"Miss ETHEL RUSSELL, Clerk of Derivatives, United States District Court, Boston, was furnished with Certificate of Citizenship #4675690 issued to JENNIE GOLDBERG June 12, 1939, which had been obtained from the United States District Court records. She stated that according to her records, JUDITH GOLDBERG, her daughter, had never applied for a Certificate of Derivative Citizenship. However, she said that under the Act of 1934, which was in effect at the time JUDITH GOLDBERG arrived, a minor child derived citizenship through the naturalization of only one parent, if such child had five years' residence in the United States before reaching the age of 21 and had entered the country legally.

"A teletype received from the Philadelphia Field Division dated March 21, 1946, reflects JUDITH GOLDBERG had Visa #2046164. On the basis of this, Miss RUSSELL declared that there appeared to be no abubt that JUDITH GOLDBERG was entitled to make application for derivative citizenship. However, in the absence of such certificate, she had no evidence of American citizenship.

"Under date of March 19, 1946, a teletype was forwarded to the New York Field Division by the Boston Field Division requesting investigation, as no marriage record for JUDITH GOLDBERG and ARTHUR ALLEN GOLDBTEIN could be located at the State Bureau of Vital Statistics, State House, Boston. It was ascertained at the Voters' Registration Office, Town of Brookline, that JENNIE GOLDBERG had advised the Registrar of Voters in Brookline that she had been residing at New York Jity since February, 1944, and furnished a forwarding address in care of BENENSON, 885 West End Avenue, New York City, and also advised that she was working for the United States Government. The Manhattan Telephone Directory reflects a Mrs. JENNIE GOLDBERG, 574 West End Avenue.


On April 11, 1946 GRUGG was surveilled by Special agent JLROID ...



It was noted the above described checks were cashed at the Frince Georges Bank and Trust Company and bore the initial of Treasurer J. ROBERT SHERWOOD. Upon contact, Mr. SHERWOOD was unable to recall the reason that he o.k.'d these checks for cashing since he could not recall the payee.

Through inquiries launched by Vice President BOWIE, it was subsequently determined that MILTON J. LLPERN and his wife ELSIE LLPERN, who reside at 7309 Glenside Drive, Takoma Park, Maryland, formerly had an FHA loan on their home which was collected through the Prince Georges Bank and Trust Company.

Mr. BOWIE was able to locate an old file which upon examination failed to disclose any information of significance save the fact that the account at that time, having a balance owing of \$5,694.01, was paid in full by one check on January 30, 1946.

This check was subsequently located in the recordak film for the period January 28 to 30, 1946, and upon examination was found to bear no number, dated January 30, 1946, drawn upon the account of MILTON J. HALFERN at the Citizens Bank of Takoma Park, Maryland, 65-287, to the order of the Prince Georges Bank and Trust Company, in the amount of \$5,694.01 for "FHA Loan in Full." This check was certified by the payer bank on January 30, 1946.

The foregoing transactions were the only records located on HAL-PERN in the Prince Georges County Bank and Trust Company, Heattsville, Maryland.

By way of background as to HALPERN, the couple have resided six years at the Takoma Park, Maryland, address. He is in the refrigeration business and the couple formerly lived at 652b Luzon Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. This is a summary of the information in the files of the Prince Georges Credit Bureau, Hyattsville, Maryland.



The report of Special Agent FLOYD L. JONES dated January 11, 1946, at Washington, D. She is the daughter of ADAL B. and ESTELLE WINTER of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. NAN HUNTER graduated from the Central High School, Oklahoma City, on Way 20, 1929, and obtained a B. A. degree at Oklahoma University of Norman on June 5, 1935. She married THEODORE HALFERIN, brother of MAURICE HALFERIN, on April 6, 1933, in Taloga, Oklahoma. Information on file in the Oklahoma City Field Office indicates NAN HALPERIN, subsequent to her marriage, was active in Communist Party front organizations in Boston, Massachusetts. She visited her mother lirs. A. B. WINTER of Oklahoma City for approximately one month during December, 1945, and then returned to New York City. No communistic activity on the part of NAN HALPERIN was developed during her current visit to Oklahoma.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent LAMSERT G. ZANDER in instant case dated April 15, 1946, at Washington, D. C., wherein data is set out concerning a physical surveillance conducted in the neighborhood of HALPERIN's residence, 9956 Georgia Avenue, Silver Spring, Maryland, on March 31, 1946. It is noted on the occasion of this surveillance an automobile bearing 1945 Pennsylvania license tags 82-426 was parked alongside HALFERIN's residence.

By letter of April 4, 1946, in instant matter, the Fhiladelphia Field Office supplied the following information concerning the owner of the above car.

Attention is invited to previous reports in this case wherein an unidentified woman named DENZIL and a man thought to be Dr. WILLIAM THEREN have been in contact with the HALFERING. These individuals have been identified as Dr. C. WARREN THORNTHWAITE, a geographer, and his wife DENZIL. This couple resides at 4708 Calvert Road, College Fark, Maryland. THORNTHWAITE is a member of the Cosmos Club of Washington, D. C., and is believed to be employed by the Department of Agriculture.

There is being set out below a summarization of the information of supplied by during the period April 1 to 15, 1946, inclusive.

On April 1, 1946, JENNIE MHLER, wife of subject MILLER, of this case, invited the HLLFERINS to dinner at 7:30 p.m., on Friday night. She stated this will be a birthday party for ROBERT MILLER.

On April 2, 1946, BOB ROGERS (MARTIM ROBERT ROGERS) of the ARI Section, State Department, which office formerly employed MAURICE HAPPETN, conferred with HALFERIM. They discussed TERRY SOR.CCO and her new position with CHARLES FLATO of P. R. Associates, Inc. According to informant, FLATO asked some odd questions concerning SCRACCO which questions ROGERS and HALFERIM agree were a sort of inverted security program inasmuch as SCRACCO has to deal with secretaries of senators and congressmen. In other words, FLATO wanted to be certain SCRACCO does not have the wrong kind of friends. In this connection it was stated SCRACCO met with the secretaries of Senator PEPFER and Schator WERLY on the prayious day.

MALPERIM then conferred with MCODROW BORLH whereupon BORLH stated he is writing to ERNEST EMPLIFICATION consequently suggested MALFERIM drop him a prospectus in the mail. FORAH also advised that IRVI G SCIPLIN'S wife HANDER COLDIAN expects to be let out of her job in the near future and suggested MALFERIM attempt to arrange for her to obtain a F-3 job with

Later in the day TERRY SOR.COO discussed her new position with FLURICE HILFERIN stating the "F. R." of F. R. Associates stands for "Fublic Relations." She advised she likes her new work very much.

TERRY SORACCO also conferred with MAURICE MALPERIN on April L, 1946, at which time HALPERIN remarked he and WOODROW BOPAH had had a mosting on the previous night. SORACCO remarked "DAVE said he had investigated

the investigations that were going on, and they didn't know what they were doing. He said there was nothing to it at all. She also advised BOB ROCERS will get in touch with her that night from New York City and wanted to know if there is anything that FALFERIN wants to tell him.

17AURICE HALPERIN also conferred with PHILIP NUMATIAY on April 4, 1946, concerning various social matters.

On April 5, 1946, VOODROW BORAH inquired of MAURICE HALFERIN as to what ratings he should give various individuals in connection with their efficiency reports. The names of SUSILITO (phonetic), HARRIED HAD, FRITZ ERSTEIN, and ALEXANDER LESSER were mentioned. They also discussed the action of the House Appropriations Committee in cutting out the entire Office of Research and Intelligence (State Department) estimate. HALFERIN suggested PORAH have lunch with the Discussion of American Republics Analysis and Liaison, as this section has some vacancies to fill.

Subsequent to the foregoing, HALFERIN attempted to contact STER-MAN MENT of the Office of Research and Intelligence of the State Department. HALFERIN also Anterred with CHARLES FLATO in an endeavor to reach TERRY SORACCO.

Additional information supplied by informant on April 5, 1966, indicates PAURICE HALFERIN attempted to reach GEORGE L. FRIL of the Department of Commerce, extension 7L2.

SHERIAN KENT of the Division of International and Functional Intelligence, Department of State, contacted NAURICE WALFERIN on April 5, 1926, at which tire he stated things are pretty tense as they are having an internal scrap. He stated, however, things seem more hopeful inasmuch as they have—enlisted some pretty powerful internal allies. MAURICE HALFERIN and JOODRON BORAH agreed to meet at 12:15 p.m. on April 10, 1946, for lunch. This invitation was also extended to BOE ROGERS who declined due to a previous commitment.

