The award of the Masters in Criminal Justice — Crime Analysis requires the successful completion of a total of 48 units of coursework and 8 units of thesis, with a grade of C or better within each class. All students are required to complete a thesis proposal prior to initiating research and defend the thesis in a public forum.
