





Beginning at 5:30 P. M., July 11, 1947, Special Agents COURTLAND J. JONES and ROBERT E. LEONARD conducted the following physical surveillance:

The surveillance was undertaken at 127 B Street, S. E., at 6:02 P. M. A green Nash Coach (fenders a darker green than the rest of the car), bearing D. C. license plate 100-633, drove up and parked in front of the building at 127 B Street S. E. Agent JONES identified the driver as GROFF CONKLIN. At 6:04 P. M. a woman, identified by agent JONES as LUCY CONKLIN, the wife of GROFF, walked up the street in a westerly direction and got in the parked car with her husband. At 6:14 P. M. a woman stepped out of the basement entrance at 127 B Street, S. E., which can be identified by a sign as the headquarters of the National Committee to Abolish the Poll Tax. This woman walked over to the car and talked to the CONKLINS for a few minutes and then entered the car. She was about forty years old, 120 pounds, five feet, two inches tall, had a thin face and thin, straight nose, black hair, parted in the middle and rolled into a knot in the back close to her head. Her complexion was pale and she were no make-up. Her build was thin and she had thin legs. Her eyes were blue with gray around the edges. Her hair was graying at the temples. Her general appearance was that of an old maid school teacher.

At 6:27 P. M. a second unknown woman walked up and down the street slowly. She finally hesitated at the bottom step of the stairs leading up to the building at 127 B Street, S. E. At this point, the first unknown woman got out of CONKLIN's car and approached her. They spoke briefly and then both women entered the car and it was driven off.



The second unknown woman was about six feet tall, 150 pounds, and about 33 years of age. She had blonde hair and her hips were rather broad. At 6:55 P.M CONKLIN, after driving out Bladensburg Road on the highway to Baltimore, turned right at the Peace Cross and continued on the road until he reached a signpost reading Lanham. At this signpost, he turned right and the surveillance was discontinuate this point by Agents JONES and LEONARD.

Meanwhile, Special Agent MANNALL, on the same date, had undertaken a physical surveillance at Crandall Road and Defense Highway in Lanham, Maryland. It may be noted that anyone visiting COLLINS would ordinarily turn into Crandall Road from Defense Highway, otherwise he would have to drive over little-used country roads.

This surveillance by AGENT WANNALL was undertaken at 5:45 P. M. At 6:27 P. M., a woman about 35 or 40 years old, who had brown hair and who was wearing glasses, drove into Crandall Road from the direction of Annapolis in a Pontiac bearing Hassachusetts license tags No. 623-858. She proceeded in the direction of COLLINS: house.

At 6:56 P. M., GROFF CONKLIN, his wife and two women, described above, were observed to drive up Crandall Road toward COLLINS' house in CONKLIN's car. At 7:00 P. M., Agents LEONARD and JONES joined "ANNALL at Lanham. At 7:20 P. M., Special Agent JOHN H. LUCAS joined the surveillance there.

At 7:45 P. M. Agents LUCAS and "ANNALL observed CONKLIN's car, and the car bearing Massachusetts license tags No. 623-858, parked in the yard beside COLLINS' house. At 8:45 P. M., Agents LECNARD and JONES observed COLLINS and GROFF CONKLIN at the Lanham train station. They not a man who arrived from Washington at 8:43 P. M. and whom COLLINS indtroduced to CONKLIN as Mr. POST. POST was about 45 to 50 years of age, five feet ten inches tall, 175 pounds, had iron-gray hair, bald down the center on top. He had a full face and was wearing glasses. The three mer drove towards COLLINS' house in GROFF CONKLIN's car. The surveillance was discontinued at Lanham shortly thereafter.




Accordingly, Agent ANNALL conducted the following physical surveillance at Lanham, Maryland, beginning at 10:15 A. M., July 12, 1947:

C., and a man of about 45 years of age. six feet tall, 200 pounds, having black hair, clean-shaven but heavy board d, and wearing tortoise shell-rimmed glasses, got off the bus and was greeted by COLLINS as ARTHUR. ARTHUR and COLLINS immediately entered the latter's car and drove in the direction of COLLINS' house. The surveillance was discontinued at this time.







of July 8, 1947, the Newark Office advised that a check of the indices of that office under the name of MORSE LECHER, JR. was negative. Investigation conducted by Special Agent PAUL F. DINSMOTE revealed that MORSE ARCHER, JR. resides at 515 Chester Avenue, Moorestown instead of the address furnished in your letter. It was determined through Officer CHIRLES ENGICKSON of the Moorestown Police Department that ANCHER and his father, WARTICKARCHER, are both officials of a bank in Camden. This family has an excellent reputation, and it is believed that the ARCHERS are quite wealthy. MONSE ARCHER, JR. was married to MARY JANEAREVE of Moorestown who is a member of a highly respected family, according to Officer EINICKSON.

Mr. JIM DAVIS, proprietor of the Chrysler-Plymouth Sales Corporation in Moorestown, a neighbor of MORSE ARCHER, JR., stated that ARCHER was approximately 40 years old, is married and has four children and that he had known him for approximately 15 years. According to Mr. DAVIS, ARCHER originally resided in Haddonfield New Jersey, and he is a graduate of Princeton College and Harvard Law School. He is an Attorney and his father, WAMTICK ARCHER, is President of the First Camden National Bank. According to this informant, MCHSE ANCHER, JR. is a conservative

type of man who seems to have a "high regard" for his own position and importance in Moorestown.

Creiner, law firm. It is also reported that AMCHER is a member of the Board of Directors of the First Canden National Bank and that he is an attorney. He has been active in labor relations work, but he has always represented the employer in this type of work. Also, according to DAVIS, AMCHER has a summer home at Barnegat City, New Jersey, and at the present time his oldest boy, age 16, is a student at Princeton and is considered somewhat of a child prodigy. DAVIS said that he believed that ARCHER was loyal to the U. S. Government and pointed out that in spite of the fact that he is the father of four children he tried to get in the armed services during the last war.

Under date of June 20, 1947, the Philadelphia Office reported that the following investigation was conducted by Special Agent LESLIE A. HAUGEN:

ROBERT McBRIDE, Rural Carrier for Huncy ID #4, stated that he has known SIMUELYMCHOLSON for a number of years. NICHOLSON resides at the home of his son, JIMES, who is a successful farmer. Both Mr. NICHOLSON and his son have excellent reputations in the community. Mr. McBIIDE stated NICHOLSON is a high type individual andhe feels there is no question of Mr. NICHOLSON's loyalty to the United States.

WEBB BNOSCIUS, Post Office Clerk, Muncy, Pennsylvania, also stated he is well acquainted with SAMUEL NICHOLSON. He considers him to be of good character and stated that NICHOLSON enjoys an excellent reputation in the community and his leyalty is beyond question. According to Mr. BNOSCIUS, SAMUEL NICHOLSON is rather wealthy and before living at his son's farm was an official of the General Electric Company in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

Chief of Police U. S. HOUSEKNECHT, Muncy, Pennsylvania, stated that he knows the NICHOLSON family quite well, and he considers them to be high type people He stated that SAMUEL NICHOLSON is a very fine old man with an excellent reputation in the area. During the war, he was a notably loyal American.

HOWARD C. OPP, President, Muncy Banking Company, who stated that he was well acquainted with SAMUEL NICHOLSON, advised that prior to his retirement, NICHOLSON was First Vice President in Charge of Production at the General Electric Company plant in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. His wife's maiden name was "HITELCER and prior to her marriage she resided near Media, Pennsylvania. NICHOLSON has two sons, JAMES, with whom he resides, and another, whose name Mr. OPP did not know, in New York State. Mr. NICHOLSON is independent financially. According to OPP, NICHOLSON is at least eighty years of age, and during the past few months he has been in a hospital suffering the infirmities of old age. Mr. OPP has often engaged him in conversation and NICHOLSON has given him every indication that he is a loyal American citizen. He seldom travels and his only present source of income, according to Mr. OPP, is his returns on General Electric stock. Mr. OPP stated that there is no question in his mind concerning the loyalty of SAMUEL NICHOLSON or his family.

The persons interviewed were considered reliable and they were cautioned concerning the confidential nature of these inquiries.



The following investigation was conducted with regard to the abovenamed subject, by Special Agents H. DUDLEY FAYNE and JAMES J. CAMAVAL for the period from april 16, 1947 to august 31, 1947.

The mail cover placed on the home of FITZG RAID met with negative results during the above period.

The following information concerning FITZGERALD'S activities was furnished by Confidential Informant Total Confidential Information of the Confidential Inform

On April 18, 1947. HARRY AGDOFF attempted to contact the FITZGERALDS and was advised that they were out to dinner and planned to go somewhere in Virginia afterwards. AGDOFF commented that he guessed the FITZGERALDS were coming to his place.

On April 19, 1947, an individual known to the informant only as WHILENE" (ph), contacted EDWARD FITZGENLU and he told her that he was leaving for Chicago that afternoon, mentioning that he had to be there for a meeting and that he had another meeting in Washington on Monday. HELENE mentioned that she lost FERCILORNELISON'S phone number.

On april 27, 1947 HERE CHIMMEL contacted EDTARD FITZGEWID and told him that he is busy getting things together. HERE mentioned that VET BASSIE suggested that EDWARD FITZGERAID did know someone in an apartment who had data on the project he was working on. FITZGERAID suggested that MAT HOSE (ph) would be the man to see. SCHLEEL agreed to come over to see FITZGERAID on Honday at 9:15 A. when they will get together with ROSE.

On May 5, 1947 EDEARD FITZGERALD conversed with his wife, REDEKAH, and told her that he was supposed to meet "HENRY" and the Chilean Ambassador at the Moger Smith at 5:00 for a drink. The then told her that he would probably me at his office until midnight.

On May 8, 1947 EDTARD FITZGULALD again conversed with his wife and asked her if CAROL had come over. R. PETAH answered in the affirmative. ED told her that he had been cut at the United Nations all day and had an appoint ment with Marian (ph), the next morning and also with 200 HILER. He also said that he expected to return to Washington Saturday night.

On May 11, 1947, FITZGERALD was in contact with HARRY MAGDOFF, another subject in this case. FITZGERALD sivised him that he had just returned from New York where he had seen SQ (HELLER) and a few other people regarding a job. ED said he also ind several other things in mind, one of which was getting in touch with LESLE (possibly LESLIE KISH) and STEVENSTOCK (ph). HARRY MAGDOFF then invited the FITZGERALDS over Thursday evening but ED said they had a date with FITZGERALDS to dinner on Tuesday night but the invitation was declined.

On May 20, 1947, a man whose identity as unknown to the informant, but who is believed to be JLANTILER, the brother of MEDIKAH FITZGERALD, conversed with the latter and advised her he was having lunch with Mr. OPPENHEIMER. REDIKAH asked if he was going to see OPPENHEIMER and if he expected to be with him the following day. He existed her that he had an appointment to see General GROVES that afternoon. The reference to CFFENHEIMER who is employed by the Atomic Energy Commission.

On June 5, 1947 FEROL CORNALISON conversed with ADMARD FITZGERALD and discussed a story which she had written for publication in some magazine. She said that she had received a letter to the effect that it could not be published in the large circulation magazines because of the startling frankness of the article, but that the publishers would see what could be done with it on some of the "enlightened magazines". FERCL mentioned that she was starting to work on a new job londay and that she had had her physical and fingerprints. She said to appointment was temporary and indefinite and that she felt like a "at" getting a job when everyone else is being fired, and thought she was ming looked upon with suspicion. FITZGERALD replied, "Yeah, I'm sure yo're one of those doubtful characters that the FBI would approve of". FECL said that was the worst thing he has said about her.

On June 12, 1947, FIFZGERALD conversed with his rife and mentioned that he had to be at the Carlton Hotel at 5:00 PM o see a representative of TRYGVE LIE and that he would either come stright home or go to MADOFF'S office and come out with them. (Apparent) the MAGDOFFS intended to visit the FIFZGERALDS that evening.)

On June 25, 1947, a person known to the informant cly as "FRANK" but who is believed to be FRANK CALERON, contacted REBEKAH TZGERALD and said he was at the corner and wanted to know if he could come over.

RELEKAH told him that he could. She also mentioned that the FUCHS were

visiting them that evening.

On June 28, 1947, ADMARD FITZGERALD contacted BENTHITING and asked BEN to pick him up when he went to JANE STONES.

On July 8, 1947, an individual known to the informant only as FRANK, (believed to be FRANK CAMERON), contacted EDTARD FITZGEFALD and discussed having dinner at TRUDY'S tomorrow, since it was FRANK'S birthday. It was also mentioned that REBEKAH was going to meet TRUDY early in the afternoon and that FRANK would meet EDTARD FITZGERALD at the George Jashington roof at 5:15 PM.

On July 19, 1947 FEROL CORNELISON contacted PEEEKAH FITZGENALD and agreed to go to the FITZGENALD'S that night and have Cinner and to spend the night.

On July 22, 1947, EDJARD FITZGERALD conversed with his wife REBEKAH from New York City and mentioned that he had been at Lake Success all that day and expected to be home the following day.

On July 29, 1947 FITZGERALD again conversed with his wife and mentioned that he had lunch with IRVING KAPLAN, another subject in this case.

On August 8, 1947, FRANK Ch. EROW, who was at the FITZGALLD residence, attempted to contact hrs. GERTHUDE Ch. ERON at the State Department on Extension 685. However, she was not a vailable.

Physical Surveillance

The following physical surveillance was conducted by Special Agents COURTLAND J. JCNES and H. DUDLEY PAYNE on April 2, 1947 but was not included in previous reports, and reflects the activities of FITZGENALD:

On that date HARRY MAGDOFF, EDUARD FITZGEFAID and V. LETIS BASSIE met in the lobby of the Willard Hotel and at 12:30 PM were joined by IRVING KAPIAN. They then proceeded to Ceres Restaurant near the 1300 block of E Street, N. W., where they had lunch. Upon leaving the restaurant, HARRY HAGDOFF was observed to enter the Munsey Trust Company and the others waited for him on the sidewalk. They then proceeded to the corner of lith and Pennsylvania Avenue, N. T., where BASSIE left the others and returned to his office in the Commerce Building. The surveillance was then discontinued.



During this period the Informant reported that there was almost a total lack of information of interest concerning the subject and his wife, PRISCILLANIES.

HISS continues to work at the Carnegie Endowment and he and his wife continue their usual social contacts which have been set forth in detail in previous reports.

On May 18, 1947, HARRY KEYS (ph) talked to ALGER HISS long distance from Garden City, New York. KEYS is apparently a friend of HISS inasmuch as they discussed personal matters and ALGER told KEYS that he and his family were driving up to Vermont in June to spend the summer. KEYS gave his home address as 114 Lee Road, Garden City, New York and his business address as Personal Airplane Sales, 147 Mest 42nd Street, New York City. Apparently KEYS' wife is named PAT.

On May 31, 1947 MALTER LIPPMANN, a well known newspaper columnist and author talked to ALGER HISS and discussed his views on the Moover Movement toward a separate peace (with former European beligerants). LIPPMANN commented that he felt such action would be a mortal blow to UN and HESS agreed with him. After some conversation, LIPPMANN proposed that HISS contact persons of importance so that proper action might be taken. It was finally agreed that HISS might speak to JIMMANNES and possibly to Dean ATCHESON (State Department). HISS agreed to get to work on the matter and indicated that he would let LIPPMANN know of his success.

On June 8, 1947 JC (ABRAHAII) spoke to PRISCILIA. JO wanted to know if AICER could speak to her "summer group" and thereafter it was a discussion of vacation plans of the HISSes.

AIGER commented that they would be away from Mashington the latter part of June and possibly in Peacham, Vermont all of July except for a brief peiod of time in Holderness, New Hampshire. (It is to be noted that the Informant had previously learned that HISS expected to attend a conference at Dartmouth, College, possibly in August.) It was also mentioned during this conversation that the King Smith School had succeeded in securing sufficient funds to rent two houses which will be used for classes possibly in the Pield of

International Relations. It was finally agreed that HISS would be listed firstatively for August 7 at the King Smith School (1751 New Hampshire Avenue, N. W.) He will generally discuss "ways in which organizations and individuals can promote a better interpretation of International questions and help or influence foreign policy". It will be noted that the King Smith School has previously appeared in this report in connection with PAHER EBER's course of instruction there in the field of philosophy.

On June 15, 1947 ALEX/IO:DEN spoke to AIGER HISS and mentioned that he had recently talked to contact HISS. IO:DEN revealed that he had an idea and he wished to talk with HISS and that Senator CONNLEY had suggested that some foundation like the Carnegie Endowment should get behind the idea. The two men agreed to meet for lunch on the following day to discuss the matter.

On June 17, 1947 Mrs. DOWALD HISS attempted to reach PRISCILLA HISS and was told by the maid that Mrs. HISS was out and that the family was leaving for the summer on the following day.

During the remainder of June and all of July AIGER and PRESCILLE HISS were absent from Eashington, and he was to return sometime in August 1947.



RE: MARY JANE KEENEY AND PHILIP O. KEENEY

The following investigation reported by Special Agent C. J. JONES is for the period of May 16 to 31, 1947.

Confidential Informant has made available a letter directed by MARY JANE KEENEY while in New York City to PHILIP O. KEENEY under date of April 20, 1947. As of that date PHILIP, or ANGUS as he is commonly known, was in Tokyo, Japan, employed by the War Department as a civilian. This letter reflects that MARY JANE traveled from Washington, D. C., to New York City on april 10, 1947, in the company of DAVID and EDITECTABL. MARY JANE wrote that she accompanied the WAHLS to the apartment of URSULA WASSERMAN, 10 Downing Street, New York City, in order that URSULA and DAVE could meet since she, MARY JANE, felt that they should be acquainted for their mutual benefit. The WAHLS left MARY JANE at URSULA's apartment and proceeded to the residence of MAURICE HALPERIN in Brooklyn.