On April 11, 1946, MAURICE HALPERIN informed WOODROW BORAH he received a letter from CHEY (phonetic) of the University of California. MORLEY advised he does not believe a full professorship will be available at his university in the predictable future. However, ECRLEY stated it is a secret but there will be an opening at Stanford University soon inasmuch as ESFIMOSA, the head of the Spanish Department, is retiring. BORAH remarked his departure will be a great cleaning there. HALPERIN advised University. Consequently, HALPERIN believes he will write to the president of the school.

MALFERIN remarked, "If we can get a footing at Stanford, then we can start work." BORAH replied, "Well, you can start working other things; the state university would be your meat." BORAH then explained that POFE (possibly KENDAID FOFE of the State Department) maintains there are too many people on sick leave in the ARI section of the State Department. In culty arose when ELINOR IOIS GROVE of the ARI section was told she will have DEUTSCH had been carried on the rolls as long as she has and had not been asked to resign. BORAH further related ALFRED McCORNACK's people are gradually leaving the State Department.

Subsequent to the foregoing, MODROW BOE. Hagain conformed with MAURICE HALFERIN. BORAH stated SOB ROOT File sick in bed and consequently

they will not be able to visit HALPERIN on the afternoon of April 11, 1944. Informant's information indicated WOODROV BORAH's wife is nicknamed ISARI. BORAH also advised a friend of his who has taught at Stanford University for three years is coming to Washington on Tuesday at which time halperin will be able to obtain some information concerning the possibility of obtaining employment at that school.

HALFERIN also conferred with LITW RVAN on April 11; 19/19, regarding the possibility of obtaining a professorship at Stanford University. RYAN suggested HALFERIN write to Professor WILLIAM SOPKINS of the economic department, Stanford University, as this individual is a very good friend of his. RYAN stated he also has another good friend at Stanford, namely: JOHN C. ALLYACK (phonetic), but he does not think he would be reliable. FYAN mentioned he and HOPKINS have been acquainted for over twenty years.

A short time later HALFERIN attempted to reach BOB HICHARDSON who is employed in the same office as LYM RYLN. BOB ROGERS also conferred with EXPERIN at which time HALFERIN told him about RYLN's suggestions with reference to Stanford University.

Additional information developed on April 11, 1916, indicates BOB RICHLEDSON, employed in the same office as LYNY RYLM, contacted ELEFERIV. According to informant, RICHLEDSON will apparently be transferred to some naval base this fall. Further conversation was entered into regarding Stanford University, and RICHLEDSON agreed to visit ELEFERIV in the near

PERIY on april 11, 1946, with reference to the "screening board" of the State Department. Upon learning MALFERIN had never heard of this board, FORREST related he has a friend who came from Norman, Oklahoma, after MALFERIN had left and who has been in the Navy as a lieutenant commander. LESSER advised he is morried about a memorandum which he prepared about a week before H-LFERIT left the State Department. This memorandum concerned a Mr. CARRIGAN (possibly JOHN W. CARRIGAN) Gall, Hexican Affairs, State Department), and he does not want it to get



around. HALPHEIN related he recalls tearing up this memorandum when he was preparing to leave the State Department. HALPERIN inquired how IRVIIG GOLDIAN was getting along stating he is doing some telephonic research for IRVING's wife (HANNAH) and wants to tell him about it.

Shortly subsequent to the above, HALFERIN conferred with IRVING GOLDMAN, 138 Wayne Place, S. E., telephone Lincoln 3640. BAUM CARDNER inquired concerning the meeting whereupon she advised SHERMAN KENT made a speech wherein he advised the Office of Research and Intelligence isn't as weak as "we think."

Later in the day BOB ROGERS conferred with an unidentified woman connected with Civil Service Commission concerning the carrying over of sick leave from one branch of the service to another. ROGERS was advised there is no definite decision available as the entire matter is up to the comptroller general.

On April 12, 1916, Mrs. HALFERIN invited the PUNATAYS (THILIF and LILLIAH) over to dinner. Mrs. HALFERIN advised that the BROOKS, HOT ROCERS, and the two TERRYS (TERRY SORACCO and TERRY BORAH) will be there.

BORAH replied in the negative and stated he is going up to Princeton University in several weeks and talk to JOE STRAYER about the possibility of obtaining a position there.

BOB ROCERS conferred with MAURICE HALFERIN on April 15, 1946, to advise him his (ROCERS') leave situation has now been straightaned out. ROCERS stated he is leaving for New York City.

The following information was furnished by confidential informant during the period April 1 to 15, 1946.

On April 1, 1946, NELL SUPPERSCALE (phonetic) invited the HISSES to dinner on April 2, 1946. Mrs. HISS advised she had been forced to refuse invitations as she could not secure a person to sit with the children.

Subsequently on April 2, 1946, Mrs. HISS recontacted NELL SUPER-SCALE to advise she had secured a sitter for the children but as her son had been exposed to German measles, she was limited in her ability to get about. However, they planned on dinner at the SUMERSCALE house the following Saturday night. This engagement subsequently was cancelled by JOHM ST ERSCALE on April 4, 1946, Tho advised "a man from Wilmington" was coming down to entertain them.

On April 1, 1946, a woman known to informant only as FLGG. SSELI (phonetic) contacted Mrs. HISS at which time Mrs. HISS advised she had her son TOPY had tea the previous week "at the TESSONS!," and that TOPT was exposed to the measles.

On April 4, 1946, MARY EDM. Senfidential informant has furnished the following information pertaining to MARY JANE KEENEY during the period of instant report.

On April 1, 1916, MARY JAME KEENEY contacted HELEN SILVERWASTER and said she MARY JAME planned on having a "gathering of the clan" soon and asked if HELEN would be free on the following Saturday night. MARY JAME also stated she would bake a tomale pie for LUD ULLMAN and she would contact HELEN SILVERWASTER at a later date to determine if they could meet on Saturday.

On April 3, 1946, the same confidential informant advised that MARY JAME RELIEF again contacted HELEN SILVERMASTER and they decided to have

the get-together on Sunday, April 7, 1946. MARY JAME said there might be four other individuals invited to the party, two of whom WELEN knew.

has advised on April 11, 1916, EMILY SHARFMAN contacted ERNA ROSENBERG and they discussed the party that ERNA ROSENBERG gave on Saturday, April 13, 1946. After a brief walk, the Major was observed to enter the apartment building located at 215 B Street, N. E. It is believed this French poodle dog is the property of MARY JAME KEENEY.

At 7:40 p.m., N.THAN GRECORY SILVERMASTER, his wife, and SILLIAM LUDITG UILWANN were observed driving up in front of 215 B Street, N. E., and entering the building. ULLWANN was operating the vehicle. Inasmuch as the Congressional apartments located at 215 B Street contain numerous apartments, the agents were unable to ascertain the identity of any other visitors, if any, to M.RY JAME KERIEM's apartment.

On April 13, 1946, Special Agents GEORGE G. NorEMMA and COMMIT. D J. JOHAS conducted a surveillance on the home of ALLAM R. ROSENYERS, 1955 Brooks Lane, Brookmont, Washington, D. C. The surveillance was instituted at 9 p.m., and MARY JAME KEENEY's car, a De Soto, bearing D. C. dicense 128-879, was observed parked in front of the ROSENEYEG home.

At 12:50 a.m., April 14, 1946, the surveilling agents observed MARY JINE KEENEY's car with five occupants drive away from the ZOSEUPENG presidence and proceed to MacArthur Boulavard and V Street, N.Z. It this time MIRY JINE KEENEY, a U.S. Army Hajor, and a civilian man and two unidentified women, one of them carrying a baby believed to the an infant, entered the apartment building at Lôth MacArthur Boulevard. 
On the evening of April 13, 1946, as a result of information being received from a confidential source that a party was being given that evening in honor of SOL LISCHINSKY at 3818 W Street, S. E., by Mr. and Mrs. JOED CORDON, a physical surveillance was conducted by Special Agent FREDERICK H. GREEN at the residence located at 3818 W Street, S. E. This residence was ascertained to be a two-family duplex apartment divided into Apartments A and B. Apartment B is occupied by the GORDONS.

At about 7:15 P.M., it was observed that SOL and MELVA LISCHINSKY were dining with another man and woman in thisapartment. Shortly after this, all blinds in the apartment were adjusted so that nothing therein could be seen from the outside. Shortly thereafter a man and woman arrived in a dark Dodge Sedan bearing Virginia license 119-240. The man was more than six feet tall, weighed about 225 pounds and was very large about the middle. It is believed that this couple were the MAGDOFFS, inasmuch as the woman called the man "HARRY", and it was noted her voice was very similar to that of BEATTIE MAGDOFF's, such voice being familiar to the surveilling Agent. The MAGDOFFS arrived about 8:55 P.M.

