.

You may wonder why, if the hole is always open, the lake doesn't dry completely. There is a logical explanation for that. The hole is shaped like the drainage for a toilet bowl. When the lake is high, the pressure causes the water to rise and run through the trap and into the gulf until it sinks below the trap level. It holds that level

until it rises again.

When the lake is going down there is no visible sign at the hole, but at the outlet it boils up over the usual water line. The water flowing through the outlet forces out the salt water fish which normally stay in the outlet, and the result is very good fishing for a few days. I have never heard of any fresh water fish being caught at the outlet; when they feel the lake going down they swim away from the current. I have fished many times in the hole while the lake is going down, but I have never caught any kind of fish in it. Fishing will be good all around the hole, as they feed on the bits of food that are drawn to the hole.

There is no "billion-gallon exchange," as Mr. Cox describes it. It's strictly a oneway deal. He was evidently misinformed.

Lake Tarpon produces some of the largest largemouth bass in the world. We have customers from all over the country who come to fish for our lunker bass. When they read that the lake has turned to salt, they wondered if the salt killed out the fresh water fish in the lake. Since many of them don't fish in salt water, the article has done the lake a lot of harm.

Sidelights from the PENTAGON

By William R. Kreh

YOU'D BE SURPRISED at what things become dangerous in atomic submarines.

Things like hobby kits, paint, deck wax and

even cigarettes.

It all boils down to the fact that when you stay submerged for long periods of time, toxic substances in what are otherwise harm-

less things begin to build up.

The Navy found, for example, that the adhesive in hobby kits was 99 percent benzine, a highly toxic hydrocarbon. Commercial deck wax emitted more hydrocarbons, and cigarette smoke produced so much carbon monoxide over a period of time that on one of her early voyages the Nautilus had to come up for air. Conventional subs never had these problems because they couldn't stay sub-merged for more than 12 to 18 hours. The Navy says it has solved most of the toxic substance problems, but it's not saying how.

Speaking of submarines, men aboard them soon will be able to play shuffleboard. How? Simple. Mess tables are going to be installed in the subs with shuffleboard game markings on them and the men will play the game on the tables. Likewise for checkerboards and backgammon games. By painting them on the tables, there's no space required to store them.

The assault gun section of an Army cavalry unit in Korea has developed a sub-caliber firing device to be used on its M-56 tank destroyers. It's a 30-cal, carbine mounted in a steel support atop the recoil mechanism of each 90-mm. gun. The device is fired by sighting through the telescope of the gun and triggering the carbine with the electric trigger normally used to fire the big gun. Thus,

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN SCHOOLS

by B. Richard

A wise school investment offers you opportunity . . . a bogus education can mean disappointment. Invest your time and money in a school that offers the training and education you want, not merely in a diploma.

Some of the most startling manpower changes ever to take place in the economy of this country are expected to occur dur-

ing the next 10 years.

The United States Department of Labor forecasts that industry's demand for skilled craftsmen, professional, and technical workers will increase by almost five million in the next decade. Obviously allied occupations like accounting, law, real estate, and others will increase accordingly. This means that there will be literally millions of job opportunities for ambitious men who have technical knowledge and special skills, and who can put these skills to practical use in industry and daily living.

The Department of Labor forecasts there will be a one-million-worker decrease in industry's requirements for unskilled labor. Only a few years ago, the demand for unskilled labor was such that the great majority of job opportunities fell into the unskilled category. Experience during recent years shows that this picture has changed drastically and will continue to change at an increasingly accelerated pace in coming

vears.

What will happen to unskilled men who suddenly find themselves out of work, or facing less remunerative jobs, and how will the five million Americans needed to fill the demand for skilled positions, get the education and training necessary to increase their technological ability? The answer to this question lies in the field of adult education, and, for the most part, it will be advanced education and training that will permit students to work while in the process of learning new skills.

Among the major sources of adult education and training are correspondence and resident-training schools. To a greater degree than ever, such schools will help ambitious men realize the satisfactions and rewards that highly technical and respon-

sible jobs can bring them.

There are three main types of adult schools providing this type of training. Correspondence schools, for example, have been helping Americans learn new skills for many, many years. Education by means of correspondence has the advantage of

letting students set their own classroom hours so full-time jobs can be held while instruction courses are being taken. Lessons are worked out at home and returned to the school by mail. The school grades the student's work and usually returns the corrected material with a new lesson.

Resident-training schools combine classrooms and practical laboratory work. Students either live near the school, or, in some cases, stay at school dormitories during their courses of study. This type of school offers on-the-spot instruction in fields that require actual laboratory practice which the student does not have in his regular job or previous experience. In both types of schools students can hold parttime jobs while completing their education.

Some schools combine correspondence and resident training, and offer whichever method best suits the applicant's particular course of study and employment problem and meets his individual requirements.

All of these schools are providing a real service for the nation by giving ambitious men the opportunity for increased income and a better way of life and by helping to fill industry's demand for highly-skilled technicians, and trained job holders.

Because of greatly increasing opportunities for technically trained men, you might be thinking of taking correspondence or resident-training courses. Here are some key points to watch for and steps you can

take to get your money's worth:

In order to check on the school of your choice before you enroll, you might want to personally take a look at the school's facilities. If this is possible, you will be able to see first-hand the school's physical set up, personnel and method of operation; and you will be able to form an accurate judgment as to whether or not the school is satisfactory.

For many this is impossible. So another good check is to ask the school for names and addresses of graduates in your own community or state. Schools should be happy to furnish names so you can write or call on graduates in your neighborhood to get their views of the school and its courses.

Schools offering law, medical, or other technical degrees should be thoroughly checked if the degree can be earned in a very brief course. Degrees of this sort sometimes take years of intensive study and preparation, and a college degree might be considered a prerequisite. Institutions offering "doctor degrees" in such subjects as Hypnosis, Eclectic, Naturopathy, Metaphysics, for example, should be considered on the basis of what value the degree earned has in the community or area where you intend to practice.

If you are now in high school or are a recent graduate, your high school principal or advisor will be able to help you decide whether you are qualified for the particular training you have in mind. It is a good idea, if possible, to consult with such an advisor to be sure you're on the right track.

Be alert if the school salesman contacting you uses "high pressure" methods in getting you to sign a contract. You might well be wary if the salesman seems willing to sign everyone right on the spot, regardless of that individual's qualifications. Most schools screen applicants to be sure they meet set requirements before they are allowed to sign a contract, or suggest alternate courses if they feel the applicant is better suited to some other course of study.

You should be aware that schools usually cannot guarantee employment after you complete your course of instruction. It's true that schools can open the way for increased job opportunities and higher earnings, and many schools do have special departments organized to help students secure jobs; but, in the final analysis, the challenge of getting a better job rests with you. You must "sell" yourself, and your training, to a prospective employer.

At no time in your nation's history has there been such an accelerating demand for new techniques, skills, and for the trained and experienced man to translate this technical knowledge into action. The highly complex products and services of today's industrial system require well-trained men for technical and service work that is essential. the unit is able to train tankers without wasting expensive rounds. The Army says it's as effective as the real thing.

The Marine Corps, which always needs to move its gear in a hurry, is testing a new 50,000-gallon fuel-storage tank. When empty, the nylon, rubber-coated collapsible tank can be rolled and packed in a canvas bag.

The trade winds may prove to be as big a boon to modern communications men as they were to old-time sailing skippers. In experiments with the Air Force, the Navy found a radio-message funnel 500 feet thick at an altitude of 5000 feet, stretching between the coasts of South America and Africa, along

the same path as the trade winds.

The duct, which can carry signals for long distances with small loss of power the year around, is formed by the temperature-inversion layer—that is, where the temperature is warmer at high altitudes than it is at lower ones. This is caused when the prevailing trade wind rides up over the cooler air below. It forms a channel which catches a radio signal and bounces it along the 500-foot duct until it is detected by a receiver. With a transmitter of only 100 watts, signals were picked up 1430 miles away. The equipment operated at a frequency of 220 megacycles.

The Air Force and Navy are now looking into the possibility that the same holds true

in other trade-wind areas.

An Air Force staff sergeant recently made a simulated plunge of 71/2 miles in less than a second.

The "fall" took place in the altitude chamber at Mitchell Air Force Base, N. Y. The sergeant was placed in the chamber and an altitude of 65,000 feet was simulated. Suddenly he was "dropped" 25,000 feet while an electronic brain recorded his reactions. It measured the sergeant's body temperature, respiration flow, respiration rate, heartbeat rate, blood pressure and galvanic skin resistance during his fall. This electronic "doctor" was designed to monitor human reactions under severe environmental conditions such as those which the Astronauts will encounter.

The tradition of blackening rifle sights with soot may be on its way out. The Army's trying nongloss flat paint to see if it will do the trick. Also there is reportedly a move afoot to discourage use of the time-tested term "foxhole" among Army personnel. Some observers would like to substitute a name such as "fighting hole." The idea is that a foxhole is a refuge from which a fox is seldom seen to emerge!



Spotlight on the

Simca Etoile

By Art Railton

FOREIGN ENOUGH to be fascinating, but not so foreign as to be strange, the Simca "naturalizes" easily. Even avid America-Firsters won't have trouble liking this French import.

Biggest problem is learning how to pronounce its name. Etoile means "star" French and is pronounced "Eh-twall" (if that doesn't help you, Berlitz is your only

A major facelift of the Aronde, the 1960 Etoile is a neat compromise of fashion and utility. It's not flashy, neither is it drab.

The engine is an overhead-valve Four of 78.7 cubic inches. Compression is 6.8 to 1. It operates quietly on regular gasoline. Not quite square, the engine has a 2.91-inch bore and a 2.95-inch stroke, a conservative but not old-fashioned ratio.

Horsepower is rated at 50 which, in the foreign-car environment, sounds like a lot until you realize that the car weighs 2050 pounds, almost 500 pounds more than a Volkswagen and 12 pounds heavier than a Corvair.

Despite this weight, it gives reasonably good economy. In a city driving test on a cold March day with the temperature 10 above zero, the Etoile averaged 30.5 miles per gallon with sane, reasonable driving. A high-speed country test (with lots of hard driving) came up with fewer miles per gallon. The test route covered 45 miles of rural roads with about 20 stops and several hills. The average was 25.8 miles per gallon. For much of the route, the car was at full throttle (about 74 miles per hour true).





Here are some average acceleration times based on several two-way runs: From 0 to 60, 25.5 seconds; from 0 to 30, 6.2 seconds; from 40 to 60, 14.7 seconds (using third as a kicker). These are good figures for an economy sedan.

The speedometer is hopelessly optimistic. At 50 miles per hour on the speedo, true speed is 43. At 60, true speed is 52; at

70, true speed is 62 miles per hour.

The odometer is wrong in the other direction. You go two percent farther than it shows. When it reads 100 miles on the trip indicator, you have actually gone 102 miles.

Cornering is excellent. Those so inclined can drift it nonchalantly. There's a complete feeling of confidence on high-speed turns. Steering is fast and precise. The shift lever of the four-speed gearbox is on the steering column, but it doesn't suffer too much for it. You can drive the car without using the nonsynchromesh Low, except in hilly starts.

Ride has none of the "feel of the road" harshness you might expect. On chuckholes, it is pleasantly soft, has no tendency to break loose. On the boulevard, it smothers such minor irregularities as tar strips

quietly and without fuss.

Seats are high and well formed, providing plenty of thigh and back support. The back is especially comfortable (except for legroom) by small-car standards. Width is adequate only for two adults. Floor humps, front and rear, are small and unobtrusive. A stepdown in the rear increases seat height to a comfortable level.

Rear-wheel housings obtrude into the corners of the rear seat back, but are so positioned as not to interfere with comfort. This is a four-adult car, although six can be carried if two are small children.

The automatic choke is sensitive to the foot — beware! The engine kicks over promptly on the coldest day if you don't touch the accelerator pedal. Once it's firing, you can feed it gas, but before then,

stay off it.

Turn signals are time-controlled so you won't drive along with a blinker operating when you don't want to. They are thermostatically controlled, heat from the current flow operating the shutoff. It blinks for about 15 seconds. Occasionally, this is a nuisance. Long stoplight intervals sometimes make it necessary to restart the lights.

Price at the port of entry is \$1798, a bit high by import standards, but it includes such extras as heater, undercoating, windshield washer, full-flow oil filter, electric wipers, armrests on all four doors, dual horns and a trip mileage indicator. This last item (rare on today's cars) is reset by

a button right beside it.

A warning light blinks on when the gas tank level drops to one gallon. Generator and oil-pressure warning lights are so faint as to be useless on a sunny day. The high-beam indicator light is too far to the left to be a constant reminder to the driver that his brights are on. The dimmer switch is hand operated (part of a complex light switch located where the turn-signal lever normally is). This is good, it being easier to operate a dimmer switch with the hand than with a foot, especially in situations where braking and shifting are required.

The hot-water heater is inadequate on the highway at zero degrees, good in traffic. However, it does suck in exhaust fumes from the car ahead to such an extent that you often have to shut it off in self defense. The blower is much too noisy. By partially covering the heater grille (ahead of the radiator), heat is somewhat improved at highway speeds, says Simca.

It's impossible to fill the gas tank without spillage. There's no ashtray in the rear seat. At full throttle, there is an annoying resonance in the car, although at 60 miles per hour the noise level is low. The glovebox door is all plastic, including the hinge, and appears fragile.

Trunk room is excellent. The spare is carried in a well in the floor. Jacking points are provided near each wheel.

Wonder of wonders, the ignition key will go into the lock either way up, eliminating fumbling. The horn ring is a piece of heavy wire bent into the shape of a kidney and located beneath the steering wheel spokes. You flip the ring upward from underneath to blow the horns. Two horns are provided. A switch allows you to use both (a cheerful chirpy sound) or just one (a low-cost, tourist-rate sound). The horn ring, incidentally, does not turn with the wheel so it's always easy to find, even when cornering.

Wheelbase is 96.3 inches. Over-all, the car measures 13.5 feet. Width is 61.3 inches, leaving plenty of room in the garage for such important items as bikes and lawn-mowers.

Altogether, it's a most satisfactory car to drive in the city. It is reasonably nimble, pleasant to park, easy to enter and leave (although the pushbutton door handles are clumsy to use).

One word of warning: When you buy a Simca select your dealer carefully. In any car this is important, but in a foreign car it is vital. Make certain the man you buy it from understands the car, likes the car and genuinely wants you to like it.



Looking for a Bargain? Try the Post Office

WOULD YOU like to buy four slightly damaged FM radios for \$23? An electric skillet, a toaster and a slightly dented electric percolator - all for \$13? Or maybe you'd prefer 328 wigs for \$93. These items were sold for those amounts at a recent post-office auction, part of the contents of the half-a-million packages lost or damaged

in the mail every year.

Held periodically in more than a dozen major cities, post-office auctions are open to everyone, with lost or damaged items going to the highest bid over one dollar. Notices of up-coming auctions appear in newspapers, are tacked up on post-office walls and are mailed to regular customers. You can pick up free catalogs at the gallery before the sale, and some postmasters will even send you a catalog if you ask them.

However, to get rid of the thousands of items quickly, most of the material is gathered together in lots. So if you have your eye on a power saw, you may have to buy a belt sander and a sabre saw as well. Or, if you're looking for a cuckoo clock, you may end up with a dozen of them.

Lots on display the day before the auction are labeled with catalog numbers. Most articles are sold "as is," but if mechanical items are damaged, they are either listed as "in working order," which usually means that they are merely dented or scratched, or "not in working order."

On sale day, a fast-talking auctioneer sells lots at the rate of 100 per hour, with bidding done by lot number. A 50 percent deposit is required on all purchases.

Items cannot be picked up the day of the sale, but must be out of the post office within a few days. Transportation home is up to you, as is the job of boxing your purchases. Post offices often have extra cartons that are yours for the asking.

Private bidders find dealers chief competition (something like four-fifths of the merchandise is bought for resale), so you have a better chance to get bargains if you're interested in offbeat items.

Biggest dead-parcel branches are in New York and Chicago, where auctions are held three or more times a year. Other cities, where there are at least two sales a year (depending on volume of goods on hand) are Atlanta, Boston, Cincinnati, Fort Worth, New Orleans, Omaha, St. Louis, St. Paul, San Francisco, Seattle, Washington, D. C., San Juan, P.R. and Honolulu.



The "Big E" Dies With Her Boots On




Last Winter, a deafening staccato roar echoed through the cavernous hangar deck of the U.S.S. Enterprise. The ragged din was punctuated by an occasional boom as gigantic chunks of her steel superstructure broke loose and fell screeching against torn bulkheads. The glare of white fire slashed the dark spaces below decks. . . .

The scenic and sound effects were nothing new to the "Big E."


Launched at Newport News, Va., in 1936, the mighty flattop was in the thick of nearly every major Pacific battle during World War II. On June 4, 1942, in the Battle of Midway-remembered in Navy circles as "The Stalingrad of the Pacific"—the big aircraft carrier got her baptism of fire in a hellroaring fight that saw her own squadrons kill three Japanese carriers and a cruiser. From then, through the Coral Sea and Solomons campaigns, the Big E's guns and planes were seldom silent. In her second engagement she absorbed a thundering cascade of Jap bombs and torpedos-the first of seven terrible batterings she was to take from Kamikazes, torpedo bombers and enemy subs before the end of the war. After each one, the gallant lady patched up her wounds and returned to fight again. All told, she fought in 20 of the 22 naval battles in the Pacific and was credited with sinking 71 enemy ships and destroying 911 of his planes.

But this time she won't be back. The chattering racket was not her 40-mm. antiaircraft batteries spattering the sky with flak, but a battery of air hammers chewing up her flight deck. The booming roars of tumbling steel involved no enemy bombs. The fires glared from oxyacetylene torches. All last winter the Big E was coming apart systematically, piece by piece, in a dreary shipyard on the Hackensack River in Kearney. N. J. As you read this the last chunks of her once great hull are rumbling away in gondola cars to the melting pots.

Dismantling a 21,622-ton, 827foot seagoing monster takes a lot of doing-you don't just start chopping her willy-nilly from the top down. Careless changes in balance and buoyancy would capsize her or set up stresses that would bend her backbone and

split her wide open. More than a year ago. when the Enterprise was bought by Lipsett, Inc. for \$561,000 (she had cost more than \$19 million to build), the company turned her over to W. Henry Hoffman, their square-jawed, veteran ship-demolisher. Hoffman had directed the dismantling of the battleships New Mexico, Idaho and Wyoming shortly after the war, and was the master mind behind the nearly impossible job of cutting up the fire-weakened hulk of the French liner Normandie after it had been righted and refloated.

The first job on the Enterprise, says Hoffman, was to cut down her 36-foot mast and lower it to the deck so she'd clear the East River bridges on the way out of the Brooklyn Navy Yard. Once tied up in the Hackensack, 100 men swarmed over the big ship armed with oxyacetylene torches and jack




Steel moves from cutters' torches right into waiting gondola cars for the trip to the melting pots


hammers, fed by hoses that snaked across the decks in every direction. First to go was the bridge and island structure, sliced into great vertical sections by the torches, boomed over the side in 15-ton chunks and lowered into waiting gondola cars. The biggest piece measured 36 feet long, 15 feet wide and 9 feet high.

But the biggest nuisance was the flight deck. "There's a prevailing idea that all old carriers had teak flight decks," says Hoffman. "They haven't-most were Douglas fir, and so was the Big E's. The fastest way to get it out was to smash it apart with air hammers." For weeks, rows of men, shuddering over the bouncing bars of their demolition weapons, marched slowly down



a flight deck equal in size to three football fields, and sent the splinters flying. And for weeks bonfires roared in the yard as incredible mountains of lumber were burned.


Out came the three huge airplane elevators—"One hundred percent aluminum," says Hoffman—sliced by the torches into 8 by 20-foot slabs that could be stacked in the railroad cars. Hull and deck plating, cut into 8 by 40-foot chunks, soared away on the cranes. In the meantime, hundreds of miles of heavy copper cable from the ship's complex electrical nervous system was hauled up on deck and chopped into twofoot sections by a thumping table shear that operated like a guillotine. The cable chunks were tossed like logs onto fires where the insulation was burned away so the valuable copper conductors could be melted down later at the scrap yard.


Torch cutters began to whittle away cautiously at the 140-foot stern overhang—removing the entire fantail in one gigantic piece. Then off came a chunk of bow superstructure, to balance the fore and aft weight. Nibbled away first at one end, then the other, the once mighty *Enterprise* gradually assumed the look of a row of building blocks, stacked four high in the center and

dropping away in giant steps to the water line at each end.


"You've got to watch your stresses like a hawk," Hoffman points out. "When the top decks are off, rain water collects in the hull and can add a lot of weight where you don't expect it. Then, too, there's no buoyancy in the bow keel-it's a dead weight tugging against the rest of the ship." You could see what he meant when you stared down at the 140-foot, sword-like projection of steel jutting forward from the fat, tapering hull. To check the stresses along the ship's deck plates and hull structure, Hoffman prowled through her each morning with a delicate strain gauge, ordering so many tons taken from here and moved to there, like a chemist adjusting a balance, but on a Paul Bunyan scale. "If you don't do it," he says, you're heading for trouble."


The veteran ship un-builder can cite a dozen grim examples of near catastrophes on other salvage jobs. In one instance, the hull of a big liner, in the process of demolition, cracked in two places reaching far below the water line from heavy strains on the structure in an unexpected storm. Hoffman saved it by putting a crew to work sewing two gigantic canvas tubes which he

wrapped around the hull over the splits and inflated like a couple of tires.

To remove the *Enterprise's* heavy, nonbuoyant chunk of bow, crews first loaded tons of scrap steel in the empty well of the aft boiler room. The effect was like putting a fat man in the stern of a light dinghy. The bow lifted and the burners went to work with their torches.

Hoffman is proudest of the way he solved the problem of removing the carrier's four monster shafts and propellers. "The outboard shafts extended 85 feet from the hull housings, and they were still four feet under water after we'd lightened her up as much as possible," he reveals. "They weighed 26 tons apiece, plus 13 tons for each propeller. So I sent down a skin diver who put a buoyed cable choker around the shaft. Then the diver sat on the shaft, near the housing where it entered the ship, and burned a deep notch in the top half of it with an underwater torch. When he finished, we burned off the outboard bearing supports—and the whole shaft broke right off, just like a tree being felled. We picked up the buoy, hooked the choker to the hoist on a 50-ton gantry crane, and lifted the whole works out of the mud. In two days, all the shafts and propellers were up in the yard."

With shafts out, sternbacks could be burned away and the upper decks (Continued to page 236)

AN EYE ON SPACE

9F WE'RE GOING SPACE TRAVELING, we'd better take a look at the Universe we're heading into.

One view is that our known Universe is a shining collection of galaxies which perhaps is limited in extent, which is curved, and which somehow doubles back on itself, leading us always home again. Another theory holds that the Universe is "straight," that it stretches endlessly, and is infinite and expanding.

Still another theory says that our Universe is infinite, but is negatively curved—and expanding, too. It may be possible for Earthlings to discover the architecture of the Universe by studying the distribution of galaxies in space. In any case, these are the thoughts of some scholarly Earthlings. This is how they feel about the unending wonder of creation.

We also should think about *time*—how long it has gone on or could go on. What was the "beginning" of the Universe?

First let's take the views of the British mathematician and astronomer, Fred Hoyle. He and his colleagues believe that it is possible to think of a Universe which *never* actually had a beginning, but always existed—what is called a "steady state" Universe. Thus time never had a beginning. This Universe is always changing; galaxies form and disappear, hydrogen is converted to helium, mass disappears and radiant energy appears.

Thus, according to Hoyle, matter remaining in our known Universe changes in amount when galaxies go "over the border" at a distance of several billion light-years. (At the "border" galaxies are traveling away from us at almost the speed of light. Thus the *space* there is expanding with almost the speed of light, and the light coming toward us from such a galaxy can't quite make up the ever-growing new distance.) On the other hand, hydrogen somehow appears within our reach or within our view to take the place of the lost galaxies. This particular aspect Hoyle calls "continuous creation" in a Universe of flux, or a "steady state" Universe.

In contrast, along with Abbe LeMaitre, we can think of a definite moment of "beginning"—the moment, for example, when the primitive atom containing all matter and energy exploded. Such a Universe is called an "evolving" one, the galaxies forever moving apart, the Universe "thinning out."

Once upon a time Earthlings thought that their region—called Europe and Asia—constituted the Universe. Later they thought that other regions and great oceans made up the Universe, and they called it Earth. The heavens, they thought, moved around this Earth. Still later, they learned that the sun had a family, and Earth was only one member. At last came the knowledge that other stars were suns and perhaps had families of their own.

The Universe grew. Or, rather, the minds of Earth-people grew. The Universe only waited to be discovered.

There are a trillion other galaxies within reach of our telescopes. But the telescopes are puny. The known Universe is not much known.


"I feel a religiosity," said Einstein, contemplating the grandeur of the shining heavens. It is not necessary to board a space ship in order to go out of this "world" to the suburbs of infinity. Earth-people are already in space. The Earth is a space ship circling the sun. And the sun is but a minor member of a galaxy rushing away from other galaxies through a great space that may be a minor part of a Universe of incredible beauty.