The evening of April 19, 1947, URSULA WASSERMAN gave a party at her apartment which MARY JANE attended. In this regard MARY JANE wrote

"The party was arranged largely so that DAN LEVIN could meet some of URSULA's Russian colleagues in the Security Council and her Dominican colleague. Both were here with their wives and the four seemed charming. Only I just couldn't summon the energy to engage in conversation with them but instead confined myself to those I already knew:

*DAN and KATHLEEN (LEVIH)
MIKE and LARIAN GREENBURG
JULES (KORCHIEN)
ALXHART/ELL

MAL I was very glad to see because I have been wanting to put a little extra pressure on him to go down to see HIR AN (KABAT). DAVE and EDITH (WAHL) blew in at 12:30 on URSULA's invitation and DAVE and JULES and DAVE and URSULA had conversations so I take it that my strategy worked. Unfortunately AL (HARTVELL) and HALO had had to leave about 11:00 so that DAVE didn't see AL with whom he used to work a number of years ago. URSULA and JULES are in the middle of an altercation. Last week they had decided to see no more of each other and since he had been out of town until yesterday, it was impossible for them to have it out last night in the presence of so many people. I called JOE B. DELINSTEIN) and arranged to have lunch with him tomorrow. Apparently he knows nothing through MIKE N. (NAIGLES) of what has befallen us (the State Department refusal to issue MARY JANE KEENEY a passport).

"I hope I can catch URSULA in an off moment and have a little fundamental conversation with her about job possibilities. The few moments we had alone yesterday and this morning were spent on her difficulties with JULES and are immediate ones. She agrees entirely with me on feeling that if I get the passport through CREEK/NATH's end run, I should proceed to Japan regardless of what might happen to you later. Like both you and me, she thinks it quite possible that whirlwind might strike you there wholly aside from the incident already upon me. I guess it's just that she and I both feel that the work you are doing there is very important, more important than you think it at times. JULES is of the opinion that this end run may well be successful. URSULA had already gotten CREEK's name from KATHLEEN FAHY as that of the one person who could be of help. JACK (FAHY), by the way, is fearfully ill again. A recurrence of the meningitis he had in the fall."

Another letter dated April 27, 1947, by MARY JANE KEENEY was made available by Informant. In it she wrote ANGUS that on April 26, 1947, SHIRLEY ENKINS called her earlier in the day, advising that IAN MINER was going to be at her home that evening and they desired to have a few people in. In this regard MARY JANE wrote

"CARL (GREEN) and I were going to a party at HARRIET'S (STHONS) for the DUNAWAYS about 9:00 so we went up to the Jenkins about 8:00. IAN looks older but otherwise the same as when we first met him in Berkeley. He is with the Security Council now on the Australian side and says he finds conditions here much changed from what they were in 1939. DAN THORNER, JOHN DEFRANCIS, and HENRY WARE and his wife came too."

HARY JANE also wrote that the EDWARD/BRECHERS, DAVID WAHLS, CHET SI CLAIRS, PHILIP DUNAWAYS, and HARRY PLOTKIN OF FCC were guests at HARRI ET/SILIONS. Conversation, according to LARY JANE, was mostly about radio.

It is to be recalled that on Friday, April 25, 1947, MARY JANE KEEPLY made plans to visit with HELEN SILVERMASTER. Since that date, on numerous occasions MARY JANE has expressed concern over the information that she learned on a certain Friday afternoon. In the above referred to letter dated April 27, 1947, MARY JANE advised PHILIP KEEPLY of the fact that NATHAN SILVERMASTER, his wife HELEN, and ULLIAN were interviewed by Bureau Agents. In speaking of this, MARY JANE wrote

The tale I heard on my visit of Friday afternoon was indeed a horrifying one, something like the Detroit incident of 1941 about which Senator MORRIS spoke for three days in the

*Senate. It is hard to tell whether it was a vast fishing expedition or had a more sinister purpose. Anyway it had a terribly traumatic effect upon HIEW. LUD got much the worst of it. The incomprehensible thing is why they ever submitted to what was advanced as a wholly voluntary procedure. We and a number of others came into the conversation. They have had legal counsel since—

what and FELEN SCHNEIDER have been down for the weekend (visiting DAVID R. TAHL). There was a party for them friday night to which I took ALIX REUTHER) at whose apartment I had stopped on my way down Connecticut Avenue. I wanted very much to discuss the developments with DAN. FELSIE is mentor in New York this week. The latter, he tells me, is bringing out a book in a couple of months on the agency in question (F.B.I.) - no holds barred either.

(In regard to the above attack on the F.B.I., it is believed that LARY JANE has reference to a book purportedly being written by ALBERT EUGENE/KAHN entitled Expose of J. EDGAR HOOVER".)

JANE to PHILIP dated May Day, i.e. May 1, 1947. Confidential Informant has advised that on or about this day MARY JANE became ill with diarrhea and was forced to take a bed at a local hospital. Thile there, ARY JANE wrote on May 1, 1947,

the first of the week. I didn't see him but DAVE (MAHL) did.
SAM had a wonderful time in Paris where he saw much of PAUL and FRANCINE (NELSON) but was unable to fine EMILIC (NORES).
He came back on the same boat with ir. FOSTER, not from Gloucester, with whom he and his cabin mate, a Yugoslav courier, had many conversations. SAM said the gentleman hasn't what it takes, both in his own opinion and in that of people he talked to in London and Paris.

SALUEL GEORGE BLOO FIELD of San Francisco, California, has entered into this investigation previously. It is to be recalled that prior to going overseas, he visited MARY JANE KEENEY, at which time she furnished him with the names and addresses of FAUL NELSON and his wife, as well as that of E-ILIO ANDRES. The latter individuals are known Communists with whom MARY JANE had contact while she was in Paris during the fall of 1945. The Mr. FOSTER's referred to is undoubtedly WILLIAM ZY FOSTER and the Yugoslav courier mentioned above is believed to be IVAN MARDUN.

Informant has also made available certain correspondence directed by PHILIP OLIN KEENEY to MARY JANE. Under date of April 30, 1947 while in Tokyo, Japan, he wrote

TALLACE is not going to have an easy assignment in his trip about the U.S.A. He will face many hostile audiences and be quoted in a hostile press. Congress has not acted with the speed anticipated by TRUMAN at all regarding the Greek and Turkish loan. The House may require more changes before the money is made available on our first installment against totalitarianism spelled with a capital C. This movement is strengthening TRUMAN and he is now out for a complete purge which will build up the Truman Committee and the F.B.I. It makes our own fight harder and more important to win. We represent much to be cherished by many and it behooves us to carry the torch.

HARRIET SDDY

It is to be recalled that during this period MARY JANE KEENEY was advised by the Department of State she would not be issued a passport, and also PHILIP KEENEY was informed by the War Department that his position in Japan was being terminated upon his arrival in the United States.

HARRIET GERTRUDE EDDY, under date of May 15th, wrote MARY JANE KEENEY the following:

This can only be a note to report the cable Tuesday from ANGUS from Honolulu saying he expects to reach San Francisco about next honday, the 19th. I sent the cable over to DESSICA and also phoned her. We will all surely hope to have news of the landing so we can meet him.

*A letter yesterday from Sofia said they would soon send answers to the questions I had asked. So evidently BORIN' sent them my letter. I'll get the material ready and hope ANGUS can carry it through.'

The identities of SOFIA and BORIN are not known to the Mashington Field Division. However, it is to be observed that in the report of Special Agent DAVID E. TODD dated May 27, 1947, at San Francisco, California, mention is made that HARRIET GERTRUDE EDDY was observed to pass a sealed, unaddressed, unstamped envelope to FHILIP KEENEY immediately upon his arrival at San Francisco. Agents who observed this incident commented that the

envelope contained what appeared to be three or four pages of typewritten material. 2

MARY JANE has apparently advised her friends that she has been denied a passport and also that FHILIP O. KEENEY was being recalled by the War Department and would be dismissed. She has received a number of condolences.

Under date of Hay 1, 1947, ARY REELAN, 601 East Beckwith Street, Lissoula, Lontana, wrote LARY JANE and among other things said

Whe are so very sorry to hear this heart-breaking reversal in the trend of your lives. It is completely depressing to see this subtle witch hunt start all over again in Congress while we seem to drift toward another war. I can't bear to think of it. In the two years since the surrender all the sands of cooperation and good will seem to have run out.

*I know that while you both have breath, you will have the will to fight such injustices, but I know too that for a long time it will be a stunning blow to ANGUS to have had his work in Japan suspended so abruptly * C

BERTH DENKINSON, 6802 South Dante Street, Chicago 37, Illinois, wrote under date of May 8th:

*I hoped each day to be hearing that you were on your way and yet I knew that no news this time was going to be bad news eventually. With things moving so damn fast in Washington, a delay in your passage could mean only one thing. Of all the beastly -- breaks for ANGUS. If he only could have been left along for awhile longer to go on with his splendid work -- -

"South Chicago is in the midst of a witch hunt led by the American Legion and the editor of our 'famous'?? daily. Some of us have gone to bat and are finding, as I suppose we should have known, that our liberal friends won't stand up to be counted. I only hope we will be able to ind the courage to continue to fight back."

LUCY SASSALAN, wife of LLTE XXXXIAN, 11027 South Green Street, Chicago 43, Illinois, wrote the following to LARY JANE under date of Lay 12, 1947:



*Demn this cruel world. WALTER and I were just figuring that 22 years of our 44 have been spent in war and depression and at no time have we or our friends been safe from the snipers. Every time it catches me unprepared. I think that I know it might happen at any time to anyone but each time it is as bad as if it had never happened before. You know how I feel about you both and you know the comfort and encouragement I want to give you but words are so inadequate.

Under date of .ay 14, 1947, an individual identifed as LUCIA at Stanford University, Stanford, California, wrote the following to ARY JANE:

"In any other circumstances with any other Congress this whole situation rould be impossible! And to go through the whole wretched thing twice! I can but believe that all the F.B.I. investigations both of you have gone through before must mean that this time the F.B.I. itself would be showing its own incomptence if it did not agree with its former decision. And look at your own record and the secret work that you have done in Washington and Berlin and surely ANGUS was FBI-d as much as you.

Wyou have LURRLY in the Senate. Is there any use of writing him, many of us? I do wish I knew any Republicans well but I don't but damn it, if I or we can be of use in any way, you will write won't you?"

PHYSICAL SURVEILLANCES

On May 22, 1947, Special Agents CH-RLES G. CLEVELAND and COURTLAND J. JONES observed MARY JANE KEENEY to enter the offices of the CIO-PAC, 728 17th Street, N. W., at 2:56 P. M. The surveillance was maintained for about half an hour and at that time it was discontinued.

Special Agents COURTLAID J. JONES and L. W. R. CBERNDORF instituted a surveillance regarding MARY JANE and PHILIP O. KEENEY on May 23, 1947, at 8:15 A. M. At that time PHILIP O. KEENEY was observed to arrive in Mashington, D. C., via Pennsylvania Railroad train. He entered the concourse and looked for MARY JANE for approximately fifteen minutes. At the same time MARY JANE was observed walking in circles about 50 yards from her husband. Neither ever saw the other in the concourse and they proceeded separately to their apartment at 215 B Street, N. E.

Special Agents WILLIAM R. COMNELISON and EARL L. FUOSS observed MARY JAME and PHILIP to leave their apartment at 2:00 P. M. on May 23, 1947, and to travel by automobile to the apartment of ALIX REUTHER, 2231 California Street, N. W. They remained there until 3:25 P. M., at which time they proceeded to the residence of NATMAN GREGORY SILVERMASTER. Special Agents OBERNDORF and JONES observed the automobile of the KEENEYS parked in front of the SILVERMASTER residence at 5:00 P. M. May 23rd.

On May 27, 1947, Special Agents CCURTIAID J. JONES and L. W. R. OBERNDORF observed MARY JANE KEENEY and her husband to travel from their apartment by automobile to the apartment of ALIX REUTHER, 2231 California Street, N. J., arriving there at 8:15 P. M. At 8:45 P. M. an individual answering the description of Dr. N. THAN HELFGOTT was observed to enter the apartment of ALIX REUTHER. Thereafter ALIX, the KEENEYS, and the individual believed to be Dr. NATHAN HELFGCTT were observed on the roof garden of the apartment house.

The following information was made available by Confidential Informant

IARY JANE KEENEY contacted HULDA FLYNN, at which time they discussed their mutual friends, BENEDICT and ETHEL-ALPER, now residing in New York City. HULDA commented that CLARICE/DOANE (ph) of Boston was visiting the ALPERS when HULDA saw them last.

The next contact of interest was between MARY JANE and Mrs. ROSE ALPHER, at which time MARY JANE informed the latter that ANGUS KEENEY was expected to arrive in Washington on May 24th. ROSE ALPHER then told MARY JANE that LAURA-TURNER, apparently a colored girl, would help MARY JANE in her household cleaning.

HARY JANE had contact with ANNA SERENSON. They discussed the progress being made by the General Homes Company with which ANNA is associated. ANNA commented that while in New York she had seen the architect (JULES KORCHIEN). In discussing the demand for pre-fab houses, which General Homes is engaged in manufacturing, ANNA said that the American Veterans Committee ir organizing a housing program. She remarked that there are still nine shares of stock left and asked if MARY JANE knew of anyone who might be interested in purchasing some of it.

DAVID R. WAHL next had contact with MARY JANE at which time he inquired concerning her health. She replied that she is feeling better and commented that she had received several letters from ANGUS KEENEY who was enroute from Japan.

IRVING ETEBERIAN contacted MARY JANE and according to the explained that he formerly was a member of the Progressive Librarian Council in Detroit, and asked if MARY JANE recalled him. She did, and IRVING said the War Department had advised there was an opening for a librarian in Tokyo. Since he knew that ANGUS KEENEY had held a similar position in Tokyo, IRVING desired to secure MARY JANE's comment. MARY JANE related that ANGUS was expected in Washington soon and he could inform him concerning the position.

IRVING asked if ANGUS had been able to accomplish anything and if it had been necessary to fight to get anything done. MARY JANE replied in the affirmative, but commented that ANGUS had won the love, respect and cooperation of all the Japanese librarians. MARY JANE related she believed ANGUS would be glad to have someone succeed him who had been a member of the Progressive Librarian Council. It was agreed that IRVING LIEBERMAN would correspond with ANGUS and secure more details.

IMRY JANE conversed with EDITH and ALBERT WATERSTON, Fairfax Village, Extension 789. ALBERT informed FARY JANE he had lost his job, to which IMRY JANE remarked that she was not surprised. It was agreed that they would get together soon for a visit.

MARY JANE next contacted ERIE BEECROFT, Fairfax Village, Extension 190. They had a lengthy conversation concerning the return of some items of furniture which ERIC purchased from MARY JANE.

FEO ATHANASSOV was in contact with PARY JANE and it was agreed the former would visit MARY JANE the following morning.

MARY JANE next had contact with DR. THISTLE MCKEE, wife of MARTIN T. BENNETT, at which time MARY JANE said she would be over for dinner that evening.

lirs. FEO ATHANASSOV cancelled her visit with MARY JANE and invited the latter for lunch, which invitation was accepted.

ALICE/THORNER contacted MARY JANE on May 18th, at which time the latter discussed her illness and furnished ALICE with the latest information concerning PHILIP OLIN KEENEY. ALICE invited MARY JANE for lunch on May 19th.

PARY JANE REENEY, according to invited Tolliand ALICE TONES to visit her that evening and the invitation was accepted.

SYLVIA ERASION contacted MARY JANE and said she had some information she wanted to give MARY JANE. It was decided that SYLVIA would visit MARY JANE immediately.

The next contact of interest was between MARY JANE and DR. MARCUS LEGIDIAN. They discussed MARY JANE's illness which she said had been aggravated by a series of shocks. They then discussed the future of MARY JANE and ANGUS and she commented that in all probability, they would leave Washington, D. C. She informed MARCUS that ANGUS' return to the United States was not voluntary and that he was sent home as soon as the War Department gave him a summary notice.

MARCUS invited MARY JANE to visit him and she replied that she has been on a diet of baby food and is very weak. MARCUS replied that it sounded like what they give people in Russia when they have diarrhea. It was agreed that they would see each other in the near future.

MARY JANE contacted CLAYTON SHITH, at which time they discussed the return of PHILIP O. KEENEY. IARY JANE then informed Lrs. SHITH that she, LARY JANE, did not believe that the recent interviews of subjects in this case by FBI agents did not hit directly at CLAYTON and BOWEN SHITH. However, LARY JANE said she believed Lrs. SHITH should be angry and she thought it was simply disgraceful. HARY JANE continued, saying she understood that the interviews were widespread; that a number of people had visits and that she is sure the visits were a mass fishing expedition.

WARY JANE and CLAYTON then commented on the trial of CARL ALDO FARZANI, which was being held in the District Court, Washington, D. C., and commented that it was a very interesting one.

MARY JANE asked CLAYTON to inform BOWEN SHITH that she, HARY JANE, had been contacted on May 19th by MARTIN/FOPPER, but that she, MARY JANE, did not know at whose instigation the contact was made. CLAYTON asked if MARY JANE was going to use POPPER as an attorney and MARY JANE replied she was not necessarily going to use him. CLAYTON counseled MARY JANE to go slow in picking an attorney. MARY JANE agreed and said that the main difficulty was to secure the facts.

DOROTHY TODD contacted MARY JANE on this date, at which sime HAMY JANE advised her that RANCHAGNON, a former student of the KEENEYS at the University of Liontana, was visiting in Washington, D. C.

The next contact of interest was between MARY JANE and BOWEN SMITH. She commented that she had attempted to reach ALLAN ROSENBERG who was in court. BOWEN said he believed ROSENBERG must have been the individual who mentioned MARY JANE's situation to MARTIN POPPER. BOWEN continued that he considered POPPER a fine individual and that POPPER was one of the individuals scheduled to attend a meeting at the office of ALLAN ROSENBERG several months ago. This meeting was held to discuss the general trend of events, and MARTIN POPPER was scheduled to be the representative of the National Lawyers Guild. BOWEN commented further that POPPER had propositioned him on the "Polish thing". Although BOWEN considered POPPER an able attorney, he commented he did not believe it would be wise for MARY JANE to have either ALLAN or POPPER as their attorney. BOWEN advised MARY JANE that she could speak to MARY JANE to commented that she has been very much impressed by the National Lawyers Guild.