The last guests arrived at 10:50 P.M. in a Ford V-8 Coupe with 1945 California license plates 82A661. These guests were a man and woman, whose description could not be obtained because of darkness. Other guests noted arriving were four men and a woman in a black sedan bearing 1946 Illinois tags 923-534. The driver was a man about 5' 5" in height, wore no hat, had dark kinky hair and wore glasses. About this same time, another couple arrived but because of darkness where they parked and efforts to identify the other group at the same time, it is believed they arrived in a dark sedan with D. C. tags 126-966. This man and woman were both under 5'6" in height, of slight build; the man was hatless and wore a gray tweed suit.

During the evening another group of three men and one woman came to the party on foot, apparently having come by bus as they approached from that direction and there was no indication of parking. Two of the men wore





khaki uniforms, apparently Army officers, Red Cross or similar uniforms. The civilian was about 5' 10" in height, slender and wore a light brown trench coat and a light brown porkpie hat. No further arrivals having been noted, the surveillance was discontinued at 11:30 P.M.

According to a confidential source, it was learned that REATTIE MAGDOFF had contacted MELVA LISCHINSKY and advised that she, MELVA, plans to take the children to Clear Lake, Canada, in the Canadian National Park during the months of July and August.

Informants of the Washington Field Office have failed to furnish any further information regarding the activities of SOLOMON LISCHINSKY between April 1 and April 15, 1946.

BEATTIE MACDOFF contacted LILLIE NEISON to say that she had overslept and would not be down town for at least an hour. She later contacted JOE NEISON to say that she would be over in a few minutes.

"MAMA" MAGDOFF, New York Jity, contacted BEATTIE MAGDOFF who said that HARRY and FREDDIE would be up on Wednesday. HARRY had to deliver an address in New York Jity on Wednesday night. BEATTIE advised "MAMA" that HARRY changed jobs and is now in the Secretary's office. BEATTIE was told that SAMMIE, HARRY's brother, a United States Army captain, hopes to be discharged in about three months.

The MUNSEY TRUST. JOMPANY asked HARRY MAGDOFF if he had issued a check for \$5.00 to a book company on which the signature was printed and if so did he want the company to cash it. HARRY said that he did.

LEONARD NEERENBERG advised HARRY MAGDOFF that PEGGY was feeling pretty good. LEONARD declined HAFRY'S invitation for lunch tomorrow for he was going to VAN'S (ALFRED J. VAN TASSELL?). LEONARD and HARRY MAGDOFF discussed the speech of WINSTON CHURCHILL on March 15th. HAPRY was of the opinion that CHURCHILL was trying to formulate policy; that he was trying to develop a sentiment in this country; that his first speech backfired considerably, but CHURCHILL still has his influence. LEONARD was of the opinion that CHURCHILL still has his influence. LEONARD was appealing to the Russian people over the head of their own government. LEONARD believed that Governor DEWEY of New York thought CHURCHILL was OK and HARRY agreed. Alexandria. HEATTIE is not feeling well and will not attend. LUTH asked if BEATTIE was going to attend the meeting of the Beverly Hills Group of the League tomorrow. BEATTIE is not for she is going to the abuntown Alexandria Group meeting. BEATTIE mentioned that CATHERINE TONE'S brother-in-law, DONALD STONE, who just came back from London, was going to address the Beverly Hills Group tomorrow.

FD FITZGERALD asked BEATTIE MAGDOFF, "Why is he picking on that poor old OPA economist, HARON: WEIN?" BEATTIE remarked, "Yes, it made a perfect jackass of the secretary because he quoted what he said on this and that date." HARNY MAGDOFF advised ED that "REID was in an awful funk about it. 

His talk was presented so well that the audience felt as if they had actually attended the United Nations Conference. Formerly MARKS had been associated with the Associated Gas and Electrical Corporation, Trustees, at 21 West Street, New York City, as one of their attorneys for a maar. During the conversation, JOE inquired as to how MILLER was getting along in his new residence, referring to MTLIER's transfer to the German Embassy detail in the State Department. BOB replied that he was performing his duties, which did not amount to very much. JOE mentioned to MILLER that he could not sell MILLER's story in that case, and he added that he did not give anyone information now without getting paid for it. JOE said that he had seen DAN ALLIAMS, an old United Press Man, who was formerly editor on the World Telegram, and that he was now working for the Post. He also added that DAN is a friend of GEORGE BLACKSTONE. GREGG advised MILLER that DAN wanted him, CREGG, to give him some stories which were a couple months old, but GREGG told DAN ALLIAMS that stories that are old are worth money. GREGG and MILLER discussed an article which was published in the Star about the abolishing of the OI/A. During the conversation, BOB stated that there were about four hundred people left of this outfit, and that HOLLAND had gotten himself appointed as an assistant. GREGG stated that there would be about six people left over from the Economic Research, including Mr. ROLAND, and added that DEAL _ had left in January to go with the Treasury Department, and that BERNIE BELL was with MARING in the Export-Import Bank and that BERNIE BELL has a most interesting job. GREGG added that BELL was undecided for about two weeks as to whether to take the Export-Import job or whether to go with BRICKEL.

On April 13, VICTOL ERIO contacted the MILLER residence, and left word with Mrs. BRINKERHOFF to have her husband contact him regarding a tennis engagement.

The same date, an unidentified man contacted JENNIE MILIER and advised her that he had arrived in town the day before and asked her if her husband, MOBERT, knows _____ and then stated, "We had better not discuss it."

The following information was obtained from Confidential Informant for the period of April 1 to April 15, 1946 inclusive.

ESTHER QBER), contacted JOAN REDLIONT saying that she might not be able to attend the meeting. On April 2, 1946, JERTY ASK/JIH contacted BERNARD REDMONT and stated that she was leaving on the sleeper for New York City and wanted to tell REDMONT goodbye.

On April 3, 1946, PEGGY (possibly identical with PEGGY HOBBS), contacted JOAN REDMONT and asked when BERNARD was leaving. PEGGY mentioned that she had a nice time the other night. JOAN agreed that it was probably the best get-together they had had. On April 3, 1946, RICHARD PRP from New York contacted JOAN REDMONT and stated that he is lining up a job with Collier's Magazine but hasn't heard anything definite on it yet. He wanted BERNARD REDMONT to write him a letter to the effect that he had received an excellent efficiency rating inasmuch as he is up for an in-grade promotion. He stated that the office has no record of it. JOAN REDMONT told BARR that she expected to be in New York in a month or two and BARR asked her to look him up stating that he is living at 27 Park Lyenue. (RICHARD BARR is employed in the State Department Division of Inter-American Affairs in New York City.)

On April 4, 1946, JOAN REDHONT told DUIGHT & MALLON that HERMARD REDIDNT would take an early morning plane the following day or possibly a late plane the following night for Miami. Subsequently JOIN REDIGNT contacted HELEN SCOTT and asked her if her friend JERRY LSKLITH had called her and they discussed the party held the previous night at HELEN's house. On April 4, 1946, MILLIE ROTHENBERG contacted JOAN REDMONT and they discussed the cocktail party at HELEN SCOTT's house the previous night. It was mentioned that several people got drunk. There was some talk about the "wild guy" and it was mentioned that BERMARD REDNONT and SANDERSUR had to take him home and put him in bed. It was also mentioned that JERRY ASKATH got drunk and made a speech about the "Atomic World We are Living In". It was also mentioned that later SAM and DIXIE RAFSUR had gone to dinner with BERMAPD and JOAN REDLONT and RUTH and JOHN CLVER. JOAN asked HILLE about the "Conference" (possibly the Mn-The-Place Conference) and was told that some of the delegates would stay at LTLLE's house. On April 4, 1946, BERNARD REDMONT told JOAN that he had just gotten through at the Press Club and that he had received a lot of letters that day. He mentioned some from BOS SRENNING (PH) and also from DUNCAN AIKMIN. He said that he would send a cable to Rio to CONNIE for

reservations at a hotel there and mentioned that he would leave the following morning if he could obtain plane reservations. Later DON ROTHELBERG contacted JOAN REDWONT who told him that she had gotten flowers for SHIRLET TLIENBOGEN. She asked DON what his plans were for the weekend as far as the Peace Conference was concerned. DON said that they start tomorrow night and go right on through. JOAN mentioned that RUTH (possibly RUTH OLVER) was taking in one member. DON said that he would talk to TLELNOR DRIESEN who has been working with BBOT (PH). DON said that he had met RHETT SCOBEY at the meeting the night before who is now with OPA having just gotten but of the Service. DON mentioned that there is only one Veterans' organization at present in Washington which is active and that it was prohibited from participating in politics. However, he was going to work on that. JOAN mentioned that she had been doing some organizing herself along the nursery line and stated that she wished she could be more active. CLRD WASFIELD contacted BERMIRD REDUNNT on April 4, 1946, to wish him goodbye. RADIONT said that he had a reservation for 10 P. M. the following night but desired to leave earlier. CARL stated that JOHN (last name not given) received his notice at the office -- seemed someone had discovered he was with the Secret Service in 1916. He also mentioned that he knew LIX REUTHER. REDIDNT stated that he may be in the Argentine for two years but may come back in seven or eight conths to talk things over.

