# Board of Trustees.

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#### Days and Hours, etc.

All departments are open every secular day except the five legal holidays, - February 22, Fast Day, July 4, Thanksgiving, and Christmas, -- and such other days as the Trustees may direct.

Bates Hall, 9 A.M. to 6 P.M. in winter, and to 7 P.M. in summer

Lower Hall, 9 A. M. to 8 P. M. Open for receiving books at 8.30 A. M

Central Reading Room, 9 A.M. to 10 P.M. Seats for one hundred readers.

#### East Boston Branch, 9 A. M. to 8 P. M.

Extent of the Collections. The Bates Hall has about 141,000 volumes; the Lower Hall, 82,500 volumes; the East Boston Branch, 6,500 volumes, - a total (including 7,800 sale duplicates) of more than 187,000 volumes, besides 97,000 pamphlets.

The Central Reading Room has about 380 different periodicals; the East Boston Branch Reading Room has 35.

#### Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

I. To use periodicals or books in the buildings. Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and, if above 16, may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. To take books away from the buildings. All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 16 years; all nonresident Clergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; all inhabitants, even if under 16, who have received certificates of graduation, medals, or Lawrence prizes, from the Public Schools; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall of the Central Library, and at the East Boston Branch.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests), may take books for home use, in accordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trustees.

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#### Bulletins.

A fresh *list of accessions* is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library. Those for the Lower Hall and for the East Boston Branch show only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19; and the present, No. 20, is the first number of the second volume. For sale (excepting No. 2, out of print.) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; and above 2110 are in the Bates Hall. Those with **E. B.** prefixed to the number are in the **East Boston Branch**.

IV. PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE. The printed cards, together with those in manuscript in the same boxes, show the books added to the Bates Hall since 1866. Those in print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1, 1871, and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do not contain such crossreferences, but only main entries, under authors, etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the necessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library have been inserted among the printed cards in their proper alphabetical places; and in due time it is hoped to embody with them, in the same way, the printed titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, and from the Lower Hall Class lists, so that the public shall have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form, and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this card catalogue.

V. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue, which is at present in manuscript.

Note. — A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUP-PLEMENT circulate like other books.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings is for sale at  $\delta$  cents.

Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the Tosti collection of engravings which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints.

These printed entries have been cut out of the various Bulletins, and inserted in alphabetical order in a book, which is in the custody of the Clerk, and which can be consulted on application to him. This CON-SOLIDATED BULLETIN, therefore, and the Card Catalogue, taken together, show all the additions, both under author and title, which have been made to the Lower Library since the publication of the several Class Lists.

OBSERVE. Many books properly belonging to the classes of the preceding Lists will be found in No.  $\nabla$ , because they form one of a series or collection.

#### East Boston Branch.

A Finding List of the books in the East Boston Branch Library has been printed separately, and is for sale at 20 cents.

#### Central Periodical Reading Boom.

A List of Periodicals currently received (nearly 800 in number, of which about one-half are kept in the Reading Room), issued in September, 1870, is for sale at five cents.

Note. -- Copies of these various Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's Desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the Kast Boston Branch.

#### The Catalogue System.

The so-called Dictionary System, upon which all the Catalogues of the Boston Public Library are made, is thought to be more simple than any other.

There are three things, one of which a person wanting a book must know, and the Dictionary System guides the average reader more readily than any other, as he always looks in the proper alphabetical place for the entry he is in search of. These three things are as follows: —

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work (if it is, the subject should be looked for rather than the title), search for it under the first word not an article or a preposition.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a pseudonym, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific head, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the horse, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so, as, for instance, Coins and Numismatics, but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher. Indeed, a multiplication of cross-references is a fundamental idea of the Dictionary System. This necessitates, of course, the disadvantage of turning from one part of the catalogue to another, but there is, on the other hand, a great advantage in the certainty of getting a clew somewhere, -- a thing often impossible in a classified catalogue, except to such as have made its system a study.

#### Assistance to Readers

will be afforded by officers and attendants of the Library inthe examination of the Catalogues, to such an extent as other duties may permit; but it should be remembered that all in the Library have special duties, and no considerable portion of their time should be held at the exclusive disposal of any individual reader; and it is enjoined upon all visitors not to occupy the attendants' time with conversation of any other kind.

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It would appear from a chapter on cataloguing in Cowtan's "Memories of the British Museum," recently published, that the authorities of that Library have been of late solicitous for a much greater multiplication of titles than the process of manifold writing allows, in order to add variety by mere assortment to the kind of catalogues. It is thought that this problem has been now practically solved in this Library, through a printed Card Catalogue. The only manuscript part of the card is the heading, which guides the assorter in distributing the cards in their proper alphabetical places, and the same card here much transcription with its errors is avoided -- is used for all the various heads under which the most extensive system of cross-references may require an entry to be made. There may be cases where a composite volume will require a hundred cards, and the simplest often need three — author, title and subject. This, of course, *pertains* only to the general catalogue on the "Dictionary System," but as the official catalogue duplicates the public one, for convenience and as a check against misplacements of cards, it will be seen that the cards required will usually be six, and may be two hundred. It is the easy multiplying of these titles that solves the problem in a way which the "carbonic process" of the Museum does not admit. Ordinarily twenty copies of a sheet of about 100 titles are printed, and such as require large numbers of cross-references are put into forms by themselves, and the requisite number printed. The surplus sheets and titles are put away and ticketed, a selection being made from the titles, to serve as printer's "copy" for the quarterly Bulletin. The difference between this system and that of the British Museum, so far, is that of printed cards (the titles cut from the sheets being pasted on cards) arranged on their edges in boxes instead of manuscript slips pasted in folios. The case of expansion is of course greatly in favor of this card system. The "carbonic process" yields only four copies, which permits neither a system of cross-references nor of special catalogues, such as those classed by the divisions of knowledge, those by languages or by dates, and those arranged for various other special ends. This reserve of titles will enable the Public Library from time to time to issue special catalogues, as, for instance, of the Ticknor Library, the final labor of compilation being almost entirely that of assorting the titles.



## Books Recommended, and Books Received.

Any person desiring a book not in the possession of this Library may ask, on blanks furnished for the purpose, that it may be purchased; and the assurance is given, that, unless there is some special reason why it should not be ordered, it will be procured as soon as possible, and the applicant — in all cases where the book is absolutely bought upon his recommendation — will be notified of its reception. If *duplicates for the Lower Highl* are asked for, they will be ordered, the provided the circulation of the present copies warrants such additions. In asking that a duplicate shall be purchased, the applicant will be particular to designate it as such. Copies are not duplicated in the Bakes Hall.

Those availing themselves of this privilege will greatly contribute to avoid delay and disappointment, if, in their applications, they will give exact titles, as well as authorship, imprint, etc., and if they will, above all, *write legibly*.

It must be remembered that books published in foreign countries are purchased through the Library's agents in such countries, in order to avoid the duties, and to get as large a discount as possible's and hence an interval of at least six or eight weeks will occur between the time of ordering such works and that of their receipt.

Books from London, Paris, and Leipsic are received twice a month; from Florence, once a year.

Special students desiring to be informed when any book in their line of investightion is received at the Library, can have word sent them, if they will communicate their name and address, and the subject of their inquiries, to the Superintendent; but, in such cases, books will not be retained subject to the call of the persons notified, as is done with books recommended.

## Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes, and are catalogued. It is intended in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These will be put on the shelves in boxes, and for the box the bound volume will be substituted, when the needful numbers are procured. Solicitations are renewed for lots of pamphlets, which will be substituted, when the needful numbers are ready. The chances are, that any miscellaneous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets wanted, and the others will avail-in-exchanges. The number of duplicate pamphlets is now upwards of 30,000, all arranged, and ready to be exchanged for others not belonging to the Library. With distant libraries, the following method of exchange has been found the most convenient: if they will send 1,000 pamphlets printed in their state, or in a given locality, this Library will send 1,000 printed in Massachusetts, or in some other locality. Each may acquire some duplicates, but a great part will probably be fresh accessions.

# Memorials of Boston.

The Public Library of the city should contain every memorial, whether book, pamphlet, map, broadside, print, photograph, or the like, which is procurable, and which in any way illustrates the history or topography of the city. Books printed in Boston at an early date are very desirable acquisitions; and it is to be hoped that friends of the Library will assist in making the collection complete.

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### Branch Libraries.

Under the willof the late Caleb Fellowes, the Rev. George Putnam, D. D., S. C. Thwing, Esq., William Whiting, senior, and others to be wind with them by an act of incorporation, were invested with a trust, whose purpose is to establish a library, and erect a building for it, within half a mile of the meeting house of the First Religious Society in Roxbury, on Eliot square. The will provides that \$40,000 shall be spent in the purchase of land and in the erection of the said building. The available fundance amounts to about \$54,000, and the excess over the sum appropriated for the land and building the Trustees are required to invest as a fund, the income of which shall be used for the-purchase of books; and to this will be added, when the building is completed, a further sum of about \$30,000, which will then be paid to them by the executors under the will of the late Mrs. Fellowes. As it has been deemed for the interest of all concerned that the advantages of these funds shall be joined with such others as may accrue from the provisions to be made by the City Council for the benefit of the District of Roxbury, in the way of a Branch of the Fublic Library, the City Council have authorized the Mayor to sign an indenture with the Trustees of the Fellowes Athenseum, by which that institution will be united with the proposed Branch Library for the Highlands. During the coming summer it is hopfit to get in operation the South Boston Branch, for which rooms have been hired in the new Savings Bank Building on the corner of Broadway and E street; and when the building contemplated under the above-named agreement is done, which it is thought will be the case by another year, the proposed Branch Library for Roxbury will be opened. The agreement in effect gives the citizens of the Highlands a library the same in kind with the Bates Hall collection, though on a smaller scale. # be increased by the Fellowes funds, while the city will maintain a popular library in connection therewith, to be of the character of the Lower Hall of the Central Library and of the branches at East and South Boston.

#### American Patents.

The Commissioner of Patents has designated this Library as one of those to receive the weekly volumes of Patent Specifications and drawings. The conditions imposed are, that the Library shall pay for the binding, and that it shall not allow the volumes to be taken from the building, except by order of the Courts. Each volume bears the official certification of the Commissioner. The original drawings are reproduced by photo-lithography. The time required for manufacture and binding is likely to cause the receipt of each volume to be delayed a formths after its date. The series was begun on the first of last July.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests), may take books for home use, in accordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trustees.



## Bulletins.

A fresh *list of accessions* is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library. Those for the Lower Hall and for the East Boston Branch show only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19; and the present, No. 21, is the second number of the second volume. For sale (excepting No. 2, 3, 19, and 20, out of print,) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; and above 2110 are in the Bates Hall. Those with **H. B.** prefixed to the number are in the East Boston Branch.

IV. PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE. The printed cards, together with those in manuscript in the same boxes, show the books added to the Bates Hall since 1866. Those in print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1, 1871, and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do not contain such cross references, but only main entries, under authors, etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the necessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library have been inserted among the printed cards in their proper alphabetical places; and in due time it is hoped to embody with them, in the same way, the printed titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, from Vol. 1 of the Bulletins, and from the Lower Hall Class Lists, so that the public shall have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form, and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this card catalogue.

'V. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue, which is at present in manuscript.

Note. — A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUP-PLEMENT circulate like other books.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings is for sale at 5 cents.

Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the Tosti collection of engravings which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints.

VI. A CARD CATALOOUE, containing only the *titles* of works (not anonymous) which have been added to the Lower Library since the issue of the various Class Lists, has been placed at the Clerk's desk in the Distributing Hall. In the printed Bulletins, such works are entered only under the names of their authors. These printed entries have been cut out of the various Bulletins, and inserted in alphabetical order in a book, which is in the custody of the Clerk, and which can be consulted on application to him. This COM-SOLIDATED BULLETIN, therefore, and the Card Catalogue, taken together, show all the additions, both under author and title, which have been made to the Lower Library since the publication of the several Class Lists.

OBSERVE. Many books properly belonging to the classes of the preceding Lists will be found in No. V, because they form one of a series or collection.

### Branches.

A Finding List of the books in the East Boston Branch Library has been printed separately, and is for sale at 20 cents. A Finding List for the South Boston Branch is in preparation.

### Central Periodical Reading Boom.

A List of Periodicals currently received (nearly 800 in number, of which about one-half are kept in the Reading Boom), issued in September, 1870, is for sale at five cents.

Note. -- Copies of these various Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's Desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the East Boston Branch.

### The Oatalogue System.

The so-called Dictionary System, upon which all the Catalogues of the Boston Public Library are made, is thought to be more simple than any other.

There are three things, one of which a person wanting a book must know, and the Dictionary System guides the average reader more readily than any other, as he always looks in the proper alphabetical place for the entry he is in search of. These three things are as follows:—

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work (if it is, the subject should be looked for rather than the title), search for it under the first word not an article or a preposition.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a pseudonym, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific head, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the horse, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes he found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so, as, for instance, Coins and Numismatics, but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher. Indeed, a multiplication of cross-references is a fundamental idea of the Dictionary System. This necessitates, of course, the disadvantage of turning from one part of the catalogue to another, but there is, on the other hand, a great advantage in the certainty of getting a clew somewhere, - a thing often impossible in a classified catalogue, except to such as have made its system a study.

### Assistance to Readers

will be afforded by officers and attendants of the Library in the examination of the Catalogues, to such an extent as other duties may permit; but it should be remembered that all in the Library have special duties, and no considerable portion of their time should be held at the exclusive disposal of any individual reader; and it is enjoined upon all visitors not to occupy the attendants' time with conversation of any other kind.

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# THE TOSTI ENGRAVINGS.

The following list covers that portion of the collection of engravings made by the late Cardinal Tosti, of Rome, and given to this Library by Mr. Thomas G. Appleton, consisting of the framed prints in the Bates Hall and the officers' apartments adjoining, which are not portraits.

The entries are under the names of the engravers, with cross-references from the names of painters, or designers, and from the subjects of the engravings.

Bulletins numbers 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the Tosti collection of engravings which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints.

A list of the Portraits has been separately published. The framed prints, not being portraits, which are in the Lower Halls of the Library, are partly catalogued; and they may probably be given in the next Bulletin. There is, in addition, a small number of engravings, not framed, which will be catalogued and printed as soon as possible.

# The Medical Alcoves.

The following report is from the pen of Joel Seaverns, M.D., of Roxbury, who has kindly made a very careful examination of the Medical Department of the Library.

The Department of Medicine in the Library is especially richin the classical works of authors of former times. It contains the works of Galen, Celsus, Hippocrates, Paracelsus, Fabricius ab Aquapendente, Eustachius, Sennertus, Boerhaave, Willis, Cullen, John Brown, Vesalius, and other old authors, many being so rare and valuable, from their antiquity and their quaint style, that one cannot speak of them too enthusiastically.

It has also the productions of the great French masters, Amumat, Andral, Bichat, Boyer, Bourgeny, Bretonneau, Broussais, Brown-Séquard, Cabanis, Chassaignac, Chaussier, Chomel, Chopart, Civiale, Cruveilhier, Cullerier, Desault, Desgenettes, Dubois, Dupuytren, Foderé, Guérin, Jobert, Larrey, Lebert, Lisfranc, Malgaigne, Mandl, Marjolin, Nélaton, Paré, Pelletan, Pinel, Piorry, Portal, Richeraud, Ricord, Roux, Sedillot, Trousseau, Velpeau, Vicq d'Azyr, and others, - a list embracing so much that is historical and brilliant in medicine, surgery, and literature ; men famous on the battlefield or in the hospital, from the fifteenth to the nineteenth century. Besides these, mention should be made of a collection of Mémoires and Mélanges in fifty-three volumes, many by the most eminent men of the times, selected by Baron Dupuytren, some of which are dedicated in the handwriting of the authors to that "viro prepobilissimo, perillustri, celeberrimo "

The great English anatomists and surgeons are represented by the works of the Bells, Brodle, Cheselden, the Coopers, Carling, Rrichsen, Glisson, Guthrie, Harvey, Hodgson, Hey, the Hunters, Lawrence, Percival Pott, Solly, Skey, Syme, Travers, and Wistar.

Among German authorities are Billroth, Canstatt, Cohu, Bchkard, Frank, Gurit, Henle, Hirsch, Kölliker, Liharzik, Müller, Niemeyer, Reichert, Rindfieisch, Rokitansky, Schwann, Spiess, Stricker, Traube, Valentis, Virchow, Vogel, Wagner, Weber, and Wunderlich.

A long list might be made of American authors, especially of the leading physicians of the Philadelphia, New York, and Boston schools; the publications of those of our own city being of course very numerous, and embracing nearly everything that has been published here.

The value of the collection is especially enhanced by its numerous volumes of plates, and atlases of illustrations, many of which are of great cost and beauty and of superb execution. Mascagni's "Anatomia Universa," with colored plates, is probably the finest and most valuable work of the kind in New England; there is also his "Iconographia vasorum lymphaticorum," Lebert's "Traité d'Anatomie pathologique," with one hundred and six engravings and colored plates; Albinus's splendid "Anatomical Tables," Sandifort's "Museum Anatomicum," Cruveilhier's superb work. Bourgeny and Jacob's Atlas of Descriptive Anatomy, Braune's Atlas of Topographical Anatomy, Quain's Surgical Anatomy, Haller's works with Anatomical plates (said by John Bell to surpass all others in utility), Auvert's "Selecta Praxis Medico-Chirurgical," Smellie's Midwifery, Malgaigne on Fractures, Swan on the Nerves, Hunter on the Gravid Uterus, the works of Bonamy, Broca, and Bean, Cullerier, Fan, Hyrtl, Masset, Moreau, Ricord, Ruyschius, and Soemmering, as well as the famous engravings of Sir Charles Bell and Scarpa.

One of the most useful portions of this collection to the general practitioner, as well as to writers, is that of medical journals and the current scrial literature of the profession. Its bulk, even more than its cost, forbids private individuals from filing the shelves of their libraries with it, yet it is almost indispensably necessary to be able to refer to it. There are here, from Great Britain, complete sets of th "Medico-Chirurgical Review," "Braithwaite's Retrospect," the Sydenham Society's publicationa, the "London Lancet," the "Edinburgh Medical and Surgical Journal," the "Dublin Quarterly Journal of Medical Science," the Transactions of the Obstetrical and Pathological Societies of London, Winslow's "Psychological Journal," the "Medical Times and Gazette" (from 1840), Guy's "Hospital Reports," (from 1836), St. George's complete, as well as those of St. Bartholomew's, St. Thomas's, and the London Ophthalmic Hospital.

From Italy there is the "Bullettino delle Scienze Mediche" (from 1829 to 1867). France is represented by the Mémoires de l'Academie de Médecine (from 1828), Bulletin of the same (from 1834), "Annales d'Hygiène Publique" (from 1863), "Recueil de Mémoires de Médecine, de Chirurgie, et de Pharmacie Militaires" complete, "Gazette Médicale" (from 1853 to 1858), "Lancette Française" (from 1853), Bouchardat's "Manuel de Matière Médicale" (from 1841), "Journal de Médecine et de Chirurgie pratiques" (from 1855), eleven volumes of Magendie's "Journal de Physiologie," and the "Bulletin de la Société Anatomique de Paris."

Of German journals, there are Schmidt's "Jahrbuch der Gesammten Medicin" (from 1858), Schültze's "Archiv für Mikroskopische Anatomie" complete, "Jahresbericht von Physiologischen Wissenschaften," "Central-blatt für die Medicinischen Wissenschaften," Müller's "Archiv für Pathologische Anatomie und Physiologie" complete, "Journal für Kinderkrankheiten (from 1843), twelve volumes of the "Archiv der Heilkunde," Frank's "Magaxin für Arsneimittellehre," the "Zeitschrift für Biologie," and Frerich's "Ar-

From the American press are complete files of the "American Journal of Medical Sciences," the "American Journal of Insanity" (from 1853), the "American Journal of Obstetrics," the "American Journal of Syphilis and Dermatology," the "Pharmaceutical Journal," the "Veterinary Journal" (from 1869), the "New York Medical Times" to its end, the "Medical Record," the "Boston Medical and Surgical Journal," and the Journal of the Gynecological Society.

Of these journals, both foreign and native, mention has been made of the principal only, or such as are complete, or have been continued through a number of years, forming really but a small part of those which are now taken at the Library, and are being made up into volumes.

Of Dictionaries and Encyclopedias, there are many, some of the best being the following: the "Dictionnaire de Médecine," in thirty volumes, by Adelon, Becquard, etc., the "Dictionnaire de Médecine et de chirurgie pratiques," in fifteen volumes, by Andral, Begin, etc., the "Dictionnaire des Sciences Médicales," in sixty volumes, by Adelon, Alibert, etc., the " Encyclographie des Sciences Médicales," in twenty-two volumes, eleven volumes of the "Nouveau Dictionnaire de Médecine et de Chirurgie pratiques " by Bernutz, Boeckel, etc., Todd's "Cyclopedia of Anatomy and Physiology, Dunglison's "Oyclopædia of Practical Medicine." the "Encyclopædia Anatomique," of Soemmering, Weber, Bischoff, etc., in a French translation, Nysten's "Dictionnaire de Médecine, de Chirurgie, et de Pharmacie," Cooper's "Surgical Dictionary," Copland's and Hooper's Medical Dictionaries. Here also may not improperly be mentioned Beale's "Archives of Medicine," Reynold's "System of Medicine," Holmes's "System of Surgery," Virchow's "Hand-buch der Speciellen Pathologie und Therapie," and the new "Hand-buch der Allgemeinen und Speciellen Chirurgie," by Billroth and other surgeons.

Considering the collection by topics, of general literature, including addresses, and the philosophy, history, and progress of medicine, the amount is very large, and much of it very interesting and valuable; in medical biography. beyond that of America (of which there is a great variety both in pamphlet and book-form), there is little except the "Eloges" of Dubois, Louis, Pariset, and Vicq d'Azyr. With works on the pathology and treatment of disease the Library is very fully supplied, both in the general works of the hest authors, and in monographs on special diseases. The department of Obstetrics and Diseases of Children is also large, as is also that of Gynmoology, though the latter is not so full in recent works. General Anatomy and Surgery may perhaps be considered the best supplied branch of this department of the Library, containing the works of the most eminent European and American writers, many most beautifully illustrated, together with an excellent collection on Military Surgery. The literature of the Eye and Ear, especially that of the latter, is not so full, but embraces very many staudard works. Materia Medica is represented by the various national Pharmacopoias, many works on Medical Botany with costly plates, and the writings of many of the best authors, and Toxicology, by a smaller number of works, which are, however, very valuable and complete. On Diseases of the Skin, most of the best authorities are present. On Cow-Pox and Vaccination, there are fewer, Ballard and Seaton being the only recent authors. The variety of works on State Medicine is not large, except as regards Hygiene, and the construction of hospitals, on which much has been collected; with regard to Lunacy, there is but little, especially concerning the vexed question of the "cottage system," on which Duval's "Gheel" stands alone. Only one of the reports of the Medical officer of the Privy Council of Great Britain, works everywhere referred to, appears in the medical alcoves, though all are present in a less accessible form among the Parliamentary Documents. In Pathological Anatomy, there is an excellent collection of the standard authors, but the constant advances in this study require constant additions. Many exceedingly valuable books on Physiology and Histology are upon the shelves, including some of those of the recent continental authors, but many others should be added. There are Ludwig's, Reichert's and Stricker's reports of the Institute at Leipsic, Breslau, and Vienna, but not those of Gscheidlin at Würzburg, Hoppe, Seyler at Tübingen, or Hensen at Kiel. A large number of Eclectic, Hydropathic, and Homeopathic works are also to be found on the shelves.

From this resume, it will be seen that, as regards the actual wants of the practitioner in his studies for his daily practice, the supply in the Public Library is indeed abundant. Its deficiencies appear only to investigators of special topics, or to those who seek for all that has been written by the authors they are consulting. Of the principal medical authors there may be some who do not appear at all; but for the most part the want is not so much of a variety of writers as of a greater number of their works. Of the many works of Scarpa, but one, his "De Auditu et Olfactu" is here in the original; Billroth and Chaussier are represented by but two works each; Cheselden, Chopart, Cullerier, Dubois, Foderé, Liharzik, Pelletan, Rindfleisch, Schwann, Traube, and Wunderlich, each by one work only. Constant additions should also be made of recent foreign works, especially those from Germany, to make these alcoves as rich in all branches as they already are in some.

These deficiencies are, after all, only spoken of as detracting from what the Library might be, and it is to be hoped will in time become, but they do not lessen its claim to being, as it is, the best collection of medical works in New England. and a treasure-house to every physician who avails himself of its privileges, to advance his knowledge of his profession, or to pursue medical and scientific investigations.

# Alterations of the Central Library Building.

The work on the alcoves on the westerly side of the Bates Hall being completed, public notice was given, March 8, of the reopening of the alcoves, the use of which, since September 13, had been very much restricted. On the 25th of March the work of removing and rearranging the books in the alcoves on the eastern side was begun, preparatory to the work of the contractors, which was begun March 27, by erecting a temporary staging for maintaining access to the front parts of the alcoves, during the progress of alterations. The compact arrangement of the books still left in those alcoves, together with the somewhat uncertain arrangement of those which have been removed, will more or less affect the circulation during the spring and summer. During the interval of more than a fortnight, while both sides of the Bates Hall were again thrown open to unimpeded use, the circulation of books rose unexpectedly to nearly the figures of last year's record for the corresponding period.

# The Ticknor Library.

The Catalogue Department has catalogued over 16,000 volumes within the past six months, and the pressure has given little time for the work to be done on the Spanish collection bequeathed by Mr. Ticknor. A slip catalogue is about half completed, however, by which and by aid of the classifications into which the books are assorted on the shelves, they can now be readily found. A card catalogue has been begun, and will be continued with as much speed as may be practicable. It is not thought desirable to insert the titles in these quarterly Bulletins.

# Branch Libraries.

East Boston. This Branch has been in operation for more than a year, and a circulation during twelve months of about 75,000 volumes, indicates the measure of its success.

South Boston. It is hoped that, during May, this Branch will be in full operation, a collection of about 4,500 volumes having been formed.

*Bozbury.* Under an agreement with the city, the Trustees of the Fellowes Athenseum have begun the erection of a suitable building on Bartlett street; and it is hoped to have a collection of books of a popular kind ready to put into it upon its completion in the autumn or early winter. At that time the income of a fund of about \$30,000 for the purchase of the higher class of books will be available.

The use of the East Boston Branch has not diminished in any degree the pressure upon the Central Library; nor are the other Branches likely to have a different effect.

# American Patents.

The Commissioner of Patents has designated this Library as one of those to receive the weekly volumes of Patent Specifications and drawings. The conditions imposed are, that the Library shall pay for the binding, and that it shall not allow the volumes to be taken from the building, except by order of the Courts. Each volume bears the official certification of the Commissioner. The original drawings are reproduced by photo-lithography. The time required for manufacture and binding is likely to cause the receipt of each volume to be delayed a few months after its date. The series was begun on the first of last July.

Extent of the Collections. The Bates Hall contains 144,000 volumes; the Lower Hall, 32,000 volumes; the East Boston Branch, 6,800 volumes; the South Boston Branch, 4,500 volumes, — a total (including 7,500 sale duplicates) of about 185,000 volumes, besides 102,000 pamphlets.

The Central Reading Room has about 392 different periodicals; the East Boston Branch Reading Room has 37; the South Boston Branch has 27. Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

I. To use periodicals or books in the buildings. Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and, if above 16, may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. To take books away from the buildings. All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 16 years; all nonresident Clergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; all inhabitants, even if under 16, who have received certificates of graduation, medals, or Lawrence prizes, from the Public Schools; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall of the Central Library, and at the several Lranches.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests), may take books for home use, in accordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trastees.



## Bulletins.

A fresh list of accessions is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall abows all the books added to the Central Library. Those for the Lower Hall and for the East Boston and South Boston Branches abow, only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19, and the present, No. 22, is the third number of the second volume. For sale (excepting those out of print) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; those above 2110 are in the Bates Hall. Those with E. B. and S. B. prefixed to the number are respectively in the East Boston and South Boston Branches.

The titles from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library have been inserted among the printed cards in their proper alphabetical places; and in due time it is hoped to embody with them, in the same way, the printed titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, from Vol. 1 of the Bulletins, and from the Lower Hall Class Lists, so that the public shall have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form, and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this Card Catalogue.

V. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue, which is at present in manuscript.

Note. — Copies of the printed Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's Desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the Branches.

A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT circulate like other books.

### Engravings.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings is for sale at 5 cents. Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the Tosti collection of engravings which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints; and Bulletin 21 contains a list of the framed engravings, not portraits, in the Bates Hall.

### The Catalogue System.

The so-called Dictionary System, upon which all the Catalogues of the Boston Public Library are made, is thought to be more simple than any other.

There are three things, one of which a person wanting a book must know, and the Dictionary System guides the average reader more readily than any other, as he always looks in the proper alphabetical place for the entry he is search of. These three things are as follows: ---

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work (if it is, the subject should be looked for rather than the title), search for it under the first word not an article or a preposition.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a pseudonym, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific head, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the horse, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so, as, for instance, Coins and Numismatics, but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher. Indeed, a multiplication of cross-references is a fundamental idea of the Dictionary System. This necessitates, of course, the disadvantage of turning from one part of the catalogue to another, but there is, on the other hand, a great advantage in the certainty of getting a clew somewhere, - a thing often impossible in a classified catalogue, except to such as have made its system a study.

### Assistance to Readers

will be afforded by officers and attendants of the Library in the examination of the Catalogues, to such an extent as other duties may permit; but it should be remembered that all in the Library have special duties, and no considerable portion of their time should be held at the exclusive disposal of any individual reader; and it is enjoined upon all visitors not to occupy the attendants' time with conversation of any other kind.

# The New Public Catalogue for the Bates Hall.

(From the forthcoming Annual Report.)

An important change has taken place in the management of our catalogue. Thirty years ago the British Museum abandoned the plan of a printed catalogue. The Bodleian has not printed any since 1859, and does not intend to do so hereafter. Dr. Pertz, the Librarian of the Royal Library of Berlin, and other of the chief bibliographical authorities of the continent, are likewise united in the view that such printing in a large and rapidly growing library is impracticable, both from the expense, and from the constant reduplication of alphabets, which will in not a long time become very burdensome to examine, with the necessity of turning to one from another. It has always been felt that our Library might in time find itself in the same circumstances with the older libraries of Europe, but when our repeated efforts during the last four or five years to begin on a new volume of the Bates Hall Catalogue have been as repeatedly thwarted by the increasing detail of this department, arising from ramifications and a rapid growth, it has become more and more apparent that the contingency was not so far removed as it had been felt to be. At the rate of growth which the Library is now maintaining, we should have found, after increasing the force of this department for the purpose of adding the proof-reading of a new volume to its other work, that its completion would only have been the signal for a repetition of all the labor upon the material which had accumulated while the other was going through the press. This would be equivalent to adding largely to our permanent force, besides entailing a heavy cost for printing.

While the use of a catalogue in print is vastly more convenient than the best in manuscript, and while our printed volumes may be of great advantage in other libraries, and to a few students who possess them, it is very apparent from observation that the great bulk of users of the Bates Hall are in search of the newer books, which cannot be found in printed catalogues, or else they find it more convenient to consult the catalogues in the building than elsewhere. Any deprivation which would ensue from the abandonment of printing the catalogues in volumes was likely therefore to fall upon distant libraries and a very few persons, not always among those who assist in supporting the institution. There was to be other gain than economy in making the change, and that consisted largely in massing in one alphabet an index to the stores of the entire Library; and it was not felt, moreover, to be necessary to give up the advantages of print.

In some correspondence with the Librarian of the University of Leyden, it had been learned that they used a primed card catalogue, uniting the marked advantages of both systems. Their titles were set up in the order of accession and . printed in sheets, one hundred and fifty titles at a time, on thin paper : and then being cut out and pasted in different records, they made up their catalogues of accessions; their alcove lists; the public alphabetical catalogue; the same for official use; and a systematic catalogue. It seemed that in this plan there was a solution of our difficulties. The multiplication of titles by print promised much saving of clerical labor, with fewer chances of error, and was capable of developing a great variety of uses by the mere labor of assortment. It had been found at the British Museum that their augmentation of copies by the carbon process, which yields only four transcripts, allowed them no chance of adding variety to their catalogues in the way of different systems, suited to varied wants in the users of the collections. Their small reserve of copies of titles for replacing those worn out prevented any more systematic use of them than a simple alphabetical catalogue, to which they might add an index in the case of important articles like Shakespeare and the Bible. In a catalogue that now numbers about 1,900 follo volumes, and is expanding so rapidly that a binding force is constantly at work interleaving and re-guarding, there is some danger that in no long time this reserve, with the constant wear, will not be enough. The dilemma, we believe, is recognized by the authorities of that Library; but no change is yet made in their processes.

Taking then the idea indicated by the practice at Leyden, and after some experimenting with printing directly upon cards, and in establishing the form of the title, a method has finally been worked out which seems to meet every requirement. The cataloguer, having prepared his title, indicates the cross-references, and then draws his pen through them, to guard against the compositor's setting them up. A day's accumulation of such slips goes to the printer at night, and comes back in the shape of printed strips, several copies being returned, one of which is corrected and sent back. One of such

strips is posted at once on a bulletin-board, showing the freshest books, and another is scanned for books known to be of interest to specialists, to whom the title thus printed is despatched. About one hundred titles are enough for a form, which is then printed on thin paper, and ordinarily about thirty copies of each sheet are printed, though more are struck off in special instances, one or two hundred being sometimes the number, when a form is made up of titles of pamphlet volumes, with contents, or other works requiring a larger number of cross-references, — the object being to provide enough copies of such titles to supply all the entries in duplicate (the public and official catalogues being kept up independently, for convenience and as a necessary check), and to furnish a reserve for future contingencies.

To each title is appended, besides the shelf number, the accession number, the number of the sheet in which it is printed, and to some the letter B, to indicate such as are to be made to reappear in the quarterly bulletins. The sheet number is a clue at once to the pigeon-hole in which the reserve titles are kept. By referring to the cross-references on the printer's "copy" of such titles, the attendant knows just how many copies to cut out of the sheet for each title, and just what headings to give them. These are pasted on cards and rolled smooth; and the cards are then put in their proper places in both the public and official catalogues.

The reserve of copies renders it of course possible to arrange by assortment any special alphabetical or systematic catalogue, as may be required, of the medical or any other department of the Library; and, in the case of any special collection, like the Ticknor Library, they afford ready-made "copy" for a separate volume. Indeed, while abandoning the printing of volumes of the General Library of the Bates Hall, it is not at all improbable that the publication of special catalogues, in departments for which we may from time to time become known, will follow.

To perfect the system indicated by this description, the work is not by any means to be confined to the entry of titles of books yet to be acquired. It is hoped gradually to embody in this one alphabet, not only all previous additions to the Bates Hall, with all their cross-references; but also the titles of the Lower Hall Collection, so that it shall represent the entire Central Library. It is not likely that the Branches, except in very rare instances, will contain any books not to be found in the Boylston street Building. Work was begun in this direction with the Prince Catalogue, the titles and cross-references from which have been put upon cards, and are already inserted; and progress is making on the printed builetins, proceeding backwards from No. 19. It must be long before this work is entirely done, so as to include the titles of the two printed volumes.

This new system was begun on the first of October, and up to this time [May 9th] there have been printed 39 sheets, beside 2 extra ones, covering the titles and contents of pamphlet volumes. This gives a total of 3,840 titles, and has necessitated 10,336 entries on the cards in each catalogue, or counting the triplication of the titles in the Ticknor Library, — another set being made to constitute a special catalogue of this collection, — we have a record of nearly 21,000 cards, prepared in six months, an extent of manual labor in mounting, inscribing and assorting, that has severely taxed the faithful Curator of the Card Catalogues, and the assistants who have aided her.