The conversation then returned to the CARL ALDO MARZANI trial and BOVEN commented he was encouraged by the witnesses who appeared on May 19th and in particular he was interested to see EMILYDES PRES.

MARY JANE said that she desired to find out what she could expect in the way of assistance in the case of ANGUS KEENEY and was disappointed in the outlook of HARTIN T. BENNETT. Although BENNETT's name was not mentioned, it was observed that is the individual of whom MARY JANE was speaking. She commented that she visited this individual on Saturday night and that it made her ill to see his attitude.

BOWEN and MARY JANE then discussed the recent interviews of individuals by Bureau Agents in regard to this case and BOWEN commented that his wife had been dreaming she was confined in a concentration camp. She would wake up in the middle of the night dreaming that people were using a rubber hose on her.

Confidential Informant advised that MARY JAME conversed with ANNA BERENSON, ALICE THORNER, HULDA FLYNN and DOROTHY TODD, however, the conversations were all of a social nature.

DAVID WAHL contacted MARY JANE, advising that PALLER WEBBER of the CIO_PAC was looking for an employee to do research work at 370 a week. DAVE said he believed MARY JANE should make application for this job if she felt she could stand the work physically. DAVE commented he had been waiting for WEBBER to receive appropriation; that it was very important that this research work be done.

IMRY JANE thereafter made an appointment with PALMER WEBBER at Executive 4610 to visit his office, 728 17th Street, at 3 PM.

LEONA CHALKLEY contacted MARY JANE and MARY JANE advised her the answer is no. LEONA commented that she had sent MARY JANE a card.

ALIX REITHER conversed with MARY JANE advising that she had just returned from New York City. ALIX asked if MARY JANE had talked to NATHAN (HELFGOTT?) and MARY JANE replied that she had called him but the circumstances were so odd she didn't believe she would continue calling him. ALIX said she believed MARY JANE should meet NATHAN socially.

ALIX commented she had brought CHARLOTTE WIDNICK back from New York with her and that CHARLOTTE expected to stay with ALIX several days. ALIX commented she had been unable to secure a position in New York but had gotten a sublease for July and August.

ALIX said she brought greetings to MARY JANE from the "friend on 23rd Street" and that this friend asked that she relate the message to MARY JANE that MARY JANE should never hesitate to call on him for anything at any time and that on "the other thing" he would do his very best.

ALIX commented that he, meaning the friend on 23rd Street, New York City, had two suggestions, but she didn't want to discuss them at that time.

ALIX said that she had seen URSULA WASSERMAN in New York. She also saw PHILIP and LILIAN DUNAWAY. ALIX continued that MIKE GREENBERG plans to go to England but that his wife would remain in the United States. ALIX related that MIKE and MARIAN GREENBERG gave a party on Saturday, May 17th, in honor of a Mexican newspaper girl, AMAGDALENA. There were numerous individuals who attended this party and among them were KATHLEEN and DAN LEVIN.

ALIX said that her guest, CHARLOTTE RUDNICK, desired to get in touch with CARL CREEN and MARY JANE furnished her with his telephone number.

Informant advised that ANGUS KEENEY returned to Washington and contacted HELEN SILVERIASTER, informing her that he and MARY JANE desired to see her. It was agreed that they would get together that afternoon.

ANGUS next contacted H. BOWEN SHITH and greeted him. BOWEN said he believed it would be beneficial for him, MARY JANE and ANGUS, DAVE WAHL and ALLAN ROSENBERG to get together soon and discuss ANGUS! dismissal by the War Department. BOWEN commented that everyone has been shocked to hear that ANGUS was dismissed and numerous individuals have learned of it and had been making comments. ANGUS said that the War Department referred him to the Civil Service Commission and that in Tokyo the War Department didn't know anything about the case and was apologetic.

BOVIEN asked if any other individuals had been dismissed and ANGUS replied he heard that MARGARET STONE had been on the carpet.

The next contact of interest was between ANGUS and DOROTHY TODD. He said he would see her soon and thanked DOROTHY for taking care of MARY JANE during the latter's illness.

ALIX RETHER invited ANGUS and MARY JANE for dinner on Tuesday, May 27th saying that NATHAN (HELFCOTT?) would be a guest also. The invitation was accepted.

IARY JANE next contacted CATHERINZ POPPER, inquiring for HARTIN and was advised that MARTIN would contact her upon his return to Washington, D. C.

URSULA WASSERIAN in New York contacted LARY JANE on this date, saying she would not be able to visit the KEENEYS on the weekend of May 30, 1947. MARY JANE informed URSULA she believed she and ANGUS would move to New York since there was nothing in Washington for them. MARY JANE said that the only possibility for a job was with the CIO-PAC and that it had some hesitations in regard to hiring her.

LARY JANE contacted H. BOWEN SHITH and suggested the latter ask LAVE SULLERS if he could find out the facts in the dismissal of ANGUS REENEY by the War Department. It was decided that the SHITHS would invite SUMERS over for an evening and MARY JANE and ANGUS would also drop in.

FEO ATHANASSOV contacted MARY JANE at which time WARY JANE said she had an individual in mind who would make an excellent secretary for BOYAN ATHANASSOV at the Bulgarian Mission. MARY JANE said she would get in touch with DAVE WAHL and make arrangements for this girl to have an interview.

Thereafter, MARY JANE contacted DAVE and informed him of the fact that ATHANASSOV was still seeking a secretary and suggested that DAVE have the girl that MARY JANE had in mind contact ATHANASSOV at her earliest convenience. (A physical surveillance shows that this girl is ALICE STAPLETON who resides with LARIAN AINSLEE.)

HARTIN POPPER contacted MARY JANE and invited the KEENEYS to visit them that evening at 8 PK. POPPER said the address is 3100 Highland Place, N. W.

LARCUS COLDMAN contacted ANGUST KEENEY and told the latter to keep his chin up; that even if the Government didn't like him there were numerous individuals who did appreciate his good qualities. He invited ANGUS and MARY JANE for dinner on Friday, May 30th, and the invitation was accepted.

According to DOROTHY NORTHAN contacted HARY JANE. HARY JANE said that she had been thinking about DOROTHY a great deal and had received a message from HERLIE NORTHAN in a roundabout way and therefore didn't want to communicate with DOROTHY by telephone. MARY JANE related that ANGUS had arrived in Mashington and that they were also having their difficulties. DOROTHY asked MARY JANE to come out and visit her, and MARY JANE asked if it would be all right, to which DOPOTHY replied that MARY JANE was a known friend of theirs and it would be all right for her to visit. In this regard DOROTHY commented that apparently the NORTMANS were as objectionable as the KEENEYS. MARY JANE answered that as a matter of fact, anyone in the United States who had certain beliefs were objectionable at the present time. MARY JANE said she would let DOROTHY know later when she could come out.

ALIX REUTHER contacted MARY JANE on this date and invited the KEENEYS to come over any time after 7:30. ALIX commented that NATHAN (HELFGOTT) had a patient at 7:30 and would arrive at ALIX's some time between 8 and 8:30.

ALIX asked MARY JANE if she had seen the comments by HERBERT HOOVER in the Washington Post and asked if MARY JANE had vomited. MARY JANE replied in the negative, saying she didn't have anything on her stomach. In this regard, it is to be noted that HERBERT HOOVER alleged that Russia was sabotaging the world food program.

The next contact of interest was between DAVE WAHL and MARY JANE. He advised her that PALKER WEBBER would be unable to hire MARY JANE at the CIO-PAC. In this regard, WAHL said WEBBER had been given the understanding by some of his colleagues that WEBBER could not take on another "blister". However, WEBBER has something else in mind for MARY JANE and suggested that she contact him within a week or two to discuss it.

WARY JANE contacted DOROTHY TODD on May 27th and advised DOROTHY she was not going to attend the meeting of the Congress of American Women. She said further that ALICE STAPLETON had secured a job at the Bulgarian Mission. MARY JANE indicated she considered herself responsible for placing ALICE with Mr. ATHANASSOV at the Mission.

DR. HERMAN KABAT contacted ANGUS on this date and suggested that they get together soon. No definite date could be decided upon, however.

MARY JANE was contacted by ALIX REUTHER at which time MARY JANE commented she had a fine visit at ALIX's the other night. MARY JANE remarked that ALIX's friend (NAT MAN HELFGOTT) gave her a "tremendous lift".

ANGUS contacted CATHERINE POPPER in an effort to locate MARTIN POPPER. He was advised that MARTIN was at his office, Republic 8165. ANGUS attempted unsuccessfully to locate POPPER.

HARY JANE then contacted DOROTHY TODD, CARL GREEN and LUCILLE EZEKIEL, advising them that she and ANGUS would drop by to see them that afternoon.



The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent COUNTIAND J. JONES. It includes the period from June 1 to June 30, 1947.

Confidential informant has made available considerable information regarding subjects during the month of June, 1947. It has advised that INNY JANE and ANGUS were in New York City from June 1 to June 9, 1947.

On June 10, 1947, according to ANGUS HEENEY had contacted MARTIN POPPER, advising him that the KEELEY's had returned from New York and that they desired to see him. POPPER stated that he himself was going to New York that day but would be back within several days and suggested that they have a conference at that time.

On the same day MARY JANE had contact with ALIX REUTHER. MARY JANE informed her that they had secured an apartment in New York City for the summer and planned to move their on July 1. ALIX commented that she herself intended to move to New York at that time and further stated that she would like to confer with MARY JANE. Therefore, MARY JANE invited her to visit that evening. ALIX accepted. Continuing, ALIX stated that she was having a dinner party on Saturday, June 14 which would be attended by IR. and IRS. BOYAN ATHANASSOV and DOCTOR NATHAN MELTGOTH. In addition, ALIX commented that the "Professor" was coming. MARY JANE said that she is not acquainted with the Professor and ALIX explained that he is a guest of the ATHANASSOV's. It is believed that this individual is a United Nations representative from Bulgaria.


The next contact of interest was between DAVE WAHL and MARY JANE KEENEY, at which time he asked if MARY JANE had secured any new information regarding ANGUS's status. MARY JANE said that the ratifications were extensive and said that she and ANGUS desired to confer with DAVE as soon as possible. DAVE said that he was leaving the city the next day and suggested that the KEENEY's confer with him that evening. It was agreed that this would be done.

On the same date HET AN KARAT contacted ANGUS KEENEY, at which time a tentative engagement was made for Sunday afternoon, June 15, 1947.

On June 11, 1947, TARY JANE contacted <u>DOROTHY TODD</u>, at which time she also informed DOROTHY that the KEINEY's were moving to New York. DOROTHY asked if there had been any other decisions to which LARY JANE answered in the affirmative but said that she desired to discuss them with DOROTHY privately.

In regard to their move LARY JANE commented that they would store their furniture in Brooklyn and only take hand luggage. Continuing, MARY JANE said she and ANGUS were considering writing a book in New York but that it does not offer any possibilities unless they can secure someone to finance it. DOROTHY suggested that the KEENEY's visit the TODD's for dinner and a tentative date was set for Thursday, June 12.

On the same date MARY JANE attempted unsuccessfully to reach H. BOWEN SLITH but was advised that he would be out of town until Saturday, June 14.

The next contact of interest was between LARY JANE and DOROTHY MODITIAN. LARY JANE commented that she and ANCUS had returned from New York and found the climate outside of Washington to be much more favorable. DOROTHY then commented that it had been very warm within the past few days to which LARY JANE replied that she did not mean that kind of weather. DOROTHY then invited the KEENEY's for dinner on Friday, June 13 and LARY JANE put up a friendly protest but allowed DOROTHY to talk her into it.

GITEL POGNANSKY in New York City contacted HARY JANE on June 11. She stated that she planned to visit Washington on June 12 and would spend four or five days here. She continued, URSULA MASSIFHAN had suggested that she contact HARY JANE in an effort to secure housing accommodations. GITEL suggested that HARY JANE contact PHILLED MASH who resides at 1701 Swann Street, N. W., in this regard. HARY JANE offered her apartment to GITEL but the latter refused.

In regard to PHILLEO NASH, MARY JAME remarked that he is a strange person for GITEL to be acquainted with. GITEL expressed some surprise and related that NASH is a very old friend of hers and that she has stayed with him previously.

GITLL said further that she would like to have contact with BOYAN ATHALASSOV of the Bulgarian Mission and asked if MARY JANE knew if he was in town. MARY JANE answered in the affirmative and said that she would contact the ATHALASSOV's and advise them of GITLL's prospective visit to Washington.

Following the aforementioned conversation, NARY JANE attempted to locate PHILLEO NASH but was advised that he was out of town.

POGNANSKY would be in Mashington on June 12 and desired to contact BOYAN ATHANASSOV In describing GITEL, MARY JANE said that she is a Anthropologist and had met BOYAN in New York.

The next contact of interest was between MARY JANE and DOCTOR ISADORE ALPHER. They discussed LARY JANE's health, diet and he invited MARY JANE for dinner on Friday, June 13, which MARY JANE was unable to accept because of a prior engagement.

MARY JANE then conversed with RUSE ALPHER and advised her that she had seen numerous mutual friends in New York the previous week. Among these friends were LIKE and LARIAN GREINBERG, who have a new baby. LARY JANE continued that she had seen DANIEL and PEGGY LELCHER and had spent a night with them at Mount Claire. LARY JANE added that PEGGY LECHER is doing considerable work for the PCA and that this organization was having HENRY WALLACE speak in Newark on Sunday, June 15.

MALLACE's name brought up his forthcoming appearance at the Matergate in Mashington, D. C., and ROSE ALPHER asked if MARY JANE would be in attendance, to which she replied "Yes, of course." They discussed the sale of tickets for his speech and ROSE commented that there were at least 1,100 tickets available yet. MARY JANE expressed surprise that the tickets for his speech were not moving so fast but ROSE commented that it did not surprise her because they are dealing with scared people. MARY JANE agreed with this comment and said that intimidation in Washington is at its fiercest.

The next contact of interest was between PARY JANE and LUCY CONMIN. LARY JANE informed her of the KEENEY's move to New York and commented that they hoped to write a book. LIARY JANE also conversed with GROFF CONMIN, LUCY's husband, and he suggested that she store her furniture with the Neptune Storage Warehouse of New Rochelle, New York.

l'ARY JANE next contacted ANNA BERENSON saying that she is happy to leave Washington because the climate is not very salubrious. They discussed the sale stock in the General Homes' Corporation which is building prefabricated houses for the GIO. MARY JANE suggested that ANNA see if MARCUS GOLDMAN desired to purchase in this stock.

On June 12, 1947, GITEL POGEALSKY contacted HARY JANE and said that she was at the Continental Hotel Since THILLEO NASH was out of town. HARY JANE invited GITEL to visit them and it was agreed that she would arrive at 3:00 P. H.

CARL GREEN from New York City next had contact with HARY JANE, at which time he told her that there was a position open with the Konsumers' Union, 17 Union Square, Hest, New York City at 075 per week. He suggested that if HARY JANE were interested in securing this job that she contact DEXTERMANTERS at ALQ 4-8050.

job was very probable and he would contact MARY JANE if he desired that she arrive in New York City before July 1. He said that if she did not hear from him that she would have the understanding that the matter was taken care of.

On June 13, 1947, MARY JAME had contact with DOROTHY NORTHAN, at which time she told DOROTHY that she and ANGUS had a very important meeting with their attorney that afternoon and that this attorney was bringing someone down from New York. This attorney is believed to be MARTIN POPPER. In view of this meeting, the dinner engagement that MARY JAME had at DOMOTHY NORTHAN'S was postponed until Tuesday, June 17.

The next contact of interest was between AMGUS KEENEY and MARTIN POPPER at the National Lawyers' Guild. AMGUS asked when he could see POPPER to which the latter replied that he would like to have AMGUS and MARY JANE visit him about 11:00 A. H.

ANGUS then contacted Senator MAYNY DRSE's Office and asked for an appointment with the Senator. The Senator's secretary made a tentative appointment for 10:00 A. M., on June 16 but suggested that ANGUS call early on that date to confirm the appointment.

ANGUS next contacted the United Public Workers of America, CIO, and attempted to make an appointment with ARTHURYSTEIN. STEIN was out of town and it was suggested that ANGUS attempt to reach him on Honday, June 16.

ALIX REUTHER conversed with MARY JANE on June 13 and they discussed the appearance of HENRY WALLACE at the Watergate. ALIX was desirous of securing a ticket for the speech and MARY JANE suggested that she could secure one from ROSE ALPHER.

On June 14, 1947, BENEDICT ALPER contacted MARY JANE saying that he was visiting with HULDA LCGARBET/FLYNN. He commented that his wife, ETHEL, was feeling fine but had remained in New York. He asked if MARY JANE had made any decisions and MARY JANE stated that she had been unable to inasmuch as they were still seeing a number of people and were still in the initial organizing stage. HEN asked how ANGUS felt about going about protesting his dismissal and MARY JANE commented that ANGUS was in favor of it. HEN commented that he was going to send ANGUS an application for a position with the United Nations Assembly to which MARY JANE replied that she did not believe he would have much success. HEN agreed but

commented that AMGUS should mail the application at any rate.

EAXTELL NAPIED TEIS! AN contacted PARY JANE on June 14 and they were each happy to hear from the other. PAX asked how everything was progressing with PARY JANE and she replied that everything was upset and further that she wished she could speak to PAX about making a decision. PAX commented that when he heard that ANGUS had been dismissed by the War Department he became very angry. He stated that he would like to see MARY JANE but that he had to catch a train for New York and would be unable to see her at that time. PARY JANE said that she and ANGUS were moving to New York and this news pleased PAX very much.