On april 5, 1946, RICHARD BARR contacted JOAN REDMONT and asked to speak to BERNIE. She told him that BERNIE did not have time to talk inasmuch as he had to get to the airport to take the 10:45 a.M. Eastern airlines plane to Miami. She told DICK she would see him in New York later. Later on april 5, 1946, JOHN OLVER contacted JOAN who told him that BERNIE's car is now parked on Nichols avenue beyond Portland Street and that the License Number is 66177. She mentioned that the Registration Card was in the car. (OLVER purchased REDMONT's car when he departed) On April 5, 1946, JOAN REDMONT contacted TILLIAM L. CLARK saying that BERNARD asked her to say goodbye for him. JOM said that she planned to go to the Argentine as soon as space became available and wanted to leave anyway within two months. CLIRK told her that she and BERNIE have a wonderful opportunity and he is pleased with the way things are going. JOLN said that the publicity in Time Magazine was good and CLARK agreed and said that the material on the back page of Republic was good and will be in Newsweek next week. JOAN told him that BERMARD would get in touch with him. (The WILLIAM L. CLARK above is possibly identical with WILLIAM F. CLIRK who was formerly Executive Director of the Guidance and Reference Division, Office of Inter-Larican Affairs.) On the evening of April 5, 1946, JOAN REDIDNT contacted her sister from New York saying that REDMONT had left on the 10:44 AM plane, and that they had sold their car to RUTH and JOHN OLVER. She said that she was going to write to the State Department and get them to hurry up her passport and that her arrival in New York will depend on when her visas go through. She added that she will come up there at BERNIE's office expense and can stay at a hotel if she so desires.

On April 6, 1946, BERNARD REDNONT contacted JOAN REDNONT saying that he was staying at the Columbus Hotel in Miami, Florida, and that he had run

into FREDDIE CONEL who used to be a State Department "Greeter" and a correspondent in the Office of Inter-American Affairs in Miami but is losing his job and has just set up a Travel Service in the Arcade of the Columbus Hotel.

On April 7, 1946, JOAN REDMONT'S Mother from New York City told her that she would arrive in Washington the following Wednesday and that she would stay with JOAN all of the following week except on Thursday night when JOAN is having forty women to her house for a meeting. On April 7, 1946, JOAN REDMONT asked DON ROTHENBERG about the Conference and was told it was successful and that PEPPER had made a good speech. He said that it was being organized on a permanent basis and that they were going to hold conferences organized on a permanent basis and that they were going to hold conferences throughout the country on a state and city basis. DON said that Representative HUGH DELACEY (Washington) had made a good speech and mentioned that DICKY HURSCHKOFF (PH) an old classmate of his was there. He also mentioned that a lot of A.V.C. fellows were there and he is going to put a little life into a lot of A.V.C. fellows were there and he is going to put a little life into ROTHENBERG asked JOAN for HELEN SCOTT's telephone number which is HO 5600, Extension 709.

On april 8, 1946, JOAN REDMONT contacted HELEN SCOTT saying that she wanted to send a note to the "Teletypes" (PH). On april 9, 1946, JOAN REDMONT told DON ROTHENBERG that she has a big meeting Thursday night—a Nursery School Meeting. DON said that he had an important meeting Friday night, "Ta'ing up something I've been working on for two months; election of a new chairman, and one vote is going to be crucial, between one of these State Department characters and one who is in there to really get some progressive legislation. DON mentioned a Lieutenant IRVING SIKOFF (PH) who helped DON out when he first was in the army on a Horale Program that DON had started. He mentioned that SIKOFF is from LATRONA, Pennsylvania. On April 9, 1946, RHETT SCOREY (PH) asked JOAN REDMONT if BERNIE had left yet. She told him yes. He asked how to contact her brother DON and was given the telephone number, Executive 3752. She stated that he could be reached at OPA Extension 4455.

On april 10, 1946, JOAN REDNONT told DON ROTHENBERG that she had received a letter from REDNONT who was still at the Pax Hotel in Rio. On april 11, 1946, HELEN SCOTT contacted JOAN REDNONT saying that she had lost her job yesterday with thirty-days notice and is looking for another. JOAN advised her to contact SAM KRIFSUR who might be able to help her. JOAN said that she could tell DIAL HELEN said that that would not be necessary. HELEN said that losing her job was serious since she had no money in the bank. She mentioned that she would like to get into another newsroom. HELEN said that she would call SAM and ask for an engagement for tomorrow. She mentioned that she may go to hear the author of "The Great Conspiracy" which was tomorrow and asked JOAN to go with her. SCOTT mentioned that if she didn't go to the speech, she might invite a Frenchman over — apparently something to do with an attempt to get a job.



On April 11, 1946, JOAN REDLONT contacted an unidentified woman named LILLIAN saying that she was getting ready for tonight and wanted to get the address of the Cellar that LILLIAN had said they could use. The address was given as 809 Mississippi Avenue. Later JOAN REDMONT attempted to contact a Mrs. FRIEDMAN or ESTHER LAWN (PH).

On April 12, 1946, JOAN REDIGIT attempted to contact JERRY ASKATTH but was told that JERRY is still in New York and would return to Washington the following Monday. On April 12, 1946, LILLIA 10 VITZ (PH) contacted JOAN REDMONT regarding Nursery meetings and the organizing of a Nursery School. LILLIAN mentioned that she had been surprised to find so many mothers with their "feet on the ground" and that all were anxious to work for the school. She mentioned some of the women at the previous night's meeting: Irst FILDLEY, Mrs. REVA and JEANNETTE. It was mentioned that the meeting the following Tuesday night would be at Irs. FINDLEY's house next door, 3416 10th Street, S.E., and it was mentioned that Mrs. ORDINN also lives at 3416. LILLIN said that she would contact RUM TRYON (PH) later. JOAN spoke of Track RUSH who is Vice-President of the Executive Committee for the Nursery. It was mentioned that Mirs. RUSH's husband was on the Atomic Bomb Project in Tennessee and that he had been a Professor in Yale University for awhile. It was mentioned that he seemed like a very intelligent man and "they are awfully nice people". On april 12, 1946, Mar POJRDMAN of the League of Momen Voters contacted JOAN and asked her to attend a meeting of the League -- a mass meeting for the following Londay afternoon which would meet in Statuary Hall in the Capitol at 2:30 P.M.. She stated that Mrs. LEON HENDERSON is organizing the different groups of the League and that they are meeting at different parts of town from where they will proceed to the Capitol and would contact various Congressmen. BOARDIAN said that Mrs. IEON HENDERSON has quite a number of other organizations coming in on it.

On April 13, 1946, JOAN REDINOT contacted ITLDRED STRUM ROTHENBERG (her sister-in-law) at FRANK'S Radio Store (PH) to discuss a picnic which they planned for the following day. JOAN suggested LINTER WOOD (PH) and then said that he might not do after all. D. D. ICHT asked her to call him at his office REpublic 5600, Extension 3244.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent Floyd L. Jones dated January 11, 1946, at Washington, D. C, in which the results of a mail-cover indicated that a letter was received bearing the return address of Ill Prospect, Herkimer, New York, by the REDHONTS on December 22, 1945. The Albany Field Division advised by letter dated April 4, 1946, that the address of 111 Prospect Street, Herkimer, New York, probably refers to 111 North Prospect Street, Herkimer, which is the residence of LANSING IN MORSE who is an engineer employed by the Municipal Electric Light Company. It was also determined that an apartment at this residence is rented.

"Inquiry to identify the residents of the apartment which MORSE rents disclosed that at the present time II. and II. F. H. TROMBLY (TROMBLEY) presently decay the apartment at 111 North Prospect Street. TROMBLY recently married BEATRICE SUSVILLE, Deputy County Clerk, Herkimer, New York, and is regarded by informants at Herkimer, New York, as a responsible, patriotic individual.

It should be noted however, that the residents of this apartment have not occupied same for any extended period of time and that during the past two years there have been frequent changes in the occupancy of the apartment. SYLVESTER E. MURPHY was a resident at 111 North Prospect Street during the latter part of 1944 and early 1945 leaving on January 16, 1945, to return to 48 West B aird, Senoca Falls, New York.

Information was provided by Postmaster FRANK FAGAN, Herkimer, New York, to the effect that sometime during 1945, the exact time he did not know, a family named WARD, given name unknown, had occasion to visit the postoffice and came in contact with Mr. FAGAN although Mr. FAGAN had not known of the WARD family prior to that time. WARD was believed to be an employee of one of the Remington plants at Ilian, New York, and advised that he was to rent the apartment at 111 North Prospect Street, Herkimer, New York. There is however, no indication that he was a resident of the apartment and Postmaster FAGAN is of the opinion that WARD later went to Mexico presumably to work for a Remington concern.

It has been determined that BERNARD S. REDNONT and JOAN REDNONT at 3418 10th Street, S. E., have a checking account at the National Metropolitan Bank, 613 15th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. This account was opened originally on October 25, 1944. The following is a summary of activity in that account since that date:

PHYSICAL SURVEILLANCE

The following Physical Surveillance was conducted on BERNARD S. REDMONT by Special Agents Kennerly R. Corbett and Courtland J. Jones.

On April 5 1946, information was received from Confidential that REDIDNT planned to take a 10:45 A.M. plane to Miami, Florida. At 10:25 A.M. REDMONT arrived at the National Airport, Washington, D. C., accompanied by JOIN REDIDNT, his son DEMNIS and an unidentified woman. REDIONT checked in at the Eastern Lirlines Ticket Office and obtained a seat on Flight 3 leaving Washington at 10:45 A.M. It was ascertained that this plane made stops at Rawleigh, N.C., at 12:17 P.M.; Charleston, S.C., at 1:54 P.M.; Jacksonville, Florida, at 3:29 P.M. and arrived in Mami, Florida, at 5:51 P.W. It was also determined that REDIONT was to leave Mami at 4:00 P.M. on April 6, 1946, via Pan-American Airlines, Flight No. 201 enroute to Rio De Janiero where he expected to lay over for a week before continuing to Buenos Aires. It was also determined that REDLONT received Baggage Check Numbers 3820 and 3821 for a large chocolate-colored canvas suitcase and for a large army-type doubled-sided suitcase. The unidentified woman who accompanied the REDMOLTS to the Airport left the Airport by way of taxi, D. C. License 3-28503 at 10:30 A.M. giving her destination as 18th and Pennsylvania Avenue, N. W., which is the address of the section of the State Department in which REDMONT formerly worked. The above information regarding REDMONT's destinations was furnished telephonically to the Bureau by Special Agent Lambert G. Zander. The following information was furnished by Confidential Informant concerning the activities of RENTIG TON from April 1 through April 15, inclusive:

On April 1, 1946, Jane HAMMER contacted DILL INCIDENT and inquired as to his knowledge of books written by PETLA KOROTKIN and FEVERBACH, adding that they were probably on Sociology or Political Science. Subject advised JANE that he had heard of these two authors and JANE requested that BILL recommend something to her in the Economic field in which he advised that LESLEY MITCHELL, who, for many years had been a Dean of American Economists, and who was active in the Association of University Professors, had retired two years ago, but was still alert. He added that MITCHELL had taught a course in the Theory of Economics, and that it is mimeographed, but had never been published, and he advised JANE that he, RETINGTON, had one of the few copies, and that he would bring it to her tomorrow.

On the same date, BILL RIMINGTON contacted PAIN COCHES (CHESTER BOUNES' Office) and discussed the lumber business with him. 

On April 1, 1946 FAIR CLASSER, wife of subject MARCID GLASSER, was in conversation with ERNA RCSENGERS, wife of subject ALLAN RCSENGERS. FAVE told her that she, RUTH and her husband might be going back to Chicago for a visit and might not return. ERNA told FAYE that she was having domestic troubles with her husband and that this time she did not intend to make up with him, she would leave that up to him. She mentioned that ALLAN RCSENGERS was going to sing with the Mational Symphony Orchestra that coming Sunday.

On April 3 FAYE GLASSER again conversed with ERMA ROSENBERG and asked her and her husband to come over on Friday night about 3:00 PM. They accepted this invitation.

On April 4 ERNA ROSENBERG got in touch with INCARUBEISTEIN. ERICA said that she and her husband LOAIS had rented a house for the first at Poughkeeps. York. ERICA said she might work if she could find something to do in toughkeepsie or she might take a couple of courses or become interested in a magro community center or settlement house, or in the American League of Tomen Voters. They discussed a Tomen's Reformatory near Poughkeepsie on the Hudson River where ERICA might do some work. MARSHA said JUDGE believed he would be in New Jersey over the week-end. ERMA said that she would have some more people over in about two weeks from the comming week-end on either a Friday or Saturday night and perhaps MARSHA could come at that time.

On April 9 ERMA ROSENBERG and ELILY SHARFTAN conversed. They discussed ELILY's husband being away. ERMA invited ELILY and her husband, HIRPY (LEONARD RATED SHARTAN) to her party to be held on April 13. ELILY said that they were laving the COLETAN SIEINS on Saturday night for dinner, but since MIPPY's father was to come and the SITHIS (ARTHER LITTIES and wife) that she contemplated having the SITHIES come on Sunday and slu and MIPPY would go to ERMA's party on Saturday night. ELILY said she was thinking of beginning a radio program on child psychology and would get in tower with ED SRICKER (who has been related in provious reports in this case as succeeding in obtaining FM licenses in California.

On this day ERIM ROSENSERG also talked to BEATRICE COPICVITZ, wife of ALLAM ROSENBERG'S Law Associate. ERIM congratualisted her on her wedding anniversary and said she would visit her on Wednesday evening if she could find someone to mind the children.

On this same day ALIAN ROSENBERG told ERMA that EDITES TTH had called and wanted to come and see the baby on the following night. ALIAN did not know how long EDVIN would remain in Washington, D. C. He mentioned that EDVIN SHITH was going to Poland for some export import concern at an annual salary of \$10,000.



ROSEIBERG said that he, ROSEIBERG, had called NIPPY SHARFIAN in Detroit and learned that NIPPY's father wanted to see certain people whom NIPPY was expecting for dinner on Saturday night. ALLAN said he asked EMILY SHARFIAN, HIPPY's wife, who these people were. She told him that they were the MRTHUN SHITHES. ALLAN said that perhaps they could come to the ROSEIBERG party on Saturday night. ERMI said she had not yet heard from DAYM and ELIZABETH SISULY, nor PYTLIP and LILLIAN DUMMNAY, nor HILLIAN SIGNIFICAN (ph).

On April 9 ALLAN ROSENBERG discussed EDITI 3. SHITH'S visit with ERNA ROSENBERG and decided to take him to BEATRICE KOPLOVITZ's and they would also take LESTER LEVIN along. They would go to BEATRICE's at twenty of nine and stay until 10:30 PM. ALLAN ROSENBERG said he would meet LESTER LEVIN on the morrow at 1:15.

LILLIAN DUMANAT discussed the subject of ERMA ROSENBERG's party with LRMA. It was agreed that ALLAM ROSENBERG would pick up LILLIAN and her husband PHILIP at Restrored on Circle about 8:30 PM and take them to the ROSENBERG home. ERMA said that SYLVIA. _____ would get in touch with LILLIAN about this too.

On April 10 ALLAN ROSENBENG told his wife that EDMIN SIGTH would be out at 5:00 Fil for dinner and after dinner he and EDMIN would go to the



Intional Lawyer's Guild meeting. They decided to break the engagement with BEATEACE and BILL REPLOYITE for that evening and make it Thursday or Friday night. There-after ALAN learned that EDIM SMITH could not accept the dinner invitation for the evening but would be out on the following night, April 11.

BETTY told ERM. RCSENBERG that she would attend the party on Seturday evening. ERMA said that DETTY ought to keep in touch with her for she would give a series of parties in order to meet people.

SYLVIA previously mentioned in this report, whose husband's name is CEIE, got in touch with ERMA ROSEIDERG to tell her she could not come to the party because ED BROCKIAN had got into town and the boys were planning a big binge on Saturday. SYLVIA said that AT DEPUSTEIN is back in town and would askend the binge and so would the RHIES (ph). SYLVIA said that ED BROCKIAN was out of the service and married and living in a nice place on Eye Struct, in Georgetown. He would probably go to work for the CPA or for the Labor Department. At the present time he is working for the United Federal Workers and very happy in his job. (SYLVIA's name is thought to be HILLER or HILLER)

An unidentified woman got in touch with ERM to tall her that neither the nor her husband LUCIEN would be able to attend the Saturday night party.

On April 11 ERMA ROSENBERG contacted BEATRICE KCPLOVITZ to tell her that she and ALLAN would be able to visit the KCPLOVITZes that evening and would bring EDILE S. SHITH with them.

ERM. ROSENBERG contacted MILDREL BANN (or RLCCM) and asked her and her husband FRANK to the Saturday night party.



At 12:50 AM a United States Army Major, MARY JAME KEELEY, an unidentified man, and two other woman got into MARY JAME MEDIEY's car, the Desota. MARY JAME KEENEY drove them to MacArthur Boulevard and V Street. Through the cooperation of ______it was learned that on April 14 HILLY SHAPPIAN and ERMA ROSENBERG had a lengthy discussion concerning the party of the preceding night. TRMA said there were about twenty people present at this party. Among them was MARIAN STERBERG, a girl from Roxbury, Massachusetts who had been mewscasts. She was described as a "brassy type of person" who was not too clean physically and who admittedly "did not know from anything". She works in an effice

Regarding HILDRED MORSE, wife of DAVIS MORSE, EILLY said, "She is an interesting person but chec and boring. She is full of her own charm". As MILLY explained it IMRIAN GREENBERG needed to be psycoanalyzed and so did MORSE, however, MILDRED MORSE's husband .DAVID is considered to be a charming person and was probably the outstanding person at the party. During the period from April 1st to April 15th the mail cover claced on the subject was unproductive.

From April 1st through April 15th Confidential Informant Whose identity is known to the Bureau furnished the following information concerning the subject.

On April 1, 1946 an unidentified man contacted DICK SILVERIAN the son of GEORGE SILVERIAN at which time DICK mentioned that he had been reading dynamics and some of John STETART MILLS! Essay on "Liberty".

The also mentioned that he had read two Russian novels, in two days.

On the same date SYLVAN KETT contacted DICK SILVENTAL. DICK mentioned that he had worked on the proxi ity fuse at the Bureau of Standards. SYLVAN said that he was still in the Navy and is studying electronics having just finished the school at the Naval Research Laboratory and he also stated he expected to be going out on the Carrier FRANKLIN D. ROCSEVELT.

On April 3, 1916 an unidentified man contacted GEORGE SILVERIAN and told him that he had just returned from New York and had talked with an un-named individual but believed to be Payor O'D'TYPE for about two hours during which time he gave him a lot of budget "blurp". They made an appointment for lunch the following day.

On April 3, 1946 GEORGE SILVERMAN contacted CHRIS MARKER and told him that he could keep "FITE there until he could see him the following day. They then mentioned the full name of "FITE which was given as DAVID UNITE, telephone # ATLantic 3563. They then discussed having DAVE THITE work for them on a salary basis as he could find a lot of "stuff" for them.

On April 7, 1946 an unidentified woman contacted SATA SILVEPLAM and advised her that she had met WIRTIV FOX, a brother of ABE TOY, and he just returned from the rmy and was now living at the "2400" and is employed by the Farm Credit Administration.

On April 8, 1946 SERN RD BERNSTEIN contacted GEOPGE SILVERVIN at which time they discussed in detail the business enterprise that they are trying to get started and during such conversation they discussed the foreign exchange and the means of financing such enterprise.

ERVIN SHIEFFER was also present at this meeting and BERNSTEIN told SHIEFFER that he had been in contact with BENEDICT ENGLISH at the State Department who told him about the headaches there were and the things that went on among some of the employees in the State Department. According to BERNSTEIN, ENGLISH was sympathetic trying to get an idministrator in his Department and the last time that BERNSTEIN was down he was trying to get in touch with a fellow in charge of the Foreign Service idministration. JOE SOULD who was also scheduled to be a partner in SILVERIAL's firm stated at this meeting that the State Department people were in favor of purchasing it either under private enterprise or having the Export-Import Back handle it.

On April 10, 1966 GEORGE SISSILN contacted GEORGE SILVER AN and told him that he had just gotten back from Europe; however he may stay in the army but if he stayed around until June, 1967 he would have to take a reduction in rank. GUSSILN told SILVERIAN that he had been in France, Germany, and Telgium. SILVERIAN told GUSSILN that if he would come to see him he thought probably he could fix him up with a job.

Confidential Informant furnished the following information concerning SILVERVAN from April 1st to April 15th.

On April 3, 1946 GEORGE SILVERIUM told his wife, SARA that he was armious to make his \$100,000 so that he could retire. He mentioned that ORKFACK had offered him a job for \$20,000 but he did not like the work. He also said that the French could not get him anything now and he west going to push himself. On April 6, 1946 IRVING KAPLAN and DOROTHY KAPLAN spent the evening in STLVER AN's house during which time they played pokur the entire evening.

On April 8, 1946 GTORGE SILVERILE was discussing the international situation with several other unknown individuals during which time one of the unknown individuals objected to the Aussian use of arms in conquest. GEORGE replied that he dislikes the Pritish methods even more and that some of his relatives do not like the Pritish operation in the near East. He said that the Russiand had not claimed any of his relatives and they were in the same area. He also cited figures on how the British were obstructing all exports from Germany contrary to the agreement and that the British were using every device to keep the coal in Germany and that they were using the same method in Greece; holding there army there and carrying out the election which no one wanted. SILVERIAN continued by saying that We keep howling against the Russians. I don't mind it but everytime we do we should howl against the British as well as the Russians.

On April 15, 1946 SILVERIAN advised JOE GOULD that JEAN MONET the French Sup ly Counsel wanted him to write a book on the French need for coal, also wanted to present the French case before the war. SILVERIAN stated that he didn't want to do it.

From .pril lst to .pril 15th no physical surveillance was conducted on SILVER AN.

The following information pertaining to JOSEPH GOULD who was to be a partner of SILVERUAN in the new adventure has been received from the Baltimore Field Division.

His full name is JOSEPH SIDNEY GOULD and until recently he resided at 623 leademy Street, Newark, Deleware and now resides at 24 Kentway Street, Newark, Deleware. 

He was married and working for the Treasury Department as an Administrative Assistant in the Monetary Research Department at a salary of 13800 per year.

The following information was obtained from regarding the activities of NATHAN GREGORY SILVERIASTER from April 1 - 15, 1946.

On April 1, 1946, JENNY TILLER, wife of subject ROBERT MILLER, contacted HELEN SILVERMASTER and extended an invitation to the SILVERMASTERS to attend a birthday dinner for her husband on Friday, April 5, 1946. HELEN accepted on behalf of herself and her husband.

On the same date MRRY JAME KEENEY contacted HELEN SILVER ASTER and indicated she is making plans for a "gathering of the clan" and extended an invitation to the SILVER ASTERS for this gathering on Saturday, April 6, 1946, at her apartment. However, the date at this time was indefinite and subsequent arrangements would be made.

On April 3, 1946, IRRY JATE KEENEY again contacted HELTY SILVER-TASTER and made definite arrangements for a dinner party at her home on the evening of Sunday, April 7, 1946. The SILVERMASTERS accepted on behalf of themselves and LUD ULLIANN.

On April 7, 1946, ROBERT MILLER, a subject in this case, contacted FELEN SILVERMASTER and asked her how he could reach LUD ULLEANN. HELEN inducated LUD was at home but not presently available. HILLER requested RAMEN SILVERMASTER to advise ULL AND he would call upon him shortly.

On April 9, 1946, ELLM BILVERLASTER refused an invitation of a neighbor ILDRED GIFFORD to accompany her to the "Moral Restrument Flay" at George Jashington University. HELEM indicated she did not think much of the moral rearmament movement but explained HEMRY FORD was interested in it and also the President, and that was how she had first met the Fresident.

On April 11, 1946, HELEY SILVEPHASTER advised Mrs. SHAFIRO, a neighbor of hers, she would drive her car in the OFA motorcade to the Capi-

PENFIELD apparently recently became engaged to Mrs. Mac-AVOY's cousin presently unidentified, and she wondered if her cousin ought to have gotten herself engaged to someone who was just remotely liberal. There was some question as to whether FEMFIELD was remotely liberal or was good old solid State Department.

Mrs. MacAVOY indicated they all have a few friends there who are surprisingly so, just quiet and not very outspoken about it, indicating it is more effective that way than if they are noisy and got kicked out.


There is set forth hereafter a summarization of information received from confidential informant between April 1 and 15, 1311.

april 1, 1946

On the afternoon of April 1, 1946, a woman, possibly ANTE ANTE Contacted the Post Office to inquire as to the amount of postage on a letter to England.

On the same date, subject WHITE was contacted by an unidentified man, undoubtedly MENRY MORGANTHAU, Jr., from his voice, modulation, and subject matter involved. This man stated CHIBERT called and apparently had a successful meeting with WHITE's friend who promised to get the matter to the top guy in BYPMES' ----. He stated they did not see ACHESOT but would set him the next day and were also going to set HAMEGAN Monday or Tuesday. The man stated they had asked him not to talk to the fellows in Maw York but have them in readiness because they want HAMEGAN to talk to the boss first. The man stated he seems to be quite optimistic and WHITE indicated that was good.

The man inquired as to whother there had been any reaction on letter as he was kind of curious, possibly referring to the letter NOT wrote criticizing the appointment of NELIS DOUGLAS to the Internati



THITE stated he had not heard any reaction; that he was in the office but busy on other matters. THITE mentioned an editorial in the Tribune which was unfavorable to the letter. The man stated he ran into THITE's French friends on the street, and they indicated they expected to be around a long time at which both laughed, and THITE stated he is afraid they will.

The man inquired as to what happened about the business of the dinner, and THITE stated he told FRANK they had better lay off; that he didn't think it was necessary and too much of a nusiance. The man indicated he asked ANN FELTUS the other day in New York, and she did not seem to know. WHITE stated RANDY FELTUS was going to have a meeting, but he told FRANK he did not think it was worth it, and they dropped the matter. THITE indicated he was going to Georgia but would return Friday, and the man stated he was going to New York but would come back to Washington over the week-end.

April 2, 1946 💢 4

On the afternoon of April 2, 1946, AMME WHITE was contacted by one FRED, probably FRED ZAFF. She inquired if he had a good time in Fhiladelphia, and he stated he may be here until the third week in April, as he is under Army medical observation for stomach trouble.

pril 3, 4, 1946

No information of importance was obtained from informant on April 3 and 4, 1946.

pril 5, 1946 & U

On the morning of April 5, 1926, WHITE contacted his life advising he was at the airport and would be home a little later after stopping by the office. She inquired whether things went successfully and he stated yes.

On the afternoon of this date AMTE WHITE was contacted by one CERTRUDE who has a daughter NANCY. CERTRUDE inquired as to the significance of the name IZVESTIA, and AMME replied it meant "news." GERTRUDY stated she had a letter from MAURICE and BEA (phonetic).

On the evening of April 5, 1946, ANNE WHITE advised an unidentified woman that MARRY had been down south but he had returned now. ANTE mentioned ADT WOLFSON and his wife would arrive Saturday and her daughter RUTH would be down on Friday.

April 6, 1946 & 4

At 1:15 p.m., WHIE was contacted by an unknown man, definitely believed to be HENRY MORGANTRAU, Jr., who furnished WHITE his number as Murray Hill 5-5362. He inquired if DICK GREBERT had talked to WHITE in the last day or two, indicating GILBERT was going to help him with his broadcasts beginning April 10, 1946, but found it involved more work than he expected and had suggested a full time man. The man was contacting WHITE for such a helper who must be a good analyzer, live in Washington where he wants the information, and have contacts. He need not be able to write. The man indicated the broadcasts would be once weekly, fifteen minutes for a period of twenty-six weeks, with no guarantee they would continue. The man inquired if WHITE knew haplan who is on lesve from Ohio State indicating GILBERT had suggested him. WHITE suggested OSCAR CSS, referred to in a previous report of the writer, and who is now working on the Jordan Valley business.

The man mentioned he had noted an article in the New York Times on the previous day stating DOUCLAS had never accepted the position as head of the bank. He also commented V.NSON had never answered his letter which indicates the caller is MORCANTHAU. WHITE commented he had not mentioned the matter to him, and he understood he is mad as hell to which MORCANTHAU commented it did not surprise him. MORCANTHAU commented it had put DOUCLAS in an embarrassing position. He then inquired what LUXFORD (phonetic) is cooking up and asked if he had a good answer for VIESON.

He asked THITE if he had seen the last annual report of the Natual Life Insurance Company of which POVELAS is president, and suggested THITE would find it interesting reading. He stated it was on interest rates and mentioned how ridiculous it is to say low interest rates do not hurt basiness. WHITE stated even if DOUGLAS were acceptable here, other countries who expect to borrow might not like him, and MOFGANTHAU stated FILdid a beautiful joe. THITE stated they had in editorial and he just trought it home to show to his wife. He stated they did a good job.

Shortly thereafter on the same date, RICHARD GILBERT contacted UHITE, and they discussed the above conversation between HORG.WTHAU and WHITE. GILBERT thought \$8,000 would be the right salary for the job in question, but WHITE stated why should a guy leave his job unless he is dissatisfied? GILBERT commented because LORG.WTHAU is interesting, and he had in mind BEP WAPLAN who is a first class guy. GILBERT inquired about LUD ULLIAN, and WHITE stated he is not brilliant but quite able. WHITE also wondered if OSCAR GASS would be interested in it but was not certain whether he and WORG.WTHAU would get along although they could start out together. WHITE mentioned INVINGEREETAN might be interested.

GILBERT stated he had talked with MORGANTHAU about the political situation up there, and he stated he would have nothing to do wit it although GILEERT took that with a grain of salt. He stated he was going up again next week and would raise the question with SIDNEY HILLMAN and ack whether ALP had made any particular commitments. WHITE stated he imagined his views on the subject would be important and asked what was his reluctance, apparently meaning MORGANTHAU. GILBERT stated his wife is not well and opposed, and WHITE commented when it came to a showdown, he would not pay any attention to her, and his action would be based on whether or not he could make it and the possibility that he may have to spend some money. WHITE thought if he was sure of getting it he would spend a substantial sum, but if he felt he would not, his wife would be against it as they are pretty tight. GILBERT stated if SIDNEY was willing to take it on, it seemed almost a sure thing.

GILBERT asked finally whether WHITE knew the name of the director of the bond program in South Carolina who is BARUCH's attorney and something of a power in the state. He stated MORGANTHAU thought he would be ideal being non-Jewish, to use some pressure for this Palestine project. THITE stated he could find out about him on Monday. WHITE inquired about some other matter, and GILBERT stated VINSON was going to St. Louis for a Jackson Day Dinner which HANNEGAN would attend and they were waiting for a call from PRICH. GILBERT stated he arranged for KAUFTAN and PRICH and himself to go down. WHITE stated he saw MONSKI (phonetic) who seemed to be a vigorous and able guy. GILBERT stated if they get any kind of favorable reception from HAMIEGAN, then they till really have to go at it hammer and tongs. He stated ACHESON was, sympathetic but as .HITE suggested, he is a protty slick article.

april 7, 1914 🛭 4

At noon BERNIE, believed to be BERNIE BERNIEIN, endsavored to contact .HITE who was not at home.

In the evening AMIE THITE was contacted by a woman acting for Mrs. HOLLANDS to advise that Reverend HOLLANDS, 1938 New Hampshire Avenue, had died. ANYE extended sympathies. This is a place where one ETHEL used to

April 10, 1944

On the morning of this date APPE WHITE contacted FRANCES EDEL-STEIN who related they have a reactionary group in the school, and they had made nominations and changes in the constitution and she is sorry she had become so involved in it. She stated the teachers were lined up with people who have been in charge for years. ANVE indicated the STALLS (ABE and SARAH) would arrive Sunday night and romain until Vednesday. She also indicated LUTHER would arrive Friday.

april 11, 1946 🖞

On the evening of Agril 11, 1946, WAITE was contacted by one IEL, believed to be IEE PRESSIAN, general counsel, CIO. He stated he had some work to do the following day and suggested THITE go on to New York without him. WHITE advised he did not have a definite place to stay, and LEE stated Ir. MOONAM, general manager, Roosswolt Motel in New York, was a contact and he would call MOCNAN when he arrived and try to accommodate THITE. WHITE inquired if the dinner was a drass affair, and IEE stated only for those seated on the dias.

April 12, 1946

No information of value was furnished by the informant. $Q\mathcal{U}$

April 13, 1946 V

On the evening of April 13, 1946, BERNIGHSTRUSTEIN contacted AN E TITE advising Colonel REPMARD BERNSTEIN had arrived and the train was late. He indicated he and HARFY had been mot by a Treasury Department car.

At 8:35 p.m., HARRY WHITE contacted the Lost and Found Department, Union Depot, to advise he had lost some records, apparently a volume or group of recordings.

Investigation was conducted by Agents J. M. GaPLAID and I. A. TaMLOR and no record could be found indicating the property in quastion or any other property belonging to WHITE had been found on either section of the train on which WHITE arrived. \mathcal{U}

April 14, 1946

On the evening of this date, RANDY FALTUS contacted WHITE who stated he returned from New York about 8 p.m. the previous night as the train was very late. They discussed the Jackson Day dinner as being worthwhile, and the best speech made by CRSO: WELLES. The fact that WALLACE Was

the only cabinet member present was noted. FELTUS mentioned he had attempted to contact MONTEROS (phonetic) but he was not in torm. \swarrow \checkmark

relative stated he had a long talk with VIVSON who mentioned nothing about that matter although he is sure he put the kibosh on it. FELTUS stated VINSON beat around the bush a lot and feels certain VIVSON blames him for MORGANTHAU's blast against LEV NOUGLAS, because he kept referring to this subject very gently. FELTUS stated FALL NELLY had worked on the subject in the beginning and FELTUS actually knew nothing about it until he saw it in the newspaper. WHISE commented that VIVSON is quite disturbed about it, and FELTUS stated he thought VIVSON believed someone put the idea in MORGANTHAU's head.

WHITE stated VINSON was very stubborn about the matter, but VINSON told him the President was the one who was stubborn on the thing. FELTUS remarked VINSON had told him the reasons for appointing DOUGLAS, about wanting to have the security sell and the banks to have confidence in this institution. Also another reason he thought a conservative appointment in that job would make liberal appointments possible at the full employment board, and FELTUS stated that is phony reasoning.