# Books Recommended, and Books Received.

Any person desiring a book not in the possession of this Library may ask, on blanks furnished for the purpose, that it may be purchased; and the assurance is given, that, unless there is some special reason why it should not be ordered, it will be procared as soon as possible, and the applicant—in all cases where the book is absolutely bought upon his recommendation—will be notified of its reception. If *duplicates for the Lower Hall or for the Branches* are asked for, they will be ordered, provided the circulation of the present copies warrants such additions. In asking that a duplicate shall be purchased, the applicant will be particular to designate it as such. Copies are not duplicated in the Bates Hall.

Those availing themselves of this privilege will greatly contribute to avoid delay and disappointment, if, in their applications, they will give exact titles, as well as authorship, imprint, etc., and if they will, above all, *write legibly*.

It must be remembered that books published in forcign countries are purchased through the Library's agents in such countries, in order to avoid the duties, and to get as large a discount as possible; and hence an interval of *at least* six or eight weeks will occur between the time of ordering such works and that of their receipt; and, if they have to be bound before sending, as is usually the case with Continental publications, the delay will be considerably increased.

Be particular to give the place of publication, by country, if not more definitely, or great delay will sometimes happen by the order being sent to the wrong agents, although titles are verified before sending, as far as possible, and titles inaccurately given will sometimes have to be laid aside till time can be had for the necessary search.

Books from London, Paris, and Leipsic are received twice a month; from Florence, once a year.

Special students desiring to be informed when any book in their line of investigation is received at the Library can have word sent them, if they will communicate their name and address, and the subject of their inquiries, to the Superintendent; but, in such cases, books will not be retained subject to the call of the persons notified, as is done with books recommended.

# Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes, and are catalogued. It is intended in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These will be put on the shelves in boxes, and for the box the bound volume will be substituted, when the needful numbers are procured. Solicitations are renewed for lots of pamphlets, which will be substituted, when the needful numbers are rady. The chances are, that any miscellaneous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets wanted, and the others will avail in exchanges. The number of duplicate pamphlets is now upwards of 80,000, all arranged, and ready to be exchanged for others not belonging to the Library. With distant libraries, the following method of exchange has been found the most convenient: if they will send 1,000 pamphlets printed in their state, or in a given locality, this Library will probably be fresh accessions.

# Branch Libraries.

East Boston. This Branch has been in operation for more than a year, and a circulation during twelve months of about 75,000 volumes indicates the measure of its success.

South Boston. The Branch, in the new Savings' Bank Building, corner of Broadway and E street, was opened May 1st, with about 4,400 volumes; and, up to this date, 1.331 persons have registered their names, and have drawn out 13,647 books.

This Branch was formally dedicated May 16, and addresses were made by the President of the Trustees, and by the Hon. Benjamin Dean, the Rev. George A. Thayer, Col. Albert J. Wright, and others. The mayor of the city presided. An account of the proceedings has been printed in a pamphlet.

Roxbury. Under an agreement with the city, the Trustees of the Fellowes Athenseum will erect a suitable building, an elevation, and plans of the two stories of which may be seen in the Annual Report of the Library, now in press. It is hoped to have a collection of books of a popular kind ready to put into it upon its completion in the early winter. At that time the income of a fund of about \$30,000 for the purchase of the higher class of books will be available.

The use of the Branch Libraries does not diminish in any degree the pressure upon the Central Library.

# Alterations of the Central Library Building.

The work on the alcoves on the eastern side of the *Bates Hall* is still in progress, and the use of the books in them is maintained by means of a temporary staging, but the necessarily compact arrangement of the books in those alcoves, together with the somewhat uncertain arrangement of those which have been removed, will more or less affect the rapidity with which books can be found while the work continues. Alterations in the *Lower Hall* are to be begun at once. The books in the galleries will be removed to cases on the floor; and a series of rooms be made on the level of the old gallery.

The Richardson estate, adjoining the Library lot on the east, has been purchased, in view of future enlargements.

# American Patents.

The Commissioner of Patents has designated this Library as one of those to receive the weekly volumes of Patent Specifications and Drawings. The conditions imposed are, that the Library shall pay for the binding, and that it shall not allow the volumes to be taken from the building, except by order of the Courts. Each volume bears the official certification of the Commissioner. The original drawings are reproduced by photo-lithography. The time required for manufacture and binding is likely to cause the receipt of each volume to be delayed a few months after its date. The series was begun on the first of July, 1871.

# Memorials of Boston.

The Public Library of the city should contain every memorial, whether book, pamphlet, map, broadside, print, photograph, or the like, which is procurable, and which in any way illustrates the history or topography of the city. Books printed in Boston at an early date are very desirable acquisitions; and it is to be hoped that friends of the Library will assist in making the collection complete.

## Engraved Portraits.

Portfolios and scrap-books have been prepared for the preservation of engraved portraits, and any contributions of this kind will be gladly accepted. Particular attention will be paid to the gathering of likenesses of Bostonians.

# Handbook for Readers.

A new manual is in press containing the Regulations of the Library, with explanatory notes; a full description of the Catalogues; and a section intended to aid the ordinary reader in selecting books by pointing out the different bibliographical and other books of reference, which will be helpful in his search. It will also contain a list of the marbles, paintings, and other works of art in the Library; and a brief chronology of the Library's history.

Extent of the Collections. The Bates Hall contains 145,000 volumes; the Lower Hall, 33.000 volumes; the East Boston Branch. 7,000 volumes; the South Boston Branch, 4.700 volumes; the Roxbury Branch (not yet opened), 900 volumes, a total (including 7,600 sale duplicates) of about 198,000 volumes, besides 105,000 pamphlets.

The Central Reading Room has 401 different periodicals; the East Boston Branch Reading Room has 39; the South Roston Branch has 27. Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

JOSEPH SYKES, Keeper of Bates Hall.

I. To use periodicals or books in the buildings. Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals. and, if above 16, may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. To take books away from the buildings. All citizens and residents of Boeton above the age of 16 years; all nonresident Clergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; all linhabitants, even if under 16, who have received certificates of graduation, medals, or Lawrence prizes, from the Public Schools; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall of the Central Library, and at the several Branches.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests), may take books for home use, in accordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Truetees.

A new Handbook for Readers has been printed.



# CATALOGUES.

*Note.* — Copies of the printed Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's Desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the Branches.

A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT to the Bates Hall circulate like other books.

#### Bulletins.

A fresh *list of accessions* is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library, and for the few days that elapse before titles appear in print on the Bulletin board, the important new books are displayed (with the shelf numbers attached) in a glass case at the Desk. The lists for the Lower Hall and for the East Boston and South Boston Branches show only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19, and the present, No. 23, is the fourth number of the second volume. For sale (excepting those out of print) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; those above 2110 are in the Bates Hall. Those with E. B. and S. B. prefixed to the number are respectively in the East Boston and the South Boston Branch.

Those in print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1, 1871, and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do not contain such crossreferences, but only main entries, under authors. etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the necessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library have been inserted among the printed cards in their proper alphabetical places; and in due time it is hoped to embody with them, in the same way, the printed titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, from Vol. 1 of the Bulletins, and from the Lower Hall Class Lists, so that the public shall have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form, and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this Card Catalogue.

V. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue which is at present in manuscript.

#### Engravings.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings is for sale at 5 cents. Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the Tosti collection of congravings which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5.100 prints; and Bulletin 21 contains a list of the framed ongravings, not portraits, in the Bates Hall.

OBSERVE. Many books properly belonging to the classes of the preceding Lists will be found in No. V, because they form one of a series or collection.

## The Oatalogue System.

The so-called Dictionary System, upon which all the Catalogues of the Boston Public Library are made, is thought to be more simple than any other.

There are three things, one of which a person wanting a book must know, and the Dictionary System guides the average reader more readily than any other, as he always looks in the proper alphabetical place for the entry he is in search of. These three things are as follows: —

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work (if it is, the subject should be looked for rather than the title), search for it under the first word not an article.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a pseudonym, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific head, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the horse, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so (as, for instance, Coins and Numismatics), but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher. Indeed, a multiplication of cross-references is a fundamental idea of the Dictionary System. This necessitates, of course, the disadvantage of turning from one part of the catalogue to another, but there is, on the other hand, a great advantage in the certainty of getting a clew somewhere, - a thing often impossible in a classified catalogue, except to such as have made its system a study.

#### Assistance to Readers

will be afforded by officers and attendants of the Library in the examination of the Catalogues. as far as other duties may permit; but it should be remembered that all in the Library have special duties, and no considerable portion of their time should be held at the exclusive disposal of any individual reader; and it is enjoined upon all visitors not to occupy the attendants' time with conversation of any other kind.

## Books Recommended, and Books Received.

Any person desiring a book not in the possession of this Library may ask, on blanks furnished for the purpose, that it may be purchased; and the assurance is given, that, unless there is some special reason why it should not be ordered, it will be procured as soon as possible, and the applicant - in all cases where the book is absolutely bought upon his recommendation - will be notified of its reception. If duplicates for the Lower Hall or for the Eranches are asked for, they will be ordered, provided the circulation of the present copies warrants such additions. In asking that a duplicate shall be purchased, the applicant will be particular to designate it as such. Copies are not duplicated in the Bates Hall.

Those availing themselves of this privilege will greatly contribute to avoid delay and disappointment, if, in their applications, they will give exact titles, as well as authorship, imprint, etc., and if they will, above all, write legibly.

It must be remembered that books published in foreign countries are purchased through the Library's agents in such countries, in order to avoid the duties, and to get as large a discount as possible; and hence an interval of at least six or eight weeks will occur between the time of ordering such works and that of their receipt; and, if they have to be bound before sending, as is usually the case with Continental publications, the delay will be considerably increased.

Be particular to give the place of publication, by country, if not more definitely, or great delay will sometimes happen by the order being sent to the wrong agents, although titles are verified before sending, as far as possible, and titles inaccurately given will sometimes have to be laid aside till time can be had for the necessary search.

Books from London, Paris, and Leipsic are received twice a month; from Florence, once a year.

Special students desiring to be informed when any book in their line of investigation is received at the Library can have word sent them, if they will communicate their name and address, and the subject of their inquiries, to the Superintendent; but, in such cases, books will not be retained subject to the call of the persons notified, as is done with books recommended.

# Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes, and are catalogued. It is intended in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These will be put on the shelves in boxes, and for the box the bound volume will be substituted, when the needful numbers are procured. Solicitations are renewed for lots of pamphlets, which will be sent for, on receiving information that they are ready. The chances are, that any miscellaneous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets wanted, and the others will avail in exchanges. The number of duplicate pamphlets is now upwards of 30,000, all arranged, and ready to be exchanged for others not belonging to the Library. With distant libraries, the following method of exchange has been found the most convenient : if they will send 1,000 pamphlets printed in their state, or in a given locality, this Library will send 1,000 printed in Massachusetts, or in some other locality. Each may acquire some duplicates, but a great part will probably be fresh accessions.

# Alterations of the Central Library Building.

The work in the Bates Hall is nearly completed, and the books will be as readily found as formerly, as soon as the necessary verification of the shelves by the shelf-lists can be made. Alterations in the Lower Hall are now in progress. The books in the galleries have been removed to cases on the floor; and a series of rooms will be made on the level of the old gallery.

The Central Reading Room has 398 different periodicals; the East Boston Branch Reading Room has 39; the South Boston Branch has 27.

#### Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

I. To use periodicals or books in the buildings. Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and, if above 16, may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. To take books away from the buildings. All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 16 years; all nonresident Clergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; all inhabitants, even if under 16, who have received certificates of graduation, medals, or Lawrence prizes, from the Public Schools; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall of the Central Library, and at the several Branches.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests), may take books for home use, in accordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trustees.

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A new Handbook for Readers has been printed.

A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT to the Bates Hall circulate like other books.

#### Bulletins.

A fresh list of accessions is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library, and for the few days that elapse before titles appear in print on the Bulletin board, the important new books are displayed (with the shelf numbers attached) in a glass case at the Desk. The lists for the Lower Hall and for the East Boston and South Boston Branches show only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19, and the present, No. 24, is the fifth number of the second volume. For sale (excepting those out of print) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; above 2110 in the Bates Hall. Those with E. B. and S. B. prefixed to the number are respectively in the East Boston and the South Boston Branch.

Those in print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1, 1871, and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do not contain such crossreferences, but only main entries, under authors, etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the necessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library have been inserted among the printed cards in their proper alphabetical places; and in due time it is hoped to embody with them, in the same way, the printed titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, from Vol. 1 of the Bulletins, and from the Lower Hall Class Lists, so that the public shall have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form, and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this Card Catalogue.

V. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted. in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue which is at present in manuscript.

### Engravings.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings is for sale at 5 cents. Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the Tosti collection of engravings which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints; and Bulletin 21 contains a list of the framed engravings, not portraits, in the Bates Hall.

This ConsoLIDATED BULLETIN, therefore, and the Card Catalogue, taken together, show all the additions, both under author and title, which have been made to the Lower Library since the publication of the several Class Lists.

OBSERVE. Many books properly belonging to the classes of the preceding Lists will be found in No. V, because they form one of a series or collection.

#### Central Periodical Reading Room.

A List of Periodicals currently received (nearly 800 in number, of which about one-half are kept in the Reading Room), was issued in September, 1870.

#### The Oatalogue System.

There are three things, one of which a person wanting a book must know, and the so-called Dictionary System (upon which all the Catalogues of the Boston Public Library are made) guides the average reader more readily than any other, as he always looks in the proper alphabetical place for the entry he is in search of. These three things are as follows:—

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work (if it is, the subject should be looked for rather than the title), search for it under the first word not an article.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a pseudonym, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific head, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the horse, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so, (as, for instance, Coins and Numismatics), but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher. Indeed, a multiplication of cross-references is a fundamental idea of the Dictionary System. This necessitates, of course, the disadvantage of turning from one part of the catalogue to another, but there is, on the other hand, a great advantage in the certainty of getting a clew somewhere, - a thing often impossible in a classified catalogue, except to such as have made its system a study.

#### Assistance to Readers

will be afforded by officers and attendants of the Library in the examination of the Catalogues, as far as other duties may permit; but it should be remembered that all in the Library have special duties, and no considerable portion of their time should be held at the exclusive disposal of any individual reader; and it is enjoined upon all visitors not to occupy the attendants' time with conversation of any other kind.

The titles from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library have been inserted among the printed cards in their proper alphabetical places; and in due time it is hoped to embody with them, in the same way, the printed titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, from Vol. 1 of the Bulletins, and from the Lower Hall Class Lists, so that the public shall have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form, and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this Card Catalogue.

VI. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue which is at present in manuscript.

### The Catalogue System.

There are three things, one of which a person wanting a book must know, and the so-called Dictionary System (upon which all the Catalogues of the Boston Public Library are made) guides the average reader more readily than any other, as he always looks in the proper alphabetical place for the entry he is in search of. These three things are as follows:---

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work, search for it under the first word not an article. Otherwise, the subject should be looked for rather than the title.

II. The cauthor. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a pseudonym, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific head, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the horse, for example, under such general heads as Natural History. Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so, (as, for instance, Coins and Numismatics), but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher.

#### Assistance to Readers

will be afforded by officers and attendants of the Library in the examination of the Catalogues, as far as other duties may permit; but it should be remembered that all in the Library have special duties, and no considerable portion of their time should be held at the exclusive disposal of any individual reader; and it is enjoined upon all visitors not to occupy the attendants' time with conversation of any other kind.

# Memoranda.

\*,\* A new list, embracing such of the Tosti engravings on the walls of the first floor as are framed and are not port; aits, with such others, bound or in portfolios, as have not already been included in previous lists [Bulletins 13, 15, and 21, and the separate Portrait List], will shortly be printed, completing the cataloguing of the entire collection.

\*\*\* A second edition of the Handbook for Readers will be put to press before the issue of the next Bulletin.

•s• A second edition of the Periodical List, showing what periodicals are received in the Reading Room of the Centra Library, and are kept bound on the shelves, is in press.

\*• A new edition of the Lower Hall Class List for works in History, Biography, and Travel will be issued during the summer. About half the work had been printed when the fire of November last destroyed it. This has occasioned a delay in publication. It will make about 300 pages, being 100 pages more than the original catalogue of *all* the works in the Lower Hall, issued in 1858; and it will have some new features in a popular catalogue, consisting of notes under important subject-headings, giving concisely the history of the literature of the subjects, with indications of the scope and purposes of particular books, the aim being to afford assistance to persons looking for books under subjects within the range of this Library will thus learn better how the two collections can be made to supplement one another.

\*.\* A second edition of the Chronological List of Historical Fiction has been prepared in a much enlarged form, and will be printed as soon as possible. The purpose of this list is to show what works in imaginative literature have been written illustrating epochs in national history, or are indicative of change of manners, etc.

\*s\* The cataloguing of the Ticknor (Spanish) Library is nearly half completed on cards, and the titles and crossreferences are inserted in the general Public Card Catalogue as fast as prepared. It is thought, that, with the necessity of keeping up in the first place the current cataloguing of the general library, another year will be necessary to complete this work, when a monograph volume will be prepared. The cataloguing is done with more minuteness than is usual with the ordinary accessions, collations and other bibliographical information being given in frequent cases, and much of value in Mr. Ticknor's manuscript notes on the fly-leaves of the books being embodied.

\*\*\* The twenty-first Annual Report of the Library, covering the year closing on the 30th of April, will be issued before the printing of another Bulletin. It will show about 80,000 more issues than the last year's, or about 470,000 issues in all; \*,\* Statistics of attendance in the Periodical Reading Rooms on the eight Sundays that they have been open, from 2 P. M. to 9 P. M., show, that, for the Central Reading Room there has been an average of about 540 magazines issued each Sunday, or an average of 77 each hour. • The largest attendance in the afternoon has been at 4 o'clock, and in the evening at 8 o'clock.

\*, \* The committee appointed to examine the Library the present year consists of the Hon. George S. Hillard, chairman, with the following cluzens: the Hon. Benjamin Dean, Eben D. Jordan, Esq., Charles C. Smith. Esq., Henry A. Whitney, Esq., and the Rev. George H. Vibbert.

\*,\* The Library is without its usual Italian involce this year, as the vessel on which it was shipped was wrecked on the reefs of Bermuda, and the case was lost. The books were insured; but they included a set of the Italian public documents since 1848, which it will be difficult to replace.

\*,\* The building for the Roxbury Branch, on Millmont Street, will probably be completed and the Library opened about the 1st of July; the portion of it belonging to the Fellowes Athenseum being furnished at the outset with a class of books such as, among the general purchases, are put in the Bates Hall of the Central Library. The Trustees of the Athenseum have appropriated \$3,000 for that purpose. It is thought that the Branch will have in both departments, when opened, about 6,000 volumes.

\*.\* A complete set of the catalogues and documents of the Library, in eight volumes, has been sent to the Vienna Exposition.

# Books Recommended, and Books Received.

Any person desiring a book not in the possession of this Library may ask, on blanks furnished for the purpose, that it may be purchased; and the assurance is given. that, unless there is some special reason why it should not be ordered. It will be procured as soon as possible, and the applicant — in all cases where the book is absolutely bought upon his recommendation — will be notified of its reception. If *duplicates for the Lower Hall or for the Branches* are asked for, they will be ordered, provided the circulation of the present copies warrants such additions. In asking that a duplicate shall be purchased, the applicant will be particular to designate it as such. Copies are not duplicated in the Bates Hall.

Those availing themselves of this privilege will greatly contribute to avoid delay and disappointment, if, in their applications, they will give exact titles, as well as authorship, imprint, etc., and if they will, above all, write legibly.

It must be remembered that books published in foreign countries are purchased through the Library's agents in such countries. in order to avoid the duties, and to get as large a discount as possible; and hence an interval of at least six or eight weeks will occur between the time of ordering such works and that of their receipt; and, if they have to be bound before sending, as is usually the case with Continental publications, the delay will be considerably increased.

F Be particular to give the place of publication, by country, if not more definitely, or great delay will sometimes happen by the order being sent to the wrong signate, although titles are verified before sending, as far as possible, and fittes inaccurately given will sometimes have to be haid aske till time can be had for the necessary search.

Books from London, Paris, and Leipsle are received twice a month; from Florence, once a year.

Special students desiring to be informed when any book in their line of investigation is received at the Library can have word sent them, if they will communicate their name and address, and the subject of their inquiries, to the Superintendent; but, in such cases, books will not be retained subject to the call of the persons notified, as is done with books recommended.

# Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes, and are catalogued. It is intended in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These will be put on the shelves in boxes, and for the box the bound volume will be substituted, when the needful numbers are procured. Solicitations are renewed for lots of pamphlets. which will be substituted, when the needful numbers are rrady. The chances are, that any miscellaneous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets wanted, and the others will avail in exchanges. The number of duplicate pamphlets is now upwards of 30,000, all arranged, and ready to be exchanged för others not belonging to the Library. With distant libraries, the following method of exchange has been found the most convenient: if they will seud 1,000 pamphlets printed in their state, or in a given locality, this Library will seend 1,000 printed in Massachusetts, or in some other locality. Each may acquire some duplicates, but a great part will probably be fresh accessions.

# Memorials of Boston.

The Public Library of the city should contain every memorial, whether book, pamphlet, map, broadside, print, photograph, or the like, which is procurable, and which in any way illustrates the history or topography of the city. Books printed in Boston at an early date are very desirable acquisitions; and it is to be hoped that friends of the Library will assist in making the collection complete.

# Engraved Portraits.

Portfolios and acrap-books have been prepared for the preservation of engraved portraits, and any contribution of this kind will be gladly accepted. Particular attention will be paid to the gathering of likenesses of Bostonians.

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### Days and Hours, etc.

All departments are open every secular day, except the five legal holidays. — February 22, Fast Day, July 4, Thanksgiving, and Christmas, — and such other days as the Trustees may direct. The Reading Rooms for periodicals in the Central Library and in the Branches are open Sundays from 2 P. M. to 9 P. M.

Etent of the Collections. The Bates Hall contains 161,000 volumes; the Lower Hall, 33,000 volumes; the Newspaper Room, 2,200 volumes; the East Boston Branch, 7,300 volumes; the South Boston Branch, 5,300 volumes; the Roxbury Branch 5,000 volumes, — a total (including 8,200 sale duplicates) of 222,000 volumes, besides 113,000 pamphlets.

The Central Reading Room has 399 different periodicals; the East Boston Branch Reading Room has 39; the South Boston Branch has 37; the Roxbury Branch has 36.

### Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

I. To use periodicals or books in the buildings. Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and, if above 16, may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. To take books away from the buildings. All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 16 years; all nonresident Clergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; all inhabitants, even if under 16, who have received certificates of graduation, medals, or Lawrence prizes, from the Public Schools; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall of the Central Library, and at the several Branches.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests), may take books for home use, in accordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trustees.

A new edition of the Handbook for Readers has just been issued.

# CATALOGUES.

Note. — Copies of the printed Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's Desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the Branches.

A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT of the Bates Hall circulate like other books.

#### Bulletins.

A fresh list of accessions is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library, and for the few days that elapse before titles appear in print on the Bulletin board, the important new books are displayed (with the shelf numbers attached) in a glass case at the Desk. The lists for the Lower Hall and for the East Boston and South Boston Branches show only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19, and the present, No. 26, is the seventh number of the second volume. For sale (excepting those out of print) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; above 2110 in the Bates Hall. Those with K. B. and S. B. prefixed to the number are respectively in the East Boston and the South Boston Branch.

IV. THE CONSOLIDATED BULLETIN (kept at the Desk). Combines in one alphabet the titles contained in the twentyfour printed Bulletins which have been issued since October, 1867, and shows the more important books added to the Bates Hall of the Library since August 31, of that year; also, all books added to the Lower Hall since the issue of the first editions of the several Finding Lists; and all books added to the Branches since the issue of their respective catalogues. It has no entries under subjects.

V. PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE. The printed cards, together with those in manuscript in the same drawers, show the books added to the Bates Hall since 1866. Those in print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1. 1871. and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do not contain such crossreferences, but only main entries, under authors, etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the necessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library have been inserted in their proper alphabetical places; and in due time it is hoped to embody with them, in the same way, the printed titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, from Vol. 1 of the Bulletins, and from the Lower Hall Class Lists, so that the public shall have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form, and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this Card Catalogue.

VI. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consuited, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue which is at present in manuscript.

## Engravings.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings is for sale at 5 cents. Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the same collection which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5.100 prints; Bulletin 21 contains a list of the framed engravings, not portraits, in the Bates Hall; and a separate Supplementary List, *lately issued*, completes the cataloguing of the entire collection.

### The Catalogue System.

There are three things, one of which a person wanting a book must know, and the so-called Dictionary System (upon which all the Catalogues of the Boston Public Library are made) guides the average reader more readily than any other. as he always looks in the proper alphabetical place for the entry he is in search of. These three things are as follows:—

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work, search for it under the first word not an article. Otherwise, the subject should be looked for rather than the title.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a pseudonym, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific head, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the horse, for example, under such general heads as Natural History. Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so, (as Coins and Numismatics), but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher.

### Assistance to Readers

will be afforded by officers and attendants of the Library in examining the Catalogues, as far as other duties may permit; but it should be remembered that all in the Library have special duties, and no considerable portion of their time should be held at the exclusive disposal of any one reader.

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The building for the Roxbury Branch, on Millmont Street, having been finished, the Trustees of the Fellowes Athenseum put it informally in charge of the Public Library on the 16th of June, and preparations were at ouce made for occupancy. The books were removed to it from the Central Library June 20th and 21st, and on the 23d the Reading Room for Periodicals was opened to the public, and the registration of applicants for cards was begun.

On the 9th of July, formal dedicatory services took place in the building, at which His Honor, the Mayor of the City, presided. After a prayer by the Reverend A. C. Thompson, D.D., the delivery of the keys was made by John F. Osgood, Esq., of the Building Committee of the Fellowes Athenseum, and they were received by the President of the Trustees of the Public Library.

William C. Collar, Esq., one of the Fellowes Trustees, then delivered an address commemorative of Caleb Fellowes, the founder of the Athenaum, making reference to the abserce, enforced by the state of his health, of the Reverend Doctor Putnam, who is both President of the Fellowes Trustees, and a member of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library; to the death of Doctor Henry Bartlett, one of the Fellowes Trustees; and to the disinterested endeavors of S. C. Thwing, Esq., Treasurer of the Fellowes Trustees, to whom much of the success of the Athenaum had been due.

The addresses were closed with some timely remarks by the Honorable George S. Hillard, of the Public Library Trustees, in which he called upon the fathers and mothers of the youth of the city to lend their assistance in the efforts which the Trustees are making to direct to better ends the reading of the younger portion of the community.

An account of these proceedings will be printed by the Trustees of the Fellowes Athenseum.

The full service of the Library began with the delivery of the books, which, after all arrangements were completed, first took place on Wednesday the 16th of July.

The Branch opens with about 5,000 volumes on the shelves, of which upwards of a thousand of the more costly ones were furnished by the Fellowes Athenseum. A Catalogue is in press, and will be ready late in the summer.

# The Barton Library.

The Barton Library, which is described in Doctor Wynne's Libraries of New York, has been purchased. It consists of a Shakespearian department of about 2,000 volumes, illustrative of that dramatist, and of his literary and dramatic associations, both in his own day and in subsequent periods, and in his own and in foreign countries, together with a supplemental collection of engravings and autographs, besides a cast of Shakespeare's head from the Stratford monument, and a statuette of Richard the Third, one of the early works of Rogers. This portion of the Barton Library is by far the richest of all the Shakespearian Collections in America, and, with the volumes illustrating this subject already in the possession of the Public Library, makes an aggregation of not far from 3.000 volumes. It will take high rank among similar collections in Burope, and it is supposed that there cannot be much richer ones than this even there, if the Capell Collection of Trinity College, Cambridge, and that of the British Museum be excluded. The newly founded Shakespearian Library of Birmingham, forming a part of the Public Library of that city, now embraces not far from 5.000 volumes, being more than twice the extent of the Barton Shakespenrian Collection; but, — judging from that portion of the catalogue which is already printed it is not nearly so rich in the rarer and more costly books, the strength of the Birmingham collection, which is jin excess of the Barton possessions, lying, it would seem, mainly in the foreign translations and commentaries, more particularly the modern ones, which have been very numerous since 1864, when Mr. Barton ceased to collect. What has been published since that date however has very largely been purchased from time to time by the Boston Public Library.

The remainder of the Barton Library consists of perhaps 10,000 volumes, quite broadly selected, but characterized by the scholarly taste and the fine appreciation of the typographical art which so much influenced Mr. Barton in the formation of his library. The peculiar strength of this general department lies also in the drama; while French next to English is the language in which the collector took the most interest.

The books have all been safely received, except about 1,500 volumes, which were sent directly to Paris from New York, for binding, and also several hundred volumes which Mrs. Barton was allowed to retain during her life-time, but which will now be shortly received by the Library, as Mrs. Barton's death occurred, very suddenly, only two days after the delivery was completed.

An assortment of the books is now taking place as rapidly as possible, preparatory to their final arrangement on the shelves. It is the purpose of the Library ultimately to print a separate catalogue of the entire collection.

An account of its acquisition will be found in the Annual Report of the Library, which is now in press.

# Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes, and are catalogued. It is intended in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These will be put on the shelves in boxes, and for the box the bound volume will be substituted, when the needful numbers are procured. Solicitations are renewed for lots of pamphlets, which will be substituted, when the needful numbers are erady. The chances are, that any misecliancous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets wanted, and the others will avail in exchanges. The number of duplicate pamphlets is now upwards of 30,000, all arranged, and ready to be exchanged for others not belonging to the Library. With distant libraries, the following method of exchange has been found the most convenient: if they will send 1,000 pamphlets printed in their state, or in a given locality, this Library will send 1,000 printed in Massachusetts, or in some other locality. Each may acquire some duplicates, but a great part will probably be fresh accessions.

# Memorials of Boston.

The Public Library of the city should contain every memorial, whether book, pamphlet, map, broadside, print. photograph, or the like, which is procurable, and which in any way illustrates the history or topography of the city. Books printed in Boston at an early date are very desirable acquisitions; and it is to be hoped that friends of the Library will assist in making the collection complete.

Extent of the Collections. The Bates Hall contains 164,000 volumes; the Lower Hall, 33,000 volumes; the Newspaper Room, 2,200 volumes; the East Boston Branch, 7,600 volumes; the South Boston Branch, 5,400 volumes; the Roxbury Branch 5,300 volumes, — a total (including 8,300 sale duplicates) of 225,000 volumes, besides 123,000 pamphlets.

The Central Reading Room has 405 different periodicals; the East Boston Branch Reading Room has 39; the South Boston Branch has 37; the Roxbury Branch has 62.

### Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

I. To use periodicals or books in the buildings. Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and, if above 16, may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. To take books away from the buildings. All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 16 years; all nonresident Clergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; all inhabitants, even if under 16, who have received certificates of graduation, medals, or Lawrence prizes, from the Public Schools; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall of the Central Library, and at the several Branches.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests), may take books for home use, in accordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trustees.

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# CATALOGUES.

Note. — Copies of the printed Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's Desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the Branches.

A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT of the Bates Hall circulate like other books.

#### Bulletins.

A fresh list of accessions is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library, and for the few days that elapse before titles appear in print on the Bulletin board, the important new books are displayed (with the shelfnumbers attached) in a glass case at the Desk. The lists for the Lower Hall and for the Branches ahow only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19, and the present, No. 27, is the eighth number of the second volume. For sale (excepting those out of print) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; above 2110 in the Bates Hall. Those with E. B., S. B., and ROX. prefixed to the number are respectively in the East Boston, South Boston, and Roxbury Branches. [The next Bulletin will contain Roxbury books.]

It has no entries under subjects.

V. PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE. The printed cards, together with those in manuscript in the same drawers, show the books added to the Bates Hall since 1866. Those in print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1, 1871, and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do not contain such crossreferences, but only main entries, under authors, etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the necessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library, and from Lower Hall Class List No. III., have been inserted in their proper alphabetical places. In due time it is hoped to embody with them, in the same way, the printed titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, from Vol. 1 of the Bulletins, and from the other Lower Hall Class Lists, so that the public shall have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form, and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this Card Catalogue.

VI. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue which is at present in manuscript.

## Engravings.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings is for sale at 5 cents. Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the same collection which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints; Bulletin 21 contains a list of the framed engravings, not portraits, in the Bates Hall; and a separate Supplementary List, *lately issued*, completes the cataloguing of the entire collection.

# The Catalogue System.

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work, search for it under the first word not an article. Otherwise, the subject should be looked for rather than the title.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a fictitious one, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific head, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the horse, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so (as Coins and Numismatics), but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher.

#### Assistance to Readers

will be afforded by officers and attendants of the Library in examining the Catalogues, as far as other duties may permit; but it should be remembered that all in the Library have special duties, and no considerable portion of their time should be held at the exclusive disposal of any one reader.

### Memoranda.

\*.\* The City Council has already taken action looking to the establishment of a Branch in Dorchester, which, in 1670, had a population of 12,261.

\*\*\* By the action of the people in accepting the acts for the annexation of Brighton and Charlestown, the Public Library of the former town, containing 10,000 volumes, together with a costly new building now erecting, becomes a Branch of this Library, on the first Monday in January next; and that of Charlestown, containing 15,000 volumes, also becomes a Branch in May next.

\*\*\* The Periodical Reading Room of the Central Library is now kept open till 10 o'clock Sunday evenings, - the large number of readers at 9 o'clock, rendering it desirable to delay the hour of closing.

\*\*\* The following institutions have agreed to protect the Library from loss by any use of it on the part of their members, and by vote of the Trustees, said members, though non-resident, are granted cards for drawing out books : -

\*.\* A catalogue of the books in the Roxbury Branch, including those belonging to the Fellowes Athensoum, has been issued; and it is for sale at the Branch Library, at 30 cents. Books of the higher class will be added for the present to that part of the collection belonging to the Fellowes Athenseum, at an average monthly expenditure of two hundred dollars. The use of this Branch approximates already, relatively to population, the use of the older Branches. During September one person in six and a quarter of the population used its books, while in East Boston it was one in a little less than five; and at South Boston one in five and a third. # Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes, and are catalogued. It is intended in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These will be put on the shelves in boxes, and for the box the bound volume will be substituted, when the needful numbers are procured. Solicitations are renewed for lots of pamphlets, which will be sent for, on receiving information that they are ready. The chances are, that any miscellaneous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets wanted, and the others will avail in exchanges. The number of duplicate pamphlets is now upwards of 30,000, all arranged, and ready to be exchanged for others not belonging to the Library. With distant libraries, the following method of exchange has been found the most convenient: if they will send 1,000 pamphlets printed in their state, or in a given locality, this Library will send 1,000 printed in Massachusetts, or in some other locality. Each may acquire some duplicates, but a great part will probably be fresh accessions.

All departments are open every secular day, except the five legal holidays, - February 22, Fast Day, July 4, Thanksgiving, and Christmas, - and such other days as the Trustees may direct. The Reading Rooms for Periodicals are open on Sundays at 2 P. M., and close at the Central Library at 10 P. M.; and at the Branches at 9 P. M.

Bates Hall, 9 A. M. to 6 P. M. (winter); to 7 P. M. (summer). Lower Hall, 9 A. M. to 9 P. M. Books rec'd after 8.30 A. M. Central Reading Room, 9 A. M. to 10 P. M.

Branches. 9 A. M. to 9 P. M., except East Boston, which closes at 8 P. M. every day but Saturdays, and Brighton, which is open from 8 to 6 and from 7 to 9 P. M.

Extent of the Collections. The Bates Hall contains 166,000 volumes; the Lower Hall, 34,000 volumes; the Newspaper Room, 2,200 volumes ; the East Boston Branch, 8,000 volumes ; the South Boston Branch, 6,000 volumes ; the Roxbury Branch 6,000 volumes; the Charlestown Branch, 16,000 volumes; the Brighton Branch, 11,000 volumes, - a total (including 9,000 sale duplicates) of 258,200 volumes, besides 130,000 pamphlets.

The Central Reading Room has 405 different periodicals; the East Boston Branch Reading Room has 39; the South Boston Branch has 37; the Roxbury Branch has 62; the Charlestown Branch has 76; the Brighton Branch has 18.

Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

I. To use periodicals or books in the buildings. Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. To take books away from the buildings. All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 14 years; all nonresident Clergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; all inhabitants who have received certificates of graduation, medals, or Lawrence prizes, from the Public Schools; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall of the Central Library, and at the several Branches.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests) may take books for home use, in accordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trustees.

Bates Hall books can be applied for at the several Branches. For further particulars see Hundbook for Readers, distributed gratis.

# CATALOGUES.

Note. -- Copies of the printed Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's Desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the Branches.

A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT of the Bates Hall circulate like other books.

#### Bulletins.

A fresh *list of accessions* is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library, and for the few days that elapse before titles appear in print on the Bulletin board, the important new books are displayed (with the shelfnumbers attached) in a glass case at the Deak. The lists for the Lower Hall and for the Branches abow only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19, and the present, No. 28, is the ninth number of the second volume. For sale ("reepting those out of print) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; above 2110 in the Bates Hall. Trose with E. B., S. B., Rox., and Chn. prefixed to the number are respectively in the East Boston, South Boston, Boxbury, and Charlestown Branches.

It has no ensities under subjects.

V. PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE. The printed cards, together with those in manuscript in the same drawers, show the books added to the Bates Hall since 1866. Those in print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1, 1871, and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do not contain such crossreferences, but only main entries, under authors, etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the accessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library, and from Lower Hall Class List No. III, have been inserted in their proper alphabetical places. In due time it is hoped to embody with them, in the same way, the printed titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, from Vol. 1 of the Bulletins, and from the other Lower Hall Class Lists, so that the public shall have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form, and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this Card Catalogue.

VI. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue which is at present in manuscript.

## Engravings.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings has been printed, but the edition is now exhausted. Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the same collection which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints; Bulletin 21 contains a list of the framed engravings, not portraits, in the Bates Hall; and a separate Supplementary List completes the cataloguing of the entire collection.

#### The Catalogue System.

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work, search for it under the first word not an article. Otherwise, the subject should be looked for rather than the title.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a fictitious one, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific head, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inamuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the horse, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so (as Coins and Numismatics), but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher.

# Charlestown Branch.

The following correspondence will show, that, in all matters in which the public have an interest, the Public Library of Charlestown becomes a Branch of this Library on the 5th of January. The correspondence otherwise defines the policy of the Trustees.

#### PUBLIC LIBRARY,

CHARLESTOWN, Nov. 15, 1873.

DEAR SIE: — The Act uniting Charlestown with Boston provides, that "the Charlestown Public Library with all the books and documents which now or hereafter may belong thereto, shall be continued and kept within the present limits of said city; and it shall have the benefit of all gifts and legacies made heretofore or hereafter in its behalf." The reason for this we explained fully to you on your visit to our Library some little time since. The Act also provides for the continuance of the Board of Trustees until the first Monday of May next, the time when a new Board of Trustees for your Library will be organized.

In regard to the provision first named, we are glad to know that it in no way conflicts with the policy of your Board in relation to all your Branches, as we understand you to be desirous that they should be made, as much as possible, matters of local pride, and as respects the other provision, we see no reason why, practically, the management of our Library cannot be in your hands after the first Monday in January; and our Librarian is already instructed to make arrangements with your Superintendent to this effect; and we seend you this communication that you may fully understand that it is our desire to put the library, as far as possible, under your control at the time the Act to unite the two cities takes effect.

> PUBLIC LIBRARY, BOSTON, 29 November, 1873.

DEAR SIR: - I have the honor to acknowledge, on behalf of the Trustees of the Public Library, the receipt of your esteemed favor of the 15th inst., containing certain statements and proposals in relation to the administration of the Charlestown Public Library.

At a meeting of the Board held this day, I was requested on their part to accede to your proposals and to agree to administer the affairs of your Library from the first Monday in January next, upon the system now in use in the other Branches of our institution, with the exception of such matters of detail as cannot be transferred by you until the first Monday of May, 1874, under the provisions of the Act uniting Boston and Charlestown. This we understand to be the desire of your Board, and we will endeavor in the mean time, with your assistance, to continue the work of preparation, so that when the first Monday of January arrives, your people will have not only their accustomed access to their own Library, but will also at the same time find the doors of the Central Library open to them as freely as to the present inhabitants of Boston.

So far as this Board of Trustees was concerned, no act of the Legislature was required to provide that the Charlestown Library should have "the benefits of all gifts and legacies made heretofore or hereafter in its behalf." In the establishment of the Branches of the Library already in existence, or to be created hereafter, it is the conceded policy of the City of Boston to place in its different districts such collections of books of a popular and useful character as shall possess general interest, leaving the purchase of a large class of works of a permanent value, like those upon the shelves of our Bates Hall, to the public spirit of the neighborhood, to whose convenience and instruction each Branch ministers. As was observed in the recent conference with your Board, it is our hope that every Branch shall be made a subject of local pride, and shall increase largely by donations and bequests. In such cases of benevolence, it will be equally the duty as well as the pleasure of this Board to endeavor to carry out faithfully the instructions of the donors. Indeed, in this manner, the large Central Library has been most signally benefited, to the grateful acceptance of the Trustees, and to the inestimable advantage of our fellow-citizens. While each Branch may be thus enriched, it will not, in any manner, interfere with the progress of the great reference library, conveniently and naturally placed in the heart of the city.

That the excellent collection of books heretofore provided and sustained by the intelligence and liberality of the citizens of Charlestown shall continue to increase in value and usefulness, is the earnest desire of its new Trustees.

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As will be seen on the first page of this Bulletin the hours of access for the public, to the Charlestown Branch, have been arranged in accordance with the established usage of the Roxbury and South Boston Branches.

The printed Catalogues of the Charlestown Library cover all accessions down to July 1, 1872. All since that date appear in the present Bulletin, with Chm. before the shelf number; and this fact accounts for the predominance of Charlestown titles. Accessions to this Branch will continue to be designated in the same manner in subsequent Bulletins.

# Brighton Branch.

The Act uniting Brighton with Boston makes no special mention of the Holton Library, the free public library maintained by the citizens of that town, and named after its principal benefactor. The hours during which that Library has been open to the public will be maintained for the present. The new building, now in process of erection, will not probably be ready for occupancy until the spring.

The Library becomes a department of the Public Library of Boston, with a nearly complete Catalogue of its books, in print, up to the date of union. All future additions, including 235 volumes of expensive books, purchased with the balance of the Holton Fund, remaining unexpended, will appear in these Bulletins, and may be known by the abbreviation **Bri**, prefixed to the shelf number of the books. The recent purchase above named, for want of shelf room has been boxed, awaiting the removal to the new building.

# Roxbury Branch.

Since the issue of the last Bulletin the Catalogue of this Branch has been printed. Subsequent accessions appear in this Bulletin, with Rox. before the shelf number. The accession of the most expensive books to that part of the Branch known as the Fellowes Athenseum has numbered 524 volumes since June 1st.

# Important Notice to Card-holders.

The rule requiring immediate notice of change of residence or address is not observed as it should be. The ramification of the Library system through its Branches renders the omission to do so a serious matter, both as regards trouble and expense. It is hoped that it will not be necessary to exact the penalty of forfeiture of card. It has also become necessary that residents in out-lying districts of the city, where the numbering of houses does not exist, should give as exactly as possible the locality of their houses.

# Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes, and are catalogued. It is intended in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These will be put on the shelves in boxes, and for the bout the bound volume will be substituted, when the needful numbers are procured. Solicitations are renewed for lots of pamphlets, which will be substituted, when the needful numbers are ready. The chances are, that any miscellaneous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets wanted, and the others will avail in exchanges. The number of duplicate pamphlets is now upwards of 30,000, all arranged, and ready to be exchanged for others not belonging to the Library. With distant libraries, the following method of exchange has been found the most convenient: if they will send 1,000 pamphlets printed in their state, or in a given locality, this Library will send 1,000 printed in Massachusetts, or in some other locality. Each may acquire some duplicates, but a great part will probably be fresh accessions.

#### Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

MISS SARAH C. GODBOLD, Librarian, East Boston.

JOSEPH SYKES, Keeper, Bates Hall.

I. To use periodicals or books in the buildings. Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. To take books away from the buildings. All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 14 years; all nonresident Ciergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; all inhabitants who have received certificates of graduation, medals, or Lawrence prizes, from the Public Schools; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall of the Central Library, and at the several Branches.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests) may take books for home use, in socordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trustees.

Bates Hall books can be applied for at the several Branches.

For further particulars see Handbook for Readers, distributed gratis.

# CATALOGUES.

Note. - Copies of the printed Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the Branches.

A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT of the Bates Hall circulate like other books.

#### Bulletins.

A fresh list of accessions is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library, and for the few days that elapse before titles appear in print on the Bulletin board, the important new books are displayed (with the shelfnumbers attached) in a glass case at the Desk. The lists for the Lower Hall and for the Branches show only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19, and the present. No. 29, is the tenth number of the second volume. For sale (excepting those out of print) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; above 2110 in the Bates Hall. Those with E. B., S. B., Rox., Chn., and Bri. prefixed to the number are respectively in the East Boston, South Boston, Roxbury, Charlestown, and Brighton Branches.

IV. The CONSOLIDATED BULLETIN (kept at the Desk). Combines in one alphabet, the titles contained in the twentyeight printed Bulletins which have been issued since October, 1867, and shows the more important books added to the Bates Hall of the Library since August 31, of that year; also, all books added to the Lower Hall since the issue of the first editions of the several Finding Lists; and all books added to the Branches since the issue of their respective catalogues. It has no entries under subjects.

V. PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE. The printed cards, together with those in manuscript in the same drawers, show the books added to the Bates Hall since 1866. Those in print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1, 1871, and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do not contain such crossreferences, but only main entries, under authors, etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the necessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library, and from Lower Hall Class List No. III, have been inserted in their proper alphabetical places. In due time it is hoped to embody with them, in the same way, the printed titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, from Vol. 1 of the Bulletins, and from the other Lower Hall Class Lists, so that the public shall have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form, and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this Card Catalogue.

VI. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue which is at present in manuscript.

#### Engravings.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings has been printed, but the edition is now exhausted. Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the same collection which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints; Bulletin 21 contains a list of the framed engravings, not portraits, in the Bates Hall; and a separate Supplementary List completes the cataloguiug of the entire collection.

These printed entries have been cut out of the various Bulletins, and inserted in alphabetical order in a book, which is in the custody of the Clerk, and which can be consulted on application to him. This CON-SOLIDATED BULLETIN, therefore, and the Card Catalogue, taken together, show all the additions, both under author and title, which have been made to the Lower Library since the publication of the several Class Lists.

OBSERVE. Many books properly belonging to the classes of the preceding Lists will be found in No. V, because they form one of a series or collection.

#### Branches.

Catalogues are for sale; - East Boston, 15 cents; South Boston, 15 cents; Roxbury, 30 cents; Charlestown, 25 cents each, parts 1 and 2; and Brighton, 25 cents, for the main Catalogue (including first Supplement), and 5 cents for each of the two subsequent Supplements.

The Bulletins since the issues of the Branch Catalogues, constitute supplements to those several lists.

#### Central Periodical Reading Room.

A List of Periodicals currently received (nearly 800 in number, of which about one-half are kept in the Reading Room) has just been issued. For sale at 5 cents.

#### The Oatalogue System.

There are three things, one of which a person wanting a book must know, and the so-called Dictionary System (upon which all the Catalogues of the Boston Public Library are made) guides the average reader more readily than any other, as he always looks in the proper alphabetical place for the entry he is in search of. These three things are as follows :--

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work, search for it under the first word not an article. Otherwise, the subject should be looked for rather than the title.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a fictitious one, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific head. and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the horse, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammais, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so (as Coins and Numismatics), but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher.

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#### The Central Library.

A plan has been matured for enlarging the south-west tower of the Central Library building, by which additional room for the Library bindery will be gained; also, separate rooms for the Barton and Prince Collections; much-needed accommodations for the library of American and foreign Patent drawings and specifications; together with a Catalogue room and other official quarters.

It is in view, also, to paint the main halls of the building; but arrangements will be made so that the work will interfere as little as possible with the use of the Library.

#### The Branches.

By the authority of the Trustees of the Fellowes Athenseum, about \$250 a month will be spent for buying for the Roxbury Branch a class of books such as are put in the Bates Hall of the Central Library. It is expected that the Brighton Branch Library will be moved into the new building, now in progress, during the coming summer. An enlargement of the quarters of the Charlestown Branch is also contemplated during the present season. Arrangements are also making for the establishment of a Branch in Dorchester.

### The Ticknor Library.

It is expected to have the cataloguing of this Spanish library completed before July. During the summer progress will be made in revising the titles for the press; and it is hoped that it will be presented to the public in a printed volume by the beginning of another year. It is thought that this work will be of great value to all students of Spanish literature, and also to bibliographers generally, as it has been prepared with great care, gives a full collation of the books, and is enriched with many interesting and valuable notes, not a few of which are by Mr. Ticknor, and have never before been printed.

The Library would like to open communication with possessors in this country of rare Spanish and Portuguese books, in order that the final revision of the Catalogue may derive advantage from collation of copies.

### Increased Use of the Libraries.

Notwithstanding five Branches afford additional means to the public of drawing books for use at home, beyond what existed in 1871, the circulation of the Central Library is still larger than before this competition was established. A thousand volumes during March, 1874, were delivered, both in the Bates Hall and in the Lower Hall, over the number of issues in those departments in March, 1871, when no Branch existed. The month of March, 1874, also showed a larger use at the East Boston and South Boston Branches than in the same month of preceding years. During that month the use of the Charlestown Branch — which before this year had an independent organization — was 800 more than ever before for the same month. The crowded state of the shelves at the Brighton Branch in its present location, has prevented the accessions to that library necessary to maintain a proportional increase of use, and accordingly the circulation during March dropped over 200 from the use of last March.

### Books Recommended, and Books Received.

Any person desiring a book not in the possession of this Library may ask, on blanks firmished for the purpose, that it may be purchased; and the assurance is given, that the book will be procured as soon as possible, unless there is some reason for not buying it; and, on its arrival, it will be retained three days for the person recommending it, to whom due notice will be sent by mail. It is not intended. however, to allow applicants to secure the first reading of popular books by recommending them before publication; as such books are purchased irrespective of all recommendations.

The right book may fail to come, if this application is not *legibly* filled in, and correctly, as regards title, author, etc.; and there may be delays in ordering, if obscure penmanship or insufficient or erroneous data render the labor of verification fruitless or uncertain.

Foreign books (even though with American title-pages), to avoid duties and to gain an increased discount, must be bought through agents abroad, and six or eight weeks, or a longer time must elapse before their arrival. Additional delays take place when the book needs to be bound, as is usually the case with continental publications, or when recommendations are received just after the despatch of orders, particularly as regards foreign books.

When the book is out of print (and books still standing in current catalogues are often so) no positive assurance of its speedy procurement can be given. The judgment of the necessity of buying duplicates must be based upon the Library's records of circulation. Bates Hall books are not duplicated; but other copies, or copies of cheaper editions, are sometimes put in the popular departments.

If the books are recommended by those not holding cards, no claim for special use can be established, even if they are bought on such recommendation.

American orders are despatched almost daily; English, French and German only weekly or fortnightly, and those to Italy only once a year.

Special students desiring to be informed when any book in their line of investigation is received at the Library can have word sent them, if they will communicate their name and address, and the subject of their inquiries, to the Superintendent; but, in such cases, books will not be retained subject to the call of the persons notified, as is done with books recommended.

### Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes, and are catalogued. It is intended in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These will be put on the shelves in boxes, and for the box the bound volume will be substituted, when the needful numbers are procured. Solicitations are reneved for lots of pamphlets, which will be sent for, on receiving information that they are ready. The chances are, that any miscellaneous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets wanted, and the others will avail in exchanges. The number of duplicate pamphlets is now upwards of 30,000, all arranged, and ready to be exchanged for others not belonging to the Library. With distant libraries, the following method of exchange has been found the most convenient: if they will send 1,000 pamphlets printed in their state, or in a given locality, this Library will send 1,000 printed in Massachusetts, or in some other locality. Each may acquire some duplicates, but a great part will probably be fresh accessions.

### Memorials of Boston.

The Public Library of the city should contain every memorial, whether book, pamphlet, map, broadside, print, photograph, or the like, which is procurable, and which in any way illustrates the history or topography of the city. Books printed in Boston at an early date are very desirable acquisitions; and it is to be hoped that friends of the Library will assist in making the collection complete.

### Engraved Portraits.

Portfolios and scrap-books have been prepared for the preservation of engraved portraits, and any contribution of this kind will be gladly accepted. Particular attention will be paid to the gathering of likenesses of Bostonians.

### Important Notice to Card-holders.

The rule requiring immediate notice of change of residence or address is not observed as it should be. The ramification of the Library system through its Branches renders the omission to do so a serious matter, both as regards trouble and expense. It is hoped that it will not be necessary to exact the penalty of forfeiture of card. It has also become necessary that residents in out-lying districts of the city, where the numbering of houses does not exist, should give as exactly as possible the locality of their houses.

### Sir Walter Scott's Edition of Shakespeare.

In the recent life of Archibald Constable, the Edinburgh publisher, precise information is given, it is thought for the first time, that Sir Walter Scott, in conjunction with Lockhart, contemplated the publication of an edition of Shakespeare. The plan secmed to have been suggested in a letter from Constable to Scott, February, 1822, asking for an edition in twelve or fourteen volumes, with readable and amusing notes, having an introductory volume to contain the life, etc.. and the suggestion was accompanied by the intimation that there was only one individual for such a work. Scott took the hint, and in reply acknowledged the necessity for a "sensible Shakespeare," but thought that it would require more time and patience than he had, and was too sure to disappoint expectation, if his name was connected with it. He became gradually more inclined to it, "with my son Lockhart's assistance for the fag," and it seemed finally to be determined that Scott's labor should be mostly confined to the introductory volume, which was to appear last. The only other mention is under date of September 20, 1825, when Constable informs Scott that "Shakespeare is getting on." Constable's son adds that " three volumes of the edition were completed before the sad crisis in 1826, but then laid aside; and ultimately, I have been told, *the sheets were sold in London as waste paper !* It is even doubted whether one copy be now in existence."

The account of the Barton collection, which was printed fifteen years ago, contained the earliest public mention, it is believed, of the supposition that Scott ever engaged in such a work, which this life of Constable now renders certain. These later corroborative statements give a peculiar interest to the volumes which are now in the Boston Fublic Library, and which are perhaps the only ones of the edition now in existence. They were printed in Edinburgh by James Ballantyne and Co., and constitute volumes second, third and fourth of an octave edition. They have no title-pages, no general introduction, and but brief ones of a page or two to each play, — the second containing "Two gentlemen of Verona," "Comedy of errors," "Love's labor lost," and "Much ado about nothing"; the fourth, "Midsummer night's dream," "Taming of the shrew," "As you like it," and "Much ado about nothing"; the fourth, "Merry wives of Windsor," "Measure for measure," "All's well that

ends well," and "Tweifth night." The notes at the foot of the page seem to be derived from the ordinary sources. "Lore's labor lost" has at the end " Notes concerning the character of Holofernes."

On a fly-leaf of volume two is a memorandum, signed by T. Rodd, the well-known London bookseller, with whom Mr. Barton had constant dealings, in which it is stated that he (Rodd) bought the volumes at a sale in Edinburgh, in the catalogue of which they were entered as Shakespeare's works, edited by Sir Walter Scott and Lockhart, volumes two, three ad four, all printed. *unique*. The memorandum continues: "That Scott entertained the design of editing Shakespeare, I know from A. Constable, who mentioned it to me more than once; and I sent him a little book of memoranda for Scott's use, but as he, Constable, informed me, it never reached him. The bankruptcies of Scott and Constable prevented the completion of the work. The book has marks of Scott's usual inaccuracies, as I find on casually opening these volumes. ... Scott is prhaps the most faulty and careless of writers, unless it be T. F. Dibdin. It is hardly saying too much of either of them to assert that a gross mistake might be found in every page issued by either of them."

There is also contained in the volumes a memorandum by a friend of Mr. Barton's, showing, that, at the time it is supposed Scott was engaged upon this editing work, he was also giving other indications of his interest in Shakespere in writing, at presumably an even date, — namely, in his History of Scotland, — a detailed historical account of Macbeth's story, with a reference to the incorrect tale of the dramatist; and, in his "Saint Ronan's well," a full sketch of an amateur representation of "Midsummer night's dream."

It may be added that neither Bohn, Allibone nor Thimm, in their Shakespearian bibliographics, makes any mention of this work; nor have the authorities of the Shakespeare Memorial Library, at Birmingham, in their more recent efforts to enumerate every edition that helps make a complete list of those in English, given any indication of a knowledge of its existence. — Boston Daily Advertiser, March 21st, 1874.

### The Patent Room.

Frequences of this department of the Library will be glad to learn that the inconvenience arising from the occasional withdrawal for binding of volumes of the Subject-matter indexes of the British Patents, and from the demands of different investigators for the same volume at the same time, will be removed, when a duplicate set, promised by the Commissioners of Patents of Great Britain, is received. Ten examiners of these Patents at one time, as has happened of late, has shown the utter insufficiency of the apartment devoted to holding them; and has occasioned annoyances, which it is hoped will no longer exist when the new addition to the building is completed.

#### Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

I. To use periodicals or books in the buildings. Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. To take books away from the buildings. All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 14 years; all nonresident Clergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; all inhabitants who have received certificates of graduation, medals, or Lawrence prizes, from the Public Schools; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall of the Central Library, and at the several Branches.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests) may take books for home use, in socordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trustees

Bates Hall books can be applied for at the several Branches.

## CATALOGUES.

Note. — Copies of the printed Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the Branches.

A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT of the Bates Hall circulate like other books.

#### Bulletins.

A fresh list of accessions is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library, and for the few days that elapse before titles appear in print on the Bulletin board, the important new books are displayed (with the shelfnumbers attached) in a glass case at the Desk. The lists for the Lower Hall and for the Branches show only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19, and the present, No. 30, is the eleventh number of the second volume. For sale (excepting those out of print) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; above 2110 in the Bates Hall. Those with E. B., S. B., Rox., Chn., and Bri. prefixed to the number are respectively in the East Boston, South Boston, Roxbury, Charlestown, and Brighton Branches.

IV. The CONSOLIDATED BULLETIN (kept at the Desk). Combines in one alphabet the titles contained in the twentynine printed Bulletins which have been issued since October, 1867, and shows the more important books added to the Bates Hall of the Library since August 31, of that year; also, all books added to the Lower Hall since the issue of the first editions of the several Finding Lists; and all books added to the Branches since the issue of their respective catalogues. It has no entries under subjects.

V. PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE. The printed cards, together with those in manuscript in the same drawers, show the books added to the Bates Hall since 1866. Those in print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1, 1871, and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do not contain such crossreferences, but only main entries, under authors, etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the necessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library, and from Lower Hall Class List No. III, have been inserted in their proper alphabetical places. In due time it is hoped to embody with them, in the same way, the printed titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, from Vol. 1 of the Bulletins (Nos. 15 to 19 have already been embodied), and from the other Lower Hall Class Lists, so that the public shall have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form, and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this Card Catalogue.

VI. The OFFICIAL CABD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supples full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue which is at present in manuscript.

#### Engravings.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings has been printed, but the edition is now exhausted. Bulletins 13 and 16 contain a list of that portion of the same collection which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints; Bulletin 31 contains a list of the framed engravings, not portraits, in the Bates Hall; and a separate Supplementary List completes the cataloguing of the entire collection.

In the printed Bulletins, such works are entered only under the names of their authors. These printed entries have been cut out of the various Bulletins, and inserted in alphabetical order in a book, which is in the custody of the Clerk, and which can be consulted on application to him. This CON-SOLIDATED BULLETIN, therefore, and the Card Catalogue, taken together, show all the additions, both under author and title, which have been made to the Lower Library since the publication of the several Class Lists.

OBSERVE. Many books properly belonging to the classes of the preceding Lists will be found in No. V, because they form one of a series or collection.

#### Branches.

Catalogues are for sale; — East Boston, 15 cents; South Boston, 16 cents; Roxbury, 30 cents; Charlestown. 25 cents each, parts 1 and 2; and Brighton, 25 cents, for the main Catalogue (including first Supplement), and 5 cents for each of the two subsequent Supplements.

The Bulletins since the issues of the Branch Catalogues, constitute supplements to those several lists.

#### **Oentral Periodical Reading Room.**

A List of Periodicals currently received (nearly 800 in number, of which about one-half are kept in the Reading Room) is for sale at 5 cents.

#### The Catalogue System.

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work, search for it under the first word not an article. Otherwise, the subject should be looked for rather than the title.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a fictitious one, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific Acad, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the Aorse, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so (as Coins and Numismatics), but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher.

### Cremation as a Mode of Interment, and Related Subjects.

NOTE. - A few works of importance, not in this Library, but in other libraries, are given, as will be seen.

A considerable number of writers have discussed, from historical and antiquarian points of view, the whole subject of sepulture, burial rites, and funcrals. Besides encyclopædias, travels in India, Egypt, Rome, etc., and books on manners and customs generally, see among the older authorities, Bosio, De Roma Sotteranca [4750.50; also in Aringhi's Roma sotteranea 2750.1]; Gutherius De jure manium, in Grævius, vol. 6 and 12 [2500.1]; Kirchmannus De funere Romanorum [Astor Lib.] Laurentius De funeribus antiquorum, etc., in Gronovius, v. 11 [2900.2]; Meursius De funere, in Gronovius, v. 12 [2960.2], and same in Meursius, Opera [2210.2]; Montfaucon, Les funeralites des Grees; des Romains; des nations barbares; in his works, v. 5, and supplement, also v. 5 [2220.1 and 2]; Muret, Cérémonies funèbres de toutes les nations [Astor Lib.]; and same, transl. by Lorain [N.Y. State Lib.]; Nicolai De sepuleris Hebræorum [Astor Lib.]; Pauvinius De ritu sepeliendi apud veteres Christianos; Poney, Libitina, seu de funeribus apud Romanos, etc. [Astor Lib.]; Porcacch, Funerali antichi [Astor Lib.] of which there is a French translation; Quenatedt, De sepultura veterum, in Gronovius, v. 11 [280.2]; Spelman, Canons concerning burial, or De sepultura, in his Works [2800.3]; Spondanus, Cœmeteria sacra [Astor Lib.]

A more modern discussion of the sepulture question arose in France, chiefly during and after the French Revolution, with reference principally to the same evils which occasioned the English parliamentary investigations and consequent enactments on the subject, half a century later; viz., the evils of internent in or under church edifices, and in the midst of towns. The authority most cited in this discussion was the Italian Piattoli, who investigated the subject by request of the government of Tuscany, and whose work was mostly transferred (with acknowledgment) by the French physician Vieg d'Azyr into his own publication on the subject, entitled Essai sur les lieux et les dangers des sépultures, in v. 6 of the Œuvres de Vieq d'Azyr [3720.11]. Other authorities for this stage of the discussion are. Cambry, Rapports sur les sépulture [Bost. Athenseum]; Girard, Des tombeaux, ou de l'influence des institutions funèbres sur les mœurs [Athenseum]; Maret, Mémoire sur l'usage d'enterrer les morts dans les églises, etc. [Astor Lib.]; other works by Navier, a physician of Chalons (1775), Haguenot, a professor at Montpellier, etc.

The material of Plattoli as used by Vieq d'Azyr was used again by Dr. Allen, of New York, in a pamphlet published by him in that eity in 1822 [M. Pph. v. 11], and more fully by Dr. Pascalis, of New York, in another pamphlet which appeared in 1823 [M. Pph. v. 18]. Both these refer, among other authorities, to a report in the document of the New York City Board of Health of 1806, made by Dr. Miller, Mr. John Pintard and Mr. Van Zandt, on interment in cities. These New York publications were with reference, more particularly, to cholera or yellow fever epidemics.

The English discussion of the question of intra-mural or extra-mural interment is presented pretty fully in the evidence before a parliamentary commission [R. Ct. 1842, v. 10] and in the subsequent reports, one by Edwin Chadwick in 1843 [R. Cr., 1843, v. 12; also 7063.9], and another by Lords Carlisle and Ashley, and Mr. Chadwick and Dr. Southwood Smith [R. Cr. 1850, v. 21; also 7063.5].

In the more ancient authorities, above quoted, the "cremation" (or burning) of the dead is discussed mainly in a historical manner as one of several methods of disposing of the remains. The French, American and English discussions next referred to only dealt with it incidentally or by implication; what they sought, and have obtained, was, the use of rural cemeteries instead of city or "intra-mural" burials. The renewal of the general question of disposing of the dead, which is at present in progress, is specifically directed to the "cremation" of the remains. For this particular view, see Grimm. Ueber due Verbrennen der Leichen, in the Transactions of the Berlin Academy of Sciences, 1849 [3322.2]; Jamieson, Origin of cremation, in Transactions of Royal Society of Edinburgh for 1818 [3360.1]; "The merits of cremation," a paper by P. 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## CATALOGUES.

Note. - Copies of the printed Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the Branches.

A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT of the Bates Hall circulate like other books.

#### **Sulletins**.

A fresh list of accessions is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library, and for the few days that elapse before titles appear in print on the Bulletin board, the important new books are displayed (with the shelfnumbers attached) in a glass case at the Desk. The lists for the Lower Hall and for the Branches show only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19, and the present, No. 31, is the twelfth number of the second volume. For sale (excepting those out of print) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; above 2110 in the Bates Hall. Those with E. B., S. B., Rox., Chn., and Bri. prefixed to the number are respectively in the East Boston, South Boston, Roxbury, Charlestown, and Brighton Branches.

The CONSOLIDATED BULLETIN (kept at the Desk). IV. Combines in one alphabet the titles contained in the thirty printed Bulletins which have been issued since October, 1867, and shows the more important books added to the Bates Hall of the Library since August 31, of that year; also, all books added to the Lower Hall since the issue of the first editions of the several Finding Lists; and all books added to the Branches since the issue of their respective catalogues. It has no entries under subjects.

V. PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE. The printed cards, together with those in manuscript in the same drawers, show the books added to the Bates Hall since 1866. Those in print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1, 1871, and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do not contain such crossreferences, but only main entries, under authors, etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the necessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library, and from Lower Hall Class List No. III, have been inserted in their proper alphabetical places. In due time it is hoped to embody with them, in the same way, the printed titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, from Vol. 1 of the Bulletins (Nos. 15 to 19 have already been embodied), and from the other Lower Hall Class Lists, so that the public shall have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form, and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this Card Catalogue.

VI. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue which is at present in manuscript.

#### Engravings.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings has been printed, but the edition is now exhausted. Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the same collection which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints; Bulletin 21 contains a list of the framed engravings, not portraits,

in the Bates Hall; and a separate Supplementary List completes the cataloguing of the entire collection.

These printed entries have been cut out of the various Bulletins, and inserted in alphabetical order in a book, which is in the custody of the Clerk, and which can be consulted on application to him. This Con-SOLIDATED BULLETIN, therefore, and the Card Catalogue, taken together, show all the additions, both under author and title, which have been made to the Lower Library since the publication of the several Class Lists.

OBSERVE. Many books properly belonging to the classes of the preceding Lists will be found in No. V, because they form one of a series or collection.

#### Branches.

Catalogues are for sale; - East Boston, 15 cents; South Boston, 15 cents; Roxbury, 30 cents; Charlestown, 25 cents each, parts 1 and 2; and Brighton, 25 cents, for the main Catalogue (including first Supplement), and 5 cents for each of the two subsequent Supplements.

The Bulletins since the issues of the Branch Catalogues. constitute supplements to those several lists.

Oentral Periodical Reading Boom. A List of Periodicals currently received (nearly 800 in number, of which about one-half are kept in the Reading Room) is for sale at 5 cents.

#### The Catalogue System.

There are three things, one of which a person wanting a book must know, and the so-called Dictionary System (upon which all the Catalogues of the Boston Public Library are made) guides the average reader more readily than any other, as he always looks in the proper alphabetical place for the entry he is in search of. These three things are as follows:-

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work, search for it under the first word not an article. Oth-. erwise, the subject should be looked for rather than the title.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a fictitious one, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific head, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the horse, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammais, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so (as Coins and Numismatics), but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher.

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# Memoranda.

 $*_{0}*$  The re-decorating of the Bates Hall, which is now in progress, is likely to interfere for some weeks to cox  $\ni$  with the full use of that department. It has compelled the removal of the Public Card Catalogue, but barring the interrur Hon of its use, the delivery of books for home use is still maintained with as much convenience as before; and whenever practicable, all facilities are afforded to such as have pressing occasion to use the books in the building.

\*.\* In a few mouths the new structure in the rear of the Central Library Building will be completed, and will afford the following additional accommodations: ---

Basement. -- The bindery will be more than doubled in size, rendering it possible to do all or nearly all of the binding required, in the building.

First Story. - Apartments will be furnished for the Barton Library and the Prince Library, and they will be put under the charge of a special custodian, whose room adjacent will have conveniences for students.

Second Story. - The work-rooms gained on this level will relieve the Fine Arts Room from such purposes, so that it can be thrown open, as formerly, to the public.

Third Story. - This will be devoted to the official quarters of the Trustees and the Superintendent.

Fourth Story. - Additional quarters for the cataloguers.

Fifth Story. — Will be devoted to the British Patent specifications, provided with draughtsmen's tables, etc., and will be lighted from above. The American and French patents will be placed in the room adjacent, now used for the British patents. These additional accommodations in this department have long been wanting, as the collection of patent specifications, now numbering about 2,400 large volumes, has much outgrown the capacity of the shelves; and the frequenters of the room, which for four years barely numbered 200 a year, then run for three years at between 300 and 400, rose in 1872 to 642, in 1873 to 973, and for the year ending last May, had risen to nearly 1,500. This enumeration embraces only the consulters of the British patents, in addition to which there is a large number who consult the American and French specifications. This increase of use has compelled an application to the British Commissioners of Patents fog an extra set of indexes, which has been promptly granted.

 $*_{0}$ <sup>\*</sup> It has been defluitely settled that the new Dorchester Branch will occupy a portion of the second story of the new city building, now erecting at Field's Corner, and which may perhaps be ready for occupancy by the beginning of the new year. The preliminary work on the books for this branch is now in progress, and it is hoped to open the library with four or five thousand volumes on the shelves shortly after the building is made ready.

\*\*\* The Charlestown Branch, with its enlarged accommodations, is doing a work greatly in advance of its record in the past, the issues being nearly 150 per cent. more than ever before in corresponding months.

\*,\* The Brighton Branch is now established in its new building, begun by the town of Brighton and completed by the city of Boston. It has a capacity probably in excess of any demand for many years to come. The statistics of its circulation show that the change has affected favorably the use which is made of it. The services of dedicating the new building are to take place the present month.

# Shakespeariana.

The Superintendent's Monthly Reports now contain bibliographical notes upon the early quarto issues of Shakespeare's plays, before the first folio of 1623, gathered and printed for the purpose of testing their accuracy, before embodying them in the catalogue of the Barton Library, which is soon to be undertaken. If persons making a study of Shakespearian bibliography will furnish their addresses, these monthly notes will be sent to them.

# Memorials of Boston.

The Public Library of the city should contain every memorial, whether book, pamphiet, map, broadside, print, photo graph, or the like, which is procurable, and which in any way illustrates the history or topography of the city. Books printed in Boston at an early date are very desirable acquisitions; and it is to be hoped that friends of the Library will assist in making the collection complete.

# Engraved Portraits.


Portfolios and scrap-books have been prepared for the preservation of engraved portraits, and any contribution of this kind will be gladly accepted. Particular attention will be paid to the gathering of likenesses of Bostonians.

# Important Notice to Card-holders.

The rule requiring immediate notice of change of residence or address is not observed as it should be. The ramification of the Library system through its Branches renders the omission to do so a serious matter, both as regards trouble and expense. It is hoped that it will not be necessary to exact the penalty of forfeiture of card. It has also become necessary that residents in outlying districts of the city, where the numbering of houses does not exist, should give as exactly as possible the locality of their houses.

Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

I. To use periodicals or books in the buildings. Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. To take books away from the buildings. All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 14 years; all nonresident Clergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall of the Central Library, and at the several Branches.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests) may take books for home use, in accordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trustees.