The next contact of interest was between MARY JANE and MARCUS I. GOLD! AN. She informed him that they were moving to New York and stated that they had not made up their minds as to whether they were going to fight ANGUS's dismissal. They then discussed job possibilities in New York and MARY JANE commented that she was worried about ANGUS's attitude, that the dismissal had hurt him. In this regard MARY JANE commented that it was a chance in a life time for ANGUS and that it was hard for him to stop his work after having such good success.

MARY JANE then had contact with ERIC VEECROFT advising him of her move to New York. She commented that ANGUS was not going to fight his dismissal from the War Department unless they could receive considerable support. She commented that individuals with whom they conferred in New York thought that they had an excellent case and that for the benefit of other individuals who might be attacked it was believed that they should fight the case.

TARY JANE then had contact with ALICE THORNER and SHIRLEY DENIED NO. at which time she informed them that she was moving to New York permanently.

On June 15, MARY JANE contacted BOB CHWARTZ informing him of her move to New York. BOB commented he had received a letter from MAXWELL NAPTER WEISMAN and stated that he desired to get in contact with MAX when he came to Washington. MARY JANE commented that she had spoken to MAX when the latter was passing through Washington but only for a few minutes. BOB appeared interested in ANGUS's welfare and MARY JANE commented that he was suffering from shock due to his dismissal.

On June 16 ANGUS successfully attempted to reach APTHUR STEIN at the United Public Workers of America, CIO.

ANGUS also contacted Senator <u>MAYNE MORSE</u>'s Office and it was suggested that ANGUS call the Senator off the floor of the Senate. ANGUS said that he would do that.

On June 17 ROSE ALPHER contacted LARY JANE suggesting that they postpone their dinner to Friday, June 20, 1947. This was agreeable with LARY JANE. They then discussed the speech of HENRY LALLACE and both agreed that it was a wonderful speech. ROSE commented that at the speech she had seen a number of people she had not seen for years and that it was just like "Old Home Week."

ANGUS KEENEY next had contact with the United Public Workers of America. CIO, asking for an appointment with ARTHUR STEIN. He was not very cordially received and was asked what organization he represented. ANGUS replied that it was a personal matter and that MARTH POPPER was supposed to have previously informed ARTHUR STEIN that ANGUS desired to confer with him. At this point ANGUS was connected with STEIN and he explained that NARTIN POPPER had suggested that he contact STEIN. ANGUS then explained that he had been in Japan for the past 18 months and his wife, MARY JANE KEINEY, was supposed to have joined him but that when she made application for a passport she was refused. Continuing, ANGUS related that shortly thereafter he himself was fired and in that being a member of the old UFTA he had dicussed the matter with LARTIN POPPER who suggested that it should be referred to ARTHUR STEIN. STEIN said that he did not handle such matters but would arrange for ANGUS to confer with AL SE NSTEIN, who is the attorney for the United Public Workers of America. ANGUS then commented that LARTIN POPPER was of the opinion that STEIN personally should be acquainted with the facts because this was more or less of a particular case. This didn't impress STEIN and he said that possibly he would be able to sit in on the interview ANGUS had with BERNSTEIN. An appointment for ANGUS was made at 2:00 P. M. that day.

The next contact of interest was between MARY JANE and P. BERWARD FORTIAN, at which time MARY JANE agreed to meet at 5:50 P. M. that afternoon.

ALIX PRITHER had contact with IATY JANE on June 17. ALIX suggested that MARY JANE get in touch with ALITE JAYSON, who would assist MARY JANE in reaching STEVE PARBETTA, Care of Santini Brothers, 1046 Simpson Street, Bronx, New York, in regard to storing her furniture.

On June 18, 1947, MARY JANE contacted LUCY CONKLIN and begged off a dinner engagement with LUCY due to the confusion of MARY JANE's apartment. It was agreed that it should be postponed.

PARY JANE next contacted DOROTHY TODD, saying that MAX WEISIAH might be in Mashington for several days and that if he were they desired to visit with the TODD's. DOROTHY said that she would be happy to see them.

The next contact of interest was between MARY JANE and HARRIET SILONS. HARRIET said that she was not feeling well because of all the bad news of late. MARY JANE advised her that they were moving to New York and stated that she desired to see HARRIET before leaving. MARRIET then informed MARY JANE of the suicide of CHET SINCLAIR. MARY JANE was surprised to hear of it. It was decided that MARY JANE and HAPRIET would get together soon.

On June 19, 1947, DAVE MAHL contacted ANGUS KEEPEY suggesting that they have a conference that afternoon. It was agreed that they would meet at 5:00 P. M.

AL BETNSTEIN of the United Tublic Workers of America, CIO, next contacted ANGUS NEITEY, at which time they discussed ANGUS's dismissal from the War Department ANGUS commented that his annual leave was being paid every two weeks. AL said that he was sure that some of ANGUS's records should have been sent from Japan to Washington. ANGUS commented that he had been told in Tokyo that the Military authorities there knew nothing as to the reason why he was dismissed and further that a Lieutenant Colonel in Tokyo had stated ANGUS's work was excellent.

AL commented that he had started the ball rolling on securing the facts of the case and had learned that the people in authority in the Intelligence Division had no knowledge of ANGUS's case. (This is incorrect information and apparently BERNSTEIN was given the "run around.") Continuing, BERNSTEIN said that he was going to get the Intelligence Division of the War Department involved in it.

ANGUS then commented that he had made a memorandum containing the facts necessary and submitted to Senator TOBY ! ORSE and Senator !UPRAY and had asked them to write a letter to Secretary of "ar PATTERSON requesting the facts involved in the case.

AL BERNSTEIN said that if ANGUS or FARY JANE were acquainted with NAX

It was agreed that ANGUS and WARY JANE would stay at DAVE WAHL'S home

However, on June 23, 1947, AL BURNSTEIN contacted ANGUS and advised that he had received a call from his contact at the War Department (GEORGE/BREWER) who said he had received a letter concerning ANGUS from a Senator. In this letter AL commented that his contact promised to give him the whole clarification of this matter by the end of that week.

The next contact of interest was between ANGUS KEENEY and BERNIE MORTEAN, at which time NORTEAN advised ANGUS that he had been released from his job at the State Department as of that day. ANGUS suggested that he contact AL BERNSTEIN in the United Public Workers of America for action.

HAROID RELLINGHAM contacted MARY JANE on June 23, 1947, according to 12 He commented that he had had an interview that day and had been asked a lot of questions concerning his activities in the Washington Cooperative Book Shop and also about his social acquaintances. MARY JANE commented that her affiliation in the Washington Cooperative Book Shop was given as one reason why she was denied a passport.

EARY JANE commented that she and ANGUS were leaving Washington and BELLINGHAM said that he felt like doing the same thing.

IARY JANE then contacted BERNIE NORTHAN and said she was terribly sorry to hear that he had been fired. NORTHAN commented that the Security Division of the State Department had ever double-crossed superiors, that he, BERNIE, had offered to resign and would have but was not allowed to.

BERNIE then asked FARY JAME if she were acquainted with JAMES ANSARA.

HARY JAME was unable to recall him. BERNIE then explained that ANSARA had also been fired.

ATY JANE informed BERNIE that if he had been dismissed under the provision of the Eccarran Rider, which was attached to the appropriations for the State Department, that he had no right of appeal. BEPNIE complained that he was not even given an opportunity to clean up his work and that he considered it very

unsportsmanlike and so Un-American. Continuing, he commented that the people in his office were shocked and felt worse than he did and that the whole situation is bad for morale.

On June 24, 1947, according to HARY JANE contacted H. BCLEN SITTH at which time she explained that AL ELFNSTEIN of the United Public Morkers of America was handling ANCUS's appeal and that BERNSTEIN was very interested in the matter. HARY JANE said that she understood that their chances of challenging the constitutionality of Public Law 808 zero but that the Act would provide for statements of charges and hearings.

EO EN SITH commented that several days previous a State Department investigator had interviewed him regarding DAN LEVIN and that he, BO EN, did not furnish !ARY JANE's name as a reference in view of her present difficulty. BO EN said that he had furnished the name of LUCIENTILLER as a reference for this applicant.

DAVID WAHL also contacted MARY JANE on June 24 and said that MAX LORENTHA had been in Washington and was busy. WAHL commented that he understood that BERNIE NORTIAN had been fired and some five or six others at the same time.

On June 25 ANGUS KEENEY contacted DOCTOR VLADIUTE HOUDEK and arranged to pick him up that afternoon and drive out to the residence of MERNER INHOOF.

On June 26, 1947, LOIS CAPLISLE contacted WARY JANE and said that she desired to have a conference with her as soon as possible. WARY JANE asked if LOIS had been dismissed from her position at the State Department. LOIS replied in the negative but said that it was that matter that she desired to discuss with MARY JANE.

RUTH ZILLER contacted LARY JANE on June 26 and it was decided that LARY JANE would visit RUTH and BOD ZILLER on June 28, 1947.

On June 27, ARY JANE was contacted by LRS. BOYAN ATMANASSOV, at which time she furnished MARY JANE with the address of Professor LEVORAH as being Apartment 706, Hotel Robert Fulton, New York City, telephone Endicott 2-4040.

LARY JANE said that her telephone number in New York would be Edgecomb 4-1632.







Spot checks made by the writer from time to time revealed that the KULISCHERS are still residing at 1611 31st St., N.W., Washington, D.C.

Special Agent J. B. Cook of this office examined the

account of EUGLNE and OLGA KULISCHER which was opened as a joint account at the National Capitol Bank of Washington, D.C. on July 12, 1944 with an initial deposit of (2725.00. They gave as a reference their former bank, the National City Bank, 57th Street Branch, New York City.

Ledger accounts for the years 1945, 1946, 1947 reflect no unusual activity except a withdrawal of \$1,000.00 on February 17, 1947. Ir. BRICKHEAD, Assistant Cashier of the National Capitol Bank, advised the writer that they have no record of the nature of this \$1,000.00 withdrawal since the cancelled check would have been submitted to the customer with his statement, and since this bank uses their recordak machine only on out of town checks drawn against the customer's account.

The writer examined the records at the Clerk's Office of the U. S. District Court, Mashington, D.C. which reflect that EUGLNE HICHAEL KULISCHER, 1611 31st St., N.W., Tashington, D.C., a research worker and professor, born August 22, 1861, present nationality, stateless, filed his retition for Naturalization number 20262 before the U. S. District Court, Washington, D.C. on July 23, 1946. He stated that he had one child, HELLY NATASHA CANLTON, born November 3, 1919 at Kiev, Russia, who is presently residing at New York City, that he filed his Declaration of Intention number 517962 before the U. S. District Court for the Southern District of New York at New York City on April 7, 1942 at which time he resided at 300 Nest 109th St., New York City. He immigrated to the United States from Lisbon, Portugal for permanent residence in the U.S. on June 30, 1941 on the SS INETER. It is to be noted that he has resided in the District of Oblumbia since July 1, 1944.

His witnesses were//IADH IR SACOYTHISKY, economist, 5324 39th St., N. ..., Washington, D.C. and Mrs. IFFINATABUBLE, research director, 4222 Sheridan St., University Park, Maryland. He was described as a white. male, 5 feet 7 2 inches tall, 161 pounds, fair complexion, brown eyes, gray hair, is near sighted and wears glasses.

MULISCHER was naturalized in Washington, D.C. on September 3, 1946 and received Certificate of Naturalization number 6535808.



The topic apparently for the radio broadcast is "Are we headed for a recession, and if so, what can we do about it."

Later HERB again contacted : AGDOFF advising that he had just conversed with HILES who wants some material from HARRY on what HARRY thinks he should highlight.

BEADIE HAGDOFF contacted DOROTHIAMATIAN who declined to attend a movie with the HAGDOFFS because she haddseen it. They discussed preparations for the party at JANE STONES and mentioned that BEADIE WAR TASSEL would help.

liay 25, 1947

Informant learned that BEADIE MAGDOFF was in contact with FEGGY ATERENBERG and JOAN DE TIND at which time BEADIE discussed her summer vacation. She informed FEGGY that they would be over to see her after dinner that afternoon. Later the informant learned that DAVID in New York City communicated with HARRY LAGDOFF advising that in view of his bad heart, the hot weather and the doctor's instructions for him to take it easy, this weekend, he wondered if he could work on the material tomorrow and send it to HARRY in order that it reach HARRY'S office Tuesday morning. HARRY agreed. HARRY asked DAVID about his free-lance work and DAVID replied "it is good for the time being." DAVID is working on some thing for the union

which will keep him busy until Lebor Day.

On this date, ED FITZGLEALD was again in contact with HARRY HAGDOFF at which time they again discussed ED'S job possibilities and the business assistant of BOB HELLER. Later this date, CHARLOTTE CHASE contacted BEADIE LAGDOFF and laked if BEADIE had heard MALTER LITINCHELL tonight. CHARLOTTE reported that WINCHELL said on his broadcast that he had received a telegraph saying that the communists were trying to take over the Government of Arlington through the schools. BEADIE was amazed. CHARLOTTE stated that the league of Women Voters had lost "it" (election of school board) officially and she wondered if the league would like to take some action. BEADIE said WINCHELL should be called and told where to get off. CHARLOTTE said the most WINCHELL could do is to deny it and his next broadcast would be after the elections which are on Tuesday. BEADIE said she thinks it is a horrible thing and that it was an irresponsible thing to do the week of the voting. CHANLOTTE stated that she was at a meeting of the "citizens committee" who are phoning to ABC in New York.

BEADIE said that she was going to call CAROLINEY PLANCH and have her call the local ABC station, WAIAL. BEADIE WAGDOFF then contacted CAROLINE PLANCH advising of her prior conversation with CHARLOTTE CHASE. CAMMLINE stated that she was just about to call BLADIE about this inasmuch as BENANTHE had just called her. CAROLINE suggested that they get PARGUERITE TONES to send a wire or call the local station for the league. BRADIE HAGDOFF then called radio station WMAL and talked to an unidentified man in the news room. She told the man that WAL should be ashamed to have allowed MINCHELL to say what he did and that MINCHELL'S statement was "irresponsible and incorrect." The man said that WINCHELL comes out of New York and there is not much he can do here. BEADIE said the least WMAL could do is get on the air and say that WINCHELL'S statement is untrue. She said that the list of organizations in favor of the direct election includes churches, PTAs, League of Momen Voters, and "and other such communist organizations." She said the referendum is for direct election vs. the appointed school board. The man said that if an organization involved in this would like to make a statement refuting MINCHELL'S statement, he would try to get it in the 11:00 pm news summary. BEADIE then recontacted CAROLINE PLANCH to tell of her call to JIAL. CAROLINE said the league should send a delegation to !AAL.tomorrow to protest "and then also go over to CLARK of FBI and say 'Now here we are, do you think we look like a bunch of communists?" 4 h

BEADIE suggested that CAROLINE PLANCH call WMAL and be LARGUERITE JONES. CAROLINE suggested the following rough statement. "As advocates of direct election of school board members in regular legal elections, we demand retraction of MINCHELL'S statement that communists are behind, ah whatever it is. " BEADIE suggested adding "Many other civic organizations in Arlington to the origin of the direct election." CAROLINE said that she is going to put it in a night letter. BEADIE said, "We ought to sue them. We absolutely ought to sue them. The nerve of him to say a thing like that." They both agreed that the Greater Arlington Association sent the telegram from which MINCHELL prepared his statement. BEADIE them contacted PATAPILLY inquiring for MARY who was not in. BEADIE told PAT about WINCHELL'S broadcast and asked him to call MAL. PAT supposed that WINCHELL would take anything that looks like an anti-communist statement and agreed to call MAL. PAT suggested the league call ARTHUR/GODFREY to broadcast a statement in repudiation of MINCHELL'S statement. Thereafter BEADIE MAGDOFF contacted JOAN DE WIND, IDA ENGLIAN, SUE COTTER (ph.), MILDREW (2) and a Irs. PERBERG (ph.), education chairman of the league. All of these persons agreed to call MAL and protest. Mrs. MTRBEY informed BEADIE that she was told that ...INCHELL said he had direct proof of communists manipulation in the Arlington school election. Later HILDRED MARCEY (?) asked BEADIE if "we" have a contact on the Ashington Post for an editorial on the matter. HIDRED remarked "they have been favorable in the past." BEADIE said that Dr. LE BEAU, CAROLINE PLANCH, 1rs. TERBERG and Mrs. YCANNON should go see one of the Post editors. HILDRED also suggested approaching the Star.

May 26, 1947 7 60 h

BEADIE LAGDOFF contacted CAROLINE PLANCH who advised that they have called off entirely the idea of any delegations to anybody but MAL has given them ten minutes tonight from 6:15 to 6:25. CAROLINE has been given the job of writing the script but what she writes, OSCAR/HE/BEAU. will not take but she will write it first and "then put in all his stuffy phrases." CAROLINE said they want somebody from the league to be there and she asked if BEADIE would contact MARGUERITE JONES and ask her to do this as she has a good voice. BEADIE then contacted MARGUERITE JONES advising her of the information furnished by CAROLINE PLANCH regarding the radio broadcast. They discussed MALTER MINCHELL again and BEADIE called him a "skunk." BEADIE also believes that the league was responsible

for about 20 to 25 calls to MAL last night and she states that the station was very responsive to them. They chatted about how much work league members are putting in on this election and expressed their hopes to win especially since it has been tried for so long without success. MARGUERITE said that if they win the work they have done so far will just be a drop in the bucket compared to the work that will have to be done. On this date BEADIE LAGDOFF invited lirs.

MINT to a farewell party for the STONES on Saturday, June 7 at 8:00 pm at the VAN TASSELLS.

BEADIE stated that Mrs. VAN TASSELL and DOROTHY KAPLAN were taking care of the food and that the other couples are toing requested to bring the beverages. BEADIE MAGDOFF later invited PEGGY NIERENBERG and ALELIA PERAZICH to the STONES' party. PEGGY agreed to come but ALELIA advised that she would try but GEORGE would be home this weekend and would probably want to stay at home. BEADIE MAGDOFF then unsuccessfully endeavored to contact CARL GREEN.