WHITE mentioned LUX had said it was part of a deal but HARRY is sceptical of that, apparently referring to ANSEL F. LUXFORD, assistant to the Secretary of the Treasury. WHITE stated he thought VINSON believed he had some part in MORGANTHAU's blast but he did not. FELTUS remarked he did not think MORGANTHAU's letter would have much effect except that it was in the record and could be pointed to later, and undoubtedly VINSON and MORGANTHAU would be life-long chamics as the result.

TAITE said he was going to try and got away for a moution for a couple of weaks and was going north to look for a summer panel.

or PILLICHODI (phonetic), and HARRY state) he had not. FELIUS said, "To had a strange message Saturday from LOCI CURRIE's secretary the called and said LOCH would be back in the country—apparently he was to arrive yesterday and had told them to tell me to expect a call from a Nr. FILLICEDI." HITE commented it sounded Itslian and might be a follow-up on what he had in mind. FELIUS stated FRAME COE told him LAUCHLIN had been fooling around with some Italian stuff too, and white observed CURRIE had been down there. FELIUS stated he had a long talk with COE who furnished him with the latest developments, particularly the NAME CARDINER business. While stated he talked with PRITCHARD who voluntarily brought up the question of DOUCLAS and said he tried to dissuade VINSON from the DOUCLAS appointment but to ne avail. FELIUS stated he was going to Fer York the next day, and his wife



would come up as soon as he could get accommodations. He stated they had an apartment beginning next week at 70th and Central Park Vest. FHITE mentioned his niece and her husband live in a ground floor apartment at 79th and Central Park Vest and identified them as Dr. INRTIN LAYOH, a psychoanalyst, and his wife ANT WYCH who is the niece of ANTE THITE. According to THITE, Irs. WANGH was a former ballet dancer.

April 15, 1916

On the morning of April 15, 1946, WHITE contacted FERIAN KIOTZ, Westchester Apartments, regarding the matter of an apartment. Apparently the WHITES are still interested in disposing of their home and obtaining an apartment.

Shortly thereafter NHITE contacted his office indicating he would not be down until later. He stated he wanted to talk with DAVI MARR, Hichigan 1865, and thereafter a Ir. THORNICH regarding an apartment in the Westchester Apartments. It is recalled DAVID MARR is well known source of information for columnist DRET PEARSON.

On the same date AN'E WHITE advised FRANCES EDELSTEIN she had some friends who have a summer place on a lake about two hours north of Boston, and she has the use of it in July. She invited FRANCES to come with them. FRANCES stated she would have to bring her two children and would talk it over with her husband. Apparently the clade is at East Jasper, Now Hampshire.

Reference is made to the reference report of the unitar, narrioularly to pages 171-175, reflecting a surveillance of a meeting at the WHITE residence attended by Colonel BERMARD BERMSTERN, OSCAR CASS, HICHARD V. GILBERT, LOUIS H. BEAN, and an unidentified individual in addition to WHITE and his wife. From a review of the Washington Field Office indices, the following is set forth briefly concerning GASS, GILBERT, and SEAN.

The files disclosed on March 13, 1946, a latter was received from the Bureau with enclosure reflecting on February 25, 1946, CSCAP GASS, 2120 16th Street, N. W., business address 1029 Vermont Avenue, M. I., had filed registration statement abstract reflecting agency for the Jewish Agency for Falestine, Jerusalem, Palestine, a public authority recognized by the Palestine Mandate and the laws of Falestine as representative of the Jewish mational interests. He indicated his duties were to advise and consult with his principal on financing activities in the United States, transfel 1. S. aconomic devalogments of feeting principal, and general aconomic policies of principal.

Concerning GILEERT, the records of the Washington 1:11 Collication 1940 a confidential source advised the name of PICLLOD V. GILEERT, 3517 Rodman Street, N. W., appeared on an index card in the index of the Washington Committee for Democratic Action. Also a confidential source advised that the name of RICHARD V. CILBERT (EM A C.) appeared in the indices of the Washington Peace Mobilization. These files also indicate a Match Act investigation was instituted by the Bureau in March, 1942, on the basis of the listing by the House Un-American Affairs Committee of GILBERT as a member of the Washington Committee for Democratic Action.

Investigation in the Fatch Act case disclosed RICHARD VINCENT GHIBERT, then director of Defense Economics, OPA, was born JERACHIEL GOLDBERG. GILBERT had previously worked for the Department of Commerce and the Treasury Department, and at the time of transfer from the Department of Commerce, an investigation was instituted concerning him. In a question-naire undated, GHIBERT indicated he was born September 6, 1902, at Fhiladelphia; that his father GHORGE LLERG GHIBERT, deceased, was born in Lugland and naturalized in Philadelphia, Fernsylvania, and his mother PHANCES GAYLBURD was born in Russia. The investigators ascertained that GHIBERT, was born September 7, 1902, at Deerfield, New Jersey, son of ETER and FEIGS COLDBERG. No record of naturalization of GHIBERT's father could be located although he was interviewed and claimed his father was born in England, and naturalized in 1900. Further check through the assistance of an attorney who was a cousin of GHIBERT disclosed his father was in fact born in Russia instead of England.

The Treasury file further disclosed GILEERT had been known in Philadelphia and at Harvard University under the names RICKAT MINERAL, RICHARD VANCE GAYLEURD, JERACHIEL SOLDEERG, RICHARD WANCE GLUEERI. The Intelligence Unit investigators observed that GILEERT had created an artificial family history which was folse in many particulars.

The files at the Office of Emergency Management contained a letter dated May 5, 1941, from LAUCHLIN SURPIE, administrative assistant to the President, who stated from ten years' acquaintance he had the highest opinion of Mr. GILBERT's character and reputation and in his opinion GILBERT was fit to hold a position with the U. S. Government. Other letters of reference in the file include one from EMILE IESPRES, Federal Reserve Board, presently believed employed by the State Department.

Further contact by agents with the House Un-American Affairs Committee disclosed Mrs. RUTH GILBERT, wife of GILBERT's brother MITCH GILBERT, was listed as a member of the Washington Committee for Democratic Action; further that ANNA and MATRAL YUSEM, 1222 Farkside Avenue, Philadelphia, Fennsylvania, sister and brother-in-law of GILBERT, were signers of the 1910

Communist Party petition in the state of Ponnsylvania. The Washington Field Office files also reflect a confidential source advised Mrs. BUTH GILBERT was listed in the active indices of the American Peoples Mobilization, previously known as American Peace Mobilization before the invasion of Russia.

The records of the Washington Field Office also reflect in Formary, 19hh, EFFA GILBERT, 2220 North Quantico Street, Arlington, Virginia, wife of GILBERT, was listed as a member of the Washington Bookshop. During investigation at Harvard University, a confidential informant.

With reference to EEAN, the Unshington Field Office files reflect a Hatch Act investigation in 1942 concerning LOUIS HYLAN EST, then economist, Bureau of Agricultural Economics, Department of Agriculture. This investigation was predicated upon a report of the House Un-American Affairs Committee to the effect that LOUIS HYLAN BEAN and his wife were members of the Washington Committee for Democratic Action. A confidential source of information advised at that time EBANUS name did not appear on the active indices but the name of his wife did so appear.

A confidential source of information about that time also advised the name of L. A. SEAN and Mrs. L. H. The appeared in the indices of the Washington Chapter of the American Peace Mobilization, the address of SEAN appearing as 2271 North Upton, Arlington, Virginia. Both of the above organizations were known front organizations declared subversive by the Littornsy General.

Reference is made to the results of the mail cover referred to in the report of the writer dated March 1, 1946, reflecting receipt of a letter addressed to Mrs. MART FISLAM, 235 Mt. Hope Place, Brown, lew York, forwarded in care of WHITE, 6810 Fairfax Road, Bethesda, Maryland, postmarked at Hollywood, California, January 10, 1946, and bearing return address FAITH FILLIOTT, Republic Productions, 4021 Radford Avenue, Morth Hollywood, California.

A letter was addressed to the Los Angeles Office requesting appropriate inquiry concerning FAITH ELLIOTT. This matter is reported in the report of Special Agent M. DOLALD ALDRICH, Los Angeles, April 25, 1916, pages 11-13.

Reference is also made to the mail cover reflecting receipt of a letter by HARRY DEKTER WHITE postmarked at Miami, Florida, January 2L, 1946, bearing the return address 705 Langford Building, Miami, 32, Florida.

Under date of April 19, 1946, the Miami Field Office advised concerning this address. According to BRUCE HOWARD, superintendent of the Langford Building, room 705 is occupied by four individuals, namely: CHARLES LARKS, CPA; SARUEL D. WEISSBUCH; T. FEILE WEISSBUCH; and MARRY IEMAM. As far as FOWARD is aware, they are engaged in legitimate business and well regarded by associates. The Miami Credit Sureau reflected the following:


