The award of the Masters in Criminal Justice – Justice Systems Management requires the successful completion of a total of 48 units of coursework and 8 units of thesis, with a grade of C or better within each class. All students are required to complete a thesis proposal prior to initiating research and defend the thesis in a public forum.

The National Institute for Law and Justice is largely comprised of practitioners who are affiliated with a variety of law enforcement and other government agencies, each of whom has made a significant commitment to producing quality educational products for consumption by the profession.