Later ROSHARDFISHER contacted BEADIE MAGNOFF about a league meeting and they discussed WALTER WINCHELL'S broadcast. BEADIE remarked that CHARLOTTE CHASE called her about the broadcast and BEADIE said "Honestly, if this doesn't teach every person in Arlington County to watch what they hear - to watch what they read in the newspaper with care - and what they hear on the radio, then nothing ever will."

BEADIE advised ROSE ARY that she had also called lrs.
TERBERG (ph.) and asked her to send a telegram to the New York office Thasmuch as she is head of the education committee. BEADIE advised ROSE ARY that Ir. TERBERG is a most conservative economist however, Irs. TERBERG had at one time told BEADIE that she, Hrs. TERBERG, was called a communist and that she is getting so used to it; that if people don't like what you have to say, why they reason that you are a communist. BEADIE informed ROSE ARY about the numerous calls to station TAL and remarked that the Washington Tost had a good editorial on the whole thing.

Later BEADIE invited FRANCIS FUCHS and JEANLTTE STATS (?) to the party for ED and JANE STONE on June 7. Later BLADIE LAGDOFF contacted lir. PLANCH to ask what he thought of the program. He remarked that it layed WINCHELL in the shade and he thought that I rs. JONES did a very good job. Subsequently BEADIE MAGDOFF contacted

ARTHUR and ANNIESTEIN and invited them to visit the MGDUFFS Saturday afternoon.

Later ROB TRUBEK in New York contacted HARRY LAGDOFF and asked if HARRY had talked to BERGE. HARRY explained that BERGE was out of town and would be in tomorrow.morning. HARRY stated that he did see PEPPER about it and that PEPPER was very grateful. TRUBEK referred to "this thing" in the Journal American and wondered whether there was any point in mentioning it to BERGE or whether there is anything that can be done about it. HARRY said "There is nothing you can do except build a better and stronger organization." HARRY added that unless a particular guy wanted to sue for liable, nothing can be done. He said it must be someone who can show damages. TRUBEK said, "Well, I don't know how he feels about it." HARRY replied, "Well, I was libeled, it was very carefully worded." TRUBEK said, "Is that libel to call him a pro-Red?" HARRY said that he didn't think so and he will tell BERGE about it."

May 27, 1947 (8)

BEADIE MAGDOFF invited the DeWINDS to the party for the STONES on June 7.

Later the informant advised that ROB TRUBEK and ALALH in New York City held a conversation with HARRY MAGDOFF in Washington, D.C.

According to the information supplied by the informant, it appears that the American Business Consultants in New York City sent a copy of an article alleging that the New Council of American Business with which MEIDELL BERGE was recently affiliated as general counsel is controlled by communists. LAGDOFF stated that he had talked to BERGE about this article and that BERGE felt that it is something that they should try to do something about in that it could be harmful in building an organization and he thought that the men who are particularly accused can sue if they want to but they should consider some way of doing something about it. !AGDOFF suggested that a board meeting should be held and this matter discussed. TRUBEK explained to MAGDOFF that he had been over to the office of the American Business Consultants and he described the office setup to MAGDOFF. MAGDOFF stated that BERGE was wondering whether he should write away for the evidence but then he considered that they might put him on the spot because they may send him the evidence and if he doesn't think the evidence means anything, he may ignore it.

Then they will write the next time and say they have sent DERGE the evidence and he didn't do anything. LAGDOFF said that BERGE is naturally concerned but that he doesn't see how this kind of a program could possibly be a front organization but naturally he would like to know more for he is curious to know how much of it is true and how much of it isn't. LAGDOFF stated that BERGE desired to know whether SHARAD (ph.) did teach at a certain school in Chicago. TRUBER stated that he is concerned with getting this matter straightened out and that he would very much like to have a long talk with BERGE and go into it theroughly and satisfy him completely. It was agreed that TRUBER would contact BERGE at his home and try to make an appointment as soon as possible to discuss this among other things.



HARRY informed FEABLE that he would have to work Saturday in view of the fact that HATCH is in town. CHATCH is associated with the NCAP. Later BEADLE MAGDOFF ascertained that HAR Y MAGDOFF was believed to be at SIDNEY KRAMER'S office, Ex. 3070, which is listed to SIDNEY KRAMER'S Book Store, 1722 H St., N.M. Subsequently, BEADLE contacted ARTHUR STELL to confirm thetfact that the STELLS are coming to visit the MAGDOFFS on Saturday.

JOE/CROSS contacted HARRY advising that he was leaving tomorrow night for a short trip to linneapolis and he may have a little time to spend in Chicago. He asked HARRY if there was anyone there HARRY would like him to say hello to. HARRY gave JOE the name of SID/ROTH who is on the board of directors of the NCAB and his address is Roth Products Co., 134 South LaSalle St., Chicago.


An unidentified man contacted HARRY FAGDOFF who stated that he was waiting for the caller and his family to come over. The man advised that they would be leaving shortly. Later SOL LISCHINSKY contacted BEADIE MAGDOFF advising that he just returned from a trip to the West Coast.

HARRY MAGDOFF informed BEADIE that he had just conversed with ARRUEN the broker and had learned that they have made "almost \$1900.00 for the whole thing which is \$800.00 for us." BEADIE stated that she expected ANNIE and ARTIE STEIN about 2:00 or 3:00 p.m. and HARRY stated that he would be home around that time. Later, ANNIE advised BEADIE that they would leave about 3:00 p.m.

Subsequently BEADIE advised IRVING KAPIAN that they are getting off to a late start so that KAPIAN should go ahead with whatever his plans are as BEADIE had promised to visit the DeWINDS first.

EAFIAN said that they would be in all evening and that the HAGDOFFS can come any time.



A check at the local Credit Bureau on May 5, 1947 revealed a report dated August 3, 1942 which reflected that Dr. HAROLD O. H. MOFLEYER resided in Apt. 208, Alban Towers. The report reflected that Dr. HOFLEYER was a heart specialist by profession and was reported to have practiced medicine in Capetown, South Africa before he came to the United States from Capetown, Union of South Africa. In 1942 HOFMEYER was employed by the Office of Procurement of Medical Supplies, Union of South Africa Office, 907 15th St., N.W. At that time he was alleged to be about 38 years old, married and a British subject. His

A report of Stones Mercantile Agency dated May 7, 1945 reflected that Dr. HOFIETER resided at 1901 Myoming Ave., N. ... from July, 1943. He originally came from South Africa and about March, 1942 came to Mashington from New York City. From March, 1942 to September, 1943 he resided at 3700 Massachusetts Ave. and since that time he has resided at the above Myoming Avenue address.

On May 4, 1947, confidential Informant advised that HAROID L. FOSNER was in contact with the LAGDOFFS. TFO case entitled Mrs. VICTOR/FERIO, Internal Security R reveals that the Bureau received a letter written by Mrs. VICTOR FERIO to the President of the United States postmarked April 14, 1944 at Ft. Worth, Texas which letter contained a partial list of alleged members of the communist underground group in Washington, D.C.

The following appears in Mrs. PERLO'S letter: "HAROLD POSNER (brother, sympathetic or a member), (in New York now)."

It may be noted that some of the other individuals listed in Mrs.

PERLO'S letter were CHARLES KRAHER, GEORGE SILVERMAN, VICTOR PERLO,
JOHN APT and others who are subjects in the GREGORY case.

On September 6, 1944, Mrs. PERLO advised Special Agents Wirt R. Jones and Sidney M. Molf that HAROLD OSNER was a known member of the Communist Party.

Informant also ascertained on May 4 that HARCLD L.

POSNER had a brother who resided on 45th St., N. J., Washington, D.C.,
Em. 7091. The June, 1947 telephone directory reflects that STANLEY

S. FOSNER resides at 4717 45th St., N.W. with the above telephone

mumber. He is also listed as a lawyer at the Standard Oil Building,

Executive 1811.

Page 14 of the report of Special Agent John A. Swartz dated April 18, 1944 at ashington, D.C. entitled ashington Bookshop, Internal Security C, reflects that POSNER, STANLEY I., #206, August 10, 1940, 1026 Woodward Building, Dist. 5405; appears among the list of expired members. The date following the name indicates the last payment of dues and the fact that a person is listed as an expired member does not necessarily mean that his membership has actually expired.



The Lashington Field Office indices revealed in the case entitled MADALE de MALP/GERGELY, was; TIBOR/SERGELY, Espionage R, that GEORGE JASZI is the son of MADALE de MALI GERGELY by her



The New York City investigation determined that MADAME de MALI GERGELY was married to TIBOR GERGELY and they resided at 246 Lexington Ave., New York City and that obviously Ers. GERGELY was identical with the MADAME de MALI GERGELY whose name was sent to RADO. The New York office also ascertained that her former husband, OSCAR JASZI resides at Oberlin, Ohio and her two sons from this marriage are ANDRES ASZI and GEORGE JASZI who is employed by the Department of Commerce, Mashington, D.C.

Investigation conducted by the WFO in January and February, 1947 reflects that GLORGE JASZI was born on September 23, 1915 in Hungary and that he was naturalized through his father's certificate of naturalization in the U. S. District Court, Cleveland, Ohio on February 20, 1931. He presently lives with his wife, HELEN R.

JASZI and one child at 2223 H St., N.W., Washington, D.C. He is briefly described as 6'3", weight 205 lbs. He attended school from September, 1921 to June, 1925 in Vienna, Germany. He attended Oberland College, Oberland, Chio from July, 1931 to July, 1933. He attended the University of London, England, School of Economics, from September, 1933 to July, 1936 where he obtained his BS degree



She resigned this position to accept another position in the Office of Strategic Services. November. 1938 to October, 1940, assistant to the director of industrial relations of the American Home Produce Company, 257 Cornelison Ave.,

The following investigative facts cover the period of June 1 to August 1, 1947. During this period the only pertinent mail received by HARRY MACDOFF was a letter from LESLIE KISH, 701 lit. Pleasapt, Ann Arbor, Hichigan. KISH is a former resident of Washington, D. C., who was employed in the Government service, and while in Washington was a close acquaintance of HARRY and BEADIE FAGDOFF. Background of LESLIE KISH has been previously reported.

The following information was furnished by Confidential Informant identity is known to the Bureau.

6-1-47 Jan

CARL GREEN was invited by BEADIE MAGDOFF to the party to be given for the ED STONES on Saturday night. CARL GREEN agreed to be present.

HARRY HAGDOFF contacted CHARLIE KRAMER and asked if CHARLIE would be home for ten or fifteen minutes. It was agreed that HARRY would visit KRALER in a few minutes.

Later the informant ascertained that ROB TRUBECK of the New Council of American Business had arrived in town and was stopping at the Mayflower Hotel and that HARRY was going to meet TRUBECK at the hotel.

6-3-47 (x) L

On this date BEADIE MAGDOFF invited Ir ROSENBERG (MAURICE?) to the party Saturday night at 8 PM at the home of BEATTIE VALUTASSELL, for ED and JANE STONE, who are moving to Seattle.

Later on this date BEATTIE VAN TASSELL advised BEADIE MAGDOFF that ED STONE would not return from Seattle by Saturday. Therefore, the party would have to be postponed. They agreed to contact the following individuals and inform them of the postponement: MAURICE ROSENBERG, HERBERD FUCHS, REBECCAH and ED FITZGERALD, the CARL GREENS, the HUNTS, the SPELLMANS, BILL and JOAN DEVIND, FEROL CORNELISON, JEANETTE STATTS, the PETERSONS.

On this date BEADIE MACDOFF contacted FEROL CORNELISON to advise her concerning the postponement of the STONE's party. On this occasion FEROL informed BEADIE that she had just passed a physical examination today and has a Government job at the General Accounting Office doing editorial work. FEROL commented that she still has to be fingerprinted and is worried because she belongs to the "Book Shop". However, she has only been in it twice.

Later BEADIE MAGDOFF was in contact with ALELIA PERAZICH, wife of subject GEORGE PERAZICH, and it was agreed that BEADIE Would visit ALELIA some time tomorrow afternoon.

The informant advised that SOL LISCHINSKY contacted BEADIE MAGDOFF at which time the informant ascertained that the MAGDOFFS were to visit the LISCHINSKYS that night.

16-4-47 100 m

The informant ascertained that BEADIE MAGDOFF and children would lunch today with AMELIA PERAZICH. Further, the informant learned that HARRY MAGDOFF was in contact with ROB TRUBECK, NCAB, who resides in East Rutherford, New Jersey, telephone Rutherford 2-7715.

In regard to this contact, it may be stated that shortly prior to this date the NCAB received the services of WENDELL BERGE as General Counsel, and that the Council gave a dinner for WENDELL BERGE in New York City, welcoming him into the organization. Apparently this dinner and the announcement of BERGE's association with the NCAB received some publicity in the New York City papers, which caused one THEODORE C. KIRKPATRICK to write WENDELL BERGE a letter, informing him that the NCAB was a Communist controlled organization. In this contact between MAGDOFF and TRUBECK the informant learned that ROB THUBECK had ascertained from Dun & Bradstreet that THEODORE C ***XIRKPATRICK was associated with an organization known as the American Business Consultants in New York City, of which JOHN G. KEENAN was president, and KIRKPATRICK and KENNETH M. (MIKE) BIERLY were also associated. This organization, according to Dun & Bradstreet, was chartered under the New York laws in April, 1947. The informant learned that TRUBECK had gone to see KIRKPATRICK, at which time TRUBECK was advised by KIRKPATRICK that the latter was a former member of the FBI and that he felt he could do more for the country this way than in the FBI. THUBECK discussed with KIRKPATRICK the letter which KIRKPATRICK had written to BERGE and asked KIRKPATRICK what he expected Mr. BERGE to do. He replied that he expected Mr. BERGE to disassociate himself of all connections with this organization and he informed TRUBECK, "My personal advice to you, although it is none of my business, would be the same for you, because evidently you aren't a Communist because you wouldn't be up here making an issue of it if you were.

Apparently KIRKPATRICK furnished TRUBECK with the information concerning associates of the NCAB which caused KIRKPATRICK to advise BERGE that the organization was Communist controlled. However, TRUBECK was not satisfied with KIRK-PATRICK's information. 


It has previously been reported that HARRY intended to stay with BEADIE and the children at Peekskill, New York and commute back and forth to his work in New York City. The telephone number in Peekskill, New York, where the MAGDOFFS could be reached was ascertained by informant to be Peekskill 2998-M.

Subsequently on this date MAGDOFF contacted SOL LISCHINSKY to say goodbye as MAGDOFF was leaving in the morning. On this occasion MAGDOFF and LISCHINSKY discussed the Taft-Hartley Bill. HARRY furnished SOL with his office telephone number, Murray Hill 5-1743, and it was agreed that SOL would contact HARRY when in New York, and HARRY promised to get in touch with SOL whenever he returns to Washington.

The students were represented by OSHOND KAPRAENKEL and they were charged with activities unbecoming a student and inimical to the best interests of the City College of New York.

The following information was obtained from Confidential Informant for the period of May 16 to May 30, 1947:

He said that they were drinking quite heavily and that he thought they were expanding his horizons. MILLER told DUNCAN that BOLLES was at his home the other night and he asked about DUNCAN. MILLER invited the AIKMANs to a Sunday breakfast, thich is to be held at 11:30 a.m., and the invitation was accepted by DUNCAN.

On the same date MILLER tried to contact R. J. SITH at Oliver 7776; however, SHITH was not in but subsequently returned MILLER's call. They discussed plans for attending the Princeton dinner. During the conversation the name of HORALINGER AN (ph) was mentioned. They further discussed the SHURA LEGIS incident and ROSA inquired as to whether JETRIE thinks SHURA will go to the Embassy (Russian Embassy) for help. JENNIE replied that she did not know. ROSA told JENNIE that she had resigned from her position in the International Office of Information and Cultural Relations in the State Department over a year ago because of the unpleasant conditions there. ROSA added that she had been helping a friend edit a book that she sold to the Ziff Davis Company (ph), which is a Jewish publishing concern. She stated that this friend of hers has to urge to cure the world of anti-semetism. ROSA also said that she had gone to the Chinese News agency here in Washington to seek employment; however, the person she was to see was not in and that she would not learn about her job until later on. They both agree that neither will testify for either of the HABICHTS:

ROSA told JENNIE that HERMAN had a lot of his correspondence stored in the attic in POLYA's home and that POLYA went over them thoroughly and that some of the papers which she thought might be useful she turned over to the proper authorities, and when JEMMIE replied "Really?" ROSA said, "Yes, the Embassy." (Soviet Embassy).

On May 29, 1947, ROBERT MILLER contacted JOE GILLMAN and they made a luncheon engagement. On the same date HILLER contacted a Mr. CARNEY of the Dixie Realty Company regarding a gift shop which was advertised for sale at Florida and Connecticut Avenues. BOB stated he was interested in seeing it.

On May 29, 1947, RANDY FELTUS contacted MILLER, advising him that he had just arrived in town and that he will be here through the next day. They make arrangements to meet later in the evening.

The following information was obtained from Confidential Informant 67 175

June 1, 1947

JIM ANSARA contacted BOB MILLER and BO; informed him that he would pick him up at the corner of McKinley and Connecticut Avenue.