Automatic Brakes "Read" The Road

Antiskid unit is easily installed by gearing it to the speedometer drive mounted on the drive shaft







STEP ON the pedal and it is an accelerator. Release your foot and it becomes the brake. This single-unit accelerator and brake for automobiles has an antiskid mechanism that makes it virtually impossible for a driver to lock wheels and skid.

Developed by Perma Research of Pawtucket, R. I., the automatic brake will be on the market by fall.

Many automobile accidents result from the inability of the driver to apply the optimum in braking action demanded by existing road conditions. Until now, the principle of the automobile brake has been essentially the application of pressure transmitted from pedal to pump and lines, to the cylinders and brake shoes and drums. Control of that pressure in relation to adverse road conditions has, until now, been impossible. In a panic situation, human reactions dictate sudden braking action, and the results of this action, locked wheels and skidding, take control of the car out of the driver's hands. The ideal, of course, would be a system positively preventing wheel lockup while maintaining maximum braking on the road surface. This the automatic brake does quickly and efficiently.

Extensive testing has shown that optimum braking is achieved when and if the brakes are applied to the extent that they hold the wheels on the verge of locking—at a point where the movement of the wheel

is about to change from a roll to a skid. The skill of the average driver is not enough to do this in the time involved. Locked wheels mean greater stopping distances. Locked rear wheels result in a spin; locked front wheels in a loss of directional control. These are the problems the automatic antiskid brake is intended to solve. Its entire assembly weighs about eight pounds. Shown above is a diagram of the brake's component parts—the modulating control valve and the antiskid unit, working in conjunction with a conventional hydraulic brake unit. A combination accelerator and brake pedal is connected to the modulating control valve. Upon release of the pedal into its braking zone the throttle linkage rotates, moving the valve's piston. By means of this valve and piston arrangement, the vacuum and atmospheric pressure operating the hydraulic power unit are controlled according to the speed with which the driver removes his foot from the pedal. Thus the power unit supplies any amount of power for brake pressure without any effort on the driver's part. With about five minutes of practice this writer was able to bring the car to a halt at speeds ranging from a slow glide to a quick smooth stop with two wheels on pavement and two on gravel at over 50 m.p.h.-without a skid. Without the necessity of having to remove one's foot from pedal to pedal, total reaction time is cut by more than half. Tests indicate that at 60 m.p.h., stopping distance is cut by 66 ft.


The antiskid unit remains inactive during normal driving and braking conditions. However, in an emergency, where there is a tendency to "over brake," it jumps into action. Imagine a situation where a quick stop is necessary and the road is slick. Another car suddenly appears. The average driver's first reaction—slam on the brakes! With no pedal to push, however, braking would begin the moment the driver's foot left the pedal. As full and sudden braking pressure is applied, the wheels tend to lock. Here the antiskid unit relieves just enough braking pressure to prevent a wheel lockup. Should the ice suddenly give way to dry surface, the governor senses the change and as the wheels find greater traction, the increase in speed causes the governor to speed up. Just enough braking pressure is reapplied to slow the wheels again. Thus the governor responds instantaneously with the optimum pressure necessary to effect as rapid a deceleration as road conditions permit.

Mechanical failure in any part of the braking system, including the antiskid unit itself, immediately triggers a safety circuit. A loss of vacuum pressure is immediately made up for by rendering the fluid system independent of vacuum supply so that emergency braking power is available. Should there be a loss of fluid, the remaining fluid is diverted to serve as a reserve, in which case a warning light alerts the driver. The brakes then lock making it impossible to drive a brakeless car. ***



This Photograph Came From the Moon!

Demonstrating the effectiveness of their new Moon-relay radio system, Navy communications experts transmitted this radiophotograph of the carrier *Hancock* from Opana, Hawaii, to Annapolis, Md., making the round trip of 480,000 miles in 2½ seconds. Motor Governor Controls Ski Boat

One of the toughest boat-driving jobs is maintaining a constant speed while pulling water skiers in a tournament; the rules only allow a one-mile-perhour variation, which is very difficult for a human driver to manage. A new automatic speed limiter, actually a speed governor, holds the boat at a preset speed, despite a skier's deliberate efforts to slow it down by heavy crisscrossing through the wake. The instrument works on the Bourdon principle, measuring the water resistance to a curved metal tube, then controlling the boat's speed electrically through the ignition system.

HOW MUCH revolution can you take? Detroit continues to bust its seams with new ideas.

Gone are the quiet, let's-pace-ourselves years in which a major decision was the shape of the hood ornament. Now the industry runs scared—scared of the other fellow's imagination and daring.

Next comes a revolution in trucks. A whole new concept is about to be born. Much credit here (as in the small-car revolt) goes to Volkswagen. It opened Detroit's eyes to an economy-truck market.

In 1959 Volkswagen sold 30,000 trucks (including station wagons). The ubiquitous VW commercial vehicle is as much in demand as the sedan (in some places in greater demand).

Ford and Chevrolet know a money maker when they see one. This fall, Ford introduces a line of economy trucks patterned after the VW—except it will have a front engine, rear-wheel drive.

Both makes will offer a wagon, a panel truck and a pickup. All will be cheap-to-run, light-load-capacity vehicles for dry cleaners, bakers, appliance dealers, dress shops and the hundreds of other businesses that require lots of "cubics" but relatively little weight capacity.

Ford's engine will probably be the Falcon six (perhaps with a little more displacement). It will mount between two front seats. Later may come front-wheel drive.

Corvair's commercial line will have the air-cooled rear engine, of course. Those who have driven the bus model say it runs so quietly and smoothly that you suspect it's a jet! There's no vibration or engine fuss at all, they say. Big as a house inside, the bus is regular Corvair length over-all. There's much less "bus-iness" about it than in the VW, especially for the driver.

Don't lie awake worrying how Chevrolet solved the rear loading problem. The platform above the rear engine is said to be only 30 inches or so above the pavement. The trick may have been to use two air cleaners, one on each side. This would reduce engine height several inches under that in the passenger car.

Look for a boom in camping conversions for these bus-type vehicles. In Europe, such conversions are big business. Once the American camper discovers how convenient touring can be in one of these motorized homes, custom builders will boom.

What about the big cars? Interest in them seems to be lagging somewhat as the compacts run with the ball this year. Next year, things may be different.

For 1961, the entire GM big-car line will be freshly styled with a nice-to-have-itback emphasis on common sense. Seats will be higher, cushions thicker, windshield

won't wrap so much. Sense is even returning to the trunk. Lids are said to open so wide and so low that you'll almost be able to slide your luggage into the trunk. Overall lengths will be down slightly and roofs (you'll never believe this) will be raised!

But there won't be any transaxle—that is aimed at 1962. So much has to be retooled for that (floorpan, drive line, rear axle) that there isn't enough time.

Buick's up-coming compact has a full width, egg-crate grille with, of course, four headlights (even the up-coming Rambler American has four). Side panels on the Buick small car are sculptured very similarly to those on the 1960 Buick. Taillights are small. No fins. The rear deck is wide and flat; the trunk roomy.

American Motors is rushing ahead a new six-cylinder engine, but it's still a year or two away. Studebaker's new six is ex-

Lincoln may come out only as the Continental Mark something-or-other. Two models are expected: A four-door hardtop; a four-door softtop. Lincoln apparently has given up its battle for the diamond-tiara crowd and now is going after the thick-walleted young-in-hearts.

Cadillac keeps the same engine, but is more conservative with higher roof.

Corvair styling is virtually unchanged, but there will be more trunk room, a bigger gas tank and an improved heater.


Chrysler engineering is working for the most part on refinements. Displacements will be smaller in all but the Imperial. The alternator will be used across the board. You won't recognize Dodge and Plymouth, so drastic will be sheet-metal changes. The body shell will not change from 1960. There will be a 1961 DeSoto. As usual, it will be a Chrysler with jazzed-up trim.

Ford and Mercury may share the same body shell next year, with Mercury dropping a couple of its models.

An all-new and spectacular German Ford Taunus is coming. Maybe this is to be Ford's big bid for the under-100-inch-wheelbase market.

THE ROCKET with the man in its nose was starting its plunge toward earth and Q. C. Harvey was watching its descent on the radar screen in the high-range control room at Edwards.

Harvey pushed the button on his mike. "X-15 this is Earphone One," he said. "You look real good. Everything appears normal. Do you read me?"

"Rog, Q.C. Have started re-entry procedure."


The X-15 rocket was still in space over a neighboring state and yet from the windowless control room at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif. the test conductor was figuratively peering over the pilot's shoulder. The radar plotting board showed the geographical location of the X-15 as well as its speed and altitude. Oscillographs duplicated the readings of important cockpit instruments. Technicians were watching scores of meters that told the story of temperatures, pressures and performance.


Even the heartbeat of the pilot was being recorded. All this information was coming by radar and radio telemeter from the X-15.

Q. C. Harvey is responsible for the lengthy, careful countdown that precedes a flight and can cancel it right up to drop time if something goes wrong. During a flight he advises the pilot on procedures





and passes on information that may be radioed from chase planes.


Usually Q.C.'s job looks easy. The pilot flies from memory a flight he had rehearsed on a simulator. He knows when to pull the nose of the X-15 up toward the sky, when to go over the hump in a ballistic trajectory and the angle at which he should re-enter the atmosphere.

Harvey can tell at once if the vehicle

departs from its program. Usually nothing goes wrong but there are alternate procedures that can be adopted, alternate landing fields that can be used if something does.

The X-15 is called a manned research vehicle rather than an airplane. It has a stubby wing and landing gear so it can land like an airplane. But in most other respects it is a true rocket. In many ways


Cutaway drawing of the X-15 shows how the big, 50,000-pound-thrust engine crowds the craft when installed

Ground crewman checks out cockpit instruments and controls of X-15 several days before a new flight is scheduled to begin


it is like a wartime German V-2. It is three feet longer, weighs a couple of tons more and develops almost as much thrust. Its estimated top speed, in excess of 4000 m.p.h., compares with the 4000 m.p.h. top speed of a V-2. Its peak altitude, in excess of 100 miles, is about the same. It carries 2000 pounds of pilot and instruments instead of 2000 pounds of explosive.

North American Aviation has built three X-15's under a contract with the Air Force, Navy, and National Aeronautics and Space Administration. Each craft is 50 feet long with a span of 22 feet. The skin is a heat-treated nickel-steel alloy over a structural frame of titanium and stainless steel. Aluminum is used internally. In addition to its ordinary aerodynamic controls the X-15 has eight tiny jet nozzles in the nose and four in the wings. These reaction controls are used by the pilot at the edge of space.

The first X-15's early flights were powered by a pair of rocket motors that developed 16,000 pounds of thrust on water-alcohol and liquid oxygen. Later a single motor that develops 50,000 pounds of thrust on liquid ammonia and liquid oxygen was installed. The motor can be throttled, can be turned on and off in flight. It consumes more than seven tons of fuel and oxidizer in 88 seconds at


Underground Cruiser Assembled in Cave




Houseboat From Pickup Coach

Piggy-back coaches to fit pickup truck bodies have become pretty common sights-on pickup trucks -but one manufacturer has gone a step further. His coach also mounts on a decked pontoon float to become a houseboat as well. Three basic units—truck, float and coach - provide a mobile home, office, houseboat, or hunting cabin. The cab-over model is best for houseboat uses, since the overhang not only provides more sleeping space but doubles as a sunshade for the driver when the coach goes vacationing afloat.



"Bustle" for Missile

Built into the Martin Mace tactical missile for use during training and test flights, two air-inflated, Neoprene-coated nylon bags have provided the answer to the problem of recovering the fast, wheelless craft intact. The "ground pilot" brakes the remote-controlled missile with three 100-foot cargo chutes, which lower it onto the air cushions for a soft landing on any surface. The recovery method has made the Mace a reusable training tool and a safe vehicle for instrument testing, where before it was a one-shot weapon with no landing equipment. If a malfunction should occur after launching on a test flight, the missile can then be flown back, landed, and reused without damage or loss of the expensive test instruments.



Artificial Planetoid Explores Space Between Earth and Venus

AT EIGHT O'CLOCK in the morning on March 11, a big three-stage Thor-Able missile left Cape Canaveral, Fla., balanced on its fiery tail with 165,000 pounds of thrust. Four and a half minutes later, at an altitude of about 300 miles, it hurled Pioneer V, our tenth successful space-research vehicle, into interplanetary space at 24,869 miles an hour, 575 miles an hour above escape velocity and only 150 miles an hour short of its planned speed.

Inside the 26-inch, 94.8-pound sphere are two radiation counters, a magnetometer, a device to count micrometeorites, and two radio transmitters. Mounted on paddle-wheel appendages outside the sphere are 4800 solar cells that charge the batteries to operate the radio transmitters.

The instruments will report on experiments in communication, radiation, magnetism, and matter in the solar corona. It is the first space vehicle to penetrate "deep space" and report its findings.

Launched in the direction opposite to the Earth's path around the sun (although it will orbit in the same direction as the Earth), Pioneer V will drop backward and sunward into an elliptical orbit between the orbits of Earth and Venus. As it breaks out of our gravitational field and into the sun's, it will accelerate and stabilize its speed at around 70,000 miles an hour, about halfway between the speeds of Earth and

Venus. Traveling 527 million miles in its 311-day orbit, it will reach the innermost point (perihelion) on the 151st day out-74.7 million miles from the sun and six or seven million miles outside Venus' orbit. Pioneer V's orbit was first predicted at 295 days (see diagram above), but corrected calculations place it at 311. Its outermost point (aphelion), will be about 93 million miles from the sun. At that time Earth will be at a different point in its own orbit, and the two satellites of the sun won't be likely to collide, though within the next 10 years the planetoid may come within several hundred thousand miles of Earth-a near miss by astronomical standards. After the first few million miles, the five-watt radio trasmitter in Pioneer V isn't strong enough to maintain contact, and the big 150-watt transmitter goes to work, using the smaller unit as a booster amplifier. It broadcasts only five minutes in each five hours, storing accumulated information in tiny memory devices between transmissions while the solar cells recharge the batteries for the next five-minute transmission.

The 150-watt signal should be received by the Jodrell Bank radiotelescope until Pioneer V is 50 million miles out. Since the transmitter is designed to work indefinitely, it is hoped that it will still be working when the satellite swings back within radio range sometime in 1963.







And Their Complaints

But everything is not perfect—it never is. And these Valiant owners have some gripes. However, 14.7 percent of them say there's not a thing wrong with the car.

Leading the complaint list is poor workmanship with 20.0 percent mentioning it. After this, come water leaks in the body, poor gasoline economy, door design and operation, and then body rattles and squeaks, in that order. These quotations describe the complaints:

"General workmanship is only fair. Here and there, bolts are not tight, some are missing. Wires are snarled, paint not uniform, welding in body especially sloppy, sheetmetal screws stripped. Bumper is rusting already."—New York engineer.

"In heavy rain, trunk and right door leak."—Pennsyl-

vania housewife.

"Gas mileage always less than 20 miles per gallon. On a metered gas test it got 23 miles per gallon at 50 miles per hour, 13 miles per gallon at 75. I must use high-test gas to keep engine from pinging. I get 17 miles per gallon overall and have a handshift transmission."-Texas sales man-

"Lousy gas mileage. I have an automatic transmission and get 14.2 miles per gallon in the city. If you could get the economy advertised this car would be a natural for a small family."—Minnesota vice-president.

"Difficulty with doors. They won't close properly. If I lock doors I can't open them."—Illinois physician.

"Door latches freeze so doors won't stay shut after washing car in low temperature."—New York broker.

"Even though it is of unibody construction, the rattles are paramount. I have had the entire car checked seven times by the dealer for this."-Michigan district manager.

"Shift lever is too short. We have added a four-inch extension and find it better, especially when shifting to sec-

ond."-Florida foreman.


"Shifting although smooth is troublesome. The passenger space is shortened considerably. There is no reason why shift couldn't be on the steering column."-New York unemployed worker.

Here's the new public lament: Workmanship. You demanded and got smaller cars. Let's see what you can do about workmanship.








It's Flamed and Pin-Striped— What Is It?


"THE ONLY flamed and pin-striped louver press in captivity"-that's how Ken Mac-Dowell describes his strange-looking interconnection of pipes at a body shop in Cleveland, Ohio. Ken completed the press when he was discharged from the Army. He built it by himself and "striped and flamed it just to be different," he says. And different it is, so different that it's difficult to tell what it might be used for. His louver press makes the familiar vents often found in car hoods. Such vents remove hot air from the engine compartments of hot rods and race cars, and also give a mark of individuality to custom cars and stock cars. The frame of the press is five-inch welded tubing. The press operates by hydraulic pressure with a twohorsepower motor and a 1000 p.s.i. pump. Incorporated in the system is an accumulator filled with 800 pounds of air, used to give speed to the upper louver die, insuring a clean cut. A pressure relief valve cuts out at 950 p.s.i., after the accumulator has been filled with the specific volume to complete one punch. Movement of the die is controlled by a solenoid-operated selector valve. There is a maximum hydraulic pressure of 15,000 pounds, which is more than adequate to form louvers in average-size hood metal. The body shop where Ken uses his machine is called "Customville," quite an appropriate place for such a customized louver press.



Letter Sorter Cancels Stamps



Actually two machines working in tandem, the "facer-scanner" does away with the chore of separating long and short envelopes. As the envelopes stream through, the machines' electronic scanners locate positions of the stamps and directs the envelopes to one of four canceling dies, and then stacks them automatically.

Model "Mother" Feeds Animals

Orphan and stray animals who are taken to a Brooklyn, N.Y., shelter are fed milk from an artificial "mother." The device is effective in pacifying many species of animals. "Mother" consists of eight bottles with nipples stuck through holes in a board. The board itself has been covered with rabbit fur. On occasion, dogs, cats, minks, ferrets and other animals have peacefully dined together at this unique feeding board.









Do-It-Yourself Vacuum Tubes From Kits


MODERN physics requires experiments with mysterious, expensive vacuum tubes which defy production in ordinary school laboratories. 

Can a jet pilot fire his ejection seat underwater? A Navy pilot rides a seat down on a rig to find out



THE NAVY NEEDS a device that will automatically get a pilot out of his plane after it crashes into the sea. That was the conclusion of Navy scientists who recently completed unusual underwater tests designed to find:

 What happens to a jet and its pilot when it crashes in water?

- Why don't some pilots escape?
- Can a pilot open a plane's canopy 20 eet under?
- Would a pilot drown trying to swim up from a depth of 100 feet?
- What happens when a pilot fires his ejection seat underwater?

During World War II, pilots who crashed at sea had several minutes to escape from their comparatively buoyant planes. Present-day jet planes generally sink within 20 seconds after crashing. The Navy wanted to know why more pilots who crashed into the sea couldn't be saved.

Under direction of the Navy's Engineering Development Department at the Naval Air Development Center, Johnsville, Pa., a group of obsolete fighter planes was sent to Key West, Fla. The planes were crashed into the Gulf Stream from a height of 50 feet to simulate an accidental fall from the deck of an aircraft carrier. The pilot should have a good chance to live in this type of accident, but many of them have died. Underwater cameras, instruments and a manshaped dummy were installed inside the aircraft to obtain a record of the effect of water impact. Underwater photographers took movies of the aircraft as it sank and instruments registered information to a depth of 130 feet. Salvage divers recovered the aircraft so recording equipment could be removed and the aircraft inspected for structural damage that might cause death.

These tests revealed that the pilot in all probability will be stunned and that the plane will sink fast. At a depth of 20 feet, water pressure crushed the canopy covering the cockpit and the Plexiglas slashed the dummy pilot. To prevent this implosion of the canopy, a valve has been designed which allows water to fill the cockpit gradually and reduce the pressure.


When a plane sinks, the rush of water is directed against the canopy. Could a pilot push the canopy off against this flow and escape? Tests were performed with a cockpit section of an aircraft mounted on the deck of a submarine to determine what force was needed to push the canopy open. A diver dressed in a pilot's standard flight equipment rode the seat down as the submarine submerged to simulate a sinking aircraft. Underwater television cameras and instruments relayed information to engineers inside the sub. The diver, who was in good physical condition, was able to push his way free.

Would the pilot drown while swimming to the surface from a depth of 100 feet? Divers at the Naval Diving Research Tank at New London, Conn., answered that question. They tested the latest pilot bail-out oxygen system that had been modified for underwater use. It proved to be satisfac-



Ready to ride down on the side of a submarine, rescue divers and photographers follow each experiment


Dummies as well as human volunteers tested the ejection seat under water. It was no way to escape



tory even when used at a depth of 100 feet. Pilots will now be able to breathe underwater as well as at high altitudes.

The tests, as well as actual accidents, indicate it will be necessary to develop a system which will automatically remove a pilot with safety from his aircraft should it crash into the sea, for most pilots are stunned or knocked unconscious by the impact. Even a well-trained pilot sometimes is unable to perform the necessary steps to get out of his plane. It was hoped that a temporary solution to this problem might be to fire the pilot's ejection seat underwater until an automatic system could be developed. Human and dummy ejection tests were conducted at Key West to evaluate the ejection seat. Preliminary tests indicated that the seat wouldn't operate underwater unless certain modifications were made. And then, even though the seat was made to fire underwater, it wasn't a safe means of escape: It travels through the water at such great speeds a pilot can be injured by the waterdrag forces.

Navy researchers, with the help of these unusual experiments, are now trying to develop a device that will save high-flying jet pilots from the sea.

Flying Saucer? No, a Shakespearean Theater


WHAT APPEARS to be the launching site of a spectacular flying saucer is actually the roof of the unusual Shakespearean theater in Boston. Eliminating the need for center supports, the nylon roof consists of two layers, 145 feet in diameter, joined at the outer edges by an oversize zipper and anchored to a steel hoop by turnbuckles. The central area between the two layers is 20 feet thick. Tilting downward toward the stage at a noticeable angle, the saucer gives the appearance that it is sailing

through space. Constant air pressure within the envelope is delivered from a pump house by a metal pipe, extending up over the stage like a hot-air furnace duct. Atop the dome, an aluminum air vent allows a set amount of pressure to escape for safety control. This air, in turn, is used for the cooling system. Besides withstanding winds up to 70 miles an hour, engineers claim that the novel design of the roof gives the unusual Shakespearean theater excellent acoustics.

Flexibility helps nylon roof withstand strong winds. It bounces freely six inches in each direction

T WAYSIDE GARDENS in Mentor, Ohio is a room in which there are 150,000 frozen plants. The plants, all perennials, were dug out of the ground last November and can stay refrigerated at 26 degrees below freezing until the end of June. From the freezer these perennials will be thawed and sold to Wayside's lateordering customers in first-rate condition for replanting-first-rate because their frozen dormancy has prevented them from reacting to the spring growing season. And since there will be no top growth, there will be no danger of heating and decomposition while the packed plants are enroute to customers-nor will there be wilting or difficulties for the customer after planting late in the season.

Wayside Gardens' plant-freezing operation is just one of many innovations this nursery has added to its grounds in the past five years. All but a few of Wayside's mechanical improvements, in fact, have appeared since World War II: Electronic business machines, irrigation and freezing systems; mechanical weeders, planters and diggers; wrapping and stapling machines; and steam-sterilization equipment (used to sterilize potting soil). Many non-mechanical improvements, too, have marked big-nursery progress since the end of World War II.

When J. J. Grullemans, president of Wayside Gardens, co-founded the nursery back in 1920, he and his men used horses for pulling cultivating and digging machines. Such a machine as a front-end loader, regarded now as a necessity at the nursery, was unknown. Today there are no horses on Wayside's 600 acres—in their place are 14 tractors, nine trucks and two electric carts. Labor was cheap and

plentiful in 1920. But this has changed since Mentor, 22 miles northeast of Cleveland, began sprouting industry. Now much of the work that was done by hand labor is done by machine.

The mechanical planter, for instance, can put 50,000 shrubs in the ground in a single day, with the help of four men. Without this machine, it once took 15 or 20 men to plant 10,000 shrubs in a day's time. And the machine does a better job!

In Wayside's offices, the bookkeeper's ledger shows a big saving since the recent introduction of modern packaging machines. Another saver of time and labor is the mechanical weeder, an attachment that can be added to any small tractor. It consists of three pairs of slowly revolving sets of pointed, fingerlike appendages, the first two sets made of rubber. Without hurting the plants, these rubber appendages agitate the top quarter-inch of soil around the plants and keep weed seedlings

from rooting. The third set of appendages—thin steel spokes—throw dirt back to the plants. One of these rigs can keep 50 acres clean of weeds.

Many of the new mechanical ideas that have come to the nurseries were conceived by the nurserymen themselves—the wrapping machine and mechanical weeder both had their inception in the minds of nurserymen who wanted to improve their operation. A Minnesota nurseryman invented the hydraulic balling machine, which has eliminated handballing of trees plucked out of the ground.


Grullemans is now experimenting with a process that, if successful, will replace the present methods of mulching, the most popular of which is to pack horse manure up against the sides of the cold frames containing young plants. Mulching keeps out the extreme cold and serves to protect the vulnerable young plants against the quick freezes and thaws that can



mean their death. Each fall, 150 truckloads of manure are delivered for Wayside's 12 acres of frames. It takes two months to complete the deliveries. Laborers then have a full-scale project on their hands, carefully piling the manure in the area between the frames and up to the top of the sides. In the spring, the manure has to be removed. Grullemans' experiment is centered on two foam-plastic-cored frames. One frame has a four-inch core of foam encased in one inch of concrete. The other has six inches of foam within a half-inch of concrete. (All of Wayside's other frames are made either of concrete or wood.)

Grullemans has his fingers crossed, hoping that the foam will supersede horse manure as a protector of young plants. If his styrofoam-core frames fail winter's test, Grullemans plans to install electric heating cables under the frames.


Nurserymen are accustomed to helping progress along. Sometimes they make their own improvisations, sometimes they pass along an idea to a man and make it worth his while to develop it. Such a man was Dr. John Mahlstede, professor of horticulture at Iowa State College, who developed plant-refrigeration, which is the most revolutionary change to come to

Wayside Gardens since the end of World War II. Dr. Mahlstede began work on his freezing project at the request of several mail-order nurserymen in Iowa. They financed the project, and about five years ago Dr. Mahlstede announced success.

Wayside was one of the first mail-order nurseries to add the new freezing system. So far as Winslow Grullemans knows, only four other nurseries have the system now. First of all, the system is applicable only to the mail-order type of nursery. Secondly, it is practical only in a nursery that does business on a truly big scale—and Wayside's scale is one of the biggest.


Its 3200 varieties of plants and shrubs have earned Wayside at least \$1,500,000 a year for the past 15 years. During the nursery's peak selling seasons—spring and fall—its delivery truck averages three daily trips to the post office. A portion of the late-spring delivery is made up of perennial plants that had been in frozen storage 36 hours earlier, and had been there since they were dug out of the ground several months before.

Wayside's refrigerative system is in two parts: a large air-conditioned room in which 150,000 rosebushes are held dormant from November to June at a 36-

degree temperature (they are never frozen); and a two-room building in which 150,000 perennial plants are stored in one room from November to June at a temperature of 26 degrees below freezing, and thawed at 36 degrees in an adjoining room. The plants are transferred to the thawing room 36 hours before mailing.


The building that houses the freezing and thawing rooms is built of styrofoamcored concrete; it was from the freezing room that Grullemans got his idea for a styrofoam-core cold frame. The freezing room has two 71/2-horsepower compressors operated by time clock to control the defrosting operation. Both the freezing and thawing rooms have high-low temperature controls, and on the roof are two condenser units with pressure-control valves to maintain proper head pressures during the colder months of the year. This has been arranged so that the units operate when the outside temperatures exceed the setting for the rooms.

For mail-order nurseries like Wayside Gardens, the chief advantage of the plant-freezing system is that it extends the shipping season until late June. Before Dr. Mahlstede developed his refrigeration process, the nurseryman had to sell all his plants right out of the ground—and he had to do it before the plants started growing. This meant that the shipping season was

usually over by mid-May. If the nurseryman mailed out a plant after it started its growing cycle, the heat within the enclosed package would often decompose the green top growth. Then, too, it's not advisable to transplant a plant once it has begun its growing cycle. The freezing system hurdles both of these one-time headaches of the nurseryman by keeping a plant dormant until late June.

"It's taken some education to convince our customers that it's not harmful to freeze a plant," says Winslow Grullemans.
"Some people have the impression that sending a plant to them from the freezer is not as good as sending it to them straight out of the ground. We've had to explain not only that the freezing is harmless, but that it's smart to ship a plant in dormant condition, because then it begins its growth cycle after it gets to the customer and is placed in the ground. The dormant condition is important. Let's say we send a plant cross-country. This would not be unusual, because we've got customers throughout the country, and overseas, too. Let's say we take this plant out of the ground before it has started its growing cycle. In transit, though, warmth is likely to start top growth, and then you have the danger of decomposition. Or the customer may disturb that growth in


Seven miles of complex pipeline are laid in the ocean floor off the Gulf of Mexico to carry molten sulphur

Pipeline Carries Molten Sulphur Beneath Ocean


BURIED BENEATH the ocean in the Gulf of Mexico, a seven-mile pipeline, made up of three concentric pipes, transports molten sulphur from 2000 feet under the ocean to the shore at Grand Isle, La. The unique pipeline, built by Freeport Sulphur Company, is made of a special high-strength alloy steel, manufactured for the first time as a tubular product. The three pipes are


a 14-inch outside protective casing, a 7%-inch hot-water jacket and a 6-inch sulphur line. Because of unusual stresses involved, the two smaller pipes are made of manganese molybdenum alloy steel. This metal has a minimum yield strength of about 60,000 pounds per square inch. As the molten sulphur pours through, the lines have an operating temperature of 300 degrees F., which means that the pipeline ordinarily would expand 55 feet in length when heated. Since the line was buried five feet in the ocean floor, engineers believed that the usual way of providing for expansion — by using joints or loops — would be too expensive. So after the pipeline was laid, the inner lines were heated and allowed to expand, and at that point were fastened to a stretched outer casing. Thus, when sulphur passes through, the inner pipes expand very little. The pipeline is designed to deliver 5040 tons of sulphur a day to tank barges on the mainland, where the sulphur is taken over an inshore route 25 miles to Port Sulphur, La.

Big Plastic Sailboat Molded in Three Parts

MAINTENANCE isn't much of a problem for owners of the 40-foot Bounty II, which has a molded plastic hull, Dacron sails and aluminum mast. In addition, use of plastics enables the manufacturer to construct the boat more quickly and at a lower price than is possible with conventional build-

ing methods.

The hull of the Bounty II is built up with layers of glass cloth impregnated with colored resins that give the craft a permanent color so that it never needs a coat of paint. Layer after layer of the resin-impregnated cloth is lapped inside two molds which form the two halves of the hull. From seven to ten layers of cloth and resin-depending on the location—are laid in the molds, which are then folded together like a giant clamshell so that the hull sections can be bonded together chemically. In less than eight hours, the 40-foot hull is

A four-ton iron keel goes into place, and water tanks are installed. The builder adds a plastic sink and icebox and then locates the prefabricated plywood bulkheads.

The deck and cabin top—one 40-foot piece of molded glass cloth complete with lights, hatch covers, winches and deck cleats—is lowered into place. Then the mast is stepped, the sails set, and the craft is ready for the water.

In a fair breeze, the vessel will spank along at eight knots. For periods when power is needed, it carries a 25-horsepower engine.

The firm that manufactures the Bounty II, the Aeromarine Plastics Corporation, turns out two of the sailboats a week in its factory at Sausalito, Calif. The craft sells for \$30,000. Also being planned by the company is a sailboat in a lower price range.





Latest Aquatic Sport— Surfing on the Sand

Teen-agers along the Southern California coast enjoy a sport as exciting as surfriding, but not nearly as expensive-they call it wet sand surfing. They take a piece of 34-inch plywood two feet wide, shape it like a disk and round off the edges. This strange device then slides easily along wet sand. And these disks are nowhere near as expensive as an \$85 conventional surfboard. The participant holds the board in both hands and races along the sand just as a wave washes in. At the right moment, he drops the board ahead of his flying feet and mounts it in the next step. With the wave retreating, he glides along on the coaster as far as 50 yards. It's perfect for a belly-flop, too. Adding further flavor to the sport, youths vie with each other by painting weird designs on the top sides of their boards.

Kit Packs Trailer Bearings

Boat-trailer wheels receive great punishment from dirt, rust, heat and immersion in water. Their bearings need frequent cleaning and packing, but the usual preventive maintenance involves either hauling the whole rig to a service station or keeping a bulky and often expensive grease gun around the garage. A California trailer and boat-accessory manufacturer has developed a do-it-yourself bearing lube kit. It includes a lubricant designed for boattrailer bearings packaged in a throwaway tube similar to a toothpaste tube except that it has standard fittings to provide a high-pressure packing job without special tools. The kit includes a wrench, cleaning brush, knockout pin and spare cotter keys.





N CANADA—as in the United States everyone is bowling. It's the number one participant sport. But the Canadians use only half as many pins as their south-

of-the-border counterparts.

Originated by the ancient Egyptians, bowling was brought to North America by Dutch settlers as the game of ninepins. Eventually somebody added a pin, and today some 26.5 million bowlers in this country are taking aim at the 10 big maple splinters. In Canada, though, the number of pins went down to five.

Fivepins differs from American bowling, not only in the number and size of the pins and ball, but in the number of times the ball is rolled per frame. If all the pins go down with the first ball, you've earned a strike; if all the pins go down with the second ball, you're given a spare. But you're given one last try in the Canadian version. Knocking down all the pins with your third ball does not give

you a carryover score, however.

There's a difference in scoring, too. In fivepins, each pin has its own point value. The head pin counts five, two of the pins count three, and the other two, as in the diagram below. (Actually, there are two different scoring systems used in Canada, but the system shown here is the "national count," by far the more popular.) There's another vital difference in scoring-you must knock down the left corner pin or you get no score for that frame.

The ball is small enough to be palmed, and has no finger holes. The bowler aims for the same pocket as in the American

A perfect game in the Canadian version is 450. The person who bowls a solid 170 in tenpins probably would average over 200 if he moved north of the border.

Canadians insist that their southern friends can't possibly miss the pins with such a large ball, while Americans insist that having three tries at the pins makes high scoring a snap!









Automatic Garage Handles Nine Cars a Minute


One attendant can park and return 400 cars in 45 minutes—without leaving his seat—in an unusual Swiss parking garage. His job is to push buttons in the control room of an electronically guided garage. The rest of the job, left to machines, is done with more ease and greater care than a motorist could ever expect in a manually

This is the inside of the garage at Basel, Switzerland. Electronically run elevators park the cars



operated garage. Nine cars can be handled at once and it takes just 59 seconds to park and return them. As the motorist drives in, two electric eyes photograph his car and give length, width and height dimensions to the attendant who selects the right size stall for the car. In a few seconds the driver receives his ticket and drives up to an elevator. He gets out, tells the attendant the car is ready, and the rest is left to electronic magic. Grip arms place the car in the elevator and the car is carried to the proper floor. From there it is pushed straight into the correct stall. In just 59 seconds, the elevator parks the car and returns another to its driver.



"Flight-Seeing" in Alaska

WHEN THE MINES closed down in Mc-Carthy, Alaska, every family in town pulled up stakes and climbed aboard the last train. They left their homes and stores intact down to the lace curtains. Today bush pilots fly mining enthusiasts on a "flight-seeing" tour of the sourdough country. They soar over the rich Matanus-ka Valley farms, weird glaciers and 16,000-foot mountains. They set down in the Copper River Valley from which more than a billion dollars in copper and gold have been extracted.

But it is the ghost town of McCarthy, which is the highlight of the tour. There amateur miners pan for glistening flakes of gold and silver. The boardinghouse reach comes back into its own at the McCarthy lodge where sourdoughs mingle with visitors at mealtime and spin tales about rich strikes and lost mines. Everybody clambers onto an Alaskan-style bus, a Model-T Speeder, for a spectacular ride over the abandoned Kennecott Railroad. Guides take visitors through McCarthy for a glimpse of yesterday's roaring frontier.

Railroading to Hudson Bay

THIS SUMMER rail fans will climb aboard a Canadian National Railways train at Winnipeg and go adventuring in the sub-Arctic. Their train will follow the line built north over the quaking muskeg to Churchill on Hudson Bay. Deep in the wilderness trading area of the Hudson's Bay Company, they will see Eskimos, Husky dogs, scarlet-coated officers of the Northwest Mounted Police and ruined forts dating back to when the English and French struggled for the fur trade.

From time to time the train will stop to allow the adventuresome to scout the wild country along the right-of-way. Passengers will leave the cars to boat or fish in northern streams. Then the train pushes on deeper into the land of the lobstick pine. The terrain becomes ever more barren for little grows in the permanently frozen ground over which the rails pass. At last, deep in the land of the northern lights, the train pulls into historic Churchill, back-door port to North America.

Camping in Forests and Parks

DIAMOND LAKE nestles in a national forest just a few miles north of Oregon's Crater Lake National Park. Pitch your tent on the shore at one of the 100 available camp sites where you can look across the sparkling waters to snow-topped Mount Bailey. You can draw close to nature in such a wilderness solitude, study the plants and animals or swim and hike.

Diamond Lake is just one of thousands of beauty spots which await your tent. Between Acadia National Park on the rocky shore of Mount Desert Island off the Maine coast to the California desert country of the Joshua Tree National Monument stretches the breadth of a continent containing a wealth of national parks, forests and monuments as well as state parks.

In the larger parks guided trips on foot or by automobile take visitors to see natural phenomena and wildlife. At all parks and monuments rangers and naturalists are particularly eager to help visitors with a scientific hobby. Youngsters working on a project are given special attention.

Rock Hounding in the Sierra Nevada

NATURALIST John Muir called the Sierra Nevada "The Range of Light" because of the dazzling granite peaks sparkling in the sunlight. Rock hounds find the range among the most exciting specimen sources in the U.S. They gather at Huntington Lake, Calif., under the guidance of mountaineer Joe Wampler and pack over the 200-mile John Muir Trail from Tuolumne Meadows to Whitney Portal. They trek through parts of Inyo and Sierra national forests and Sequoia, Kings Canyon and

Yosemite national parks, passing close to towering Mount Whitney.

Rock hounds ride or hike as they range the backbone of California. Photography addicts, bird watchers, plant, insect and animal collectors as well as trail followers go along. There are plenty of peaks to scale, and a chance to visit isolated Indian tribes.

Sleeping under the stars after a zestful day on the trail, trippers agree with John Muir who said, "Everyone needs such beauty places to play in and pray in."

Exploring the Border Wilderness

Amateur foresters put out onto a broad, pine-girdled lake in the north country — unchanged since the days of the voyageurs

THE VAST Quetico-Superior wilderness of broad lakes and tree-studded islands, of rushing streams which knew the canoes of voyageurs, spans the U.S.-Canadian border in Minnesota and Ontario. Every July the American Forestry Association takes a canoe expedition of youngsters and adults through the labyrinth of waters to show them the beauty of the unspoiled woods and teach the know-how of forest conservation.

The party takes to its boats at Moose Lake, 20 miles from Ely, Minn. Dipping paddles propel the canoes between rocky islands and narrows where deer watch from wooded shores. None of the travel is rough so the trip is ideal for families.

Although the first portage seems tough to city forestry amateurs, by the time the trip is over they are effortlessly lugging the canoes from one stream to the next. Camps are made at old logging sites, in the middle of vast stands of white pine, on beaches where swimming is good or at outstanding fishing spots. A side trip takes the party to the Kekekabac Fire Tower.

WEEK-END TARS with a yen for the seas board tall-sparred Maine schooners and put out from port for a week's cruise along the rocky coast. They lend the crew a helping hand at hoisting sails, catting the anchor or trimming sheets. Even the landlubber enjoys a turn at the wheel.

Every night the schooner puts into a different port, depending upon the daily changes in wind and tide. Crews go ashore on island beaches to steam lobsters over a driftwood fire. Sometimes they join inhabitants of the Outer Islands in a spirited square dance, or visit historic spots.

The schooners which make the voyages are not fancy yachts but the last of the American merchant sailing vessels, the windjammers. Forecastle and cargo hold have been converted into small cabins. Living aboard is simple and informal.

Sails stretch taut in the wind, and the rigging flaps. The sturdy schooner rides the swells. With the deck rising and falling beneath him, the sailor is home on the sea.



Steamboating on the Mississippi


The Delta Queen, last reminder of the days of racing river packets, steams down the Mississippi on way to the Dixie river ports

Rent a Yacht in Florida


Once the plaything of a rich man, a luxury yacht heads for tropical seas, chartered by midwestern YMCA skin diving club

Amateur Archeology in Yucatan


Amateur archeologists view ancient Chichen Itza. Yucatan's Mayan ruins have long excited the students of mankind's past

UNDER THE SUPERVISION of professional archeologists, amateurs are having a chance for "dig-it-yourself" vacations in the Mayan ruins of Yucatan. They fly to Merida by Cia Mexicana de Aviación and explore the famed Chichen Itza.

It was almost 120 years ago that a group of amateurs sailed to Yucatan to make the first serious explorations of the great Mayan cities of Chichen Itza, Uxmal, Kabah, Tulum and Copan. They found giant trees had grown up in the plazas and

courtyards. The strangler fig covered stairways and roofs. Long-armed spider monkeys lived in the acropolis of Copan. Everywhere they saw monuments so impressive that they reported to the world that they were "equal in workmanship to the finest monuments of the Egyptians."

It is believed that all the major discoveries have now been made, but there is always hope of learning more about Mayans, described as "the most brilliant aboriginal people on this planet."

DUSK WAS SETTLING DOWN several years ago on the banks of the St. Joe River in northern Idaho—but I wasn't. I was struggling in the dim, tree-filtered light to read the directions on how to put up a spanking new umbrella tent.

My wife, who had started cooking operations, paused now and then to cast a hopeful glance at the man she married for worse.

Fortunately, a neighboring camper strolled by.

"My tent is just like yours," he said.

"First, you nail down the bottom of the tent with those spikes in that sack over there; then you fix the umbrella ribs this way—be sure you don't get them upside down—and next you step inside the tent and..."

That was lesson No. 1 in the art of tenting—an art that has become so popular in the U.S. that more tents are now sold annually in the country than were used by both Blue and Gray soldiers throughout the entire Civil War.

The modern umbrella tent, which has become a favorite with campers, is tricky to erect the first time. Simple, the second. So it's a good idea to conduct a dry run with a new tent in your own back yard before you start out on a camping expedition. It may be raining at your camp site.

Other equipment can do with some testing, too. Even if you have used a gas stove for years—and especially if you have—it's a good idea to check it out.

While camped last summer with the family at Oregon's huge Honeyman State Park, I was visited by a lady in distress. Her stove wouldn't work. She had wandered through the camp looking for a stove just like hers. Ours matched. Would I help?

Remembering the kindly gentleman of the St. Joe, I walked—for miles, it seemed —to the lady's camp where her husband

was busily munching cookies while awaiting her return. Disconcerted, I nevertheless went to work and, with a borrowed bobby pin, unclogged the gas line.

Planning a camping trip with a family is a big part of the fun. Everybody takes an interest in lining up the gear. Besides, it's fun just to take a look at it now and then and speculate on what is coming.

It is recommended that you give assignments and establish responsibilities before starting. You will be pleasantly surprised to find how eagerly the children will carry them out.

Air mattresses are standard equipment

for camping now. If your lungs need exercise, you can blow and blow. But about \$3 will get you a small and efficient hand pump. Beauty of this is that the youngsters will fight for the privilege of blowing up the mattresses. Even our five-year-old daughter insisted on taking her turn.

If the plastic valve stem on a mattress becomes worn and won't hold in the pump, you can build the stem up again by applying plastic glue—the same material you use for patching the mattress. In a hurry, you can wrap some plastic tape around pump and valve stems to hold them together.






All service-center restaurants seem alike, all stamped from one mold. Local color doesn't exist. There's no inclination to gracious dining.

So toll roads are not really for touring, but for traveling—for that there's none better.





For the Seaside, Mountains or Woods...

VACATION HOMES

S ECOND HOMES—retreats built in out-of-the-way places where families can run off for a vacation or a week end—are rapidly becoming a familiar part of American life.

It is estimated that vacation homes are being erected at the rate of 75,000 per year and that some two million families own a second home. They're going up on sea and lake shores, in the woods and on mountain slopes—any place that attracts vacationers. Generally second homes are fairly close to the family's year-round residence so that travel doesn't consume too many of those free hours.

The seclusion of the building sites allows unusual design in the cabins, since there are no neighborhood patterns to adhere to. Geodesic domes or A-frame cabins, for instance, are not ordinarily found in suburban neighborhoods.

Prefabrication is also part of the picture, with a number of manufacturers offering factory-built components to be assembled on the site. Techbuilt, Inc., has a prefabricated vacation cottage designed by Carl Koch, A.I.A. The three models of the cottage can be built as summer dwellings or, by use of a winterizing package, can be turned into skiing cabins or year-round retreats.

An unusual shape in prefabricated summer housing is the geodesic dome offered by Pease Woodwork Company. The house is composed of 38 factory-built triangular


plywood panels which are bolted together at the building site.

The triangular construction of an A-frame cabin makes a very rigid structure, and there is no need for interior bearing walls. Thus, the partitions may be located wherever the owner wishes. Depending on the cabin size, too, a small sleeping loft or a relatively full second story may be included.

But whatever the style, second homes are making it possible for more families to "get away from it all" often and easily.

Typical A-frame cabin—one of the scores being buil: in mountain areas nowadays—is popular in heavy snow fall regions because roof sheds snow easily







Tiny Trailer Becomes 13-Foot Sleeping Room

Easily towed by a small car, a tiny, wedge-shaped trailer unfolds to form a tent that's 13 feet long, 4 feet wide and 6½ feet high. An extension of the floor slides out and rests on telescoping legs. The canvas

top then pulls into place. The trailer-tent, built by a British manufacturer, weighs 450 pounds. Folded down for towing, the unit stands only 2½ feet high and does not obscure rear vision.



Washbasin for Motorists


Four pints of water and a supply of toilet articles can be carried in a plastic washing pack designed especially for the use of motorists. Molded into the water bottle are recesses for a mirror, comb, liquid soap and nail file. A cover, into which the pack fits, serves as a basin and permits washing inside the car.

Amphibious Home

On moving day, the captain of this seagoing back-yard houseboat just cranks up his house and moves

WHEN DR. S. W. JOHNSTON, a dentist in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., built a 49-foot, 16-ton houseboat in his back yard, neighbors chuckled and made joking reference to Noah and his ark, since the nearest body of water is more than a mile from the Johnston home. But they stood and stared when the job was finished, for the big boat put down four steel pipe legs and hoisted itself off the ground while a flatbed trailer backed under the hull for the trip to the water for launching.

The hoisting system is only one of a dozen unusual features of the Johnston boat, designed and built as a year-round floating home by a family that has lived aboard boats for about 20 years. When it's finished, the boat will serve as a land and water home for Dr. Johnston's son, Bill, and his family while he attends medical and dentistry schools in Florida and Mary-

land. With its retractable legs it will be equally at home in a Florida harbor or a Maryland trailer court.


The hand-cranked hoist system uses 4:1 pulleys and 72:1 reduction worm gears which allow it to be raised with only 12 pounds of pressure on the cranks. On land, the Johnstons will use a conventional doorway into the living quarters. In the water, the watertight door is sealed and the boat is entered through gangplanks onto the fore and aft upper decks.

Other features in the two-bedroom boat include twin-pane windows controlled from a central panel; a built-in vacuum cleaning system that serves every room and blows the dirt out a small vent on the bow; built-in hi-fi music system, movie projector and screen, and color television set. In the kitchen, the electric oven, washer and dryer fit under the foredeck, saving floor

space and keeping their heat out of the cabin.

The boat has radiant heating through a network of copper tubing laid under the decks and fed by the electric hot-water system. A two-ton air conditioner is augmented by a roof sprinkler system which keeps the deck cool under-foot and helps cool the interior.

The 49-foot hull is 12 feet, 11 inches across the beam, and is overlaid below the water line with heavy creosoted pine planking. Dr. Johnston and his son have done all the work themselves. working from a scale model instead of a set of plans. The younger Johnstons think it will be easier and cheaper to live in the boat than in a trailer or temporary housing ashore. Dr. Johnston says, "I guess none of us cares much for living in houses."


Stop! Thief!



Even a Motor Scooter Can Haul Collapsible Trailer

SOMETHING for the compact-car buyer—here's a compact traveling van that even can be transported by a motor scooter. The trailer neatly folds away into a flat box seven feet long and five feet wide. It stands just three and a half feet off the ground. Made of Fiberglas and equipped with independent wheel suspension, the trailer can be assembled into a nifty camping van in just 10 minutes. Hinged sides that fold inward when closed up are pulled out to form the walls, complete

with windows. The ends fold down from the roof. One end has a window and wash basin while at the other end there's a door with a window in it. There are two single beds which easily convert into a double bed. Storage cupboards are enclosed beneath the beds. During the daytime, a table folds down between the beds, turning the bedroom into a kitchen. To steady the caravan while it is being used, jacks at each corner lower to the ground. A towing bar attaches the van to the vehicle.



YOU CAN ESTABLISH a profitable business of your own in Latin America if you know where and how. In this article, you'll find helpful tips on existing business opportunities south of the border. But first, consider the stories of these Americans who have already gone south—and made money for themselves down there:

• Bernard Rosemberg left Brooklyn in 1952 with a good knowledge of electricity and established a fluorescent-lamp factory in Cali, Colombia. He started with borrowed capital. Now his annual sales run up to \$500,000, and he's planning to expand his operations.

 Frank Smith went to Mexico City a few years ago and established a small soda fountain. He specialized in making malts, and today his combination drugstorefountain-restaurant is known as one of the best in Mexico.

- Louis Chiurato settled in San Salvador in the Republic of El Salvador and started making hair dressing from imported ingredients. His product found immediate acceptance and has earned him thousands of dollars.
- Orlando Flye, a native of Maine, went to Santa Marta, Colombia, many years ago on a contract as an electrical engineer and soon found himself a prosperous farmer. One day, while working near a stream, he found some wild coffee plants whose berries he picked and sent off to New York for examination. The immediate reply that he got from New York was "Send us 10,000 bags of 100 pounds each of the same."




Coffee beans dry on William Flye's milliondollar plantation at Cincinnati, Colombia

That reply made Flye switch careers, and he soon invested his small earnings in a coffee plantation in the cool mountain area which he later called Cincinnati after his wife's home town. As time passed, Flye increased his coffee acreage, fought erosion, and improved his farming practices. When Flye died a few years ago, he left his son William a 1000-acre coffee plantation which today produces an average of 4000 bags of mild coffee beans a year. The plantation employs 500 workers during the harvest season and is now worth over a million dollars. Maxwell Cone arrived a few years ago in the Volcan area of

the El General Valley in Costa Rica and now owns a first-class cattle ranch which brings him thousands of dollars annually. From the start, Cone wanted to own a cattle ranch but lacked the capital. So he went to El General Valley where land was still available at practically give-away prices. There he bought a couple of hundred acres, cleared the land and sold the logs to sawmills.

Then he rented a small plane and sowed his pastures from the air. In time, he had hundreds of cattle grazing on his fine pastures, whereupon he built a slaughtering plant on his ranch. Today LACSA (a Costa Rica airline) cargo planes land on his ranch, wait a couple of hours while 47 steers are slaughtered and then take off loaded with 11,000 pounds of beef for meat-deficient Curacao, Puerto Rico and Venezuela.

When asked if he uses refrigeration in the planes to prevent the meat from spoiling, Cone replies, "No, there's no need for it. I simply tell the pilot to go high enough, and the cold air at 14,000 feet keeps the meat chilled until its arrival." Besides profiting from his beef-exporting business, Cone earns additional income from the hogs he produces on his farm. These are fed almost 100 percent from the waste obtained in his slaughterhouse.

Like these Americans, hundreds—if not thousands—of others are today working busily at their own profitable businesses in Latin America. They have found that business success, whether it be in a large city, a small town, or out in the country, comes from filling a need that exists or is created for a product or service. The way you manage the business will spell the difference between success and failure whether you are in Caracas, Panama or New York.

Starting a business is not easy, and it is getting more difficult every day to create a really profitable enterprise. Yet, I have discovered that everywhere throughout Latin America resourceful individuals are demonstrating that businesses similar

Fuel Cells Power Tractor

Mixed fuel gases (largely propane) and oxygen react in an electrolyte within 1008 fuel cells to provide electricity to power an experimental tractor. Gases enter the cells through tubes. A catalyst coating the electrodes of each cell aids the reaction. Chemical reactions within cells cause direct current to flow through an external circuit, connected by bus bar to a controller. The driver regulates speed and reverses direction by the controller.


Laboratory Highway Cuts Testing Time

Four auto wheels, carrying the weight of anything from a bicycle to the largest truck at highway speeds, whirl around the track hour after hour. 
Ballistic Missile To Carry TV Station

Fun and Thrills With Radio-Controlled Model Car and Boat


VER HAD THE YEN to get behind the wheel of a racing car or powerboat -to go tearing down a course with a wide-open throttle and no speed limit? Well, few of us actually have the opportunity to satisfy this craying with the real thing, but everyone, young or old, can experience some of the same thrills—with radio-controlled models. And once you've been bitten by the bug you'll find that model racing is a sport or hobby which takes a back seat to nothing else.

Now you can buy or build radio-controlled equipment that'll duplicate every function of the real thing—with a few to spare. That kind of gear, however, is hardly the thing for beginners. It's complicated to build, install and operate and it's expensive.

In contrast, the units described here can be built by just about anyone, and at the lowest possible cost consistent with reliable operation.

What's more, the electronic equipment and engine, the most expensive parts of any system, are completely interchangeable between car and boat. You can build either one—complete—for less than \$40, and you can have both for just a few dollars more.

Simplicity is the keynote for both of these projects. The efficient prop-drive engine eliminates the expense and problems of complicated gearing associated with electrically-driven units and reduces operating costs. It has only one speedfast-but you can control the direction: forward, left turn, right turn, simply by



Easy-to-build transmitter chassis, inset, takes up little space in transmitter housing. Simple receiver, upper right, will present no construction problems


pressing the button on the transmitter. And right here, a few words concerning the electronic and electrical equipment are in order.

Operation of either car or boat requires only the simplest and least expensive type R/C transmitter and receiver. The units shown were assembled from commercially available kits for a combined cost of about \$18, but virtually any good make of equipment will do the job. You don't even have to build the units yourself since there are a variety of factory-wired jobs available from most hobby shops. But the construction of these kits is not difficult and can result in substantial savings.

Since the assembly and adjustment of the kits shown in Figs. 1 and 2 are thoroughly detailed in their accompanying instructions manuals, there is little point in duplicating them here. The photographs serve only to illustrate their relative simplicity. Precise adjustments can be made with a milliameter or inexpensive VOM.

In operation, the transmitter sends out a continuous, crystal-controlled signal as long as the "transmit" button is pressed. In the car or boat, the receiver picks up this signal and converts it into d.c. which actuates a set of relay contacts. As the contacts close, battery voltage is applied to the servo motor causing a 90-degree rotation of the servo gear. This rotation is translated into wheel-motion (or rudder action) through the crank pin, tiller and tie rod, see Fig. 3.

The crank pin remains in the offcenter position until the "transmit" button is released, after which the servo, by completing its rotation cycle, automatically returns to neutral. To cause the vehicle to turn in the opposite direction, the "trans-




mit" button is pressed, released for an instant, and pressed again. This causes the crank pin to come to rest in the 270-degree position until the button is released for the second time, causing it to return to neutral. It takes only a short time of actual practice to get the hang of the operation.

Construction of the car, as detailed in Fig. 3, is a project of only a couple of hours, and all the parts can be obtained from a hobby shop and hardware store. The numbered assembly steps indicate the sequence of most convenient construction. Here are a few additional suggestions:

 Cover all wood with several coats of "fuelproof" paint before mounting any of the parts.

Cement the bottom of the transparent receiver box (supplied with kit) to the bottom of the battery box. Use a sponge-

rubber pad between battery box and car floor to act as shock absorber.

3. In following the wiring of Fig. 4, the plug and socket may be replaced with direct connections between the relay and servo. These parts merely facilitate transfer of the receiver from car to boat.

When mounting the engine, be sure to allow for adequate propeller clearance.

The streamlined cover, Fig. 5, is not required for proper operation of the car. It does, however, give the model a "finished" look.

Construction of the boat is much more involved than that of the car, but it's not

particularly difficult.


The boat is built around a rectangular, closed-bottom box (see Fig. 6) which serves as the cabin and houses the R/C equipment. The bottom of the box has a slight (10°) upward taper, beginning about 8 in. from the rear edge. A notch cut in

the bottom of the front cabin-member permits insertion of the keel which is trimmed to extend the cabin-taper all the way to the front edge of the bow block.


Exact sizes and shapes of the bulkhead frames 1 through 7 can be obtained from the half-frame drawings of Fig. 7. The tinted screen over this drawing represents 1-in. squares and can be used for accurate sizing of these parts. Location of the frames is indicated in the half-top and cross section side-view drawings, Figs. 8 and 9. Small balsa-wood cleats serve to hold frames 4, 5 and 6 in position against the cabin sides. Frames 3 and 7 are cemented directly to the front and rear of the cabin box while frames 1 and 2 and the bow block straddle the keel with their bottom edges flush with the bottom of the keel. These determine the ultimate shape of the hull.



Bulkhead frames can be sized with 1"-square screen







LAZY-SUSAN SERVER




WANT a conversation piece for your next social gathering? Bring out this stunning Lazy-Susan server. Loaded with cheese dips or the "makin's" for sandwiches, its two rotating trays will delight your guests and make selection quick and easy. Designed with classic simplicity to please the eye, it harmonizes with the traditional as well as contemporary.

Walnut was used in the original, but any one of the various hardwoods, such as mahogany, maple or birch, would do as well. All of the stock is ¾ in. thick with the exception of the column. The top view, Fig. 1, illustrates the layout of the circular recess for dishes or bowls. Should you prefer, obtain dishes or bowls of your own choosing and dimension the recesses to suit the particular dishes.


Since solid wood is used, it is necessary to build up the base and the two trays from several pieces glued together edge to edge. Usually it is best to select three pieces ¾ x 5½ x 13 in. for the base, three pieces ¾ x 5½ x 15 in. for the upper tray and four pieces ¾ x 5½ x 22 in. for the lower tray. These sizes allow 1 in. for waste in each case. The capital, Fig. 2, was turned out of a ¾ x 5½ x 5½-in. square.

In gluing up the pieces, first study the texture and figure of the wood grain, then decide on the most pleasing combinations. Mark the pieces selected and keep them in order. Check the edges to be joined since they must be smooth and straight in order to make good glue joints. Ripping out stock on a bench saw and jointing with a plane will give good results if carefully done.





Underside of upper tray shows how Lazy-Susan bearing seats in recess. Note slight recess also in capital. Bearing is cemented in recesses with epoxy mastic




Bar clamps will provide the necessary sustained pressure for gluing. Three bar clamps, one above and two below, were used on the base. Likewise three were used for the upper tray. This method of placing the clamps will prevent buckling. Apply full-bodied glue to each joint spread to a uniform film. After drawing up the clamps, wipe off any excess glue with a damp cloth. Hardened glue is extremely difficult to remove. Allow the glue to cure overnight.


Careful Sawing Required

Working from the diagrams, Fig. 1 and the detail, Fig. 4, lay out the three required circles, 12, 14 and 21 in., on the glued-up pieces. Mark the centers clearly and cut out the disks, using a bandsaw, portable sabre saw or a power jigsaw. Saw to the line but never beyond it, in order to retain a true circle. Sand all three disks on the top sides beginning with a coarse-grit sandpaper and working up to a finer grit. Smooth off the edges on either a belt or disk sander, or by hand with garnet paper.

Lay out all the circles for the recesses in the two trays, Fig. 1. A variation of individual recessing is to form one large recess in each tray, leaving a narrow lip around the outer edge to contain the various dishes or bowls. Another alternate method of tray construction is shown in Fig. 4. Here the individual recesses are formed by jigsawing them in a disk of 1/8-in. plywood and gluing it to the upper tray.


Hanging Wall Desk Made of Plywood and Pine

Clean, simple lines make this desk an attractive yet useful addition to your home. The desk shown above measures $8\frac{1}{2} \times 20 \times 48$ in. but these dimensions may be varied to suit individual needs. The top and front are $\frac{3}{4}$ -in. fir plywood panels, while the ends, back and bottom are solid pine. The

front panel has sections cut out to accommodate a center and a side drawer, and one end has an opening for books and magazines. Partially supported by wooden brackets, the desk's main support is through bolts driven through the back and into the wall studs.

Lock Nuts Cut From Coupling

While in the process of installing a stockwatering tank, one farmer found that he had no lock nuts with which to secure the inlet and outlet pipes. As an emergency substitute, two sections cut from the ends of a pipe coupling served perfectly for lock nuts which were drawn up tightly with a pipe wrench. Two rubber gaskets made the job leakproof.




Filter Fitted to Garden Sprayer

To keep the nozzle of a pump-type garden sprayer from clogging, install an automobile fuel filter in the line to trap coarse particles in the spray mixture. Drill out a 90-deg. brass fitting to receive the sprayer outlet tube to which the fitting is soldered. Clamp the hose to a straight, threaded union screwed into the outlet side of the filter.—L. G. Braunstein, Havertown, Pa.

LADIES' HATS are less likely to get crushed when stored on a wardrobe shelf if they are placed on small lamp shades that are covered with tissue paper as shown at left. Since the brim of a hat stored in this manner does not rest on the shelf, it will not become misshaped, particularly if the hat is heavy. Inexpensive shades may be purchased for this purpose, or shades that are to be discarded can be used

CLOTH MEASURING TAPE won't become tangled, frayed or creased when kept with other sewing paraphernalia if it is wound on a reel like the one shown in the drawing, left center. The reel is a piece of \%-in. hardboard about 6 in. long and having undercut notches jigsawed at each end. Notches admit each turn of tape easily but prevent it from loosening or unwinding when stored in the sewing-cabinet drawer

PLASTIC BAGS used as dustproof wrapping for some wearing apparel sold in stores make good storage bags for woolen clothing that requires protection from moths. Treat the garment to be stored with a moth repellent, place it in a plastic bag of the right size and seal the open end with a warm iron as shown below, left. Place aluminum foil on each side of the plastic to prevent it from sticking to the iron

HARDENED DROPS OF PAINT on windows are easier to scrape off when the drops are dampened with turpentine shortly before removing them, below right. Turpentine softens the edges of the drops, making it easier for the scraper blade to get under the paint. It also serves as a lubricant, which allows the blade to glide over the glass without scratching it

TO DEFROST A REFRIGERATOR in a hurry, as when it is filled with perishable food but is long overdue for defrosting, try using a hair dryer to speed the job as illustrated at right. The warm air from the dryer can be directed completely around the freezer unit, insuring that no ice is left between the evaporator and cabinet interior


WHEN FILLING a hot-water bottle with boiling water, it is a good idea to place a spoon in the neck of the bottle to vent it as shown below left. This allows the steam to escape gradually on the side away from your hand, avoiding the danger of being burned






Raft for Lifesaving and Play

The raft also serves as a "wet" dinghy that youngsters can have a lot of fun with when in port.

To build the raft, first cut the plywood core to shape as in Fig. This should be dimensioned so that when completed the raft will fit the stowage place reserved for it on board. If stowed in a pram kept on board or towed, be sure the raft will nest in it as in Fig. 3. Canvas strips folded and stitched to form loops on the inboard and outboard sides of the float as in Figs. 1 and 4, provide a means of attaching the floor netting and life line.

HALTING FIRE

AST DECEMBER in a Richmond, Va. residence a fire started in an overstuffed sofa some hours after a Christmas party had broken up. Once under way, the flames spread rapidly up an open stairwell, cutting off the exits at each end of the upper hall. Final toll: Five dead; the house a total loss.

In contrast to this tragedy, consider the incident in a Fresno, Calif. Veteran's Housing development where another live

cigarette butt fell out of an ashtray onto another sofa after the GI and his young wife had gone out to the movies. Fiberboard walls and ceilings had been extensively used in this project. While the blaze which spread from the sofa lasted an estimated 40 minutes, consuming every stick of furniture in the room, it never got out of the apartment to sweep through the rest of the building—it didn't even damage the electric wiring in the walls or ceiling. It

. . . but it could save your life

The finest fire-retardant paint cannot prevent a fire, extinguish a fire or withstand a severe fire indefinitely. It cannot make anything "fireproof." But it can reduce the combustibility of the surface to which it is applied for a reasonable time. This can be time enough to get out of a burning building or time enough to do something about the outbreak before the fire gets completely out of hand.



Fire-retardant paint is activated like a sprinkler system. When the temperature reaches 400 to 500 deg. F., the intumescent agents in paint start to swell and form a cellular barrier which insulates the wood and other combustible surfaces underneath. This insulating barrier reduces excessive heat penetration and retards the spread of flame

simply died from lack of sufficient nourishment when all the available fuel in the room was exhausted.

The big difference between these two fires was no bigger than a paintbrush. For while an unprotected open stairwell spread the first outbreak with tornado velocity, it wouldn't have taken the second blaze long to eat its way out to an even more extensive stairwell if it hadn't been confined to its point of origin by an effective fire-retardant paint.

Most householders are unaware of the existence of such protection—and for a good reason. Most manufacturers sell all they can produce to industrial, commercial and government users, hence aren't too concerned about the retail market. Since early in World War II, the Army and Navy have been using a brand that has been listed by the Underwriters Laboratories for some 20 years. Now the current UL (Underwriters Laboratories) list includes eight other "surface coatings" which can be brushed or sprayed like ordinary paint and are available to the householder.

Describing these coatings in general, the Paint, Oil & Chemical Review says: "It is generally accepted that they fall into one of three general classes: Glazing agents that fuse to block oxygen from reaching the burning area; intumescent agents which puff up to insulate underlying

material from an adjacent fire; and chainending agents that smother a fire by releasing or by chemically combining to form nonflammable vapors, thereby excluding oxygen." None of these should be confused with incombustible paints which will not ignite, but which do nothing to halt flamespread or heat penetration in the material underneath. As the Navy learned long ago, coat upon coat of ordinary paints applied to surfaces can add considerable fuel and fumes to a going blaze.


The majority of the protective paints now available are of the intumescent type, and many also generate oxygen-excluding ing vapors. Put a blowtorch flame on a piece of board coated with such a paint and the coating immediately blackens, then puffs out to a thick, insulating pod or blister resembling a scorched marshmallow. This blister will glow until the flame is removed, whereupon it "blacks out." The charred area can then be scraped clean and refinished.

In other words, the coating does not support flame nor add appreciable fuel to the fire. Equally vital, it checks the penetration of the heat so effectively that you can safely put your bare hand on the opposite side of the board while the blowtorch is still operating.


How important this factor is was shown in a test which I saw the Cleveland Fire Department make some ten years ago. A condemned, five-room dwelling was used for the experiment: The basement ceiling was painted with a fire retardant coating; the basement was stacked with old orange crates and packing boxes which were set ablaze and allowed to burn for 25 minutes. In this time the pyrometers showed a tem-perature of 1600° F. Yet not only were the ceiling beams and floor boards uncharred—but the temperature in the room directly above never exceeded a safe 205°. (It takes 325° to ignite a parlor match; 446° to touch off cotton batting.) Since then this particular paint has been greatly improved for less flamespread and much longer heat resistance.

It is important, of course, that a fire-retardant coating add no toxic fumes to a fire, and all of those listed by the UL are free from this hazard. The amount of smoke contributed also is very significant, since smoke kills far more fire victims than flame. This feature is rated in the UL listings and shows a wider variation than either flamespread or fuel contributed.

Since the function of a fire-retardant coating is to upgrade a free-burning material—or even a flash-burning one, such as cellulose wallboard, to the category of slow burning or fire retardant, a word



about the standards employed is in order. The inherent rate of flamespread of a given material is measured at UL by inserting a 25-ft. sample in a tunnel; applying flame to one end for three minutes; then checking the time it takes for the flame to travel to the opposite end. With untreated red oak, which is the standard yardstick, this takes five to six minutes. This is considered normal for an average combustible, hence is so rated as 100 in the scale. On this basis, flamespread ratings given in the National Fire Protection Association Handbook classify noncombustible as 0-15; fire retardant, 16-30; slow burning, 31-75; combustible, 76-200; highly combustible, over 200.

The majority of fire-retardant coatings come ready-mixed and in a number of dec-

orator colors, mostly flat. (Some users apply a regular enamel top-coat for a gloss finish.) They are applied just as easily as a typical paint, by either brush or spray. In the early days there was an irritating odor during application, but that stage has long since passed among the better brands. Coverage per coat is roughly about half of that expected from a conventional enamel. If you want greater coverage with proportionately less protection, you can spread it thinner than specified in the UL listings. To be specific on this point, one leading brand has a flamespread rating of 10 for two coats at 200 square ft. per gal. per coat. A single coat of this same paint at the same coverage gets a flamespread rating of 25. This is still very good—but it is like going out in the rain with only one rubber.

Most fire-retardant coatings can be applied over an existing paint surface, but in this case two coats are required for the same rating obtained by one coat on unpainted wood. Some brands also protect any interior surface, including metal. Such paints are widely used to raise the protective rating of gypsum board by from 50 to 90 percent, and they are taking the notorious metal ceiling out of the fireman's nightmares. In one test, for example, an aluminum panel was melted in 2½ minutes by a 2200-deg. welding-torch flame. A similar panel coated with a top-grade fire-retardant paint remained intact after 25 minutes of the same temperature.

Some of these paints have a life expectancy of 10 to 12 years under normal indoor conditions. They also can be washed repeatedly, even scrubbed, which is rather important for home use. However, there are brands, which are acceptable fire retardants, but are water soluble, hence will not tolerate high humidity. This is a point to remember if you're looking for bargains.




Nonslip Boating Gloves



The caps come in two sizes, ½ and ¼ in. I.D., and in white, black, red, yellow and turquoise. Being of polyethylene, the caps can be pressed in place and will stay put.

When you are about to light your charcoal grill and find you are out of lighter fluid, a milk carton will prove a good substitute. Cut off the top of the carton and nest it in the center of the fuel bed. Then fill the carton with coal and ignite. The wax-coated carton will produce a hot flame around the center coals.


Pulling Stakes the Easy Way




Altered Fahnestock Clips Are Easier to Use


Clear-Plastic Boxes Store Odds and Ends




Tape Around Lure Hooks Prevents Injury and Tangling


Pull-Out Leaf Houses Typewriter in Knee-Hole Desk


Digging Tunnel Under Walk


Wooden Hangers Hold Moth Balls

GET IN THE SWIM

BY BUILDING YOUR OWN POOL



PART II

F YOU ARE planning to build your own concrete pool, you will need to obtain a good set of plans locally. You need on-thespot plans because each concrete pool is different, depending on its size, shape, the soil supporting it, the temperature extremes of the area and whether it is to be Gunited, poured or dry-packed. Today there are two good sources of concrete-pool plans. Many large cities now have engineering firms which specialize in designing home pools. They furnish the plans many pool builders use. One of these firms will inexpensively check your site and plan the pool you desire for it, including complete plumbing blueprints and also for the steel reinforcing of the shell. Or you can arrange with a pool-equipment dealer to buy all the necessary equipment from him. You have to buy it somewhere and in return most dealers today will similarly go over the site


and furnish plans for your particular pool.

Glass fiber and metal pools come with complete installation plans, as do the plastic-liner pool kits. Because they are quite flexible, the inexpensive plastic-lined pools with sand bottoms can be built by the same plans in warm and cold climates and in different soils. Concrete blocks are as practical as poured concrete when laid and reinforced as shown in Fig. 13. The block sides should be given a thin waterproof plaster coat to assure a smooth surface for the plastic lining. A plastic-lined pool shaped approximately as shown in Fig. 13 will give better swimming and diving features than one with a flat bottom. The detail also shows a good way to anchor the lining at the top of the pool. A 1/2-in. reinforcing rod is slipped inside the cuff of the plastic lining (or is rolled up in it, if no cuff) and then is embedded in the mortar joint under the coping. A strip of building felt will protect the plastic at this point from any sharp edges of the masonry. The mortar joint can be broken easily with a chisel and the coping removed if the lining should need replacing.

Digging the hole for the pool by hand is plain hard work and no saving today when a tractor-loader or small backhoe will dig it so quickly and inexpensively. About 24 man-hours with a flat shovel and a mattock is usually needed to smooth and finish the hole. Plan to dig the hole and lay the concrete or other shell in as short a time as possible, to eliminate the one big hazard of pool construction - a cave-in of the raw

earth sides from a sudden rain.


With good plans, you can lay the plumbing and the reinforcing steel for a Gunited pool yourself without complications. Then the crew brings in its Gunite equipment



and sprays the shell, usually in one day,

at an average cost of about \$700.

For a dry-pack concrete pool, be certain to use the extra thickness and the amount of reinforcing wire recommended by your plans. The sides are packed first, packing the stiff mix in a spiralling manner around the pool so that no great amount of fresh mix needs to be supported in any one place. Some of the mix will probably sag down but can be worked back up the sides with a trowel or spread on the bottom. At the top, the sides are completed by packing the mix behind leveled boards. The bottom is poured last. The secret of a good dry-pack job is to have several persons on hand to shovel, pack and smooth the pour.





Once the excavation has been made work can move rapidly through several stages to the finishing touches. Note coping form

If you plan to have an underwater light in your pool, a small niche to fit the light you obtain needs to be formed in the pool wall when the shell is built. Fig. 14 shows a typical installation. The waterproof light fixture usually is placed in the deep end directly under the diving board. It can be either 300 or 500 watts, is grounded and is surrounded by water for cooling. A length of waterproof cable looped inside the niche allows the fixture to be removed and lifted above water for replacing the bulb.

Usually, the finish coat of white calcareous-base plaster is laid on a concrete pool five to seven days after the shell is built. If the shell is rough, a thick coat of waterproof grout (sand and cement, plus anti-hydril or tricisal) is plastered on first. If an expert is not available to apply the calcareous-base plaster it is probably best to apply a smooth coat of the waterproof grout and finish the pool with vinyl or chlorinated-rubber swimming-pool paint.

The water line of one or two rows of ceramic tile is cemented in place before the finish plaster is laid. Tile of light-blue color is the most popular, giving a blue reflection to the water, but warm colors, such as peach, orange, or maroon, are also good as their contrast intensifies the blue of the water. Because filtered water is a brilliant turquoise blue when it has a white background, the plaster or other finish of a pool shell is best a bright white. A blue shell gives a dark pool.

Most pools today are trimmed along their top edges with precast coping blocks, which are available from any pool dealer. They are slipproof and their bullnosed shape gives a good handhold and drainage away from the pool. Cut-flagstone and brick also give attractive pool copings, but their rough surfaces are not too practical for children. Scum gutters along the water line are obsolete today. A small skimmer does a much better job of removing floating material, and gutters are difficult to build and to keep clean. A deck or paved walkway 3-ft. wide around the pool is desirable, and it should slope away from the pool at a slant of 1 in. in 4 ft. for drainage. Grass up to the coping means clippings continu-


ally tracked into the pool and the splashings of chlorinated water will brown nearby grass. Most decks are of poured concrete, the surface being finished slightly rough so it will not be slippery. Flagstone, brick and wood blocks

also are good.



Even if you do not plan at present to have a filter system or heater, it is advisable to stub in their piping when the pool shell is built. Copper pipe is best; galvanized pipe deteriorates in chlorinated water. Follow the pipe sizes specified in your plans, usually 1½ to 2-in. diameter, and if in doubt, use a larger size. Especially for a sand filter, use the recommended pipe, pump and strainer to have a strong backwash flow which is needed to clean the filter properly.

Fig. 15 shows the simple plumbing required for a diatomaceous earth skimmer-filter. The pump and its strainer usually are placed


above ground near the pool and can be enclosed inside a small wooden bench. Backwashing this type of filter requires very little water and so the line to waste usually is just a plastic hose that is unrolled to drain the water somewhere into the ground.

You can build your own sand filter if you wish of concrete as shown in Fig. 16, or you can similarly adapt a heavy-metal tank by fashioning a removable lid on it of at least 10-in. diameter. For the average pool, the filter should have a 3-ft. inside diameter and 41/2-ft. depth. Cast the bottom of a concrete filter first, including a 2-in. strip of galvanized flashing around the edges as shown, to give an extra seal for the joint with the sides. Forms should be arranged to pour all four sides at once, with the outlet piping and top angle iron in place. Let the caps of the perforated pipes extend slightly into the concrete walls to keep the pipes from moving. Use one of the waterproofing additives in the concrete.

Where the outlet pipe extends through the concrete, a pipe flange or similar fitting is slipped over the pipe and welded in place to give a water seal. The inlet pipe is welded to the lid and has a union for removal in case the sand should ever need relaying. A simple baffle to spread the inlet flow is made by bending the corners of an 8-in. square of heavy plate and welding the corners to the lid as shown. A water pressure gauge is attached to the lid or

Filter and water-heating equipment generally can be installed in a cabana or other structure near pool. inlet pipe to tell when the filter needs backwashing, and usually a second gauge is attached to the outlet pipe. The water pressure in a filter is not high, usually about 10 lbs., but the concrete should be reinforced with wire and the steel lid needs a thick rubber gasket and to be secured with %-in. bolts every 4 in.

The completed filter is filled 39 in. deep with level layers of sand and gravel. Fill the bottom 8 in. deep with 1 to 1½-in. crushed gravel. Over that lay 3 in. of ½ to ¾-in. gravel, then 3 in. of ¼ to ½-in. gravel followed by 3 in. of ⅓ to ¼-in. gravel. The final layer is 22 in. of No. 16 filter sand. This is a coarse, heavy sand available from

pool dealers.

A cabana or dressing room for the pool is an extra you can add later or do without if there is a bathroom available nearby in the house. The cabana can be of almost any design. Basic requirements are privacy, drainage, a place to sit down, a place for towels and a good-sized storage place for the face masks, fins, floating toys, etc., that gather around a pool. The filter and heater

equipment usually go in a "boiler room" in the cabana or in a small shed near the pool. In warm regions, cabanas are often built without roofs and the filter system is often

left out in the open.

If you live near a small stream, the water supply problem usually is simple. Just install an intake box below normal stream level to house a submersible pump. Locate the pool so that its water level when full is well within the lift capacity of the pump. Fig. 21 suggests a method of installation, using natural stone laid in mortar for the pool sides and a layer of selected flat stones overlaid with concrete for the bottom.

Maintenance

Throughout the swimming season the maintenance of the average pool is about the same as that for the average lawn—totaling approximately two hour's time for cleaning, plus a few minutes each evening for treating the water and emptying the skimmer. A poorly-planned pool can more than double the maintenance time.

The weekly cleaning is a matter of wip-

ing any "bathtub ring" from the water-line tile, scooping out any floating leaves the skimmer may have missed with a leaf skimmer (a long pole with a small flat net at the end), brushing down the pool sides with a brush on another long pole, and then vacuuming the pool bottom. The bottom of a small or seldom-littered pool often can be cleaned by just using the pool brush to sweep any sediment down to the bottom outlet where the filter pump will draw it away, but most pools will require a vacuum cleaner to keep the bottom immaculate. There are two types of cleaners. The standard heavy-duty version is simply a 1½-in. flexible hose with a vacuum-type nozzle that is plugged into the vacuum cleaner line of the filter system. The other is independent of the filter, operates by venturi effect from the water pressure supplied by a garden hose and has its own bag to collect the debris. It is handy for small pools.


The skimmer at the edge of the pool usually needs emptying every other day, or oftener if it gathers a clogging amount of floating material. The strainer at the pump needs emptying much less often. The pump is operated a sufficient number of hours each day to keep the water clear—the aver-


age being about twelve hours but varying with size of your filter and pool and with the season of the year. A timer clock usually is installed to turn the pump on and off automatically each day. If anything, it is best to over-filter your pool because the electricity used by the pump is insignificant and a clean pool requires less chemical treatment.

Most filters have two pressure gauges, one giving the water pressure at the top inlet, the other the pressure at the bottom outlet. As the filter loads up with dirt, the pressure differential will increase. When the top gauge reads 5 to 7 lbs. higher than the lower gauge, the filter should be backwashed by reversing its flow as described in Part I. The accumulated dirt is flushed away and the thick sand layer of the filter is lifted and scoured clean by the water flow. The piping to the sewer or dry well usually has a sight glass. You stop backwashing as soon as the water in the glass is clear.

After every backwashing, a small amount of alum is fed into the top of the filter via an alum pot on the inlet line or by dropping it into the pump strainer. In the (Continued to page 214)



SUNGLASSES FOR YOUR WINDOWS

By James Joseph

VISUALIZE, if you can, the interior of your living room bathed in a cool green or blue light even though the fierce summer sun is beating at the windows. Imagine being able to shut out 90 percent or more of the day's heat and glare. Comfort aside, this would mean money saved in faded furniture and drapes and in air conditioning costs. And all this is possible and within the reach of homeowners. The answer is a quick-drying, liquid-plastic emulsion,

3. Equipped with a suction nozzle, the pump dispenser makes it possible to retrieve all the overflow




which when sprayed or "flowed" on windows, acts in much the same way as do the filters used on photographic lenses. Like the photo filters, the emulsion makes use of materials known as "photographic inhibitors," plus pigment and silicones. It is the addition of the silicones with their affinity for glass that bonds the emulsion to the window pane; the tint and the "inhibitors" shut out various lightwaves in the light spectrum, such as the ultraviolet and the infrared. Thus, in selecting one of the several available tinted emulsions, it is pos-sible to "tailor" the light entering the room according to the light and heat conditions desired. Generally speaking, the clearer and more lightly tinted coatings have a lower "fade" percentage. That is, they allow more natural light and ultraviolet rays to enter, and with them more heat and glare. The darker coatings pass less light, but score highest in the way of heat and glare reduction, as indicated in the chart at the top of the following page. A comparison of tinted and untinted windows can be seen on the opposite page.

Preparatory to applying the emulsion, the window is thoroughly washed and then cleaned with a special window-conditioning chemical, applied with a tack cloth. A trough of heavy moistureproof paper is placed along the bottom edge of the win-




4. This electrically operated dual-pump dispenser furnishes the steady pressure which is necessary to attain an even flow of emulsion from the dispensing nozzle

dow, as shown in Fig. 1, to catch any overflow. Since it is of the utmost importance that the emulsion be of the proper viscosity, it is first tested with a viscometer cup, Fig. 2. When thinned enough so that a cupful flows from the hole in the cup in 17 to 18 sec., the fluid is ready to be applied.


Application is made by a special dual-pump dispenser, Fig. 4, equipped with dispenser and suction nozzles. The dispenser nozzle is moved steadily along the upper edge of the window from one corner to the other without backtracking, as shown in Fig. 6. As the emulsion flows down the pane of glass, it spreads itself out in an even coat about \(\frac{1}{1000} \) in. in thickness. The suction nozzle picks up the overflow in the trough, and returns it to the pump reservoir, Fig. 3.


Within 4 to 6 hours the coating is dry to the touch, and in 12 to 14 days it is completely dry and cured. Two weeks following its application and every six months thereafter it should be sponged with a cleaner-preservative. ***






Obsolete Fuel-Delivery Truck Serves as Farm Water Wagon

After minor repair, the engine of such a truck usually will perform satisfactorily for this limited service. The tank, of course must be cleaned thoroughly before using it for drinking water

Tangleproof Dog-Chain Anchor

Here is a tangleproof dog-chain anchor you can make from a 3½-ft. length of ¼-in. mild-steel rod or heavy wire. After cutting the rod to length, bend it U-shape, spacing the legs about 5 in. apart. Then, push it into the ground like a croquet wicket and snap the end of the chain to it as illustrated. The chain will not only be held securely but it will not get wound around the anchor, since it will always ride over the top regardless of the number of times the dog runs around it.

Both Sides of Storm Sash Painted at One "Sitting"

Both sides of a screen or storm sash may be painted at one time by supporting the sash on a pair of sawhorses, to the tops of which wooden blocks are nailed as shown. The blocks, bearing against the glass only, provide clearance between the sash and sawhorses. Thus the side painted first doesn't contact the sawhorses when the sash is turned over to be completed. A brick centered under each pane or the wire of a painted screen, will do the trick too.

Milk Cartons Cut in Half Serve as Seedling Flats

Half-gallon milk cartons make waterproof planting flats for starting seedlings when cut in half and filled with planting mix as illustrated at left. After sowing seeds in a firmly-tamped mix, the milkcarton flats are placed next to a window where they will be exposed to sunlight. The flats should be covered with a pane of glass to help keep the temperature and moisture constant within them.



PLANT PROTECTORS


TO PROTECT newly germinated sweet corn from predatory birds, and to prevent frost damage to seedlings, cover them with fabricated plastic protectors as illustrated. Made in 6-ft. lengths, the lightweight units are easy to store and use since they nest when stacked and in use are simply placed on the ground over the row of plants. Each unit consists of two 6-ft. lengths of 1 x 1-in. wood strips drilled to take U-shaped frames formed from clothes-hanger wire. The stringers are spaced 5 in. apart, the wire frames about 6 in. Next, plastic-coated fabric or wire mesh, such as is used for covering a storm door, porch enclosure, or window openings, is stretched over the frames and tacked to the stringers. In a warm climate, where protection from only predatory birds is needed, window screening may be used instead.

Strips of aluminum foil do a good job of keeping birds away from ripening raspberries when hung on a line stretched over the bushes between stakes as shown at the right. Strips 1½ x 9 in. are cut from heavy-weight aluminum foil and are threaded on a length of heavy cord. Spaced about 1 ft. apart, the strips are kept apart by tying knots in the cord on both sides of them. They should be crimped so that the wind will make them flutter and sparkle in the sun.—Hi Sibley, Nuevo, Calif.



WHICH BOAT FOR YOU?

By Earl F. Wobeck

WHETHER YOU ARE a seasoned skipper looking for a new "command" or a converted landlubber with dreams of enjoying the thrill of boating in a craft of your own, the information in this story is intended to help you make a wise choice in an outboard boat. Such major considerations as design, construction and performance characteristics should be given careful thought before you trade a bundle of cash for the boat of your choice. In addition, the number of persons to be accommodated regularly and their preference as to boating activity must be matched to the size and type of craft selected.

About the best place to shop for a new boat is at one of the annual boat shows held in most medium to large cities sometime between January and May. Here, gathered under one roof for your convenience, you are likely to find boats of most types and manufacture. And since an attempt usually is made to arrange exhibits according to broad categories, it is fairly easy to inspect and compare boats of the desired type, without having to drive miles from one dealer to the next. Of course, the great number of boats exhibited in even one category at the "national" boat shows may make selection of a particular model difficult-and hard




on the feet, unless the answers to some rather important questions are known beforehand. This is particularly so if this "water dragon" you're going to buy is for the use of the entire family. While most boating families have one "like" in common-the water, Dad may prefer to fish or cruise, Mom likes to read and relax, while the younger set wants to be very active skiing, swimming, skin diving, or falling out of the boat. A good boat that will satisfy such diverse interests is a 17 to 20-ft. cruiser with the stern half of the boat open and the forward half an enclosed cabin, like the one shown in Fig. In a craft of this type, there is ample room in the cockpit for water-sports equipment and elbow room to fish for large game fish, and a complete galley, head and bunks for three or more in the cabin. Most boats of this type also come with a canvas top and side curtains that can be installed quickly when bad weather threatens or extra sleeping space is needed in the cockpit. If you expect to do a lot of cruising, equip the boat with two medium-size motors instead of one large one for safety.

Boaters who prefer to spend most of their time on the water cruising, will want a boat with more space devoted to enclosed cabin, less cockpit area. Those who like the adventure of cruising large lakes, or to offshore islands, where the sea can get nasty in a hurry, should make sure that the cruiser of their choice handles well in rough water. The small cruiser in



Fig. 1, is a good example of a fine roughwater boat. The fine entrance, V-bottom and deep, well-formed bow surfaces permit the boat to knife through the waves effortlessly, not pound and skid over them as is the case with flat-bottom boats having blunt bows.

Since space is at a premium on a small cruiser, it must be allotted to equipment niggardly, including only that which is definitely needed, and doubling up on some installations. A good example of the latter is shown on the cruiser in Fig. 2. Under the port helmsman's seat, which can be tipped aft to provide a counter surface, there is a sink and cabinet. The starb'd seat tips back in the same manner, exposing the galley stove, under which there is an ice box.


Those who take fishing, skiing, cruising and joy riding in afternoon doses need only a plain fishing boat to indulge in their favorite sport, although most will gravitate to a fancy upholstered runabout or sport boat soon after their first plain boat.

Runabouts are designed primarily for riding comfort. Sports boats are a compromise between a runabout and a cruiser. They are roomier and more versatile than runabouts, having movable or removable stern seats that can be rearranged to make room for skiing and fishing equipment. Many models also are available with detachable hardtops, or canvas canopies, permitting them to be used as cruisers as well. As with boats of other types, select a size that will safely accommodate the number of passengers to be carried normally. For a good guide on this, see "Sinkproof Your Boat" in the March 1960 issue of *Popular Mechanics*.

The last important personal question to consider before shopping for a boat is, what can the budget stand as to initial investment, annual operating expenses and maintenance costs? If the boat you want is decked out with a lot of unnecesary frills that are not optional, and which may add up to a budget deficit, look around for one which lists the extras as optional, or select one of the many good plain boats. Big motors gulp prodigious amounts of fuel, so stay away from a boat that is designed for hefty power if operating expenses are to be kept to a minimum.


Outboard boats like other power boats, are classified usually by type (runabout, sport boat, cruiser, as explained already); by construction material (glass fiber, wood, aluminum); and by hull design

8. Section of glass-fiber boat bottom shows how stringers are used to support floor and make bottom rigid



Molded glass-fiber hull, showing how "ribs" have been formed as part of the hull to help stiffen it




10. Longitudinal stiffeners are combined with transverse ones in this boat to counteract torque effects

(planing hull vs. displacement hull, lapstrake vs. smooth hull, soft vs. hard chine). Since design has a direct bearing on the performance of a boat according to its use, it is the first point to ponder when buying a boat. A design that is not suited to the purpose for which the boat is to be used will not perform well, regardless of the size, construction or material used.

A high-speed runabout should have a planing-type hull, one that rises above the water for most of its length when accelerated to cruising speed. The latter characteristic, in addition to shallow draft, makes such hulls ideal for water skiing and for fast riding on rivers, small lakes and sheltered bays. Most planing hulls have nearly flat bottom surfaces aft, which change gradually to a broad vee at the bow. On rough water this hull type will pound excessively, which is hard on the boat and passengers. Therefore, if most of your boating is expected to be done on large bodies of water where the surface frequently gets rough, a one-hundred-percent planing type of boat would be a poor choice.


Outboard boats seldom are built to displacement lines, wherein the bottom forms a broad vee at the stern and gradually changes to a sharp vee at the bow. When under way, the bottom of such a boat remains submerged for its entire length since there are no broad, flat surfaces angled upward toward the bow to lift it, as is the case with a planing hull. A displacement hull is essentially a deep-draft hull, making it compartively slow moving but stable and comfortable riding, even when the water is very rough.

Modern outboard boats that are designed for use on exposed waters, such as large lakes and coastal waters, combine some of the features of planing hulls with (Continued to page 220)

Shear Pin in Post Saves Rural Mailbox From Damage




Although it offers greater convenience to the rural mail carrier. a mailbox extending outward on a pipe post, such as shown, is apt to be damaged by large trucks or road-working machinery. One rural resident suggests that the outward extending portion of the pipe be mounted on a pipe of smaller diameter which is driven into the ground. By drilling a hole through both, a wooden shear pin may be inserted. Should the box be struck accidentally, the pin will shear and allow the box to swing out of the way with little or no damage.

Chalked Line Measures Water Depth

In checking the water depth of unused wells to determine the periodic changes of the water level, one geologist uses a cotton line coated with blue carpenter's chalk. When the weighted line is lowered to the bottom of the well, the wetted chalk turns a darker blue in contrast to the dry portion of the line. By measuring this darker portion, the water depth is quickly determined.




Locators Help Align Decorative Laminate on Table Top




The use of contact cement to secure a sheet of plastic to a table or counter top requires the most accurate positioning. Once the table top and the plastic have been coated with cement and the two coated surfaces make contact, the plastic can not be shifted. Correct positioning is assured by taping two metal corners to the table top to serve as locators. They should project about 1/2 in. above the table surface. By directing the plastic sheet so that two corners engage the locators, as shown, the sheet may be lowered into place accurately.

Staple Spaces Shingle Courses

Spacing of wood shingles becomes increasingly important when roofing large structures, such as barns, sheds and similar buildings, as the gain or loss in a long course will multiply the error considerably. A spacing gauge on the handle of your shingling hatchet will assure uniform spacing of each course and you can make a simple one by bending a large staple as shown and taping it to the handle at a point which will give the recommended spacing, or exposure, of the courses.


OUTDOOR OVEN HAS UNDERGROUND SMOKE PIT


FOR THE MANY homeowners who have become cook-out enthusiasts, this outdoor barbecue oven affords a means of broiling steaks and fowl and in addition can be used to prepare casseroles, to smoke hams, small game or fish. With all these features, it occupies less than a square yard of space and can be built for only a few dollars.

The oven is simply a chamber built with concrete blocks. Over-all size is about 16 x 32 x 48 in. The uppermost block in the rear wall is a pilaster block which serves as a flue leading to a chimney formed by the openings in the fifth block set on top of the oven. The blocks are set \(\frac{5}{8} \) in. apart and mortar is cut from between them on the interior to allow grills to be moved various


distances from the fire. Thus food may be prepared in the many ways requiring fast or slow cooking. Two galvanized iron doors swing on hinges set in the blocks and another sheet of iron forms the top lid.

An underground pit measuring 15 x 17 x 36 in. is dug some 4 ft. from the oven and is lined with firebrick. Used for cold smoking, smoke is conducted to it through a 6-in. pipe and escapes either through a vent or by allowing the lid to remain open a crack. To use the entire oven as a smoke house, a similar pit is dug in the base of the oven. In this case the doors are kept closed and the smoke escapes out the chimney. A space at the bottom of the lower door keeps the fire alive.—W. A. Leak, Cupertino, Calif.

TOWED INTO THE SHOP because it couldn't start under its own power, a '53 Buick gave us a round of head-scratching. Quick, routine checks showed everything seemingly in order. But—the starter motor just wouldn't crank the engine.

Then I remembered the wiring charts for the '53 Buick. One long look at these showed that we overlooked something. The chart showed that starter solenoid action depended not only on a closed circuit for the vacuum and safety switches but also on a good ground through the generator via the field coils and brushes. If for example, the generator brushes made very poor contact, then the ground was not available and the starter would remain dead.

The two-panel diagram shows that from the battery the positive cable leads to an insulated terminal block, from which another cable leads to the starter solenoid. A wire connects the block to the ammeter. Two wires lead from the ammeter, one to the regulator post B and another to the ignition switch. Note that two wires come to the ignition switch, a feed wire from the

ammeter and another that energizes the fuel gauge when the switch is on. From the solenoid relay (don't confuse with the starter solenoid) a wire goes to the vacuum switch on the carburetor and from this switch another wire runs to the neutral safety switch.

Two more wires on the relay need accounting for, one leading to the regulator post A and the other to the primary stud of the starter solenoid. This is the wire that energizes the starter motor—if the circuiting is complete and the ground is through the generator. The heavy armature wire runs between the regulator terminal A and the generator armature post. The thin field wire ties in between the terminal F on the regulator and the post, F, on the generator.

In the case of the '53 Buick in our shop a close check of the generator showed that it was so badly worn that it was necessary to replace it. That cured the starting trouble immediately. In most instances, all that is necessary is a thorough overhaul of the generator to restore the circuiting to operating efficiency.

Unusual Locations Where Trouble May Occur

Loose Rivet

A loose rivet on the flex-plate that supports the Fordomatic transmission converter can produce a knock similar to that made by a worn water pump or a V-pulley that is slightly loose on a keyed shaft. Just one loose rivet will allow the plate to slacken its hold on the converter. This development is comparatively rare, but once the trouble is detected and localized it should be corrected without delay. Of course, it may be possible to make a satisfactory repair, but usually it is advisable to replace the defective plate with a new one.

Accelerator Lever


If a '59 Dodge develops a rough, erratic shift or if the shift mechanism seems to lack positive follow-through, check the accelerator lever for looseness. This lever is mounted on a bracket on the engine side of the firewall and it is necessary to make a close check to determine if any play is present. Shim stock fitted on the flat between lever and shaft (see arrow) will tighten the lever on its shaft and usually will smooth out the action of the shift mechanism. While you're at it check the whole linkage just to make sure there are no developing defects due to wear.


Insufficient Clearance

For average owner-drivers clearance between the steering-wheel rim and the door control on '52 Studebakers is no problem. But in cold weather some drivers habitually wear lined, loose fitting gloves or heavy mittens and it is then that the minimum clearance between the wheel and the control handle can result in steering interference and possibly a bruised hand when swinging the car sharply to the left. As a serviceman you can warn your customers of this possibility.


Fuel Gauge

Fuel gauges on some '56 Pontiacs indicate empty when the tank is still about one fourth full. Should this be objectionable to the owner, here's a way to make the gauge register more accurately: Remove the assembly and bend the float arm at a point near the float. Bending it down will cause the gauge to read higher and bending in the opposite direction will make it read lower. Although the gauge can be removed as a unit with little danger, it's best to take the precaution of disconnecting a battery cable before removing it from the fuel tank.



























Quick Double-Vise Setup Saves Milling Time

Cutting a quantity of dowel pins on a bench saw can be done quickly and safely with the use of a special paddle. Cut the paddle from 34-in. stock. Its width should be equal to the length of the required pins. The wide end of the paddle is tapered and slotted to fit over the dowel stick. Set the fence paddle-width from the saw blade. By moving the paddle against the saw fence, the pins are cut to size quickly, without jamming or twisting be-tween fence and blade.

Thread Helps Position Gasket

To keep a gasket from slipping out of position while a machine or automotive part is being mounted, apply gasket cement as usual and, in addition, tie the gasket on with fine sewing thread. Loop the thread through several of the part's mounting-bolt holes so that the gasket is held centered firmly in position. Once the part is mounted, the thread will be forced into the gasket material by the pressure of the bolts and need not be removed as it will offer no resistance to a good seal or seating.-R. Dishpan Sink for Darkroom Beginner

What to use for a sink without spending a lot of money poses a problem for the amateur photographer interested in setting up a basement darkroom. The answer is a plastic dishpan. The plastic is soft and easy to cut, making it a simple job to cut a hole in the bottom for a standard bathtub-drain fitting. The flange around the edge of the pan permits it to rest neatly in an opening jigsawed in a plywood or hardboard counter covered with linoleum. In most cases, water can be piped to the darkroom by adding a line and faucet to the existing plumbing, and the sink can be drained with a length of 1½-in. plastic hose into a nearby floor drain. In the latter case, a trap isn't necessary on the sink fitting.






Filter on Faucet Assures Clean Water at Darkroom Tap

Clean water, free of rust flakes and other foreign particles, is important when it comes to processing film. Unfortunately, commercial filters are expensive and for this reason most amateurs use unfiltered tap water in the darkroom. However, an inexpensive and fairly simple water filter can be made as shown in the pull-apart drawing and attached directly to the sink faucet. Made entirely of brass, the body is a 3-in. section of kitchen-sink drainpipe


which has a disk soldered at the bottom and a flange at the top. The bottom disk is drilled and tapped for a ¼-in. hose connection. The cover of the filter is held in place with eight capscrews turned into tapped holes in the flange. A gasket cut from an innertube goes between. A section of brass channel supports the filter screens and loosely packed cotton which filters the water.










INISHING OPERATIONS on semifinished parts are often carried out by stepchucking the work piece by piece in a small lathe. Although somewhat slower than other methods, stepchucking the work results in the fine accuracy and uniformity so essential when finishing small parts within close limits. No other type of chuck in common use has greater accuracy than the step chuck, which takes over work beyond the capacity of the largest collet the lathe spindle will accommodate. Small disks which have been machined to finish diameter, precision gear blanks, any similar work which is difficult to hold, usually can be handled in a step chuck.

Step chucks made for use on small lathes usually are operated with a draw-in bar and a closing ring, or sleeve. Draw-in bars are available as accessories for almost all small lathes, also finished closers and chucks in various sizes, but many users prefer to purchase the bars and closers ready-made to fit the lathe and then machine chucks for their own requirements from step-chuck blanks. With these parts at hand, very accurate chucks can be machined on the lathe on which they are to be used. There are, of course, definite practical





SPEED FINISHING IN METAL LATHE


example, chucks taking work larger than 5 in. in outside diameter are seldom used on a 9-in. lathe. Some users consider 4 in. a maximum diameter when accuracy is a first consideration. Also, chucks are made with more than four steps only for jobs which may require special machining operations on both faces. A 5-in. capacity chuck is shown in detail above at the right.

Some users of step chucks purchase the blanks and machine them with only one step. In this way it is possible to attain the finest accuracy as the single step can be more easily machined to run dead true. When two or more steps are required, many lathe operators machine the second and succeeding steps with a work blank in place in the first step. By using this method extremely accurate concentricity is possible. Of course, in any operation the open and closed diameters of the step must be carefully calculated. Usually the requirements will call for a minimum movement of the parts when opening and closing the chuck. As a rule the steps are made $\frac{1}{16}$ to 3/2 in. in depth but, of course, this can be varied to some extent to suit special jobs. As an example, the over-all depth of the chuck, including all steps, should not exceed 5/16 to 3/8 in., as otherwise there is


some risk of distortion of the segments when closing on the work.

The accompanying details give general dimensions of chucks and closers for small lathes. The dimensions given are not specific, but rather are intended to give a general idea of the size of small chucks, closers and draw-in bars.


When operating a lathe equipped with a step chuck, it's important that one acquire a sense of just the right amount of pressure to apply to hold the work securely for the machining operations. In repetitive work this uniformity of closure is especially necessary to avoid inaccuracies due to slight distortions of the work or chuck which may occur if too great a closing pressure is applied. Also, it is essential that the workpieces and all parts of the lathe and the chuck be scrupulously cleaned and kept clean throughout the entire work sequence. Tiny metal chips, heavy grease or oil, abrasive, or any other particles on any of the meeting surfaces of the work or the chuck can cause trouble. Make sure, by frequent close examination, that there are no metal chips in the slots between the segments of the chuck. A small metal chip in one of the slots can prevent uniform closure with resulting inaccuracy in the work.



Two-Position Cross-Feed Stop

An adapter that fits the cross-feed stop will permit turning of two diameters without disturbing the original setting of the conventional stop. The adapter can be of metal or hardwood, metal being best for durability while use of wood is permissible for special jobs where speed in making the setup is imperative. A stop about 1¼ in. long will have an adequate range for nearly all average work. It is grooved to fit over the cross-feed stop screw. In use, the cross-feed stop is positioned for the larger diameter to be turned.

Four-Tier Rack for Used Tires

Racking 140 used tires side-by-side in four neat rows results in a display that is certain to catch the eye of every passing motorist. The wooden racks are a simple carpentry job. Retaining bars, made from 1-in. pipe, are counterbalanced by sash weights attached to cords running over awning pulleys. These bars keep the tires in the racks. Any individual tire can be removed by simply pulling down on the bar. When released the bar returns automatically to its original position. If desired the bar system could easily be arranged for padlocking as additional protection.

Locking Pliers Serve as Vise

There are times when a conventional vise just won't hold things in the position you want them for some special operation. That's when you call on some other tool or fitting in the shop to do the job. The next time this problem comes up in your shop, think of your locking pliers. Drill one small hole through the fixed handle. Insert a screw, add a spacer, washers and wingnut and attach to the bench top as in the detail. The setup will swing in any desired direction and the locking pliers will hold any small item in a viselike grip.


Data Chart on Torque Wrench

This chart could be the means of avoiding a serious error when tightening bolts or screws to a uniform tension with a torque wrench. Often the tension limits of assemblies are quite definite and if you depend on memory alone, you may miss badly. To eliminate the guesswork for yourself, or someone else who is to use the wrench, type or letter a chart and tape it to the spindle of the wrench as indicated in the photo. Protect the chart from dirt and smudging with a wrap of cellulose tape.



ODD-JOB LATHE BITS

STANDARD lathe bits will handle all ordinary machining without altering the cutting edges, but some special jobs may require regrinding and reshaping the cutting edges and clearance angles. Figs. 1 to 6 inclusive show how bits can be altered to work in limited space, around corners, machine recesses, fillets and grooves. Figs. 2, 3, 5 and 6 show side and top views of altered bits, all the shapes shown being ground on 5/16-in. high-speed-steel bit

stock. Within practical limits a cutting edge can be brought down to $\frac{1}{32}$ in. as in Fig. 1. Of course, such a bit will take only very light cuts and it must be ground with side clearance to prevent binding, heating and scoring of the work when used for cutting off. The shape shown in Fig. 6 is useful for undercutting in bored work which is to be threaded internally. The maximum overhang should not be more than $\frac{1}{2}$ in. or so. Walter E. Power Your Tools With a FLEXIBLE SHAFT

By C. W. Woodson

LEXIBLE SHAFT applications cover a wide range of equipment from the most delicately manipulated hand tools, running at extremely high speeds for precision work, to the heavy-duty grinding or snagging wheel built for rough, hard use where the service is severe. For light work, with a suitable handpiece mounting a keyoperated chuck, the flexible shaft will handle a variety of tools for drilling, grinding, carving, sanding and other operations, Figs. 1 and 5. With the proper combination of end fittings, on both the shaft and its casing, special equipment, such as the toolpost grinder, Fig. 2, can be driven at the required speed for internal grinding, making the tool an indispensable accessory to the metal lathe. A similar accessory, but for external grinding, is shown in Fig. 8.


Flexible-Shaft Applications


Covering a wide field, flexible shafts are made in various sizes, for light work where extremely high speeds are needed, to shaft sizes transmitting power for the heaviest type of work that can be done with handheld tools. Regular types of flexible shafts are built up of one or more superimposed layers of wire with a single wire, or mandrel, in the center. Fig. 7, details A, B and C, indicates how shafts of various sizes are made up and how the pitch direction of successive layers alternate.


Different characteristics of the flexible shaft are determined by varying the size and grade of the individual wires, the number of strands and number of layers, the degree of pitch as well as the winding tension and in some cases, heat treatment after the shafts are wound. These features largely determine the transverse flexibility, or degree to which a shaft can be flexed, Fig. 3, while under load. Torsional stiffness, or twisting under load, is affected as well as the running torque of the shaft.

"Lay" of Shaft

The "lay" of the shaft is either "right-lay" or "left-lay" as determined by the pitch direction of its outer layer of wires. A right-lay shaft is one in which the outer layer has the same pitch direction as a right-hand screw thread, while the outer layer of a left-lay shaft corresponds to a left-hand thread, Fig. 4. For maximum efficiency in transmitting power, the flexible shaft is wound for rotating in one direction only. The pitch direction of the outer layer of wires determines the direction of rotation for best results. Fig. 8 indicates how the direction of rotation is determined and the correct lay of shaft to use for each direction. For driving in a clockwise direction a left-lay shaft should be used. Direction of rotation is determined from the power-source end of the shaft, Fig. 6. Shafts of both right-lay and left-lay types are made in a wide range of sizes and care should be used in selecting one to correspond with the running direction of the motor and design of the tools to be used, Fig. Clockwise direction of rotation is most frequently applied. The average small motor runs in a clockwise direction.








Torque, or twisting force which the shaft will be called on to transmit, is the principal factor in selecting a flexible shaft because each size has a definite torqueload capacity. A distinct advantage is to be gained by running a shaft at the highest speed which the job at hand will permit. Ordinarily, speeds of 1750 to 3600 r.p.m. are recommended as suitable for flexible-shaft operation. In many applications shafts operate from 600 to 12,000 r.p.m.

The use of gearing, where standard motors are used, is common practice where a decrease or increase of speed is desirable. In each case the flexible shaft is always run at highest practical speed. Fig. 9 illustrates how the gearing is located so that the shaft operates at the highest speed.

The flexible casing is made in three general types: metallic, fabric covered and rubber covered. The casing enables the shaft to run true and operate smoothly. It also prevents it from helixing, or looping, under torsional strain. The casing also protects the shaft from moisture, dust, grit and external injury and retains the lubricant.

Two and four-wire metallic casings meet requirements for the general use of power-driven flexible shaft applications, Fig. 7, detail D, E and F. The two-wire casings are made of two formed wires accurately machine-wound. The inner wire is half round in section and the outer wire triangular, its shape conforming to the innerwire contour. This facilitates bending freely while maintaining the contact of adjacent wires. The two-wire casings are particularly suited




for portable tool applications where the shaft will be flexed more or less constantly. The four-wire casings are similar in construction but are wound four wires at a time instead of two. This makes a longer pitch, stiffening and strengthening the casing.


The interlocked type metallic casing is a single, continuous steel strip formed so that the adjacent turns are interlocked and when the interlocked joints are packed, usually with asbestos, the flexible casing is grease tight. Connecting end pieces of the shaft are press-fitted into the casing for direct connection to the motor at one end and the handpiece at the other. When the flexible shaft is operated in a straight position, the end of the core protrudes only slightly but when flexed the core protrudes considerably farther. To allow for this endwise movement the core is fixed on one end to the connector and is splined or keyed in the handpiece on the other, Fig. 6.


Fabric covered casing, Fig. 7, detail F, is very flexible in the smaller sizes. It is comparatively light in weight and is generally used on portable flexible-shaft machines. The rubber covered casing, Fig. 7, E, is generally a heavy-duty type on shafts designed for hard service. The casing is oil and watertight and offers maximum resistance to abrasion and stretching.

Always be sure the shaft rotates freely before starting. Also properly engage the end fittings and the core tips, Fig. 6, when setting up any special type of assembly. The flexible-shaft handpiece is made in different types for holding a large variety of tools. Suspended units, Fig. 8, consisting of motor, shaft and angle head, are widely used in industry.

Periodic lubrication of the shaft is necessary, the frequency of lubrication depending to some extent on the nature of the service. Where the shaft is operated for long periods with considerable flexing during operation it should be lubricated more often than for less service.












An electrified reduction drive for a large stone can be made by utilizing an auto rear end as pictured, a wheeled truck from a farm implement and odds and ends of pipe and rod stock.



Large Work Dogged to Mandrel

Large diameter wheels sometimes tend to slip on the mandrel when machining must be done at or near the rim. This tendency usually can be prevented by dogging the wheel to the mandrel as pictured. 
Reducing Oversize Hole in Hub

If you listen closely, you can tell when a pulley is running slightly loose on the shaft. When the setscrew won't hold tightly enough to silence the rattle, remove the pulley and punch-mark the hub at the edge of the hole. Space the marks uniformly. Replace the pulley and check its performance. If still loose, make the punch marks a little deeper.



The bar is attached to the machine table with a strap clamp as indicated.



Lathe-Bit Clearances Ground Accurately

Grinding a lathe bit by eye does not always produce the accuracy required for close work on the common metals. In some types of work the clearance angles are quite critical. Shops not equipped with special grinders will find use for this lathe accessory which is adapted from a straight tool-bit holder of the drop-head type. The shank of the holder is ground or milled flat on top, then is cut as indicated and fitted with a tenon so that the tool-holding end can be rotated and locked at any desired angle by means of a setscrew. Next, the parts are drilled and tapped and a pointer and protractor are fitted in the positions indicated. This arrangement, combined with the scale on the lathe compound, en-




ables you to set the tool bit for grinding at any desired angle. Use a medium to fine grade wheel, mount in the lathe as pictured, and drive at the highest spindle speed.—Harland H. May, Toledo, Ohio.


Steel Wool on Legs of Magnet Picks up Metal Filings

Removing tiny pieces of steel wool from work after rubbing down a finish can become rather trying to one's patience. It's almost impossible to brush away all the pieces, especially in the corners. Another job where a brush is only partially effective is removing metal filings from a bench top. Use a magnet for both jobs. It will pick up every particle of steel wool from a finished surface and if you press a wad of fine steel wool on each of the legs, you can use the magnet to clean up metal filings from the bench top. After using the magnet remove the wool and replace the keeper.









It is never entirely safe to hold work by hand when drilling on a drill press, even when working small diameter holes in soft metals or hardwoods. Should the drill bit seize suddenly and spin the work, there's not only risk of a shattered drill bit but of a painful injury as well. Holding the work in a drill vise or by means of suitable clamps gets the job done safely and more accurately. Of course, it takes time to arrange clamps for holding individual workpieces that differ in size and drilling requirements, but the safety factor makes the extra time spent well worth while.

It is possible to increase greatly the use range of an ordinary drill vise. Figs. 1 and 2 picture examples of how this can be done easily and quickly. To adapt the vise to hold round work and also workpieces of irregular shape drill 5 holes in both the movable and fixed jaws. These are blind holes, bottom-tapped to take headless slotted setscrews. Flats are filed or ground on each setscrew as in the detail. For some types of work heat-treated, square-headed setscrews will serve equally well. By arranging the screws in the 10 holes provided, it is possible to hold almost any irregular shaped work and also any round workpieces within the capacity of the jaws.

In Fig. 2 note that the outer face of the fixed jaw of a drill vise has been drilled and tapped to take a threaded rod. The outer end of the rod is bent at a right angle so that when the vise is placed in position the bent end of the rod enters one of the slots in the drill-press table. When the vise

is used without bolting it to the machine table, the rod prevents it from accidentally falling to the floor, also prevents it from tilting or swinging out of position. The rod can be made to serve as a pivot when locating the work directly under the drill bit.

Ordinary C-clamps can be altered as in Fig. 3 for clamping work directly to the machine table. Simply grind or file off the web and the fixed pad to permit the clamp to slip through the table slot from below. The swiveling pad on the clamp screw will span the table slot. Drill the frame of each clamp to take a small cotter pin, which will

prevent it from falling through the slot.

A spacer cut from sponge rubber or an artificial sponge will hold parallels in place while the work is being set up in the drill vise as in Fig. 4. Cut that portion of the sponge to be used somewhat wider than the space between the parallels so that when it is in place it will hold the parallels securely.

Another use for the tapped hole in the outer face of the fixed jaw of the drill vise is shown in Fig. 5. Here a rod long enough to reach past the column when the work is centered, prevents the vise from tilting or spinning with the work.


Ridge Saddle Is Safe On Steep Roof

When repairing a shingled roof at points between the eaves and the ridge it's common practice to rope a ladder over the ridge or trust two short lengths of 1 x 4 stock nailed or clamped to the ladder rails. On lower pitched roofs these methods can perhaps be considered safe enough. On a steep roof the method illustrated is safer and the ladder is more easily moved. Drive a large nail about half its length into a 2 x 4 near one end. Place the 2 x 4 and the ladder on the ridge as pictured. The length of the 2 x 4 should be more than half the length of the ladder for maximum safety.

Roof for Round Corncrib Hoisted With Elevator


How to lift the assembled sheet-metal roof of a round corncrib into position stopped one farmer until he thought of using his elevator as a hoist. The photo shows how the idea worked out. An implement wheel was placed inside the cone-shaped roof and a light chain was passed around the hub of the wheel and attached to the top end of the elevator. The latter was then raised by means of its own derrick, taking the roof with it as pictured. The elevator was backed into a position by tractor to bring the roof directly over the crib. Lowering the elevator dropped the roof neatly into place.—Wally E. Schultz, Elkhorn, Wis.









Short Cuts That Help Solve Shop Problems



- 1. TO DRILL a larger hole when all you have at hand is a ¼-in. drill, simply enlarge the ¼-in. hole with a countersink to the required size. The remaining burn is removed with pin punch
- 2. A BROKEN TWIST DRILL can be removed from work by slotting the end of the broken part. Chuck the part and rotate by hand. Slot will engage the broken part of drill in the work
- **3.** CLAMPING PLIERS are often difficult to unlock when worn. To remedy, grind two sides of the adjusting screw to take an open-end wrench. Pliers then can be loosened without damage



- 4. WHEN BORING a row of holes prevent the bit from running out by pressing a length of dowel into last hole bored. Dowel should fit fairly tight in order to serve as guide for bit
- **5. FENCE STAPLES** can be substituted for supporting strips when placing shelving between studs. Simply drive two rows of staples in line to support shelf ends. Top row prevents tilting
- **6.** A DEPTH GAUGE for measuring blind holes can be made by turning two nuts onto a stove bolt. Place bolt in hole and run nuts down to touch surface. Tighten top nut to hold measurement



- 7. LONG BORING BARS are sometimes mounted with one end rotating in a special bushing turned to fit tailstock spindle. Bar is turned with pilot which fits straight bore of bushing
- 8. IRREGULAR WORKPIECES can be held vertically against the stationary jaw of the machine vise by a strap clamp which is pivoted between a steel round and a fulcrum block
- 9. A NUT with badly rounded corners is removed easily if a cotter pin is first placed over rim of socket. Wire pin to the socket, then tap socket onto nut with light hammer blows

Spillproof Container

This spillproof container was devised by a tree pruner to hold the sealer, or dope, with which fresh tree wounds are coated to prevent infection. It's made from an ordinary oil can which is placed inside a larger container fitted with a special bail. The bail can be hooked onto the user's belt while climbing and hooked over a tree limb when in use. The handle of the brush is shortened and forced into the oil-can spout which serves as a brush handle. When not in use, the spout, with the brush is screwed into the oil can.

Before painting, fill screw slots with putty. It keeps paint out of the slots, conceals countersunk screws effectively and you can always scrape the putty out of the slots when you need to remove or tighten the screws, as in the case of screwfastened turnbuttons holding storm sash.




Swamp Shoes for Tractor

Wide, hardwood treads bolted to the tracks of this small crawler tractor enable it to travel across swampy areas and through ditches without miring or stalling. Length of the wooden treads is determined, of course, by the clearance between the standard tread plates, or lugs, and the frame. This will vary with different makes of light crawlers. Ordinarily the treads should be cut from 2 x 3 or 2 x 4-in. hardwood such as elm, or red oak. Each tread should be held in place with two large-size carriage bolts.



Portable Parts Cleaner

This parts cleaner is made easily portable by mounting on casters so that it can be moved to any part of the service shop where disassembly of car motors, transmissions and other parts makes thorough cleaning necessary. The tank is square, can be of any convenient size and consists of flat steel plates, 1/8 in. thick, welded to angle-steel legs. Square pads are welded to the lower ends of the legs for the attachment of plate casters. Inside the tank are welded two steel shelves in staggered positions for supporting the work while it is being cleaned by solvent. One shelf serves the dual purpose of protecting the motor from the liquid solvent and also supporting work. The shelves are tilted slightly so that solvent will drain back into the tank and the motor is protected from splashes by means of a baffle. The motor-driven pump supplies solvent under pressure.—Harry J. Miller, Sarasota, Fla.



it is equally obvious that the only repair that can be considered at all permanent is to grade up the low areas to the original level. You do not say but we assume that the ball the b do not say, but we assume that the height of the foundation will permit grading at least level if not slightly sloping upward to the top of the foundation. It is possible that after construction was completed the excavation was originally graded with top soil, which would settle much more than the clay or clay and gravel that was excavated from the lower levels. Probably it would be best to grade with a mixture of clay and top soil rather than top soil only, if such a mixture is available. Usually if there is building construction going on nearby, suitable grading soil can be had for the hauling costs. If the area is now grassed over the sod can be lifted and piled and then replaced after grading. Lift the sod by cutting into squares of grading. Lift the sod by cutting into squares of 10 or 12 in., and taking up about 3 in. of soil with each square. Pile in partial shade to a height of not more than 2 ft. and keep dampened until the squares can be replaced. A healthy and vigorous sod can be kept in this manner for several days. When the grading has been finished and the surface leveled by raking, apply a complete fertilizer, rake this into the top 1 in. or so of soil and replace the squares of sod, being careful to see that each square is pressed tightly against the one previously laid. When finished, scatter top soil lightly over the whole area and water thoroughly. Keep watering periodically until the sod has rerooted solidly.



tion usually is bonded solidly to the wood and provides an excellent base over which to apply paint. As the first step go over the surfaces with medium steel wool to cut the gloss and remove any dust flecks or bubbles which were in the original finish coats. Then apply a prepared undercoater, which is really a pigmented sealer. This will prevent any tendency of the old stain colors to bleed through the new paint. When the undercoater is thoroughly dry steel-wool it lightly and then apply the top coats in the color desired.



Trimming Hedge

Q — There's a high hedge which has been planted on the lot line between my property and that of my neighbor. This hedge has been allowed to grow without trimming and is now about 8 ft. high. It shades my grass all along its length, making it difficult to grow a lawn or flower beds. I do not know who planted the hedge. Can I trim it to the lot line, or do you have some other suggestion?

—T.W., Ind.

A—In most communities you would be permitted to trim the hedge to the lot line,

but the wisdom of this usually is questionable. Consider the appearance of a hedge of this height trimmed in this manner. It would be anything but attractive. Also, trimming away your half of the top growth would not solve your problem as the root system of the hedge plants would still compete with your lawn and any nearby flower beds for the available plant food. If any legal question is involved then we are not in a position to advise, but if not, then it would seem best to seek a mutual agreement with your neighbor on what seems best to do with the hedge. If it has grown to a height of 8 ft., then the hedge has been growing for several years, the time depending on the kind, of course. One plan would be to cut it to a height of about 4 ft. and reducing the width to about 2 ft. If the trunks of the individual plants are not too large, this procedure should stimulate new growth. Of course, the planting will have to be periodically trimmed in order to control height and width as otherwise the plants will spread and grow back to the original height. The other alternative is to remove the planting entirely.




Repair Old Sink?

Q—My kitchen sink is an older wall type and the enamel is chipped in several places, inside the bowl and on the rim. For several reasons I'd like to keep and use this sink for a year or more. It is quite large and has apron with rolled, or curved, edge. Is there any way to repair the chipped places?—K.D., Mo.

A—There are several porcelain repair kits available but of course, these cannot be considered as durable as the original finish, which was fired onto the metal. Usually these repair materials are accompanied by detailed instructions and it is important that these be followed in all details. It's especially important that the entire area to be patched be thoroughly cleaned of all grease and soap residues. Scrub the area with a stiff-bristle brush and rinse with clean water. Allow to dry thoroughly before applying the patching material according to instructions for application.

U. S. Military Services Need Help of Inventors

GOT ANY IDEAS for improving armed services chow? Or better yet, can you come up with something that will help a soldier

turn inedibles into a meal?

The old problem of supplying military forces with food is still with us, even in the day of missiles and jets. And the armed forces are interested in any good ideas you might have about certain food matters as well as your solution for almost 300 other

problems.

You can get a complete list of the problems from the National Inventors Council, U.S. Department of Commerce, Washington 25, D.C. When you solve them, send the answers back to the same group, which serves as a liaison between the armed services and the nation's civilian inventors. Here are some other items that are needed:

A reliable parachute-opening system to operate at altitudes from 250,000 down to 150,000 feet for the purpose of "exposing meteorological sensors to the measured elements for a sufficient period of time." The 'chutes are to be rocket-borne.

Expendable cargo parachutes. Those now in use are initially too expensive, and their

recovery adds even more cost.

High energy solid propellants having a potential energy of some two million footpounds per pound without excessive ero-

sion effect on gun barrels.

Methods of producing food from otherwise inedible natural materials—such as the use of micro-organisms (yeasts, molds, bacteria) to do this job so that a soldier can "live off the land" when cut off from his food supply.

An insect repellent that will protect personnel for at least 12 hours after a single

application.

Rapid warning device that will give early warning of the presence of harmful contamination in the atmosphere.

Flame protection for individual soldiers that can be integrated into basic combat clothing.

Cold-water laundry procedure. Field laundries need a procedure and detergent to utilize water ranging from 35 to 80 degrees F.

Turbojet engine noise suppression devices that can be applied internally or externally to a jet engine without inhibiting

its performance.

For submarine cable repair, a method that makes a damaged portion of cable rise to the surface by interaction of sea water with internal chemicals when damage occurs.



Take care to allow for a possible variation in dimensions should you decide to follow either alternative.

When recessing with a portable router or a router bit in a drill press, proceed with caution along the penciled lines. A little experimenting will familiarize you with grain direction and its effect on a router bit rotating at high speed. If necessary, score each circle with a sharp knife, being careful to stay on the line, and clean up with a small chisel or gouge as soon as the routing is completed. Sand all routed surfaces smooth. A sanding disk of the flexible type designed for use in a portable electric drill will be convenient as well as timesaving. Shaped sanding blocks made from 34-in. scrap stock and notched to hold a garnet strip in place, will clean up the narrow edges of the recesses very well.

Beveled With Hand Plane


The underneath sides of both trays are beveled flat, the bevels tapering off to ½ in. at the edges, Fig. 4. Check the drawing for accurate location of the inner edge of the bevel on each of the trays. On the original the beveling was done with a hand plane and the surface smoothed by sanding. The bevels also can be turned on the lathe before recessing with the router. Begin with the slowest speed and have your tools sharp. Work from the center to the edge. Note carefully the depth and diameter of the recess in each disk for the Lazy-Susan bearing, Fig. 3.

The capital was turned on the inboard lathe spindle, care being taken to assure a flush fit with the column, Fig. 4. When turning the column, note that the tenon extends \(\frac{7}{16} \) in. beyond the capital and that the \(\frac{3}{4} \)-in. tenon is a little short of being flush with the bottom of the base. The bottom of the base should be checked for flatness and then felt or cork can be cemented in place, trimming off a little short of the edge for neatness.


It is best to apply a finish to the individual parts before assembling permanently. Varnish or lacquer can either be brushed or sprayed on over a suitable filler or sealer. Rub with fine steel wool (000) between coats and also rub the final coat to remove the gloss. Apply paste wax and rub to a glow. A soft, mellow finish can be obtained by applying a thinned coating of sealer (shellac cut by an equal amount of alcohol will do). Allow to dry and then steel-wool level with the surface of the wood. Apply lemon-oil polish generously and allow to







Apply paste wax, wipe off immediately, and rub down. Repeat the process, continuing the rubbing. The result will be gratifying—especially so on a porous hardwood. In assembling, join the column to the capital, using white glue for faster setting. A full \(^{1}\)_6 in. of the \(^{3}\)8-in. tenon should project beyond the recessed surface of the capital if dimensions have been followed. Allow at least \(^{1}\)2 hour to set. Check the joint. Any error can be best corrected by recentering the work in the lathe and turning the joint with a very light cut. Check all the parts for fit before assembling.


Lubricate a 3-in. Lazy-Susan bearing with light grease. Use sheet-metal screws to fasten the bearing in the recessed top surface of the base, taking care to center it over the 34-in. hole which will receive the ¾-in, tenon. In fastening the column to the base, place epoxy adhesive on the upper surface of the bearing; place white glue in the 34-in. hole bored in the base, then slip the 34-in, tenon through the slightly oversize hole bored through the exact center of the lower tray. Place a little glue on the tenon and force it into the base until the column shoulder bears against the top surface of the tray. Allow just enough play for the tray to rotate freely. This will result in a compact unit with the column fastened securely to the base.


Apply lubricant to the other bearing. Place a little furniture wax on the end of the 3/8-in. tenon to eliminate any possible future squeak. Now place epoxy adhesive on the upper and lower surfaces of the bearing and set it into the squared recess of the capital. Slip the upper tray into place. Place a suitable weight on the upper tray and allow to set overnight.

slightly alkaline water of a pool, the alum coagulates into a soft floating mass on top of the filter bed. This soft floc, not the sand, catches the finer particles in the water and the used floc is flushed out with the backwash. One to three lbs. of alum per 10 sq. ft. of filter bed is ample; more should not be used.

Most diatomaceous earth filters are cleaned similarly. First, the built-in skimmer is emptied and then the water flow is reversed by a valve or other arrangement to backwash sediment and soiled diatomaceous earth to the waste line. When the water being flushed through the filter is clear, it is turned back to normal flow and a handful of diatomaceous earth is dropped into the top of the filter. The earth immediately recoats the cloth elements of the filter and it is back in operation. These filters have no pressure gauges to tell when to backwash. Smaller in capacity, they should be backwashed weekly or more

often if experience dictates.

You become quite an amateur chemist when you own a pool. Besides treating the filter, the major item is proper chlorination of the water. Chlorinating does two important jobs-purifies the water and stops the growth of algae. Algae are microscopic one-celled plants which are everywhere in the air and in all water, even that drawn from deep wells. They multiply rapidly in the combination of sunlight and warm water and so are especially a factor with swimming pools. Most algae are green in color and can turn the water of an untreated pool a muddy green in three warm days. Some will turn the water brown and some stubborn black algae collect and multiply on a pool's sides and bottom. Other treatments—ultraviolet lights, ozone, silver ion and bromine-have been used with some success but chlorination has continually proved the simplest and best treatment for a residential pool.

You can chlorinate two ways, with calcium hypochlorite or liquid sodium hypochlorite. Calcium hypochlorite is a powdered chemical commonly available and it can be thrown directly into the pool but is better dissolved with water in a gallon jug and poured around the sides so the calcium solids will settle in the jug instead of on the bottom of the pool. Liquid sodium hypochlorite is simply poured out of its jug into the pool. Household bleaches, such as Chlorox and Purex, are sodium hypochlorite solutions and can be used in the pool but a mix of three times stronger chlorine content obtained from pool dealers usually

is less expensive. Inexpensive feeders are available today which will feed either of the above liquid mixes into the filter piping automatically. A third method of chlorinating, feeding chlorine gas from pressure cylinders into the filter lines, gives the cheapest chlorination of all but is usually practical only for large public pools. The equipment required is quite expensive and the poisonous gas requires constant attention.


Pool experts advise your maintaining a free chlorine residual of 0.2 to 0.5 parts per million parts of water during the swimming season. This may sound complicated but is easy to obtain by following the daily dosage recommended by the supplier of the chlorine you are using and then checking yourself with an inexpensive pool testing kit. You add a few drops of its ortho-tolidine solution to a test tube of water dipped from the pool (within two hours after chlorinating) and compare its color with the sample tube provided. More chlorine is needed if the color is paler than that of the sample, less if more yellow. Actually, few home pools are kept precisely at the above chlorine residual, especially 24 hours a day. The chlorine dissolved in the pool is a gas that sunlight burns away rapidly. Therefore, a small amount of chlorine is usually added each day, in the late afternoon or evening, to bring the water back to or near the recommended residual. The chlorine will stay in the water throughout the night. During the heat of the following day, especially if the pool is heavily used, the chlorine dissipates to where a test may show none at all in the afternoon. That is of no consequence, because the water will be rechlorinated in the evening and bacteria and algae will not have time to grow.

Some algae do became immune to the usual chlorination in time and therefore it is advisable to give your pool a "shock treatment" about every three weeks during the swimming season with a triple dose of chlorination to kill any stubborn algae in the water. The extra chlorine will dissipate in a few hours of sunlight and on a dull day within about 24 hours. The daily chlorination is the one treatment of significant cost. For a 16 x 34-ft. pool, the chlorinating averages about \$10 each summer month.


Most pool test kits also contain a PH test for the water's alkalinity-acid balance. Occasionally and after any special treatment, you should dip the other test tube into the pool, add a few drops as specified by the kit of its phenol-red solution and compare with the PH color sample provided. It is important that your pool water register slightly alkaline. If acid or highly

MUSKEGON, MICH. alkaline, it may turn cloudy in the pool (resemble household ammonia). If the least acid, it will in time attack the plaster finish of a concrete pool, also the metal of the filter and plumbing and it will dissipate chlorine very rapidly. If too alkaline, the effectiveness of the chlorine in the water is greatly reduced. Most water has the correct balance, is slightly alkaline by nature and if off either way can easily be corrected. An acid condition is corrected by broadcasting a small amount of inexpensive soda ash in the water, about one lb. for each 5000 gallons. Repeat the dosage at two-hour intervals, if needed, to bring the water to proper PH balance. For high alkalinity, sodium bisulphite in the same dosages or equivalent amounts of muriatic acid is used. These amounts of chemicals are so minor the pool can be used for swimming


immediately after treatment.

Occasionally, the fresh water used to fill a pool contains a high amount of iron, manganese or other metallic salt. Suspect this condition if your house sinks show a yellow or reddish-brown stain beneath their faucets. The water may be perfectly clear when drawn, but exposure to sunlight and chlorine can precipitate the metal to continually cloud the pool and deposit a yellow or reddish rust on the bottom. Also, a few hard waters will deposit a scale, usually calcium carbonate, on pool sides and bottom. The scale stains plastered pools and can give a surface as rough as coarse sandpaper. Either of these conditions can be remedied by refilling the pool with more suitable water, by treating it with chemicals or by using a water softener. Often a portable water softener can be rented from a pool dealer for a one-shot treatment to clear the pool. Carefully follow the advice of your local pool dealer when softening water with either chemicals or a water softener, because the treatment varies considerably with different waters. Test the water immediately after treatment for proper PH balance and correct if off.

Winter Care

As with a lawn, a pool's maintenance is much less in winter. The growth of algae and bacteria is greatly reduced in cold or cloudy weather and the pool is seldom used. Some owners in cold regions practically ignore their pools throughout the winter, just drain and scrub them thoroughly in the spring. Most owners give the pool a partial winter maintenance, clean out collections of leaves and give the water a triple dose of chlorine during stretches of warm weather or any time the water turns green. In warm climates full filtration and

chlorination is often continued (with considerable less chlorine treatment) for an occasional dip on sunny days or just to keep the pool attractive.

Almost all experts today recommend leaving your pool filled throughout the winter. A frozen-over pool will equalize the frost pressure of the surrounding ground, is much less likely to move or crack. In very cold areas, softwood logs of 10-in. diameter or more are often secured in the water around the perimeter of the pool by short ropes attached to stakes in the ground beyond. The logs weaken the pressure and break the expanding force of any heavy surface ice. Wherever freezing temperatures are expected, the level of the pool should be lowered in the fall to drain all inlet, outlet and vacuum lines above frost level and those are plugged to stay empty when the pool is refilled. Often, the pump and its motor are disconnected and stored elsewhere. The filter and heater and their piping also are drained.

A filled pool throughout wintertime eliminates the hazard of someone falling into an empty pool. Occasionally, an empty glass-fiber, metal or plastic-lined pool, sometimes even a concrete pool, will float up out of its bed from the pressure of ground water. If filled, it will not. Plastic covers are available today for pools which are simply spread over the surface, floating on top of the water. They will support a child should he fall in, will keep leaves and dust from entering and further reduce algae growth. The diving board, pool ladder and such are usually removed and

stored elsewhere in winter.

Pool maintenance, especially the summer chemical treatment, does sound complicated to the newcomer but it is quite simple once you become familiar with the routine. In some localities pool companies offer to take complete care of the pool—weekly cleaning, chemical treatment, backwashing, etc. — for about \$35 a month. Doing it yourself requires about the same time but much less effort than maintaining a lawn.

Keeping Gutters Free of Leaves

WHEN WET LEAVES accumulate in your roof gutters, getting them out can be a tedious and disagreeable job. Try using a 2-in. section cut from an old tire casing as a "dipper". The section of casing will take the contour of the gutter, gather the leaves from as far as you can reach in either direction, and serve as a dipper for removing them. A No. 2 can will serve the same purpose in half-round gutters.

that of displacement types, resulting in a modified V-bottom with a fairly sharp entrance (angle formed by the bottom planking in the area of the forward extremity of the keel and lower part of the stem). The boat in Fig. 1, is a good example of such a marriage of designs. Note that only the forward half of the boat clears the water at cruising speed and that no water is being pushed forward at the front of the hull, spray only being deflected at the chines. This makes for soft riding qualities, permitting the boat to be operated safely and comfortably at cruising speed. A planing boat would have had to travel at a much slower speed to avoid pounding.

Whether you buy a boat having a smooth-planked hull, or one of the lapstrake type is a matter of personal preference, general performance being about the same for both. Lapstrake is an old method of fastening the planks or boards to the hull frames by lapping the edge of one plank on the preceding one, similar to the way in which the exterior boards are fastened on a clapboard house.

The design of the chine (where the hull sides meet the bottom) has much to do with the handling qualities and performance of a boat. A rounded chine tends to allow a boat to skid on turns, while a sharp or "hard" chine on a boat having a flat bottom or shallow vee, tends to grip the water when turning, making it hazardous to make sharp turns at high speed. Carried to the extreme, a high-speed turn may cause the boat to flip. A sharpcornered chine also makes it difficult to steer out of the wake of passing boats. It does help to give maximum lift though, which is why many racing craft have hard chines. The chines of the latest contender for a new world's water-speed record, the jet-powered "Tempo Alcoa," are sharpcornered, with the sides meeting the bottom at or near a 90-deg, angle for most of

Most folks, however, don't want a boat that will do a minimum of 200 mph. They are interested in a boat that will give them dependable service for a variety of water sports. To meet this demand, today's boat manufacturers are turning out hulls with chines ranging from medium-hard to medium soft. These boats take turns at high speed with little danger of overturning, yet skidding is negligible.

There is no "best" hull material. Good boats are made of wood, glass fiber, aluminum, plywood and various combinations of these materials. Although it is possible

to purchase a boat made of poor grade of material, it usually is difficult for the buyer to judge a boat from this standpoint. In this case, the reputation of the com-

pany must be relied on.

More important is the method and type of construction used, the design, size and location of the ground-tackle hardware, and the type of metal from which the latter are made. Non-ferrous metals should be used throughout, wherever metal fastenings and fittings are used. The hull planking, or shell in the case of aluminum and glass-fiber boats, should be thick enough to avoid hull damage when loaded properly on a trailer and resist easy puncture and buckling of the bottom in normal use. Joints must be fastened properly and stress points must be reinforced, especially at the transom, keel and stem. Examples of bracing are shown in Figs. 4 and 7.

There are many ways of making a hull rigid without adding weight unnecessarily by making the planking or shell overly thick. In wooden boats, of course, stringers and ribs, or frames, are used for this purpose. In small aluminum boats, transverse stiffeners of aluminum are fastened to the inside of the boat bottom, Fig. 7. To counteract the effects of motor torque (twisting action resulting from the rotation of the propeller) on a larger aluminum boat designed for a single motor, transverse stiffeners are used in the stern area, while longitudinal ones are installed from the stern seat forward, Fig. 10. The molded-in transverse stiffeners or "ribs' in the lapstrake glass-fiber boat shown in Fig. 9, is another means of achieving a strong, stiff boat while keeping the hull thickness to a minimum. Balsa-wood blocks fitted to conform to the bottom curves of the glass-fiber hull shown in Fig. 11, stiffen the bottom and provide a part of the required flotation. Heavy cruisers require bilge stringers spaced fairly close together to provide proper hull reinforcement. In the cross-section of a glass-fiber model shown in Fig. 8, the stringers not only stiffen the bottom but they divide the bilge into air chambers as well. The latter provide flotation for the boat, although air-chamber flotation considered by the writer a poor second choice for meeting flotation requirements. Punctures, especially in the floors, could reduce the floatability of the boat beyond a safe point. Foamed plastic is the best available material to use for this purpose, because of its multicellular characteristics and resistance to deterioration.




ground tackle—anchor and mooring ropes. p. 172. Many of the new streamlined designs look nice but make a bad showing when they must hold a line in a blow. Cruisers, especially, should have cleats big enough to take a minimum of %-in. rope, ½-in. minimum for mooring bitts. All cleats and bitts should be bolted in place and have a backing block under the deck where they are fastened, otherwise a hard tug on the rope may pull them from the deck. A hatch on the fore-deck provides ventilation when in port on hot days and is a safe place from which to handle an anchor when the boat is tossing about. A minor point is the provision of a bilge drain. The example shown in Fig. 12 is ideal for two reasons. The drain plug is located in the transom at the bottom of a deep sump, making it easy to pull the plug when under way so that the water flows overboard. If you look closely at the sump, another plug fitted in a drain hole on the right side can be seen. This drain leads to the enclosed bilge compartments, permitting condensation to be drained as necessary.

On metal and glass-fiber boats, look for sharp edges on the gunwales and exposed structural members. This fault is difficult to correct, so avoid buying such a boat. Permanent fuel tanks are a valuable bonus feature, since they save the cost of cumbersome portable tanks. They also provide much more fuel capacity than the same number of units of the latter, while taking a minimum of usable space. The side-mounted tanks in Fig. 5, not only take very little space but help to maintain load balance in a boat that is designed for a twin-motor installation.

Before taking delivery on a new boat, it is wise to have the dealer give a rundown on the maintenance and operation of all the equipment, Fig. 3. The "mate" should be present at this briefing since some of the gadgets are in her department. Anyway, being second in command, she will be expected to see duty on the bridge, to spell the skipper on those long cruises in your "dreamboat."

Painted Spouts Give Longer Service

WHEN YOU'RE PAINTING downspouts you can add years of service to the pipes by painting the inside as well as the outside. How? Form a roll of cotton batting or soft cloth large enough to fit the pipe snugly. Tie a long cord around the roll, dip the roll in paint and pull through the pipe with the cord.

to those existing in the U.S. can be established and operated successfully south of the border.

An example is young, enterprising Ruben Robles of San Jose, Costa Rica, who in 1955 established the country's first automatic laundry. At first, business was not too good. People were skeptical about the new type of service and were not sure their clothes would be washed separately. The reluctance of people to try something new and unknown posed a serious obstacle. It nearly broke Robles, but he didn't give up.

To solve the problem, he staged an extensive advertising campaign in which the main point stressed was that clothes were washed separately. That did the trick. People began to flood into his laundry in such great numbers that he decided to open three other similar establishments in other parts of town.

Still another proof that human nature is the same the world over was given by Willie Brealey, also of San Jose, when he established the city's first supermarket in 1955. At first, housewives who had never seen a self-service store hesitated to go inside and serve themselves. But this fright lasted only a few days. Before long, they had become so acquainted with the new system of buying and liked it so much that most of them never returned to the stores they formerly patronized.

In many cities in Latin America today there are no hot dogs or hamburgers available. Yet the Latins are great meat eaters, and in such areas as Panama and Puerto Rico people devour these two popular snacks. Many moving-picture houses still do not sell popcorn in many large towns in Latin America. Nor has anyone yet had the foresight to set up a popcorn stand at baseball games, boxing matches or other athletic contests in many places.

Last September when I traveled through the Central American countries, where there's a combined population of over 10 million, I didn't see a single telephoneanswering service, a rat and roach-exterminating service, or a mailing service despite the fact that there's a need for these services and many others like them.

In many of the large cities in Latin America, drive-ins haven't been sampled yet. Good camera-repair shops are hard to find. And many of the large towns located in warm areas have no efficient air-conditioning and refrigeration-servicing firms.

Although service industries offer excellent opportunities, I believe the greatest need right now is for small manufacturing industries such as plants for fruit and vegetable processing, candy making, furniture production and clothing manufacturing.

The reason for this is that as population increases (in Latin America it is increasing almost twice as fast as it is in the U.S.) the demand for food products, wearing apparel and housing will also rapidly increase. It is natural to expect, then, that it is in these fields that the alert individual will most likely be able to cash in if he becomes an efficient producer.

But don't plunge into establishing your business south of the border until you have first obtained more information on just what you would like to do and where

you would like to do it.

Here are some practical tips on where to obtain the information you need:

Get a good geography book on Latin America and read the material presented for each country. By doing this, you get a broad picture of the whole. Don't limit yourself to travelogues and to what you see in the movies about those countries. Hollywood's version is usually distorted anyhow and will only help to confuse you.

Try to talk to people who are acquainted with those places. Most universities in the U.S. have professors, specialists in their fields, who have been in Latin America at one time or another on assignments as sociologists, anthropologists, technicians, geographers, geologists and diplomats. They can usually give you good, practical tips which may help you in your inquiry. Write the Pan American Union, Washington 6, D.C., for further information.

Now that you know what the whole is about, you may concentrate on a particular country that appeals to you. Go to your library and look up sources where more information is available about that

particular country.

Then write to the U.S. Embassy in that country asking for advice on specific matters. The Embassy maintains a commercial attaché or economic advisor and other trained personnel who should know how things stack up in that locality. If they can't give you the information you seek, they can tell you where you can obtain it.

The Department of Commerce field office in your city can give you information obtained from the head office in Washington about specific business opportunities in certain countries. Every month the Department of Commerce publishes a little bulletin called *Investment Opportunities* Abroad (available in Washington) which may contain something of interest to you.

Other sources of information are the Chambers of Industries in each of the capital cities of the 20 countries in Latin America. They are eager to attract potential businessmen to their areas and will give you all the assistance they can in making suitable contacts and furnishing additional data.

Be sure to write to the United States Operations Missions which operate in every Latin American country. They're carrying out what we know as the Point Four Technical Cooperation Program, and their job is to give technical assistance and to encourage more production. They will gladly guide you in your survey if you specify just what line of business you have in mind and give them complete information about yourself, your training and approximately how much capital you intend to put into the business. Their reports will be unbiased and entirely objective as they are not interested in recommending the establishment of just any type of business, but those which have a fair chance of survival and which would be beneficial to the country's economy.

When you have made your choice of where you want to go and what you want to do, the best thing to do is to take a leave of absence from your present job and go there to see for yourself. No need to take all your family along. That will only add to your expenses. See and speak to many people and, as you study each business opportunity, give it a rating on your check list. Only when you have weighed everything and studied every detail will you be justified in quitting your job at home and sending for your family.

Meanwhile, remember that the people in Latin America are eagerly looking to their neighbors of the north for tips on better living. They welcome brains and initiative. If you think you can supply these, here's an opportunity to build a future for yourself.

Lab Mice Recover From Cancer When Given Stimulating Agent

Natural body defenses of laboratory mice can be stimulated to resist one form of cancer. The stimulation agent, bacillus calmette guerin, has been used commonly to stimulate resistance in children exposed to tuberculosis. The form of cancer, sarcoma 180, was implanted in the mice. In the tests, all mice recovered. Now in progress are animal studies to discover if body defenses can be stimulated against spontaneous cancers as well as implanted ones.





Tips for Tenting

Worn plastic valves on air mattresses can be "built up" again by application of liquid plastic coating

Letting out the air from the mattresses should always be the first chore when you are breaking camp. The mattresses will be deflated when you are ready to take off. Incidentally, the mattresses make wonderful floats on a lake.

For additional recreation for the youngsters, carry along a spare inner tube and rope. Tie the rope to a tree limb, then attach it to the inflated tube. You have a swing which will attract playmates for your children from all over the camping area.

In national forests during fire seasons, you are required to have in your car a shovel, ax and pail. You might try picking up at an Army surplus store a folding shovel used by GIs for digging foxholes. Among other things, the shovel's sharp point is excellent for scratching a small rain-runoff around your tent—and for digging clams on a beach.

A hatchet will serve, but a small handled ax is much better. Some of the wood you will have to chop is on the knotty side. The blade of the ax is also the best tool I have found for prying tent spikes out of the ground.

You can keep the chopping down to a minimum by looking for "squaw wood"—bits of dead trees found on the ground. Squaw wood serves as good kindling, and its bark makes the hottest fire with a low flame. If the woods are wet with rain, snap off dried twigs from tree trunks to get a fire going.

Cook on an open fire if you will, but a camp stove will keep everybody happier.



You need a stationary light of some kind. It can be either gas or battery powered, but you should have a light to place on the camp table in the evening, and in the tent upon retiring.

Another indispensable item is a water jug. It is handy to have in the tent at night, but even handier to have in the car while traveling. Many stops at service stations are saved. If you take a boat out fishing, the jug should go along.

Keep dishes—and dish washing—to a minimum. For \$10, you can get a week's supply of paper service for a family of

tour.

Probably the biggest saving in dish washing comes in the use of paper cups. We carry them in assorted sizes. Eightounce hot-drink cups for coffee and tea, nine-ounce cold-drink cups for milk and heat-of-the-afternoon beverages, and five-ounce cold-drink cups for water and breakfast fruit juices.

We bring along our regular silverware, but disposable forks and spoons can be used if vacation dish washing is to be kept

to an absolute minimum.

Many housewives today are using aluminum foil extensively in their cooking, but they too often forget it on vacation trips. Two or three rolls should be tucked

in with the supplies.

My wife probably appreciates aluminum foil most when frying the day's catch of fish. She molds a large piece of foil over the frying pan, and cooks the fish on this superimposed surface. The frying pan comes through the cooking process clean enough to require only rinsing.

Selecting the best possible camp site is highly important. In improved federal and state parks, the problem is relatively simple. Just try to get near a water faucet and avoid being too close to rest rooms

which are used at night.

Midwesterners, I have noticed, when they first come to the timbered mountains of the West, are inclined to pitch tents in the deepest woods. If the woods are deep enough, they don't warm up all day. And, if it has been raining, the tall timber can be downright uncomfortable. You want shade, but not too much.

Some camp sites in the mountains are of necessity in ravines, but avoid them if possible. The cool night air settles in the draws. And don't pitch your tent where there is danger from rock slides or falling rocks. I have a friend who got quite a hole in his tent. He adds that he was lucky "not to get one in my head."

Because you are camped in the mountains, you are not necessarily above the mosquito line. Last summer, one of my sons and I camped at high-altitude Lake Louise in Canada's Banff National Park. As we ate our supper, the mosquitoes be-

gan dive bombing.

My son got an insect-killing bomb from the luggage compartment. Spraying this around the camp site and tent, he finished supper. By the time we were ready to hit the sleeping bags in the tent, there was not a mosquito in sight or sound. It was peaceful all night, although, once when I awoke, I heard a neighboring camper swatting desperately.

To help keep the floor of the tent free from ground moisture, place a piece of heavy plastic on the tent site before you erect the tent. If you carry gear on the top of your car, the plastic will do double duty as added protection against rain. The plastic is available at building-supply

stores.

Then there is the matter of keeping the canvas floor of the tent clean. A big help is an old towel or throw rug placed at the entrance to the tent. Also handy is a "sawed-off" broom. Many campers use a child's play broom or a whisk broom for sweeping the floor of the tent, but a regular broom with handle sawed off to size is most effective. The shortened broom will fit under the front seat of most cars.

If you have extra space—and careful packing will usually allow some—take along a rake with sawed-off handle. It will come in handy for clearing a moun-

tain camp site.

Finally, as a highly important "be sure" item, be sure always to put gear—from ax to air mattress pump—in the car in exactly the same place each time. If you have to make camp in the dark, you will be happy you did. Even in the daylight, it is good to know just where everything is. Makes you feel at home on the trail.

As an assurance that you're not forgetting anything, run through this check-off list before you leave on a camping trip:

Shelter and Sleeping


Tent (take a couple of extra tent spikes).
Heavy plastic ground cloth.
Throw-rug or towel for front of tent.
Sleeping bags and pillows with cases.
Air mattresses (include liquid plastic for repairs).

Hand pump for mattresses. Broom with sawed-off handle.

Eating and Cooking

Knives, forks, spoons, cups, plates, cereal or soup bowls. Paper cups and plates will add to the vacation; at least, use paper cups.


RADAR SIGNAL BOUNCED OFF SUN

Scientists at Stanford University's Radioscience Laboratory report making man's first contact with the Sun by sending a

radar signal to it and back.

Drs. Von R. Eshleman and Phillip B. Gallagher and Lt. Col. Robert C. Barthle said the Sun was difficult to reach by radar because it was 93,000,000 miles away and because of the "thunderous radio noise arising from its turbulent surface." The solar radar echo did not come from the Sun's visible surface, but from its outer corona, the pearly white upper atmosphere of the Sun usually visible only at time of an eclipse.

The contacts were recorded on magnetic tape at daybreak, April 7, 10 and 12 of last year. Scientists have spent the past months analyzing the tapes, which store sounds of a crashing roar, with the aid of an electronic computer. They hope to use the radar probe to learn more about solar flares and violent eruptions on the Sun that hurl streams of particles into space. Some of these particles, trapped in the earth's magnetic field, are thought to form the radiation belts expected to hamper manned space travel.

cut down until there was nothing left in the water but a small chunk of center section. When that is gone the Big E will live among the great legends in our military annals. A few scraps of her will still be around, however. The rounded skirt of her fantail is destined to become a monument in center field on the diamond of Hoffman's favorite Little League ball team in River Vale, N. J. And the section of steel bulkhead containing her battle record was cut out intact for posterity. Few ships in history can boast the achievements emblazoned on that sheet of steel. Beside her impressive record of kills is the long row of battle stars, nine Navy Commendations and a Presidential Unit Citation—the first ever given to an aircraft carrier.

The Enterprise was one of those rare combinations—a rugged ship on which everything nearly always worked the way it was supposed to, and whose complement of officers and men always seemed to function with miraculous teamwork and spirit. B. J. Oglesby, a member of her crew through the great ship's early campaigns, wrote to Popular Mechanics and explained some of the factors that made her the number one fighting ship of her time.


Outstanding Crew

"Her crew," says Oglesby, "was the cream of the crop, made up of highly trained enlisted men with high-school education or better, and officers who were nearly all Naval Academy graduates. Our chief petty officers were outstanding men in more ways than one. Bing Miller and Jelly Jones, two of the Navy's great baseball players were among them; so was Chief Sobeloff, the fleet boxing champ. Our aerographer, Chief Lindemann, was the navy's top enlisted weatherman, and no one in the fleet knew more about engines than our chief machinist's mate, Krup, who was later beheaded by the Japs on Guam. . .

"But the number one reason for the spirit aboard was . . . Captain C. A. Pownall, who commanded her during the critical training period just before war broke out. He was a stern-but understanding-C.O. who demanded nothing less than perfection-and got it. As a result, we held many fleet honors. Our communications department won the coveted 'C' for excellence; we held three 'E's' on the five-inch gun mounts, an engineering 'E,' and boasted the top baseball, basketball, softball, and rowing teams in the fleet. Our rowing team won the International Battenberg Cup. This striving for the best extended through our air group



whose fighters always strafed closer, whose dive bombers waited just a little longer to release bombs, and whose torpedo planes pressed in to spitting distance before dropping their fish. This great competitive spirit was largely responsible for the fantastic record of enemy planes shot down, ships sunk, and shore installations destroyed during the real hostilities, and may explain why the Big E was able to continue fighting after suffering, on several occasions, what would have been mortal damage to a less efficiently run ship.

"Another factor was the personal conviction of every man aboard that it was our job to avenge Pearl Harbor. We had come into Pearl on December 8, 1941, to find ships still burning and the stench of the dead on the air. Every man was hopping mad to refuel, rearm, get back to sea and kill the enemy. That burning desire to kill the enemy was still in me when I left the Enterprise months later, and didn't disappear until long after I returned to the United States as an instructor in a training school in Florida. I have talked to many other shipmates who had the same experience."

And the hard fact is that no ship in the U.S. Pacific Fleet during World War II did more to "kill the enemy" than the farfamed fighting lady—Big E. **





The transom block is shaped and slotted to receive the engine standoff before being cemented to frame 7.

Gluing the ¼ x ½-in. balsa chine and sheer beams and the deck stiffener to the notched bulkhead frames, bow block and transom block completes the skeleton.

While the glue on the skeleton is drying, the engine standoff and cowling may be cut and shaped. There's nothing critical about the shape of these pieces except that the standoff should fit snugly into the transom slot and be high enough to allow adequate propeller clearance. Basically, the standoff and cowling are cut from a single ¾-in.-thick white-pine board. The cowling is widened with a layer of ¾-in. balsa glued to each side and shaped to fit. The engine mounting plate should be screwed to the hardwood core of the cowling, as detailed in Fig. 11.

Plank the bottom and sides of the skeleton with ½6-in.-thick balsa sheeting before gluing the engine standoff in place. Each joint should be given two coats of fuelproof glue to insure watertight compartments. In a similar manner, the top of the hull is planked after the standoff is in place.


The Cabin Cover

The cabin cover is fashioned next. Details are given in Figs. 7, 8 and 10. Properly constructed, the frame of the cover will fit snugly into the cabin of the main hull so that it need not be fastened to the hull in any way. A cutout may be made in the top of the cover for the installation of the receiver on-off switch, if desired. Otherwise, the switch may be mounted inside the cabin.

Installation of the skeg and stabilizers on the bottom of the hull completes the construction of the model.

"Finishing" the model is almost as timeconsuming as the actual construction, but it must be done right if you expect a neatappearing, watertight job. Carefully fill in all joints and crevices with a sealer such as balsa filler and sand the entire assembly smooth with fine sandpaper. Brush on a couple of coats of clear fuelproof lacquer, sanding lightly after each coat. Then cover the external parts of the hull and cabin cover with silk or model-airplane Silkspan. Don't try to cover these units with a single piece of material. Cut enough silk for the individual large surfaces, lay the material in place, and brush it down with a coat of clear lacquer. When the lacquer is dry, trim the silk with a razor

blade, allowing a 1/8-in. overlap. This is then brushed into place with another coat of lacquer. Repeat this procedure for all exposed surfaces until the entire job is finished.

Installing the Rudder

The rudder assembly, detailed in Fig. 12, is quite simple to construct and install. A small hole is drilled through the center of the cabin floor directly in front of frame 7. Push a 2¼-in.-length of ¼6-in. i.d. brass tubing through the hole so that it extends ¼8 in. below the bottom of the boat. Cement the tubing to the center of the frame and apply a liberal amount of glue to the point where the tubing goes through the floor, both inside and outside the hull, to make a watertight seal. To strengthen this installation, a ¼-in.-thick piece of balsa is glued and screwed to frame 7 to hold the tubing firmly in place.

The tiller is made of 1/16-in.-dia. steel wire, as in Fig. 12 and slipped through the


previously installed brass tubing.

The rudder, a piece of .020 brass or tin is soldered to the end of the wire which protrudes through the bottom of the tubing. Before this is done, however, the rudder and tiller should be carefully

aligned, as in Fig. 8.

Painting of the model can now be completed. The silk or Silkspan with which the boat is covered comes in several colors and can be used for your basic color scheme. Otherwise, you can follow up the coat of clear lacquer which fastens the silk to the boat with several coats of colored lacquer of your choice. The interior of the cabin and cabin cover should be painted at the same time and we strongly recommend that you use the same brand of paint throughout the entire project. When all painting is completed, strips of celluloid can be glued inside the cabin cover to serve as windows and to keep the cabin reasonably watertight.



Installing the Radio Equipment

Installation of the electrical equipment is illustrated in the photo. The equipment is identical to that in the car, and installation is very similar. The servo is first mounted on a piece of ¼-in. white pine which is then glued to the bottom of the boat in a position which permits the crankshaft pin to engage the tiller. Careful positioning is essential so that the rudder is aligned straightforward when the servo is in "neutral."


The receiving antenna is a length of thin (.020) steel wire, bent as illustrated. It is cemented to the inside of the cabin, with cloth glued over it to hold it upright.


Two notched balsa-wood blocks glued to the floor serve as a receiver mounting platform and permit the receiver assembly to be fastened down with rubber bands. In the boat, the battery holder for the servo cells should be screwed to a block of ¼-in. white pine glued to the bottom of the cabin. A small alligator clip attached to the end of the receiver antenna lead permits clipping this wire to the antenna without soldering. This facilitates interchange of the receiver between boat and car.

Possible Substitutions

The simplicity of the radio-control functions, the stability of the models and the adequate mounting space available, make parts substitutions quite permissible. Virtually any receiver and transmitter and self-neutralizing servo you may already have will provide satisfactory results. Neither size nor weight is particularly

critical so long as the equipment can be relied upon for dependable performance. In all cases, manufacturers' adjustment instructions for the radio equipment and servo should be carefully followed.

The engine recommended in the list of materials has an integral gas tank which holds enough fuel for a two or threeminute run. If a longer run is desired, a separate tank, such as a Kap Pak or Perfect #12, may be attached to the engine mount. (This may become necessary if an engine other than the one illustrated is used since many units are not supplied with a built-in tank.) The top of the auxiliary tank should be level with the engine crankshaft to avoid flooding or hard starting. A fuel line from the auxiliary tank to a hole drilled in the side of the Baby Bee engine's integral tank provides the necessary coupling for that particular engine. Your hobby shop dealer will be able to assist you in selecting the proper engine and tank combination for any reasonable length of running time.







Gimmicks Add Realism To Your Home Movies

This makes the tablets vaporize, invisibly, and the condensing gas, falling from ceiling height in the form of white particles, photographs just like snow.

TV MOVIE BACKGROUNDS. Want something different in title backgrounds? Although it is not practical to shoot amateur movies off a TV screen, TV scenes do provide an excellent source for unusual title backgrounds. Pick the scene you like and take a still picture of it at a 25th of a second. Then make a blowup and use the enlargement as a background card to hold the letters of the title. Such TV backgrounds also can be used for animated puppet sequences.

MYSTERY MOVIE TITLES. Mystery titles that appear out of nowhere in black and white or color, are easy to produce if you write or print the title on a white card with a stick of paraffin. To make the lettering appear magically, support the card at an angle, start the camera rolling and sift fine, colored pigment over the lettering, letting the pigment slide from top to bottom.

SMOKE FOR MOVIES. Small clouds of fireless smoke can be produced with chemicals for outdoor movies. Pour several drops of hydrochloric acid into a plastic squeeze bottle and a few drops of ammonia into a second squeeze bottle. When ready, hold both spouts together and squeeze simultaneously. Dense clouds of chemically produced smoke will result. Caution: In handling hydrochloric acid, extreme precautions sould be exercised. Wear rubber gloves to avoid direct contact with the skin, and avoid inhaling the fumes.


Humidifier Removes Odors, Cleans Air Automatically

Home odors are removed, and the humidity of the house kept constant, by a new home air purifier designed to work with air-conditioning systems. Resembling a drawerless filing cabinet, the unit gives the effect of airing out the home with clean, fresh air every half hour. Its manufacturer, the Carrier Corp., says the purifier not only removes new odors but also gradually will eliminate those absorbed over the years by walls and furnishings.

The unit's filtering element consists of many layers of aluminum mesh screen which is bathed every 20 seconds by a wave of water and a glycerinelike fluid. After absorbing odors, the fluid is heated and air is bubbled into it to carry away odor

vapors through an outside vent.

Humidity is controlled by regulating the amount of water in the solution passing over the filtering element. A humidistat, once set, performs this chore by electrically opening and closing a water valve to maintain the desired rate of evaporation.

transplanting when he goes to work with his fork or digger."

Another advantage of the freezing system is that it enables Wayside's shippers to fill orders from under one roof, which eliminates delays caused by inclement weather, the cause of many broken promises. Wayside uses the previous year's sales figure for perennial plants as a guide for the number of plants it stores in the freezing room in November. Two-thirds of the number of plants sold during the previous year are consigned to the freezer. In February, March and April, when plants are naturally dormant, orders are filled from the field. The first shipments go to the southern part of the country. Then, as spring's warmth sets in, Wayside begins shipping northward. In April, order fillers begin drawing from the freezing rooms.

A nurseryman of 100 years ago probably wouldn't have been very much surprised if he had visited a nursery of 50 years ago, because the process of growing seedlings and plants and cuttings-one of man's oldest occupations-hadn't really changed much. But a visit today to a large nursery like Wayside Gardens would produce wide-eyed astonishment in the time-traveler. He would never have dreamed that a planter could help nature -and improve the nursery business-in so many ways.

Meeting Winslow Grullemans, he might first be told about such innovations as the mechanical planter and weeder, and the freezer. Then Grullemans might explain that many nurserymen have their own planes to speed delivery of perishables.

The old-time nurseryman would be amazed to learn how Grullemans keeps track of his nursery business. One of the first nurseries to adopt an International Business Machines system, Wayside Gardens uses the machines for a daily sales inventory, the payroll, records, mailing lists, shipping labels and research. The cybernetic machines tell the Wayside office which plants are selling and which aren't, and even offer proof with comparative figures for other years. The machines keep a complete buying history for each customer, and if Grullemans wants to announce a special offer on a particular plant, the machines tell him which customers would be interested. If he wants to know how well a certain magazine advertisement "pulled" in a certain area of the nation, Grullemans can turn to his machines for the information.



Grullemans would take pride in telling about mist propagation, rose-waxing, jiffy pots, the use of sphagnum peat for growing purposes, and polyethylene packing.

Mist propagation, which was developed about four years ago, benefits young cuttings of shrubs, which have difficulty taking root. Mist propagation sprays water periodically on the cuttings' foliage, keeping it moist until the rooting action takes place. This means that the foliage will not deprive the cuttings of moisture, and they will have a better chance of surviving. Before mist propagation, cuttings had to be kept under shade, and even then many plants could not make their own roots; they had to be budded or grafted. Throughout the day, the spray comes on for five seconds in every 60-second interval. A timer can be set for any spraying period up to 60 seconds and the spray can be constant or scattered.

In Wayside Gardens' rosebush storage shed is a "wax heater." It is here that the dormant rose plants are dipped in melted paraffin wax to boost their development after replanting. The waxing process has been in the nursery industry for the past quarter century, but it was just a few years ago that a definitive study was made to prove its value. The study showed that waxing raised growth and flower production more than 50 percent, and that it reduced dieback and mold development in storage while increasing growth of shoots and roots. Moreover, the waxing of rose canes slowed moisture loss.

"We found, and still do, that some of our customers are suspicious of the idea of waxing roses, much as some are uncertain about freezing plants," Grullemans says. "But now we have scholarly proof that the waxing method helps nature, and we show the results of the study to anyone who's dubious. We still have unwaxed roses for customers who can't stand the idea of waxed roses—despite the proof."

About two years ago, the clay flowerpots familiar for scores of years to anyone
who has ever planted were replaced by
pots made of peat—called "jiffy pots."
They got their name because plants grow
faster in them than in the clay pots, and
because people save time by planting pot
and all in the ground. "Putting the pot in
the ground also avoids the transplanting
shock that a plant gets when you knock it
out of a clay pot," says Grullemans. "And
the roots will grow right through these
peat pots." After the jiffy pot is in the
ground awhile, the peat disintegrates.

Wayside Gardens grows many of its plants in sphagnum moss rather than in



regular soil. It's been found that they do much better in the sphagnum, which is a genus of mosses that grows in boggy or swampy places. Once, as a test, Grullemans arranged for a shipment of sphagnum-grown chrysanthemums to be in the mails for a month. At the end of that time the mums were alive and healthy. "If those mums had been planted in regular soil," Grullemans says, "I don't think they would have lasted 10 days."

Wayside grows many difficult varieties in jiffy pots containing the nursery's own mixture of two-thirds sphagnum moss and one-third ground-plastic foam. The foam, mixed through the moss, keeps it from compacting. All of Wayside's plants are packed in polyethylene bags which let the plants breathe and retain their moisture, yet allow the harmful gases from the foliage to escape. Until three years ago, when Wayside adopted the polyethylene bags, the nursery used aluminum foil and wood-fiber cartons in packing. The trouble with this method was that the plants dried out too soon. It also produced a heavier and more expensive package to mail, and required much more labor in packing. Now a plant is dropped into a polyethylene bag and the top of the bag is tied. The customer merely unties the bag and places plant and jiffy pot in the ground.

For all their modern, mechanized look and the many changes that have come over them in the past 15 years, big nurseries like Wayside Gardens still depend on human hands for cutting, potting, budding and grafting. All perennial plants are hand-planted. Nurserymen still must gamble and take a certain number of risks, and hope for a warm spring, adequate rainfall and a not-too-severe winter. Experience and common sense haven't yet been outmoded by machines, and a nurseryman has to have much of both, plus patience. In propagating hydrangea plants, for example, Wayside's workers make hand cuts from maturing plants in the fields and haul the cuttings into sheds, where the foliage is trimmed, again by hand, and stems are dipped in hormone powder to induce rooting. Then the cuttings are planted in the cold frames and remain there six months. After that time they are removed and planted in the field, where they continue to grow for two years before they are harvested and sold. As they mature, of course, their cuttings are taken to the sheds to begin the three-year cycle over again.

It is unlikely that nurserymen will ever make nature conform to the Speed Age, but their machines have certainly gone a long way in giving nature a hand. * *







Midget Camera for Guided Missiles

Capable of taking a single photograph, a camera weighing eight ounces is being mounted in guided missiles at Woomera, Australia, to record details of target interceptions. Made of steel, it measures one and one-half inches in diameter and is one and one-quarter inches long. An ultrawideangle lens gives a field of view of 186 degrees so that two cameras mounted back to back provide coverage through 360 degrees. The camera unit is mounted in the missile's nose and is triggered by a proximity fuse. Its main job will be to photograph the attitude of a missile relative to the target, but photographs may also show the attitude relative to the ground.







The X-15 Points Into Space

full throttle. In that short time the craft accelerates from its drop speed of 500

m.p.h. to above 4000 m.p.h.

Research flights began last year and will continue into 1961. It is understood that specs on the X-15 call for a craft capable of sustained flight at Mach 6 at an altitude of 250,000 feet, roughly 50 miles above sea level. But North American designed the plane to fly higher. Eventually, climbs to 100 miles or more may be made unless it is found that the heat of re-entering the atmosphere would be too great. Even in a normal descent from 50 miles the leading edges of the nose and wing will glow bright red with heat.

The X-15s are painted black so they can radiate this heat away quickly. The pilot, however, wears a bright silvery suit. Its aluminized cloth is intended to reflect heat that might build up in the cockpit during re-entry or high-speed level flight.

No single pilot has been flying the X-15. Scott Crossfield, backed by Alvin S. White, has been doing the performance flights for North American. The Air Force's Maj. Robert M. White and NASA's Joseph A. Walker were assigned as pilots by the purchasers. Each will alternate and each is expected to fly the craft to maximum speed and to maximum altitude.

Never before has such a complex vehicle been built, for never before was it necessary to cram so much energy, in various forms, into such a small space. Seven different gases and liquids are required.

Liquid ammonia is the engine fuel, liquid oxygen is the oxidizer. The LOX tank is something like a spool that is built around a separate, inner tank and separated from it by an air space. Liquid nitrogen at minus 300 degrees is pumped through the air space at the start of servicing and helium gas is pumped into the inner tank. The nitrogen keeps the helium cold until subzero oxygen is loaded and takes over.


The surrounding structure frosts up at the start of this operation and so hot air is circulated through other parts of the craft to prevent freezing of the hydraulic and

hydrogen peroxide lines.

The hydrogen peroxide provides a hightemperature gas that drives two auxiliary powerplants, known as APUs. These generate power for the 1300 pounds of instruments and for such odd jobs as defogging the windshield on the way to drop altitude.

The cockpit and the pilot's suit must be pressurized, and the pilot and instruments must be kept cool during portions of the flight. Liquid nitrogen (pressurized by he-



To avoid this the X-15 feeds off its mother plane during the climb. The LOX tank is topped off from a tank on the B-52, the pilot breathes B-52 oxygen and gets his suit nitrogen from the B-52

Preparations begin five days ahead of time. Systems are inspected and operated. The rocket motor is fired. Movie cameras are installed on the mother plane. The closed-circuit TV by which the launch panel operator on the B-52 checks the X-15 during the climb is tested.

Other groups stand by. The pilots of the two F-104 chase planes, the F-100 photo plane and the photo helicopter are alerted, as are the crews of the back-up chase planes at Edwards and Palmdale.

A two-section convoy proceeds to the landing area on the dry lake bed. Included are fire fighting trucks, ambulance, a mobile crane, crash crew, purging crew, ground photographers and the radio control truck that takes over during landing.

Other crash and fire crews will be spotted at alternate landing areas. Telescopes that make space-positioning photographs of the flight are prepared. Radar and telemetry crews go to their high-range tracking stations at Ely and Beatty, in Nevada. Interested officials from throughout the country converge on Edwards.

The countdown begins 20 hours before the flight is scheduled to start. If takeoff is set for eight in the morning, the task of mounting the X-15 on the B-52 begins at noon the day before. Fueling starts at 3 a.m. and all the other gases and liquids go on board both planes on schedule.

It's possible to "hold" at any time. Once a countdown was held five days on account of weather. Strong surface winds are a bugaboo. The X-15 can land in a 25 or 30-knot wind but this would be too strong for the pilot in case of a bail-out.







He has a dressing room, an air-conditioned trailer, that delivers him to the plane and takes him from it. Two men dress him in the \$18,000 space suit and meanwhile the pilot goes on 100-percent oxygen, a prerequisite for an extremely high altitude flight. Before the dressing starts, however, there are other details. Sensing devices are taped to his body so that his rate of breathing, temperature and heartbeat can be monitored. At the last moment he is driven to the plane.

The chase planes take off, then the B-52 with the black X-15 under one wing. During the half-hour climb to the drop point and altitude, the X-15 pilot has more than 50 jobs to do. He checks his radio equipment, sends preliminary bursts of data by telemeter, operates the controls that start the aircraft's systems and reports his progress to P. C. Harvey. He finishes pressurizing the X-15 by the time the B-52 pilot gives him the one minute warning, and reports to the mother plane and test conductor that he is ready to be launched. The B-52 pilot starts a short countdown and at "one" presses the button that allows the X-15 to drop away.

Once free of the mother plane, the X-15 pilot fires his rocket motor and begins the

flight scheduled for that day.

Each flight is made for different purposes. The idea is to obtain new information on such things as behavior of the vehicle at the speeds and altitudes achieved, the air pressure "Q" factors, the "G" forces, temperatures and the effects on

the pilot himself.

Some knowledge from the X-15 program will be used in Project Mercury, the plan for orbiting a man around the earth in the nose cone of a rocket. The X-15 also is a forerunner to Dyna-Soar, the space glider that is intended to circle the earth in 80 minutes after being shot into orbit by a rocket. Like the X-15 pilot, the pilot of Dyna-Soar will control his craft as it re-enters the atmosphere and bring it to a safe landing at a selected spot.

Another vehicle under consideration is the X-15B, a larger version of the X-15. It would be shot into orbit as the third stage of a huge Saturn booster and would travel around the earth at 18,000 m.p.h. at 2000 miles altitude. It would carry two men, a pilot and an observer. It, too, would dive and glide back to a safe landing after

using retro-rockets to decelerate.

But Mercury, Dyna-Soar and the X-15B are still in the future. Unless the Russians have put a man into orbit since this was written, the X-15 program is man's closest approach so far to true space flight. **



"Interior construction is very poor. Upholstery is not fitted neatly nor are the moldings. This is where the foreign car excels."—Ohio physician.

"Shock absorbers extremely noisy when cold."—Colorado commercial artist.

"Disappointed in the dash compartment which is made of cardboard. I feel this is false economy in a car that cost \$2366."—Massachusetts contractor.

"Can't open the door vent windows even a little bit in rain or water comes right in your face."—Illinois truck driver.

"Parking brake (foot pedal) requires too much effort. A woman couldn't use it."—New York heat treater.

"Turn-indicator lever broke twice in first 1500 miles."— California businessman.

"Dome light is too low. Hits the heads of children standing in rear."-New York photographer.

"Needs larger gas tank. I get more miles per gallon but a larger car has a 20-gallon tank so I make as many trips to the gas station as before."—California owner.

"Inside rear-view mirror too close to center passenger's head."—New York maintenance man.

"Too small rear window. Poor vision to rear."—Massachusetts executive.