Bates Hall books can be applied for at the several Branches, and when the word comes to the Central Library, if found on the shelves, they will be sent to the Branch by the return express box.

# CATALOGUES.

Note. - Copies of the printed Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the Branches.

A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT of the Bates Hall circulate like other books.

### Bulleting.

A fresh list of accessions is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library, and for the few days that elapse before titles appear in print on the Bulletin board, the important new books are displayed (with the shelfnumbers attached) in a glass case at the Deak. The lists for the Lower Hall and for the Branches show only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19, and the present, No. 32, is the thirteenth number of the second volume. For sale (excepting those qut of print) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; above 2110 in the Bates Hall. Those with K. B., S. B., Rox., Chn., Bri., or Dor. prefixed to the number are respectively in the East Boston, Bouth Boston, Roxbury, Charlestown, Brighton, or Dorchester Branches.

#### Bates Hall of the Central Library.

IV. The CONSOLIDATED BULLETIN (kept at the Desk). Combines in one alphabet the titles contained in the thirtytwo printed Bulletius which have been issued since October, 1867, and shows the more important books added to the Bates Hall of the Library since August 31, of that year; also, all books added to the Lower Hall since the issue of the first editions of the several Finding Lists; and all books added to the Branches since the issue of their respective catalogues. It has no entries under subjects.

V. PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE. The printed cards, together with those in manuscript in the same drawers, show the books added to the Bates Hall since 1866. Those in large print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1, 1871, and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do not contain such crossreferences, but only main entries, under authors, etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the necessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles in small print from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library, and from Lower Hall Class List No. III, have been inserted in their proper alphabetical places, and some progress has been made in embodying with them, in the same way, the titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, and from the various Bulletins (Nos. 15-19 have already been embodied, as well as the first half of the Bates Hall Supplement) and other Lower Hall Class Lists. When this work is finished the public will have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this Card Catalogue.

VI. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue which is at present in manuscript.

### Engravings.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings has been printed, but the edition is now exhausted. Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the same collection which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints; Bulletin

**S1** contains a list of the framed engravings, not portraits, in the Bates Hall; and a separate Supplementary List completes the cataloguing of the entire collection.

In the printed Bulletins, such works are entered only under the names of their authors. These printed entries have been cut out of the various Bulletins, and inserted in alphabetical order in a book, which is in the custody of the Clerk, and which can be consulted on application to him. This COS-SOLIDATED BULLETIN, therefore, and the Card Catalogue, taken together, show all the additions, both under author and title, which have been made to the Lower Library since the publication of the several Class Lists.

OBSERVE. Many books properly belonging to the classes of the preceding Lists will be found in No. V, because they form one of a series or collection.

### Branches.

Catalogues are for sale; — East Boston, 10 cents; South Boston, 10 cents; Roxbury, 20 cents; Charlestown, 25 cents each, parts 1 and 2; and Brighton, 25 cents, for the main Catalogue (including first Supplement), and 5 cents for each of the two subsequent Supplements.

The Bulletins since the issues of the Branch Catalogues, constitute supplements to those several lists.

#### Index to Historical Fiction.

A list of books in prose fiction, of poems and of dramas, illustrating historical eras and persons, and arranged by countries in chronological order, giving indications of authors and titles, so that the work can be found by the catalogues, is nearly ready.

### Central Periodical Reading Room.

A List of Periodicals currently received (nearly 800 in number, of which about one-half are kept in the Reading Room) is for sale at 5 cents.

# The Oatalogue System.

Books are found by -

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work, search for it under the first word not an article. Otherwise, the subject should be looked for rather than the title.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a fictilious one, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific kead, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the *horse*, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so (as Coins and Numismatics), but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher.

# Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes, and are callogued. It is intended in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These will be put on the shelves in boxes, and for the box the bound volume will be substituted, when the needful numbers are procured. Solicitations are renewed for lots of pamphlets, which will be substituted, when the needful numbers are eady. The chances are, that any miscellaneous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets wanted, and the others will avail in exchange. The number of duplicate pamphlets is now upwards of 30,000, all arranged, and ready to be exchanged for others not belonging to the Library. With distant libraries, the following method of exchange has been found the most convenient: if they will send 1,000 pamphlets printed in their state, or in a given locality, this Library will send 1,000 printed in Massachusetts, or in some other locality. Each may acquire some duplicates, but a great part will probably be fresh accessions.

# Important Notice to Card-holders.

The rule requiring immediate notice of change of residence or address is not observed as it should be. The ramification of the Library system through its Branches renders the omission to do so a serious matter, both as regards trouble and expense. It is hoped that it will not be necessary to exact the penalty of forfeiture of card. It has also become necessary that residents in out-lying districts of the city, where the numbering of houses does not exist, should give as exactly as Possible the locality of their houses.

### Memoranda.

\*\*\* The books, etc., were removed to the quarters for the Dorchester Branch, in the new city building at Field's Corner, January 7th; and the greater part of the month will probably be occupied in shelving the books (nearly 4,000 in number), in preparing shelf lists and otherwise arranging for the opening. The Reading Room will have twenty-one different current periodicals, and may be opened before the delivery of books begins. Dorchester applicants for cards can, after the opening takes place, register their names at the Branch, as well as at the Central Library; but they cannot register at one place after they have already done so at the other, and cards issued at any of the libraries are good at the Dorchester Branch, provided there are no books checked on them from any other of the popular departments. The Catalogue of the Dorchester Branch will go to press as soon as the books are arranged, and as soon as a sheet is printed it will be posted on the Bulletin board, and the circulation begin. The printed Bulletins, for April, 1875, and subsequently, will contain such additions as shall be made to the Branch, supplementing the catalogue, and be identified by the abbreviation, Dor., against the shelf numbers. Miss Mary G. Coffin will have charge of the branch, as librarian, and be assisted by Miss Esther R. White. Mr. Davenport, the janitor of the building, will act in that capacity for the library. Public announcement will be made of the dedicatory services, which will probably take place in the Rev. Dr. Hall's church.

\*\*\* The great loss which the Library sustained in the death of Mr. William A. Wheeler, the Assistant Superintendent, and head of the Catalogue Department, just after the issue of the last Bulletin, threw temporary obstacles in the way of the progress which was making in the extra catalogue work of the library; but the labor of revising the Ticknor catalogue has been resumed, and will be prosecuted with all the rapidity consistent with the character of the work, and the demands of the general service of that department.

\*.\* Since the gift of the Tosti engravings, in October, 1869, the Fine Arts Room has been occupied most of the time as an extra work-room, but now that the books for the Dorchester Branch have been removed, and a room for such work has been provided in the new addition to the building, there will probably be no necessity, hereafter, of closing the Art Room to the public.

\*.\* Obstructions to the use of the Bates Hall began Sept. 1st, 1874, by reason of the erection of a stage for the decorator, and the bulletin stand and card catalogue were necessarily removed, having the effect of reducing the use of this department about one quarter. This was the state of the case till early in December, when the staging was removed and the appliances restored, whereupon the circulation resumed an extent greater than prevailed in any previous year at the same season. The work of painting the alcoves was proceeded with gradually, so as to interfere with the use of the books as little as possible, and occupied another month. Additional cases for the Public Card Catalogue will be put in place during the present month, when room will be obtained for inserting in its alphabet an accumulation of cards, showing titles and cross references from the back printed catalogues. When this latter work is all completed, this Public Card Catalogue will present the very desirable condition of showing all books in the Central Library in one and the same alphabetical catalogue.

\*.\* It is hoped to have the new Patent Room ready for the public in a few weeks. The recent fire in Waltham street burnt up some fixtures and kiln-dried stock, intended to furnish the same, and delay in its completion resulted.

# Books Recommended, and Books Received.

Any person desiring a book not in the possession of this Library may ask, on blanks furnished for the purpose, that it may be purchased; and the assurance is given, that the book will be procured as soon as possible, unless there is some resson for not buying it; and, on its arrival, it will be retained three days for the person recommending it, to whom due notice will be sent by mail. It is not intended, however, to allow applicants to serve the first reading of popular books by recommending them before publication; as such books are purchased irrespective of all recommendations.

The right book may fail to come, if this application is not *legibly* filled in, and correctly, as regards title, suthor, etc.; and there may be delays in ordering, if obscure penmanship or insufficient or erroneous data render the labor of verification fruitiess or uncertain.

Foreign books (even though with American title-pages), to avoid duties and to gain an increased discount, must be bought through agents abroad, and six or eight weeks, or a longer time must clapse before their arrival. Additional delays take place when the book needs to be bound, as is usually the case with continental publications, or when recommendations are received just after the despatch of orders, particularly as regards foreign books.

When the book is out of print (and books still standing in current catalogues are often so) no positive assurance of its speedy procurement can be given. The judgment of the necessity of buying duplicates must be based upon the Library's records of circulation. Bate Hall books are not duplicated; but other copies, or copies of cheaper editions, are sometimes put in the popular departments.

If the books are recommended by those not holding cards, no claim for special use can be established, even if they are bought on such recommendation.

### Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

I. To use periodicals or books in the buildings. Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. To take books away from the buildings. All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 14 years; all nonresident Clergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall of the Central Library, and at the several Branches.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests) may take books for home use, in accordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trustees.

Bates Hall books can be applied for at the several Branches, and when the word comes to the Central Library, if found on the shelves, they will be sent to the Branch by the return express box.

For further particulars see Hundbook for Readers, distributed gratis.

Days and Hours, etc.

All departments are open every secular day, except the five legal holidays, - February 22, Fast Day, July 4, Thanksgiving, and Christmas, - and such other days as the Trustees may direct. The Reading Rooms for Periodicals are open on Sundays at 2 P. M., and close at the Central Library at 10 P. M.; and at the Branches at 8 or 9 P. M.

# CATALOGUES.

Note. -- Copies of the printed Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the Branches.

A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT of the Bates Hall circulate like other books.

#### Bulletins.

A fresh *list of accessions* is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library, and for the few days that elapse before titles appear in print on the Bulletin board, the important new books are displayed (with the shelfnumbers attached) in a glass case at the Desk. The lists for the Lower Hall and for the Branches show only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19, and the present, No. 33, is the fourteenth number of the second volume. For sale (excepting those out of print) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; above 2110 in the Bates Hall. Those with E. B., S. B., Rox., Chn., Brit, or Dor. prefixed to the number are respectively in the East Boston, South Boston, Roxbury, Charlestown, Brighton, or Dorchester Branches.

IV. The CONSOLIDATED BULLETIN (kept near the Desk). Combines in one alphabet the titles contained in the thirtythree printed Bulletins which have been issued since October, 1867, and shows the more important books added to the Bates Hall since August 31, of that year; also, all books added to the Lower Hall since the issue of the first editions of the several Finding Lists; and all books added to the Branches since the issue of their respective catalogues. It has no emiries under subjects.

V. PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE. The printed cards, together with those in manuscript in the same drawers, show the books added to the Bates Hall since 1866. Those in large print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1, 1871, and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do not contain such crossreferences, but only main entries, under authors, etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the necessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles in small print from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library, and from Lower Hall Class List No. III, have been inserted in their proper alphabetical places, and some progress has been made in embodying with them, in the same way, the titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, and from the various Bulletins (Nos. 11-19 have already been embodied, as well as the first half of the Bates Hall Supplement) and other Lower Hall Class Lists. When this work is finished the public will have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this Card Catalogue.

VI. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue which is at present in manuscript.

### Engravings.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings has been printed, but the edition is now exhausted. Builetins 13 and 16 contain a list of that portion of the same collection which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints; Builetin 21 contains a list of the framed engravings, not portraits, in the Bates Hall; and a separate Supplementary List completes the cataloguing of the entire collection. A Consolidated Catalogue is in charge of the Curator, as also a numerical catalogue of the engravings in frames.

This Cox-SOLIDATED BULLETIN, therefore, and the Card Catalogue, taken together, show all the additions, both under author and title, which have been made to the Lower Hall since the publication of the several Class Lists.

OBSERVE. Many books properly belonging to the classes of the preceding Lists will be found in No. V, because they form one of a series or collection.

### Branches.

Catalogues are for sale; — Kast Boston, 10 cents; South Boston, 10 cents; Roxbury, 20 cents; Dorchester, 20 cents; Charlestown, 25 cents each. parts 1 and 2; and Brighton, 25 cents, for the main Catalogue (including first Supplement), and 5 cents for each of the two subsequent Supplements.

The Bulletins since the issues of the Branch Catalogues, constitute supplements to those several lists.

### Index to Historical Fiction.

A list of books in prose fiction, of poems and of dramas, illustrating historical eras and persons, and arranged by countries in chronological order, giving indications of authors and titles, so that the work can be found by the catalogues, is for sale at 10 cents.

### Central Periodical Reading Room.

A List of Periodicals currently received (nearly 800 in number, of which about one-half are kept in the Reading Room) is for sale at 5 cents.

### The Catalogue System.

Books are found by-

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work, search for it under the first word not an article. Otherwise, the subject should be looked for rather than the title.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a fictitious one, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific kead, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the *horse*, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animale, Quadrupeda, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so (as Coins and Numismatics), but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher.

e memorials; the articles in Allibone panied with son under Lamb and Talfourd; and the paper in the West-minster review, Oct., 1874, on "Charles and Mary Lamb, their editors and biographers."

Talfourd's memoir [574.6.1; 874.2.1; 2571.50; 6906.2; 6607.17] is made up largely of Lamb's letters, which Talfourd is accused of changing somewhat, and it must still be accounted the chief authority; while details of the insanity of the family, omitted for prudential reasons from the memoir, were afterwards given in the "Final memorials" [874.6.2; 2571.30; 6006.2]. Another expression of Talfourd's estimate of Lamb may be found in his essay on Wallace's Prospects of mankind (808.9).

Others of Lamb's friends have commen porated him. Procter's [Barry Cornwall] memoir [1516.9; and with portraits 4545.1] gives personal recollections, written thirty years after Lamb's death, and it has been reviewed in the Edinburgh review, 1866, or no. 1161 of Living age, and from the Examiner, in no. 1165 of Living age. De Quincey has an essay [895.17; 6604.2] and some se tions in his Literary reminiscences [895.11.1; 4367.1.8]. The lives of Coleridge, particularly Cottle's Reminiscences [ 586.17], H. N. Coleridge's biographical Supplement to the Biographia literaria [886 2.3; 2555.30], and All-sop's "Life and letters of S. T. Culeridge" [4558.7] afford much illustrative material.

For the shorter accounts by acquaintances see John Forster in the New monthly magazine. 1835 [5517.1]; S. C. Hall's Memories [6542.13]; Maclise's Gallery [2240a.52]; Mary Cowden Clarke, in the Gentleman's magazine, 1873 [3115.1], or no. 1543 of Living age [3161.2], on some letters with reminiscences, and also her " Recollections of the Lamba." in the National magazine, re-printed in Hazlitt's "Mary and Charles Lamb" [2549.65].

Of the recent lines. Fitzgerald's " Charles Lamb, his friends, his haunts, and his books" [1589.3; 4559.10.2, or Dublin university magazine, 1865, copied in Living age, no. 1064, etc., and reviewed from the Spectator and Examiner in nos. 1135 and 1141 of Living age] is a sketchy picture. Cradock's [2549.56] is chiefly an appreciative literary critique. G. A. Sala wrote an essay on the "Life and genius of Lamb," which was originally prefixed to the four volume edition of Lamb's works, published in 1968, by Moxon, but it is not spoken well of, and was withdrawn, and an eveny by Thomas Purnell [2477.56] substituted, which embodied the resollections of Isola (Lamb's daughter and wife of Moxon); but the edition led to a quarrel, and was of little credit to any one. In 1874 appeared " Mary and Charles Lamb : poems, letters, and remains : now first collected, with reminiscences and notes, by W. Carew Hazlitt" [2549.65], who rather strongly takes issue with previous biographers on some points, and adds to our knowledge of Lamb's early life; but his editorial revision is charged with much inaccuracy.

Minor notices of Lamb will be found in Daniel's "Love's labor not lost" [4567.10]; in Howitt's" North-ern heights of London "[4535.2]; in Willis's " Pencillings by the way " [904.14, ch. 70]; in Timbe's " Eccentrics " [2468.17]; in Bulwer's Miscellanies [1839.3.1]; in H. C. Robinson's Diary [1554.2, etc.]; in Patm "My friends and acquaintances" [3443.11]; in Hazlitt's "Spirit of the age" [867.2.5; 898.17]; in Tuckerman's "Characteristics" [548.5.1.]; and in the lives of Wordsworth, Leigh Hunt, Leslie, Hazlitt, etc.

An account of Lamb's library, which came to America, will be found in the Historical magazine [4315.1. Feb., 18651.

> As to the sext of his writings J. E. Babson began to gather from the old magazines such papers of Lamb's as had escaped the early editors, and published some of them in the Atlantic monthly, 1863, and afterwards in a volume, " Eliana " [813.1z, etc.], and in a supplemental paper, "Another dish of Lamb" in "Old and new," Nov., 1874. These developments have added to our knowledge of Lamb, and the same sort of researches was carried further in Moxon's edition [3477.56], and still further in Shepherd's edition of the present year [2477.58], in which edition many cancelled pass have been restored.

te. - The old life of Erasmus, by Jortin [3496.1.4]. dating back to the middle of the last century, was, until recently, the best account for English readers, though too discursive, written in the form of annals, and having other defects, which were counterbalanced in some degree by its store of anecdotes. Other more recent Eng-lish lives are imperfect presentations, like Knight's, 1728 [2846.5], confined chiefly to his career in England, and Butler's, 1825 [2844.1]. There were views of him necessarily taken in Milner's History of the church [3518.2], and in Hallam's Literature of Europe [1572.3]. Still later, Seebohm, in his "Oxford reformers" [5323.25], confined his study to tracing the joint labors and fellowship of Colet, More and Erasmus, and did not follow the latter's career later than 1519. For parallel reading the student will necessarily compare the au-thorities on Sir Thomas More, like Mackintosh's life [863.8], and on Luther, and all general works on the beginning of the Reformation. For the connection of Erasmus with the contemporary scholarship of England, see Mullinger's History of the University of Cambridge [2496.13].

The English reader can now, however, find both the most condensed and comprehensive views of his life and character in two recent lives by Drummond [2929.52, the ost extensive], and by Pennington [3539.66].

In French, De Laur's " Érasme, précurseur et initia-teur de l'esprit moderne " [2841.50], vol. I given to a life, and vol. II to his works, is perhaps the most satisfactory of all recent expositions. Other lesser French accounts may be found in Michelet's "Biographie " [2844.3]. and in Nisard's "Études sur la renaissance " [55198.34].

All the older lives, including the German ones Wagner, etc. [6059a.2.7] and by Müller [4257.6], will be found characterized in Dean Milman's full yet compact cosay [5555.14, or Quarterly review, July, 1850, or Living age, no. 796], while that in Ersch and Gruber's Cyclopedia is accounted the best among the lesser ones. 1. Spotorno, who, deriving chiefly from Napione's "Della patria di Colombo" [2318.8], gave credit to the story of the non-marriage of Columbus and Beatrix Enriques, In his "Origin and country of Christopher Columbus," and in his biographical introduction to the "Codice Colombo-Americano" [E. 221.9; also see 2318.2 and 8, in English, and 544.8].

2. Navarrete, in his Collection of the maritime voyages of the Spanlards [in French, 4367.6], who aimed to exculpate Ferdinand the Catholic from the charge of ingratitude towards Columbus, which had been recently brought forward in the French translation [" Histoire de Christophe Colombe," Paris, 1824] of Bossi's Italian life of Columbus, published at Milan in 1817 [2818.14].

8. Irving's " Life and voyages of Columbus "[377.1.6; 889.9; 597.1; 544.18; 2344.2], the earliest considerabl narrative, and the best known in English, but objected to by De Lorgues as written with a protestant disregard of divine interposition. Irving used the material amassed by Spotorno and Navarrete, but according to De Lorgues "conceived a higher and juster idea of the great man."

4. Humboldt's "Critical examination of the history and geography of the new continent" [4316.1], the fullest of the protestant narratives after Irving's, but more objectionable than Irving's to those seeking the canonization of Columbus.

The first letter of Columbus recounting his discoveries is known only in our day in a Latin version, of which six different editions appeared in 1493, which are all described with discriminations in Harrisse's Bibliotheca Americana [2150.21]; and in Mr. Lenox's appendix to his reprint of Syllacius, where the cuts, etc., are given in fac-simile [4410.9, see also Historical magazine, 4315.1, Feb., 1861]; while a more condens bibliography will be found in the introduction to Ma-jor's "Select letters of Columbus" [2364.1]; in Branet [5th ed. vol. II, p. 163]; in Sabin's Dictionary [21.99.2, vol. IV, p. 274]; and in Major's "Bibliography of the first letter" [6106.13], who disagrees with the other bibliographers as to the order of their issue. Harrisse, in his "Notes on Columbus," gives the original Latin of this letter. See also Historical magazine [4315.1, Sept., 1864].

There are copies of some of these six editions in this country, in the libraries of James Lenox, of New York. and of the late John Carter Brown, of Providence. Mr. S. L. M. Bariow, of New York, now owns a copy which formerly belonged to Col. Aspinwall, of Boston. The Astor library has received by gift a copy within a few years. Harrisse, in 1895, pointed out [2130.21] copies of books issued before 1550, and relating to America, which within his knowledge were in American collections.

An English translation of the first letter appeared in the Edinburgh review in Dec., 1816, and was reprinted in the Analectic magazine, vol. IX. It was again trans-

Note. - There have been diverse views as to the site of ancient Troy, but Grote's summary [3072.1.1, ch. xv] will be sufficient for the general reader, who may find similar recapitulations in Tozer's "Highlands of Turkey" [5084.11, vol. I, ch. 2, and vol. II, appendix], and in the Edinburgh review, April, 1874.

Schliemann names Lechevaller, in 1788, as one of the earliest of modern investigators in his " Voyage de la Troade " [3076.4; see also 2996.33], and his view, that the site of Troy was to be found near Bunarbashi, has been maintained later by Rennell, in his "Topography of the plain of Troy," 1814 [2901.13]; by Welcker, in his "Ueber die Lage des Homerischen Ilion," in his " Kleine Schriften " [2952.8.2]; by Forchhammer, in the Journal of the Royal geographical society [6365.2, vol. 12, with map]; by Manduit, in his " Découvertes dans la Troade," 1840; by Choiseul-Gouffier, in his "Voyage pittoresque de la Grice," 1820 [3070.5], and by others. See for this view the plans and landscapes given in Gell's "Topography of Troy " [29.D.3].

This theory was opposed by Schliemann, in his " Ithaque, le Péloponnèse et Troie," 1869 [in German, 2962.6], as in direct opposition to the statements of the Iliad. In this work the author described his preliminary explorations in his subsequent field, and argued in favor of the hill of Hissarick, as the genuine site of Troy, this locality being the traditional site, and this view was accepted from meeting the conditions of the case, by Buckner; by Eckenbrecher, in the "Rheinisches Museum," Neue Folge, 2 Jahrg., and recently in his " Die Lage des Homerischen Troja," with mape, 1875; by Mac Laren, "Plain of Troy described " [3084.15]; by Grote, in his History of Greece [3072.1.1, ch. XV], etc.

Dr. Schliemann's definitive explorations were made at Hissarlik in 1871-73, and his narrative appeared in German [3046.55] with a volume of photographs [3040.53] of the objects discovered. His results attracted attention largely though the clear account which Dr. Burnouf gave in the "Revue des deux mondes" [3315.1, Jan.,

1874], and Max Müller in "The academy," Jan. 10, 1874; but the files of this latter periodical, since that date, should be consulted for numerous discussions of the question, by Newton, Lenormant, Schliemann himself, and others. Other examinations were given in the Edin-burgh review, April, 1874, or no. 1564 of Living age; in burgh review, April, 1004, or no. 1004 of Latting eq. , and the London quarterly review, April, 1874; while Giad-stone, in the Contemporary review, June and July, 1874. or nos. 1574 and 1580 of Living age, on " The place of Homer in history " examines the relations between the explorations and the Homeric text, and decides " that a real objective Troy is thus for the first time, with some marked notes of possibility, presented to our view."

While Schliemann's veracity has not been questioned, his judgment in connecting his discoveries with ancient Troy has been thought too sanguine by some; but the reader will find the present state of the controversy surveyed by Dr. Philip Smith, in his preface to the English translation of Schliemann [2962.7], to which the author has contributed some new material not in the original German, while the woodcuts introduced into the text and the lithographs are a very good substitute for the photographs, largely from drawings, of the original book.

Beside the review articles named above, there are brief recapitulations by B. Taylor in the Tribune popular science papers [1151.2], in "The story of the Trojan war" [2039.38, appendix], etc.

# Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes, and are catalogued. It is intended in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These will be put on the shelves in boxes, and for the box the bound volume will be substituted, when the needful numbers are procured. Solicitations are renewed for lots of pamphlets, which will be sent for, on receiving information that they are ready. The chances are, that any miscellaneous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets wanted, and the others will avail in exchange. The number of duplicate pamphlets is now upwards of 30,000, all arranged, and ready to be exchanged for others not belonging to the Library. With distant libraries, the following method of exchange has been found the most convenient: if they will send 1,000 pamphlets printed in their state, or in a given locality, this Library will send 1,000 printed in Massachusetts, or in some other locality. Each may acquire some duplicates, but a great part will probably be fresh accessions.

# Important Notice to Card-holders.

The rule requiring immediate notice of change of residence or address is not observed as it abould be. The ramification of the Library system through its Branches renders the omission to do so a serious matter, both as regards trouble and expense., It is hoped that it will not be necessary to exact the penalty of forfeiture of card. It has also become necessary that residents in out-lying districts of the city, where the numbering of houses does not exist, should give as exactly as possible the locality of their houses.

# Works on Costume.

The principal works treating generally of the Costume of all Nations, to be found in the Library, are as follows:--Vecellio, "Antichi e moderni costumi di tutto il mondo" [2263.11], illustrated by carefully drawn wood-cuts; Ferrario, "Il costume antico e moderno" [2262.1], in 30 vola., with colored stele plates, and very comprehensive and useful. Kretschmer, "Die Trachten der Völker" [6251.1], is the most modern and perhaps the most useful work, beginning with the earliest historical times and coming down to the present day. The plates, very carefully drawn and colored, are taken from historical sources, and give an excellent, chronologically arranged view of costume, arms, armor, jeweiry, ornaments, furniture, household utensils, military uniforms, etc. The author is artist and costumer of the Royal Theatre in Berlin; the text is by Dr. Rohrbach of Gotha. "Le tour du monde" (1860 to 1874), is an annual volume of recent travels in various parts of the world, copiously illustrated by good wood-engravings and often of costumes [6291.1]. See also "The book of costume, by a lady of rank," devoted mainly to female costume [2236.16], and the "Gynesceum," by Jobst Ammon [4077.56], a work illustrating the dress of 1586, in different countries of Europe.

On the costume of the Anciente, beside the information to be got from the classical dictionaries, the reader may refer to Weiss, "Costumkunde des Alterthums" [6252.10]; also to Lens, "Kostum der Völker des Alterthums" [4153.2], translated from the French (authorities given in a table); Guhl and Koner "Leben der Griechen und Römer" [2900.23]; Bættiger's "Sabine" [2950.21], the description of the morning tollette of a Roman lady; Dubay, "Hygiène vestimentaire" [2637.7]. Also "Charicles" and "Gallus," by Becker [957.1 and 2950.27], tales giving an account of the daily domestic life and manners of the Greeks and Romans, without plates; Hope, "Costume of the ancients" [2230.8]. See also the works on Pompeli, particularly Niccolini.

On Arms and Armor, see Hewitt's "Ancient armor" [2233.9]; Kottenkamp, "History of chivalry and armor" [2230.1]; and the illustrations and text scattered through many of the works elsewhere referred to, viz.: "L'art pour tous," Lens, Willemin and many others. Also Asselineau, "Meubles et objets divers du moyen âge" [4070.18], and Demmin, "Weapons of war" [6232.2], a very copiously illustrated work on weapons, coming down to the present day.

A volume in the Tosti collection [7, D. 16] "Picture antique cryptarum," etc., gives also many costumes from frescoss and other ancient sources.

The costume of European nations during the *Middle Agee* is very fully treated in many beautifully and carefully illustrated works, of which the following are the most important. Hefter, "Trachten des christlichen Mittelalters," 3 vols. [6252.1], very elaborately lilustrated in colors and gold, is one of the finest works on this subject. Equally interesting is Mercuri's "Costumes historiques" [6251.3], treating of the 12th to the 15th centuries, and beautifully illustrated by Mercuri with text by Bonnard. Also see Lacroix, "Mours\_usages et costumes au moyen âge" [622.3] with colored plates and 440 wood-cuts. In "Les arts somptuaires," by Louandre [8072.6], will be found many costumes, chieffy French, as well as in Bommerard's "Arts du moyen âge" [4070.2], which gives numerous exquisitely executed illustrations of the celebrated collections of the Hôtel de Cluay. This work is in 4 folio volumes, accompanied by 2 volumes, 8vo, of descriptive text. See also under England, France, etc., the works elsewhere cited of Wright, Fairholt, Lacroix, Willemin, Ammon; also "L'art pour tous," and Labarto, "Histoire des arts industriels" [4071.50].

For orders of Knighthood, see l'errot, "Ordres de la Chevalerie" [22 0.7], and Ferrario, passim.

Ecclesiastical Costume. Beside the numerous illustrations on this head, to be found scattered in works on the general subject of costume, such as those of Hefner, Kretschmer, Mercuri, Lacroix, see also Bock, "Geschichte der liturgischen Gewände des Mitteialters" [3531.4], in 3 volumes; Pugin's "Giossary of ecclesiastical ornament" [4090.4]; Dolby's "Church vestments" [3531.2]; Dolby's "Church vestments" [3531.3]; Rock's "Catalogue of church vestments in the South Kensington museum" [4020a.11].

The splendid work on the CBcumenical council of 1869, published under the direction of V. Frond, will give a compicte view of the costume of the Roman Catholic church of the present day. It is full of fine illustrations, views. interiors, pictures, portraits and innumerable details relating to Rome and the Catholic church [3510.50].

England. For costumes of England, see Martin's "Civil costume of England" [4530.3]; Wright's "Homes of other days" [4523.9]; Fairholt's "Costume in England" [2520.16]; Charles Knight's "Old Kngland" [4520.7]; Strutt's "English dresses" and "Royal antiquities" [2530.2 and 3]; "Clans of the Socutish Highlands" [452.4]; "The Book of costume," by a lady of rank [2236.16]; Mrs. Jameson's "Court of Charles the second" [2440.12]; Drummond's "British noble families," very beautifully illustrated and containing numerous portraits [24.M.1]. The spiendid volume, "The Coronation of George IV," gives portraits in full dress of many of the principal personages of the time [1823] as they appeared on that occasion.

For the costume of the English during the last century, perhaps there is nothing better than the "Works of Hogarth" [24.G.1], and for the time of George IV and the Regency, the student should not fail to examine the celebrated caricatures of Gillray [24.L.3] which are as noted for their excellence as works of art as for their cutting satire on the chief personages of the realm. The accompanying text gives a good many details as to the costume of the day. A few representations of the style of dress in England about 1815 are to be found in the illustrations to Gronow's "Reminiscences" [587.23 and 24]. A volume by Macliee, with text by Dr. Maginn, "Gallery of illustrious literary characters" [2240a.52], gives portraits, often caricatures, of well-known persons, from 1830-38. "London," by G. Doré and Blanchard Jerrold [4000.3], gives some idea of dress of the present day (1875) in all classes. Meyrick's "Costume of the ancient Britons" (Barton library), gives colored plates of the Scotch Tartans, with text reprinted from the ancient MS. of that title from the Scots' College at Douay.

Curious details are given by Pepys, in his Diary [6543.24], as to his own dress and that of his wife and their friends, which illustrate the English fashions of the time of Charles II.

Planche's "History of British costume" [2539.15], valuable for its illustrations and text, gives also a complete list of authorities on Biltish costume in the introduction.

France. The work of Paul Lacroix, "Costumes historiques de la France" [2635.52], in 10 vols., 8vo, contains portraits and historical costumes from the earliest times to that of Louis Philippe; the illustrations are carefully drawn and beautifully colored, and accompanied with copious notes on such matters as jeweiry, laces, shawls, etc., with an appendix containing sumptuary laws and other historical details. Herbé, "Costumes français" [2630.50], gives, beside 2,800 costumes, furniture, arms, banners, etc.; so does Willemin, "Monuments français" [4630.50]; Debay, "Hygiène vestimentiaire" [2637.7], treats of fashion and dress (but without illustrations), from the earliest times to the present. Lenoir's "Musée des monumens français" [4086.4], treating mostly of sepulchral art, has also a dissertation on the costume of each period. Pauquet, "Modes et costumes historiques" [6251.2], is one of the best books (without text) for court and female dress, and very finely illustrated. Lacroix" "Mœurs, usages et costumes du moyen âge" [6252.3], is one of the most valuable books on French costumes and manners, down to the time of the Renaissance, copiously illustrated with wood-cuts and colored plates. Beside these are the volumes of Ferrario, concerning France [2262.1], and for antiquities generally, beside costume, the beautifully illustrated works of Louandre, "Les lois somptuaires" [6072.6], and Sommerard, "Les arts du moyen âge" [4070.2], both of which are full of illustrations of costume, arms, armor, jeweiry, furniture, etc., the latter work being devoted largely to the contents of the celebrated Museum of the Hôtel Cluny in Paris. "La Gallerie du Luxembourg" [Toeti, C. 7.5] contains fine engravings by Nattier of the series of allegorical pictures by Rubens, illustrating the life of Marie de Medicis and Henry IV.

See "Album du siège de Paris" [4820.6], for costumes and military uniforms of the war of 1870-1.

Other Nations. In the comprehensive work of Ferrario, in 30 volumes [2262.1], are well executed colored plates and descriptions of the costumes of all nations. Also, Vecellio [2263.11]; Hefner [6252.1], finely illustrated, gives German costumes of the middle ages, and in Kretschmer, "Trachten der Völker" [6251.1], the costumes of the principal peoples are given, arranged chronologically, down to the present time. Pinelli "Costumi di Roma," in the Tosti collection [25.6.8], gives, in finely engraved large plates, views of Rome and its costume in the early part of this century.

See also the volume issued in commemoration of the festivities at Parma, in 1769, on occasion of the marriage of Don Fernando with the Archduchess Maria Amelia [Tosti, C. 8. 2], giving the costumes of the persons taking part in the tournament, and the masques.

For the costumes of *Oriental* nations, see various books of travel. For Japan, Humbert's "Japon illustré" [5010.1], and the books by Alcock [5011.4], Jephson [5011.3], Silver [5011.1]; and the Japanese "Rough sketches" (5011.2). Also the illustrations in "Le tour du monde" [6291.1], Wood's "Uncivilized races" [6252.2], and Van Lennep's "Oriental album" [D. 4.2].

On China, see Thomson's "Illustrations of China and its people" [5010.10], in 4 vols., with 200 photographs and descriptive letter-press.

For North American Indians, see McKenney's "History of the Indians" [231.1], which gives finely colored portraits of prominent chiefs from the collection in the War department at Washington, and Brown's "Races of mankind" [2230a.51]. See also Catlin's works on the same subject.

Theatrical Costume is treated specially in several works. Lacy's "Male and female dramatic characters," 2 vols. [2231.50], gives well but roughly drawn uncolored lithographs of about four hundred characters of the modern English stage, Bloch's "Bühnen-Costime" [4232.9] contains very elsborately drawn colored plates, taken mostly from the repertory of the modern German stage, which are at the same time authentic portraits of distinguished actors of the present day. "Costumes de Théâtre" [4263.92], is a collection of 371 stage costumes of the Paris theatree in the first half of the present century, and portraits of the leading actors. "Edwin Booth, in 12 dramatic characters" [4400.51], gives the results to which this tragedian has arrived in the costume of his principal rôles. Knight's Shakespeare [4591.4], Cassell's [4592.1], and Boydell's "Shakespeare gallery," in Barton library, (an American reduction of the celebrated original plates, is 4560.5) give costumes and other details, which will also be found in other illustrated editions of Shakespeare. But the artist and costumer will find endless material for study in the books of historical costume of Kretschmer, Lacroix, Hefner, Bonnard, Willemin, Pauquet, Lovandre, Sommerard, etc., cited under other heads. In Lodge's Portraits [2451.1] and the large edition in the Barton library] and other similar works, will be found authentic costumes from portraits by great artists.

For Jeweiry, Ornament, etc., see Edwards's "History of rings" [2236.10]; King's "Antique gems" [4063.23]; Mad. de Barrera, "Gems and jewels" [4063.16]; Westropp, "Manual of precious stones" [3668.56]. Beside these, numerous illustrations will be found scattered through the following works, treating of ornament and costume, of which one of the finest is Racinet, "L'ornement polychrome" [8070a.13]; "L'art pour tous" [7860.3]; Knight's "Old England" [4520.7]; Lacroix, "Cost. Hist. de la France" [2635.52]; Herbé, "Costumes français" [2630.50]. In all these will be found innumerable illustrations of the minor details of dress, jewelry, arms, armor and personal ornament. See also Gavarni, "Les parures, les joyaux" [2671.50]; Blanc, "L'art dans la parure" [2255.51]; Nicolai, "Perruques" [2236.9]; Le Blanc, "Art of tying the cravat" [8019a.9]; "Le Bon Ton." modern fashion plates [7261.2]; "Madre Natura versus the Moloch of fashion" [3568.62].

On Lace, consult Felkin's "Lace manufacture" [4014.23]; Palliser's "History of lace" [4016.19]; Hallstone's "Designs for lace" [4020.60]; Branchardière's "Point lace sampler" [6009a.35]. See also "Catalogue of the South Kensington museum" [8020a.11] for Fabrics.

Works treating on *Costume and Toilet*, generally without illustrations. Frost, "Art of dressing well" [197.34]; Fairholt's "Satirical songs and poems" [2537.37]; Cooley, "Tollet and cosmetic arts" [6008.17]; Fosbrooke, "Kncyc. of antiquities" [2232.7]; "Due statuti circa il vestire, etc., Perugia, 1322" [4761.7]; Louandre, "Les arts somptuaires" [8072.6]; Hauff, "Moden und Trachten" [6252.35], Sommerard, "Les arts du moyen âge" [4070.2].

For the history and manufacture of boots, see Morin, "Manuel du bottier" [4019.20]; gloves, D'Artojs, "Manuel des gamts" [4019.25]; artificial flowers, Celnart, "Manuel du fleuriste" [4019.26].

**Portraits.** For historical portraits, beside the books containing the lives or works of the personages in question, there are several collections, such as Lodge's "Portraits of illustrious personages of Great Britain [2451.1]; Knight's "Gallery of portraits" (in Barton library); Mrs. Jameson's "Beauties of the court of Charles II " [2440.12]; Drummond's "British noble families" [24.M.1]; the "Gallerie du Luxembourg," pictures by Rubens illustrative of the times of Henri IV and Marie de Medici [Tosti, C. 7.5]. The render will also find many portraits scattered through the works of Lacroix, "Costumes historiques de la France" [2635.52], Willemin, Pauquet, and Sommerard elsewhere cited. The magnificent volume issued in commemoration of the Coronation of George IV contains authentic portraits of all the principal personages who took part in that ceremony, in their robes of state, very beautifully executed. Many portraits will also found among the caricatures of Giliray. Fine portraits of the Pope and the members of the College of cardinals of the present day, are

given in the volumes of the History of the (Boumenical council of 1869, by Frond [3510.50], which has also views of Rome, and many illustrations of matters connected with the history of the Pope, the council, and the Catholic church.

The Tosti collection of engravings, given to the Library by Mr. Thomas G. Appleton, contains 676 portraits, partly contained in bound volumes, and in part framed. Of these portraits, a separate catalogue will be found, arranged alphabetically under the names of the engravers and painters, as well as the subjects of the engravings.

# Lexington, Concord, and Bunker Hill, 1775-1875.

The most thorough account of the events of a hundred years ago, in and around Boston, will be found in Frothingham's "Siege of Boston" [214.2; 231.2; 2353.1; and in the Appendix will be found an account of the authorities]. Concerning the battles of Lexington, Concord, and Bunker Hill, more condensed narratives will be found in the general histories of the United States, like Bancroft [vol. vii of 302.1; 4421.6]; of New England, like Elliott [2321.4.2]; and of Massechusetts, like Barry [223.3.3; 2352.3.3], and in the general works on the Revolutionary war. Narratives of events in their association with places will be found in Lossing's "Field-book of the revolution" [211.1; 2320.23] and in Drake's "Historic fields and mansions of Middlesex" [222.6; 2359.57]. Many of the original documents will be found in Force's American archives [C. 160.1.1].

For imaginative renderings of some of the events, see Cooper's "Lionel Lincoln" [760.42; 1506.17]; Mrs. Child's "Rebels"; Hawthorne's "Septimius Felton," [505.24], and shorter episodes are commemorated in poems, like Longfellow's "Paul Revere's ride" [373.21]; Emerson's poem [1339.21]; Pierpont's [2406.58], etc.

Specially on the fight at *Lexington*, beside the general works named above, see the account by Phinney [4335.50]; that in Hudson's History of Lexington," [4454.2; ch. vi]; Everett's Oration [861.7.1; 2404.5.1], and his "Mount Vernon papers" [893.7 no. 47]; the "Life of Timothy Pickering" [2346.18. 1 ch. v]; the "Proceedings of the Massachusetts historical society" [2355.12, April, 1858], and the English account of the affair in the same Society's Collections, [2351.1, second series, vol. 11]. Also a popular account is contained in Harper's monthly [1810.1.20; 5210.12.20]. The Reverend Jonas Clark, minister of Lexington at the time, delivered a sermon on the anniversary in 1776, to which was appended a "Brief narrative of the principal transactions of that day" [3454.14], which is one of the chief original authorities.

For Concord, beside the general authorities already enumerated, see Shattuck's "History of Concord" [2357.46]; Everett's Orations [861.7.1 and 2; 2404.5.1 and 2], and R. W. Emerson's Historical discourse, 1835 [2357.28].

See also Frederic Hudson's illustrated paper in Harper's monthly, May, 1875; and an article, "Concord fight," by G. Reynolds, in the Unitarian review and religious magazine for April, 1875.

For Bunker Hill, the general monograph by Frothingham [214.2; 231.2; 2351.1] is still the best, and he examines the conflicting contemporary authorities, and reprints General Gage's report, and that of the Committee of Safety, which last is followed by Gordon [4402.22; 4315.6]. Burgoyne saw the battle from Copp's hill, and his narrative has been edited by Pulsifer [43598.50]. Frothingham summarizes his narrative in his "Life of Warren" [242.1; 2346.12]; and other condensed accounts will be found in Bancroft [302.1.7; ch. 38]; in Irving's Washington, ch. 41, [511.1; 516.6; 516.11; 1578.7; 2340.16; 2341.11]; in Elliott's "New England" [2321.4 2; ch. 20]; by Alden Bradford [Pph. v. 234]; in Webster's oration [284.1.1; 2400.4.1; 2404.3.1]; by George E. Ellie [4355.26]; in A. H. Everett's address [Pph. v. 237, or embodied in his life of Warren 518.5.2]; in Edward Everett's addresses [861.7.1 and 3].

For the associations of localities see Drake's "Historic fields of Middlesex" [2359.57]; Lossing's "Field-book of the revolution" [211.1; 2320.23], and his paper in Harper's monthly, Vol. 1 [1810.1; 5210.12]. Finch's article in Silliman's journal [5164.1, for 1822] is reprinted in Frothingham's "Siege of Boston."

In 1818 there was much controversy as to the officer who commanded the provincials, and the curious reader may consult, beside Frothingham's results and his later pamphlet [4355.44], the contributions of Swett [528.9; 2323.11]; and Fellows's criticism of Swett [2347.11]; Hudson [2069.11]; General Dearborn's narrative [4356.25, or Historical magazine, August, 1864]; Webster's article in the North American review, July, 1818; and the proceedings of the Mass. historical society [2355.12, June, 1858]. The claims of Putnam to be considered the commander have been opposed by Dawson. See also papers in the New England historical and genealogical register [2335.1, particularly vols. 12 and 15].

It has been claimed that bloodshed occurred earlier in other places. See Historical magazine, January, 1869.

Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

I. To use periodicals or books in the buildings. Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. To take books away from the buildings. All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 14 years; all nonresident Clergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. The registration takes place in the Lower Delivery Hall of the Central Library, and at the several Branches.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests) may take books for home use, in accordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trustees.

Bates Hall books can be applied for at the several Branches, and when the word comes to the Central Library, if found on the shelves, they will be sent to the Branch by the return express box.

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# CATALOGUES.

Note. — Copies of the printed Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's desk in the Lower Delivery Hall, and at the Branches.

A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT of the Bates Hall circulate like other books.

#### Bulletins.

A fresh list of accessions is posted almost daily in each Library. That for the Bates Hall shows all the books added to the Central Library, and for the few days that elapse before titles appear in print on the Bulletin board, the important new books are displayed (with the shelfnumbers attached) in a glass case at the Desk. The lists for the Lower Hall and for the Branches show only the books added to those departments.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19, and the present, No. 34, is the fifteenth number of the second volume. For sale (excepting those out of print) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; above 2110 in the Bates Hall. Those with E. B., S. B., Rox., Chn., Bri., or **Dor.** prefixed to the number are respectively in the East Boston, South Boston, Roxbury, Charlestown, Brighton, or Dorchester Branches.

IV. The CONSOLIDATED BULLETIN in two volumes (kept near the Desk). Combines in one alphabet the titles contained in the thirty-four printed Bulletins which have been issued since October, 1867, and shows the more important books added to the Bates Hall since August 31, of that year; also, books added to the Lower Hall since the issue of the first editions of the several Finding Lists. It has no entries under subjects.

V. PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE. The printed cards, together with those in manuscript in the same drawers, show nearly all of the books added to the Bates Hall since 1866. Those in large print show also the books added to the Lower Hall since October 1, 1871, and contain all needful cross-references, under subjects, etc.; those in manuscript do not contain such cross-references, but only main entries, under authors, etc. It is the intention, however, to embody the titles of the Manuscript Cards in this Printed Card Catalogue, with the necessary cross-references, as rapidly as possible. The titles in small print from the printed Catalogue of the Prince Library, and from Lower Hall Class List No. III, have been inserted in their proper alphabetical places, and some progress has been made in embodying with them, in the same way, the titles from the Bates Hall Index and Supplement, and from the various Bulletins (Nos. 4-19 have already been embodied, as well as the first half of the Bates Hall Supplement) and other Lower Hall Class Lists. When this work is finished the public will have access in one alphabet to a catalogue of all the books in the Central Library. Until this is done, the visitor will have to search in various printed alphabets in book form and in the manuscript part as well as in the printed part of this Card Catalogue.

VI. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consuited, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue which is at present in manuscript.

# Engravings.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings has been printed, but the edition is now exhausted. Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the same collection which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints; Bulletin 21 contains a list of the framed engravings, not portraits, in the Bates Hall; and a separate Supplementary List completes the cataloguing of the entire collection. A Consolidated Catalogue is in charge of the Curator, as also a numerical catalogue of the engravings in frames.

A CARD CATALOGUE, containing only the titles of works (not anonymous) which have been added to the Lower Library since the issue of the various Class Lists, has been placed at the Clerk's desk in the Distributing Hall. In the printed Bulletins, such works are entered only under the names of their authors. These printed entries have been cut out of the various Bulletins, and inserted in alphabetical order in a book, which is in the custody of the Clerk. and which can be consulted on application to him. This CON-SOLIDATED BULLETIN, therefore, and the Card Catalogue, taken together, show all the additions, both under author and title, which have been made to the Lower Hall since the publication of the several Class Lists.

OBSERVE. Many books properly belonging to the classes of the preceding Lists will be found in No. V, because they form one of a series or collection.

#### Branches.

Catalogues are for sale; — East Boston, 10 cents; South Boston, 10 cents; Roxbury, 20 cents; Dorchester, 20 cents; Charlestown, 25 cents each, parts 1 and 2; and Brighton, 25 cents, for the main Catalogue (including first Supplement), and 5 cents for each of the two subsequent Supplements.

The Bufletins since the issues of the Branch Catalogues, constitute supplements to those several lists.

#### Index to Historical Fiction.

A list of books in prose fiction, of poems and of dramas, illustrating historical eras and persons, and arranged by countries in chronological order, giving indications of authors and titles, so that the work can be found by the catalogues, is for sale at 10 cents.

# Central Periodical Reading Room.

A List of Periodicals currently received (nearly 800 in number, of which about one-half are kept in the Reading Room) is for sale at 5 cents.

# The Catalogue System.

Books are found by -

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work, search for it under the first word not an article. Otherwise, the subject should be looked for rather than the title.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a fictitious one, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific head, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that there references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the *horse*, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synonymous, or nearly so (as Coins and Numismatics), but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher.

For an extended account of the Catalogues see "Handbook for Readers," of which a new edition has just been published.

Note. - This life and one published last year by the baronne de Chabannes [2047.70] have been written in furtherance of efforts, to which Bishop Dupanloup (see his Panegyric, 2705.51.1, one of a long annual series, made at Orléans on the 8th of May of successive years) has lent his assistance, to induce the canonization of Joan of Arc. and they emphasize her sanctity and deem her mission one of divine appointment.

There is a critical note in Brougham's " England and France under the House of Lancaster" [983.1] on the original authorities, which consist chiefly of the contemporary chronicie and the full and interesting records of the trial at which she was condemned, and of that subsequently held by order of Charles VII, at which, on the testimony of those who knew her, it was sought to re-establish her fame. The curious student will study these memorials in the collections of Leber [2618.1.17]; of Michaud [2811.1. series 1, vol. 8]; of Petitot [2615.1, series 1, vol, 8]; of Buchon [2617.2.34]. For the trials themselves reference can best be made to the original Latin with French translation as issued by Quicherat [2626.4 - see notice in Sainte Beuve. 2670.1.2], with accompanying documents in the Freuch version of O'Reilly's "Les deux procès," in the first volume of which will be found the depositions of her neighbors as to her childhood.

To the lives in Frenck the first place must be given to Barthélenny de Beauregard's [4615.7], in which there is a bibliography down to 1847. There are others by Barante [4681.23, drawn from his Ducs de Bourgoyne, 4014.1 and [400.25, drawn from his Duce der Bourgoyne, 601.1 gnd 3, vol. & and 6); by Villiaumé, in "Réfutation des diverses erreurs" [401.8]; by the duchess d'Harcourt, 1864 [4006.24]; by Lamartine [347.4.2, in English], arhetorical actecht; by Carné, viewing her as a "Kondateur de la unité française" [4002.3]; by Préseu, a sketch form 26 in serie 4 and 20 (2012). (2640.76.2); and a recent simply emotional portrayal of her childhood by Marie Edmée Pau (2640.57). The reader may also be interested in Jules Favre's Éloge [2068.65].

In some respects the best narratives of her public career will be found in the general historians, like Sismondi [2622.1.13]; and Michelet [2624.5], whence the account of Joan has been drawn which constitutes what is known as Michelet's life of her [1078.34; or in English, 549.42; 2649a.53; 4677.28]. The French reader will also find a very readable chapter in Guizot's recent Histoire de France (2621.61.2, ch. 24].

In English, the fullest of the lives is that by Harriet Parr [4016.25], based upon recently published material. Earl Stanhope (Lord Mahon) was one of the carliest to give English readers the benefit of the disclosures made by the publication of her trial, but his essay [609.6; 889.32] fails of some developments regarding her trial, which Gurney in his chapters from French history endeavors to supply [4028.63]. See also for suggestions that Joan of Arc was never executed at all. Deleujerre's Historical difficulties [6297.21]; and the reader for essaylike treatment of the subject will not overlook De Quincey [805.8; 4567.1.3], and Sterling [886.1.1]. For a general Catholic view there is a popular anonymous sketch [2649.60]; and for the old English derogatory estimate see Fuller's Holy and profane state [2099.28].

Creasy treats of Orléans as one of the world's decisive battles [948.3]; and Sainte Beuve gives an account of an old historical drama on the siege [4660.28.3]. The English reader who is content with outline sketches of her career can find such in Alice King [1536.12]; in M.

In Putnam's magazine (1841.1, Jan., 1836), Miss Della Bacon, an American, expressed doubts, and in her book, "The philosophy of Shakespeare's plays unfolded," in 1857 [4585.7], she assigned the authorship to Bacon, Raleigh and a club of wits. " in Sept., 1856 (#597.82), and the next year, 1857, he also presented the case more fully in "Bacon and Shakespeare" [2598.15]. Judge Holmes, of St. Louis, who was acquainted with Mise Bacon's theory, but not with Mr. Smith's, went care-fully over the ground, and, in a skilfully-constructed book, made the most powerful plea for such a belief yet Note. - Contains also chapters on F. Mr. Leland does not give full credence to the theory, but deems it probable; and, in corroboration of it, he cites Rochrig's Smithsonsian report, 1872, on the "Language of the Dakota or Sloux Indians" [287,56], in which that linguist finds Asiatic affinities. D'Eichthal also cites as verifying the theory of the Chinese origin of the early Mexicans, the narrative of the journey of Cibola in 1540 by Castañeda de Nagera, 1838, which is included in Ternaux Compane's collection "pour servir à l'histoire de la découverte de l'Amérique" [2316.1]: the Report on the route for a railroad from the Mississippi river, made under the direction of the secretary of war, 1853-4 [4090.1, vol. III]: Whipple and others' report on the Indian tribes [6090.1]; and John Russell Bastlett's "Personal narra-tive of explorations," 1854 [624.2]. Bretschneider's article, "Fusang, or who discovered America ?" which appeared in the Chinese recorder and missionary journal, Foochow, Oct., 1870, is reprinted in full by Leland.

Note. - This book has no new developments, is based on the common authorities, and is intended as an encoursement for the French nation after their recent trials.

The most extensive bibliography on Henry IV is that of the estalogue of the National Library at Paris [6161.1.1]; while the documentary resources for a study of Henry's character and reign can be found in the collections of Michaud [2611.1. 11]; of Petitot [2125.2, 1-9]; of the Archives curieuses [3617.1. 13, etc.] Sec also "L'histoire universelle" of De Thou, 1543-1607 [2300.3, 11. etc. ).

Henry's letters, which are very helpful in forming an estimate of the man, have been collected in seven large volumes, 1500-1610, under the direction of the government, and edited by Berger de Xivrey [240.15], each volume giving a summary of events, and in the general preface there is a list of the previously published partial gatherings of these memorials, with indications of all the sources from which this consolidated collection is derived, which may be supplemented by his letters to Bellièvre, 1581-1601 [2648.59]. Other letters will be found in the Mémoires of his companion and minister, Sully [3657.3; in English, 609.3], and of Duplessis-Mornay [257.2]. Sainte Beuve has a paper on Henry as a writer [2570 1.11], and his letters are reviewed in the Foreign Quarterly review, April, 1843.

The English reader must depend for regular biographies on the popular narratives of James [0812.18] and of Miss Freer, both in her Henry III [1007.11]; in her Henry IV [995.2], and subsequently in her Henry IV and Marle de Medici (614.3). There are also translations of Guizot [837.5; 949.1] and of Ranke [1007.6; 4192.3] for Henry's'relations with his times, and chapters in the concise histories of France, in English, by Yonge [2628.60], and others, beside the general survey in Smyth's lectures [827.8; 4142.2, etc.]. Henry's connection with Netherlandish history is also open to English readers in Motley's United Netherlands [911.1; 4822.9 and 101. and in his John of Barneveldt [2812.51]. Abbott [559.13], Hewlett [535.8], and others [839.6.1, etc.], furnish brief sketches of his career; and a section is devoted to Henry in Gurney's Chapters from French history [4628.63].

In French one of the most important contributions to the understanding of Henry's reforms is the careful and cautious "Histoire du règne de Henri IV," by Poirson, which is examined by Sainte-Beuve [2670.1.13].

The general historians upon the troublous period of the religious wars and Henry's opposition to the Catholic League must be read with an understanding of their several blases. Ranke is a German Protestant [1007.6; 4192.3.2; in German, 4187.2]. Michelet, both in his " Ligue et Henri IV " [4617.5] and in his " Henri IV et Richelieu" [4617.2 and 6], must be understood as liberal in politics and not acceptable to the Catholic party, which finds a strenuous advocate in Capefigue in " La réforme et la ligue " [4628.58], followed by " La ligue et Henri IV "[4028.57], while in the introduction of the former [4628.58] he characterizes from his point of view the various schools of historians who have surveyed the subject. A more temperate writer is Martin in his general Histoire de France [2612.1.10]; and Guizot, subject. though a protestant, in his History of civilization in Europe and France, is broad and well-sustained in his views [837.5; 949.1; in French, 4666.21; 6345.2], while an excellent summary of Henry's career can be found in his recent "Histoire de France" [2621.61.3]. An

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LESCURE, Mathurin François Adolphe de, continued. extreme derogatory estimate of Henry, reversing the popular view, will be found in Haag's " La France protestante" [2644.7]. The estimate taken by a protégé of Catherine de' Medici can be found in Davila's Civil war in France, 1555-1588 [in Italian, 4662.6; 4905.10; in an old French version, 4610.1]. Vitet gives a succinct history of the league, as an introduction to his dramas on that period [in French, 4629.28]. The histories of the Huguenots and of the reformation in France will of course cover much of the subject; and there is a special monograph by Perrens on the relations of the church and state at this time [2626.67]; and another by Mercier de la Combe, "Henri IV et sa politique [4667 16]; while Henry's letters [2640.15, 3 and 4] can well be studied for the period of his abjuration, in commentary upon Ranke's views [4192.8.2]. See also Voltaire's essay on the civil wars [2605.1.10]. Carné's "Fondateurs de la unité française " [462.3] examines Henry's claims to be considered one of the consolidators of the French monarchy; and there is a monograph by Prévost-Paradol on the league formed, 1595-98, between Henry and Queen Elizabeth [2648.66], based on the journal of Henry's ambassador to England, which is preserved in the French archives.

The court life of Henry's reign can be studied in the Mémoires of Margaret of Valois, 5. 1533, his first queen [2026.5; see also Sainte Beuve, 2670.1.6]; and in the lives of his second queen, Maria de' Medici, by Freer [614.3], and by Pardoe [543.1]. See also Menzie's Royal favor-Ites [2246,52]; and the accounts of Gabrielle d'Estiées, duchess of Beaufort, in Elliot's "Old court life" [2006.1; 2623.65] and in Davenport Adams's "Famous women "[2349.57].

I. The Geographic test, so called, which is thought to be the most genuine, and the earliest form. as Polo wrote it, and which was printed in 1824 in the Collections of the Geographical society of Paris [220.11.1].

The Crusca test is held to be an abridged Italian ve ion of the Geographic (French) text, and was published by Baldelli-Boni in 1827 [2240.8; also see 2040.9]1 and again from the original and compared with the Geographic text, by Bartoli, 1863 [5049a.26].

II. The remodelled French text, which Panthler (who wrote the article on Marco Polo in the Nouvelle blographie générale) followed in his learned edition in 1855, and it shows, according to that editor, the emen tions of Polo himself. Yule reviewed this edition in the Quarterly review [3114.1,1868], and another review appeared in the Journal des savants [5341.1, Jan.-May, 18671

III. The numerous Latin texts, translations and retranslations have given rise to many versions in other languages, and that in Grynzus's "Novus Orbis" [4160.8] is a vitiated specimen.

IV. The Ralian taxt of Ramuelo [2260.2.2], which has many interpolations, more of a literary style than the others, is perhaps eclectic, possibly embodies supplemental recollections, and the original of which is not known to exist. This text was republished by Baldelli-Boni in 1827 [2940.8]; and was followed in 1625 in Purchas's Pilgrims, vol. III ( in Barton ]; by Marsden in his English version in 1818 [2240.10, reviewed in Quarterly review, 3114.1.21, and in Monthly review, 3109.1.92]. Wright's edition [857.6], in Bohn's Antiquarian library, was based mainly on Marsden.

V. Modern sciectic texts have been followed in the English versions of Hugh Murray, 1844 [820.67], who rearranges the books : and by Yule, whose first edition appeared in 1871 (5043 5), and was reviewed by Major, in the Quarterly review (3114.1,1872), and by Rawlin-son in Edinburgh review (3112.1, Jan. 1872). This Library has also the Italian edition of Lazari [2240.11], for the Scientific congress, which met in Venice in 1847.

The bibliography of Polo and his book is treated in full in Lazari [2240.11, based on Marsden, 2240.10]. but the student will find an appendix in Yule [3042.65.2] sufficiently full and brought down to date ; while the Italian scholar will find in Bartoli [5049a.26] an essay on Polo and the literary history of his book.

Any reader interested to know the extent of the latest knowledge of Polo's life and writings must first depend on Yule's introductory matter [3042.65.1], and he may consult also his "Cathay and the way thither," published by the Hakluyt society in 1806 [2204.31], whose preparation led Yule to this study of Polo. The general reader will find sufficient for his purpose

NOTE. — The following survey of the literature of the history of Boston during the resolutionary period, beginning with the excitement over the application for "Write of assistance" in 1161, and ending with the transfer of the seat of actual war upon the evacuation of Boston, in March, 1716, — has been prepared to meet the reneved interest incident to the contennial celebrations. It is not intended to make reference to all works, but only to such as are indicative in some respect. The Superintendent would be glad to receive corrections or suggestions.

#### Writs of Assistance, 1761.

Shortly after the close of the French war, when the British government was no longer dependent on the friendly assistance of the colonies, and revenue was to be got from enforcing the acts of trade, the application of the agents of government for "Writs of assistance" was met by James Otis in his plea against the grant. Tudor's Life of Otis [513.3; 2342.14] makes that patriot the centre of interest at this period, and the legal aspects of the case can be studied in Horace Gray's Appendix to the Reports of cases in the superior court, 1761-1774, by Josiah Quincy [5693.11]. The third volume of Hutchinson's History of Massachusetts [2352.9; 2352.13 and 14] 1750-1774, gives the governmental view, while in Minot's History, 1748-1765 [2352.10.2] the patriot side is sustained, and this view is represented in the lives of Josiah Quincy [524.30; 1522.19], John Adams [283.1.1 and 2; 2400.2.2], and Samuel Adams [242.2]. In its broad relations as indicating the temper of the people it is discussed by Bancroft in his History of the United States [302.1; 4421.5]; by Hildreth in his History [303.2; 4411.7; 4321.6]; by Frothingham, in his "Rise of the republic" [273.2; 2322.66]; by Barry in his History of Massachusette [223.3; 2852.3], etc.

#### Stamp Act, 1765.

To the authorities named in the preceding section may be added, for local coloring, the chapters in the histories of Boston by Drake [222.1; 2350.10], and by Snow [2353.7 and 8]. See also chapter XIV of Tudor's Otis [513.3; 2342.14].

# 1767-1775.

This period and its patriotic movements are made the special theme of Frothingham's "Warren and his times" [242.1; 2346.12]; and in the same author's "Rise of the republic" [273.2; 2322.56] the action of the patriots is viewed as tending to form the national spirit. A chapter in Tudor's Otis [513.3; 2342.14] is given to characterizing the people of Boston at this time; and in the collection of contemporary documents called Niles's "Principles and acts of the revolution" [2323.1], the

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spirit of the people can be read in their own words and writings. In Mercy Warren's (she was a sister of James Otis) "History of the American Revolution" [4402.19] we have the characters of the most distinguished of the patriots drawn by one whom when them closely.

The influence of the press is traced in the third era of Hudson's History of American Journalism [231.1; 2405.54] and the aspects can be studied in the files of the five newspapers published in Boston at this time : --

- Ficet's Evening Post, patronized both by the whigs and the government.
- The Boston Newsletter, the only paper which continued to be published during the slege.
- The Massachusetts Gazette, the chief organ of the government.
- The Boston Gazette, devoted to the patriots.
- The Massachusetts Spy, devoted to the patriots.
- The most important journal out of Boston was the Essex Gazette.
- For the influence of the clergy, see Thornton's Pulpit of the Revolution [217.20].

As before, the lives of leading patriots must be consulted, - Wells's Life of Samuel Adams [242.2]; the life and diaries of John Adams [283.1.1 and 2; 2400.2.2]; Quincy's Life of Josiah Quincy [524.20; 1522.19]; Austin's Life of Eibridge Gerry [2842.11]; and the general histories like Bancroft [302.1; 4421.6]; Hildreth [303.2; 4411.7; 4421.5], Minot [2352.10 and 18]; Barry [223.3; 2352.3], etc.

The third volume of Hutchinson [2352.9; 2352.13 and 14] still gives the tory view, and the later British estimate of the period is found in Mahon's (Stanhope's) History of England [2429.50].

For the local associations of the Province House, Green Dragon Tavern, etc., see Shurtleff's Description of Boston [222.4; 4451.20], and Drake's Landmarks [228.22; 2329.52].

# Boston Massacre, 1770.

Frothingham, in his articles in the Atlantic Monthly, June and Aug., 1862, and November, 1863, on the "Sam Adams Regiments," traces carefully the progress of events from Oct., 1768. which culminated in the massacre in March, 1770, and this matter is epitomized in chapter VI of his "Life of Warren" [242.1; 2346 12]. Bancroft treats it in all its relations, in chapter 43 of his sixth.volume [302.1.6; 4421.6.6]; and it is the subject of special treatment by Kidder [4422.12], and in the introduction to Loring's "Hundred Boston Orators" [282.5]. Capt. Preston, the royal officer who commanded the soldiers. was defended at his trial by John Adams and Josiah Quincy, and the lives of these patriots treat of their defence. The accounts of the trial [219.1; 2353.25; 4428.17] and the collection of orations delivered on succeeding anniversaries [4359 18; 2323.1] are necessary to a full understanding of the event.

See also Snow's Boston, [2353.7 and 8], the lives of Otis [513.3; 2342.14], Samuel Adams [242.2], etc., and the general histories.

Crispus Attucks, one of the slain, usually called a mulatto, is held to have been a half-breed Indian in the American Historical Record [4313.51, Dec. 1872].

# The Tea Party, Dec., 1773.

Frothingham, in his "Life of Warren," ch. IX [242.1; 2346.12] has given the details, and in his "Rise of the Republic," ch. viii [273.2; 2322.66], has shown its political significance, and has again taken a general survey in his Centennial paper. in the Proceedings of the Massachusetts Historical Society, Dec. 1873 [2351.2]. See also the Collections of this Society [2351.1, 4th series, vol. 3; and 2353.55]. In ch. 2 of Reed's Life of Joseph Reed [444.8] and in Sparks's Washington [511.5; 2402.1] the relations of the patriots of Boston to those of the other colonies at this time can be studied. Bancroft gives to it ch. 50 of his sixth volume [302.16; 4421.66]; and Barry, ch. 16 of his second volume [223.3.2; 2352.3.2]. Hewes, an actor in the scenes, has given an account [219.4; 2353.16]. There are illustrative documents in Force's "American Archives," vol. I [C. 160.1]; in Niles's "Principles and Acts of the Revolution" [2323.1]; and the contemporary account and records have been reprinted from the Boston Gazette of Dec. 6, 1773, by Poole [Pph. vol. 384].

See further Tudor's life of Otis, ch. 21 [513.3; 2342.14]; Snow's Boston [2353.7 and 8]; Niles's Register, 1827, vol. 33, p. 75 [3141.1 from Flint's Western Monthly Review for July, 1827]; Lossing in Harper's Monthly, vol. 1V [1810.1.4; 5210.12.4].

#### Boston Port Bill, 1774.

General Gage arrived in Boston in May, to put the provisions of this bill in force, June 12. Its political bearings can be traced in Bancroff [302.1; 4421.6] and in Frothingham's Warren, ch. x [242.1; 2346.12] and in his "Rise of the Republic" [273.2; 2322.56]; and the military sequel in Frothingham's "Siege of Boston" [214.2; 231.2; 231.4; 2351.1]. See also Tudor's Otis [513.3; 2342.14]; Wells' Samuel Adams [242.2]; life of John Adams [283.1; 2400.2]; life of Josiah Quincy [524.20; 1522.19].

Illustrative documents will be found in Force, vol. II [C. 160.1]. See the diary of Thomas Newell, in Boston, Nov., 1773, to Dec., 1774. in Proceedings of Massachusetts Historical Society [2356.12, Feb., 1859], and in their Collections [2351.1, 4th series, vol. I]. The Correspondence of the Boston Donation Committee, relative to the supplies sent to the embargoed town from other places, is given in the Massachusetts Historical Society's Collections [2351.1, 4th series, vol. IV]. For Correspondence of the Boston patriots with those of the other colonics, see Reed's Life of Joseph Reed [4443.8.1].

The Suffolk Resolves, passed at Milton, Sept. 9, 1774, can be found in the Appendix to Frothingham's Warren [242.1; 2346.12].

# 1775. January - March.

For the interval before the actual hostilities at Concord, still follow Frothingham's "Siege of Boston," chapter II [214.2; 231.2; 231.4; 2353.1]. and consult for illustrative documents Force's American Archives, vol. I [C. 100.1.1], where will be found Berniere's Narrative of his explorations towards Worcester, to get information for General Gage. For particulars of Leslie's expedition to Salem, in March, see Endicott's article in the Proceedings of the Essex Institute, vol. I [2355.10]; and the life of Timothy Pickering, vol. I [2346.13.1]. The contemporary evidence relative to the expedition to Marshfeld can be found in Force [C 160.1].

E. E. Hale's popular summary, " One Hundred Years Ago" [2353.36], begins with these preliminaries of war.

#### 1775, April, Lexington and Concord.

The best eclectic account is that in Frothingham's "Siege of Boston" [214.2; 231.2 and 4; 2363.1] and in his appendix will be found a chronological list of the principal authorities.

Paul Revere's expedition on the night of the 18th, to give notice of the morrow's march, which is the subject of Longfellow's poem [373.21], was narrated by himself, and appears in the Collections of the Massachusetts Historical Society, first series, vol. v [2351.1]. See in this connection, on the escape of Hancock and Adams, Loring's Hundred Boston Orators [282.5], and General Summer in the New England Geneslogical Register [2335.1, VIII, p. 188].

The narrative and depositions ordered by the Provincial Congress were printed in the "Journal of the third Provincial Congress, 1775," [6410a 3]; in the London Chronicle, and in various Boston newspapers, and the whole resppeared in a pamphlet, issued by Isaiah Thomas, and entitled "A Narrative of the Incursions and Ravages of the King's Troops on the nine-teenth of April," and are given in Force [C. 160.1.2]. This matter constituted the account sent by the Congress to England, with the Essex Gazette, which was the chief newspaper narrative, and which reached London eleven days shead of General Gage's messenger, and in this connection, see the Proceedings of the Massachusetts Historical Society, April, 1858, [2355.12]. Other accounts and depositions as well as those transmitted to the Continental Congress, can also be found in Force's "American Archives" [C. 160.1.2]; in Frothingham's "Siege of Boston" [214.2; 2353.1]; in Shattuck's History of Concord [2357.45]; in Dawson's "Battles of the United States" [221.1.1]; in Frank Moore's "Diary of the Revolution " [222.2,1; 432.62] etc. The Rev. Wm. Gordon, May 17, 1775, prepared "An Account of the Commencement of Hostilities," [in Forces, C. 180.1.2] and this, with additions and abridgmenta, forms part of his "History of the Revolution " [4402.22.1].

The Rev. Jonas Clark delivered a discourse in Lexington on the first anniversary in 1776, and appended to it a narrative of events [3464.14; reprinted, 2353.35; G. 23.1.] A brief account was also prepared by the Rev. Wm. Emerson. of Concord, a witness of the events at Concord, and this was printed in R. W. Emerson's Centennial Discourse in 1835 [2357.28; 2358.9].

Of the British accounts. Col. Smith's report will be found in the Appendix to Mahon's (Stanhope's) England, [2429.50.6]. Various English accounts are given in Force [C. 160.1 2], and in "The Detail and Conduct of the American War" [4427.26]. General Gage sent to Governor Trumbull, a "Circumstantial Account," which is printed in the Massachusetts listorical Society's Collections, second series, vol. 11 [2331.1], while in vol. 1v will be found a reprint of a pamphlet originally printed in 1770, from a manuscript left in Boston by a British officer, which gives Gage's instructions to Brown and d'Berniere, Feb. 22, 1775, with an account of their journey to Worcester and Concord, and a narrative of the "Transactions" on the 19th of April. Stedman [2320.18.1] and the other British writers claim that the provincials fired first at Lexington; and Pitcairn's side of the story is given from Stiles's Diary in Frothingham, and in Irving's Washington [2340.18; 2341.1], etc.].

Late in the day General Heath exercised a general command over the provincials, and his memoirs can be consulted [2323.4]. Col. Timothy Pickering's Essex Regiment was charged with dilatoriness in coming up, and this question is discussed in the "Life of Pickering" [2:46.13. 1, ch. v].

The semi-centennial period renewed the interest in the matter, and the question, whether the provincials returned the fire of the British troops at Lexington, was discussed with some spirit. This having been denied, a committee of the town of Lexington authorized Elias Phinney to publish an account of "The Battle of Lexington" [4325.50; 2333 24], to which was appended depositions (taken in 1822) of survivors to establish the point. This led the Rev. Exra Ripley and others, of Concord, in 1827, to publish "The Fight at Concord" [2324.21; 4325.60] claiming the credit of first returning the fire for Concord, and this was reissued in 1832. In 1835, the story was again told in the interest of Concord, in Lemuel Shattuck's "History of Concord" [2357.45. Reviewed in North American Review, v. 42]. In this account, as well as in that by Ripley and others, it was claimed that the part borne by Captain Davis, of Acton, was not fairly represented, and Josiah Adams. in his centennial address at Acton. In 1835 [4163.13], and again in a letter to Shattuck in 1850 [4325.50]; presented the merits of Davis, and gave depositions of survivors. The parts horne by other towns have also been commemorated, for Dauvers, by D. P King in 1836 [4325.50]; for Cambridge, by Mackenzie, in 1870 [4454.14]; and also see S. A. Smith's "West Cambridge on the 1 th of April, 1775" [4429a. 4].

At Lexington, Edward Everett delivered an address in 1835 [861.7.1; 2404.5.1, — see also his Mount Vernon Papers, 893.7, No. 4:] and there is an account of the celebration in Niles's Register [3141.1 and 2, v. 48]; and a plan of the Lexington field can be found in Josiah Adams's letter [4325.50], and in Moore's Ballad History of the Revolution, No. 1. See also Hudson's History of Lexington [4454.2, ch. v1], and a popular narrative in Harper's Monthly [1810.1.20; 5210.12.20]; and accounts in association with landmarks in Lossing's "Field-book" [211.1.1; 2320.23.1], and in Drake's Middlesex [222.6; 2359.57]. See also R. H. Dawa's address in 1875 [2351.50]; and the centennial " Souvenir of 1775" [2330.22].

At Concord, Edward Everett delivered an address in 1825 [861 7.1 and 2; 2404.5.1 and 2], and much of interest in connection with this anniversary was printed in the newspapers of that day, and Lossing [211.1.1; 2320.23.1] and Drake [2:2.6; 2359.57] should also be consulted for much illustrative of the events of 1775. Popular narratives can be found in Frederic Hudson's illustrated paper in Harper's Monthly, May, 1875, and the article by G. Reynolds in the Unitarian Review for April, 1875 [also separately 2353.34]. See also George W. Curtis's oration in 1875, and James R. Loweil's ode, in Atlantic Monthly, June, 1875. Also the Rev. Henry Westcott's Centennial Sermons, 1875.

The events of the 19th of April also form important chapters in Bancroft's United States [302.1.7; 4421.6.7]; in Elliott's New England [2321.4.2]; in Barry's Massachusetts [223.8.3; 2352.3.3], and in other general works on the Revolutionary period. Also see Dawson's "Battles of the United States" [221.1.1]; E. E. Hale's "One Hundred Years Ago" [2353.36]; and Potter's American Monthly, April, 1875.

Amos Doolittle's contemporary engravings of the events are reproduced in a new edition of Clark's narrative [23 G.1]. See also, Moore's Ballad History, part 1; and Potter's American Monthly, April, 1875. There is a view of Concord taken in 17.6, in the Massachusetts Magazine [5146.3, July. 1794].

An account of Jonathan Harrington, the last survivor of the fight, is given in Potter's American Monthly. July, 1875. See also. Lossing's "Field book" [211.1.1; 2320.23.1].

Claims have been raised for other places as having been the first to shed blood in the war, for which see the Historical Magazine, Jan., 1869, and Potter's American Monthly, April, 1875.

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The events of the interval between Concord and Bunker Hill can best be studied in Frothingham's "Siege of Boston." Particularly on the affair at Noddle's Island. May 27, 1775, see Force's American Archives, Humphrey's Life of Putnam, and a chapter in Dawson's "Battles of the United States " [221.1.1].

#### 1775, June 17, Bunker Hill.

Frothingham, in an appendix to hi4" Siege of Boston" [214 2; 231 2 and 4; 2333.1], enumerates in a chronological order the chief authoritative statements regarding the battle. Dawson devoted the whole of the June, 1863, double number of the Historical Magazine [4315.1] to a collation of nearly all the p inted accounts, authoritative and compiled, and from his footnotes can be gleaned a full list of articles and books which at that time had been published.

The affairs of the 19th of April had among other results precipitated the removal of the newspapers published in Boston to other places, and the number for April 24 was the last of the Evening Post published in Boston. Evelow Boston Gazette, which was thus removed to Watertown, the sent of the provincial Congress, gave in its issue for June 19 the earliest account of the battle which appeared in print. The Massachusetts Spy, which had been removed to Worcester in May, had its first account in its number for June 21. That same day the Connecticut Journal had its first intelligence, and though it was several days later before the New York papers published accounts on this same 21st a han ibill with the news was circulated in New York. In F. Moore's "Diary of the American revolution" [222.21; 433: 52.1], there will be found a list of the contemporary newspapers publishing these accounts, and from which he derives in part the matter of his book which begins Jan. 1, 175. Muny of these accounts will be found reprinted in Dawson's Historical Maguzine article [435.1, 146'); and some of them have been reproduced in fac-simile in the centennial memorials of the present year. Frothingham reprints that of the Massachusetts Spy in his recent condened narrative of the battle, and it is in fac-simile in the "Centennial Graphic" Almon's Remembrancer. Lonion [2323.9], was begun June 15, 1775, for gathering from English and American sources the fugility and contemporary accounts.

The Rev. Mr. Thacher was a spectator of the action, from the north side of the Mystic River, and within a fortnight afterwards, and depending in some measure upon Prescott's assistance, prepared an account, the manuscript of which is now preserved in the American Antiquarian Society's collection at Worcester. This had been used by Frothing ham and others, but was never printed in full with all its corrections indicated, till Dawson included it in bis appendix in 1868. This narrative of Thacher's was made the basis of that which the Committee of Safety prepared for transmission to England, and this latter narrative is given with much other matter in "The Journal of the Third Provincial Congress, 1775" [6410a.3], and has been reprinted by Ellis (in 1843), Frothingham, Swett, Dawson, etc. Force's American Archives, volume iv. [::160.1.4], is another repository of these and various other contemporary accounts, several of which are copied by Dawson in his "Battlee of the United States" [221.1.1], as well as in his Historical Magazine article; and by F. Moore in his "Ballad History of the American Revolution," part 2. Colonel Prescott's own account is contained in a letter dated August 23, 1775, and addressed to John Adams, and this can be seen in Frothing'am, where it was first published, and in Dawson. What is called the Prescott Ms., which is said to have been prepared in the family of the colonel, and in part with his approval, was first printed in full in Butler's History of Groton [2357.42, p 337], etc., and it has been reprinted by Dawson, 9, 437. Frothingham and Sparks had the use of the manuscript know'na SJudge Prescot's (son of the colonel) memoir of the battle; but it has never been printed in full. Contemporary feelings will be found expressed in Mrs. Adams's Letters [4448.9].

President Stiles, then of Newport, kept a diary of events at this time. which is preserved at Yale College. He first heard the news on the 18th, and began his account on that day to which he added from day to day, as further corrected tidings reached him. This was printed at length for the first time in Dawson, but has been used by Sparks, Frothingham, Bancroft, etc. This dary also copies the lotter of Peter Brown dated June 25, to his mother, which is considered by Frothingham, who gives it, as the most noteworthy description written by a private soldier engaged in the battle, and is printed from the original in Potter's American Monthly. July, 1375. Col. Scammans's account of his court martial is given in the New England Chronicle, Feb. 29, 1776, and is reprinted in Duwson, p. 400. Governor Trumbull in a letter, August 31, 1779, gave a sketch of the action, and it is printed in the Massachusetts Historical Society's collections, vol. vi [2351.1.6]. Col John Trumbull, who afterwards painted the well-known picture of the battle, was not in it, but saw the smoke of it from the Roxbury lines, and in his autobiography [4345.18], published in 1841, has an outline narrative. General Heath's memoirs [2323.4], published in 1798, have a brief account. The narrative in Thacher's military journal [2325.4; 4402.10], is entered as having been written in July, 1775. The memoirs of General James Wilkinson, printed in 1816, give, in chapter xix [2324.2], a "rapid sketch," embodying his own knowledge and other evidence which had reached him at first hand, as he went over the field in March, 1776, with Stark and Reed, and conferred with Major Caleb Stark.

Other testimony of eye-witnesses was gathered too long after the battle to be wholly trustworthy, in 1818, at the time of the Dearborn controversy, later to be mentioned, and numerous depositions were taken from survivors attending the semi-centennial celebration, which are preserved in three large volumes, but are considered by those who have examined them as of little or no value. There is a long account in the Columbian Centinel of December, 1824, and January, 1825. Mr. Needham Maynard contributed the recollections of a survivor, which were printed in a Boston newspaper as late as 1843 [Pph. v. 234].

Of the British accounts, the entries in Howe's orderly book are given in Ellis's sketch, 1843 edition. The Gentleman's Magazine of the same year (London) gave an account with a somewhat erroneous plan of the redoubt, which has been reproduced in Frothingham's monographs. General Gage's official report was printed in Almon's Remembrancer [2323.9] accompanied with strictures upon it, and it has been reprinted by Ellis (1843 ed. with the strictures), Force, Swett, Frothingham; by Dawson, in his Historical Magazine and in his "Battles;" in Frank Moore's "Ballad History," etc. Burgoyne saw the action from Copy's Hill, and his letter to Lord Stanley, dated June 25, 1775. has also been given in Dawson [221.1.1]; in Ellis, ed. of 1843; in the New England Historical and Genealogical Register, April, 1857; in an appendix in Pulsifer's sketch [237.24; 4359a 50] issued two or three years since, and is also given in S. A. Drake's "Bunker Hill; the story told in Letters from the battlefiel" [231.6; 2333 23], in which also will be found, together with various other minor British accounts, the "Impartial and authentic narration," originally London, 1775, by John Clarke, "a first lieutenant of marines," who gives what purports to be a speech of Howe to his troops previous to the advance, which with much else in this somewhat extended narrative is considered rather apocryphal. The compiled account in the Annual

Register [2218.68] has been thought to have been written by Burke. Force, Ellis, ed. of 1843, and Dawson, both gather various of the contemporary royalist accounts, and some particulars can be found in the separate historic records detailing the careers of some of the royal regiments in the action, like the Fourth, Fifth, Tenth Foot, etc. Mooroon's Fifty-second regiment [2422.5] gives a brief account of its share in the battle, with plates of their uniform at the time. See also Sergeant Lamb's (Welsh Fuzileers) "Journal of occurrences during the late American war" [4402.18]; and the "Detail and conduct of the American war" [4427.26] for a letter from Boston, July 5, 1775, and other British accounts. The British accounts first took regular shape in Stedman's History of the American War, published in 1794 [2320.18]. Howe's conduct of the battle is criticised in Lee's "Memoirs of the warin the southern department" [4402.20]. Mahon's (Stanhope) History of England [2429.50.6] represents in his account, otherwise fair, that the Americans then and since have considered the battle a victory; but when called upon to substantiate such an assertion, relied chiefly (see his appendix) on the reports of British tourists of a subsequent day.

In 1868, Mr. Henry B. Dawson published a popular account of the "Battles of the United States" [221.1.1]. giving a chapter, based on the ordinary authorities, to Bunker Hill. In 1868, in the Illatorical Magazine [4315 1], an American periodical, then edited by him, he gave a special study of the battle, in which the "colonists" of the earlier work became "insurgents," and the royal troops were ropresented as fighting 'in support of the constitution, the laws, the king and the government, and in defence of the life of the nation." Differing from other authorities, he represents that the attack along the beach of the Mystic was a preliminary attack. He has elaborately collisted the various contemporary and later compiled accounts, and has appended numerous illustrative documents by English and American writers. derived from Almon, Force, Ellis, Frothingham and others, to which he adds several printed for the first time. The fac-similes of Page's, DgBerniere's and Dearborn's maps, which are mentioned in his text as given with his account, were never

Of the more extended descriptions, that in Frothingham's "Siege of Boston" [214.2; 231.2 and 4; 2353.1] is distinctively marked for its dependence chiefly upon contemporary accounts, and its avoidance of the mingled recollections and selfdeceptions of the survivors of all grades, who, in 1818. furnished so many depositions, over forty years after the conflict, to perplex the truth-lover. These confused recollections, added to the local jealonsies of the partisans of the troops of Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Connecticut, and to the facts narrated by different persons as having taken place in positions so disconnected as the redoubt and the rail fence, have done much to render the sifting of evidence very necessary; and it all gave some ground for Charles Hudson, in 1857, in his "Doubts concerning the Battle of Bunker Hill" [2069.11; see also Christian Examiner, vol. xl] to attempt a logical venture somewhat after the fashion of Whateley's famous book on the non-existence of Napoleon. When, later, Frothingham wrote the life of Joseph Warren [242.1; 2346.12] he took occasion to summarize his longer narrative in a chapter of that book, and his whole description has again been recast in a popular form in his recent centennial "Bunker Hill" [2358.11], where he has added much new matter, in letters, incidente, etc.

Anniversary addresses have often rehearsed the story, occasionally adding a few details to our stock of information, and the most significant among them have been Webster's, in 1825 [284.1.1; 2400.4.1; 2404.3.1; see also Analectic Magazine, vol. xi], at the laying of the corner-stone of the monument; Alexander H. Everett's, in 1836 [Pph. vol. 237], which subsequently was inwoven in his life of Warren [518.5.2] in Sparks's series; the Rev. Dr. George E. Ellis's, in 1841 [4355.26], which was subsequently i-sued in 1843, anonymously, as a sketch of the battle with an appendix of illustrative documents, some of which were printed for the first time, and has again in 1875 been recast in a centennial history without the illustrative documents [231.5; 2359a 53; see also his account in the New York Herald, June 8. 1875]; that by Edward Everett [861.7.1 and 8; 2404.5.1 and 3]; and that by Judge Devens in 1875. A succinct narrative of the battle was also once or twice printed [in 1825, Pph. vol. 234] by Alden Bradford, in connection with his studies in the history of Massachusetts [E. 223.2; 2352 6]. A recent "New History of the Battle" by W. W. Wheildon, traces two separate engagements constituting the battle. The last two or three years have produced condensed summaries, like that of Pulsifer [237.24; 4359a.50], and S. A. Drake's [231.6; 2353.28] that by James M. Bugbee, in Osgood's Centennial Memorial [231.7; 2351.51]; an article by H. E. Scudder, in the Atlantic Monthly, July, 1875; one by Launce Poyntz in the Galaxy, July, 1875. It also makes chapter 4 of E. E. Hale's "One hundred years ago" [2353.38], and the story is retold in the Centennial numbers of Frank Leslie's Pictorial, in the Centennial Graphic, and in various other popular memorials of 1875. The story is also told discursively in the illustrated paper, by Rev. Dr. Samuel Osgood, in the July (1865) number of Harper's Monthly; and with particular reference to landmarks, in Lossing's Field-book of the Revolution, volume 1 [211.1; 2320.23], which account also appeared in the first volume of Harper's Monthly [1810.1; 5210.12]; in S. A. Drake's Historic Fields and Maneions of Middlesex [2359.57]. Finch, in an article in Silliman's Journal [5164.1], 1822, gave an account of the traces then existing of the works of the British and Americans in the siege of Boston, and this has been reprinted by Frothingham.

The battle has necessarily given a subject to chapters in the general histories of the war and of the State. The earliest American historian of the war was Gordon [4315.6; 4402.22.2; see Loring on Gordon's History In Historical Magazine, February and March, 1862], and he followed closely the account of the Committee of Safety. Ramsay's American Revolution [4422.64] was published in 1789. Mrs. Mercy Warren's [4402.19] later. Hubley's in 1805. Bancroft gives to it the 38th chapter of his seventh volume [302.1; 4421.6]. It is described in chapter 20 of the second volume of Elihott's New England [2321.4.2] and in the third volume of Barry's Massachusetts [223.3; 2352.3]. The biographers of Washington, like Marshall and Irving. needed to describe it as leading to the consolidation of the army of which he took command on the 3d of July next following. There is a brief account in Tudor's life of Otis [518.3; 2342.14]. The memoirs of Heath have already been mentioned, and the lives of other observers and participants will give occasional minor details.

For the part borne by New Hampshire troops, see the memoirs of Stark [522.11] and Edward Everett's life of Stark [518.5.1; 529.1.1]. Stark's report to the New Hampshire congress is in the New Hampshire Historical Society's Collections, vol. II [4337.44]; in Ellis, ed. of 1843, etc. The adjutant-general of New Hampshire, in his report for 1866, second volume, rehearses the military history of that State, and gives some details regarding the troops of that province which were engaged. The manuscripts in the adjutant-general's office (New Hampshire), containing the rosters of Stark's and Reed's regiments, have never been printed in full. C. C. Coffin, in a letter in the Boston Globe, June 23, 1875, epitomizes the service of New Hampshire troops in the bittle; and details will be found in the New Hampshire Provincial Papers, vol. vil [4437.1]; in the histories of the towns of Hollis [2357.3], whence came Capt. Dow's company of Prescott's regiment; of

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Manchester, by Potter [2338.10], whence came Capt. John Moore's company of Stark's regiment; and of New Ipswich [2338.1].

The question of the highest command in the battle has given rise to much controversy. In many of the unauthoritative contemporary accounts, particularly in the British ones, Warren is represented as the commander. Putnam is known to have been the adviser of the expedition in the Council of War, and in the less authoritative accounts of the time is represented, as also in engravings, as the responsible director. Gordon, in his history in 1788, was the earliest, in print, to give the command to Prescott, following the Committee of Safety's account. The earliest printed mention of Putnam as commander is in a note to the sermon preached at his funeral by Rev. Josiah Whitney, in 1790, where he took exception to Humpbrey's statement in his Life of Putnam, 1788, published while Putnam was still living, in which no mention is made of Putnam having commanded. Eliot, in his Biographical dictionary, in 1809, represents Prescott as commanding in the redoubt, and Stark at the rail fence. The earliest reflection upon the conduct of Putnam in the action appeared in General Wilkinson's memoirs [2324.2], which were published in 1816, and were reviewed in the North Ametican, October, 1817. The Analectic magazine [5178.3], for February and March, 1818, had articles on the battle, following chieffy the accounts of Thacher and Gordon, but with some important differences, and giving documents in the latter number.

General Henry Dearborn, who was a captain in Stark's regiment at the rail fence, opened a controversy, not yet ended, and which at that time soon got to have a political bearing, when he printed his communication in the Portfolio for March, 1814, in which he aimed to show that during the battle Putnam remained inactive at the rear, and this paper has since been reprinted separately [4355,25]; and twice in the Historical Magazine [4316.1], August, 1664, and June, 1868, p. 402. Colonel Daniel Putnam, the son of the general, replied to Dearborn in the May number of the Portfolio, and appended numerous depositions, all of which have been reprinted in Dawson [4315.1, June, 1868, p. 407].

This reply of Daniel Putnam led General Dearborn to vindicate his former statement by the publication in the Boston Patriot of June 13, 1818, of various depositions and confirmations of other participants, all of which may also be found in Dawson, p. 414. At this time, Daniel Webster, in the North American Review, July, 1818, vindicated the character of Putnam, but, examining the evidence judicially, came to the conclusion that Prescott commanded the fatigue party during the night, and on the subsequent day exercised a general command over the field so far as he could, and should be considered the commanding officer, and as acting under the orders of General Ward, at Cambridge, only, and to whom he made report of the action after it was over. See also the Proceedings of the Massachusette Historical Society for June, 1858 [2355.12].

Judge John Lowell next reviewed Dearborn's defence of his attack on Putnam in the Columbian Centinel for July 4 and 15, 1818, and strengthened his points with counter-depositions of actors in the struggle, all of which is again given in Dawson. p. 423. Colonel Swett now entered into the controversy in an "Historical and topographical sketch of Bunkerhill battle," which, in October, 1818, was appended to an edition of Humphrey's Life of Putnam [528.9], and this sketch was subsequently published separately and with enlargements, derived in part from conversations with the survivors who attended the semi-centennial jubilee of 1825, and this appeared in 1826, and again in 1827 [2323.11; see Sparks's notice in the North American review, vol. 22]. Meanwhile, Col. Daniel Putnam, in 1825, recapitulated his views in a communication to the Bunker Hill Monument Association, and this document is printed in the Connecticut Historical Collections [4473.21.1]. The account of Swett has been substantially followed in Rand, Avery & Co.'s "Bunker Hill Centennial." Swett's first publication was criticised by D. L. Child, in the Boston Patriot, November 17th, 1818, who claimed that Putnam was not in the battle, and whose article was reprinted as an "Enquiry into the conduct of General Putnam" [Pph., vol. 247]. On the other hand, Alden Bradford, in his pamphlet. in 1825 [Pph., v. 234], claimed the command for Putnam. In 1841, Ellis, in his oration [4355.26], and subsequently in his "History of the battle," in 1843, taking advantage of intercourse with Prescott's descendants, made the first extended presentation of Prescott's claims, to which Col. Swett demurred in the Boston Advertiser, where also can be found Ellis's rejoinder. Again, in 1843, John Fellows, in his "Veil removed" [2347.11], animadverted upon Swett's views regarding Putnam, and reproduced Dearborn's statements and many others aimed to detract from Putnam's fame.

When Frothingham's "Siege of Boston" appeared in 1849, in which the question of the command was critically examined, p. 159, etc., giving that power to Prescott, Swett renewed the controversy in a critique on that work in 1850, with a tract, "Who was the Commander" [Pph., vol. 195, no. 16], etc., to which Frothingham replied in a pamphlet of fifty-six pages, "The command in the Battle of Bunker Hill" [4355.44], substantiating his position, and pointing out the inconsistencies and seeming perversions of Swett. In 1853, Irving, in his "Life of Washington," favored Prescott. In 1855, L. Grosvenor, in an address before the descendants of General Putnam, "exposed" (as he claimed), "the ungenerous conduct of Colonel Prescott toward General Putnam, the commander in the battle." When Bancroft, in 1858, published his seventh volume, he took the ground, already foreshadowed in a lecture which he had delivered, that Prescott commanded the provincials. In 1859, " Selah," of the Hartford Post, favoring Putnam, had a controversy with Dawson, who held Putnam to have been a " blusterer and swaggerer," and intimates he was also treacherous, and this was reprinted in an unpublished quarto, "Major General Israel Putnam." Again, in Putnam's favor, the Hon. H. C. Deming delivered a discourse before the Connecticut Historical Society on the presentation of Putnam's sword, and it was repeated. June 18, 1860, at Putnam's grave, at Pomfret, before the Putnam Phalanx. The argument, as regards the claims of Putnam, was presented by the Rev. I. N. Tarbox, in the New York Herald, June 12 and 14, 1875. and in the New Englander, April, 1875. S. A. Drake's "General Israel Putnam the Commander at Bunker Hill" [2353.37], argues on the basis of military rule, and summarizes the authorities. See also Hollister's "History of Connecticut" [4337.10] and Hinman's "Connecticut in the revolution" [4402.8]. Judge Devens's oration at Bunker Hill, 1875, favors Prescott. Wheildon's "New History" favors Putnam.

In 1825, when General W. H. Summer was adjutant-general of Massachusetts, and it devolved upon him to arrange for the appearance of the veterans in the celebration of that year, he collected from the recitais of some of them some particulars regarding the appearance and death of Warren, and held some correspondence with Dr. Waterhouse on the subject in the Boston Paritot, in August of that year. This matter he reproduced in a paper in the New England Genealogical Register, April and July, 1858. See further the accounts in Loring's "Boston Orators" [282.5]; in Mr. J. B. Brown's [Warren's grand-daughter] "Stories of General Warren" [4409a 30]; in Dr. John Jeffries's (son of the royal surgeon on the field) paper in the Boston Medical and Surgical Journal, June 17, 1875; and in the life of Dr. John Warren [2345.63], brother of the general. See also the memorial volume [2342.9] on the occasion of the dedication of the Warren statue, and particularly Frothingham's Life of Warren [242.1; 2346.12]. There is an account of the different celebrations in Charlestown in the New York Herald for June 4, 1875. There are other papers on the battle in the Genealogical Register [2335.1], and Dawson's and Frothingham's notes will indicate additional publications not mentioned here.

The earliest of the plans of the action seems to have been a slight sketch, after information from Chaplain John Martin, who was in the battle, drawn by Stiles in his diary, which is reproduced in Dawson, who also, as does Frothingham, gives the slight sketch, made with printers' rules, which accompanied the account in Rivington's gazette. Aug. 3, 1775.

The careful plan made by Page of the British engineers, based upon Capi. Montresor's survey (which closely agrees with Felton and Parker's survey of ('harlestown in 1>48, is much the best, and it shows the laying out of Charlestown, the position of the frigates, and the battery at Copp's lill. The successive positions of the attacking force are indicated by a superposed sheet. This was issued in London in 1776, and the same plate, with few changes, was used in Stedman's history [2320.18.1] in 1794. The original impression was re-engraved for Frothingham's "Siege," and is also given in his Centennial marrative.

De Berniere's plan, on much the same scale as Page's, differs in some points from it. is not so correct in the ground plan, and is the first plan that appeared in an American engraving, in the Analectic magazine [5178.3], February, 1818, where it is represented as from a sketch found in the captured baggage of a British officer in 1775. General Dearborn made some remarks on this plan in the Portfolio, March, 1818, which are reprinted in Dawson, p. 438. Dearborn's subsequent plan, as altered in red on that of De Berniere, was criticised upon the field in June, 1818, by Governor Brooks (who acted as messenger from Prescott to Ward in the battle), as detailed by General Summer in the New England Genealogical Register, July, 1858. This map was made the basis of one engraved by Smith, and issued in Boston, at the time of the completion of the monument, in 1843.

A map of Boston, showing Charlestown and the field, with Burgoyne's letter attached, was issued in London, and has been reproduced in fac-simile in F. Moore's "Ballad History of the Revolution," part 2.

There is also an English map of the eastern part of Massachusetts, dated London, September 2d, 1775, in which the lines of march of the troops of the different provinces are designated as they assembled to the relief of Boston. This has been reproduced in smaller size in the Centennial Graphic, and Frothingham styles it "more curious than valuable." In a sidesketch, of this same sheet, there is a semi-pictorial plan of the battle, with the whole of Boston, and this has recently been fac-similed in Wheildon's, Pul-ifer's and Bugbee's sketches, and in George A. Coolidge's Centennial Memorial.

Colonel Swett made a plan [2323.11] of his own. based on Bernlere's, of about the size of Page's, and it was reproduced full size in Ellis's Oration, 1841; but the reproductions of it in Lossing's Field-book, in Ellis's New York Herald article, June 8. 1875, and in his History and Centennial History, in Rand, Avery & Co.'s "Bunker Hill Centennial," in George A. Coolidge's "Brochure," in the Bunker Hill Times, June 17, 1876, and in Bugbee's sketch, are reduced in size. Little regard is padd in this plan to the laying out of the town of Charlestown.

Of contemporary plans of Boston, that in the Gentleman's Magazine, October, 1775, p. 464, shows the peninsula, with "Charlestown in ruins." This is drawn from the same original as that in the Pennsylvania Magazine, 1775, which in the June number has a plan of Boston Harbor, with only one eminence delineated on the Charlestown peninsula, which is marked "Bunk H." The houses in the town are represented as on fire. The London Magazine, April, 1774, has a chart of the coast of New England, whith a plan of Boston in the corner, and this plan was inserted, enlarged. in Jeffery's "Map of New England," Nov., 1774, with also a plan of Boston harbor, and was again copied in Jeffery's "American Atlas," 1776, and a French reproduction of it was published at Paris in 1778, in the "Atlas Ameriquain septentrional."

There are rude contemporary views of the action, one of which appeared in 1775. known as Roman's, represents Putnam on horseback, as in command, and was reduced in the Pennsylvania Magazine, September, 1778, and this has been heliotyped in Frothingham's Centennial sketch, in Rand, Avery & Co.'s, and in Coolidge's memorials, and is also reproduced in Moore's Ballad History, and in the Bunker Hill Times, June 17. 1875. In Cocking's poem, "The American war," published in London, 1781, is a somewhat extraordinary picture, which, with extracts from the poem, has been reproduced in S. A. Drake's monograph, in Bugbee's sketch, and in Coolidge's "Brochure." In the Gentleman's Magazine, Feb., 1790, there is a view of Charlestown and Howe's encampment on the hill, taken after the battle; and in the Massachusetts Magazine, Sept., 1789, is a view of Charles River Bridge, showing the configuration of Bunker's and Breed's Hills.

The well-known picture which Colonel Trumbull, in 1786, painted of the battle, and of which a key will be found in the Genealogical Register, vol. xv, and of which there is a description in Trumbull's autobiography, gave the command in the redoubt to Putnam, and a subordinate position to Prescott, which the painter is said afterwards to have regretted, as indicating views on the question of command at variance with the truth. A picture by D. M. Carter represents Prescott in command, and this is reproduced in Coolidge's Brochure [23596.54]. For accounts of the monument, see Ellis's ed. of 1843; Frothingham's "Slege of Boston;" and Wheildon's Life of Solomon Willard [4345.11].

#### The Siege of Boston, June, 1875 - March, 1776.

The slege of Boston began with the return of the British troops from Concord on the evening of April 19, 1775; and Putnam fortified Prospect Hill immediately after the battle of Bunker's Hill; and after Washington's taking the command, July 3, 1775, the completion of the lines about the town was begun.

The fullest account of the events succeeding the 17th of June will be found in Frothingham's "Siege of Boston" [214.2; 231.2 and 4; 2353.1], but a general survey of the events will be found in Bancroft [302.1.8; 4421.6.8] and Barry [223.3.3; 2352.3.3]; and popular accounts can be followed in Dawson's "Battles of the United States" [221.1.1]; in E. E. Hale's "One hundred years ago" [2353.36], and in the general historics. Gordon [4402.22.2] gives details from diaries of the times; and illustrative matter of contemporary origin is given in Almon's Remembrancer [2323.9]; in Force's American Archives [C.160.1]; in Moore's "Diary of General Heath in the camps at Roxbury and Cambridge, in the Proceedings [2355.10.3]; the diary of General Heath in the camps at Roxbury and Cambridge, in the Proceedings [2355.10.3] of the Massachusetts Historical Society.

The letters of Washington, in Sparks's edition [287.2.3; 2402.1.3], during his stay at Cambridge, are of the utmost importance, as are those of Joseph Reed [4443.8]. his military secretary. See also the autobiography of Col. John Trumbull [4345.18], who was at this time of Washington's military family, and the life of Dr. John Warren, of the medical staff [2345.63]. Of the associations of Washington with his head-quarters at Cambridge, see Alexander McKenzie's article in the Atlantic monthly, July. 1875; and Charles Deane's paper in the Proceedings of the Massachusetts Historical Society [2355.12, Sept. 1872. — see also June, 1858]. In this connection see Rev. Dr. Peabody's oration at Cambridge, July 3, 1875, and the poem by James Russel Lowell. Also much connected with the Cambridge centre, and the left wing can be learned from Drake's "Middlesex" [23:9.57]; and for the whole line, in Lossing's "Field-book" [211.1; 2320.23].

Various diaries and letters of contemporaries, written during this interval, have been printed, like that of Dr. Belknap, in the Cambridge camp, Oct., 1775, etc., in Proceedings [2355.12, June, 1838] of the Massachusetts Historical Society; that of Paul Lunt, in the Cambridge camp, May 10, to Dec. 23, 1775, in the same, Feb. 1872; that of Ezekiel Price, in the same, Nov., 1863; the Andrews papers in the same Proceedings, July, 1865; the diary of Aaron Wright in the Boston Transcript, April 11, 1862; a diary in the Historical Magazine [4315.1. Oct., 1864]; letters, which had been used by Frothingham, but were not printed in full till they appeared in the New England Historical and Genenlogical Register, April, 1857; and letters in the Proceedings of the Massachusetts Historical Society, June, 1873; in the American Historical Record, Dec., 1872.

On the evacuation, in March, 1776, there are letters in the New England Historical and Genealogical Register, VIII, p. 231, etc.; in the Proceedings of the Massachusetts Historical Society, 1858. Dawson, in his "Battles" [221.1.1], gives Howe's despatch from Nantasket Roads, March 21, 1776; and Washington's despatch of March 19, 1776.

The appearance of Boston at this time can be judged of from a plate representing the landing of the British troops to garrison the place in 1768, by Paul Revere, which is reproduced in Rand, Avery & Co.'s "Bunker Hill Centennial." There is a view of the harbor and town in the Pennsylvania Magazine, June, 1773; a description with a view in the Columbian Magazine, Dec. 1767 [5156.3]; and one of the town from Breed's Hill in the Massachusetts Magazine, June, 1791 [5146.3], and in July, 1793, a large view of the Old State House, and for another see Aug.. 1791; in July, 1789, one of the Hancock House; in March, 1780, one of Fancuil Hall, — all showing the aspects of revolutionary Boston. A view showing Dorchester Heights is in the number for Nov.. 1790.

Descriptions of the town and its society at a little later date will be found in the letters of Anburcy [2362.6], who was one of Burgoyne's officers, quartered at Cambridge in 1777; in Abbé Robin, a chaplain of Rochambeau, in 1781 [4363.13], whose account is quoted by Shurtleff, and translated in the Historical Magazine [4315.1], Aug. 1862; and in Chastellux, 1782 [2361.18.2], also quoted in Shurtleff's Description of Boston [222.4; 4451 19 and 20].

There is a view of Gage's lines on Boston neck in Frothingham, from a print published in 1777, and a plan of them in Force's American Archives [C. 160.1.3], and an original plan reproduced in the Centennial Graphic. See also Pennsylvania Magazine, Aug., 1775, for Gage's lines. A plan of the fort erected by the British on Bunker Hill proper is given in Frothingham's "Siege," from one published in London, in 1781.

Shurtleff, in his "Description of Boston" [223.4; 4451.19 and 20, ch. vi.], gives a chapter to the enumeration of maps of the town and its harbor, some of which are of interest in understanding the circuit of fortifications erected by the provincial forces at this time. The best for consultation is the eclectic map given by Frothingham, p. 01 [214.2; 231.2 and 4; 2353.1], See also that in Force [C.160.1.3], and the military maps in Marshall's Washington [2340.20; 2341.3; 4440.5], Sparks's Washington [311.6, reproduced by Guizot], Lossing's "Field-book" [211.1; 2320.23], etc.

For contemporary maps, that in Vol. I. of Almon's Remembrancer [2323.9], drawn at Boston in June, 1775, shows for the field of battle, the words "Breed's pasture," which accords with the belief that that eminence was not known as Breed's Hill, till after the battle. It is not otherwise very accurate.

The Gentleman's Magazine, Jan. 1775 [3115 1], gave a chart of the town and harbor.

The Pennsylvania Magazine, July, 1775, gave a plan of Boston, with a side-sketch of the lines about the town, which has been reproduced in Moore's Ballad History, and in the Centennial memorials of Rand, Avery & Co., of George A. Coolidge. etc. Col. Trumbull, in his autobiography. [4345.18], gave a map of the lines made by himself in Sept., 1775.

A large map of the town, with surrounding country and harbor, after Samuel Holland's surveys, was published by Des Barres in London, Aug. 5, 1775. It shows no fortifications except those at Copp's Hill and on the neck. A colored copy of this is in this Library, as is also a French map, 1780. "Carte particulière du Havre de Boston, réduite de la carte angluise de Des Barres." The 1775 plute of Des Barres, without change of date, but nevertheless with changes in some parts, and with the various fortifications of the siege delineated, was published again in 1780-83 in the "American Neptune." and it was from the Hon. Richard Frothingham's copy of this, that the reproduction in Shurtleff's "Description of Boston" [222.4; 4451.19 and 20] was made in 1870.

Faden's map of Boston, with the intrenchment of 1775, based on the observations of Page in 1775, was published, I ondon, Oct. 1, 1777, and in a later edition, Oct, 1778, and it has been fac-simile'd in Frothingham's "Siege" [214.2; 2353.1, etc.].

Roman's map of "The seat of civil war in America," 1775, has a rude view of the lines on Boston neck, and a plan of Boston and its environs.

In 1776 there was published by Beaurain, at Paris, a "Carte du Port et Havre de Boston," which is copied from a British plan, and has in a vignette the earliest known printed representation of the Pine-tree banner (this vignette is copied by Frothingham, who calls the map "curious but not correct"). There is also a German edition of the same.

In 1777 was published Henry Peiham's map of Boston and environs, which is called "the most accurate" of all. It was published in London, June 2, 1777, shows the military lines, and has been reproduced in Moore's "Diary of the Revolution" [222.2.1; 4823.62.1], and in Drake's "Landmarks" [2359.57].

In 1777, Faden published in Londou a plan of Boston and vicinity, showing the "Rebei works," and based on Page's and Montresor's observations.

The earliest of the eclectic maps, and the one followed by later authorities in assigning the location of the military lines, was that given by Gordon in his History [4402,22.2], who took Page's for the town, and Pelham's for the country.

# Works on Ornament and Decoration.

In this note will be found the titles of some of the more important works upon ornament and decoration, not including purely architectural works, or those treating of painting and sculpture, in which, however, will be found much valuable suggestion and material. For convenience of reference, they have been classified as follows: --



1. Ornament and Decoration generally. These are for the most part elaborately illustrated in colors and gold, giving examples of a great variety of subjects, such as frescoes, bronzes, embroidery, porcelain, textile fabrics, tapestry, lace, carpets, arms, armor, jewelry, book-binding, manuscript illumination, wood and ivory carving.jewelry, gold, silver and iron work, glass painting and mosaic, costume, furniture and interior decoration. Among the leading works are the following: Sommerard, "Arts du moyen àge," 1 vol. of plates [4070.2], and 2 vols. 8° of text [4071.15], taken mainly from the collections of the Hôtel Cluny; Louandre, "Les arts somptuaires" [8072.6]; Gruner, "Specimens of ornamental art" [D.3.M]; Lacroix, "Le moyen àge" [8061.15]; Racinet, "L'ornement polychrome" [8070s.13]; Owen Jones, "Grammar of ornament" [4070.5]. (See, also, the descriptive catalogues of the various courts of the Crystal Palace, viz. : Italian [4089.25]; Renaissance [4089.33]; Mediæval [4079.34]; Byzantine and Romanceque [4089.35], illustrated by wood cuts; also, Newbery, "Gleanings from ornamental art [4072.52], excellent outline plates.

The following books are not of the general scope of those aircady named, but are devoted to some special department. Among those concerning ornamental design and drawing are kichurdson's "Studies of ornamental design" [4050.1] for freecocs, embroidery and goldsmith work; Hahn's "Ornamenten Schule" [80 M. 1] for self-instruction in free-hand architectural drawing: Hulme, "Outline examples of freehand ornament" [4072.57]. The following treat of the adaptation of natural objects to the purposes of design: "Art studies from nature [4076.52]; Pugin, "Fioriated ornament" [4101.1]; Colling. "Examples of mediaval foliage" (12th and 15th cent.) [4091.52]; "English mediaval foliage and colored decoration," by the same author [4091.52]; Prang, "Parallel of historical ornament" [407.55], taken mostly from Racinet and Jones; also a series of flowers from nature, by Ryan [3840.52].

Prefixed to the "Tradesman's book of ornamental designs" [4080.15] (lithograph illustrations), is an essay on "Ornamental art, as applicable to trade and manufactures," by James Ballantyne.

On Plant Form, in relation to ornament and design, see the works of Hulme, "Principles of ornamental art" [4071.68]; "Sketches from nature of plant form " [3841.51]; "Plants, their growth and ornamental treatment" [3840.51]. Of these, the first named is a treatise with photo-lithographic illustrations, the others, principally colored plates of plant form. "Flore ornementale," by Ruprich-Robert [8070a.9], treats of flower forms in a "plastic point of view," with numerous illustrations.

Dupont-Auberville has in course of publication a very finely illustrated work, "L'ornement des tissus" [6070.57], having 100 beautifully colored plates, with notes and introduction. See, also, "La dentelle," by Seguin [4020.51], which gives an elaborate history, description and bibliography of lace, illustrated by phototypographic fac-similes and wood engravings.

Architectural Detail. — The works referred to in this paragraph are, in the main, devoted to ornament and decoration considered in relation to architecture. The following mostly refer to Bouthern Europe: Tatham's "Etchings of Greek and Roman architectural ornament" [4100.24] gives vases, friezes and sepulchral ornament; Gailhabaud, "L'architecture du Sme au 17me siccle" [8084.3] has finely colored plates; Gruner treats of the "Terra Cotta architecture of Northern Italy in the 12th-15th centuries" [8090.50], and is very finely illustrated in colors. Runge's "Backstein Architectur Italiens" [8100.20]; Waring and McQuold's "Examples of architectural art in Italy" relates to the 13th-16th centuries, also illustrated in colors [4050.2]; Wyati's Architect's note-book in Bpain" [4096.54], containing 100 autotype fac-similes of the author's pen and ink sketches. "Le moyen äge monumentale et archéologique" [4050.17], 4 v. f\*, gives elevations, interiors and details in finely drawn lithographs.

For GotAic architectural ornament, see the works of Gibbs [4100.21], domestic and monumental art; Colling [8090.11]; Brandon's "Analysis" [4101.3], containing 700 illustrations of doorways, windows, etc.; Pugin's "Ornamental timber g ubles" [4101.2]; Brandon's "Open timber roofs of the middle age" [4090.10]; Mackenzie and Pugin's "Specimens of Gothic architecture," mostly from Oxford [4102.6]; Pugin and Le Keuz" "Architectural antiquities of Normandy" [4101.4], giving architecture," mostly from Oxford [4102.6]; Pugin and Le Keuz" "Architectural antiquities of Normandy" [4101.4], giving architecture" [8103.50] and the "Detached essays" of the Architectural Publication Society [8103.51], each having one volume of text with separate volumes of plates; the "Moniteur des architectural ornament and decoration [4100.10]; Shaw's details of Elizabethan architecture [4090.16]; "Monuments of art" [8021.20].

Interior Decoration and Furniture. — The following books treat mainly of the interior decoration and ornament of buildings, and are elaborately illustrated in color and gold, giving ceilings, friezces, frescese, parquet floore, meanic, tile and marble work. "The universal decorator," edited by W. Gibbs [8090a.1]; Weissbach and Lottermoeser, "Architechtonische Motive" [8100.11], edited with the coöperation of Prof. W. Lübke, of Stuttgart; Lagrange, "Album d'ornements" [8064.1], for the use of mechanica; Schreiber, "Renaissance Ornamente," Carisruhe [8064.2].

For Freeco and Painting, see Hunt's Book of art" [4071.67]. illustrated by wood cuts of the decorations of the new Houses of Parliament at Westminster; Pocock's "Modern finishing for rooms" [4102.24]; Thomas "Mural or monumental decoration" [8094.8]; Whittock's "Decorative painter's and ginzier's guide" [4012.17]; Taylor's "Manual of freeco and encaustic painting [4077.8]; Bryce's "Modern ornamentor and interior decorator" [8072.27]; all these being intended more particularly for the use of practical mechanics.

Wood and Isory Carving. — Bee Roger's "Art of wood carving" [4072.33]; Penrose, "Manual of wood carving" [4074.32]; Williams, "Historical sketch of the art of sculpture in wood" [4077.2]; Habn, "Funf Elfenbein-Gefässe des frühesten Mittelalters" [4071.17]; Maskell's "Ivories in the South Kensington Museum" (with photographs) [4072.67]; Williams, "Ornamental designs for fret work [8070.58]; Sawyer's "Fret sawing and wood carving [4018.63] and [1207.8]; "Manual of buhl work and marquetry" [4021.52].

Furniture. Consult Pugin's "Gothic furniture in the style of the 16th century" [4101.10]; Gibbs' "Designs for Gothic furniture" [4090.19] for practical mechanics; Talbert's "Gothic forms applied to furniture, metal work, etc." [4090.55]; "Ancient and modern furniture in the South Kensington Museum" [4093.52], illustrated by photographs; Bielefeld "Use

of papier-maché in furniture and decoration" [4100.23]; Eastlake's "Hints on household taste in furniture, upholstery, etc.," edited by C. C. Perkins [8102.26]; Dupont-Auberville, "L'ornement des tissus," Paris, 1875, beautifully illustrated [8070.57]; Hope, "Household furniture and decoration" [39F.1], in the classical style of the first French empire, which has a list of authorities; Shaw's "Specimens of ancient furniture," finely illustrated [8100.10].

Metal Work. Pugin's "Designs for iron and brass work, in the style of the 15th and 16th centuries" [4101.11]; Pugin's "Designs for gold and silver smiths" [4071.2]; Wyatt's "Metal work and its artistic design" [4050.14], treating of iron and bronze work, and also of artistic locksmith and goldsmith work. See also King on "Antique gems and rings" [2251.51].

Ecclesiastical Ornament and Costume. Pugin's "Glossary of ecclesiastical ornament and costume" [4000.4]. 1846, gives numerous fine-colored illustrations of vestments, alphabets, diapering, monograms, emblems. The third edition, edited by Bernard Smith, in 1868, is [4000.64]. "Instrumenta Ecclesiastica" [8084.4] gives photolithographic illustrations of objects exhibited at Mechlin, in 1864, such as reliquaries, patines, chalices, and articles of wood and ivory carving. See Twining's "Symbols and emblems of early and mediæval Christian art" [4071.51], and Lübke's "Ecclesiastical art in Germany during the middle ages" (Eng. trans., by Wheatley) [8061.6]. "Church decoration" [4099.10], is a little practical manual, containing lettering, wreaths, borders and Christmas decorations.

Painted Windows and Glass. On painted windows and glass, see Weale's "Works of early masters in Christian decoration" [4061.1], which includes a biography of Albert Dürer, and is finely illustrated by examples of painted and stained glass; Waring's "Examples of stained glass, freeco, ornamental marble, enamel, and wood inlay," fully illustrated in colors [4070.60]: Deville's "Histoire de l'art de la verrerie dans l'antiquite" [4021.57], also finely illustrated; Winston's "Memoirs" [4065.23]; Le Vieil, "Art de la peinture sur verre" [4065.31]; "Inquiry into the difference of style in ancient glass paintings, especially in England" [4066.1], 1 v. text, and 1 vol. colored wood-cute; Snell's "Enamel painting on glass" [4078.60]; Langlois' "Peinture sur verre" [4065.5]; de la Fieffe, "Les verreries de la Normandie" [4015.56].

*Pottery, Porcelain, Titee.* Consult Jaquemart's "Histoire de la céramique, des poteries de tous les temps et de tous les peuples" [4021.53], in English [4021.56]; "Merveilles de la céramique," by the same author [4025.8], both illustrated fully by beautiful etchings by the author; Brogniart, "Traite des arts céramique" [4025.2], 2 v. text, 1 v. plates; Figuier, "Merveilles de l'industrie" [4021.56]; Maze, "Recherches sur la céramique" [4021.55], photographic illustrations; Mareschal, "Faïence populaire au 18me siècle" [4021.50], 112 chromolithographic plates; Demmin, "Guide de l'amateur de faïences et porcelaines" [4025.9], fully illustrated; Nichols "Examples of decorative tiles" [4101.20], fac-similes in original size; Marryatt, "History of pottery" [4026.1 and 10], illustrated in color; Chaffers, "Keramic gallery" [4024.13].

Chaffer's "Marks and monograms on pottery and porcelain" [4025.25], 4th ed. [4024.15]; Binn's "Century of potting in Worcester" [4025.20]; Passeri, "Istoria di pitture in majolica in Pesaro" [4066.15]. See also Slade's "Catalogue of his collection of glass" [8020.50] finely and copiously illustrated; Fortnum's "Catalogue of majolica. Hispano-Moresco, Persian, Damascene and Rhodian wares in the South Kensington Museum" [4021.54], with fine colored illustrations; "Catalogue of Terra Cottas, in the British Museum" [4070.11]; also a volume of photographs of objects in the British Museum [6140.7], vases, stone utensils, glassware, etc. Cousin, "Recucil des œuvres choisis" [4070.67] gives some examples of glass painting. The Life of Wedgewood by Eliza Meteyard [4025.24], and that by Jewitt [4025.23], are well illustrated, and interesting books.

Itismination, Manuscripts, Binding. — The magnificent work of Silvestre, "Paléographie universelle," in 4 v. [2110.1], gives fac-similes of manuscripts of all people and all times, chronologically arranged and admirably executed. See also a gmaller work by the same author [2110.3]. Humphrey's "Illuminated books of the middle ages" [2110.2] is of the same character; Westwood's "Fac-similes of miniatures and ornaments" [24 F.2] is devoted to Anglo-Saxon and Irish manuscript; "Fac-similes of ancient manuscript," published by the Paleographical society (in course of publication); Lempertz, "Bilderhefte zur Geschichte des Bücherhändels" [2126.8], gives bindings and fac-similes of manuscripts, with portraits and autographs of persons eminent in the history of the book trade. More practical books concerning the art of illumination are those by Delamotte [2115.27] and [2115.37]; DeLara [2116.32]; Savage [2120.3]; Humphreys [2115.2]; "Initialen des Mittelaiters" [2126.10]. See also Bickham, "Universal penman" [2110.4]; "Williams & Packard's Penmanship" [6111.25]; Williams" "Practical Treatise" [21233].

For reproductions of Egyptian papyri, see the work of Mariette Bey [5050a.2]; Pierret [5050.1]; as likewise the great work of Lepsius [D.2 A-L] for inscriptions and mural paintings and decorations.

On binding, see Julien's "Album de reliures " [6010.12].

In the "Recueil des œuvres choisis de Cousin" [4070.67] will be found examples of illumination, glass painting and engraving.

Historical Ornament and Decoration. — Under the titles of Egypt, Rome, Pompeli, Central America, India. etc., in the notes of the various catalogues of this Library, the reader will find references to many works having more or less bearing on the subject. Some titles are subjoined here. Champollion, "Monuments de l'Égypte et de la Nuble" [D.4 L.]; Layard, "Monuments of Nineveh" [D.4, R.2]. Belzoni, "Voyages en Égypte" [D.4 O.3]. See also the magnificent work of Lepsius, "Denkmaeler aus Aegypten und Aethiopien," in 12 volumes [D.2 A-L.]; Fergusson, "Picturesque illustrations of ancient architecture in Hindostan" [3020.5]; "Burgess' Archæological survey of Western India" [5040.7]; Stackelberg, "Die Graeber der Hellenen" [80 F.1], giving urns, vases, bas-rollefs and other sepulchral ornaments; Waring's "Stone monuments and ornament of remote ages" [8080.3] refers to Scotch and Irish antiquities; "Cités et ruines américaines" [23 H.1], with text by Viollet Leduc, gives large photographs of the Central American ruined eities; Niccelini's work on "Pompeii" gives magnificent large colored plates of the architectural ornament and decoration of that city. See also Ruskin's "Examples of the architecture of Venice" [D.3]; Gruner's "Decorations des palais et d'églises en l'Italie" (15th and 16th centurics) [27 E. 1], and the works by Pfuor, on the castles of "Heidelberg" [80 H.1] and "Fontainebleau" [80 J.1], giving details of decorations on a large scale, and in color.

Appell's "Sculptures and catacomb paintings" [4075.82] gives woodcuts of monuments of early Christian art, and refers to numerous authorities in his notes.

Arnold, "Herzogliche Palast von Urbino" [47 G.1]. See also Owen Jones' books on the "Alhambra court in the Crystal Palace" [4089.37], the Greek court [4089.30]; the Egyptian court [4089.40]; and his elaborately illustrated "Plans of the Alhambra" [4100.26].

Theoretical. - The following books are devoted to the theoretical treatment of various points of decorative and

ornamental art: Wornum, "Analysis of ornament" [4202.14]; Chevreul's treatise on the "Laws of the contrast of color," translated from the French by Spanton [4078.65], illustrated in colors; Bourgoin's "Théorie de l'ornement" [4072.53] is fully illustrated by engravings; Field." Grammar of colouring "[8068.29]; Bacon, "Theory of colouring "[8068.30]; Portal, "Des coulcurs symboliques" [4066.23], treats of the symbolical significance of colors; Sir Gardner Wikinson's treatise "On colour" [4066.24], showing the "necessity of a general diffusion of taste, also, on dressed or geometrical gardens;" Fairholt's "Rambles of an archaeologist [A.225.1] is a volume of papers on painting, art, decoration and manufactures, illustrated by woodcuts; Waring's "Record of my artistic life," London, 1873 [4079.72] is an entertaining autobiography, containing hints and criticisms interspersed through his diary of travel, in regard to this subject; Walter Smith's Lectures on "Art education, scholastic and industrial," Boston, 1872 [4074.50], contains much useful suggestion. Ruskin's works, too, are full of criticism, precept and suggestions as to all branches of art culture [2579a.50-72].

Periodicals. — The volumes of these periodical works contain, among other things, many articles and illustrations upon this subject. In many instances the illustrations are executed in the best manner, and are worthy of careful examination. The following are among those best worth referring to: "Architechtonisches Skizzen-Buch," Berlin, beginning in 1865 [8091.9]; "The workshop," illustrated by wood-cuts [8101.16]; "The portfolio" [8080.1]; "L'art pour tous," an encyclopædia of industrial and decorative art [7360.3] illustrated by wood-cuts and chromolithography; the well-known London "Art journal" [7260.2]; "Blütter für Kunstgewerbe" [8070.54]; Vienna, devoted mainly to interior decoration, with full working drawings, and dealing largely with the Exposition of 1873; the "Gewerbehalle," published in Stuttgart [8090a.2].

# Public Card Catalogue.

A change is to be made in the printing of the cards of the PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE, by which time will be saved in getting the titles before the public in their proper places in the drawers. The process to be employed is that of direct transfer on gelatine plates, by Messrs. James R. Osgood & Co., the entries appearing in fac-simile of the writing of the Library transcribers.

# Dorchester Branch.

A sub-delivery of the Dorchester Branch has been opened since June 7th, at the Lower Mills Village, a box passing daily between that Branch and the Delivery. Books are thus obtained at the Lower Mills from the Branch at Field's Corner, and through that Branch from the Central Library; and the use of the books is increasing to a degree that will probably warrant the maintenance of the Delivery, which has now only the features of an experiment.

By an arrangement, the books, as far as serviceable, of the Dorchester and Milton Circulating Library have been turned in provisionally to the Dorchester Branch; and, having been catalogued, the titles, with such others as have been added to the Dorchester Branch since the issue of the Catalogue in March, 1875, will make a supplemental list for this Branch, which will be issued before the publication of the next Bulletin.

# The Notes in the present Bulletin.

It is hoped that the careful reader will derive help from the notes which appear in the present list. The statistics of circulation show such a decided impulse in the direction of more studious reading, produced by the notes in the Class List for History, Biography and Travel, that the plan has since been followed of appending similar notes to the titles of new books, when their publication gives freshness to a subject. Attention is called to the following :--

# Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes, and are catalogued. It is intended in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These will be put on the shelves in boxes, and for the box the bound volume will be substituted, when the needful numbers are procured. Solicitations are renewed for lots of pamphlets, which will be sent for, on receiving information that they are ready. The chances are, that any missellaneous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets wanted, and the others will avail in exchange. The number of duplicate pamphlets is now upwards of 30,000, all arranged, and ready to be exchanged for others not belonging to the Library. With distant libraries, the following method of exchange has been found the most convenient: if they will send 1,000 pamphlets printed in their State, or in a given locality, this Library will send 1,000 printed in Massachusetts, or in some other locality. Each may acquire some duplicates, but a great part will probably be fresh accessions.



# Books Recommended, and Books Received.

Any person desiring a book not in the possession of this Library may ask, on blanks furnished for the purpose, that it may be purchased; and the assurance is given, that the book will be procured as soon as possible, unless there is some reason for not buying it; and, on its arrival, it will be retained three days for the person recommending it, to whom due notice will be sent by mail. It is not intended, however, to allow applicants to secure the first reading of popular books by recommending them before publication; as such books are purchased irrespective of all recommendations.

The right book may fail to come, if this application is not *legibly* filled in, and correctly, as regards title, author, etc.; and there may be delays in ordering, if obscure penmanship or insufficient or erroncous data render the labor of verification fruitless or uncertain.

Foreign books (even though with American title-pages), to avoid duties and to gain an increased discount, must be bought through agents abroad, and six or eight weeks, or a longer time must elapse before their arrival. Additional delays take place when the book needs to be bound, as is usually the case with continental publications, or when recommendations are received just after the despatch of orders, particularly as regards foreign books.

When the book is out of print (and books still standing in current catalogues are often so) no positive assurance of its speedy procurement can be given. The judgment of the necessity of buying duplicates must be based upon the Library's records of circulation. Bates Hall books are not duplicated; but other copies, or copies of cheaper editions, are sometimes put in the popular departments.

If the books are recommended by those not holding cards, no claim for special use can be established, even if they are bought on such recommendation.

# Memorials of Boston.

The Public Library of the city should contain every memorial, whether book, pamphlet, map, broadside, print, photograph, or the like, which is procurable, and which in any way illustrates the history or topography of the city. Books printed in Boston at an early date are very desirable acquisitions; and it is to be hoped that friends of the Library will assist in making the collection complete.

# Engraved Portraits.

Portfolios and scrap-books have been prepared for the preservation of engraved portraits, and any contribution of this kind will be gladly accepted. Particular attention will be paid to the gathering of likenesses of Bostonians.

# Centennial Collections.

The Library will be glad of assistance from its friends in forming a collection of books, pamphlets, periodicals, pictorial and other newspapers, manuscripts, prints, photographs, etc., illustrating the celebrations now occurring.

# Important Notice to Card-holders.

The rule requiring immediate notice of change of residence or address is not observed as it should be. The ramification of the Library system through its Branches renders the omission to do so a serious matter, both as regards trouble and expense. It is hoped that it will not be necessary to exact the penalty of forfeiture of card. It has also become necessary that residents in out-lying districts of the city, where the numbering of houses does not exist, should give as exactly as possible the locality of their houses.

Central Library books can be delivered at the Branches.

<sup>\$50.00</sup> reward will be paid for information leading to the conviction of any person, who may mutilate or wantonly deface any book, periodical or engraving belonging to this Library.

Marking or writing on books, etc., is covered by the provisions of the law, under which the Trustees direct prosecutions to be made.

Notices to remind borrowers of the return of books are sent; but no claim can be established because of the failure of such notices in the mails.

Books can be recommended for purchase on slips provided at the Desks, if the Library needs them; and when duplicates are recommended, they will be bought, if the circulation of them warrants it, and there is no objection to the purchase of a book in any case.

Persons Admitted to Use the Libraries.

I. To use periodicals or books in the buildings. Any person above the age of 14 years may use the Reading Room for periodicals, and may make use of the books within the buildings, without previous registration.

II. To take books away from the buildings. All citizens and residents of Boston above the age of 14 years; all nonresident Clergymen and Teachers having regular professional occupation in the city; and all pupils attending the Girls' High and Normal Schools, are entitled to a full use of the Library. All these must sign the application card, and give the name of a citizen, who may be consulted, if necessary. The registration takes place in the Lower Hall of the Central Library, at the Branches, and at the Lower Mills Delivery.

III. Non-residents. Non-resident members of educational institutions in the city and other non-residents (when specially permitted, in consideration of the advancement of the public interests) may take books for home use, in accordance with the conditions imposed in each case by the Trustees.

Bates Hall books can be applied for at the several Branches, and at the Lower Mills Delivery, and when the word comes to the Central Library, if found on the shelves, they will be sent to the Branch by the return express box.

# CATALOGUES.

Note. — Copies of the printed Catalogues are always accessible on the tables of the Bates Hall, at the Clerk's desk in the Lower Hall, at the Branches, and Lower Mills Delivery. A limited number of copies of the INDEX and SUPPLEMENT of the Bates Hall circulate like other books.

#### Bulletins.

A fresh list of accessions is posted almost daily in each Library. That for Bates Hall shows books added to the Central Library, and before titles appear on the Bulletin board, the new books are displayed (with the shelf numbers attached) in a glass case at the Desk. The lists for the Lower Hall and for the Branches show only the books added to those departments. The Dorchester list is posted at the Lower Mills Delivery.

The printed quarterly Bulletins reached the end of the first volume with No. 19, and the present, No. 35, is the last number of the second volume. For sale (excepting those out of print) at 2 cents each. Books with numbers below 2110 are in the Lower Hall; above 2110, in the Bates Hall. Those with E. B., S. B., Rox., Chn., Bri., or Dor. prefixed to the number are respectively in the East Boston, South Boston, Roxbury, Charlestown, Brighton, or Dorchester Branches.

It has no entries under subjects.

V. PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE. The Card Catalogue in the Bates Hall contains the more important books added to the Bates Hall since 1866 and all books added to both the Lower and Bates Halls since 1871. Of these, those in print (large and small type) contain all needed cross-references under subjects, etc. Those in manuscript, on smaller cards, have all been inserted in their proper alphabetical order among the larger ones. Most of these manuscript cards respond to a title in the Bulletins, and such are thrown out when the duplicate card in this small print is inserted. Titles from all the Bulletins have been already embodied in the cards. The titles from the Catalogue of the Prince Library, from the Lower Hall Catalogue of History, Biography, etc., and from the first half of the Bates Hall Supplement, have also been put in, and some progress has been made in preparing titles from the last half of the Supplement and from the Bates Hall Index.

VI. The OFFICIAL CARD CATALOGUE, which can be consulted, in cases of need, upon application, supplements the printed Index and Supplement, and supplies full cross-references to that part of the Public Card Catalogue which is at present in manuscript.

#### Engravings.

A List of the Portraits in the Tosti Engravings has been printed, but the edition is now exhausted. Bulletins 13 and 15 contain a list of that portion of the same collection which is in bound volumes, embracing nearly 5,100 prints; Bulletin 31 and a separate Supplementary List contain the engravings, not postraits, in frames and in portfolios. A Consolidated Catalogue is in charge of the Curator, as also a numerical catalogue of the engravings in frames.

In the printed Bulletins, such works are entered only under the names of their authors. These printed entries have been cut out of the various Bulletins, and inserted in alphabetical order in a book, which is in the custody of the Clerk, and which can be consulted on application to him. This COR-SOLIDATED BULLETIN, therefore, and the Card Catalogue, taken together, show all the additions, both under author and title, which have been made to the Lower Hall since the publication of the several Class Lists.

OBSERVE. Many books properly belonging to the classes of the preceding Lists will be found in No. V, because they form one of a series or collection.

#### Branches.

Catalogues are for sale; — East Boston, 10 cents; South Boston, 10 cents; Boxbury, 20 cents; Dorchester, 20 cents, and 10 cents for the Supplemental list. Charlestown, 25 cents each, parts 1 and 2; and Brighton, 25 cents, for the main Catalogue (including first Supplement), and 5 cents for each of the two subsequent Supplements.

The Bulletins since the issues of the Branch Catalogues, constitute supplements to those several lists.

#### Index to Historical Fiction.

A list of books in prose fiction, of poems and of dramas, illustrating historical eras and persons, and arranged by countries in chronological order, giving indications of authors and titles, so that the work can be found by the catalogues, is for sale at 10 cents.

#### Central Periodical Reading Boom.

A List of Periodicals currently received (more than 800 in number, of which about one-half are kept in the Reading Room) is for sale at 5 cents.

#### The Catalogue System.

Books are found by -

I. The title. If this is not clearly indicative of the subject of the work, search for it under the first word not an article. Otherwise, the subject should be looked for rather than the title.

II. The author. Find this in its proper alphabetical place. If the name is a fictitious one, there will be a reference from it to the real name.

III. The subject. Find this under the most specific head, and consult other heads referred to there; but observe that these references are not to more general subjects, inasmuch as it is left to the intelligence of the user to look for matter pertaining to the horse, for example, under such general heads as Natural History, Animals, Quadrupeds, and Mammals, books on which general topics have, almost as a matter of course, chapters or sections on particular animals. Again, books on the same subject will sometimes be found under different heads, where the terms are synouymous, or nearly so (as Coins and Numismatics), but in such cases cross-references from one to the other will always assist the searcher.

For an extended account of the Catalogues see "Handbook for Readers," of which a new edition has just been published.

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## Waterloo and the Campaign of 1815.

Bibliography. — There is a monograph by Max Budinger, "Zur Waterloo Literatur," published in 1869, and sections can be found in the catalogue of the National Library at Paris [6161.1], under military histories in vol. vrr, and on the Hundred Days specifically in vol. 111, p. 304, and vol. v, p. 637, while the select bibliography in the article on Napoleon in the "Biographic Universelle" [2262.237] will afford the principal titles in the interests of the Emperor. A list of what Quinet found to be the most essential authorities can be seen on p. 38 of his book [4635.31].

English accounts .- Wellington's despatches during the campaign were necessarily hurried, and they can be found in the main collection of them [2523.1.8] and the supplemental series [2524.10.11], while that on Waterloo is given in connection with the English version of Müffling's sketch of the battle [4629a.52] and in other general accounts. The Duke was through life very reticent about the battle of Waterloo, but his views have been held to be expressed in Lord Ellesmere's two articles on Waterloo in the "Quarterly Review" [3114.1] and thirty years after the events he answered some of the criticisms of the Prussian Clausewitz on the battle of Waterloo, in which answer it has been proved that Wellington's memory was more or less at fault. This answer can be found in the Supplemental Despatches [2524.10], in Gleig's version of Brialmont's life of the Duke [4543.5.2, app.], and in the appendix to Yonge's " Life of Weilington " [2523.7]. The lives of Weilington need to be consulted. Maxwell's is the earliest of importance [2541.7.8]. Gleig, in 1858, translated and enlarged the excellent work of Brialmont of the Belgian staff [4543.5.2], but in regard to this particular period, Brialmont found it difficult to acknowledge the failures of Napoleon, and he is not so clear as in other portions of his book. Later, in 1962, Gleig gave a more condensed life of Wellington [2523.9], based on his version of Brialmont, but with additional matter derived from the "Supplemental Despatches." Gleig also prepared a popular narrative, "Story of Waterloo" which Siborne, in his third edition [4515.8]. claims to have been derived in the main from his book. The latest life of Wellington is by C. D. Yonge, published in 1860 [2523.7], which embraces new matter and the latest investigations. See also a general officer's review of Wellington's European campaigns in the "Spectateur Militaire" [7950.3.15].

General Mercer, who commanded the ninth brigade of the Royal Artillery, made rough notes of his daily experience during the campaign, which were afterwards written out and kept free from everything that did not come under personal observation, and the section on Waterloo is in chapter 13 of vol. I [6646.10], and is valuable for minor details of the day's experiences. Scott visited the scenes scon after the event, and his "Paul's Letters to his Kinsfolk" [2677.5.5; 4569.1.5. etc.] were written near enough to the occurrences to enhance their interest. Mudford's illustrated quarto on "The Campaign in the Netherlands" [2540.20] was published within two years of the battle. Scott, of course, again surveyed the campaign in his taskwork, the "Life of Napoleon Buonaparte" [2642.11.9, etc.], but not with the weight of authority necessary to the student.

It was not until Siborne, in 1844, published his "War in France and Belgium in 1815," that a thorough study of the subject was made, and his account still remains the completest in detail, which makes it, however, too full of military technics for the general reader [1005.2]. His third edition is somewhat corrected and brought within the compass of a single volume [4515.8]. His prejudice in favor of the British troops is strong, and Knoop's controversy with him for his slight of the Netherlandish contingent is examined in the "Spectateur Militaire" [7650.3.43]. His opinions are also examined in an article, "Marmont, Siborne and Alison," in the "Quarterly Review" [8134.1.76].

Alison, in the earlier editions of his "History of Europe" [943.1.4, etc.], had criticised Weilington's conduct of the battle, for which he was in turn criticised by Sir F. B. Head in 1843 [875.1.2; 3134.1.72]; but in his later editions [2293.60, etc.], he recast the section on Waterloo, and though he sacrifices somewhat to picturesqueness of detail, and is of no original value, he makes the narrative readable through his working up of the researches and criticisms of Siborne, Charras and Clausewitz, and of Hamley's brilliant analysis in his "Weilington's Career" [2529a.51], and in his "Operations of War" [3933.51].

General Shaw Kennedy's "Notes" [2513.4], confined to the battle of Waterloo, and comparing all the accounts, up to 1863, supplements and complements other accounts, giving the clearest idea of the actual conflict and the fullest exposition of Wellington's tactical skill. He was on the English commander's staff in the quartermaster's department, but he trusts much for details to Siborne, and depends largely upon his power of clear judicial examination of them. He is reviewed in the "British Quarterly Review," Oct., 1866.

Col. Chesney's lectures on Waterloo [1983.2; 2541.8; 3d ed. 1874, 2513.3] do for the antecedent strategy of the campaign what Kennedy has done for the tactics of the battle, and he weighs the conflicting estimates of it. He leads the reactionary feeling in England in allowing the Prussians due credit for their share in the battle. Mathew's casay [1828.13] is a summary based largely upon Chesney.

The reader who desires the best single accounts in English, covering both the political and military aspects of the entire campaign from Eiba to St. Helena, will find it in the compact narrative of Hooper's "Waterloo" [4653.6], who may lack the judicial bearing of Kennedy, but he combines in a readable way the points of Siborne and Charras, the leading English and French authorities.

Details can be filled in further from the 23d chapter of Duncan's "Royal Artillery" [2423.55.2]; and from Leake's "Lord Seaton's Regiment at Waterloo," 1866 [2424.51.1, ch. 1-5, and 2, ch. 55 for summary], a clumsy and repetitionary narrative, dwelling on the claims of that regiment to have defeated single-handed the Imperial Guard at the crisis of the battle by a flank attack, which claims met with much criticism from the partisans of the British Guards; and these criticisms are answered in the same veln in a supplemental volume [2424.52]. There are also recitals of the part borne in the conflict by the Grenadier Guards [2423.57.3], by the Fifty-second [2422.51], and by the Coldstream Guards [4564.1].

Waterloo is one of the conflicts described in Creasy's "Fifteen Decisive Battles" [948.3]. As regards the reception of the news of the battle in England by private hand in advance of advices to the government, see Everett's Orations [861.7.3, p. 138] and C. M. Young's Memoirs [6547.19].

French accounts. — Until of late years Napoleon's own accounts have been the basis of most of the French narratives, and have given color to the popular lives of the Emperor. The publication of the imperial edition of his correspondence gave in full his writings at the time [2641.11.23], so far as it was deemed politic to print them. After he was domiciled at St. Helena, what is called Gourgaud's account of the campaign of 1815 [in English, 4625.21; see also 605.10] was hastily written to exculpate himself and throw the blame of the failure upon Marshal Grouchy, whom he censured for not acting contrary to his own orders. This narrative cannot be disregarded, but it must be cautiously followed.

The Emperor made a more elaborate defence of himself in the section on this campaign, which is a part of the Memoirs [in English, 602.5.7; in French, 2643.7.9], published as dictated by himself at St. Helena, and can also be found in the imperial editions of the "Correspondence," [2641.11.31], and of the "Commentaries" [4621.6.5].

The question of the culpability of *Grouchy* has given rise to much controversy. The Marshal himself published a pamphlet, "Observations sur la relation de la campagne de 1815." Count Gérard answered Grouchy in "Quelques documents sur la battaile de Waterloo" [2618.56], and threw more light on the question, and Janin reviews the positions of both Grouchy and Gerard in the "Bpectateur Militaire" [7960.3.9]. The publication of Thiers' 20th volume [4647.4.20; or separately, 4643.18], in giving the Emperor's views of Grouchy's conduct, renewed the controversy, and the Marquis of Grouchy published " Le Maréchal de Grouchy, 16 au 19 juin, 1815" [4628.65]. Meanwhile with judicial thoroughness Charras had reviewed the matter, which he elaborated in his sixth edition in the notes to his 24 volume [2613.51], and he is closely followed by Quinet [4635.21]. Chesney sums up the question in Grouchy's favor [2513.3, p. 198]; and Hooper gives an appendix to it [4638.6].

The conduct of Ney, both at Quatre Bras and at Waterloo, has also been the topic of controversy, instigated by those who would shield the reputation of the Emperor. Ney's official account may be found, among other places, in the appendix of Maxwell's Weilington [2541.7.3]. Colonel Heymès, his aid, published a "Relation de la campagne de 1815," which can be found in vol. 1X of the "Mémoires" of Napoleon [2643.7.9] and in the "Documents indits sur la campagne de 1815" [2643.55], which Ney's son, the Duke of Elchingen, published in his father's defence in 1840. Heymès is reviewed in the "Spectateur Militaire" [7960.3.8], while in another volume of this periodical [7960.3.15] there is a review of the "Memoirs" of Ney [2633.2], published by his family.

One of the earliest of the French controversialists was Fleury de Chaboulon [in English, 604.9; in French, 4657.3], and his narrative drew forth some notes from the Emperor himself [4621.6.5, in the "Commentaries"].

The earliest of the French authorities to give anything like a comprehensive examination of the campaign was Jomini, in his "Vie Politique et Militaire de Napoléon" [2046.50; in English, 4625.3], but his method of making the Emperor introduce the topics in imagined conference with Alexander, Casar, and Frederick the Great, has hampered him, in Chenney's view, on points where Napoleon had expressed written opinions, while Kennedy thinks that Jomini, not witnessing the action, was not master of details. The campaign of 1815 forms the 22d chapter of this great work, and has been issued separately [987.10; in French, 4663.19,] and has been reviewed in the "Spectateur Militaire" [7950.3.34]. His representations of the conduct of Ney also led to a correspondence with the Duke of Elchingen, which may be found in Jomini's appendix, and in the "Spectateur Militaire" [7950.3.32] of 1841.

The reaction in France against the Emperor's reputation for the conduct of this campaign began when Col. Charras, who had been exiled from France, published in Belgium, in 1867, his account of the campaign, which is too much elaborated except for the special student, as it makes two large octavo volumes with an atlas. Writing near the scene of the conflict, he sought local sources of information, and Chesney ranks him as the first of all authorities. Thiere laborate to refute him, and in the sixth and posthumous edition of Charras [2613.51, published in 1869] there are elaborate notes in reply to Thiers.

Edgar Quinet, who had been led to the study of Waterloo by the Jomini and Elchingen correspondence, was further prompted by the appearance of Charras's book to review it; but his examination finally took shape in a keen and brilliant monograph, in which he followed Charras closely and made a very readable condensation of these reactionary estimates [4633.21].

The brilliant effort in Napoleon's favor, palliating his blunders, and explaining the discrepancies of the Emperor's account, which Thiers made in the 20th volume of his "Consulate and Empire" [4647.4.20, etc., reviewed in "Le Spectateur Militaire," 7950.3, 2d ser. 42], and which is issued separately in France, in popular editions [4643.18], tends largely to preserve the traditionary prestige of Napoleon's name among the French people. The conflicting statements have naturally been examined by many essayists, among whom may be named Sainte Beuve [4660.28.2]; Scherer [2678.64.2]; the "Quarterly Review," Jan. 1863, etc.; while the most important reconcilement of opposing news, expressed however, with apologetic deference for Napoleon, is given in the Frince de la Tour d'Auvergne's monograph, published in 1870 [4624.10], which is reviewed in the "Revue Militaire Francaise" [7954.1, new ser., vol. 11].

Of subsidiary importance connected with the military history of the campaign are many other works, among which may be named Nettement, "Histoire de la Restauration" [2614.51.2]; Lamartine's "Restauration" [2704.4.4; 4653.17.4, book 25; whose account is examined in the "Quarterly Review," 3144.1.90, and his military errors have been pointed out by Capt. Du Casse, in "Le Spectateur Militaire," 7950.3, second ser., vol. III and IV]. General Lamarque's "Resai historique sur les cent jours," in his "Souvenirs et mémoires" [2654.11.1]; and Capefigue's "Cent jours" [4653.3], mostly of political import, but ch. 7 of vol. II is on Waterloo.

German accounts. — Blücher's official account can be found in English in the appendix to Maxwell's "Weilington [2541.7.3], and the various lives of that marshal will afford additional or illustrative matter, as Scherr's "Blücher, seine Zeit und sein Leben," 1862 [4847.23.3, last book]; Förster's [2845.10]; and Varnhagen von Ense's, which is a popular narrative, with anecdotical interest. General Müffling was the military commissioner of Prussia at Wellington's head-quarters, and his contributions are essential to the complete understanding of the co-operation of the two armies. He published a short history of the battle [in English, 4629a.52], but made subsequently a more important contribution in his "Aus meinem Leben," Berlin, 1851, known in the English translation as "Passages out of my Life" [6424, part II, p. 197, etc.]. Von Damitz's "Geschichte des Feldzugs von 1815" [2646.66] is of secondary importance, but the author participated in the campaigu, and had possession of the documents left by General Groiman, Quarter-master General of the Prussian army. The greatest of the Prussian military writers, however, is Clausewitz, whose "Feldzug von 1815," to which Wellington made a reply, makes vol. viii of Clausewitz's "Hinterlassene Werko," Berlin, 1835. Chesney refers to vol. XIV of Schulz's German history of the "Revolutionary Wars" as being excellent; and says he found Bernhardi's "Geschichte Russlands," 1824-1831 [3063.10], important in some respects.

Dutch accounts. — The chief of the Netherlandish writers is Van Löben Bels, who is an essential authority, with original documents on the part borne by his countrymen, and he is awarded the praise of impartiality by the adherents of the Emperor. His full work is in Dutch, on the war career of Napoleon [2646.55.4.], but there is a French version [2644.63] of the part on the campaign of 1815.

#### Maps, Plans, etc.

The Campaign of 1815. — The strategy of the opposing armies can be followed in the general maps of the country they occupied, given in the atlance of Jomini [2640.70, with a separate volume for descriptions]; of Thiers [4634.1 pl. 65]; of Siborne [4510.2]; of Charras [2613.61]. Other maps can be found in the imperial edition of Napoleon's "Commentaries" [4621.65, p. 113]; in Jomin's Campaign of 1815 [463.19]; in the Dutch War History of Napoleon, by Van Löben Sela [2646.65.4, pl. v111], and in the French version of his campaign of 1815 [2644.63]; in Prince de la Tour d'Auvergne's narrative [4624.10]; in Hamley's "Operations of War" [3953.61, pp. 182 and 198]; in Col. Chesney's "Waterloo" [2513.13.3, followed in Mathews's Essay, 1828.13]; and in the "History of the Grenadier Guards" [2423.57.3]. Similar maps are given in the principal lives of Wellington, like Brialmont's, translated by Gleig [4543.5.2, p. 400]; Maxwell's [2541.7.3, p. 462]; Stoequeler's [4545.50.2]; and Yongo's [2523.7.1].

Waterloo, June 184A - The plan in Thiers's atlas [4634.1, pl. 66] is a topographical chart, not showing the position of the troops, which, however, is said to be best shown in the plans in Siborne's Atlas [4510.2], where the stages of the battle at 11.15 o'clock, at 7.45 o'clock, and 8.05 o'clock, are represented. Plans showing the position of the forces in the morning and at the crisis in the evening are given in Alison's Atlas [2293.50, pl. 106 and 107]. In the imperial edition of Napoleon's "Commentaries" [4621.6.5] the field is represented at 10 o'clock, A. M., and at 7, P. M., and Hooper, in his condensed history, shows the same at 11 o'clock and at 5.30 o'clock. Hamley, in his "Operations of War" [3953.51, p. 388], gives a chart of the formation of the lines. Oldfields' plan is given in Yonge's Wellington [2523.7.1] where is also given. p. 565. a transcript of a plan of the field made by the Duke's orders in Sept. 1814, and used by him on the morning of the battle, showing his pencil lines, as marking the positions intended for his troops. Kennedy [2513.4] gives Bergeant Major Cotton's plan, which, he says, represents best the general features of the ground, but he thinks Craan's map best for the topographical details. Leake's account of Lord Seaton's Regiment, the Fifty-second Infantry [2424.51.1, 2524.52] has three plans to show particularly the successive positions of that regiment, and to illustrate its agency in the final repulse of the Imperial Guard. See also Moorsom's Fifty-second Regiment [2422.5]. There are also plans in the "History of the Grenadier Guards" [2423.57.3]; in Charras [2613.51]; in Van Löben Sels [2646.55.4, pl. x, and 2644.63]; in Damitz [2646.56.1]; in Mudford [2540.20]; in La Tour d' Auvergne [4624.10]; in Jomini's Campaign of 1815 [4663.19]; in Nettement's "Histoire de la Restauration " [2614.51.2]; in Gleig's Wellington [4543.5.2, p. 468] and in Maxwell's Wellington [2541.7.3, -at 7 P.M.]. Also in Gleig's " Story of Waterloo."

Kennedy [2513.4] gives plans of Hougoumont and La Haye Sainte; and Hougoumont is similarly delineated in the "History of the Coldstream Guards" [4564.1.2], and in Stocqueler's Wellington [4545.50.2]. Mudford [2540.20] gives various views of parts of the field taken just subsequent to the battle.

Wasse, June 184A and 194A. — Siborne [4510.2] shows the position of the forces at 4 P. M., on the 18th, and at 4 A. M., on the 19th. See also the plans in the Marquis of Grouchy's defence of Marshal Grouchy [4628.65]; in Damitz [2646.56.1]; and in Alison's Atlas [2398.50, p. 108]; and the map for the study of Grouchy's movements in the "Speciateur Militaire" [7950.3.9].

Subsequent advance of the Allies. - See the Atlas of Charras [2613.51], and some of the general maps of the campaign above enumerated.

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### Newspapers.

In general. — One of the earliest general accounts of newspaper history in various countries is in a paper by P. L. Simmonds, 1841, in the Journal of the Statistical Society of London [2288.1.4].

The principles on which newspapers are conducted have been discussed in connection with the specific works of the different national presses, later to be mentioned; but different phases of the subject have been treated in an article by Beresford Hope on "Newspapers and their Writers," in the "Cambridge Essays" [2555,16.2]; by F. B. Sanborn in "Journaliam and Journalists," in the Atlantic Monthly [5324.1], vol. 34; in "Schools of Journalism," in Scribner's monthly [7392.2.4]; in Maurice's "Use and Abuse of Newspapers," in his "Friendship of Books" [2576,68]; in P. G. Hamerton's "Reading of Newspapers," in Scribner's monthly, vol. 5; in Conant's "Newspapers and Editors," in Harper's [5230a.18], vol. 46; and in the recent "Views and Interviews on Journalism" [2405.58], by Wingate, who gives the opinions of the chief contemporary editors of this country on the methods of conducting newspapers. This book also contains a sequel to Croly's "Newspaper of the Future," which appeared in Putnam's magazine. See the paper on the "Modern Newspaper," in the British Quarterly Review, April, 1872.

Americas. — The whole subject of journalism in this country has had ample treatment in a special monograph by Frederick Hudson [2405.54], who was for a long time the managing editor of the New York Herald, and whose record covers the interval 1690-1872, — the only comprehensive treatment which the subject had previously received being a somewhat scanty summary in chapters 21 and 22 of Andrews's "History of British Journalism " [395.1].

The earliest period of newspaper history in America, chiefly confined to New England, is covered in the collections of the Mass. Historical Society [2351.1.5 and 6], in what is little more than a list of such as were published in New England from 1704 to the Revolution. See in this connection Thomas's "History of Printing in America" [2113.2]; Drake's "History of Boston" [221.1; 2350.10]; and special local lists like Streeter's, on those of Salem, 1768-1856 [2176.26]; Griffin's book on the "Press of Maine" [6192.7], etc. The lives of Franklin cover much of interest for the period of the middle of the last century; and for the early part of this century, particularly in New England, see J. T. Buckingham's "Personal Memoirs" [525.21], and his "Specimens of Newspaper Literature" [868.3]. For a good recent list, see G. P. Rowell & Co.'s "American Newspaper Directory" [613.2].

After newspapers became a power in political history, their development can be followed in the lives of prominent editors, like Amos Kendall [2344.52]; William W. Seaton [587.25]; Gerard Hallock; the work of Maverick, "American Journalism from 1840 to 1870, — Raymond and the New York Times" [4500s.17], and Jennings's oblituary of Raymond in the Galaxy; the lives of Horace Greeley, and his own "Recollections of a Busy Life" [1522.11; 2345.56; 4445.2]; Prati's "Bennett and his Times," and Parton's paper on the New York Herald in the North American Review [5315.1], reprinted in his "Topics of the Time" [894.17]; and the account of Whitelaw Reid, editor of the New York Tribune, in Scribner's, vol. 8.

Different phases of journalistic life and character are considered in the papers by Eugene Benson and Richard Grant White, in the Galaxy; by Park Godwin, in Putnam's, which has been reprinted in his "Out of the Past" [4407.2]; in Parton's "Falsehoods of the Daily Press," in Harper's, July, 1874; in the paper on "Washington Journalists," in Harper's, vol. 43; and in the experiences of different editors, as detailed in Wingate's "Views and Interviews on Journalism" [2405.63], and in this book George P. Rowell gives a paper on "The Business Side of Journalism."

English. — The subject was surveyed early in this century in Nichols's "Literary Anecdotes" [2534.2.4]; but his section "Of Public News and Weekly Papers" is mostly a list of those published down to 1804. In Chambers' Journal for 1834, in the Edinburgh Review for 1837 [3112.1], and in the British and Foreign Quarterly Review for 1837, there were papers on English newspapers.

Chalmers, in his "Life of Ruddiman" [2454.7], gave a chronological list of newspapers from the civil wars, and first gave currency to the belief that the "English Mercurie" of 1588 was the pioneer journal, and his views were reprinted in the Gentleman's Magazine for 1794, and were generally followed till, in 1839, Thomas Watts, of the British Museum, proved the production a forgery; and the question is examined at length in chapter 8 of Andrews's "British Journalism" [395.1].

The earliest systematic survey of the subject of the English press was in F. K. Hunt's "Fourth Estate" [999.5], in 1850, which, as a first attempt at bringing facts together, was necessarily imperfect; but he enlarged on the subject of the liberty of the press at greater length, and gave more attention to the "mechanism" of a newspaper establishment, and to the plans of reporting than was done in A. Andrews's "History of British Journalism" [395.1] in 1850, which brought the record down to the repeal of the newspaper stamp act in 1855, included "Sketches of Press Celebrities," and gave chapters (17th) to the Provincial Press, (18th and 19th) to the Scottish Press, (20th) to the Irish Press. A somewhat extended, but not highly esteemed, monograph, Grant's "Newspaper Press" [2475.50], is confined to London journals published oftener than weekly. See also the paper on the "London Press" in Contemporary Review, vol. 7.

During the last century, from the time of Queen Anne, the sphere filled by the modern newspaper was so nearly equalled by the essayist and pamphleteer, that the lives of Defoe, Steele, Swift, Addison, Fielding, Burke, Johnson and Smollett contribute much of the material for a history of journalism in England during that period; and so of a later time the lives of Cobbett, Jerrold, Dickens, Leigh Hunt, etc.

French. — The most elaborate and the best book on the French press, Hatin's "Histoire politique et littéraire de la Presse en France" [4619.1, in eight volumes], covers the literary and speciality journals as well as those more strictly devoted to contemporary history, and should not be confounded with his smaller work in one volume, which preceded it: "Histoire du Journal en France, 1631-1853" [2176.7], and which covers the field in a condensed manner. The works of Gallois [2176.4] and of Monseignat [4628.76] on the press of the revolutionary epoch have introductions on the antecedent history of the press in France. The most extended account in English is in Kirwan's "Modern France" [906.3], covering the period, 1635-1863, which is reviewed in the British Quarterly Review, Jan. 1864, — but see also July, 1863.

See also Hayward's "Journaliam in France," from the Quarterly Review, March, 1840, reprinted in his Essays [2564.2.2]; a series of papers on the French press in the Cornhill Magazine, 1873-4, reprinted in Living Age, Nos. 1520, 1536, 1545, etc.; and Albert Rhodes's article in the Galaxy, Jan., 1874.

On the press of the revolutionary period there are several works. Gallois, "Histoire des Journaux et des Journalistes de la Révolution Française, 1789-1796" [2176.4], which, after a general view, gives sketches of prominent journalists, like Brissot, Peltier, Marat, Camille Desmoulins, Condorcet, Robespierre, Mirabeau, etc., and the lives of these actors in the scenes will afford illustrative material. Similar sketches of the revolutionary journalists are contained in the 4th to 7th volumes of Hatin [4619.1], which are given to this period. Monseignat's "Un Chapitre de la Révolution Française" [4628.76] is upon the press of 1789-1799. See the paper on the French revolutionary press in the Cornhill Magazine, 1874, or No. 1565 of the Living Age.

German. - Prutz, "Geschichte des Deutschen Journalismus" [2176.5]. Lakeside monthly, March, 1873.

In Fiction. — Newspapers, as such, have not yet been much used as machinery or themes for fiction or poetry. Crabbe, in the first years of this century, published his astirical poem, "The Newspaper," which attracted no great attention, perhaps because those whom it satirized did not choose to help circulate it. In one of Balzac's novels, "Les Illusions Perdues," part of the story turns on the features of newspaper life and management in Paris. Similar chapters of London life are described in Thackeray's "Pendennis," and the name he contrived for his imaginary newspaper, "The Pall Mall Gazette," has since been actually adopted by a well-known London paper. Taylor's novel, "John Godfrey's Fortunes," does something of the same kind for newspaper life in New York city; and in Newell's "Avery Glibun" there are some passages of like nature.

Note. — The newspaper collection of the Boston Public Library, without counting special journals of a small size, but including the large pictorial and religious papers, now embraces about 3,000 bound volumes, besides about 500 more in process of making up and preparing for the binder. This collection is surpassed but by few collections in this country. The Boston Athensum counts 4,500 volumes, including illustrated papers, and is strongest in Boston, New York and Southern papers in the order named. The Library of Congress reports nearly 4,800 volumes, including 240 illustrated papers. The American Antiquarian society at Worcester reports 8,000 bound, and 1,000 ready for binder. The New York Historical society has 2,319 bound volumes, and 1,600 ready to bind, and is strongest in New York city papers from 1730 to 1875.

The next largest collection is that of the Wisconsin Historical Society at Madison, 2,423 volumes, including illustrated papers, and about equally divided between papers of the East and of the West.

Then follow those of Harvard College Library and of the New York State Library at Albany, which have between 1,700 and 1,800 volumes each. The New York Mercantile Library has about 1,500 volumes, including pictorial papers, and is strongest in the city dailies. The Library Company of Philadelphia has over 1,000 volumes, not including illustrated papers, and mainly consisting of Philadelphia papers from 1719 down. The Massachusetts Historical Society has 900 volumes, including pictorial papers, chiefly old Massachusetts newspapers. The Astor Library has 614 volumes, including illustrated papers.

## John Wesley.

The introduction to Rigg's "Living Wesley" [3558.57] is devoted to a criticism of the different accounts of Wesley, and the student will find further bibliographical help in the article in Allibone; in Decanver's list of books, written in refutation of Methodism [6182.10; 6185.1]; and in the list of authorities given by Southey [578.16; 5558.26].

Wesley left three literary executors, — Coke, Moore and Whitehead, his physician; and his journals and papers were put into the hands of the last named. Coke and Moore, however, acting independently, were the first to publish a hasty memoir, and Whitehead followed in 1793-96 [3554.2]; but his proved to be the work of a theological partisan. A memoir by Hampton [5555.3] was ready when Wesley died, but it turned out to be very meagre.

Next came the life of Southey [578.16; 5558.26] in 1820. He had no sources of information beyond the printed material open to all; but he had literary skill to make the most of it; and appreciation enough of his subject to elevate Wesley's standing in the opinion of such as were outside of his communion. He accordingly made an account of a great moral revolution, which has been by no means superseded in popular usefulness.

Now followed a number of lives intended to correct the representations of previous biographers, and in some cases to offer views more satisfactory to the Methodists themselves. Moore, in 1824, found something to correct in the accounts of both Whitehead and Southey. Watson, in 1831, aimed to displace what Southey had said unsatisfactory to the sect, and to correct Southey's chronological order; but he made his narrative slight and incomplete. Southey was, however, chieffy relied upon by Mrs. Oliphant in her sketch [983.4; 4527.2]; but while Dr. Rigg acknowledges it to be clever, he calls it full of misconceptions. Another lady, Mrs. Julia Wedgwood, in her "John Wesley and the Evangelical Reaction of the Righteenth Century" [3558.61] relied so much on Southey, as the Methodists say, that she neglected later information; but she so far accorded with the general estimation of Wesley in the denomination as to reject Southey's theory of his ambition.

In the general histories of English Methodism, Wesley necessarily plays a conspicuous part, and their authors are among the most important of his biographers. The first volume of George Smith's history [3548.4] was in effect a life of Wesley, though somewhat incomplete as such; but in Abel Stevens's opening volumes [114.3; 5558.11] the story is told more completely and with graphic skill. There is an excellent account of these days in chapter 19 of Earl Stanhope's History of England [963.2; 1966.6], and a careful summary is given in the fourth volume of the Pictorial History of England [962.2; 2422.1].

The relations which Wesley sustained throughout to the established church have been discussed in the London Quarterly Review, by the Rev. W. Arthur, and by Dr. James H. Rigg, the contribution by the latter being subsequently enlarged in a separate book [3547.61]. See also British Quarterly Review, Oct., 1871. Curteis, in his Bampton lectures, goes over the ground also [3467.60]. Urlin, in 1871 [5569a.10], prominently claimed that Wesley was a revivalist in the church and not a dissenter, and aimed to add to our previous knowledge.

The most extensive narrative, considering Weeley in all his relations, private as well as public, the result of seventeen years' labor, with the advantage of much new material, is the "Life and Times of Weeley," by Tyerman [5552.3; 5552.7]. It is, however, far too voluminous for the general reader. He is not blind to Weeley's faults, and some Methodists say he is not in sufficient sympathy with the reformer to do him justice.

Those who want compacter estimates of the man, with only narrative enough to illustrate them, will find them in Taylor's "Wesley and Methodiam" [1108.4; 3548.3], where the philosophy of the movement is discussed; in Rigg's "Living There is a well-proportioned epitome of his life by Lellèvre, in French, of which there is an English translation [3558.60]. Janes has made "Wesley his own historian," by a collocation of his journals, letters, etc. [577.8], and his journals have been separately printed [3473.8.3; 5559.2]. There is a separate narrative of Wesley's early love [5558.3].

Lesser accounts and miscellaneous material will be found in Clarke's "Memoirs of the Wesley Family" [535.12; 4543.19]; in Gorrie's "Eminent Methodist Ministers" [535.14]; in Dale's "Life's Motto" [1528.7]; in Larrabee's "Wesley and his Coadjutors" [578.9]; in Mrs. Sigourney's "Examples" [548.17]; in "Biographies of Eminent Men" [839.6.3]; in J. B. Hagany's paper in Harper's magazine [1810.1.19]; in the Galaxy, Feb. 1874; in Madame Ossoli's "Methodism at the Fountain," in her "Art, Literature and Drama" [403.18]; and in W. M. Punshon's Lectures [1114.4].

See also Nichois's " Literary Anecdotes" [2554.2.5], and Malcolm's "Index" [2190.19].

Tyerman's "Oxford Methodists" [5552.8] uses the material he had to leave out of his life of Wesley.

See the note on Methodiem in the History Class List.

### Architecture.

IN GENERAL. — The reader desiring to inform himself generally on the subject of Architecture will naturally turn to the admirable history by Fergusson [4103.9], an accurate, comprehensive and philosophical work, the most recent as well as the best general work in English. Equally to be commended is the work by Kugler, "Geschichte der Baukunst," in 5 vols. [4095.50], and that of Lübke, "Geschichte der Architektur" [8102.50]. These last named are in German, and are especially full in their illustrations of the architecture of that country. All three are fully illustrated by fine woodcuts.

Fergusson's "Handbook" [203.21] treats the subject topographically; but enlarged and remodelled on an historical plan, it constitutes his llistory, the fourth volume of which (published also as an independent work) is devoted to *Modern* Architecture. His division of the subject is adopted in this note, and is as follows: I. Ancient, or Heathen art. II. Medisoval, or Christian. III. Pagan (including Asiatic and American art, and the Rude Stone period). IV. Modern Art. Ramée's "Histoire Générale" [4102.13], in French, is a work of the same scope as those above named. See also "Discourses on Architecture," by Viollet-le-Duc, translated, with an introductory essay, by H. Van Brunt [4093.54].

Chief among the older authorities are the works of "Vitruvius," in English [4090.1], in Italian [4096.1], in German [2945.16]; of "Paliadio," in French [4100.16], in Italian [4080.2]; of "Alberti" [4093.11], an Italian translation from the Latin, also in English [4080.4]. Canina's "Architettura Antica" [4104.2], in 9 vols. with 3 vols. of finely engraved plates [4000.10], is a more recent work, dated 1843. Braun's "Geschichte der Kunst" [4075.69] treats of the architecture and art of Eastern nations among the ancients.

See also the following: Blondel, "Cours d'Architecture" [4100.9]; Normand, "Parallel of the Orders of Architecture" [4100.15]; Hope's "Historical Essay" [4092.3]; Patterson's "Essays" [4075.67]; Ashpitel's "Treatise" [8091.3]; Durand's "Recueil et Parallèle" [4050.6], which gives a great number of plans and elevations, on a uniform scale, of ancient and modern buildings, with details; "Monuments of Art" [8061.20], which is fully illustrated; also Séroux d'Agincourt's "Histoire de l'Art" [4050.1]. Falkener's "Museum of Classical Antiquities" [2962.4], beside essays on Ancient Art, gives a bibliography of works on the subject. The "Papers read at the Royal Institute of British Architects," 1863-1874 [4100a.50], are very full of matter.

Among elementary books may be mentioned the history by Memes [830.48]; "Lectures" by Elmes [4103.10]; Bury's "Rudimentary Architecture" [4109.1]; Wyatt's "Lectures on Fine Art" [8062.6]; Reymond's "Histoire de l'Art" [4076.54]; D'Anvers "Elementary History of Art" [4078.59]; Leeds' "Orders and their Æsthetic Principles" [4109.7]; also Mrs. Clement's "Handbook of Painters, Sculptors, Architects and Engravers" [4079.71], a convenient illustrated hand-book; and Samson's "Elements of Art Criticism" [4077.26], a text-book for schools, and hand-book for amateurs.

Other convenient and well-illustrated manuals are Parker's "Glossary of Terms" [4099.15]; Horton's "Architecture for General Students" [4099.16]; Mitchell's "Rudimentary Manual"; Lafever's "Architectural Instructor" [8090.8].

Encyclopædias. — Gwill's [4107.2 and 3], 1872, is copiously illustrated, and contains a full glossary of architectural terms, with a list of architects, and a classified catalogue of their works. Viollet-le-Duc's "Dictionnaire raisonnée" [4105.14], 10 vols. is devoted to French architecture, from the 11th to the 16th century. The "Encyclopédie d'Architecture" [4090.51], in course of publication, the first volume dated 1872, is finely illustrated. See also the "Dictionary" issued by the Arch. Publication Society [8103.50], and their "Essays" [8103.51]; also, Loudon's "Encyclopædia of Gardening" [3834.7], which treats of rural and garden architecture.

Periodicals. — (English.) See the "Papers of the Royal Inst. of British Architects" [4100a.50]; Transactions of the Inst. of Brit. Architects [4101.20]; Weale's "Quarterly Papers" [4001.6]; "The Architect" [5310a.50]; the "Builder" [3110.2 and 7210.7]; the "Building News" [7360a.1]; "Civil Engineer and Architect's Journal" [3200.1]; "Architects" and Mechanics' Journal" [8090.7]; London's "Architectural Magazine" [4107.1]; "Fine Arts Quarterly" [8072.1]; also the "Art Journal" [5160.1].

(American.) "Proceedings of the Am. Inst. of Architects" [3090.16]; "Architectural Review and Builders' Journal" [8090.22]; the "Workshop" [8101.16]; "Architectural Sketch Book" [8090.51].

(FrencA.). "Moniteur des Architectes" [8101.3]; "L'Architecture au Salon [4090.53]; "La Mosaïque" [8081.3]; "Tour du Monde" [6291.1]; "L'Art pour Tous" [7360.3].

(German.) Crelle's "Journal für die Baukunst" [4094.1]; "Architektonisches Skizzenbuch" [8091.9]; "Gewerbehalle" [8090a.2]; "Blätter für Kunstgewerbe" [8070.54].

(Italian.) Monumenti inediti [27. H. 3; 27. I. 1; 27. J. 2].

Bibliographies and Catalogues. - Lacroix, "Bibliographie" [2172.31]; Vinet, "Bibl. Méthodique des Beaux Arts" [6172.17], (in course of publication); Weale's "Catalogue" [2172.1]; Goddé's "Catalogue" (1850) [2138.4]. Also the "Universal Catalogue of Books on Art" [6172.2], published under the direction of the South Kensington Museum, London. All these books give many titles of books, in all departments of art, with bibliographical details.

In "Poole's Index to Periodical Literature" [3182.2] the reader will find references to many articles on this subject, published in English and American periodicals previous to 1853. See also, "Appleton's Library Manual" [2142.3].

I. ANCIENT OR HEATHEN. --- The reader will refer to the chapters in the general histories by Fergusson, Lübke, Kugler and others, above mentioned. Also to Müller's "Ancient Art and its Remains" [4072.9]; and to the works of Vitruvius, Palladio, and Canina, already referred to.

Egypt. — The architecture of Egypt has been very fully illustrated. Among the numerous works of the highest value devoted to it are the following: Lepsius, "Denkmäler aus Aegypten und Aethiopien," in 12 vois. [D.2.A-L]; Champollion, "Monuments de l'Égypte et de Nuble" [D.4.L]; Belzoni, "Voyages en Égypte [D.4.O.3]; Donon [D.4.O.2]; Taylor's "Great Pyramid" [3058.15]. Compare the note under Egypt in the Class List for History, etc.

Quatremère de Quincy's prize essay, "L'Architecture Égyptienne," is devoted to a consideration of what the Greeks have borrowed from Egyptian architecture [4003.15].

See also Owen Jones's "Egyptian Court in the Crystal Palace" [4099.40]; and consult the card and general printed catalogues of this library for many other works given under the title of Egypt.

Greece. — See Thiersch, "Epochen der bildenden Kunst" [4078.2]; Stieglitz, "Baukunst der Griechen und Römer" [4096.3]; Falkener, "Ephesus and the Temple of Diana" [2962.3]; O. Jones, "Greek Court in Crystal Palace" [4069.30]; Falkener's "Essay on the Use of Color," in Museum of Classical Antiquities [2962.4]. In Lloyd's "Age of Pericles" [2962.11] will be found a chapter on this subject.

Rome. — See Nardini, "Roma Antica" [2736.3]; Parker's "Archaeology of Rome" (1874) [2754.6]; "Monumenti Inediti," treating of Greek, Roman and Etruscan antiquities [27.1.1]. Also the magnificent works of Piranesi, in 29 vols. ? # The Notes in the present Bulletin.

It is hoped that the careful reader will derive help from the notes which appear in the preceding pages. The statistics of cfrculation show such a decided impulse in the direction of more studious reading, produced by the notes in the Class List for History, Biography and Travel, that the plan has since been followed of appending similar notes to the titles of new books, when their publication gives freshness to a subject, and of making important subjects the occasion of more extended treatment by themselves. An index to the notes in the second volume of the Bulletins, concluding with this number, will be found following the title-page prepared for the volume.

The series of notes on Centennial Reading will be continued for the year 1776 in the next Bulletin, and the Superintendent will gladly receive suggestions.

# Pamphlets Solicited and Exchanged.

The collection of pamphlets belonging to the Library is now all arranged; and many of them are in bound volumes, and are catalogued. It is intended in future to keep no pamphlets unbound, except in order to complete sets or series. These will be put on the shelves in boxes, and for the box the bound volume will be substituted, when the needful numbers are procured. Solicitations are renewed for lots of pamphlets, which will be substituted, when the needful numbers are ready. The chances are, that any miscellaneous lot will contain a fair proportion of the very pamphlets wanted, and the others will avail in exchange. The number of duplicate pamphlets is now upwards of 30,000, all arranged, and ready to be exchanged for others not belonging to the Library. With distant libraries, the following method of exchange has been found the most convenient: if they will send 1,000 pamphlets printed in their State, or in a given locality, this Library will send 1,000 printed in Massachusetts, or in some other locality. Each may acquire some duplicates, but a great part will probably be fresh accessions.

### Public Card Catalogue.

A change has been made in the printing of the cards of the PUBLIC CARD CATALOGUE, by which much time will be saved in getting the titles before the public in their proper places in the drawers. The process employed is that of direct transfer on gelatine plates, by Messrs. James R. Osgood & Co., the entries appearing in fac-simile of the writing of the Library transcribers.

# Memorials of Boston.

The Public Library of the city should contain every memorial, whether book, pamphlet, map, broadside, print, photograph, or the like, which is procurable, and which in any way illustrates the history or topography of the city. Books printed in Boston at an early date are very desirable acquisitions; and it is to be hoped that friends of the Library will assist in making the collection complete.

# Engraved Portraits.

Portfolios and scrap-books have been prepared for the preservation of engraved portraits, and any contribution of thir kind will be gladly accepted. Particular attention will be paid to the gathering of likenesses of Bostonians.

# Important Books in this Bulletin.

# Books Recommended, and Books Received.

Any person desiring a book not in the possession of this Library may ask, on blanks furnished for the purpose, that it may be purchased; and the assurance is given, that the book will be procured as soon as possible, unless there is some reason for not buying it; and, on its arrival, it will be retained three days for the person recommending it, to whom due notice will be sent by mail. It is not intended, however, to allow applicants to secure the stret reading of popular books by recommending them before publication ; as such books are purchased irrespective of all recommendations.

The right book may fall to come, if this application is not *legibly* filled in, and correctly, as regards title, author, etc.; and there may be delays in ordering, if obscure penmanship or insufficient or erroneous data render the labor of verification fruitless or uncertain.

Foreign books (even though with American title-pages), to avoid duties and to gain an increased discount, must be bought through agents abroad, and six or eight weeks, or a longer time must elapse before their arrival. Additional delays take place when the book needs to be bound, as is usually the case with continental publications, or when recommendations are received just after the despatch of orders, particularly as regards foreign books.

When the book is out of print (and books still standing in current catalogues are often so) no positive assurance of its speedy procurement can be given. The judgment of the necessity of buying duplicates must be based upon the Library's records of circulation. Bates Hall books are not duplicated ; but other copies, or copies of cheaper editions, are sometimes put in the popular departments.

If the books are recommended by those not holding cards, no claim for special use can be established, even if they are bought on such recommendation.

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
