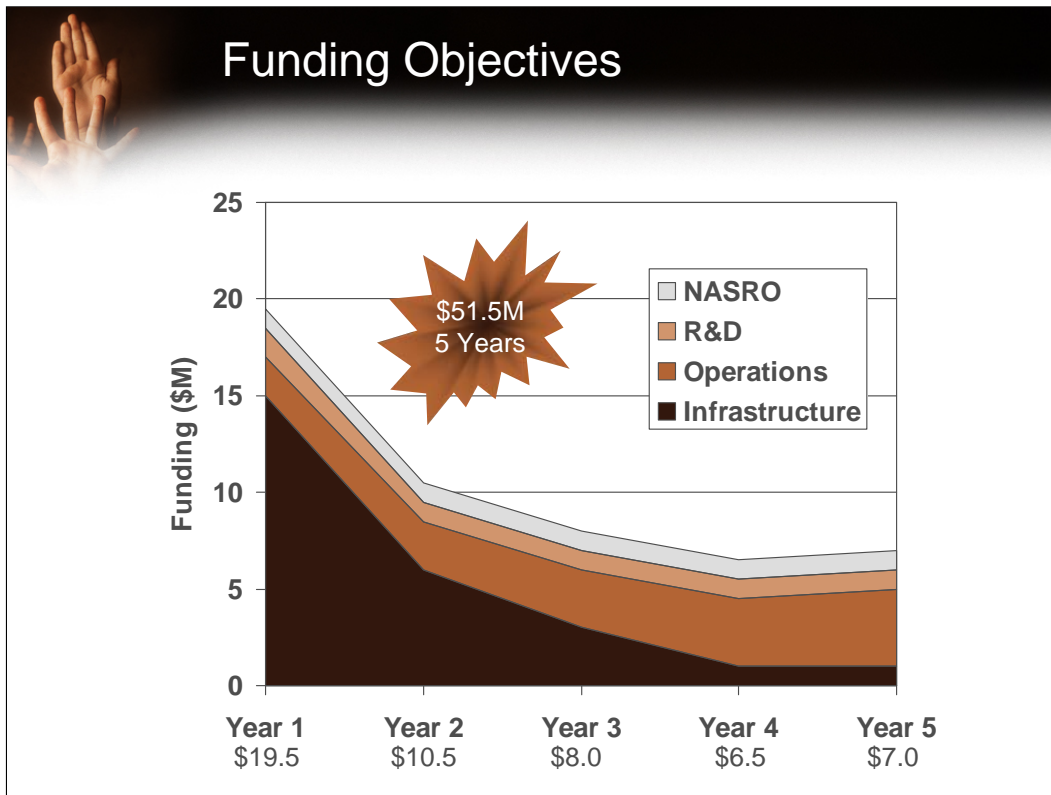
U.S. Annual Congressional Subsidized funding

Facility construction \$10M to \$15M (would adjust cost projection from \$19.5 to \$23.5) TxSSC-ICJS would seek private donations to off-set any cost (additional cost) and to help fund research & development. The receipt of federal funding would help ensure securing of private fundings.