June 3, 1947

BLAIR (BOLLES ?) contacted ROBERT HILLER and stated that EMINY (very phonetic) was there and would like to talk to BOB and that EMINY was looking for an executive vice president and he, BIAIR, does not know if it is what BOB wants, but BOB can talk with EMINY (male) about it. BLAIR stated that EMINY wants someone who knows about foreign affairs, public opinion and dealing with people, the main idea being to keep large groups of people in various cities going in a coordinated fashion in the exploration of foreign affairs problems. BLAIR stated that ELINY appeared to be fairly conservative in his general outlook and that he was married to some ROCKEFELLER girl. He stated that BOB was to meet EMINY at the Metropolitan Club at 3:30. BLAIR stated that the job would be outside dealing with people, but with a good deal of inside planning, figuring out how to deal with the people, and he figured it would be the main item in "our" work and would be the "cream of jobs as far as the FPA (phonetic) *Foreign Policy Association) is concerned". BLAIR asked BOB to give him a brief life history of himself. BOB stated the following: 37 years old; B.A. in 1931; H.A. in 1932, Princeton University, living at Baltimore at the time. He did some writing for a year or so and then went into a fund raising company in New York by the name of JOHN PRICE JONES. He went abroad and spent 21 years in Moscow from 1934 to 1937 where he wrote for various British newspapers. He stated that he never wrote for the American press except for a very little time. He then went to Paris from 1937 to 1939 where he worked for the Spanish Government News Agency in Paris, "which was not a propaganda bureau, just a Government news agency". BOB stated that he used to speak a "fair" amount of Russian but does not read it very well. He speaks French and cannot speak Spanish but can read newspaper Spanish. He mentioned that one of the newspapers he had written for in Moscow was the Manchester Guardian. He stated that a few months after he came home he organized "that hemisphere deal" with JACK FAY, a news writer, on Latin America published in New York and it also

gave a research service which was subscribed to by "Time" and "Newswerk". In 1941 he came to ashington with MOCKEFELLER with O.I.A. He was then Information Officer in the Near East and Africa Section of the State Department and then became Assistant Ohief of the Publications Division.



BOB stated he does not know where MALLACE is going to end up but that he, BOB, was glad to see so many people there after "they" had tried to scare everybody away.

HELEN TAMB contacted BOB MILLER, who stated that the situation at the New Republic is very involved and it is so disorganized that she does not see "us" making WALLACE President at this point. BOB said there is a sort of air of that about the whole business, that he hates to say that because that was a wonderful speech and meeting but there is just something that isn't there. They agree that the basic ground work and real organization is not there.

June 18, 1947

AN

TRUDY MALLACE contacted BOB MILLER and invited them over for a drink the next day at 6:00 P.H.

June 20, 1947

JENNY MILLER contacted ROSA (HANNAH?). They discussed the divorce proceedings between the HABICHTS, stating that POLYA has a lawyer by the name of MADCLIFF. JENNY stated that they may go away for the month of July and ROSA remarked that if she went away it would be to look for a job which she, ROSA, has not been doing until the "hysteria" dies down. ROSA mentioned going to a meeting of the Hadassah Club at the Mayflower Hotel and stated that she was not a member "but her sister, Mrs. JANSE (phonetic) is very active". She stated that her other sister is Mrs. JANE BRESSADIE (phonetic). ROSA asked if JENNY cnew what happened to SHURA LEWIS. JENNY said she did not, that she had called SHURA once soon after the "display" but JENNY does not know where or how she is coming.

June 22, 1947

BOB MILIER contacted SAL RODMAN and made arrangements to drive out to RODMAN'S and see him. SAM remarked that he was at the DAVENPORT'S house, which is on the right side of the main entrance of Tauxement.

June 23, 1947

PEGGY GREENFIEID contacted JENNY MILIER and PEGGY said that she worked at home Saturday "trying to get my files straightened out so I could bring home my receipt materials". JENNY said they went to the Senate Gallery last Friday night to hear TAYLOR. PEGGY said Senator MAGNER is ill and THOMAS is in Geneva and is not coming back, and the Republicans have refused to allow pairs. PEGGY said "those Southern V-S". JENNY said those "swine, I know, but maybe, maybe, maybe". PEGGY said she would expect more if AIKEN came from an industrial state, she would have more respect, and there would be more chance of AIKEN changing his mind than one of these Southern Democrats. JENNY said BOD LAMB was over last night and they agreed that the Senators had tough, gangster-like faces. JENNY thought TAYLOR was wonderful, so funny, sweet and very good looking.

June 24, 1947

ALICE ANSARA contacted 30B HILLER requesting BOB to come over that morning as they would like to talk to him about something. ALICE said "JIM got a letter yesterday and apparently there were a lot of letters yesterday".

(State Department dismissals). ALICE said "we thought you might know a lot about procedure and that sort of thing". BOB said he didn't, but that he would be glad to come over.

June 25, 1947 (10 4

ALICE ANSARA contacted JENNY MILLER and they again discussed JIM'S letter of dismissal. ALICE said JIM was fine and that they were beginning to consider it a great compliment. ALICE stated that she thought that the Bill Monday at 3:00 o'clock was the signal and went on to state that JIM'S letter was addressed to his former office and that he had made a change the first of June. She remarked that it is typewritten on one typewriter and the date, Monday, June 23rd, was typed by another typewriter. ALICE asked JENNY to look at her sister's letter to see if there was any notice of more than one typewriter being used. They agreed that the dismissals should be fought on the grounds of civil liberties.

JENNY MILIER contacted FLO IEVY. FLO said she had gotten a dozen or more calls from the girls in the office wanting to know what had happened (regarding the letters of dismissal). JENNY told FLO to bring her letter when she came over because ALICE and SARAH had called and said the date was written in later and the envelopes were typed with a different machine right after the veto was overridden. FLO said hers was written in but the envelope was typed on another machine. JENNY said that BOJEN SMITH was taking the kids to a show that afternoon.

June 26, 1947


JENNY contacted PEGGY GREENFIEID and made arrangements to visit PEGGY that evening. JENNY stated that they were going to be away for the month of July and PEGGY said that a friend of hers by the name of KRAUS might be willing to rent the MILIER house while they were gone. PEGGY mentioned that ARAUS had an appointment in the Atomic Energy Commission hanging fire, a personnel job.

MILIERS. HERMAN HABICHT contacted BOB MILIER and made arrangements to visit the

RANDY FELTUS contacted JENNY MILLER and JENNY stated that HERMAN HABICHT had told her that GOODWING ATSON was leaving on Monday with a group of 25, that he was going to England, France, Austria and Czechoslovakia and that he had tried to get an admission into Poland but they would not give it to him. JENNY requested FELTUS to see if he could help MATSON get a visa into Poland. RANDY agreed to do so. JENNY gave MATSON'S address as 615 West 113th Street, Apartment 73; New York City. She said that he does not have a telephone at home, but that he might possibly be reached at the Teachers College, University 4-7000. JENNY said the is an awfully good guy" and requested FELTUS to contact him to see how he made out.

June 29, 1947

JIM ANSARA contacted BOB MILLER and stated that the title of the book BOB wanted was Governments and Politics Abroad", edited by JOSEPH STROUCEK who is from Hofstra College and the book is published by Funk & Wagnall. JIM said it covers events up to 1947. BOB said he would like to know what the competition is in talking to anybody.



June 30, 1947

BOB MILLER contacted the "Vashington Post" and gave instructions to stop delivery of the newspaper to his home from July 3 to August 4 and have it mailed to him at Box 84, Duxberry, Massachusetts. BOB started to give a part of his Duxberry address "King Cesar", but decided not to and gave just the Post Office Box.

BOB MILLER contacted CARL GREEN and CARL said that he had learned that O EN and EIFANOR TATTIMORE had left for New York. BOB stated that he had a radio broadcasting idea which he requested that CARL protect as his idea. To get up a reference book of basic political information of all countries of the world which would show the party breakdown in each party, and an account of how the existing government got in. BOB said persons to help on this did not have to be writers but should know research technique. (CARL said that WOODROW BORAH had been fired (from the State Department) and is available.) BOB said the publisher he has in mind is GREENBELG. CARL recommended HELEN LAMB as being good on the Far East and also JOHN DeTHANCIS, who is going to be at Johns Hopkins next year and who is here now doing graduate work with O.EN, and is going to be on OHEN'S staff next year. CARL recommended a student of OHENS', a Japanese namedylke who is in Baltimere. CARL also recommended MARY JANE KEENEY and gave her address as 501 West 138th Street, Apartment 71, New York, Endicott 4-1632. BOB said he knew MARY JANE. CARL also recommended SHIPLEY JENKINS, whose husband is DAVEY ENKINS at the Treasury. CARL said SHIRLEY is in London going to Oxford for the summer and that she works for LAR TASALSBURY at the Survey of Foreign Affairs in his Washington office. CARL said that JOHN DeFRANCIS lives in Virginia and that if BOB has trouble reaching him that he is to contact DAVE WAHL. CARL said DAVE MAHL is very good on suggestions of people. CARL mentioned that FRITZI XMANUEL (phonetic) has a job on Benders Congressional Committee. CARL also entioned ANNE CERTIER. BOB said that he knew the CERTIERS and had just recently CARL asked if BOB ever sees DAVE WAHL and BOB said very seldom, but it is a good idea. CARL suggested that BOB contact DAVE WAHL tonight. CARL mentioned that a directory of the type BOB has in mind has to be perfect and a thing like that would be reviewed by ONEN who would pick out everything wrong with it and that would kill it. BOB said that he, BOB, is going to be the editor of the directory. CARL mentioned ALICE DELERJIAN. CARL said that he was going to JOE *BERGENS for the month of August. CARL stated that he was going to talk to DAVE TAHL and would tell him BOB was going to contact him.

July 28, 1947

FLO LEVY contacted Mrs HIRSCHFELD, who resided in the HILLER home



during their absence, to advise her that she had received word from her sister (JENNY !ILLER) that they would return on August 3rd.

PHYSICAL SURVEILLANCE

On June 23, 1947, a physical surfaillance was conducted by Special Agents L. W. R. OBERNDORF and C. J. JONLS. At 9:30 A.M. ROBERT T. HILLER'S automobile was observed parked beside the residence of JAMES ANSARA, 21 Q Street, N. W. At 12:08 P.M. HILLER was observed to depart Trom ANSARA'S, enter his car and drive home. HILLER appeared to be very surveillance conscious.

On October 13, 1945, ROBERT T. MILIER contacted Mrs. J. LUTHER SOUTH/ORTH, Penola. Virginia. In a report of Special Agent V. LEROY SWEENEY in this case dated May 22, 1946, at Richmond, Virginia, information was set out regarding Mrs. SOUTH/ORTH. She and her husband lived at Penola in a small rural settlement in Caroline County, and operated a farm of moderate size. They displayed no signs of wealth and her husband was described as a typical farmer, and both he and his wife were reported to have bad dispositions. They were known to have one son recently honorably discharged from the service.

On November 14, 1944, and Harch 22, 1945, BOB MILIER contacted ARTHUR BLYLOR, Dawn, Virginia. According to the above-mentioned report from Richmond, BAYLOR is a negro operating a service station on Virginia State Highway #22, about 16 miles south of Bowling Gree, Virginia. He receives mail at Box 74-A, RFD 1, Hanover, Virginia. His wife is HATTIE G. BAYLOR. He was born on March 20, 1888 in Caroline County and has lived in this county all of his life. The Sheriff of Caroline County and Virginia State Trooper FRANK SLATER spoke highly of BAYLOR and mentioned nothing derogatory about him.

On January 20, 1946, **OBERT FILLER contacter Sergeant GILLER BEVERLY,
5th Chemical Company, Edgewood Arsenal, Maryland. In a memorandum from Baltimore
to Mashington dated June 12, 1946, information was set forth regarding this
individual. BEVERLY is a negro born on November 22, 1919, at Russell County,
Virginia. Prior to entering the Army in Harch, 1942, he was employed by the
Gate City Pharmacy, Gate City, Virginia. He served in the CCC for 1 year in 1938.
Since his enlistment in the Army, prior to his reenlistment on December 10, 1945,
he served as a Squad Leader, Communications Chief and Heavy Mortar Crewman. He is
Squad Leader of the Chemical Motor Company, motorized. He is not in a position
to handle any confidential information inasmuch as he is not stationed in the
Laboratory area of the Proving Grounds. He is of Class 4 intelligence with grade
62. The present requirements for acceptance in the Army is grade 69, however,
BEVERLY was accepted prior to the raising of the requirements for entrance. His
aptitude is graded as 61.



By memorandum dated August 9, 1946, the Baltimore Office informed the Washington Field Office that Baltimore telephone number University 2876 was listed to Dr. JOHN STAICE DAVIS, 215 Lendover Road, Guilford. His office is in the Severn Apartments, phone Vernon 1447. ROBERT T. MILLER has previously contacted the Baltimore number University 2876


licensed to practice medicine in June of 1903, a graduate of Yale University and Johns Hopkins Medical School. DAVIS is a specialist in plastic surgery and the medical examiners know of nothing derogatory concerning him. He is approximately 58 years of age and has a son, Dr. M. BONDOIN/DAVIS, who at the time of the report, was serving an internship at the Union Memorial Hospital. JOHN STAIGE DAVIS is the son of the late WILLIAM B. DAVIS, who for many years was a surgeon in the U. S. Army. Dr. DAVIS is considered to be moderately wealthy.

On January 11, 1946, ROBERT T. HILLER contacted an individual at telephone number Atlantic Highlands 840, New Jersey. In Newark Field Division letter dated October 2, 1946, it was stated that this number is listed to EDMARD M. CRANE. The Merchant's Credit Bureau, Asbury Park, New Jersey, advised on October 26, 1937, that EDMARD M.C. MANE, Box 502, Red Bank, resided on Riverside Drive, Middletown Township, New Jersey, and had been living there for about 4 years. Prior to that he resided in New York. He is married and is connected with the D. Van Nostrand Company, New York City. His reputation was good. EDMARD M.C. RANE was formerly on one of the Alien Enemy Hearing Boards in Newark, New Jersey, and was enerally considered to be a very loyal citizen.

GORGE N. PERAZICH

The following information reflects the activities of the abovenamed subject during the period from March 16, 1947 to August 31, 1947.



Confidential Informant furnished the following information concerning PERAZICH'S activities during the above period:

On April 4, 1947 DOROTHY KAPLAN, the wife of IRVING HAPLAN, contacted MELIA PERAZICH, the wife of GEORGE FERAZICH, and after engaging in personal conversation, AMELIA mentioned that her husband GEORGE was coming to Jashington, D. C. for the weekend.

On May 4, 1947, ALELIA PEREZICH again conversed with DOROTHY KAPLAN and it was agreed that the Kaplans would visit the PEREZICHS that afternoon. ALELIA mentioned that her husband, GLORGE, was at home.

On May 7, 1947, in a conversation between IRVING KAPLAN and BEADDIE WANTASSEL, KIPLIN mentioned that his wife, DCRCTHY, was spending the day with ALLIA PERAZICH.

On May 21, 1947 LCROINY MAPIAN again conversed with ALELIA FEMAZICH and ALELIA mentioned that she had received a letter from her husband, GECRGE,

and that he had been to hear WALLACE (HENRY MALLACE) speak and that he had said it was a very good meeting.

On May 22, 1947, DOROTHY KAPIAN was in contact with ALELIA PERAZICH and AMELIA told her that she had dinner with Mr. and Ars ALLIA (from the Yugoslavian Embassy Commercial Attache's Office). ALLIA and DOROTHY then agreed to meet downtown in an hour or so.

On May 27, 1947, DOROTHY MAPIAN invited AMELIA PRAZICH to attend the MAILACE meeting on June 16, 1947, to be held at the Watergate. She told her that BRADDIE VAN TASSEL was also accompanying them. AMELIA indicated she would attend.

On June 3, 1947 DOROTHY MAPIAN again conversed with AMELIA PERAZICH and AMELIA told her that there had been a dinner party on Sunday and that Mr. and Mrs. KUGANJA had visited them over the weekend. They then discussed a party to be held on the following Saturday night at the VAN TASSEL'S in honor of JANE STONE. AMELIA was not sure that she could attend. DOROTHY then agreed to drop in at AMELIA'S that afternoon.

On June 15, 1947 AMELIA PERAZICH conversed with DCROTHY KAPLAN and told her that NCREAN BURSLER, another subject in this case, was coming to town that afternoon from Chicago and that he and the WINSTONS were coming for dinner. She invited the KAPLANS but they declined.

On June 16, 1947 DCROTHY KAPLAN advised AFELIA PERIZICH that they would pick her up and go to dinner and would proceed to the latergate where LALLACE was appearing that evening. DCROTHY mentioned the expected crowd and the parking problem and AFELIA laughingly retorted, "You mean my friend PARNELL hasn't scared them away."

On June 28, 1947 DCROTHY MAPIAN contacted AMELIA PLRAZICH concerning a contribution which was being collected for ED STONE'S memorial. AMELIA indicated she would give hers to DCROTHY.

On July 21, 1947 DONOTHY KAPLAN told AMELIA PER/ZICH that the KAPLANS would be over about 9:00 PH.

On August 1, 1947 AMELIA PERAZICH conversed with DOROTHY EMPIAN and told her that the WINSTONS and BURSLER were coming to dimmer and she invited the KAPLANS over after dinner to see NORMAN (BURSLER). DOROTHY later told her that they would not be able to make it but to say hello

for them to NORMAN and the WINSTONS.

On August 5, 1947 DORCTHY KAFLAN conversed with AMELIA PERAZICH and AMELIA told her that GEORGE PERAZICH was expected home Saturday morning. She invited the KAPLANS over on Sunday for a birthday party for one of the boys.

The following information was furnished by Confidential Informant concerning the activities of the PFRAZICHS during the above-mentioned period:

On March 20, 1947 BEADDIE MAGDOFF conversed with AMELIA PERAZICH and they discussed the birthday party which had been given for one of the PERAZICH children. They mentioned also a CHRISTINA FORITZER and her mother who were at the party. AMELIA indicated that the PERAZICHS had lived with the POELTZERS on Broad Branch Road for a while before they moved into their present home.

On March 29, 1947 BEADDIE MAGDOFF invited the PERAZICH children to a party for her son FREDDIE on the following Saturday. AMELIA believed that GEORGE PERAZICH would be home that day and didn't know whether they could attend.

On March 31, 1947 AMELIA PERAZICH advised BENDDIE MAGDOFF that GEORGE PERAZICH would be home Friday night and that they might possibly attend the birthday party mentioned above.

On April 12, 1947 AHELIA PERAZICH contacted bEADDIE HAGDOFF regarding a legal organization that gave free legal advice. BEADDIE suggested that she call JACA/BICOM at Temple 7595. BEADDIE then invited the PERAZICHS to dinner Tednesday evening saying that BILL and FEGGY/FABST were coming. (The phone number of the PABSTS is apparently CROWAY 1517.)

On April 15, 1947 DEADDIE MAGDOFF told AMELIA PERAZICH that the dinner would be held on Tuesday instead of Wednesday and that WYNN (ph) and BENCHINDLER, HCbart 3481, were coming and could the PER-ZICHS come over.

On April 21, 1947 AMELIA PERAZICH told BEADDIE MAGDOFF that she had made arrangements with the HANDLERS to drive them out the next eveing.

On May 26, 1947 BEADDIE MAGDOFF and AMELIA PERALICH discussed a party which was being planned for ED and JANE STONE. AMELIA indicated

she would try to attend and mentioned that her husband, GEORGE, would be home for the weekend.

On June 3, 1947 BEADDIE MAGDOFF advised AMELIA PERAZICH that the party for the STONES was off. BEADDIE indicated that she would try to visit AMELIA the following day.

On June 4, 1947 BEADDIE HAGDOFF conversed with AMELIA PER ZICH and said she would be home for lunch with the children.

On June 5, 1947 BEADDIE TAGDOFF contacted AMELIA PERAZICH and they discussed organizing a Murses Aid Group. AMELIA indicated she would like to help but said that she wouldn't have the time.

Physical Surveillance

No physical surveillance was conducted on this subject during the above period.


RE: VICTOR PERLO

It has been reported in this case that JAMES H. DAY, 522 Central, Manchester, New Hampshire, corresponded with VICTOR PERLO by correspondence postmarked 2:00 p.m. February 24, 1947 at Manchester, New Hampshire. The Washington Field Office by letter dated March 26, 1947, requested the Bostom Office to identify and furnish available background data to JAMES H. DAY.

The Boston Office by letter of July 9, 1947, advised that JALES H.

DAY resides with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. CHARLES H. DAY, at 522 Central Street,
Manchester, New Hampshire. His father operates a neighborhood grocery and confectionary shop. JAMES H. DAY is one of five children and is reported to be
an unemployed disabled war veteran.

Captain GEORGE WEICH of the Manchester Police Department was acquainted with JAMES H. "JIMETE" Day and advised that Day is regarded as a war here in Manchester although there have been rumors that the wounds he reputedly received in action were actually the result of a hand grenade exploding while Day was holding it. WEICH had no reason to doubt Day's loyalty and advised that to the contrary Day is generally regarded as a patriot.



Past investigation regarding VICTOR PERLO has reflected that he is acquainted with DAVID ROSS JENKINS who is employed in the Monetary Research Branch of the Treasury Department, Washington, D.C., in which section VICTOR PERLO was formerly employed. The background of DAVID ROSS JENKINS has also been reported and that information revealed that JENKINS came to the United States from New Zealand.



DORIS PLENN had a lengthy conference with NELL and GEORGE FRAIN concerning the work in connection with the Washington Arts Committee. GEORGE commented that on the previous night, he had distributed about 100 press releases and mentioned that on this date, he had been to Mrs. RAYMOND CLAPPER'S home. FRAIN commented that she is a wonderful person and indicated that she was very interested in the Jashington Arts Committee and had even offered the use of her home after the meeting. GEORGE told DORIS that NELL had been very active in getting some women to assist in the work and mentioned that KATHERING HURLEY, DELILAPIERCE, and ELEANOR BERKIAN would assist. DORIS suggested that NELL have two white women and two negro women to assist, pointing out that unless these arrangements were made, the negro women would feel slighted.

DORIS read to GEORGE a statement she had prepared outlining the objectives of the Washington Arts Committee. The statement was quite lengthy but generally its theme is that the National Capitol lacks an art center and it is felt that artists should be encouraged and art fostered in Washington, D. C.

ABEL suggested she write Mrs. CECTIVSNYDER, care of Supreme Court Justice SNYDER, San Juan, Fuerto Rico. At the conclusion of the conversation, PLENN mentioned that he expects to finish his book by the middle of June and wants to have a big party at that time.

VIRGINIA LEWIS talked to DOMIS PLENN and during the conversation mentioned that she had seen PETER (SEEGAR?) in the bookshop yesterday. DORIS was surprised and was unable to understand why he hadn't called her.

During a conversation between ABEL PLENN and his wife, he mentioned that he and DeWITT ELDRIDGE hoped to attend the class at the King Smith School that evening, at which time PALMER WEBER would preside. On the same date, HELEN KELLEY talked to DORIS PLEN! and among other things, it was mentioned that ABEL would finish his book in about three weeks. HELEN mentioned that she had been talking to LOLA BOSWELL and invited DORIS and ABEL to join LOLA and some others in the KELLEY apartment for breakfast on the coming Sunday morning. HELEN asked that DORIS advise her at North-9385, her home telephone number. The PALMER WEBER lecture at the King Smith School that evening was also discussed and HELEN indicated that she thought she would attend. The two women agreed to see each other at the class.

In the late afternoon, an individual named MURIEL (believed to be MURIEL DRAPER) contacted DORIS PLENN and stated that she had just arrived and was at the station (Union Station?). MURIEL commented that she had to go to the "Washington Chapter" tonight at 8:00 P. M. and then was returning later in the evening (to New York?). MURIEL stated she would take a cab and come right out to DORIS' apartment.

5-29-47 K N

OGDEN KELLY of the Library of Congress, contacted ABEL PLENN and inquired if he would be at the Library during the day. After a short conversation, the two men agreed to meet in the lobby of the Willard Hotel at 1:00 P. M. on the following day for lunch.

KATHERINE HURLEY and DORIS PLENN discussed the reception on the previous evening, apparently concerning the Washington Arts Committee. Among those mentioned as being present were Mrs. HARRIMAN, Mrs. FINCHOT, CLAPPER (Mrs. RAYKOND CLAPPER?), JACK BERKMAN, GEORGE FRAIN, and HILDAYSTITH. The conversation included nothing of a particularly pertinent nature.

Physical Surveillance

On June 11, 1947, Confidential Informant reported that MARTIN POPPER was scheduled to take VIRGINIA LEWIS to lunch at 12:45 P. M. On the basis of this information, a surveillance was instituted by Special agents ROBERT E. LEONARD and WILLIAM H. MARR in the vicinity of POPPER's office, 20th and I Streets, N. W. At 12:45 P. M., ABEL PLENN appeared and entered the office of the National Lawyers Guild where POPPER has his office.

At 1:13 P. M., PIENN emerged from the office at 902 - 20th Street, N. W., in company with a large woman about 5: 10" or 11", who is believed to be VIRGINIA LEWIS. They walked slowly southwest on 20th Street, entered the Colonial Coffee Shop at 20th and Pennsylvania Avenue, N. W., and after staying a very short time, left and finally went to the Latin restaurant, La Casa Chilena, 1738 F Street, N. W., entering at 1:28 P. M., apparently for lunch.

The surveillance was discontinued at 1:40 P. M.

Identity of Contacts

The following contacts of ABEL and DORIS PLENN have been identified by the New York Field. Detailed information concerning these contacts will be found in the report of Special Agent JOHN T. HILSBOS, dated June 3, 1947, at New York, New York, in the section devoted to ABEL PLENN.

ANITA BRENNER

This individual is identical with ANITA BRENNER, formerly of 152 Caryl Avenue, Yonkers, New York, a journalist by profession and a member of the American Correspondents Association. Miss BPENNER was interviewed in connection with the case entitled, "JACQUES MARNARD VAN DENDRESCHD, with aliases - ESPICHAGE - R". -t this time, she resided at 38 - 8th Avenue, Brooklyn, New York.

EXEMNER stated that she spent several years in Mexico City where she resided in the "liberal" section. It was believed by interviewing agents at that time that she meant "Communist" section.

The information which she furnished concerning the previously entitled case is not being set forth inasmuch as it has no relation to this investigation. Apparently, ANITA BRENNER's only connection with Harper's Magazine was that before the war she wrote a few articles which were published in this publication.

Information from the Credit Bureau of Greater New York reflects that her husband is apparently Dr. DAVID CLUSKER. The name ANITA BRENNER is the maiden name which she has used in connection with her writing.

TON STRASSMAN

This individual is apparently identical with FANNISTRASSIAN, of 24 East 61st Street, New York City. Miss STRASSIAN has lived at this address since early 1941 and is reportedly a quiet person and an excellent tenant. For many years, she was employed by the Viking Press, New York City, but at the present time it is understood that she apparently is self-employed working as an author's agent. No derogatory information was discovered concerning her.

HELEN BLACK

This individual is identical with HELEN BLACK of 15 West Whith Street, room 904. Miss BLACK is affiliated with the Sovfoto Agency. It is noted that she is presently under investigation by the New York Office and information from the New York Office reveals that she is the USSR agent for the distribution of all Russian propaganda in the United States. She was born in New York on August 3, 1890, is considered pro-Russian and Communist; she is a registered foreign agent listing Russian



principles as "Press and Publishers Literary Service, Moscow, an Tass News Agency of the USSR".

She has operated the Sovfoto agency, 11 West 42nd Street, in New York City, since 1932. HELEN BLACK was one of the founders and in 1926 a member of the Executive Staff of the "New Masses" magazine. She has contacted known espionage agents and in her attempt to secure photographs has indicated possible subversive motives.

ALFRED O MENDEL

This individual is appearently identical with ALFRED OSCATAMENDEL, who made application for a certificate of identification under the alien enemy registration act. He presently resides at 131 West 15th Street, New York City, and was formerly affiliated with LONGPAN, GREEN & Company, 55 - 5th Avenue, New York City. He has also been active as editor of the "Living Thoughts Library", since about 1937. No particularly derogatory information was found concerning him.

DAVID M. SHYTHE

This individual is identical with DAVID M. SHYTHE, 66 Irving Place, New York City. Inquiry at this address reveals that SMYTHE has rented an apartment in this building for the past two years but at the present time is believed to be in Hollywood, California, doing some writing. Nothing derogatory appears concerning him.

The mail cover currently enforced on the subject's residence, 1511 Park Road, N. W., apartment 6, failed to provide any information pertinent to the investigation during this period.

INFORMATION FURNISHED BY CONFIDENTIAL INFORMANT

Hrs. HIMME TAIDS, who has previously appeared in this case as a contact of DORIS PLENN, during a conversation with lirs. PLENN, stated wile need to abolish the capitolistic system". HINHE RANDS and DORIS PIEHN, both of whom are interested in left wing organizations of various types, discussed generally ways and means whereby their associates would be made more effective. They were particularly interested in combating anticipated labor legislation (Taft-Hartley Bill) which was pending at that time.

June 5, 1947 /

ABEL PLEMN spoke to OGDEN MELLEY of the Library of Congress and on the same day to DE ITT ELDRIDGE of George Washington University. conversations resulted from these contacts are not particularly pertinent and are not being set forth.

ALIX HEUTHER in conversation with DORIS and ABEL PLENN mentioned that she had left the Government Service and was anticipating going to New York. During the conversation, DAVID R. MAHL was mentioned, whom ABEL described as "a fine person", and added "we need every fine person we can get". To this remark, ALIX replied "he is a wonderful person really", and then added a bit later "that there are really so very few (wonderful) people left when you look around". The conversation was quite lengthy and generally concerned itself with a discussion of what ABEL and ALIX termed as "the growing reaction in the United States".

June 8. 1947

ABEL PLEIN talked to MARTIN POPPER of the National Lawyer's Guild. The purpose of this conversation was chiefly to arrange an appointment for VIRGINIA LETTS to meet and talk with MARTIN POPPER.

June 9, 1947

ALEXANDER OHL talked to DORIS PLENN. He indicated that he wanted to speak to ABEL to see if ABEL could provide some information on MORIAN -ARIOUR, the American Ambassador to Spain who succeeded CANLTON HAYS. DORIS later talked to ABEL, giving him the message, and asked him to call UHL.

june 11, 1947

Ins. CHARLES CLITIAN, who is apparently identical with Ers. C. I. COLIMAN, 410 Baltimore Avenue, Chevy Chase, telephone isconsin 9459, spoke to DORIS PLEIN. The two women agreed that they had a great deal in common because of their liberal ideas and generally discussed the changes for "liberalism". COLIMAN remarked, "we are sort of at the crossroads now". To which DORIS agreed. They agreed to keep in touch with each other and as DORIS termed it "keep the lines of communication open".

LEONARD CALEMITE of the State Department contacted DORIS PIENN.

LEONARD mentioned that his wife, HELEN is working at the Department of Labor and the conversation was generally of a social nature. LEONARD agreed to recontact DORIS about the middle of the following week and arrange to see her.

June 18, 1947 W

DORIS PLENN spoke to KATHRYMAURLEY, wife of GRANVILLE MURLEY of Howard University. It was tentatively agroed that PETER SEEGER, DEMITT and HOPE EIDRIDGE and the PLENG would visit KATHRYN HULLEY on the following night.

June 19, 1947 W

PETER (SEEGER ?) spoke to DCRIS PLENT and during the conversation mentioned that he was going to see DAVID (CA PBELL ?). DORIS gave PETER, DAVID's address as Community Education, 935 G Place, telephone Republic 2711.

June 20, 1947 (1)

During a conversation between DELITT ELDRIDGE and DORIS PLENN they discussed a party which was to take place that evening. Among the names mentioned of the individual who would possibly be present were the following:

PLENN. Their conversation was lengthy, but it appeared apparently that both PLENN and DRAPER are most friendly and have a good opinion of each other. During the conversation TURIEL mentioned that she is quite active in the Homen's International Democratic Federation and cited a racial incident which occurred in Stockholm, Sweethn, which had provided good propaganda for the organization to use in illustrating that the United States is really not a democratic nation. After MURIEL had described the incident and its possible propaganda value, PLENN's comment was to the effect that it was "wonderful".

DECITT ELDRIDGE, while in conversation with ABEL PLENN, mentioned that he had seen HURIEL DRAPER on a previous evening and commented that she had given a rousing speach. ELDRIDGE indicated that he was quite well acquainted with DRAPER and PLENT mentioned that he expected to see her in New York City the first week in July.

On this same date ABEL PLEN! talked to JUDITH CRANADOS, wife of the Guatemalan Ambassador. PLEN! told JUDITH that he had spoken to HARTIN POPPER and PCPPER had suggested that they meet at his home on the Tollowing Tonday night. There was no indication as to the nature of the matter to be discussed.

June 23, 1947 W M

In a conversation between DEWITT ELDRIDGE and DORIS PLEMN it was mentioned that DEWITT is going to Havana, Cuba. It was also of interest that ELDRIDGE endorsed the publication "The Churchman".

June 26, 1947 W

Yu

LEGIARD C. RENNIE spoke to DORIS PLENN and mentioned that he would be unable to visit the PLENNS because he had had a terrible shock that he did not wish to discuss. HENNIE discussed this blow which had befallen him as "fantastic and unbelieveable in this country". He indicated he would contact DORIS on the following Sunday. The "shock" to which REDNIE referred unquestionably was the order of termination which he received from the State Department. It will be recalled that some ten State Department employees were dismissed because of disloyalty which caused quite some comment in the place at that time and subsequent thereto.

During the early part of July 1947, ABEL PLENT arranged to rent a cottage near St. Michael's, Laryland and DORIS PLENT and her daughter MILT v and spent most of the month of July at this cottage. PLENT has spent part

of this time at the cottage and he has divided the remainder of his time between Mashington and New York. His time in Washington was spent almost wholly at the Library of Congress where he is putting the finishing touches on a history of Latin America.

His trips to New York apparently involved contacts at various publishing houses where he is attempting to arrange for royalty fees and the publication of his book.

July 24, 1947 J& U

The Columbian School of Music attempted to contact ABEL PLENN. The person answering the phone believed to be one EDITH ALDER AN who is subletting the PLENN's apartment house, was heard by the informant to state that PLENN was in New York City and would possibly not return to Mashington for approximately a week or two.

As of July 31, 1947 Informant reported that PLENN was still in New York City.

ROSENBERG talked to WARREN SHARFMAN and during the conversation, ALLAN mentioned how hard he had been working on the MIRZANI case. They discussed the previous day's court action and commented on it at length. ROSENBERG mentioned that it was necessary for him to see MARY JANE KEENEY that afternoon and mentioned that her husband, ANGUS, has a two year contract with the War Department and they want a hearing on the charges against him by the War Department. ROSENBERG commented that it was hopeless and said he had advised against it, adding however, that if the contract is valid, ANGUS could sue the government in the Court of Claims for non-performance.

<u>5-17-47</u>

HAROLD TANNENT (phonetic) talked to ALIAN ROSENBERG and mentioned the nominating committee had been meeting on the coming elections (in the National Lawyers Guild?). They want ALIAN to accept the nomination of Treasurer because of the fine work he has done on the Membership Committee. ROSENBERG commented that he liked the idea but does not have the time.

5-18-47

Informant reported that an individual named DAVE (probably DAVE WAHL) called ALLAN ROSENBERG, saying that he had some important



business and wished to see him today. ROSENBERG told DAVE to come to see him at 2:00 P. M.

During a conversation with one PETER (believed to be PETE (UNDERWOOD), ALLAN ROSENEERG and PETE mentioned the name of GOLDMAN.

PETE explained that he meant MARCUS GOLDMAN and after ALLAN said that he knew MARCUS, PETE commented that MARCUS is still working in the Interior Department. ALLAN mentioned that he met MARCUS GOLDMAN when he was having some trouble with the Dies Committee, adding that he was a member of the bookshop which is a "very subversive organization". ROSENBERG further mentioned that MARCUS and DAVE WAHL went through a series of hearings in connection with this matter.

Toward the conclusion of the conversation, the MARZANI trial was discussed and ROSENBERG mentioned that they were getting a number of witnesses who are in the radio field. He commented that he was going to give PETE the name of one of them but thought he better not, adding "I don't know whether anyone is listening on the phone or not".

5-19-47


MARIAM AINSLEY attempted to reach ROSENBERG and was informed that he was in court. MARIAM said that DAVE WAHL had told her to call ROSENBERG in reference to a little matter for her. She left her home telephone number as Lichigan-4865.

5-20-47

During the conversation between ROSENBERG and his wife, ERNA, they mentioned the way the MARZANI case was progressing on this date. ALLAN felt that things had gone pretty well although the situation is very tense. He commented that PAUL ROBESON was mentioned as a possible witness for MARZANI but it was doubtful whether or not it was advisable to put him on. The informant indicated that ROSENBERG was not gleeful but seemed to be generally encouraged.

5-22-47

ALLAN ROSENBERG called his wife, ERNA, and told her that CARD LARZANI had been found guilty on all counts. ERNA commented that this was terrible and ALLAN indicated that he also is shocked and that the letdown is awful. ERNA commented, "the government didn't prove its case but that didn't make any difference". ALLAN commented that CHARLEY



ROSENBERG remarked that from things he has been picking up, it is his understanding that the FBI is tapping telephone conversations. He cautioned ERNA to bear that in mind when talking, pointing out that he did not mean to leave the impression that she had anything to conceal but she should remember that someone might be listening to the conversation.

Later in the day, ENLIN SHARFIAN and ERNA ROSENBERG talked about the MARZANI decision. ERNA commented that this "red baiting scare" has just reached its turning point with this "terrible thing". ENILY's reply was that it is nothing worse than some of the things that have been happening in the past several months.

POLYA HABICHT contacted ALLAN ROSENBERG to inquiry whether he would handle her defense in the divorce action instituted against her by her husband, HERMANN HABICHT. She commented that DAVE RAIN of 1105 - K Street, N. W., had refused to handle the case.

Later in the day, ROSENBERG contacted DAVING IN and the two men discussed POLYA HABICHT's background at length.


Later that evening, ALLAN ROSENBERG talked to WARREN SHARFMAN and the two men decided they did not want to handle POLYA HABICHT's case. ALLAN's comment was that he didn't want to get mixed up with a "crazy woman".

5-23-47

During a conversation between ERNA and ALLAN ROSENBERG, ALLAN mentioned that HERD SCHENKEN (phonetic) was at his office at this time.

<u>5-25-47</u>

"IZ" (I. F. #STONE of "PM" newspaper, contacted ALLAN ROSENBERG and indicated he was writing an article about the CARL MARZANI



case and wished to discuss it with ROSENBERG. The two men discussed the case in almost its entirety and dealt with the various phases of its development and discussed most of the witnesses individually. The SCHNEIDER AN case was discussed, at which time, ROSENBERG pointed out that the government held that SCHNEIDERMAN could not be denaturalized on the grounds that he was a Communist Party official at the time of his naturalization, and that as such he and the Party advocated the overthrow of the government by force and violence.

They also discussed the possibility of appealing the case and even went into such details as to how the jury panels are chosen in Washington, D. C. (STONE specifically seemed confused with the rapidity with which Policeman DREW gained entrance into the Communist Party, giving the impression that the Communists must have been awfully careless to let a man get in so quickly.)

They also discussed HARPERS' activities in the Communist Party and pointed out that there was some confusion of testimony concerning HARPER. The conversation was terminated by the two men agreeing that the case was a rather confusing one.

Later, ROSENBERG talked to CHARLES FORD, who mentioned that he would file a Motion for a New Trial on the following day. FORD mentioned that he had talked with I. F. STONE from "PM" for three quarters of an hour and ROSENBERG commented that he had also talked to STONE.

5-27-47

HUGH BARTON, formerly of the State Department, talked to ALLAN ROSENBERG and mentioned that he has been working on a document in the form of a Memorandum, which deals with the people who knew CARL MARZANI and himself. He stated the purpose is to present full information history of the case and the nature of the indictment and the nature of the trial. He indicated that this Memorandum would be used for the purpose of raising money to be solicited from persons sympathetic to the case.

The possibility was also discussed that the case might eventually go to the Supreme Court. ROSENDERG was sympathetic with which BARTON was attempting to do and promised to review the document if it were brought to his office.



5-29-47

During a conversation between ERNA and ALLIN ROSENBERG, he mentioned that ANNE GERTLER would be in his office that afternoon so that he could draft her will. It was also mentioned by ERNA that they had less than \$200 in the bank at the present time. This emphasizes the financial difficulties which ROSENBERG has been experiencing.

The following information reflects the results of an investigation of this subject's activities during the period from May 16, 1947 to August 31, 1947:

The mail cover placed on the home of SHITH met with negative results during the above period.

Confidential Informant furnished the following information concerning SAITH'S activities:

On May 17, 1947 SHITH conversed with MARY JANE KEENEY concerning her attempts to secure a passport for Japan. SMITH said he talked to miss IRLNE BELIAN who is secretary to General HILDRING and that she advised him that MARY JANE'S file was on Mrs. SHIPLEY'S desk. They then discussed his efforts to expedite MARY JANE'S passport. SMITH mentioned that he felt very much involved because of his relationship with MARY JANE and ANGUS, her husband, and that Mr MODLIN on HILDRING'S staff was also concerned.

On May 20, 1947 MARY JANE KEENEY conversed with CLAYTON SHITH, the wife of BOTEN SHITH, and advised the latter that ARGUS had cabled her that he would be here Friday morning. MARY JANE talked about the visits that many people were getting, possibly referring to the interviews of Gregory subjects by agents of this office. MARY JANE said that she was sure it was just a shot in the dark, just a fishing expedition. She asked CLAYTON to tell BOWEN SMITH that MARTIN POPPER had called yesterday but she didn't know at whose instigation.

On the same day MARY JANE REEMEY conversed with BOWEN SHITH at which time they discussed the case of ANGUS KEENEY. BOWEN mentioned that he had tried to get in touch with ALIAN ROSEMEKRG concerning it but was unable to do so. He also mentioned that he thought hOSEMBERG was the one who mentioned the situation to MARTY POPPER. They then discussed POPPER and MOSEMBERG. SHITH cautioned her about keeping away from THURLING RESOLD'S law firm in regard to ANGUS'S case. They also discussed the ANGUET case which was then being litigated in the District Court. SHITH then discussed with MARY JANE the dreams which his wife CLAYTON, was having. He said that they concerned a concentration camp with the "rubber hose department" and that she would wake up in the middle of the night in a very disturbed state.


On May 23, 1947 ANGUS KEENAY conversed with BOMAN SAITH

and discussed his trip back from Japan. They then talked about ANGUS'S dismissal by the War Department. BOWEN mentioned that everyone was shocked when they heard of it.

On May 24, 1947 MARY JANE KEENEY contacted BOWEN SMITH and thanked him for some flowers which he had apparently sent to her. She then conversed with SMITH'S wife, CLAYTON, concerning their getting together. It was decided that the KEENEYS would come out Monday evening, May 26, 1947. They then talked about ANGUS'S dismissal by the War Department and CLAYTON inquired of MARY JANE if she wanted her to ask DAVE SUBJECTS to come to the house Monday so that they could discuss ANGUS'S case with him since he formerly worked for the War Department. It was agreed that SUMMERS would be invited.

On June 22, 1947 MARY JANE KEENEY told BOWEN SEATH about their moving to New York and that AL. BERNATZIN of the United Public Workers of America was handling ANGUS'S case. They also mentioned the fact that BERNIE ACCIDAN, another subject in this case, had been released from his job at Treasury.



Confidential Informant reported that on June 25, 1947 in a conversation between Janki miller, the wife of ROBERT MILLER, another subject in this case, and FLO LEVY. JENNY mentioned that BOJEN SMITH was taking her children to the show and that she had to take them over to Georgetown by twenty minutes to three.

Confidential Informant advised that on June 29, 1947 BCWEN SETTH was in contact with ERNA and Allan MOS_NBERG, also a subject in this case, at which time SMITH advised them that they were going away the following day for the summer and he would rent their house to a Lieuten-

ant Commander in the Navy.

On June 4, 1947 Special Agent CHARLES D. CHAPMAN instituted a physical surveillance on the residence of BOWEN SMITH, from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM during which time no activity of interest was noticed on the part of the subject. However, it was noted by the agent that SMITH'S automobile now bears a 1948 Maryland tag, #94-349.

A review of information furnished the Confidential Informants of this office for the period covered by this report fails to reflect any information of pertinence or value to this investigation.

RE: UNKNOWN SUBJECT "JOHN"



On April 28, 1947, a letter was addressed to the New York Office, pointing out that an effort was being made by the Washington Field Office to identify Unknown Subject "JOHN".

The New York Office was furnished with a list of suggested questions and requested to interview Informant GREGORY to obtain additional background information concerning "JOHN".

By letter dated June 9, 1947 the New York Office furnished the following information concerning "JOHN" which was obtained from Informant GREGORY when her activities with "JOHN" were discussed with hir. This information supplements previous information furnished by GREGORY concerning "UOHN".

The subject matter of this letter was recently discussed with Confidential Informant CREGORY and all of the items set forth in this letter were gone over carefully with her. The following is a resume of the additional information that she was able to recall in connection with the unknown subject, "JOHN".

At the first scheduled meeting she was to have with "JOHN", the latter did not show up and when she saw him for the first time at a drug store on Ninth Avenue in New York City she observed him with a photograph in his hand. He approached her and after introducing himself as "JOHN" he indicated to her that the photograph was not a good likeness. She was unable to state how "JOHN" came into possession of her photograph except that it would be a fair presumption that he secured it through JACOB NaCOLOS, inasmuch as the latter was known to have photographs of her. She could not state specifically when, where and under what circumstances such photographs might have been taken. The presumption of how "JOHN" came into possession of her photograph is borne out by the fact that the next two times she saw "JOHN" he was with GOLOS, and these meetings took place at the automat on Broadway, between 46th and 47th Streets, New York City.

Subsequent meetings she had with "JOHN" were prearranged and took place at a Newsreel theater and also at a Translux theater on 42nd Street in New York City. These meetings were prearranged either by GOLOS or by her. The meetings were always held at 7:00, 8:00 or 9:00 P.M., on the date specified, and upon entering the theater she would go to the right side of it where these meetings would take place. This Newsreel Theater (1 is more particularly described as being located on the South side of East 42nd Street, near Pershing Square, and is still being operated there.

In connection with the questions concerning the brief or attache cases, CREGORY recalled that during the time the meetings were being held in the Newsreel and Translux Theatres she suggested that they each obtain attache

cases and exchange these when they met in the above-mentioned theaters. She recalled specifically on the first occasion she saw "JOHN" with an attache case, which was really a large, brown briefcase, and she indicated to him that this was too large and bulky and that he should make an attempt to exchange it. He did not, however, and she subsequently purchased a small attache case for him and as their meetings progressed they would exchange these small attache cases.

In connection with the receipt of money, GREGORY stated that all of the currency was in twenty dollar bills and they would be enclosed in plain white, cheap envelopes which had no identifying marks and that she would always execute a receipt for this money which she turned over to "JOHN"; it is her recollection that she executed these receipts in the name of "HELEN", which was the name by which she was known to "JOHN". She further recalled that when they would exchange messages or attache cases no comment was made by either.

In this connection she also stated GOLOS, on several occasions, was very critical of "JOHN" and directed her that she should not tell him anything of what she was doing and to merely carry out whatever instructions he, GOLOS, gave her in her meetings with "JOHN".

In connection with his general appearance and attitude she stated when she first saw him he was extremely sloppy in his dress and had a very decided accent, but after some period of time he began to dress better, spoke with less of an accent and was becoming "Americanized". She also recalled that he was very arrogant, was probably disliked by people he met and was the type of person who started out with some small, menial job and, through his own efforts, "went up the ladder". The only significant recollection she had of his physical condition was that he had an extremely unhealthy pallor and that he had a rather deep cough, which she characterized as tubercular. She has no recollection of any individuals he was associated with other than, of course, MARGARET, and has no knowledge as to whether he owned an automobile inasmuch as she never saw him in one.

The New York Office advised by letter dated June 10, 1947, that during the course of the interview: with MICHAEL GREENBERG on June 4, 1947, it was noted that GREENBERG was introduced to a weman named Missevany-SCHAIK in the latter part of 1942. 

Miss VAN SCHAIK as described above could not be identified in the files of the New York Division; however, the files did reveal that GEORGE SAVARY SCHAIK, 40 Hemlock Road, Bronxville, New York, was listed as a reference by MARY WOLFE PRICE, à subject in instant case, and he may be identical with an individual who was the vice president in New York City of the New York Life Insurance Company. In view of the similarity of the description of Miss Van SCHAIK to that of UNKNOWN SUBJECT, with alias CATHERINE in this case, the Washington Field Office was requested to identify Miss Van SCHAIK.

Inquiry by Special Agent AUBREY C. ERENT at Stones Mercantile Agency reflected a report dated April 28, 1941, concerning Miss FRANCES L. VAN SCHAIK, 3120 R Street, NW, Washington, D.C. This report stated that Miss VAN SCHAIK is originally from New York City. She came to Washington on or about March 15, 1941, from 14 Washington Place, New York, New York, and has resided at 3120 k Street, NW. Since her residence in Washington she has been employed as a research assistant by WALTER LIPPMAN, writer, 1535 35th Street, NW, phone Michigan 0596, at an approximate salary of \$30.00 per week.

A New York credit report dated april 30, 1941, reflects that Miss VAN SCHAIK is approximately 28 to 30 years of age and single. She was formerly employed by the Associated Hospital Service in New York City from November 1939 to March 1941 in a secretarial capacity. She resigned in March 1941 to accept her present position in Washington, D.C. Prior to the above employment she had been in the employ of the American Arbitration Association for a number of

years in their research department. Her father, GEORGI VAN SCHAIK, had been the state superintendent of insurance and in the past had reported his daughter as quite capable of taking cure of her requirements. Her father is an attorney by profession. The New York credit report further informed that Miss VAN SCHAIK had graduated from Vassar College in June of 1933.

It was ascertained on June 19, 1947, that Miss FRANCES L. VAN SCHAIR resided in Apartment 5, 3120 R Street, NW. On June 27, 1947, under appropriate pretext Special agent COURTLAND J. JONES obtained the following description of Miss FRANCES L. VAN SCHAIK residing in Apartment 5:

By letter dated July 2, 1947, the New York Office advised that informant GREGORY recently recalled that she had been slightly acquainted with FRANCES VAN SCHAIK at Vassar College. The informant stated that Miss VAN SCHAIK's home was in Rochester, New York, where the family was rather prominent in business. It was further recalled that she secured employment with MAITER LIPPMAN during the time that MAFY PRICE was in his employ. GREGORY advised that as far as she knows Miss Van SCHAIK was never involved in Communist activities or Russian espionage. In view of this information from the informant, no further investigation was conducted regarding Miss FRANCES L. VAN SCHAIK.



On February 12, 1942, Governor THOMAS E. 




On May 16, 1947, a physical surveillance was conducted by Special Agent % R. CORNELISON and STANLEY BLASIK and H. T. PAYNE. At 12:35 P. H. an individual identified as KING DERR entered Room 2702, Temporary T Building. DERR has previously been identified in this case. At 12:40 P. i. DAVI AHL entered Room 2702, Temporary T Building. At 12:45 P. ii, AHL, DERR, and a firl identified as MARY HEALEY walked out of the building and proceeded to the Occidental Restaurant where they had lunch together. At 2:05 P. H. they departed from the restaurant. DERR caught a Yellow Cab and proceeded to CIG Building, 2210 3 Street, N. ". At that point his name was determined as KING DERR and that he was from Santa Fe, New Mexico, and went in to see a Ir KROWE. At 3:10 DERR departed from CIG and proceeded on foot to the new State Department Building where he entered the office of Assistant Secretary of State RENTON. At 4:20 P. II, DERR departed from the State Department Building and proceeded on foot to Temporary T Building, Fourteenth and Constitution Avenue, and entered the office of \$2707 where he as observed in conversation with MARY HEALEY. 



The indices of the Philadelphia Field Office reflect that EDWARD ISREL ZIETZEW, 2918 West Arizona Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, is a member of the JOHN PARKS Communist Club, and subscriber to the DAILY WORKER and Financial Secretary of the International Workers' Order Lodge. A security index card is presently maintained on EDWARD ISREL ZIETZEW. His file does not reveal whether he is related to MORRIS ZIETZEV

The residence at 1623 Pine Street is a boarding house in which the following individuals, in addition to MORRIS ZIETZEV, reside:

Mrs. ALNEDY KIKER; LIBEY/BETTA; JACK and FRANK OSISEK; DAVID LIVINSON.

The indices of the Philadelphia Office were checked with negative results regarding all of the above individuals except DAVID LIVINSON. DAVID LIVINSON was born in Odessa, Russia, July 31, 1883. He has been a resident of Pennsylvania since 1893, and was naturalize d in Philadelphia on April 23, 1908. He was admitted to practice as an attorney in Philadelphia on November 29, 1994, and is a nationally known Civil Rights Congress Attorney. He is active in Communist Party affairs and represented the Communist Party and its members in the courts of Philadelphia. In this connection, he has in some instances been associated with SAUL C. WALDBAUM and HARRENIEVITAN, attorney, who are members in the Communist Party in Philadelphia. In addition LIVINSON is active in the United People's Action Committee, a Communist dominated negro rights group.

In June, 1946, IIVINSON attempted to intercede as defense counsel at the arraignment of a colored youngster accused of murdering a white student. As a result, he received threats, a series of telephone calls, and a letter signed "KKK". He was promised police protection, and when interviewed by reporters stated in part, "From my earliest days as a member of the bar, I have acted as voluntary counsel for men charged with serious offenses and without means to engage a lawyer. During this time I have defended the underdog, regardless of race or class. I am content to defend people whose economic, political, or religious rights or violated. We don't want Government by the KKK. We will keep democracy and constitutional rights".

A security index card is also maintained on LIVINSON.

There was no record of MORRIS ZIETZEV at the draft board covering his residence address. A description of MORRIS DAVID ZIETZEV as obtained from his alien enemy registration form is as follows:







