

The app also comes with a "Know your rights" user guide, which helps explain what they should and should not do when interacting with law enforcement in the state.

"Nearly 40 people have been killed by police so far this year in Arizona, and we regularly receive reports of excessive use of force by police and Border Patrol agents," Will Gaona, policy director of the ACLU of Arizona, said in a statement.

The Phoenix Police Department supports technology that promotes transparency between the Police Department and the people we serve.


8.3 New Era of Transparency – Cont'd

8.3 New Era of Transparency – Cont'd


"The Phoenix Police Department recognizes that this technology has been publicly available for several years through a variety of applications.

**SAFETY Note: For those who want to record their own interactions with law enforcement, the ACLU reminds them that they "should announce that they are reaching for a phone, and that they are attempting to access the app to record the exchange. Users' safety depends on their ability to clearly communicate any actions they take and remain calm."




